

Polio Situation Continued By Mrs. Williams

Polio is making its most vicious attack in history. Approximately 4,000 in the nation have already fallen victim to this disease during the first nine months of the year. Mississippi has not reported 167 children and adults stricken the first nine months as compared to 484 for the same period in 1951 which was the previous high record in the state. Tishomingo County reported four polio victims during the first nine months.

One of Dimes money has been working every minute of the day to provide care for patients. The task has been tremendous. There are 200 Mississippi polio patients now in the state.

Tishomingo County contributed \$3294.84 to last January's Dimes. This per capita contribution by county residents amounts to 21 cents. Mrs. Williams, chairman of the chapter of the National Paralysis Foundation for Infants and Children, said the results would not have been possible without the standing efforts of the many patients who generously donated so many hours of their time.

The continued care of patients wehe exhausted. An appeal for financial aid was made immediately to National Headquarters. Swiftly, the National Headquarters sent \$1500.00 to the chapter to help meet emergency needs. The chairman declared this is one of the basic reasons why March of Dimes funds in each county are shared 50-50 basis with Headquarters of the National Foundation.

The tremendous load of carry-overs from last year's epidemic in Tishomingo County continues to drain the chapter and places a heavy burden on the National office in meeting the needs of other hard-hit counties. For this reason, the chapter must fulfill the pledge "that no parent go without the best hospital and medical care for lack of funds."

Mrs. Williams said plans are made for the 1953 March of Dimes campaign which begins early 2nd. E. N. Allen will again be county March of Dimes campaign Director. Committee members are already being selected and appointed by Mr. Allen and he will be glad to have Tishomingo Counties volunteer what may be the most important campaign in history. Newly Published Bible To Replace King James Version

"The newly published translation of the Bible, within 50 years, will be read at most church services in place of the King James Bible or the American Revised translation now commonly used," predicted Dr. Fred W. Neal, professor of philosophy and religion, addressing the Y Faculty Club at Mississippi State College Monday noon.

Dr. Neal said that he was enthusiastic about the new translation of the Bible because of its clarity, accuracy, and beauty of language.

"The King James version of 1611 uses language that is not up to date," he said. "Furthermore, the King James translators had only 24 manuscripts available, all of them copied after the tenth century. In the New Testament alone there are over 5,000 copyists' mistakes in the manuscripts they used."

Dr. Neal said that over 4,000 manuscripts, one of them dating back to 200 B. C., were used in making the new translation. The chief difference between the American Revised Bible and the new translation, according to Dr. Neal, is not in accuracy, although the new version has the advantage of some ancient manuscripts found in Palestine in 1948 and in Egypt somewhat earlier, but in beauty of language.

Moscow Attempt to Get Information on Resources Halted

An attempt by Moscow to get vital information on mineral resources in the State of Mississippi was halted at the University of Mississippi by the State Geological Survey. An organization identifying itself as Vsesojuznyy Insitut Mineralnogo Syrja Pyzhevski of Moscow, USSR, sent a book order to the "University of Mississippi Press" for four bulletins published by the Survey. Bulletins ordered contained "actual estimates of the state reserve of vital minerals such as oil," the survey office said. The Russian School was informed that such orders must be cleared with the State Department in Washington. "Besides," an office secretary said, "We've suddenly developed a shortage of these particular bulletins."

New Tags Not Lawful Until Nov. 1, 1952

Colonel T. B. Birdsong, Commissioner of Public Safety, urges all persons to refrain from putting new tags on their cars and trucks until midnight, October 31, 1952 which is the time they become lawful, for the following reasons:

1. It is against the law, as your new tag is no good until November 1, 1952.
2. If someone else hits your car or you, a "hit-and-run," and leaves you dying or dead, we have no records of who owns the car and will not have until the Sheriff's finish selling all tags and send records to the Patrol and Motor Vehicle Comptroller.
3. If someone steals your car, we do not have the record. Therefore, it would take considerable time to locate tag, motor number, etc., on hit-and-run, stolen car or any other violation.

We sincerely hope everyone will cooperate in this matter.

