Bad Check Artist In Iuka Jail, Awaits Action Of Grand Jury In August

Richard McWhorter, 19, resident of Corinth and a native of Nashville, Tennessee is in the Iuka jail after being arrested here last Thursday. The arresting patrolman Noel Kirk and Creekmere Wright, were making a routine check on drivers licenses last Thursday afternoon when a car bearing Indiana license and driven by Haywood King of Corinth was stopped. After the car had been released Kirk remembered the license number was one carrying a warrant from Iuka. The car was again stopped and King, the driver, told officers that he was holding the car for McWhorter on a \$50 loan.

Officers went to King's place of business in Corinth, a service station, and arrested McWhorter shortly thereafter. Investigation cleared King of any complication. However, McWhorter confessed to passing checks in towns and cities from Chicago south. Since last December he has, according to documents in the sheriff's office, collected over \$2,250 on his trail of bad checks. A warrant sworn out by Ward Moser's service station was responsible for his apprehension. McWhorter is awaiting action of the August term of the Tishomingo county Grand Jury.

Highlights Of Korean Truce

Official cease-fire halted the Korean war at 10 p.m. Korean time (7 a.m. C. S. T.) 12 hours after armistice was signed at Panmunjom. Quiet blanketed the battle front after three years, 1 month and 2 days of bloody fighting and history's longest truce negotiations. Artillery thundered right up to the time the cease-fire order went into effect. Armistice was signed in an eleven minute ceremony at Panmunjom by top negotiators. Military commanders each signed half of the eighteen copies then traded and signed the other half. Exchange of more than 100,000 prisoners of war probably will start this week. Reds say they'll free 127,736 POW's including 3,313 Americans. U. N. Command will return about 69,000 North Koreans and 5,000 Chinese. Joint military armistice commission charged with over-all supervision of truce held first meeting at 11 a.m. Tuesday, Korean time, in Panmunjom. Within 72 hours of cease-fire by 10 p.m. Thursday both armies pull back one and one-fourth miles to create two and one-half mile wide buffer zone across Korea. Chinese Peiping radio boosted that communists won "glorious victory" and cautions Red troops to remain on guard. General Mark Clark told his army there will be no immediate or even early withdrawal from Korea. General Maxwell Taylor, 8th army commander, says truce is just a suspension of hostilities. South Korean President Syngman Rhee says his nation will not disrupt the truce for a limited time but he is sure the armistice "will prove to be the prelude to more war . . ."

PMA To Measure '53 Cotton Acreage

As there is a possibility that Marketing Quotas on the 1954 crop of cotton will be declared by the Secretary of Agriculture it is necessary that a certain amount of preparatory work be done this summer so that more accurate records can be had when, and if, allotments are set up, according to E. N. Allen, County P. M. A. chairman. Twelve men out in the county, employed by the Tishomingo County P. M. A. Committee will call on you and measure your acreage of cotton planted this year. Also, if you have not already turned in your 1951 and 1952 acreage of cotton they will get this information at the same time they are on your farm measuring your cotton acreage. The Tishomingo County Committee urges you to cooperate with these Fieldmen and when they visit your farm please furnish them all information they call for.

Keep this in mind, there is not any cotton allotments this year and this measurement of your cotton planted will be for nothing at all except to complete your history. It is possible that your 1953 cotton acreage will never be used in establishing future allotments. Again you are urged to give the men working your cooperation. If you will be away from home be sure to leave someone in charge that can furnish the needed information. Emphasis that no polio vaccine is ready for use this summer and that gamma globulin, the blood derivative found effective as a temporary preventative of paralytic polio, is in critically short supply, Mrs. Williams reported that: "Polio probably will present much the same problems this summer as in the recent past." She pointed out that national incidence of the disease this year is already running about 25 per cent ahead of the same period in 1952—which was the worst year in recorded polio history, with 57,628 cases reported across the country.

