Annual Meeting Of Tupelo Production Credit Association

The Tupelo Production Credit Association will hold its Eighteenth Annual Meeting in the Auditorium of the Okolona High School, Okolona, Tuesday, August 12, 2:00 p. m. M. C. (Pat) Dougherty, Secretary-Treasurer, announced today.

At the meeting, Mr. Dougherty will present to the stockholders the financial statement and progress report of the Association. Mr. Dougherty urged the full attendance of farmer-stockholders at this meeting. "Agriculture is the basis of our economic structure in the South," Mr. Dougherty said. "The financial progress made by farm people of this business, and a crop disaster is felt by all. Farming is more of a risk than a commercial business, even when every member of the farm family is doing his honest best, as has been clearly demonstrated during the drought this year." At the meeting, Mr. Dougherty will briefly outline the policies of the Association regarding the extension of needed credit to members to care for livestock and put in winter grazing crops to carry them through a difficult period following the loss of grain and hay crops. Representatives of the Production Credit Corporation of New Orleans will be guest of the meeting.

Members of the Association will elect two directors to serve on the board which establishes the governing policies. The Dixie Rhythm Notes of Shennens accompanied by Mrs. W. K. McKinney, will furnish special music. Special attendance awards will be made to members. At the conclusion of the program, soft drinks, ice cream and cakes will be served.

State Declared Disaster Area

The State of Mississippi, suffering from its worst drought since 1930, has been declared a disaster area by the Farmers Home Administration. Drought stricken families, unable to obtain financial assistance from private sources, are now eligible for disaster loans. Application may be made through the local offices of the Farmers Home Administration.

Damage from the prolonged drought was brought to the attention of Dillard B. Lasseter, Administrator, Farmers Home Administration in Washington, by Rev. Tom G. Abernethy, of Okolona, on July 21. He appealed for disaster relief. Lasseter promptly returned a telegraphic message giving assurance to Abernethy that the disaster declaration would be forthcoming and loans made available.

What Can I Do?

The extended drought with daily temperatures of near 100 degrees has severely damaged the crops of Tishomingo County. Old corn planted on high upland has seemed to suffer most. If the drought and hot weather continues, most farmers of Tishomingo County will experience a crop failure, which in many cases will be near disastrous.

This is the third consecutive bad crop year; during 1950, there was too much rain; last year and this year dry weather has reduced yields. It costs more to produce a crop now than it ever has; for three years many farmers have hardly made expenses, and some have lost money.

"What can I do?" is a question farmer after farmer is asking himself. The answer of course is to have faith in the future, but this is difficult, knowing the record of the past. It is suggested that more knowledge of plant adaptation to the soil on his particular farm be acquired, and in so far as practical, this knowledge be put into practice by each farmer of Tishomingo County. This will achieve results that will be encouraging. This should, if diligently practiced, prove economically sound and should return an annual profit instead of a loss to those who operate the farm.

Hundreds and hundreds of acres of corn is being planted on land better suited for sericea lespedeza. On most farms, there are a few acres of bench land or bottom land on which corn can be produced most every year. Cotton should continue to be grown on the better well drained upland soils. It should be borne in mind that during winter and early spring there is ample rainfall for crop growth and that ryegrass and crimson clover will grow during these seasons, furnishing good grazing for livestock. The ryegrass cut and properly cured furnishes a fair grade of hay.

The Commissioners of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District recommend the following:

1. That each farmer of Tishomingo County study his own situation and see if he can not profitably use sericea lespedeza as a pasture and hay crop on his farm.
2. Where sericea is to be used for pasture, plant several acres and fence it as that the livestock will have nothing to graze but sericea when turned into this field.
3. Apply liberal applications of basic slag and potash (at least 500 pounds of basic slag and 100 pounds of muriate of potash per acre annually) on the sericea.
4. Begin grazing the second year when sericea is 4 inches high; now if necessary to keep sericea tender.
5. Plant ryegrass on sericea to provide winter grazing, but keep ryegrass closely grazed in spring at time sericea begins growth. Sericea cannot stand much competition from other plants.
6. Look about you and see how well sericea has stood height and drought. It is easy to cut for hay, it furnishes good grazing, it prevents erosion, and builds up your land. Why not decide now to plant some sericea next spring. This partly answers the question of "What can I do?"

