On Monday morning, August 31, following an opening address by one of the local past-ors, textbooks will be issued, the tentative daily schedule will be tested, and the initial lesson as-ignment made. It is greatly desired that all pupils be present on these two occasions, so that school officials may have as com-plete a picture as possible of the potential enrollment for the season.

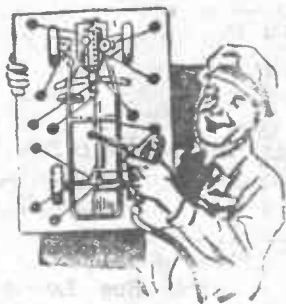
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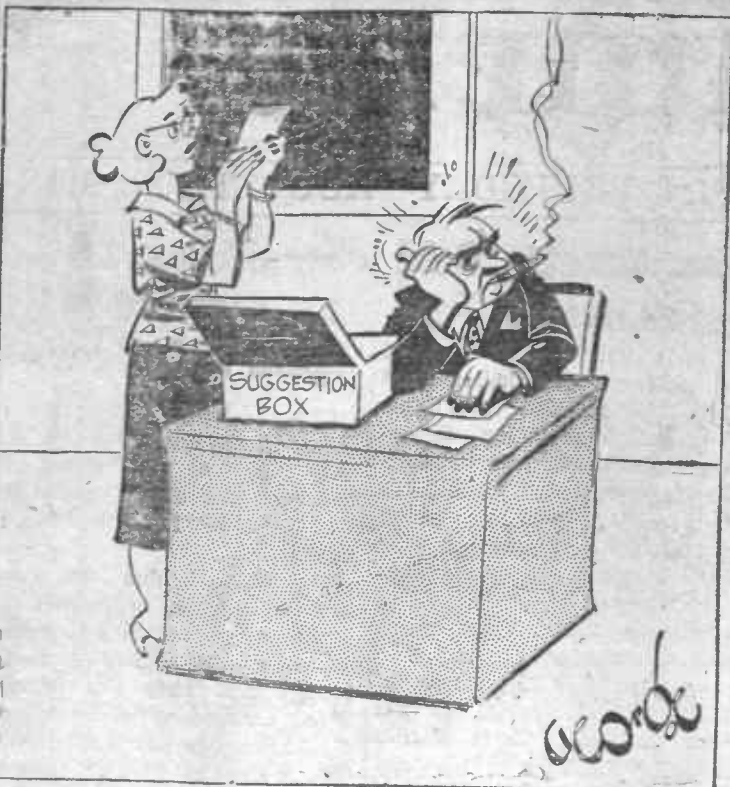

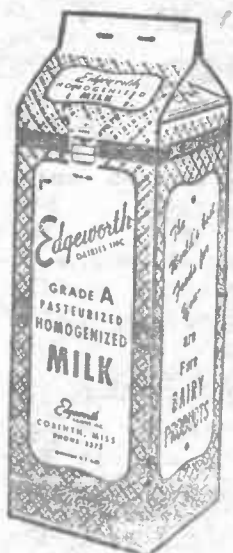

The grass came up to a good stand and stood the drought amazingly well and since the rain, growth has been satisfactory. He said that to achieve the purpose of the State Land Grant College, education was given to the young and extension services were offered to all of the farming people in the state. Mr. Hilburn also recognized the services of the PCA and the NFLA to farmers of this area and predicted continued success for the organizations.

In observance of the Twentieth Anniversary of the Tupelo Production Credit Association, Pat Daugherty, Sec-Treas., said, "During the twenty years of operation, we have loaned \$32,999,976. with an actual loss of only \$5,202.42. As you do your week end shopping, there seem always to be a lot of different size cans on the shelves, doesn't there? But actually there's not as many as you might think. There are only nine sizes that the average housewife usually buys.

To help you with your shopping, here's some information on the weight of the contents, the number of servings and the types of food packed in the various sized cans.

The six-ounce can holds three-quarters of a cup (6 four-ounce servings reconstituted). It is used mainly for frozen concentrated fruit juices.

The eight-ounce can (2 one-half cup servings) is found mainly in the metropolitan areas, and is used principally for fruits and vegetables.

