Mississippi Scouts At Jamboree

On July 10, 39 scouts of the Yocona Council Area met at the First Baptist Church in Tupelo to begin their trip to the Jamboree. We left at 7:30 a.m. on an air conditioned Greyhound bus for Memphis. There we stopped for about an hour, from there we traveled to Fort Smith, Arkansas where we stayed all night. Then from there to Amarillo, Texas, Gallup, New Mexico, and Grand Canyon, at Grand Canyon we stayed all afternoon and toured the Canyon. Then from there it was a straight shot to Barstow, California, and then to Santa Ana. We arrived that morning about noon, after we had a short lunch we started putting up the tents.

The master of ceremonies was Bob Hope. We had a great air show by the Blue Angels, in which they did precision flying. The

best of all was the last night in the arena in which the Yocona Council was represented in a tower building exhibit. The Yocona Council Arena was well represented from Iuka with four scouts as followed: Donald Davis, Senior Patrol Leader; Charles Sweeney, Scribe; Tony Gaines, and Billy Brinkley, son of Iuka's Scout Master. HOME AGENT NOTES

By IMOGENE BYNUM

Old furniture that looks like new—that's what lots of homemakers would like.

Refinishing old furniture is lots less expensive than buying new furniture and you can achieve good results—but it takes work and must be done the right way.

To tell you the right way to refinish furniture, Miss Bonnie Dale Sanaom, the Extension Home Management Specialist, has prepared three publications, one on refinishing furniture, one on finishes for furniture and one how to bleach furniture. A copy of each one is available at your home agent's office just for the asking.

Each publication tells you step by step what to do and tells you the equipment and materials you will need to carry out the job from start to finish.

Ask for Extension Publication 257, Refinishing Furniture, Publication 263, Finishes for Furniture; and Publication 264, How to Bleach Furniture.

Shrinkage of Cotton Marquisette Curtains

Along with your newly finished furniture, or to give your bedroom or another room a fresh, crisp, cool look, you may plan to add cotton marquisette curtains. And from past experience, you've probably found that shrinkage must be considered, whether you buy the material or the ready-made curtains.

A recent study showed that cotton marquisette curtains shrink with each washing through the sixth laundering. However, the greatest shrinkage occurred with the first laundering and amounted to as much as a fifth to a

half of the total shrinkage in length.

If you are making your own curtains, you can save alterations and fabrics, if you laundry the material before making it up—and then leave enough extra length for later shrinkage.

Shrinkage in length causes the most trouble, but the study showed that cotton marquisette usually shrinks even more in width than in length. This shrinkage in width may cause the curtains to hang unevenly.

Some textile specialist suggest not only laundering marquisette before you make it up, but also basting a wide bottom hem for easy alteration after laundering.

Marquisette with special finishes shrank less than that with ordinary finishes, the study showed. The least shrinkage occurred in fabrics that had a permanent finish.

Special Care For Straw Cloth

"Straw" cloth, made of 100 per cent woven cotton, needs special care if you are to get the greatest amount of wear from it. This material is known by the trade name of Madagaska straw, and like Everglaze, the name identifies a family of fabrics, not one fabric or finish.

The finish on straw cloth gives it a crisp look and the feel of natural straw. It comes in natural or colors. It is washable, but should not be starched or bleached. The manufacturer's tag says to "avoid twisting and sharp creasing".

A fabric that has a resin treatment in its finishes to give stiffness should not be starched, since the starch will not penetrate the fabric well, but will lie on the surface. When too stiff a fabric will break or crack, and wears out more quickly.

