August Gasoline Tax Collections

Funds made available to the Highway Department from gasoline tax collections in August amounted to \$1,296,240.65.

A portion of the state gasoline tax is the sole state support of Mississippi's current pay-as-you-go road program.

Total income, collected by the Motor Vehicle Comptroller ran to \$3,086,679.58 last month. Collections for August last year amounted to \$2,893,827.75.

In addition to support funds for the Highway Department, the gasoline tax netted \$1,080,940.43 to the counties. The balance of the tax goes to refunds for non-highway users, collection expenses, bonds and the State Aeronautics Commission.

To: The Citizens Of Tishomingo County

The following article was composed by a group of veterans and citizens of Tishomingo county. We publish it verbatim. It does not necessarily express the opinions of the editor of this newspaper.

"Your County Agent hesitates to talk plain or hurt anyone's feelings, but we as veterans and members of our cooperative can talk plainly.

"A little group from the warehouse co-op has been out asking people to put the pressure on the board of supervisors to get rid of the county agent because he 'meddles into their business.'"

"Goodness knows, someone who knows should advise the board of directors. It costs over \$800.00 a month to operate our co-op. We can buy fertilizer here in Iuka or in adjoining counties cheaper than we can at our own co-op.

"If you think our county agent gave bad advice, just check up and see. We know he advised them to carry liability insurance to protect the warehouse in case of accidents. They didn't take the advice. A man got his leg broken while he was loading seed in the warehouse. He asked for \$500.00 damages for hospital and doctor bill. The county agent advised the warehouse to pay as it was a just claim. No, they went to court and wrangled in court for nearly two years and paid out around \$4,000.00 to the man, lawyers, court costs, etc. Whose money was this? The farmers' money.

"The county agent informed the warehouse that they could no longer make a farmer buy five sacks of mixed fertilizer to get to buy one sack of T.V.A. nitrate. He also advised them not to ship a carload of Mississippi Chem-

Pvt. Bobby Pharr Drowns In Korea

Their worst fears came true on August 26, when Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Pharr of 65 N. Evergreen St., Memphis, Tenn., received a telegram saying their son, Pvt. Bobby Jack Pharr, who had been previously reported missing had died of "accidental drowning" in Korea on August 18th. Pvt. Pharr was returning from training with his unit in Co. E. of the 275th Infantry Regiment of the 45th Division, and crossing a river at a 75 yard ford when a flash flood suddenly swept down and drowned thirty of the soldiers.

Bobby was known widely in



this county. He spent the first years of his life in Belmont, where he attended school three years. Later he moved to Tishomingo, where he attended elementary school. The past nine years of his life was spent in Memphis. He was a graduate of Tech High School in Memphis in 1949, where he took honors in R. O. T. C., Glee Clubs and Literary Clubs.

Pvt. Pharr was employed with the Hunter Fan and Ventilating Company of Memphis, when he was inducted into service on November 8, 1951. He took his basic training at Fort Jackson, S. C. Following his basic training he and seven others of his company were placed in Leadership School, where he trained until June 18th. His last furlough with his parents and wife ended July 8th, when he had to report to Seattle, Washington for overseas duty. Bobby landed in Japan July 28th. On August 6th he was stationed in Chunchang, Korea, where he was undergoing mountain training fifteen miles behind the lines.

These whereabouts of Private Pharr were given in his last letter to his family, written on August 14th, four days before he drowned.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Pharr, of Memphis, Bobby leaves his wife, Mrs. Etyle Smith Pharr, formerly of Walnut, Miss., and now of Memphis. He also leaves five sisters, Mrs. Marjorie Moore and Mrs. Betty Yarbrough, Memphis, Mrs. Grace Goodenough of Modesto, Calif., Mrs. Glattee Silva of San Leonora, California, Mrs. Vivian Hatcher of Burnsville, and five brothers, Tommie Pharr of Memphis, Delton J. Pharr of Spartanburg, N. C., Eugene Pharr of Seattle, Washington and Jim Pharr, last reported in Wisconsin.

