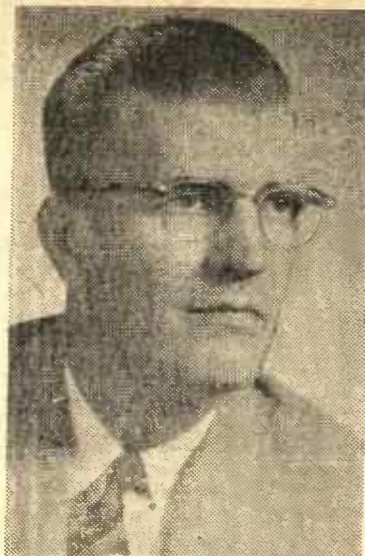

Industrialists Hear
Miss. Manufacturers
Association President

Frank R. Iler

TUPELO, MISS.—Frank R. Iler, general manager of the Blue Bell, Inc. plant here and president of the Mississippi Manufacturers Association, addressing the Tupelo Industrial Club at its September 9 meeting, said "Manufacturers must put aside their differences and work together" if they are to fight effectively for the American Way of Life and against the rising tide of collectivism in government.

"The Mississippi Manufacturers Association," Iler asserted, "was created to bind together the manufacturers of this state into an organized group so that the story of our contribution to Mississippi's economy may be adequately told and so that a true picture of this state's manufacturing industry, operating under the principles of Free Enterprise and Individual Initiative, may be presented to the people."

Iler, the first president of the association and one of its founders, is a native of North Carolina who first came to Mississippi in 1940 to work in Blue Bell's Natchez plant. He became manager of the Tupelo operation in 1947.

Pointing to the annual meeting of the Mississippi Manufacturers Association, to be held in Jackson on October 14, Iler stated that "the association's first year of growth is drawing to a close, and we are proud of what has been accomplished. We intend to get a fresh start at the annual meeting and to enlist the aid of every member in putting our forward-looking, positive plan-of-action into effect."

This program-of-action includes cooperation with other organizations in bringing new industries to Mississippi, as well as plans to publicize the part the manufacturing industry is playing in Mississippi's economic development.

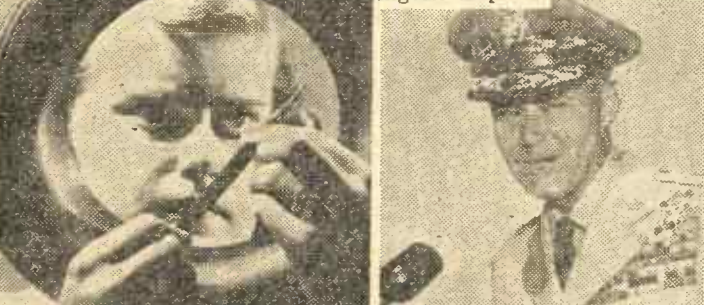

Washday Every Day

One old tradition worth banishing when a new washer comes into your house is the weekly washday. It's more efficient and economical general to spread the washing through the week. Do a load a day instead of four or five loads a day.

Overshoe Rack

A peg rack is a good device for keeping rubber boots or tall over shoes handy and in good shape. Old broom handles, cut longer than the height of the boot, may be nailed to a shelf or board so that each boot can be placed upside down on its own "peg."

This saves rubber boots from flopping over and eventually cracking at the ankles. Keeps them clean too.

Rubber boots and over shoes

may be saved from cracking by stuffing them with paper to hold them in shape when they are stored.

Much wear and tear on over-shoes can be prevented by putting them on carefully instead of jerking them on.

Uses For Tea Ball

Onions cut into bits and put in a tea ball kept especially for the purpose will flavor food delicately and leaves no pieces of onion in the food itself.

A tea ball is a convenient container in which to put whole spices when making spiced sirups or some types of pickles were a spice flavor rather than whole spice itself is desirable. Leave the tea ball containing the spice in the boiling water mixture the desired length of time and then remove.

Fall Vegetables

Okra will continue to bear until frost. So will hot and sweet peppers, eggplant and pole lima beans. In many instances bush lima beans and some field peas have taken on new life and are blooming abundantly.