Some of the resins used hold chlorine and cause the fabric to become brown in color when

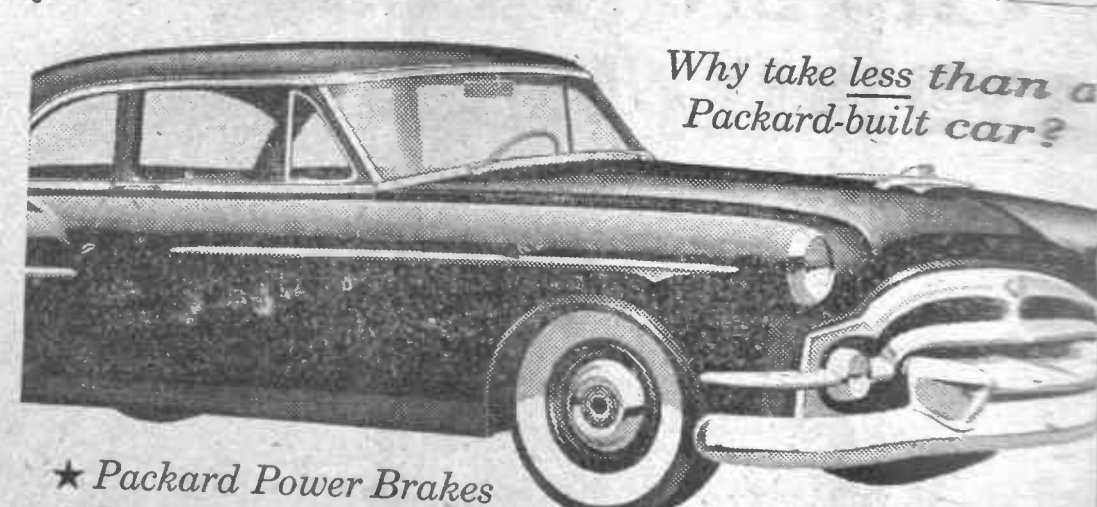

Weather Conditions For July

The hot dry weather of the first few days of August contrasts with the comparatively cool and wet weather of July.

Last month Mississippi State College saw 5.26 inches of rainfall, almost half an inch above the 64-year average, according to R. F. Dudley of the agricultural engineering department. Mr. Dudley keeps the weather records for the Agricultural Experiment Station at State College.

He says that rain was recorded there on fifteen days during July. The total rainfall for the first seven months of 1953 was 38.22 inches, 4.53 inches above the 64-year average for this period.

The average maximum temperature for July was 89.9 degrees, which was 2.3 degrees below the long-term average of 92.2 degrees. The average maximum temperature for July this year was 5.2 degrees below the average maximum temperature for June, 1953. The highest temperature recorded for the month was 98 degrees on July 7.

The average minimum temperature for this July was 71.2 degrees, which was 1 degree above the long-time average of 70.2 degrees. The minimum temperature for the month was 63 degrees recorded on July 11.

Increase In Business Activity

The Corinth district on the whole showed 5.4 per cent more business activity than during the level set the previous month and 14.8 per cent above that of June 1952, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College.

Data were very incomplete outside of Corinth. Booneville reported telephones in service to be 11.9 per cent more numerous than during June 1952 and .6 per cent more numerous than May 1953. Iuka gave a city-wide gain

for both comparisons. Telephones in service in that city were off 1.3 per cent when compared with May 1953 and when compared with June a year earlier they

remained on the same level. The other indicators in Iuka were of a positive nature in both comparisons. Ripley reported more business activity than either last June or May 1953. The largest gain came in postal receipts. When compared with those a year earlier there was a gain of 55.1 per cent.

In Corinth, bank debits, money orders, postal receipts and telephones in service exceeded the record set a year earlier to give a city-wide gain of 13.5 per cent. In the comparison with the previous month, however, there were two indicator gains and two losses. They were: bank debits, 4.3 per cent; money orders issued, 2.6 per cent; postal receipts, down 11 per cent; and telephones in service, down .4 per cent. The

gains offset the losses to give the city as a whole an increase of 1.7 per cent.

