The Department of Agriculture Sets Prices Farmers Will Pay For Hay In Mississippi Drought Area

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced the prices at which hay will be made available to farmers in the Mississippi drought area under the emergency hay supply program, the operating details of which were announced yesterday.

Under terms designed to provide emergency hay supplies to farmers in the disaster area at a cost that will make it economically practicable for them to maintain their dairy cows, heifers, and basic beef herds, the following prices have been established which farmers will pay for three kinds of hay:

1. **Legume hay — \$36 per ton.** Specifications call for this kind of hay to be made of alfalfa or clover (excluding sweet clover), which may not contain more than one fourth timothy or grasses.

2. **Mixed hay — \$32 per ton.** This kind of hay must be a mixture of alfalfa or clover with timothy or other grasses of good feeding value, but must consist of at least one-third of legumes.

3. **Timothy and other grasses of good feeding — \$28 per ton.** The prices established are those which farmers will pay at the railroad car, and therefore do not include the cost of unloading the hay.

The emergency hay supply program has been developed by the Department following the President's designation of Mississippi as eligible for disaster assistance under Public Law 875, and the allocation of \$3,000,000 from funds appropriated under that law for use as required in connection with the emergency feed supply activities for those States.

All farmers in Tishomingo County who are in need of hay, due to the drought, should contact the County P.M.A. office at once and place your application. At the time you fill out your application you will put up \$5.00 deposit per ton on the number of tons of hay you need. Your application will be received by the Tishomingo County Agricultural Mobilization Committee and if approved the order will be placed with the State Office for delivery.

All farmers in the Fifth District (around Belmont, Dennis and Golden) will place their orders for hay at the Belmont Office on SATURDAY MORNING. (REMEMBER THE OFFICE WILL BE CLOSED AT NOON ON SATURDAY.) O. E. Bostick will have application blanks at his home if you wish to go there and place your order.

Iuka Public Schools Open With Large Enrollment

The Iuka City School opened Friday, August 29th with registration of all grades including 1 through 12.

Registration was held for the first six grades in their respective rooms, while grades 1 through 12 assembled in the auditorium.

Prof. H. L. Shook made a brief talk on Friendship. Mr. Roy Vaughn, friend of Mr. Shook, and pastor of the Iuka Church of Christ led in prayer. The students then were dismissed to register in their respective rooms.

This year's term for High School students opened with an unusual large enrollment of 175. Of this number there were 72 freshmen, 48 sophomores, 34 juniors and only 21 seniors enrolled.

Grades 1 through 6 had a total of 187, Junior High School 55.

On Monday morning the entire student body assembled in the main auditorium. Rev. Thurman Booth, pastor of the Iuka Baptist Church was guest speaker for the occasion.

After the chapel exercises the high school students assembled in the study hall, where they were assigned to their various class rooms to receive books.

School was dismissed at noon.

Corinth Business Man Victim of Traffic Accident

Charles Deaton, 43, manager of the Corinth branch Kroger Grocery Store, was killed instantly on Labor Day when the car he was driving smashed into a halted truck. The accident occurred four miles west of Corinth on State Highway 2.

His wife, Mary, was seriously injured. Mrs. Deaton was treated at Community Hospital and later removed to a Memphis clinic.

Parents of three young daughters, Mr. and Mrs. Deaton were alone in the car when it rammed into the rear of a Worsham Bros. water truck. The accident happened at 8:50 p. m., as the Deatons were returning to Corinth from Kossuth where they maintain a home.

The truck, driven by James W. Dixon, 28, of Corinth had been engaged in watering grass along the newly surfaced roadway and was preparing to refill its tanks near channel bridge when the accident occurred.

A flagman, Norbin Voyles, of Corinth, told officers he tried to warn the approaching car by standing behind the truck and waving a flashlight.

Economic Council To Meet Sept. 9th

North Alabama State Fair To Open Sept. 15th

The North Alabama State Fair will open this year at Fair Park, Florence, September 15 for six big days and nights of fun and entertainment. The management announces there will be no advance in admission prices over previous years.

With every effort being expended to make it the greatest fair yet presented in the Tennessee Valley, the only thing missing will be the swine exhibits, this being due to a state-wide quarantine on hogs to prevent the spread of a virus now prevalent in southeastern states. All other livestock will be shown, however.

With the exception of swine, the livestock exhibits are expected to be bigger and better than ever, officials announced. Larger exhibits are planned for all types of agricultural products, which in spite of the drought, will be abundant.