Now friends, I would love to



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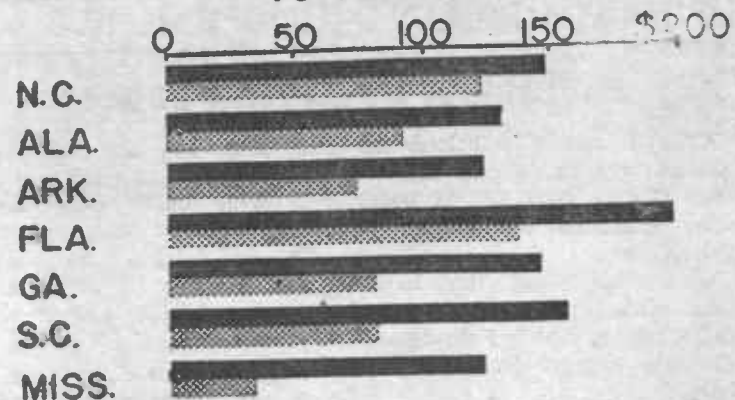

The expenditure per pupil, for white and colored, gives an indication of the type of education facilities offered students. All southern states, according to the Mississippi Economic Council chart above, spend less per pupil on Negro public schools. However, it is apparent from the chart that Mississippi spends less on both whites and colored than any other southern state. Equalizing facilities, plus providing generally improved opportunities, presents a real social and economic problem to state citizens, the Council's committee on public education points out.

This chart is one of a series furnished by the Council to acquaint Mississippians with some of the problems confronting our public school system.

getting tiresome during hot summer days trying something different and doing to cook, isn't it?

Pop and Little Johnny as Grandma and Grandpa here's a suggested menu for a picnic or a backyard meal that's easy to prepare and good eating and a bit of fun for the family, too. plan to have ground beef, potatoes, onions, and carrots. It is easily prepared and lends itself to outdoor cooking.

Allow one-fourth pound of beef for each person. Cook the meat with salt and pepper. Place the patties

on a double thickness of heavy aluminum foil, 12 inch square. The vegetables will be cooked in the foil with the meat.

Peel a potato for each person and cut it as you would for French fries. Put it on the foil along side of the hamburger and season.

Peel and slice an onion and place on top of the hamburger and potatoes. Then wrap the meat, potatoes and onion in the foil and place in the coals. Be sure the edges are well crimped and air tight all around.

Place the foil wrapped food directly in the coals. It won't scorch if you let the fire die down enough. The double thickness of the foil gives added protection during cooking time.

Let it cook for 15 minutes. At first you may want to open the package and peek, but a little practice will help you become expert in this type of cookery.

While the meat, potatoes and onions are cooking, cut raw carrots into strips. Use ready-baked buns for bread. If you like them toasted, use long sticks, like you do when toasting marshmallows. Spread the buns with butter. Use

butter too, to season the meat, potatoes and onions after they are cooked.

For our outdoor meal dessert, let's have an orange. It will be easy to carry, requires no refrigeration, no cooking and no special serving dish. And it fills the requirements of serving one citrus fruit, tomatoes or raw cabbage each day.

Suggested for "something to drink," with the meal is butter-milk. Allow 1 pint for each person. Don't forget the drinking straws.

Be careful not to burn the fingers or puncture the foil while removing the food bundles from the fire. Unwrap the food and shape the foil into a serving plate from which you can eat. Spread butter over the potatoes and onions.

There, you have a well balanced meal that is fun to prepare, especially because so little work is required. And there is so little cleaning up afterwards, with no dishes to wash. All the trash, such as paper napkins and bags can be burned and there won't be much to carry home or back into the house except the empty milk bottles.

If you have some growing boys or other particularly hearty eaters in your family, you may need to allow for increased portions of food for them.

One Dish Meal

Drain a pint can or jar of English peas. Toss them carefully with half a cup of finely cut celery, one-fourth cup finely cut sweet pickles, one-fourth cup cubed cheese, 2 sliced hard-cooked eggs and one-fourth cup of nutmeats. Cut a large, firm head of lettuce into 4 to 6 wedges from the top down, but not quite through the bottom.

Spread open like a flower. Mix one-half cup cooked-type salad dressing with 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, 1 teaspoon sugar and one-half teaspoon salt. Carefully fold the dressing into the peas and heap into the lettuce. Garnish with 6 to 8 rolls cold baked or boiled ham.

Serve with waffle cornbread, crisp bread cooked in your waffle iron, heaping plateful of fresh fruit and a big glass of cold milk. Who could want a better meal?