Here are some final suggestions: Prepare your land well, use plenty of fertilizer, use plenty of seed, and do not expect to obtain anything from your sericea the first year.

Large Crowd Gathered To Hear Rep. J. E. Rankin

Speaking to a large audience in Jaybird Park Saturday afternoon at 2:30, John Rankin, candidate for re-election as Representative from the First District, called for a return to the policies of Washington, Jefferson, Monroe, and others like them who believe in carrying on government affairs as the constitution stated them, and denounced "politicians who don't know a bull weevil from a bumblebee who are trying to tell Southern farmers how to farm." He forecast that Americans of future generations "may not know what freedom is" if the present agriculture committee is permitted to continue to regiment farming.

Mr. Rankin urged members of the attentive audience to patronize Mississippi's industries, to buy her products, and to boost the state in every way possible. He promised, if elected, to develop a waterway on the Tennessee river which would give Iuka and vicinity water rates as cheap as those enjoyed by Birmingham and Memphis.

Touching on communism, Mr. Rankin declared, "The communists hate us more than any other man in congress." He termed the FEPC and the anti-segregation laws as communist planks and denounced both heartily. Blaming Truman for sending troops into Korea without consulting congress, Mr. Rankin said that "we have lost more men in Korea than in the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812, the Spanish-American War, and the Mexican War combined."

He expressed the opinion that America can "protect herself against any attack and can lead the world in peace and prosperity" by building her air force, reserving a supply of atomic bombs, and increasing her naval facilities.

He was introduced by Bill Brinkley, manager of the local power association.

Mack Sanders, Chairman, Tishomingo County P.M.A. Committee announces the 1932 Price Support Program (Cotton Loan).

The Base Loan Rate for upland cotton of the 1932 cotton crop at Corinth and Belmont Warehouses will be \$2.02 for 15 16 inch Middling, white cotton. Most loan cotton of Tishomingo County will be carried to Belmont and Corinth Warehouses. Loan rates for other grades and staples will vary up or down, based on 15 16 inch Middling.

Your County P.M.A. Office will make Direct Loans on cotton placed in any approved warehouse. Also, the Bank of Belmont and the Bank of Tishomingo have been approved as lending agencies so farmers can get loans on their cotton in the south part of the county.

For any information dealing with the pooling of cotton please contact your County Committee or the P.M.A. Office.

The County Committee also announces the 1932 COTTON SEED PURCHASE PROGRAM.

The County Committee is now in the process of contacting all growers in the county requesting them to sign up to participate in the Cottonseed Purchase Program. If all growers and Old Mills sign to participate the farmers of Tishomingo County will be guaranteed Support Price on their cotton seed. Growers in the county have already signed, others are planning to sign. The County Committee hopes to announce, next week, the names of all growers in the county that are going to participate.

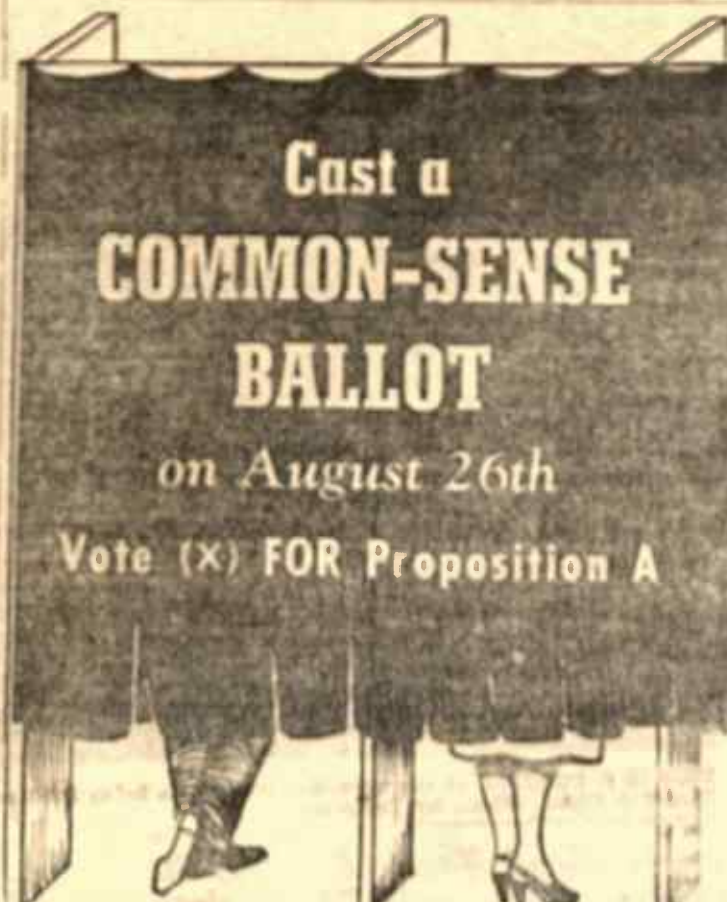
The Support Price on the 1932 crop of cotton seed is \$2.40 per ton based on Grade (GHI) plus or minus a percentage of such price equal to the percentage by which the average grade of cottonseed for the area in which the gin is located exceeded or was less than basic grade (GHI).