These plants that are in production should be given some extra care during the next 3 or 4 weeks. Weeds and grass should be cleaned away and 2 pounds of nitrate of soda per 100 ft. applied on either side of the row. Work the fertilizer into the soil.

This will give a little extra "push" toward more production before weather comes.

You still have time to plant a number of fall vegetables in your garden. These include beets, carrots, Swiss chard, Chinese cabbage, kale, lettuce, mustard, turnips, tendergreens, onions, parsley, radish, rape and spinach.

Adlai E. Stevenson

I-A Personal Philosophy

Adlai (almost rhymes with "glad") Ewing Stevenson, thirty-seventh governor of the State of Illinois, is fifty-two years old, weighs one hundred and eighty-five pounds, stands five feet nine and a half inches and is one of the few men in history who has turned down a sure nomination for the presidency of the United States before being elected to that office.

Stevenson has a detached viewpoint about his sudden emergence as a major figure on the world scene which sometimes pains and always puzzles professional politicians.

Stevenson himself is more entertained than upset by such attitudes. "I must confess," he remarked recently, "I seem to spend a lot of time reading about myself in papers and magazines these days. The awful thing is, I can't say that I mind it much either."

"Presidential Timber"

Stevenson's announcement that he could not run for President read in full as follows:

"I have been urged to announce my candidacy for the Democratic nomination for President, but I am a candidate for Governor of Illinois and I cannot run for two offices at the same time. Moreover, my duties as Governor now so recently afford the time to campaign for the nomination even if I wanted it."

"Others have asked me merely to say that I would accept a nomination which I did not seek. To state my position now on a prospect so remote in time and probability seems to be a little presumptuous. But I would rather presume than embarrass or mislead."

In these somber years the hopes of mankind dwell with the President of the United States. From such dread responsibility one does not shrink in fear, self-interest or humility. But great political parties, like great nations have no indispensable man, and last January before I was even considered for the Presidency, I announced that I would seek re-election as Governor of Illinois. Last week I was nominated in the Democratic primary. It is the highest office within the gift of the citizens of Illinois, and its power for good or ill over their lives is correspondingly great. No one should lightly aspire to it or lightly abandon the quest once begun.

"The long agony that followed was never about what I wanted to do—I had already settled that. It was the result of an increasing pressure to get me to do something different."

But the questions that confronted the Democratic National Convention were only two. One was whether it really wanted the best; and the other was whether, if it did want the best, it had the courage and the common sense to get it.

Gov. Stevenson

The Governor's self-possession under trying circumstances is not a newly acquired characteristic. In 1937 Stevenson and his wife, the former Ellen Borden, from whom he was divorced in 1949, decided to build a house in the country. Six weeks after they had moved into it, the house caught fire on an evening when they were not at home. By the time the Stevensons reached the scene of the conflagration, it was too late for anyone to do much except stand around and watch the structure burn to the ground.

One of the neighbors who was near Stevenson in the crowd of spectators edged over to express his sympathy. As he did so a bit of burning debris floated through the air and dropped at the owner's feet. Stevenson picked it up and calmly lit a cigarette with it.

"Oh, well," he said, "as you can see, we are still using the house."

Conscience—Not Flippancy

Stevenson's ability to achieve minor feats in moments of stress is less the result of flippancy on his part than of an overly strict conscience which obliges him to set himself unusually high standards of efficiency and deportment. And it forbids him to seek the sympathy of outsiders. Thus, on the occasion of the fire, to have betrayed his inward feelings would have seemed to Stevenson unpar-

