to make Pop's discarded tie into a scarf and bow tie for yourself. Silk, wool and crush-repellent fabric are best. If you need a special color, buy a tie of your own.

Rip the tie open, remove the interlining of wool and cut out a section about 10 inches long at center back along straight of fabric. Restitch the seam and press open. Press out the lengthwise folds and hem the edges.

With a final pressing, you are ready to try your hand at some of the various ways a scarf may be used this season.

For the little bow tie, press open the piece you cut from the center back and fold wrong side out. Stitch across the ends and up the sides to within an inch of the center. Clip corners and turn right side out through the inch opening.

Slip stitch opening, press lightly and tie in a knot at the center. Tack a small safety pin to the back of the knot—and your tie is ready to go at the neck of your blouse, dress or try to pin it on the pocket of either.

KEEPING BREAD

Keeping bread fresh and mold-free is no problem to the housewife with home freezer space for it. Bread that is frozen and stored at well below freezing temperature will keep fresh a year.

This long keeping isn't practical, however, and its an uneconomical use of freezer space and requires special moisture-vapor-proof wrapping.

To keep bread in your freezer a week or two, the waxed paper wrappings in which it comes is enough. Leave the bread in its wrapper until it thaws out so the moisture from the warm air will condense on the wrapper rather than the bread.

For toasting, ready sliced loaves needn't be thawed. Take the bread directly from the wrapper and place in the toaster or oven.

Bread should be kept either frozen or warm to hold its softness. Whether you and your family like your bread soft or firm, will decide whether or not to keep bread in the home refrigerator. Bread in the refrigerator loses the softness that to many people means freshness. In the chill of the refrigerator, bread becomes firm and cannot be restored to its original softness.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To reheat rolls or biscuits with out lighting the oven, place them in the top of a double boiler and heat over boiling water for about 15 minutes.

When you are making baking powder biscuits, roll them thinner than usual, butter one biscuit and place unbuttered one on top. Then bake. The biscuit will not only break in two easily but they will taste richer, too.

Pad coat hangers with discarded shoulder pads. This helps keep the shape in shoulders of newly cleaned clothes that you are storing in the garment bag.

Put strips of adhesive tape on the soles of new shoes to keep them from slipping.

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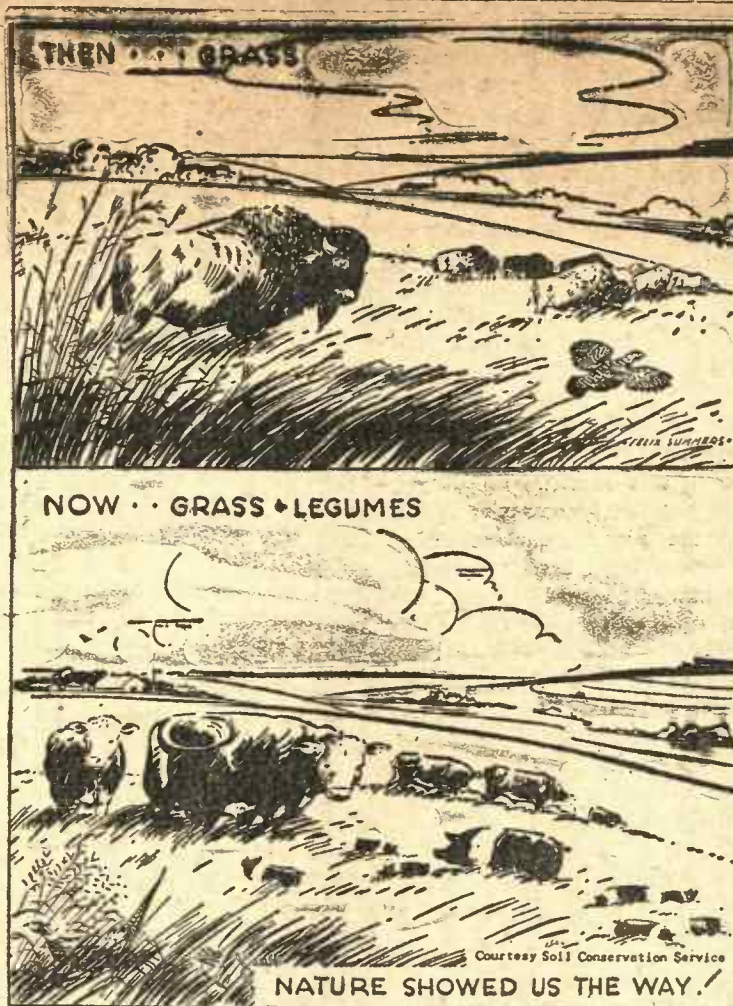

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH L. FOREMAN
SCRIPTURE: I Kings 1:28-40; 2:1-4; 3:1-15; 5:1-14; 8:1 II Chronicles 5-8.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Proverbs 3:12-18.