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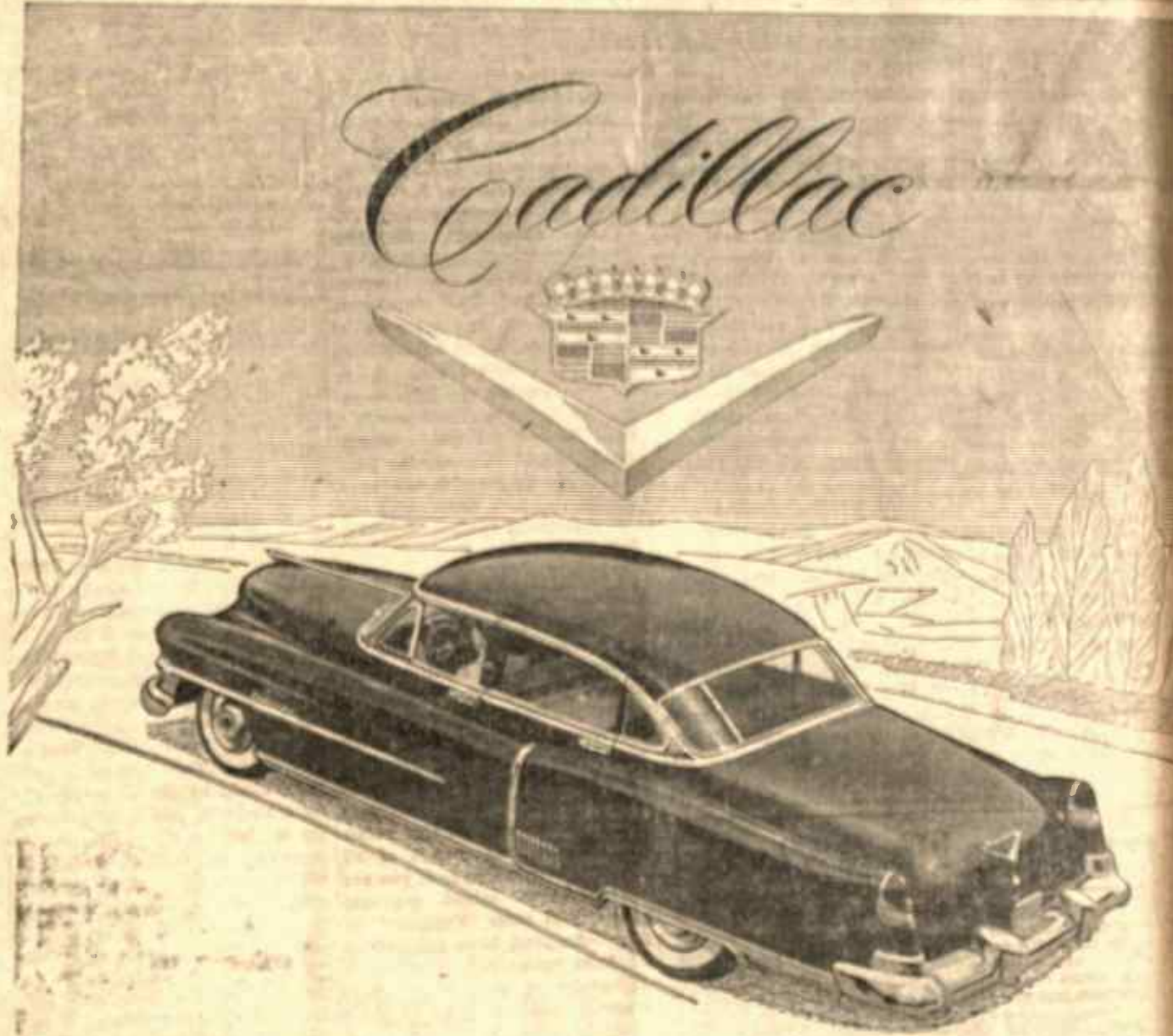