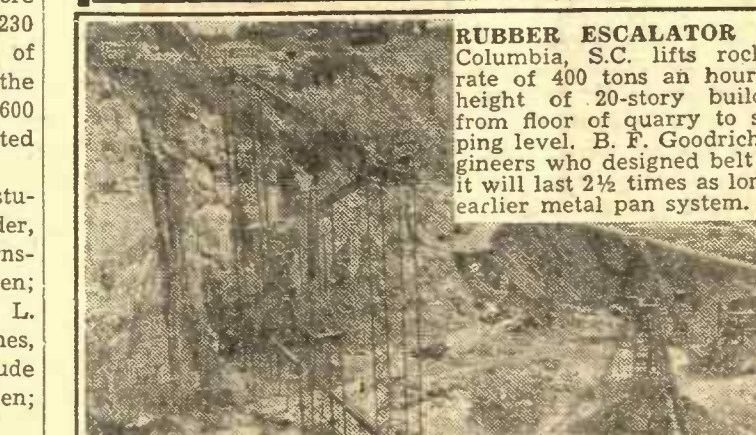
He is a Sunday School teacher, Mason, Phi Delta Kappa, past president of the Walnut Lions club and now chairman of the Tippah county teachers association.

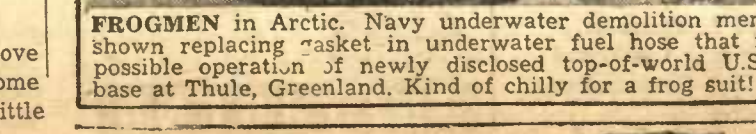

Adlai E. Stevenson

by Noel F. R. H.

IV—Hiss

Governor Stevenson's relations
with Alger Hiss are detailed in a
deposition made by the govern-
ment which sets forth information about
what other people thought about
Hiss, and which in no way even
implied any opinion on Stevenson's
part as to the defendant's charac-
ter, let alone his guilt or innocence.

In the deposition Stevenson stated
that he had no contact with Hiss
until the summer of 1945, when he
met him again in the State Depart-
ment where I went to work there
in 1945. Upon my arrival in the
State Department at the end of
February or early March to the
end of April, when Mr. Hiss left
for the San Francisco conference,
he was, I think, largely preoccu-
pied with the arrangements for
that conference, for the United Na-
tions conference on international
organization at San Francisco. Dur-
ing that interval from the first of
March to the end of April, we
engaged in other matters and met
him mostly in intra-departmental
meetings and in connection with
some aspects of the plan for the
San Francisco conference, largely
relating to the press at the con-
ference. I was at the confer-
ence, myself, as assistant to the
Secretary of State, from about the
10th of May until the end of June.

During that interval, Mr. Hiss was
Secretary General of the delega-
tion and I was attached to the
United States Delegation. Our paths
did not cross in a business way but
we met occasionally at official so-
cial functions.

"Back in Washington during
July, I had some conferences with
him in connection with prepara-
tions for the presentation of the
United Nations Charter to the Senate
for ratification.

"I resigned from the Department
early in August, 1945, and so far
as I recall I did not meet Mr. Hiss
personally again until he came to
London in January, 1946, with the
United States Delegation to the
First General Assembly of the
United Nations. During that con-
ference in January and February
we had offices nearby each other
and met frequently in delega-
tion meetings and staff conferences.

"I returned to the United States
in March, 1946, and I do not be-
lieve I met Mr. Hiss again until
the United Nations General Assem-
bly in New York in 1947. At that
time he was connected with the
Carnegie Endowment for Inter-
national Peace and I visited with him
on one or two occasions at my of-
fice in the United States Delegation.

Try eating more honey. It is
a natural, unrefined food made
by the honeybee from the nectar
of flowers and stored in small
waxen cells of the honeycomb.
It is both good and good for you.
The flavor of honey varies
with the kind of flower from
which the bees gather the nectar.
According to U. S. grades—the
color standards for honey, there
are seven color classifications:
water white, extra white, white,
extra light amber, light amber,
amber and dark.
The grades of honey, however,
are not based on color, but
largely on freshness from foreign
matter in extracted honey and
upon finish and whiteness of cap-
pings in comb-section honey. To
insure uniformity, two or more
honeys are often blended. This
helps to insure the same color,
flavor and consistency of the
products.
Honey is made from different
crops. In fact, there are about
2 varieties sold in the United