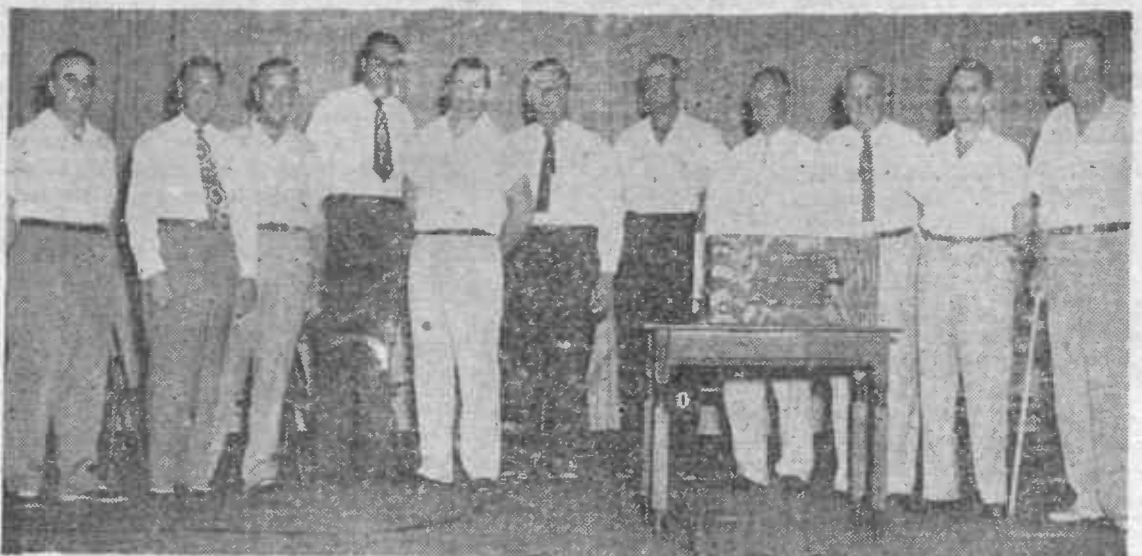

HOLLY SPRINGS — People of prominence in the community, county and state participated in a program at Slayden on Wednesday when rural telephone service for approximately 50 new customers in this North Mississippi community was inaugurated by the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company.

The affair, which was held in the auditorium of the Marshall County Agricultural High School, was sponsored by the Holly Springs Rotary Club. Rotary president, Neil G. Wiseman, acted as Master of Ceremonies.

Principal speakers were Harris Gholson, Holly Springs businessman and civic leader; the Honorable Howard Little of Corinth, member of the Mississippi Public Service Commission; and J. H. Fleming of Greenwood, District Manager for Southern Bell.

Others taking part in the program were: The Reverend R. B. Deline, pastor of the Slayden Baptist Church; W. B. Jones, Superintendent of the Marshall County Agricultural High School; Glenn East, Holly Springs attorney; C. T. Ames, Manager of the Holly Springs Electric Department; and H. M. Stanfill of Grenada, Southern Bell Group Manager.

The program concluded with the closing of the switch by W. D. Howard, State Representative of Mount Pleasant, which signalled the start of service over the new facilities.

C. A. Sanders, new telephone customer of Slayden was selected

to place the first long distance call from Slayden to Atlanta, Georgia, where he talked with O. T. Robinson, Southern Bell's General Rural Development Supervisor.

Speaking from the telephone company's viewpoint, District Manager J. H. Fleming stated that the job of providing modern rural telephone service for farming areas like the one at Slayden presents many difficulties.

According to Mr. Fleming, construction of the new facilities to serve the approximately 50 new rural customers around Slayden cost about \$25,000. It would not have been feasible, he stated, except for an arrangement known as the MI carrier system developed by the Bell Telephone Laboratories to provide from one to a maximum of five additional two-way circuits to customers without placing wire facilities for all the circuits.

By means of certain equipment, Mr. Fleming said, conversation over these wires is carried at frequencies that are too high to be detected by the human ear. When the conversation reaches the receiving end of the circuit, special equipment brings the voice back to ordinary conversation level.

From special equipment at the end of the cable in Holly Springs, five carrier lines are carried over a pair of copper-clad telephone wires to a pole-mounted terminal installation near Slayden. In this carrier section of line, five carrier circuits and one regular circuit

are carried on the same pair of wires without interference with each other.

The average person's ear can detect sounds up to 10 or 12 kilocycles only. The carrier circuits operate at frequencies from 150 to 420 kilocycles.