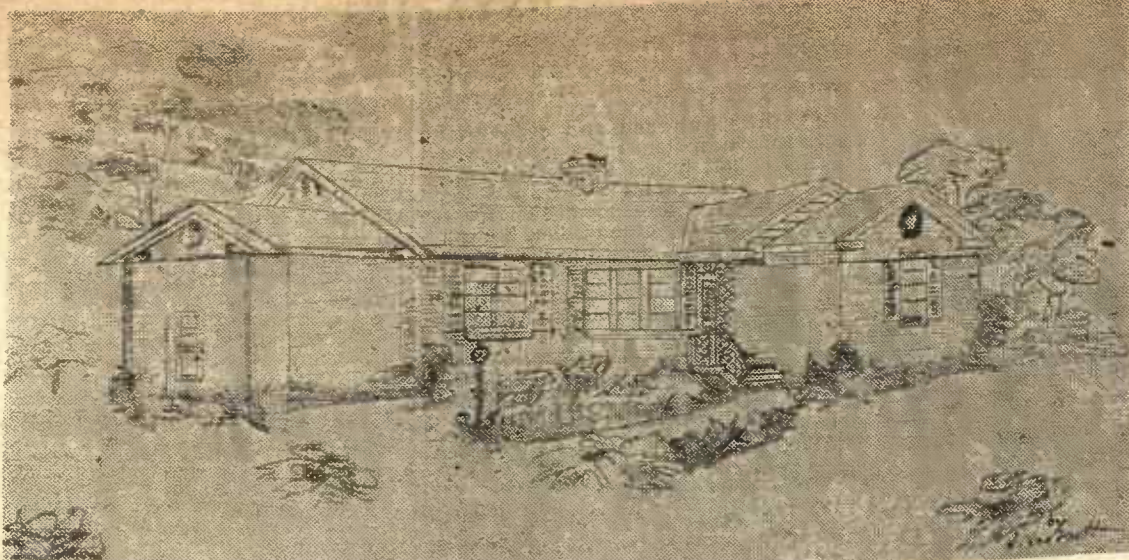

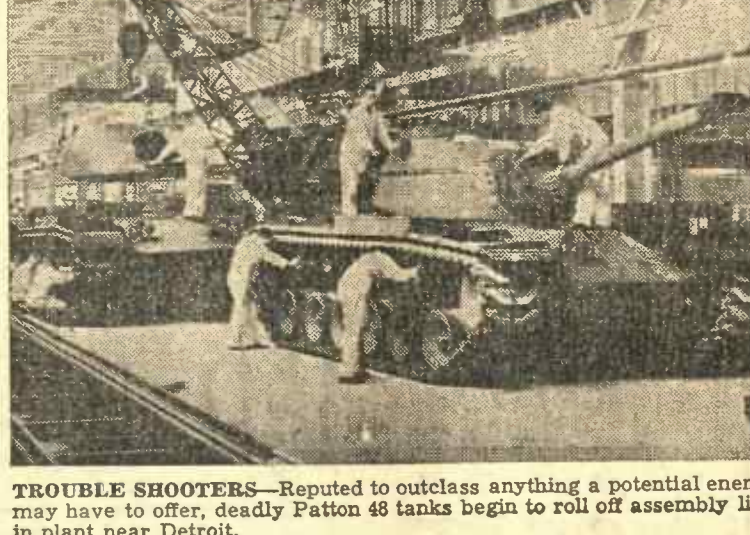

Mrs. W. R. Crane of Holcut, was hostess for a modern methods town party given at her home Saturday afternoon, September 13th.