States. If you are one who says
you do not like honey, just which
variety is it you do not like? Is
it cotton blossom, orange blos-
soms, buckwheat, alfalfa, tupelo
tree, or one of the many varieties
of clover, or something else?
You can usually buy honey in
three forms; extracted honey,
section comb and bulk honey.
The newest addition to the honey
market is "whip honey" or "cry-
stalized honey."
Extracted honey is separated
from the comb by centrifugal
force on the principle used in a
cream separator. Section-comb
honey is sold in the wooden
frames as taken from the bee
hives. Bulk comb, or chunk
honey, consists of pieces of comb
with extracted, or liquid honey
poured over them.
Honey keeps well at room tem-
perature, if you store it in a dry
place. Do not put honey in the
refrigerator. Freezing does not
injure the color or flavor but
may cause sugar crystals or
granules to form. In the event
granules form, place the honey
container in a bowl of warm wa-
ter—not hot—until all crystals are
melted. Put a cloth or rack un-
der the container at time of heat-
ing.
Use of Honey
Honey has many uses. It is
used as a spread for bread, bis-
cuits, pancakes and waffles; to
sweeten fruits, beverages and
cereals; in sauces, in frozen des-
serts, in sandwich fillings, in bak-
ing, in candies, in jams, preserves,
and in meringues.
Adjusting Recipes for Honey
Honey may be substituted for
at least a part of the sugar in
cakes and cookies, but the amount
of liquid in the recipe must be
reduced. If you substitute honey
for one-half the sugar the recipe
calls for, decrease the liquid
one-fourth. If you use all honey
in place of sugar, decrease the
liquid one-half.
You can substitute honey
measure for measure for mol-
lasses recipe. Since honey is
less acid than molasses, the
amount of soda used to neutral-
ize the molasses may be omitted.
Products containing honey must
be baked in a very moderate
oven as the honey makes them
brown readily.
Honey may be used in place of
corn syrup in making candies,
but only half as much will be
needed to prevent the candy from
crystallizing.

Honey Butter
1 cup honey ½ soft butter
Beat honey first, about 10
minutes. Add butter gradually
and beat well each time. Pour
into a jar, fasten on lid and keep
in a cool place as ordinary but-
ter. Put on gingerbread while
hot to melt the butter. This
makes a pleasing combination.

The Dairy Cow In Conservation Farming

The dairy cow can help the farmers of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, make better use of their land. Much has been said and written about using the land of this county within capabilities and treating it according to its needs. This is a goal to work toward, but how is it to be attained?

As there are many roads that lead to Chicago, Illinois, so there are many ways by which a farmer may reach the goal of good land-use. One way is by dairying and this is what we want to discuss now.

The farms of Tishomingo County are small, averaging less than 100 acres in size. On most every farm there are a few acres suited to cotton. Usually there is some bottom land that with proper fertilization and culture will produce 100 bushels of corn per acre. On a large per cent of the farms in this county, the land suited to row crops is limited. Most of the land is so steep it erodes very badly when plowed, planted to row crops, and cultivated. This kind of land should be put into sod crops, such as hay and pasture. Very steep or badly eroded land should be planted to pine trees.

We were discussing the dairy cow and how she can help the farmers of this county use their land within its capabilities and treat it according to its needs.

First you should consider the needs of the cow. How much hay, pasture, and corn she will need, and start building pastures now. Good pastures cannot be built in one or two years. It takes two or more years to produce the kind of a pasture you want. You farmers know this. But sorghum silage is something you can grow which will produce a great amount of feed in one year. Start to work on your pastures and permanent hay crops like sericea now. But lean heavy on sorghum silage, and annual hay crops for the first few years you are in the dairy business, so your pastures can become well established.

Second, put adapted hay and pasture crops on your land. The best way to accomplish this is to get a soils map of your farm and you and the Soil Conservation Service technician work out a basic farm plan from this soil map for your farm. Sericea is a good crop for hay and pasture on the steeper land. More fertile land may produce good dallis and lespedeza pasture, the

MISSISSIPPI TEACHERS CAN WIN NASSAU FLIGHT IN AIR AGE EDUCATION CONTEST

Editor's Note:

The following is another in the series of articles prepared by the State Aeronautics Commission designed to broaden the knowledge and interest of Mississippians in aviation. Another article will follow next month.

Two Mississippi teachers — one of elementary grades and one of high school grades — will be awarded all-expense air cruises to Nassau as prizes for writing and using in the classroom the best teaching "unit" correlating aviation material with education. This "unit" may cover any one or all of the subjects taught in a grade and any Mississippi teacher of elementary or high school grades is eligible to compete for these prizes.

The Nassau air cruises, widely advertised by Delta Air Lines as the "Millionaire's Vacation," are offered by the Mississippi Aeronautics Commission in connection with the Golden Anniversary of flying, 1903-1953, and as a part of the commission's effort to further the development of aviation in Mississippi through its Air Age Education Program.

Air Age Education is a term which means education for life in the modern world. The fact that use of the airplane affects the life of every child in the classrooms of Mississippi's schools has been realized by the State Aeronautics Commission and the State Department of Education, and Mississippi teachers now find aviation stories and material in all state-adopted textbooks at every grade level.