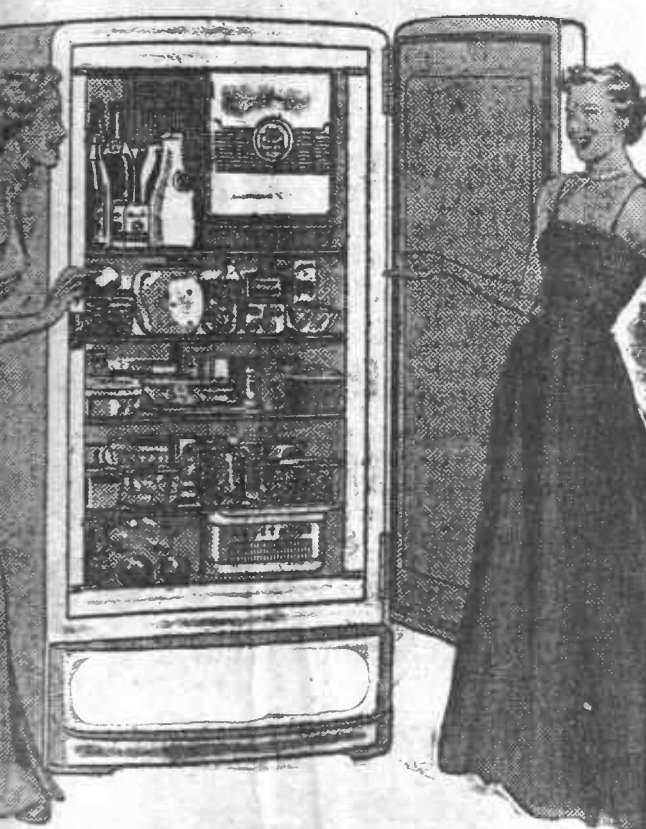

The Municipalities Of Mississippi Need Money

There has been much comment concerning Governor White's proposed programs to assist the municipalities of Mississippi. This, in our opinion, is good because we feel certain that it will help in our struggle for financial assistance.

We sincerely appreciate the Governor and truly believe he is going to do all in his power to grant us financial assistance. We agree in part with his two proposals.

The proposal that caused so much comment is the proposal to direct part of the gas tax to the municipalities. In our opinion, there is nothing wrong with this proposal. The municipalities have as much claim to part of the gas tax to pave and maintain their streets as do the State Highway Department or the County Board of Supervisors. After all, no one believes that the cars that drive over our streets run on tax-free gas. So why not use part of the gas tax for our streets?

We cannot honestly see where the Governor's share the gas tax proposal is unfair. However, in all fairness to the Governor, he did not make any suggestion as to how to divide the gas tax. That he left to the legislature.

We see no reason to criticize the Governor because of an editorial in the Jackson Clarion-Ledger. We do not agree with the editorial that our legislators are "Short-Sighted"; on the contrary they are to be commended on getting what we would call a better distribution of our gas tax.

Let us make our stand clear:

We do not stand for any proposal that would endanger our present gas tax distribution to our county. However, after it gets to the county, let the Board of Supervisors share it with our municipalities. We do not make this proposal as a "cure-all", nor do we think it is a good way to win friends and influence supervisors. We agree that they need more money, but so do the municipalities of Tishomingo County. After all, twice as much gas is sold inside municipalities as is sold outside.

In reply to last week's editorial in our own county papers: The millions of dollars of so-called pork-barrel money is approximately four thousand dollars for Tishomingo County's five municipalities.

Also, it was stated that the State Auditing department had no authority to audit the books of cities and towns. An opinion of the State Attorney General dated July 20, 1953 states: "Any Municipality with a population of 1,000 or less may, in the discretion of the governing authorities, file with the State Department of Audits a report of prescribed forms in lieu of an annual audit." All above 1,000 population must file an audit.

Seriously, We, too, think the present use of the gas tax for highway purposes is the correct way to use the tax, but we feel that city streets should be included.

Decrease Of Business Activities In Local Area

There was 6 per cent less business activity in the Corinth area during May 1953 than during April 1953. There was a decrease of 3 per cent for the comparison with May 1952, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College.

Data was very incomplete outside of Corinth. Booneville reported 11 per cent more telephones than a year earlier. Iuka and Ripley reported less money orders sales than during either May 1952 or April 1953. The former decreases were Iuka, 6 per cent; and Ripley, 11 per cent. Iuka had a very slight drop in postal receipts when compared with May 1952, while Ripley had an increase of 16 per cent. Telephones in service were more numerous than a year earlier in both Iuka and Ripley.