A great aggregation of circus and vaudeville stars will be presented twice daily before the grandstand which will be free in the afternoons. A big carnival midway with new rides and shows will also be a feature of the 1952 event.

As we write these lines we find in our files for fall enrollment a few more than two hundred transcripts of entering freshmen—most of whom right out of high school. This number exceeds our goal, and so far as our information goes, is the largest number of entering freshmen in the history of the college.

The public Junior College such as ours answers the age-old question of how a boy or girl with limited financial means can secure an education.

It answers the question of how a high school graduate may terminate his schooling in two years with knowledge and skills that will merit pleasurable and profitable employment. It answers the question of how one with limited means may secure a college degree by giving him his basic work which leads to admission to the junior year in a senior college. It answers the question of how a student aspiring to a profession may at practically no cost get his pre-professional training.

Furthermore, the modern junior college anticipates the call of industry for better and more skilled workmen; of the schoolroom for better trained teachers; of the professions for technicians; of the farm for those with expert knowledge of soils and trained in the cultivation of farm products; of the government for those trained in the fine art of good citizenship and of the home for a better and a more stabilized home-life.

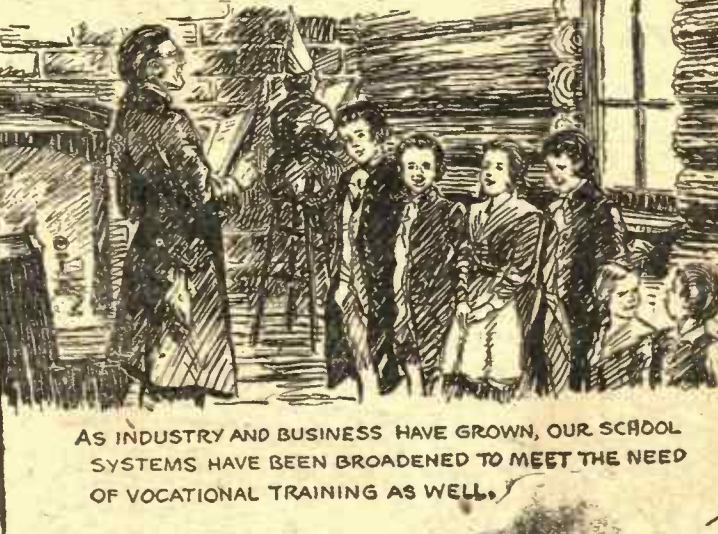

Bible Lesson
For The WeekBy Roy L. Vaughn, Minister
Church of Christ

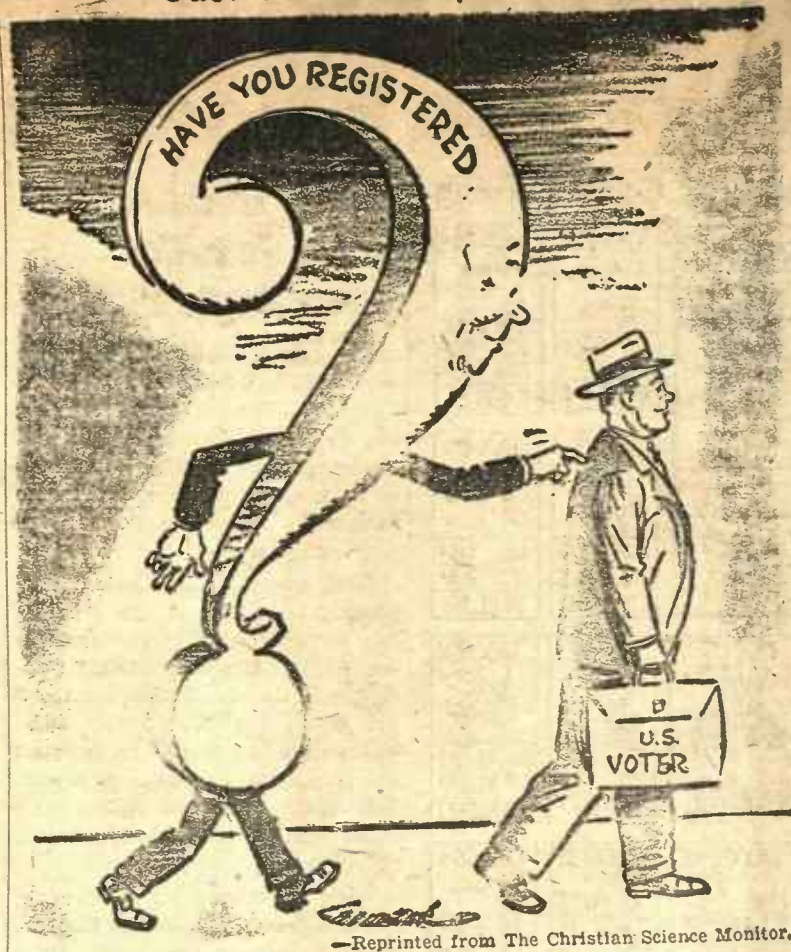
In our last lesson we learned why preachers for the Church of Christ do not presume to arrogate unto themselves titles of exaltation and names denoting superiority to others.