Statement By Paul Keller

Following is a statement by Paul Keller:

"Many people think that the county agent runs the county co-op or warehouse. This is not the case. The county agent is always glad to help or advise any group or organization. The co-op is entirely separate from the Farm Bureau.

"May I say to begin with that I am not against farm co-operatives. If co-ops are run right, they can render a valuable service to the farmers. I have worked very closely with farm co-ops for 25 years. Check this by asking the general manager of the Mississippi Federated Co-op at Jackson, Miss.

"I am sincerely sorry if I have seemed to meddle but I have meant to be of service to you by advising the management of the cooperative.

"Co-ops are set up under the state law for cooperatives. There are certain things co-ops must do to conform to the laws in order to avoid paying income taxes. Our co-op is the only county co-op in the state that does not belong to the state co-op system at Jackson. The state co-op furnishes its members with free audits every six months and advises on how to operate properly.

"Every farmer becomes a

member when he trades there. Every penny the co-op has in profits from your trading belongs to the farmers. I therefore feel it my duty as a public servant to give the best advice I know how in order to keep your business on a sound economical basis.

"I am interested in the farmers getting seeds that will live and grow, also fertilizers and supplies at the cheapest prices possible and still maintain quality.

"The honorable County Board of Supervisors stated that the main reason for letting me out was the objection or recommendations from a group from the county co-op. I am sure that some of the directors of the warehouse do not feel unkindly toward me. I am sure that some of them do not yet know just how their business is being operated. Any suggestions or advice I have offered have certainly been meant for the best interest of all the people in the county.

"I have certainly put in many hours of extra time and over time trying to be of service to the public and it has been a pleasure to do so. I have given freely of my time and talents, and have rendered an unselfish service to all alike. I hold no ill will toward any one."

Enrollment Increase At N. E. M. J. C.

Although, as is the case over the nation, there is marked decline in veteran college attendance, the situation is somewhat offset at Northeast Mississippi Junior College by an increased enrollment of civilian students. With enrollment still in progress, the total enrollment shows a gain over the enrollment of first semester of 1952, and the freshman enrollment to date of 220 students is twenty above our goal of 200 freshman set in the summer and 28 above the freshman last fall according to office records.

The total enrollment of the college today including academic veterans in evening classes is 400 with enrollment still in progress. This does not include the anticipated enrollment of teachers for six weeks courses and the large class of vocational students enrolled in the "Trades Training" department.

The Junior College has inaugurated this fall a guidance program which we believe will be far-reaching in its effect.

Every enrollee of the college is being assigned a faculty advisor selected from the field of the student's major interest. This advisor, cooperating with the academic dean will follow the student throughout his two years at Junior College and through conferences will advise him both academically and personally. This plan for close relationship between teacher and pupil should yield rich returns.

Miss Louise Marshall, a graduate of the class of '27 and a former county superintendent of Education, will be the new alumnae secretary of Mississippi State College for Women. The appointment, effective September 17, was announced by President C. P. Hogarth. Miss Marshall will replace Miss Alice Hamner, who resigned to do graduate work.

Farmers Home Administration Announces Disaster Loan Policies

Policies covering the making of disaster loans by the Farmers Home Administration to drought-stricken Tishomingo County farms have been announced by M. Hays Woods, county Farmers Home Administration supervisor. The disaster loan policies for 1952 and 1953 will enable Tishomingo County farmers, who have suffered a genuine production loss because of the drought and who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere from local sources, to obtain a loan to cover their farming operations. Mr. Woods stated that through the disaster loan program "every reasonable step will be taken to prevent the liquidation of desirable livestock by drought-stricken farmers and to help farmers continue in business."

Former Resident Accepts Position At Peabody

Mrs. Elizabeth B. Harris Sterrett, daughter of Mrs. R. J. Brown of Iuka and who has taught school in Jacksonville, Fla., for the past several years, has been appointed to a faculty position in the laboratory school at Peabody college, Nashville, Tenn., one of the South's outstanding normal schools.

Mrs. Sterrett submitted her resignation as first grade teacher in the North Shore school in Florida to accept the new post, according to W. Daniel Boyd, Superintendent of public instruction for the city of Jacksonville, Fla.