The Mississippi Aeronautics Commission also publishes a number of teaching aids. "Air Age Education in Mississippi," a manual for elementary and high school teachers, points out aviation material in the state-adopted textbooks, lists sources of additional material and offers suggestions for utilizing these materials in the work of every class.

The commission also has available for teachers a loose-leaf pamphlet series which includes "The Primary Teacher in the Air Age," "Flying With the Intermediate Grades," "Transportation by Air," and "High School English in the Air Age." These teaching aids may be obtained by writing to the Mississippi Aeronautics Commission at P. O. Box 5, Jackson.

Two new pamphlets, "New Horizons for Mississippi Teachers" and "Fifty Flying Years: 1903-1953," will be added to the series during the current school term. Each year since 1949, the Mississippi Aeronautics Commission has maintained a booth at the

wetter land can be put in fescue and Ladino clover. Then there is the rye grass and crimson clover, sudan and millets.

Third, use efficiently the pasture and hay produced on the farm. A good dairy cow that will produce, when properly managed 6000 pounds of milk or more per year, year in and year out for seven or more years will do this. This means, at \$5.00 per hundred for milk, that each animal can if treated right return a gross income of \$300.00 or more per year. \$225.00 of this \$300.00 should come from the hay and pasture. Three acres of land in the right crops properly treated should supply enough pasture, hay and corn for a cow. According to this, each acre will return about \$75.00 gross income from milk alone and the value of the calf has not even been considered. This is where the farmer sells grade-A milk at approximately \$5.00 per hundred pounds of 4% milk.

This means a farmer can still grow cotton on his level or slightly sloping hill land. His corn on his best bottom and second bottom land, using the rest of his land, not so steep and eroded that it should be in timber, for pasture and hay crops and sell this grass and hay for a good price through the dairy cow. The barnyard fertilizer can be used on the corn and cotton land increasing its productivity. Good cotton land can be made to produce 1½ bales per acre by good management. Five acres can be made to produce as much cotton as 10 acres usually produces. The land can be used within its capabilities, erosion can be checked, if not stopped, and the land improved, while the farmer is making more money.

meeting of the Mississippi Education Association and has offered this material to interested teachers.

"The Air Age," a thirty-minute technicolor film showing the uses of the present-day airplane, is available at no cost to any school or teacher requesting it.

Air Age Education is not a new subject to be added to an overcrowded curriculum. It has become an integral part of all phases of the instructional program.

Meta Moore, author of the booklet "Air Age Education in Mississippi," points out that "The study of aviation is one of the few subjects brought to school by children with the request 'Teach us about this.' Every child who sees an airplane in the sky wants to know about it. Teachers have a wonderful opportunity to use this natural curiosity as a means of building interest in other subjects."

"As children build their model airplanes and airports," Miss Moore continues, "as they demonstrate the theory of flight and the principle of jet propulsion in simple laboratory experiments, as they plan and make imaginary or actual trips, teachers are busy using the experiences as a springboard for

guiding their pupils to realize the social, economic and political implications of the Air Age. Teachers today must show pupils not only what the airplane can do but also what they must do because of the airplane."

The American Association of School Administrators recognizes the importance of Air Age Education, and the subject has occupied a significant position on this group's agenda since 1949. National education magazines have featured articles on this new concept of teaching. For the past several summers workshops have been held at universities throughout the country to show teachers how to use aviation materials in their own classrooms. The above photograph shows the group which attended the University of Mississippi workshop.

The Mississippi Aeronautics Commission is one of the most active of the state agencies for aviation across America. The commission has received requests from nearly every state in the union for its material on Air Age Education. Similar programs have now been adopted by a majority of the 42 states maintaining an aviation agency.

WEEKLY NEWS LETTER

State Department of Public Welfare

The County Welfare Office has a great many duties in addition to those in connection with looking after the needy aged, needy blind, needy children, child welfare services, and needy unemployables between the ages of 18 and 65. One of these duties is co-operation with the Governor, the State Parole Board, and the State Penitentiary authorities at Parchman. During the year that closed last June the County Welfare Offices handled a total caseload of 983 parolees under supervision and had 119 persons on suspended sentences.

A private, personal conference is held each month with these prisoners who are paying their debt to society and hoping to regain their good standing as citizens which they forfeited when they went to prison. The County Welfare Office tries to see that they are getting fair treatment and are working under wholesome influences. This is a far cry from the days when it was said that very few prisoners could get a suspension or pardon except through the influence of persons in high places.