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

PAUL KELLEN
COUNTY AGENT

We announced last week the pasture winners in the county. We are sure there were many good pastures that were not entered in the contest that we did not see.

The points considered in making a good pasture are many. 1. The first thing to consider is a sound general land use program on the farm that includes pasture or grazing crops and livestock. We seldom see too much of the farm in grazing crops but there must be a balance of home grown foods on the farm in addition to the pasture program. A cattle man or a hog man will certainly need some grain and we cannot forget the value and low feed cost of silage. 2. We must consider the relation between livestock numbers and the grazing crop acres. Too many farms do not have enough pasture. The kind of land in pasture makes a lot of difference. One acre of good land will make more beef or milk than ten acres of wornout land. If a farmer does not have enough pasture, in the spring he can cut some hay from it, he will likely be in need of pasture when the dry summer months come. Sid Wilman, near Leeds, has cut 500 bales of hay from his pasture this year and he still has grazing. Check and see how many farmers have cut hay from their pasture. 3. Lime fertilizers are the main spring to good grazing, whether it be winter grazing, spring or summer grazing. The safe thing to do is to send soil samples to the Soil Testing Laboratory at State College and get your soils analyzed to see what kind and how much fertilizer you need. We have plenty of soil sample boxes at the County Agent's office. 4. Fences are also a part of a good pasture. You will need to keep your cows in and others out. You will have more trouble keeping others out if you have some well fertilized fall and winter grazing. Cross fences are needed so the pastures can be alternated and parts of it grazed at a time. 5. Weed and brush control cannot be left out of a good pasture. Brush and weeds shade out the grasses and take up the moisture needed by the grass. 6. Water control or the lack of water control on rolling land causes many times more soil losses than any other thing. A pasture soil takes very little soil fertility from the soil and the soil cuts erosion to a minimum. Terracing done properly will prevent erosion and will cause the water to soak into the soil and help the grass stay green longer.

We are having a Terracing school on August 18, 20, and 21

at Tishomingo school. We would like for every farmer who is interested in terracing and better land use to attend this school. 7. Stock water is needed just as much as grazing water should be plentiful in every pasture and conveniently located so the stock will not have to walk the far to get it. The farm pond program is doing a lot to help the stock water problem. If you need a pond check with Mr. E. N. Allen to see if you have some soil building allowance left to help build a stock pond.

8. A stand and growth of both clovers and grasses are important. If you get half stand of corn or cotton you know you can't expect top yields. The same is true with a pasture. If you don't get a stand, try to improve it. 9. Temporary grazing of some kind is a definite part for a successful pasture program. Anyone has grazing in April, May and June, but the cows need good grazing in July, August, and September. This can be furnished



by seeding Sudan Grass, Millet, or Sorghum. We think Sorghum is one of the most important crops on a livestock farm in Tishomingo county. It will furnish grazing in summer when other grasses are gone. It will make fine quality hay if cut when about 12 inches high. Sorghum is "a poor land Allende". It grows on thin land but responds quickly to lime and fertilizer. Sorghum is slow to start off the first year. You can't expect much from it until the second year. Then you can fertilize it and produce good crops on thin soils and a good stand of Sorghum will keep soil from washing. If we had half our cropland to a good stand of Sorghum we would have a much better livestock program. Prepare a good seed bed and seed 40 pounds to the acre and culchpack after seeding. Don't seed Sorghum too early. Wait until April any way. If we get a rain soon we should be getting our land ready to seed winter grazing. Early seeding and fertilizing means early grazing.