Corinth reported the following indicator losses for the comparison with May 1952; bank debits, 3 per cent; money orders issued,

8 per cent; and postal receipts, approximately 1 per cent. Telephones in service were nearly 7 per cent more numerous than a year ago. However, general business was off by 3 per cent. The comparison with April 1953 gave pretty much the same results. General business was off 5 per cent in the city for this comparison.

The Business Research Station's index to general business activity moved up by one point during May. It started the month at 410 per cent of the seasonally adjusted 1940 average and finished the month at 411 per cent.

Miss. Forestry Commission Needs Cones For Seed

Area Forester Busby reports that the Mississippi Forestry Commission needs 14,000 bushels of loblolly, 8,000 bushels of slash, 2,000 bushels of longleaf and 1,000 bushels of shortleaf pine cones to furnish seed for the states two tree seedling nurseries. Busby asks that everyone be on the lookout for locations of cones so they may be gathered quickly this fall, as the cone gathering season is too short to allow much time in locating trees bearing an appreciable number of cones once the season begins. The Mississippi Commission plans to buy from all collectors that present good clean cones collected at the proper stage of maturity.

Busby states that all persons interested in collecting cones this fall should contact him at Iuka for additional information.

"It is very necessary," Busby said, "that all collectors know how to test the new crop of pine cones for maturity." He added, "If immature cones are picked, few will open to release their seeds and seeds released will not germinate."

"If a great enough cone volume can be collected by an individual," Busby states, "the Mississippi Forestry Commission will be glad to enter into a contract to purchase all of the cones the contractors may gather. Such contractor should contact Area Forester Busby or notify the Jackson office of the Mississippi Forestry Commission."

Archie Epps Works To Save His Soil

Mr. Archie Epps, Route 2, Belmont, Mississippi, has established a vegetated waterway in a 60 acre field on his farm.

Mr. Epps is a cooperator of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District and is following the directions of the Soil Conservation Service technicians in establishing a complete water-disposal system for this 60-acre field.

After the sericea planted in this waterway has become sufficiently established, the field will be terraced and the rows and terraces arranged to empty into the sericea waterway.

Under such a system, excess water will run off the field slowly and less topsoil will be removed from the land.

MISSISSIPPI NOTEBOOK

Some thoughtful person at Parchman has kindly added our name to the mailing list of "Inside World," interesting and informative mimeographed magazine published by and for inmates of our state penal farm.

"Inside World" is edited by Jesse F. Durham of Camp Five under the supervision of R. L. Patterson, educational director and sponsor. Feltor E. Johnson is mimeograph operator and Albert Lee is art contributor. All concerned deserve congratulations for a fine job, especially contributors and correspondents in each of the several camps.

EYE-OPENING STORIES

This unique literary nugget fairly sparkles with humor, philosophy, sound editorial comment and really excellent news reports from various camps at Parchman. Now in its fifth year, "Inside World" was inaugurated by Marvin E. Wiggins, Penitentiary superintendent whose regime has been the first to permit and encourage journalistic self-expression among the prison inmates.

The prison magazine is by no means Parchman's only refinement. Our penal farm boasts a crackerjack musical band made up of inmates. There is a recreation and athletic program, frequent motion picture shows, liberal visiting hours and other benefits which may surprise those who have been led to believe that Mississippi treats her prisoners like wild beasts.

A SPECIAL INTEREST

Your humble columnist is particularly interested in Parchman. We used to visit there frequently during Mike Conner's administration when our favorite uncle,

Oliver G. Tann, was superintendent of the state penal farm. Reading the July issue of "Inside World" brings back memories of those visits.

MANY IMPROVEMENTS

In an "Inside World" article on "Improvements At Mississippi's Penitentiary," Howard Milner writes that "work at all camps has been made easier in recent years by acquisition of machinery such as tractors, balers plows, etc."

"Visiting privileges have been improved. In earlier years relatives were allowed to visit only once a month. At present, members of families can visit inmates every Sunday. These privileges were not the same ten years ago," Milner writes.

"Inmates have benefited greatly by the installation of a new, modernly equipped laundry. This laundry does the whole of the penitentiary's work twice a week, including bed linens, towels, aprons, and everything a modern 'free world' laundry does," the article points out.

MAKING FINE PROGRESS

"Although medical facilities have always been available here," Milner continues, "the new hospital is a 100% improvement over the old. The new hospital is better staffed, while its equipment and medicine are equal to any 'free world' medical institution."