This week I want you to think

with me in somewhat the same vein of thought. It often happens that when a person drops something, stubs his toe, or things suddenly go wrong for the individual that he remarks something like this, "I sure would have said it, if the preacher hadn't been standing there." Or "I wouldn't have said that or done that if I had known you were a preacher."

I ask you in all seriousness, how much worse is it for a

preacher to hear you say those things than it is for God to hear you? Have you ever stopped to consider that He has the power to know even your very thoughts? The preacher can neither condemn you nor save you (eternally of course). I know that the preacher is bending his every effort and thought trying to persuade you to do God's will.

God is omnipresent; that is, He is capable of being everywhere at all times.

God is omniscient; that is, He has the power to know all things at all times.

Since He is, or can be where you are, because he knows all things, hears all things; and sees all things, it seems to me that He is The One toward whom we should feel our responsibility. He is going to judge us at the judgement, through Christ, according to our thoughts, words, while living upon the earth. "But I say unto you, that every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgement," Matt. 12:36. "Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life," Prov. 4:23. Space does not permit our giving more than a resume of the teachings of the Bible on the thought that God looks not on the outward man,

but that He looketh on the heart; and that He is going to hold us accountable for every deed done in the body, whether it be good or evil.

I know that preachers do not like to hear foul language and "cuss" words, and they appreciate ones abstaining from speaking them in their presence. But, the all-important thing is, that God knows the thoughts and intent of the heart. The preacher should not be revered and worshipped. He might lead you wrong, be guided by God's Word. Cleanse your thoughts, have pure motives, study God's Word; do what it says and you will not have to look to see if a preacher is near when you have an accident.

Growth of a Soul

Lesson for September 7, 1952

AFTER A MAN IS DEAD, and indeed while he is still alive, we ought to remember the best about him and forget the worst. That is how we want to be treated, ourselves. But human beings are so perverse that we often do just the opposite. We remember the worst, forget the best. This is so in the case of the great King David.

A novel was once written about him in which his life was pictured as a curve high in the middle, bending down sharply at both ends. After his great sins of adultery and murder, so the story went, he went on down and down hill to the end. This is not the picture we get from the Bible. In many ways his later days were sad; his fortunes declined, as we say. But his soul did not decline. The latter days of David show us how even a man who has sinned can rise again; how even an ageing man can grow in soul.

Signs of Growth

NOT THAT a man has to sin as David did in order to grow. In order to be healthy it is not necessary to be half-dead with ever first; yet even after a long stay in the sanitarium it is possible for a man to make his way to full health and strength.

Now David, though he fell, "did not blind his soul with clay." The experience struck down his pride; he realized with shame what he had done. Some men must wake bitterly to the fact of their own weakness before they can begin to take hold of God's strength. At any rate, we can see signs of growth in David's soul.

One of these signs is humility before God. Take the story of his flight from his capital, for example. He could have hardly been in a worse state. His loved son Absalom had become a rebel, his throne was in danger, his friends were turning against him, even his life was not safe. Another man might have committed suicide, or sat in his deserted palace bitterly awaiting the end. Another man might have returned Shimei's foul language, curse for curse.

But David moves through all this as a man who realizes he deserves his troubles, knows it is God who is bringing these hard things to pass, and bows humbly under whatever God sends. His kingdom was shrinking, but his soul was growing again.

Is the Young Man Safe?

ANOTHER plain sign of inward growth was David's attitude to his bad son Absalom. That young man had ceased to be a son, but the old man did not cease to be a father. The young man would have stopped at nothing, he would have killed his father without hesitating, in order to gain the kingdom for himself. But David was willing to lose the kingdom, if by so doing he could keep from losing his son.