Let the People Decide!



The Mississippi prohibition law has bred unsatisfactory conditions in certain parts of the state.

The Mississippi Legislature in its 1935 session recognized this fact. As a result, the Legislature authorized a state-wide referendum on August 26 to allow the people of each county to decide how they would solve this critical problem.

In this August 26 election the people will vote on the following propositions:

A. For allowing counties upon petition of 20% of the qualified electors to vote for or against legalizing the sale of intoxicating liquor of an alcoholic content of more than 4% alcohol by weight.

B. Against allowing counties upon petition of 20% of the qualified electors to vote for or against legalizing the sale of intoxicating liquor of an alcoholic content of more than 4% alcohol by weight.

The issue is crystal clear. County action is the only issue. Your vote FOR Proposition A allows county Home Rule will simply give the people of each of Mississippi's 22 counties the right to do what they desire in the future. A county can remain as it is or at some later date it can decide to hold a local option election.

If a majority of Mississippi voters, on August 26, approve Proposition A, it will mean that any county which holds a local option election on a later date. A local option election CANNOT be held unless 20% of the county's voters petition for such an election.

Not a drop of legal liquor can be sold in Mississippi as a result of the August 26 election. This fact has been established beyond question by a ruling of the Office of the Attorney General of Mississippi. This ruling states:

"The result of the referendum will have no effect upon our present prohibition laws. Even though the entire state should, by a majority vote, favor the proposition stated, the prohibition laws will remain in full force and effect until changed by the Legislature by future action."

In other words, the Attorney General's office has said that approval of Proposition A only allows later county option elections if and when 20% of the voters of a county desire such an election.

Therefore, on August 26 you will not be voting for or against the sale of liquor in Mississippi. The August 26 issue is not a wet or dry election. You will only be voting for your right, and the right of your fellow citizens in other counties, to solve a serious problem for themselves.

It's the common-sense, fair-play, democratic, American way to handle such matters.

We are all aware that the Federal Government has been rapidly infringing upon the powers and rights of the various states without the consent of the people and in violation of the rights granted in the Constitution of the United States.

Mississippi has gained on record as being opposed to such intolerant and undemocratic invasion of states' rights and Home Rule.

The very same democratic principle is at stake in the August 26 election.

The Mississippi Legislature had the authority to repeal the prohibition law and immediately legalize liquor in every county in the state. But the Legislature, abiding by the democratic principles of HOME RULE, recognized the right of each county to decide what they want for themselves.

BECAUSE... we firmly endorse the democratic principle of County Rights and Home Rule.

BECAUSE... we believe that the time has come to give back to the people in each county their democratic right to handle the liquor issue in the light of their own reason and judgment based on local conditions, and

BECAUSE... we believe this referendum is the only fair and sensible way to meet this problem.

THEREFORE... we, as voters of Mississippi, have joined together in a CITIZENS' COMMITTEE FOR HOME RULE AND LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT.

We urge all citizens of Mississippi--whether wet or dry--to join with us on August 26 and vote FOR Proposition A to allow the people of each county to decide their own local problems as they see fit.