Mrs. Sterrett holds a Master's degree from Northwestern University and prior to teaching in Jacksonville was a teacher in the demonstration school at Florida State University, Tallahassee.

To: Patrons Of The Tishomingo County Farm Improvement Association

The past few days a great deal of talk and statements have been made to you people of this county regarding the Mississippi Chemical Ammonium Nitrate which I shipped from the Belmont and Iuka Warehouses to Mark Tree, Ark., December 3, 1951.

Since so much has been said regarding this nitrate I feel it's my duty as manager of the Association, and working for you people of this county, to tell you publicly and give you the facts—when and why—I shipped this nitrate out.

Let's start at the beginning of the story and find out why we have Mississippi Chemical ammonium nitrate. How it came into existence in Tishomingo county. About four years back 113 people of this county bought approximately \$10,000.00 worth of stock and the Tishomingo County Farm Improvement Association bought \$5,000.00 worth of stock which makes a total of approximately \$15,000.00 of stock Tishomingo county has in the Mississippi Chemical Plant at Yazoo City, Miss. All other counties in Mississippi and some in Alabama did likewise and the plant was built. We signed an agreement with Mississippi Chemical Corporation that they would ship us one ton of nitrate for every \$75.00 stock we had with them, in other words by having \$15,000.00 stock we should have received approximately 200 tons each fiscal year from July 1 to June 30 the following year.

It so happened the plant was late starting than they first thought they would. Therefore, we received some of the first material or nitrate the plant made and that was some of the nitrate which I shipped out of the county which you have been hearing about. Now please keep reading and see WHY I shipped this nitrate out.

Our first shipment of 16.7 tons of Mississippi Chemical ammonium nitrate was ordered to the Iuka and Belmont warehouses about June 25, 1951, this shipment was shipped on our 1950 allocation. Remember the plant is on a fiscal year set-up. About July 4, 1951, just a few days later we ordered another shipment of 40 tons but this came from our 1951 allocation and the day this nitrate was shipped from the Yazoo City, Miss., plant, notices were mailed to the stockholders of this county by the Mississippi Chemical Corporation stating their material had been shipped and authorizing the stockholders to pick this nitrate up in a fifteen day period. I also sent these same stockholders a notice stating this material was on the floor and ready to be picked up in the 15 day period. If the

stockholder doesn't come for this material in this 15 day period, reading from the contract, we hold with Mississippi Chemical Corporation, we then can sell this nitrate to non-stockholders. This we did so you see instead of holding it 15 days we held it from the 26th of June until December 3, or five months.

About November 1, Waco Parsons, Floor manager, and I broke into the stock of this nitrate and realized that this nitrate had become very, very hard, due to the moisture content that was in this nitrate when it was shipped to us. Remember this was some of the first nitrate made by the plant. We call the directors attention to the condition of this nitrate and they were asked what would they advise us to do with this material. They instructed us to sell it if we had to sell it at cost.

A few days later the auditor for the association, Paul J. Wolfert, checked the condition of this nitrate with me and he stated if we carried this nitrate over until spring it would be impossible to sell at regular price and maybe not at all.

About November 28, 1951. Mr. W. R. Smith, seed and fertilizer inspector of Northeast Mississippi examined this nitrate and found it to be hardened and in such a condition that he authorized me to ship it back to the company office, or either sell it to someone who might use it at once. He also stated if he found this nitrate on the floor, December 31, 1951, on his next trip around he would condemn the sale of this nitrate in Mississippi.

If that had happened we would have had \$2,220.00 of material on the floor which could not have been moved. That seems to me it would be a total loss if the company would not accept it back. We do not have a contract of any kind where they state they will accept material back if not sold within thirty days period, therefore I made a trip to Memphis trying to find a sale for this material. After making several inquiries I found a firm in Mark Tree, Ark., who wanted this material and would pay us \$74.00 per ton for it. This is the same price the nitrate was sold to you here in this county for. I sold it to this first stating that I did not guarantee this nitrate to be in condition for use if carried over until spring.