General Joab, a professional killer, could see no point in David's generosity. He believed David should be a king first and a father afterwards. It was Joab who against David's strict orders finally killed Absalom.

But in death as in life, David loved that wild young man. No more tragic scene is found in history than David's lament, "Would God I had died for thee, A Absalom, my son, my son." It does not sound like a lament for a dead enemy, and it was not; it was a father's grief for his son. The grief came late; David should long before those days have remembered his duty as a father to Absalom. But late though it was, David's tears show that in him his soul still grew.

No Cheap Sacrifice

ONE OTHER sign of soul-growth comes to the surface: a single sentence from David on the day when he bought the land where the temple was to be built. The owner Ornan (Araunah) would have given the land free; but David insisted on paying the full value. "I will not offer burnt offerings unto the Lord my God which cost me nothing," he said.

No one would have blamed him for taking advantage of the owner, cutting the price a little. When David was a younger man he might have done it; but not now. No one else would know it, perhaps; but God would know it.

It was a sign that David was no longer the half-grown soul he had once been. For a man never really grows up till he does what he does, not because of fear, or ambition, or reputation, nor for any reason but because he knows how God is going to look at it.

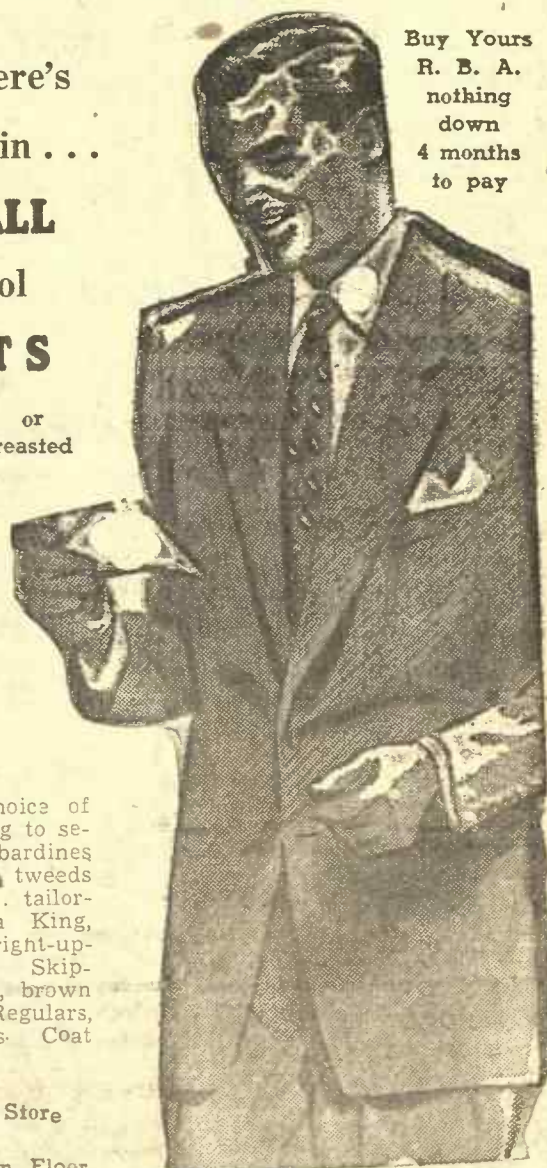

Delta Provides New Homes, Hope For War Area Refugees

A Mississippi Delta cotton plant-
er and a handful of displaced Eu-
ropean war victims have, despite
different customs and language
barriers, reached a common un-
derstanding which is proving a
profitable venture for both in Mis-
sissippi and which is helping reaf-
firm the belief of America's great-
ness as a land of opportunity for
all.

The venture, a modern furniture
factory at Sledge, a small commu-
nity in the heart of the cotton
growing Delta, probably never
would have been undertaken had
it not been for the migration of
labor from the plantations in the
industrial centers of the North.

The man responsible for the pro-
ject—Latvia Furniture Manufac-
turing Company—is Harry Howze,
a graduate in agriculture from
Mississippi State College, manager
of a 1,800-acre plantation, and an
aggressive young man in his thir-
ties whose native ability has spark-
ed the 2-year business into sud-
den but rapid success.

Howze returned to Sledge in
1943 after a fling with a big rub-
ber and tire company and took over
the plantation of his father upon
the latter's death, managing it for
himself and his five sisters.
Cotton at that time was the prin-
cipal crop.

