

TISHOMINGO COUNTY-WIDE SURVEY TO FIND UNKNOWN TUBERCULOSIS CASES BEGINS WEDNESDAY, OCT. 8

On next Wednesday, October 8, a county-wide survey to find unknown cases of tuberculosis will begin in this county. This survey will be offered to anyone of age and over, white or colored, from anywhere in the county. Sufficient time has been allocated at the mobile unit to allow everyone in the various age groups in the various communities and outlying areas opportunity to take advantage of this service.

Dr. H. G. Waldrop, Acting Director of the local health department, calls attention to the fact that this will be the last time a mobile unit will be in the county for two years to do county-wide work. This is because there has been a cut in federal funds and services must be reduced, the program changed in order to be more efficient and practical.

Since tuberculosis is not common in the group under 15 years of age and there is not enough money to x-ray all age groups, it is expedient to shift emphasis to the age groups most productive of tuberculosis which will be the x-raying of each county's high school population on an annual basis. However, x-raying of such groups will be discontinued, but periodic will be less frequent, since time will be spent in a unit extending the program to all groups in all population concentration centers as predicated on the basis of a county-state, equally acceptable program.

In the past a large percentage

of the county high school students have been x-rayed on an annual basis and a few cases of tuberculosis have been found each year. However, in counties where the emphasis is shifted more to adults the percentage of cases found is nearly double that of those found in the student population. It is therefore concluded that the source of infection in the younger group is probably an adult, a parents or close relative. It is for this reason that we are attempting to x-ray as many school patrons and other adults as possible.

The mobile x-ray units will travel on continuous itineraries to prevent expensive back tracking. Since schools will not be in session at the time of the survey the high school students in the age group and other high school personnel will be taken as a part of a mass x-ray approach planned for the county. However, when schools are in session, students from grades 7 - 12 inclusive will be x-rayed irrespective of age since these grades generally interchange classes, are closely associated, and if one case was in the group, all would be tuberculosis contacts.

Contacts and suspects beginning at 6 years of age will be x-rayed if they present a written referral from the health officer, public health nurse, or private physician.

The change of emphasis in the x-ray program will not affect the routine mobile x-ray clinic. These clinics will continue to be scheduled as they have been in the recent past, designed for tuberculosis contacts and suspects, prenatal cases, foodhandlers, etc.

Practically all rural areas where the mobile unit is scheduled are represented by Home Demonstration Clubs whose membership will promote the program. This participation was discussed and arranged with Miss Imogene Bynum, Home Demonstration Agent and the Home Demonstration Council of Clubs at the regular Council meeting, September 18. Mrs. Helen Pruitt, Public Health Nurse represented the Tishomingo County Health Department and Mr. E. T. Offner, coordinator, represented the State Board of Health.

All foodhandlers that have not had a recent x-ray and all elementary teachers are urged to avail themselves of this opportunity to get their chest x-ray.

This survey is being conducted primarily to find unknown cases of tuberculosis and heart diseases, but any condition that is not normal and is found in the chest will be noted and reported to individual concerned according to Dr. Waldrop. This survey is not particularly concerned with known cases of any kind which are already under medical supervision other than as a check on their previous condition, but it is concerned with those people who appear to be, and think they are perfectly healthy and yet have some disease of the chest.

These cases, if found early, can in most instances be cured or controlled, if not found, however, they may become progressively worse until death and may be constantly spreading infection to their associates. These statements indicate the importance of 100 per cent participation of people of the county at large. If you had a negative x-ray last year it doesn't mean that you can not have tuberculosis this year.

HISTORY OF THE BATTLE OF IUKA SEPT. 19, MARKS 90th ANNIVERSARY

The 90th anniversary of the Battle of Shiloh was celebrated with great pomp and ceremony. Historians and men in high po-

sitions came from far and near to pay homage to the gallant lads in blue and gray who gave their lives in that fearful carnage April 5th and 6th, 1862.

Not more than thirty miles from Shiloh the 90th anniversary of another battle took place but there was no celebration of any kind staged and only a few old citizens knew that on Sept. 19th 1862, the Battle of Iuka took place, a battle which Northern histories as well as veterans say was one of the bloodiest battles of the whole war. A battle which lasted only about two hours but in which between 1,500 and 2,000 boys were killed or wounded in fierce combat. And yet children are taught in school of the Battle of Thermopylae, or Marathon, of Hastings, of Bunker Hill and absolutely nothing of their local history.

The Federals were under Rosecrans and Ord. Ord was directly under Grant who was stationed at Burnsville and tradition says was drunk and did not even know that a fierce battle was raging about five miles from him. The Confederates were Muray, two brigades under General Henry Little of Maryland but all under the immediate supervision of General Sterling Price of Missouri. General Price was at that time an old man and he and his staff were domiciled in the home of Mrs. Martha Lyle in Iuka.