The No. 1 (picnic) can, holding about one and a quarter cups (2 to 3 servings) is used chiefly for condensed soups and some fruits and vegetables.

The No. 300 cans holds about one and three-quarter cups (3 to 4 servings). It is used for specialty items as pork and beans, spaghetti and date and nut bread.

The No. 303 can, holding 2 cups (4 servings) is used extensively for fruits and vegetables.

The No. 2 can, holding about two and a half cups (5 servings) is used for fruits, vegetables, and fruit juices.

The No. 2 1/2 can, which holds three and a half cups (7 half-cup servings) is used principally for large fruits, fruit cocktail and bulky vegetables.

The No. 3 cylinder or 46 ounce can (11 to 12) servings is used exclusively for juices and whole vegetables.

The No. 10 can is the institutional or restaurant size. It holds three quarts or 12 cups (24 servings).

Make it a practice to read the labels on the cans for other helpful information.

Ice Cream Stains
Children and ice cream cones are a happy combination in the good old summer time. But once in a while the ice cream gets out of control and slides down a fresh clean pinafore or drops on a little boy's Sunday suit.

Remember, ice cream stains contains milk or cream, sugar, egg and sometimes coloring. To remove a fresh stain from washable material, sponge the garment with cold lukewarm water. Then wash in warm soap suds. This works best if the ice cream contains no highly colored fruit

On material that is not washable, sponge with a commercial cleaning fluid to remove the greasy part of the stain. Follow directions on the bottle. Use it out of doors or in a well ventilated room, for the fumes may be toxic. Let the fabric dry, then sponge with cold water: to remove any stains from the egg and sugar in the ice cream.

If the stain is not removed completely, follow with a pepsin treatment. You can buy the pepsin at the drug store. First sponge the stain with cold water, then sprinkle on the dampened stain and let it stand for half an hour. Brush it off and rinse the spot well. For best results, be sure the material is free from soap and other alkali before you apply the pepsin.

Tomato Salad
Ingredients: 6 chilled tomatoes; lettuce; 1/2 cup celery; 1/2 cup chopped cucumber; 1 tablespoon minced onion; 1 tablespoon chopped green pepper; 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped; 2 tablespoons mayonnaise of cooked salad dressing; 1 teaspoon salt; pepper.

To Make: Cut stem end from tomatoes. Cut tomatoes four times from the top almost through the bottom to form eight attached "petals". Spread petals apart on the lettuce. Combine other ingredients and put filling in center of "flowers". Chill. You might use one-half cup cottage cheese in place of egg.

County Agent News

Seven out of every 10 acres of open crop land is Mississippi need lime for legumes. Is your land included in the seven acres that need lime or is it in the three that have plenty? A soil test will help you find out.

With prices as they are, increased efficiency of production is even more important. Lime and fertilizer are tools of efficient production. So make your fertilizer dollar even more valuable by having a soil test made to determine just what you need in the way of lime and fertilizer.

Right now is a good time to take soil samples from land that is being fallowed for fall planting of small grains. For later planting, samples must be taken before September 15, if you expect to get results back in time for fall planting. Send Samples to the State Soil Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State College. See your county agent for sample boxes, information sheets.

Late August Management. Clipping—if your pastures have short grass and a lot of weeds, they should be clipped. However, if you have good grass and not to many weeds, clipping at this late date is not recommended.

Small Grains.—Now is the time to get that land ready for planting small grains for early fall grazing. A well prepared seedbed is a must for getting the oats or wheat off to a good start.

Harvesting Silage.—You cannot always tell when corn is ready for the silo by looking at the stalk. Shuck a few ears and if the grain is dented and becoming hard it is ready to cut and put in the silo. Sorghum is ready for

cutting when the seed heads are in the dough stage.

Second Growth Sorghum.—Sometimes contains prussic acid. Don't take chances by turning your whole herd out to graze second growth sorghum. Find out if prussic acid is present first. Here is one way to do it—let one cow, preferably the worst cow in your herd, go out and graze the field. If she is not hurt by the second growth sorghum, you can believe that no prussic acid is present and the sorghum is safe for the whole herd to graze.