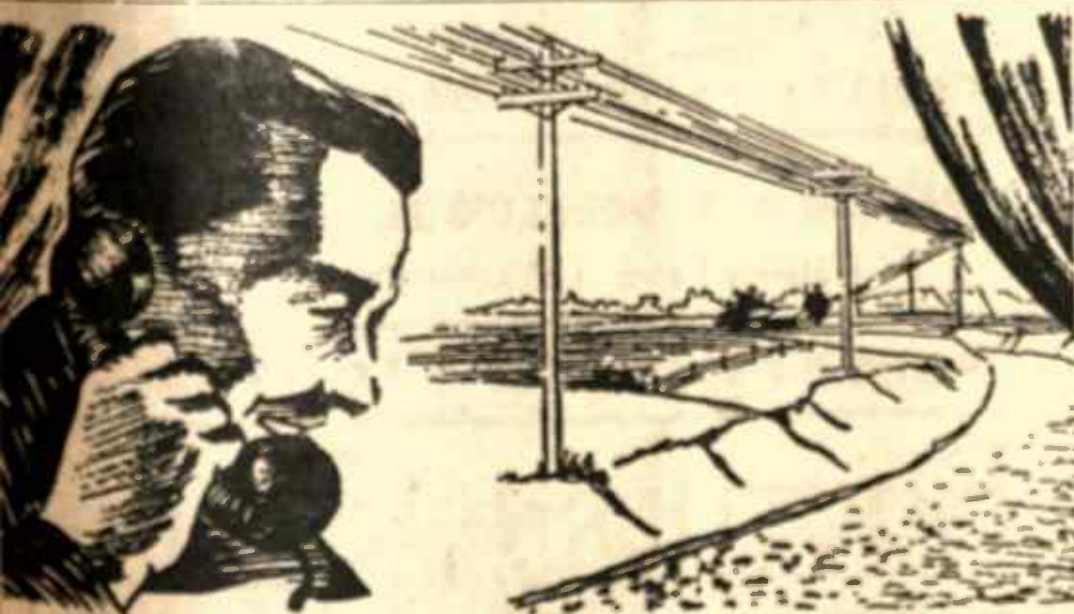

ers within convenient reach of the stove. Use them dry to hands. Round holders may be used and more convenient than the usual square shape because they fit the hand and have no corners to catch on the stove or touch the flames.

Tongs with a firm grasp are good to use in lifting the jars, cans of corn, potatoes or anything else from hot water.

Any fabric or paper in the kitchen should be kept far enough from the stove or heating unit so that it can't catch fire from contact with the hot surface of a flame. This holds for window curtains, towels or clothes drying on racks over lines, and also paper calendars on walls, recipe clippings or collections of paper bags.

Many burns result just from carelessness or forgetfulness. So it pays to review even the familiar safety rules. Review and practice them.

HOME AGENT NOTES

By IMOGENE BYNUM

There are 22 different vegetables that can be grown in the fall garden.

Most Mississippi gardeners sow the drought take a bit of their beans and tomatoes and other garden vegetables. Get the ground and seed and plant all made for fall gardening and you still have time to make up for a lot of vegetables you didn't get from your summer garden.

You can plant pole snap beans, collards, tomatoes, plants or cuttings. Chinese cabbage, rutabagas and six-week peas up to August 15. During the last half of August, you can plant bush snap beans, turnips, tendergreens, lettuce, mustard, cauliflower, rape, radish, onion sets or seed, kale, parsley, and cabbage.

Throughout the month you can plant carrots, beets and chard.

If you will plant at least 12 or 15 of these vegetables you will be the envy of many as you enjoy a good garden during the fall.

Irish potatoes for fall planting should be sprouted 2 weeks before planting. So it's too late to plant them in the North and Central Mississippi if you don't have your seed potatoes sprouting.

South Mississippi gardeners can plant them from August 15 to 25, central, August 15-20 and north August 1-10.

STORE VEGETABLES. You can store beets, cabbage, carrots, onions, pepper, potatoes, pumpkins, sweetpotatoes, tomatoes and turnips during the winter. Ask at the home agents office for a copy of Extension Circular 124, "Successful Home Food Storage." This circular will tell you how to handle these for storage.

WAYS TO AVOID BURNS. Women as children take first place as sufferers from burns, the figure on home accidents have shown for years. A few simple safety measures in kitchen would greatly reduce this unfortunate record.

To protect young children, you might fence off a play space away from the stove. Be sure a baby's high chair is set at a safe distance also—far away so that he can't reach hot pots and pans on the stove top and also far away enough so that the chair can't tip over against the hot stove. Keep matches in back of the range or on a shelf out of reach of children.

Never lift a kettle of hot fat. It pays to wait until the fat is cool to move it. When placing anything to cook in hot fat, do it with care, if possible, with tongs.

When cooking be sure pan handles are turned away from the edge of the stove so pans won't be knocked off accidentally. Use pans with flat bottoms that stand steady on the stove. Be sure handles are securely fastened so they won't loosen or turn when you lift the hot pan. When you take the cover from a pan or kettle, raise the far side so the steam will come out away from you. Have a place prepared to set a hot pan before you take it off the stove. Have plenty of thick pot holders.