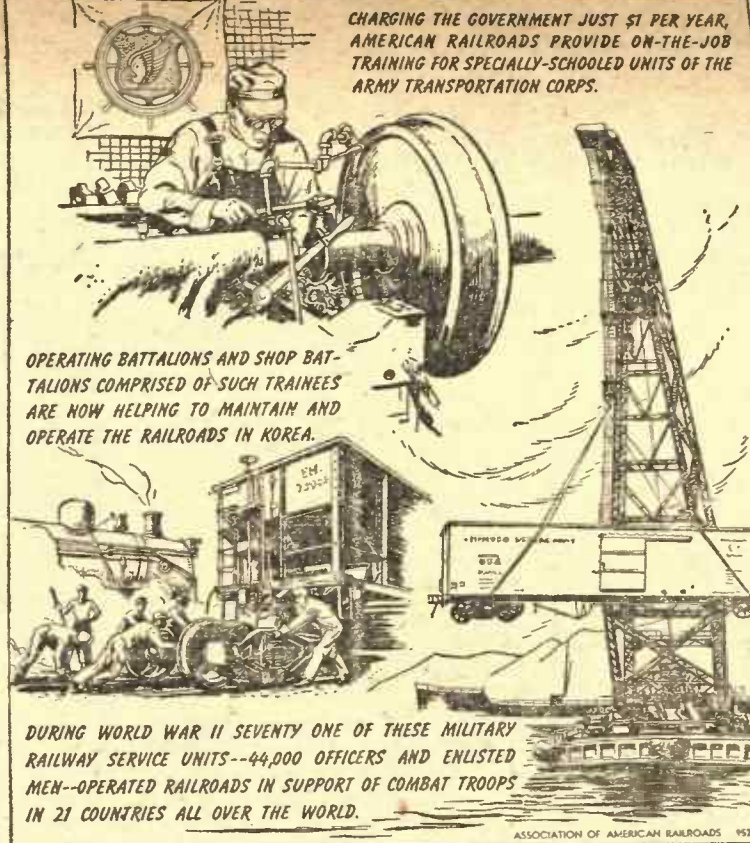

Glory Is Brittle

Lesson for September 28, 1952

CALL the roll of the dead nations, name any kingdom or empire you know of, that once knew glory and now is but dust. You will observe, if you know their history, that their ruin began just after a period of special brilliance. It is as if the old proverb were reversed, and the brightest hour came just before the dark. Why is this? One reason is that the glamor and the glory were not what they seemed to be. Beneath the glittering surface of things, the foundations were rotting away. Glory, personal or national, is a brittle thing.

Bang! Want the Empire
YOU do not have to poke about in large volumes of history to find this out. For a small sum you can buy a book that tells the story of the most famous nation of all time—namely, the Bible, giving the history of the nation called Israel.

Israel was a remarkably short-lived nation. Three kings' reigns spanned its whole history from beginning to end. After, that, Bang! It split into two pieces, indeed into more than two. For not only did it divide into the two kingdoms of the north and of the south, but it disintegrated everywhere.

All the conquests of David were undone. The Empire of Israel (for empire it was) simply went to pieces at every seam. What had been, for a time, the greatest and only empire between the Nile and the Euphrates, fell to pieces fearfully fast. And all that crash occurred immediately after the death of Solomon, that king whose reign is still remembered for its wealth, glamor and magnificence. How could such things be?

Glamor for the Few
PART OF the answer is that the glory didn't spread around very far. There was no middle class, and the gap between Solomon and his crowd at the top, and the peasants on the bottom, was enormous. Solomon's only known son, Rehoboam, told a mass-meeting of citizens shortly after Solomon's death, "My father beat you with whips." Rehoboam was not trying to blacken his father's memory; he was stating a simple fact. The common man had indeed taken a beating under Solomon.

To build the king's great public works cost money, and needed (in those non-mechanical days) armies of laborers. There was the immensely costly Temple, and then there was the royal palace, larger than the Temple, requiring nearly twice as long to build and no doubt correspondingly expensive; there were other temples, public buildings, pools, water works, fortifications, royal stables at Negiddo and what not. King Solomon found it necessary to work thousands of his people, without pay, one month out of every three.

The fact that about nine tenths of the people were ripe for rebellion within months after Solomon's death, shows that, to say the least, they were not contented and happy. Nations often do die, or blow up, just after periods of "prosperity," but it will generally be found that the prosperity was quite badly distributed. There is little true glory in a nation where a few grow rich upon the poverty of the many.

High Income Bracket
BUT THAT is not the whole story. Even if every one in the country were equally wealthy, it might not be good. Strange as it seems, the Bible is full of warnings, not so often against poverty as against wealth.

The truth about Israel is not that Solomon and his friends prospered while the rest of the nation decayed; the fact is, Solomon and his set were decaying too, not in spite of their wealth but because of it.

The king's annual income has been computed at some nineteen million dollars of our money. We hear that he built temples to other gods besides the true God, all because of his wives' influence. If he had been a poor man, he could not have married those expensive imported princesses. A man with excess income will often mis-spend it, ninety-nine times out of a hundred; and Solomon was not the hundredth man.

Today in America every dollar spent on drink, on gambling, is a surplus dollar, an uneasy dollar. Not that you can in any way wipe out sin by eliminating excessive wealth; but you might remove a lot of temptations.