Statements from Paul J. Wolfert, auditor for the Association and W. R. Smith, state seed and Fertilizer Inspector, will be found in this paper next week confirming the statements I have used in this letter regarding this ammonium nitrate.

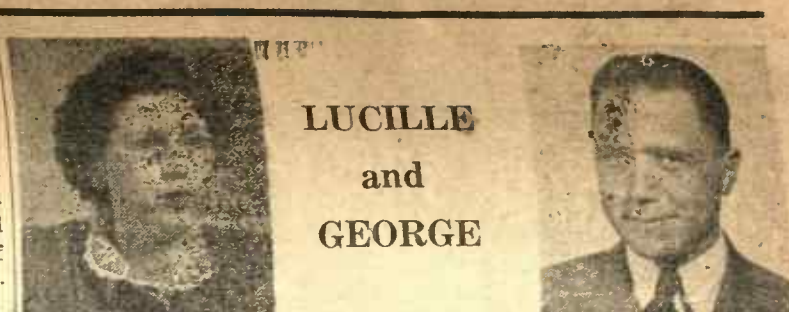

A quarterly examination was made for the first three months of 1952 which was followed by a semi-annual examination (6 months). The report of this six months examination was presented to a meeting of your board on July 26, 1952.

These examinations are made in accordance with standards for auditing agricultural cooperatives as they are outlined by the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.

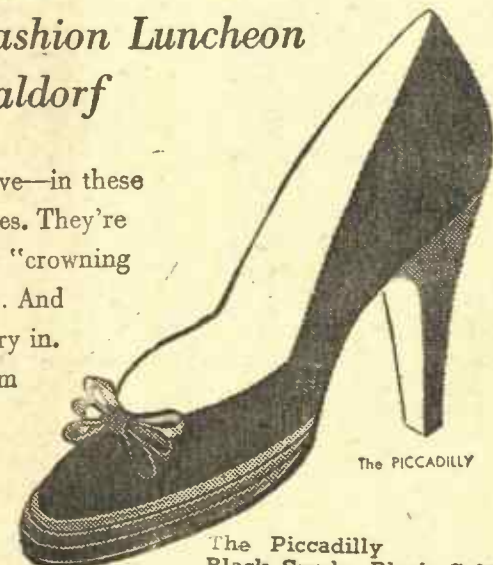

Legacy of a King

Lesson for September 14, 1952

DAVID did not mention you in his will. But if you are a Christian, you are one of his heirs all the same. The gold and silver he owned have long since been spent; of his palace not one stone is left upon another; his vast holdings in land have gone to strangers far outside his family. But the most valuable part of what he left us is still with us, imperishable: his legacy of religion.

Experience of God
ONE THING every one will think of: the Psalms. Bible students realize that the titles of the Psalms are not part of the original psalms, but represent later editors' beliefs as to the authors. However, scholars are agreed that David did write some Psalms and may in fact be called the father of the psalm-book.

Now the chief importance of any Psalm is not that it is a hymn or has been the basis of other hymns (as most of them have); it is not simply that it is beautiful and unforgettable poetry. The main point is that it is a first-hand record of firsthand experience of God.

We do not always realize how much of our own religious experience grows out of the experience of others. We would lack much of our interest in God and knowledge of him if we had not been waked up, so to speak, by some one else first. Think of the millions of readers of the 23rd Psalm, for instance, from David's time to now—the millions who have been inspired and comforted by it. How much we owe to David!

Singing Faith

WE CHRISTIANS owe to David also that blending of beauty with religion which is a mark of our faith. Beauty apart from religion can drag men down and destroy them. Religion apart from beauty is usually a harsh and cold affair. There is a great deal of irreligious beauty and unreligious religion in the world, and neither of them does the world much good.

But for David religion and beauty flowed into each other, or rather beauty found its highest level in the service of God. It was not only in the words and music of the Psalms.

While David did not build the Temple, he dreamed it, and before a stone was laid he could see in his mind's eye the fine carvings, the gold inlays, the cypress and the fir, the brilliantly woven hangings; all the gorgeous gleaming Temple that he never lived to see, was in his mind and heart. He it was who gathered singing men and singing women for the worship of God the Lord. Whatever beauty there is in our church buildings, in our hymns, in our services, we owe much of the original inspiration of it to David.