The Confederates knew of Grant's occupation at Burnsville and were expecting an attack from the west. Brast works had been thrown up in various points in the town, noticeably in the school grounds and out near the cemetery.

But what the Confederates did not know was that Rosecrans was advancing from Jacinto, which at that time was the county site of Tishomingo County. All the Confederate forces were guarding the road to Burnsville except Faulkner's Brigade, Partizan Rangers, who were near Burnt Mills on the Fulton Road. Infantry pickets were placed on the Jacinto Road and it is said that these pickets were sent to Iuka to warn of the approaching army but not being familiar with the terrain they got lost on the way and the "Message" did not get through to Garcia. However Price in Iuka did get word in some way and sent General Henry Little with the First Mo. Brigade, the Third La Infantry and Whitfield's Texas Legions to meet them.

As Rosecrans advanced with 18,000 men as some histories say

they were fired upon by the Confederates from a ravine, the Federals returned the fire and one man was killed and one wounded in the encounter. At 12 P.M. the Confederates reached Cripple Deer Creek where they took a stand and when the Federals came in sight they fired a volley which killed Lt. Scraun, which so infuriated the commander Hamilton who ordered a torch set to the house of a Mrs. Moore and her fine home was immediately consumed for nothing but want of destruction as she had nothing to do with the selection of the stand in front of her handsome home.

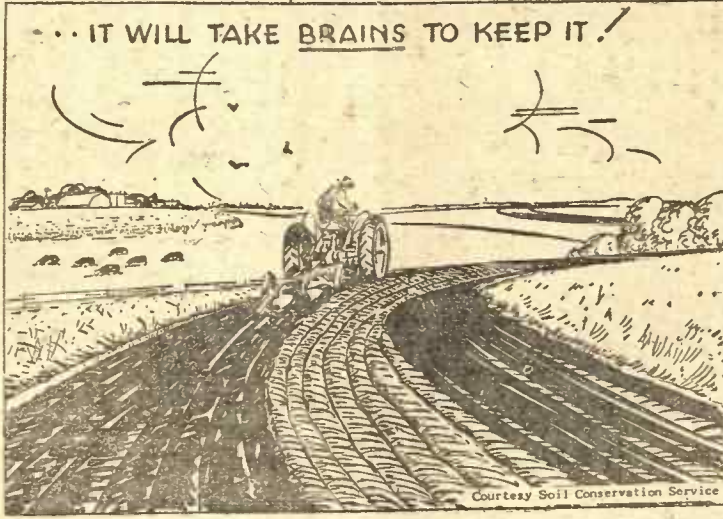
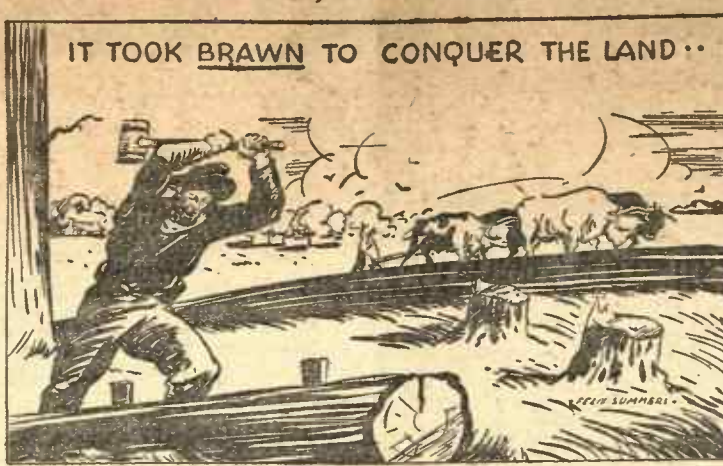
Coming on nearer town it was near the Ricks home where Rosecrans struck one of the soldiers with the flat of his sword for molesting the house. This soldier was later wounded in the battle, but lived through the entire war. (Both Union and Confederate soldiers said that Rosecrans was kind).

About two miles south of town the armies met. General Herbert had brought his brigade from near the cemetery and joined Little on the hills south of Iuka. It was now nearing 5 p. m. General Price on a mule rode up with his staff and sought General Little about 100 yards away. As he talked to Little a minie ball struck General Little in the head as he fell dying Col. Celsus Price caught him in his arms. General Little's body was brought to the home of one of Iuka's worthy citizens Major J. M. Coman and prepared for burial and that night was buried in the garden. After the war Mrs. Little came from her home in Maryland and had the remains taken to Baltimore for burial.