A King Prays
Lesson for September 21, 1952

KING SOLOMON is not best known for his prayers; yet they are among the most remarkable features of what we know of him. If we can know what a man prays for, we know the heart of the man. The higher a man's place in life, the more he stands in need of prayer, the prayers of others as well as his own. King Solomon's reputation for wisdom based on one rather fantastic court decision, or on the splendor of the Temple, which he did not design; still less on those legendary powers such as being able to converse with dragonflies and demons. He was never more wise than in his prayers.

Dreams Give You Away
THEY SAY that when one is learning a new language, one can be sure one is making progress when one starts dreaming in the new language. Dreams, psychologists believe, show us what our minds are like, beneath the smooth surface. We should not take all our dreams too seriously, because, after all, it is the conscious mind that is at the wheel during our waking lives. But still a dream may show the kinds of wishes and desires and fears which lie deeper than our usual consciousness.

Now when a man dreams about praying to God face to face, you may be sure he is really a God-fearing, praying man. So the young Solomon's dream of his interview with God is a good indication of the depths of his mind and intentions at that time.

It was not a silly dream; it was quite serious. We may well believe that the young king often thought about it afterwards, and that God actually took this way of speaking to Solomon.

Ask for One Thing
IN THAT dream Solomon is invited to pray, and God guarantees to answer the prayer, whatever it is. It is remarkable what Solomon did not ask for.

Considering the fact that his father had been such a warrior, one might expect Solomon to ask for victory in war. But the young king, even in his dreams, did not picture himself as a conquering hero. Then again, he might have been expected to want to be rich. He came of a race that rated property very highly indeed. In the Hebrew language, the expression "a great man" often meant simply a very rich one. But it was not money that Solomon desired most of all. A third blessing too might have been in Solomon's mind; something that every man of his time looked on as a sure sign of the blessing of God: namely, long life. But this too was not what the young man most wished to have.

Instead, he prayed for wisdom. Knowledge is knowing; wisdom is knowing how to use what you know. And he wanted this wisdom, not in order to be rich, powerful or long-lived, but in order to become a good leader of his people.

One cannot help believing that Solomon already had in him the seed of wisdom, or he would not have offered that prayer. Only the wise know what a jewel wisdom is.

Prayer of a Mature Mind
A NOTHER prayer of this famous king is recorded at the dedication of the Temple. Solomon had grown older by that time, and we can see in this prayer that he had grown wiser as well. For good as his dream-prayer was, this later one was deeper, higher, wiser.

By this time his idea of God is higher than it was. He is aware now that God does not live even in the most gorgeous of temples; his dwelling place is in heaven, and his care is not for the nation of Israel alone.

Then again, in the earlier prayer Solomon's horizon was bounded by the limits of his native land. His prayer was unselfish indeed, but it took in the welfare of his own subjects—no others. Now at the Temple he prays for "the stranger . . . all the people of the earth."

Furthermore, if in his earlier prayer young Solomon was aware of his and his people's weakness and ignorance, now he feels something deeper, more serious: the burden of human sin. He prays for many blessings, but above all for this: forgiveness for every heart that turns to God. When we ourselves pray, are our prayers mature? How high is our thought of God? For how wide a circle of persons do we pray? And do we pray first, and most of all, for things, or for power, or to be in harmony with God?

This is to certify that I make monthly examinations of seeds and fertilizers of the Tishomingo County Farm Improvement Association.

When I made my monthly visit in November, I found 600 bags of Mississippi Chemical Ammonium Nitrate which had already set up and could not be used if it was longer. I discussed this with the floor manager and the manager of the Co-op and advised them to ship it back to the company or if possible sell it provided they could do so, otherwise I would have to prohibit the sale of this material when I made my visit in December, 1931.

When I made my visit in December, 1931, they told me that they had shipped the 600 bags of ammonium nitrate to Mark Tree, Arkansas, for use there. If I had found this material on the floor on this trip I would have prohibited sale, causing the Association to lose around \$2,000.00 of they had put up for the Stockholders of the Mississippi Chemical Corporation to get this material.