Where Cross the Crowded

Ways of Life
RELIGION that cannot be applied to daily living, religion that is a purely solitary affair, has never been typical of the best in Christianity. Christianity has something to say to the world, our word, our world, something to do in it. Christianity in retreat, in hiding, is not full Christianity.

Perhaps we owe more of this ideal to David than we realize. For when he came to the throne, the ark—sacred symbol of the presence of God—was in a little out-of-the-way place where few could know of it. David took that ark and brought it to the nation's capital. Shrine and city must be united.

So wherever today the church stands literally or figuratively at the crossroads of life, challenging, inviting, winning men, a constant reminder of God, we should be thankful to David, who set the symbol of his religion in the very center of his nation's political city.

Faith Faces Forward
ONE MORE thing must be mentioned, which we owe at least in part to David. It is a characteristic of both Jewish and Christian faith: Hope.

Some religions are religions of regret. Their golden age is in the past; as they see it the world is either going around and around in meaningless circle or in hopeless decay.

But any one who will read the Psalms with a penetrating eye can see how bright the future is to the Psalmist's mind. Bright, because it belongs to God. If Paul can say that hope is one of the things that endure, along with faith and love, he was not the first to think it. David long ago sang his songs of hope, and for this legacy too we may be grateful.

HOME AGENT NOTES

A clean kitchen range looks, cooks and lasts longer than one that is allowed to gather grease, spilled food, and dust. For full, even, efficient heat, cleanliness is important. Reflecting surfaces must be kept shining to do their job of giving off heat.

The manufacturer's booklet, which comes with a new range, gives advice on cleaning and care. Read this booklet and keep it handy.

Here are some general suggestions, however, that apply toward keeping your kitchen stove clean.

Wipe up spills and spatters promptly with a dry clean cloth or paper. Grease comes off most easily when fresh and hot. Acid foods should never be left on because they eat into enamel surfaces or hasten rusting of metal. Other foods may scorch on until they are hard to remove without strenuous scouring. Which is likely to be hard on the surface.

Metal and porcelain parts of ranges need frequent washing with a clean cloth moistened in warm suds, but this should be done only after the stove is cool. A wet cloth on a hot surface is a hazard to your hands and may crack enamel.

Many good house keepers make a habit of wiping off the stove with a damp cloth after doing the dishes. Go easy on water so it doesn't drip or run down sides or into burners and cause rust or streaks.

Charred particles on burners or heating units, or in the bottom of the stove may be removed after the stove cools off by brushing out or drawing them out with a vacuum cleaner. If gas burners become clogged, you may clean them out with a metal wire after the gas is turned off. Never use a tooth pick; it may break off in the burner.

Ovens are often neglected in cleaning because they are closed and out of sight. Yet a dirty oven often smokes when heated, may even give food cooked in it an unpleasant taste. Ovens benefit by ventilation after use. Leaving the oven open to cool helps keep it clean and fresh

and prevents rusting from closed in steam.

To remove scorched on grease in ovens, diluted ammonia helps. Apply with a cloth. Or set a dish of ammonia in a closed oven over night to let the fumes loosen the soil. Then scour lightly with very fine steel wool or fine scouring power like whiting, and wipe off.

Changing Your Will
 Wills, like everything else, should be kept up to date. This may be done by the addition of a codicil or by remaking the entire will. In the event a new will is made, the old one should be destroyed. In the event the old one is not destroyed, however, the will bearing the latest date is the one that will be recognized.

The death of a beneficiary might likely make you want to change your will. Then, too, both personal and real property can change from time to time. It is much better to keep a will current for the sake of the one who is to see its execution after the maker is gone.

Cautious Start
 One touch of a hot iron has ruined many a garment. It pays to start with low heat on any ironing job. Then adjust the temperature to the fabric.

This is especially true if you are pressing any of the synthetic fabrics or even fabrics that are a mixture of synthetics and other fibers. Even cotton and linens, which generally can take a hotter iron than any other fabrics, may have special finishes that call for less heat.