At the terminal point near Slayden, the conversations are brought back to intelligible frequencies and carried to subscriber residences, employing a pair of iron wires for each eight subscribers.

Mr. Fleming pointed out that part of the telephone facilities were attached to the poles of Holly Springs Light and Power Department by means of a joint-use rental agreement between the city and the Telephone Company.

Telephone Company representatives emphasized that the MI carrier used to provide service for the Slayden area is not a cure-all for rural telephone problems, but can be used only where conditions of distance, population, etc., are suitable. The installation at Slayden is the third one in Mississippi. James M. Phillips, Mississippi Manager for Southern Bell states that the Slayden project is one of approximately 100 rural telephone projects which the Company plans to complete this year in the State to provide our rural areas with about 5000 new telephones. The mid-point of the year finds over 50 of these projects completed and over 2600 new rural telephones installed.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

Christ Above All

Lesson for August 16, 1953

THE reader who goes to Sunday school will have noticed that the quarterly never prints all the Scripture that is listed in this column. The reason is, the interdenominational committee preparing these lessons selects more Scripture than any quarterly is going to have room to print. This is in the hope that the student will not be content with reading short bits from the Bible at second-hand, but will go on to read more fully in the Bible itself. This particular column is free to use the whole passages selected, not simply the verses reprinted in most quarterlies.

Christ Pre-eminent

It ought to go without saying that Christ is pre-eminent, that is to say, above all, for the Christian. It does not go without saying, because Christians incline to forget it, or more exactly, they forget him. Paul uses the word "pre-eminent" only once in Colossians 1, but he uses many other ways of declaring that Christ is above all. In Christ we have forgiveness of sins; in him all the fullness of God dwells; he is the head of the church. The Christian has been transferred to Christ's kingdom; through Christ all men may be reconciled to one another; in Christ are "hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge"; the Christian is to be "filled with the knowledge of his will." The Christian receives him, is rooted in him, built up in him, grows to maturity in him; he is the Christian's hope of glory. All this is "in the book"; but is it in life? Does Christ actually loom as large in the life of Christians as he does in the plan of God.

You Received Christ

Speaking of the way the Christian life begins, Paul says, "You received Christ." That is what ought to happen at the very start. If it does not happen, there is no real start. What do we receive at the beginning of the Christian life? A certificate of church membership? Water? The Communion bread and wine? A name like "Methodist" or "Baptist" or "Lutheran"? Even a name like "Christian"? Now, it is true that the Christian life begins with an "I will." There is a vow, a determination, a hope and intention. But unless there is a receiving, all the hopes and intentions go for nothing.

So Live in Him

Paul says the Christian is "rooted" in Christ (as if we were plants) and "built up" in him or on him (as if we were brick walls). He puts these two together when he says "Live in him." If we are like plants "rooted" in Christ, that means he is to us what the soil is to a plant. All our spiritual life comes from him. Not from a book, from a creed, from a set of ideas, least of all from our own thin selves; but from Christ, in whom is "all the fullness of God." Again, if we are "built" on him, that means he sets the line of our lives. Just as a wall cannot lean one way or the other off its foundation, and still stand, so our lives either follow the line that Christ has set, or they collapse.

Mature in Christ

Christ is not only the ground and foundation, he is the goal of life for the Christian. Are we walls? He is the blueprint. Are we plants? He is a perfect specimen. Paul wants every Christian—not a few selected saints!—to be "mature in Christ." (The older translation "perfect" is misleading, since the Greek word means mature, not perfect nor sinless.) Why is it we are so easily self-satisfied? Why are so many Christians midgets, permanent babies, in mind and spirit and character, when they ought to be growing up? Once there was a baby whose parents lived at some distance from other families with small children. For more than a year they thought their baby was doing very well. Then they visited another family where there was a normal baby, the same age as their own. For the first time, they realized their own child had not grown as it should. So we Christians compare ourselves with ourselves, or with other imperfect Christians, and we are foolishly content.