While the battle lasted the 11th Ohio was taken and every man killed. Three cannons were rendered unfit for further service and the three moved after dark.

The entire battle lasted not more than two hours and yet in that short time there were between 1,500 and 2,000 men killed or wounded. According to a letter written by a Federal soldier after the war which was published in the Iuka Vidette and I quote from his letter: "We lost more than any other regiment in the battle. My company (B) lost 28 men out of 60 killed and wounded. It was the hardest fight I ever was in and I never say a Union or a Confederate soldier who didn't say the same thing."

After the battle Price getting



sat on gate posts near the school building and watched surgeons throw out of windows and doors legs and arms which they were amputating without benefit of any anesthetic.

Years ago when the United States was erecting markers on many a battlefield in the south, The Thursday Club of Iuka asked for a marker for the battle fields of Iuka and Eastport. A bill was written but no action ever taken. The same club is now asking the same from the Miss. Historical Commission.

Dr. Otto Eisen Scriml, the noted war time historian who has visited every battle field in the United States and who was the principal speaker at the Shiloh celebration says that he hesitated for some time about placing the battle of Iuka as one of the decisive battles of the war but decided against it.

Even after 90 years there come visitors looking for the place where a grandfater, a father, a brother, an uncle died.

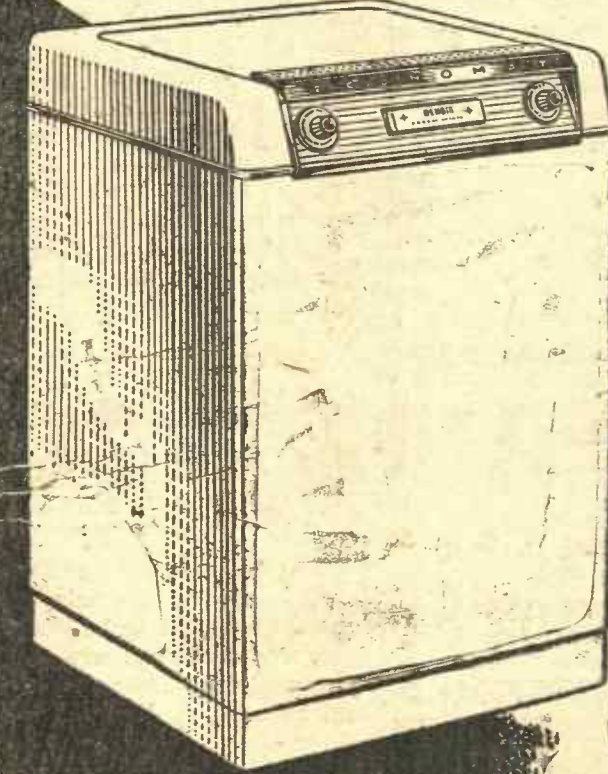

If you are about to buy a new rug, do look for the new synthetics. These man-made fibers are gaining in popularity. About 10 or 20 per cent of the total carpet production is already in synthetics, and carpet experts believe this is just beginning.

In a popular twisted weave, a blend of half synthetics add half wool sells for about \$8 a square yard. A 100 per cent synthetic in a popular rug weave sells for about \$6, or less than \$75 for a 9x12 rug.

This man-made fiber is rayon. It has tested four or five times rougher than rayon used for clothing. It is equal to wool in wearing and cleaning qualities.

These synthetics fibers seem to be the carpet mills' answer to the soaring prices on carpet wools from South America and China. The carpet experts believe that some day American mills may be almost independent of foreign wool markets.

COTTON RUGS: continue to grow increasingly popular, even for wall-to-wall use. They come in beautiful clear colors. The new patterned shag rug in two-tone colors costs about the same price you used to pay for plain, cotton shag rugs.

Christmas Flowers

You need to start right now if you want flowers blooming in your home for the holiday season.

Keep your poinsettia plants that you brought in the house in September away from drafts and escaping gas. Don't keep it in a room where lights are on at night as the poinsettia forms its flowers when the days are short. Even a street light shining in the window may stop it from blooming.

Apply a complete fertilizer to your poinsettias each month until December. In most cases the plants need watering daily.

You can force narcissus to bloom by putting the bulbs into a bowl of pebbles and water. Start them off in a dark closet, and keep them there for about three weeks.

If you keep tulip bulbs in the refrigerator for 30 days, then plant them in pots of rich soil, they will bloom in the winter. Use only good heavy, firm bulbs.