Shortly after the war, however,
the negro tenants on his place
started drifting North, as was the
case in many other sections of
the Delta. By 1945 the farm labor
situation had become so acute that
a neighbor of Howze, Cok A. T.
Calhoun of Senatobia, decided
to transport several hundred Lat-
vians to Mississippi as farm laborers on his place.

Howze, quick to recognize the
possibility of solving the labor
problem, offered in the Spring of
1946 to assume responsibility for
25 of the families with the pro-
vision that they remain with him
for a year's trial.

The bewildered, fear-ridden re-
fugees, who fled their homes first
at the German invasion, then from
the Russians, arrived in New Or-
leans with little more than the
clothes they wore. A few spoke a
little broken English, the older
ones none. Howze met them, gave
them their first welcome to Amer-
ica, and carried them to their
new American homes at Sledge, a
strange land compared to Latvia—
which is Minnesota and terrain corre-
sponding.

The farm laborers who had been
occupied previously by negro and
white tenants were turned over to
the newcomers, and Howze agreed
to furnish all materials and tools,
provided the occupants fixed up
their own homes.

"Most of them," Howze says,
"built in new floors, papered the
ceilings and put up the inter-
iors. All of them immediately
went to work to break ground for
small gardens."

"Those folks can raise more on
an acre of ground than we ever
dreamed of," Howze declares.

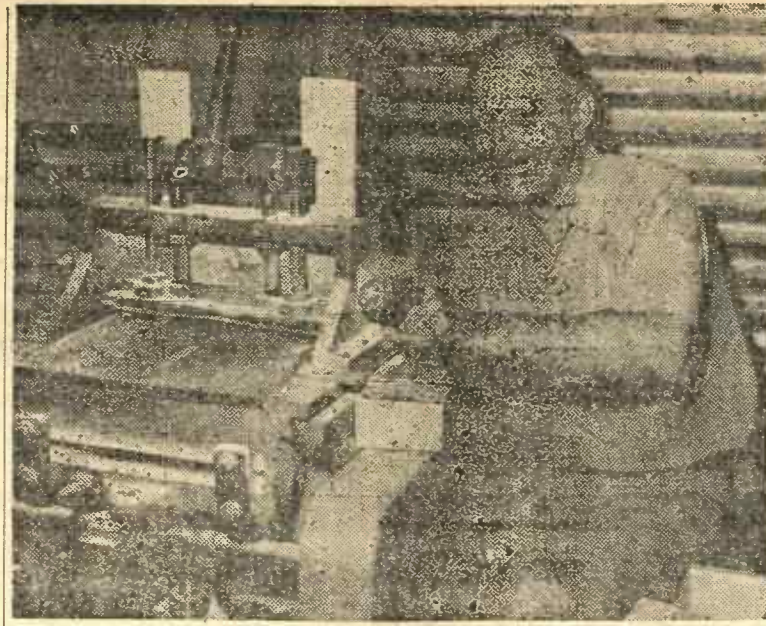
That first year the Latvian ten-
ants worked long and hard to pro-
duce cotton, a crop entirely alien
to them and especially difficult for
a cultured people unaccustomed to
the rigorous toil under a broiling
sun foreign to their native land.

"They just weren't inclined to
ward the type of farming we do in
the Delta," Howze relates.
"They were more accustomed to
dairying and livestock."

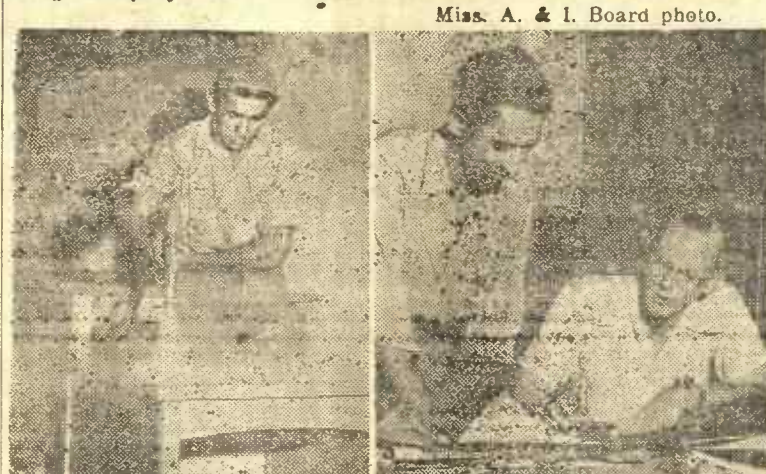
Most of them became discourag-
ed after the first year, and all of
them were discontent to remain
idle during off-season periods.
Howze sensed their restlessness,
and decided to do something about
it.