Take What You Have And Make Something Out Of It

"Take what you have and make something out of it" was the sound advice Dr. George Washington Carver (the great negro scientist) of Tuskegee Institute gave his students. Dr. Carver practiced what he preached, and gave us many uses for the lowly peanut.

Recently I checked on the number of conservation farm plans written in Tishomingo county during the two years since the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District initiated its program in this county. I found that 227 farmers have a plan on their farms and are busy at the job of conserving their soil.

These people are taking what

they have and are making something better from it. Hundreds of other farmers have been contacted and the need for conserving their soil discussed with them. Some of these may want a farm plan later.

Miss Dorothy Garrett, who lives northwest of Burnsville (Miss. Garrett recently received her degree from State College, Mississippi) is determined to make something out of the land she has. The Soil Conservation Service technicians surveyed and supervised the construction of one stock pond and approximately a mile of dragline ditches, which drains 50 acres of good bottom land on Miss Garrett's farm. This lady was not satisfied at having the land drained, she hired a bull dozer operator to clear the ditch banks and land formerly too wet for use even as pasture.

Mr. H. E. Hester is clearing bottom land that he has drained and Mr. Joe E. Whitehead of Route 1, Golden, Mississippi is proud of the ditch he had cut this summer and is working land he has never been able to tend before. The general plan on each of these farms is to establish sod crops on the steep land now in cultivation and to cultivate this level, more fertile, soil which is now drained.

These are examples of what the 227 Soil Conservation District Co-operators are doing to improve the land use on their farms by taking what land they have and using it now so as to have good land in the future.

These people are to be commended for the fine job they are doing.

Fire Is Not The Answer To The Insect Problem

Unfortunately we still have people in Tishomingo County who purposely burn thousands of acres of land each year to rid their farms of insects. Fire will not rid the farm of boll weevils, chiggers, ticks, snakes, etc. No matter how hot a wood fire may be the boll weevil is not eliminated. Thorough studies have proved conclusively and definitely that the custom of woods burning to gill boll weevils is ineffective and wasteful.

Fire annually sets the stage for a bigger army of chiggers, snakes usually manage to get away when the woods burn, little trees never do.

So you see friends you overestimate the usefulness of fire and underestimate the damage it does. Remember fire cost you money—money you should be harvesting, not burning.

County Agent News

With plenty of high quality roughage, cut them immature—grasses just booting to head out—and saved carrying a bright green color, dairymen will not have to worry too much about feed-in-the-sack from the feed merchant. They will be able to keep more of that milk check for other farm and home uses.

Producers should make their milk production out of roughage and grazing rather than from high cost concentrate feeds.

DDT For Peach Tree Borer Control. Unless already made, now is the time to make the first application of insecticide for peach tree borer control. Do not delay. This job should be done in early August.

Here is how to mix the spray material: Mix one pound of 50

per cent DDT wettable powder with 12 gallons of water. Spray the trunk and lower parts of larger limbs.

The second application of insecticide should be made September 5-10; and the third, October 10. After using this recommended treatment examine carefully the trees during late October or early November and if you find any borers, treat the infested trees with ethylene dichloride emulsion.

Here are some tips toward having a high producing home garden this fall. Clean out, clean off, and clean up all rows not now producing. The time to do this is now.

After cleaning off the area, plow it thoroughly. Make low rows now. Add three or four pounds of 5-10-5 or 6-8-8 fertilizer to each 50 feet of row. This should be mixed well with the soil and placed in the row 10 to 15 days before planting.

Wheat or oats for fall grazing should not be planted before Sep-

tember 1, unless there is plenty of moisture or you have an irrigation system. Often the heat does as much damage to young growing crops as does dry weather.

August is a good time to get everything in readiness for planting. Then during the first part of September, after the nights turn cool, it will be time to plant.

Last spring smut showed up in oats and wheat. During average weather, smut does not become too noticeable. However, after treating, the seed cannot be used for feed. It must be planted.

The cost of treating against smut is slight. Some seed houses will do the treating at a small extra cost. The treating treatment is good insurance against smut damage.

For home treating of oats or wheat seed, use Ceresan M dust at the rate of one half ounce per bushel.