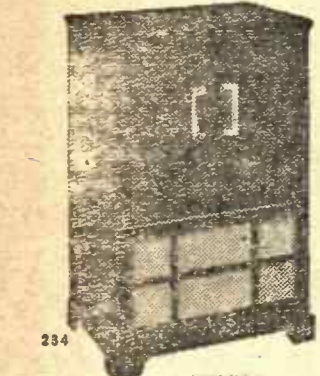

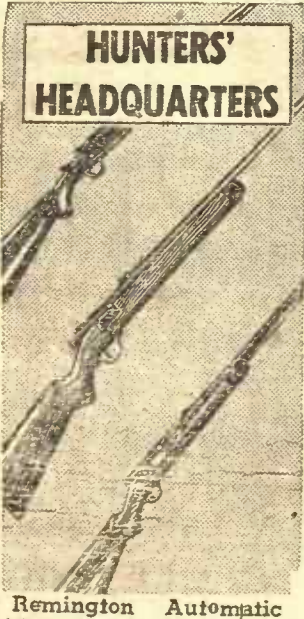

Adlai E. Stevenson

II—The Things That Made Him

When Adlai Stevenson was born, his sister Elizabeth, called Biffie in the family, had already been on the scene for over two years. According to the psychologists, second children often consider themselves to be family interlopers, obliged to justify their presence by especially good behavior. In the case of Adlai, there were no subsequent arrivals to diminish this illusion. Being a serious and sensitive child, he endeavored himself to everyone by excellent deportment. When, on rare occasions, his conduct left something to be desired, he was more upset by it than by any other fault.

Adlai's grandfather Davis gave him a red-handled jack knife. A few days later, Adlai mislaid it. His grandfather found it. Thinking to teach his grandson a gentle lesson in prudence, he asked him at lunch whether he liked his new knife.

"I've lost it," said Adlai, and broke into tears of remorse before his grandfather could fish the knife out of his pocket.

On another occasion, Stevenson, like countless small boys before him, yanked a table cloth, causing some china to fall and break. In this instance, his self-reproach was even more acute than it had been in that of the knife. He retreated to a dog kennel where his worried parents discovered him several hours later, sleeping on the straw.

A Tragic Accident
What happened one Christmas holiday evening was that his sister Biffie, who felt as protective about Adlai as he felt admiring of her, had been given permission by her parents to have a few of her friends for supper. It was to be a "teen-age party." Mr. and Mrs. Stevenson went out to call on friends. Adlai Stevenson had his supper early but was allowed to join his elders later.

One of the boys present was a student at a military academy. After dinner, it was suggested that he entertain the others by going through the manual of arms. Adlai was sent to get a twenty-two rifle. The military academy student examined the gun carefully, to make sure that there were no bullets in the barrel or the magazine. Then he executed the manual of arms, to the applause of everyone. Adlai was given the gun to hold. He tried to copy the motions of his sister's friend. It was at that moment that the gun went off.

Later investigation showed that one shell in the gun, perhaps because of a rusty spring in the ejecting mechanism—had failed to emerge in the pre-drill inspection. During the manual of arms the gun had been shaken and the stock thumped on the floor. This had loosened the spring and released

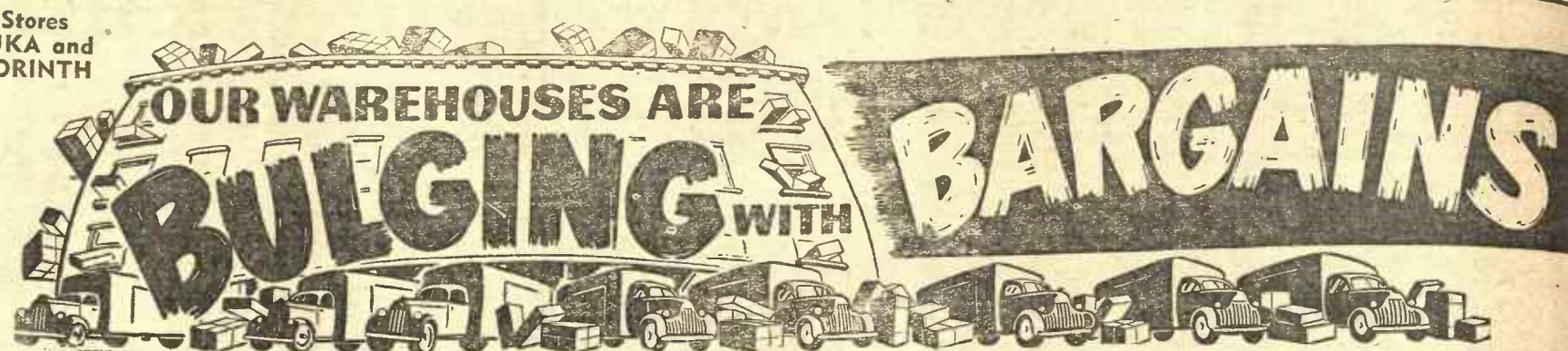