"From a recreational standpoint," he adds, "the leisure moments of inmates have been improved by the acquisition of equipment. The Educational Director who is in charge of Recreational Department has acquired

from various organizations and distributed it equally throughout the institution. This has aided in bringing up the morale of inmates who participate in athletic programs."

EDUCATION AND MUSIC

Other improvements mentioned include better educational opportunities, whereby inmates now find it possible to attend elementary schools at the camps, instructed by prisoners who received educations in the outside world. This system, popular with inmates, is rapidly reducing illiteracy.

Recreational facilities have also been expanded during the administration of Marvin Wiggins. The prison band rehearses daily except "when crops are in bad shape." This band broadcasts over the Mid-South Network each Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock and there is a smaller band which also furnishes music on occasion.

BASEBALL AND MOVIES

Inmates are allowed to stage a camp variety show each year. Movies are shown to prisoners on a modest schedule, with four picture shows listed in the camp magazine during July. A prison-wide hobby contest is now being

held, with cash awards.

Various camps have teams, maintaining batting and bunting averages and camp correspondents much space to brag their respective teams.

FOOD IS WHOLE

Parchman food is abundant, the inmates. Camp Five reports that include strawberries, tuces, beets, English peas, beans. Watermelons and butterbeans are also included, which indicates that receive a proper diet.

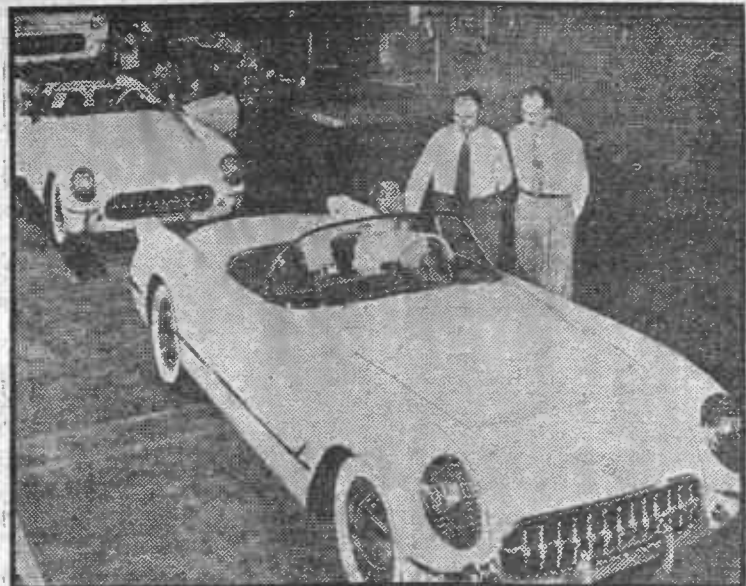

Bible Comment:

For What Reasons Were the Apostles Chosen by Jesus?

TO the 12 men whom Jesus called to special discipleship. He said, "Ye have not chosen Me, but I have chosen you."

Why, out of the many, did Jesus choose these particular men? We cannot answer that with full knowledge, but we can get some rather definite impressions from the nature of the men and the nature of the task for which Jesus called them.

It was not enough that they should be good, well-intentioned men. They must be good for the purpose for which Jesus chose them. They must be men of adventurous spirit, capable of endurance. They must be men of ambition, willing to sacrifice everything for a cause and a worth-while goal.

Their spirit was manifest in the bold declaration of James and John, "We are able." Their rivalry about who should be first was in itself an evidence of their ambitious and determined spirit.

Jesus undoubtedly saw in them the makings of what they really became, and their achievement in the founding of the church justified His vision and His faith in them.

But what about Judas? Was Jesus deceived in him? Or did Judas deceive himself? Of one thing we can be sure. The failure was not the Master's. Jesus called him for what he might have been, but Judas failed to rise to the vision.

Jesus calls us all for what we may be. How much do we rise to His vision of us?

"Accident Facts," the Council's Statistical yearbook, which is just off the press, shows that one person was injured accidentally every three seconds during 1952. Deaths from accidents occurred at the rate of one every five minutes.

During the year, motor vehicle accidents killed at the rate of four persons per hour and injured at a rate of 150 per hour.