Shortly after their arrival he
had noted that many of the Lat-
vians showed exceptional skill in
woodworking, in repairing machin-
ery, and in designing novelties and
furniture.

"They had made furniture for
their homes; they could tear down
an automobile and reassemble it,
and were always coming up with
interesting new novelties, such as

telephone "gossip stands," inner
closet door racks for men's cloth-
ing, and similar gadgets," Howze
recalls.

"So, I decided to set up a simple
hobby woodworking shop in the
back of the commissary, more to
give them something to do be-
tween seasons than for any other
reason, never dreaming that it
might develop into an industry."

At first Howze encouraged his
friends and neighbors to give their
repair work—furniture, screens
and doors, and other odd jobs—to
the Latvians. He agreed to let
them make whatever profit they
could from such work.

Soon Howze discovered that he
had uncovered some excellent
craftsmen. One was 70-year-old
Adolfs Jacobson Povosils, a master
craftsman in his native Latvia—
which requires a 20-year appren-
ticeship—who had operated a plant
of his own manufacturing custom-
built furniture.

His son, Charles, whom he had
taught the trade, also showed ex-
cellent promise and had the addi-
tional advantage of being able to
speak English reasonably well.

Four other members of the origi-
nal consignment showed interest
and inclination for the work, and
soon the odd jobs had developed
into orders for store fixtures and
bank interiors. They also made a
few novelties which they distrib-
uted locally and in the immediate
vicinity.

"I soon realized, however,"
Howze recounts, "that I was eith-
er going to have to get into the
manufacturing business, or give
up the idea of having a hobby
shop in the back of my store.
Business was growing too fast."

At that point Howze became in-

planted and in good shape, hems to be let out in Susie's and Junior's school clothes and new ones to be made, canning and freezing of fruits and vegetables, house cleaning and many other chores, I believe you'll welcome a couple of recipes for quickly and simple made dishes. And both of them involve a minimum of dish washing and cleaning up afterwards.

DANISH PASTRY
 All mixing is done in one pie pan. Here's how.
 Place 6 tablespoons of melted butter in a 9-10-inch pie pan. Add 1 cup of flour. Blend with a fork until well mixed. With fingertips dipped in flour, press pastry against bottom and sides of pie pan in a thin, even layer. Place in a 350 degree Fahrenheit and bake to a golden yellow color. Don't bake too brown. Cool.

Add cooled, cooked filling as cream, pie or lemon ice box pie. If you desire meringue, bake in a slow oven then place to cool. This crust will hold together and is especially tasty with banana coconut cream pie or other fruit cream pie.

CHERRY PUDDING
 When Mrs. Felder, our Extension foods and nutrition specialist, tried out this recipe she suggested that huckleberry and blackberries with a little lemon juice or canned plums without the seed would be as good as the cherries. Look over your pantry shelves, you might come up with some other good idea for tasty substitutes.

The following list of ingredients will make 6 to 8 servings. One-half of the recipe will fit nicely in a 3-cup casserole or ovenware bread pan.
 2 tablespoons butter
 1 cup sifted flour
 1 cup sugar
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup milk
 1 No. 2 can 2 1/2 cups pie cherries
 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
 2 teaspoon cornstarch
 Few drops red food coloring
 Cream butter and 1/2 out of the sugar in a 1 1/2 quart casserole or baking dish. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Add alternately with milk to creamed mixture, stirring well.
 Strain cherries; add enough water to juice to make 1 1/2 cups of liquid. Add almond extract. Mix cornstarch with remaining 1/2 cup sugar; add to liquid, then bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Add coloring.
 Pour hot juice over batter. Spread cherries over top. DO

NOT STIR. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 40 to 45 minutes.
 Serve warm with cream or ice cream.

SHINE UP CHROME
 Sometimes the chrome even on new furniture loses its shine. If this has happened to your kitchen furniture, don't try to clean it with an abrasive. That means don't use steel wool or scouring powder. Your best bet is to give it a coating of cream wax and then brighten it by polishing with a dry cloth.

The same cream polishing technique does nicely on plastic upholstery of most kitchen furniture. It keeps it clean and shiny, and prevents stain from digging into plastic.