I would like to say to the farmers of Tishomingo County your Association has cooperated with me in every way and have called my attention to things that were wrong and received a car of Ammonium Nitrate this summer. I found a short in weight and they could have sold this material one probably would never have known this was short in weight. This material, and reported the shortage, found they want to do what is right in carrying on business.

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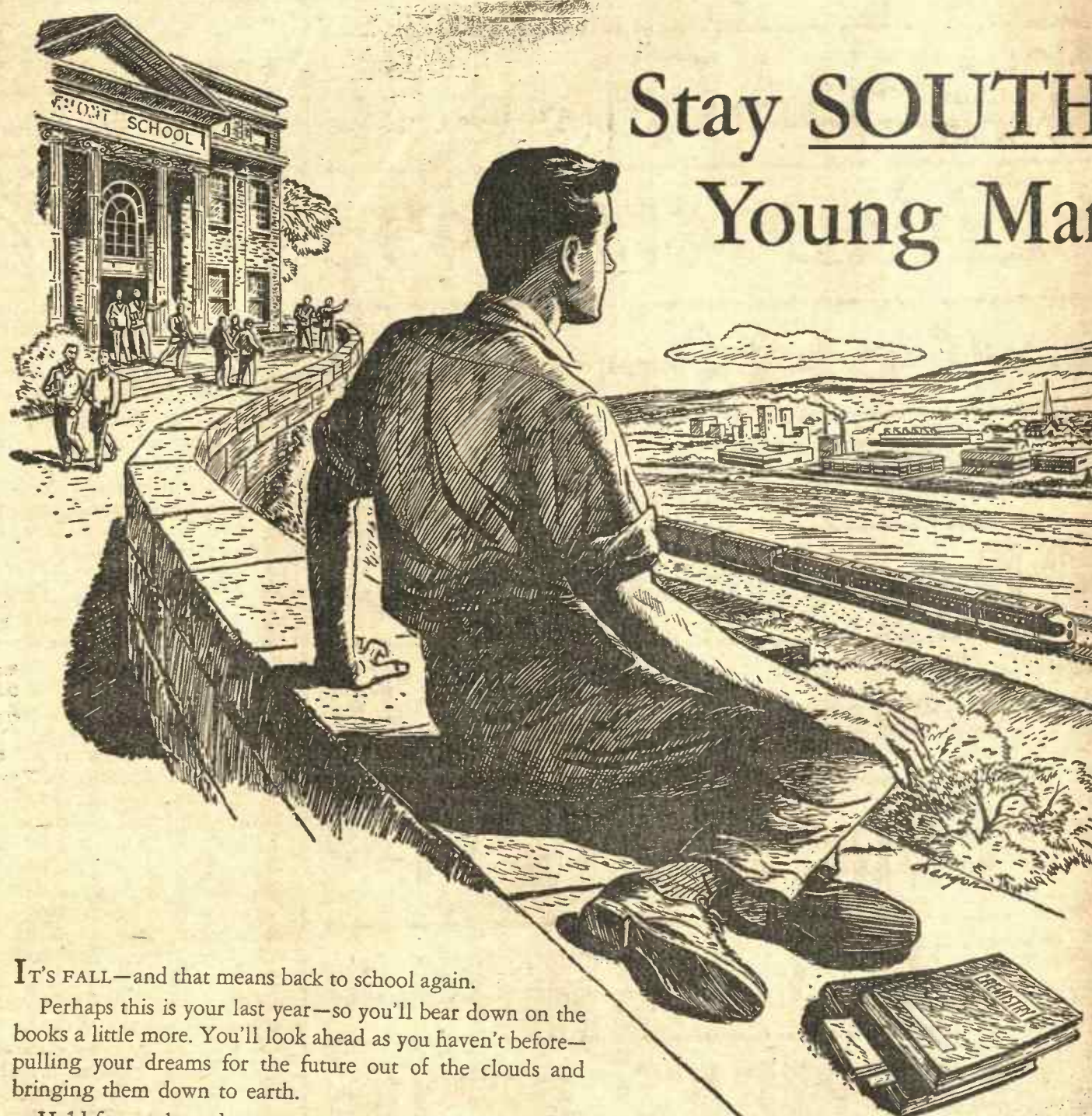