What's In A Name

If you were going on a picnic and need a container to keep your coffee hot, what would you ask the storekeeper for? Chances are you would say you wanted a "Thermos"—and you would be wrong. Why? Because "Thermos" is a trade name, not a substitute for the generic term, "vacuum bottle." There are many brands of vacuum bottles; only one Thermos vacuum bottle. The same applies to Vaseline petroleum jelly, Kodak cameras, and Frigidaire refrigerators—to name only a few of the best known trade names.

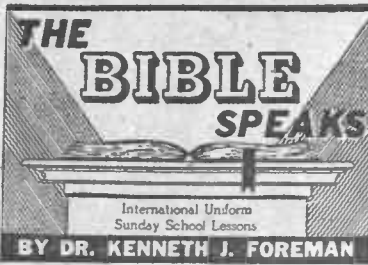
"Well, so what? An interesting point in semantics no doubt, but frankly, what does it mean to me?" That's a perfectly natural response and one we are all prone to make—to our own detriment as members of the buying public. The fact is that consumers do have a selfish interest in trade marks. Whether they realize it or not, they associate brand names with a certain quality. When, for example, they ask for "Vaseline" petroleum jelly or a glass dish by the trade name, "pyrex" they have in mind a product which they know through long familiarity to be satisfactory. There is no assurance that just any petroleum jelly or just any type of heat-resistant glass will be manufactured to conform to these same standards.

In order to assure the continuance of high quality products on the market it's up to us as the consuming public to know about trade marks, to understand what we are buying and why we are buying it, a freezer that freezes deep isn't the same as Deep-Freezer freezer and we should know it.

Christian Home

Lesson for August 2, 1953

YOU can have a Christian town more easily than a Christian nation. You can have a Christian one-man business more easily than a Christian corporation. You can have a Christian church more readily than a Christian school. But you can come closest to a Christian group, 100 per cent, in a Christian home than anywhere else in the world.

Home Has Its Problems

A good Christian home is not automatic. Its praises can be sung too loudly. In sentimental moods people talk and write poems and even preach about the home as if it were just naturally a heaven on earth. Nonsense! Like all good things it has to be planned and worked out. Or again, they talk about the Great American Home as if it were a special product of this American nation. But there were homes before America was discovered. There are good homes wherever Christians are—in China, Africa, India, Fiji. There is no magic about America that makes an American home the best on earth. It is Christianity, not race or geography, that makes the best homes. A Christian home in Madagascar is likely to be better than a non-Christian home in Memphis.

But even a Christian home has its problems. How can old and young live happily under the same roof when "happy" doesn't mean the same thing at six, sixteen and sixty? How can you have an Executive Committee (husband and wife) with no one to break a tie vote? How can a father steer between being too strict and not being strict enough? How can a growing child learn independence without wrecking the place? Of course home has its problems. Life has its problems, and you don't get rid of them even when every one concerned is a practicing Christian.

Some Christian Intentions

One reason why a home can be more nearly Christian than any other social group, is that you can come nearer sharing the same basic intentions in that group than in any other. One intention that must be woven into a true home is that of permanence. Homes cannot claim to be Christian if they are no more than campsites. If husband and wife are not in it for keeps, they lack the first of all intentions that keep a home together. Further, a home that is Christian will welcome children. If children are accepted grudgingly, if they are thought of mainly as "mouths to feed," "brats," it is not a Christian home. Another Christian intention is the Golden Rule. "Be done by as you did" is somebody else's rule, not Christ's. If you go looking for slights and insults, if you go around insisting always on your "rights," if you have a chronically unforgiving spirit, you don't fit into a Christian home.

Christ in the Home

There is a motto sometimes seen on a wall: "Christ is the Head of This House." What does it mean to have Christ in the house? His picture on the wall won't do it, though it may help. Pious mottoes won't do it unless they express the real heart of those who live there. What does it mean to have Christ, not as an obscure occasional guest, not a stranger, but as Head of the house? He is Head when his ideas are known, followed and loved. He is Head when every one has the habit of thinking, Is this what He would do? He is Head when his spirit is in every heart. He said himself that he came not to be served but to serve; and the Christian home is one where every member of it carries out that purpose of Christ. When in a home there is prayer each day in His name—that is to say, when all the daily prayers of the family are not just "Gimme" prayers but such as Christ Himself would endorse, when time is taken out every day for prayer and all together at least once in the twenty-four hours think quietly about what it means to be Christian, then it is more and more likely that Christ will be truly the Head of that house. The problems will be there, and they will not be easy even for Christians; but no problem of Christian living, even at close range, is impossible when Christians work them out together in His name.

Very little of the land in Tishomingo County is properly terraced. For this reason the rows are more crooked and there is more erosion than there would be if the land was correctly terraced and the water permitted to flow off the land down vegetated natural draws.

This fall is the time to vegetate outlets in fields to be terraced next spring. The farmers who have tried out this new system liked it. I am sure you will like it too. If you will come by the USDA Soil Conservation office in the County Coop Building in Iuka and talk to either me or Mr. Tice, we will be glad to explain in detail how a complete water disposal system can be established on your farm. Not only will we explain it, we will go out on your farm and help you establish a water disposal system that will pay you off in future increased crop yields. Why not save your land while you work it?

County Agent News

By W. C. HAMILTON

If you expect to have a full fall garden you must get started during August.

Here is a partial list of vegetables that can be planted during August for fall production. Pole and bush snap beans, bush lima beans, tomato suckers or plants, Irish potatoes, beets, carrots, Swiss chard, collards, leaf lettuce and turnips.

Here are some pointers toward a better fall garden: Cultivate row thoroughly, use plenty of fertilizer, watch out for insects and make sure that you control them, keep the grass and weeds out of the garden.

To insure continued protection of long season plants, thorough harvesting is necessary. Even one cucumber or one pod of okra left on a plant to mature, will slow down production.

Seed saving is another important part of August gardening. Seeds to be saved include peas, beans, melons, squash, okra. Save seed from good producing plants. Make sure that the plants, from which you save seed, are free from disease.

Corn will be ready during August for putting in the silo. To tell when corn is ready for the silo, shuck some of the ears and if the grains are in the dent stage and beginning to glaze over, it is time to put up as silage.

Do you have a broom sedge field that you would like to make into a good pasture? Here are several ways to do it. Spread lime on the land and in early August, plow under all the old sedge. Keep the area disked during August and part of September, then plant a cereal like oats or wheat and interplant some clover.

Another method is to lime the sedge area now and then in October, clip off the sedge, rake and burn. Top dress the area with potash and phosphate, basic slag and potash, 0-14-14, or 0-20-20 mixed fertilizer. Then sow crim-

son clover on high land and white clover on the low land. It will pay to disk the land lightly before sowing the clover. Dallis and Bermuda or carpet grass will volunteer in the clover and most of the broom sedge will fade away.

More Korean Than World War I Veterans In Miss.

Mississippi has furnished more men to the Armed Forces since the beginning of the Korean police action than enlisted or were inducted during the First World War, according to Bob DeKay, Executive Secretary of the State Veterans Affairs Board.

During the First World War, 57,575 Mississippians enlisted or were drafted, said DeKay, while 57,989 have entered the service

from July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1953. The First World War lasted only approximately 19 months while the present action is now in its fourth year.

Battle casualties are not as high as they were during World War I. 1613 men from Mississippi were killed and 1080 wounded in World War I, while in the present action 279 have been killed and 1261 wounded.

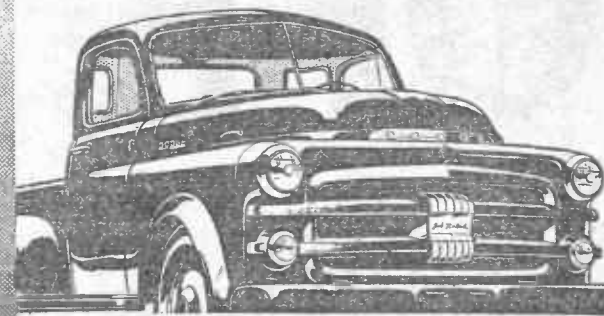

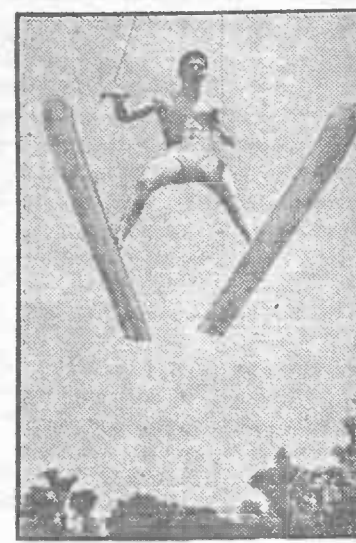