Make your plans now not to lose any money through improper harvesting of this year's crop. Here are some pointers to help you do a good job of gathering this year's cotton.

1. Dry damp or wet seed cotton before taking it to the gin. By having your cotton ginned dry, you can save from \$10 to \$15 a bale.

2. Do not pick cotton that is wet from rain or damp from dew. 3. Under no circumstances tramp seed cotton. If you do, grass stems, seeds and fine leaf particles will be impossible to clean out of lint.

4. Have a cover handy to use over your seed cotton while hauling to the gin, holding overnight or when raining.

5. Keep matches and other foreign matter out of your seed cotton. This includes the water keg, lunch pails and the like.

6. If you have green, trashy or damp seed cotton on your truck or trailer, tell the ginner about it.

Scripture: Matthew 6:7-13; 1 Timothy 2:1-8; Romans 8:26-28
Devotional Reading: Psalm 32.

Prayer Life

Lesson for August 23, 1953

CAN it be true that some Christians have no prayer life? It is true that some church members have none; but what about Christians? Well, can an airplane be without an engine of any kind, or without any motive power? Can a deep-water diver keep on at his work if his lifeline to the top is broken in two? Of course not.

An airplane that cannot move may look like a plane, but it is no more use than so much junk. A diver whose lifeline has broken will be brought to the surface a drowned man. His friends may look at the corpse and say, "How natural Kelly looks!" but it isn't Kelly any more. An airplane with no motive power is a dead plane; a diver with no lifeline is a dead diver. And a Christian without prayer is a dead Christian. For prayer is the motive power, prayer is the lifeline, of the Christian.

Prayer Habits

It is not true that prayer means less when it is a habit. On the contrary, a Christian is much more likely to pray when he has made a habit of it. All Christians, and many who are not Christians, are aware of the great importance of prayer. Most Christians, if interviewed, would say something like "I know I ought to pray more than I do." We do not need to be convinced that praying is important. What most of us need is help on how to pray. We pray only when we are in the mood, and the praying mood dries up on us, so to speak. This is where habit helps us. Breathing is essential to life, and if it were not a habit we would often forget to breathe. Prayer can never be as automatic as that, but it can be so much a habit that we never need to be reminded

of it. The first thing to do, if you want to develop your prayer life, is to set aside a definite time every day for it. Make it a "must," not something you do if you have time for it. When prayer is something done only "if" there is time, then there never is time, and there seldom is prayer.

In Season, Out of Season

The mature Christian will pray at regular times; but he also cultivates the habit of praying at irregular times. Do you have a regular time for looking at your watch? Perhaps so; you look at it when you wake up in the morning, you look at it at breakfast time, and so on. But no one who wears a watch looks at it only at regular hours as if it were a medicine. You look at it off and on all through the day, for any number of reasons. So the Christian acquires the habit of looking to God off and on all through the day, also for a number of reasons. When a happy thing happens, the Christian breathes a prayer of thankfulness. It does not have to be long to be real. When something seems too much to stand, the Christian just asks God, then there, to help him. When he hears about some one in trouble, he does not content himself with saying "Too bad." If there is anything he can do about it, he will do it. But the Christian does not stop there. In the very midst of helping another, he will offer a prayer to God for him. This is most important perhaps when the other person is clear out of reach, when nothing we ourselves can say or do will help him at all.

Praying Like A Christian

A person might pray every day and often and yet not pray like a Christian. For a Christian's prayers are not the "gimme" kind. It is not that we should never pray for ourselves. A study of the Lord's Prayer will show that some of the petitions are for ourselves. But for what? For purity of life, for forgiveness, for daily bread—that is, for necessities, not for luxuries. It is a good thing once in a while to ask one's self: How many other persons could join me in this prayer? Am I praying for something that is going to make trouble for other people? Am I praying for something which if I get it will have to be taken away from others who need it just as much as I do? Unselfish praying and unselfish living go together. Christ lived and died "for their sakes" as he said. Prayer in his name is prayer in his spirit.

County Agent's Cotton Insect Report

Migration of Boll Weevils is at its peak. Weevils are moving from old cotton to young cotton damaging bolls on both old and young cotton where the bolls are not at least twenty-five days old.

I would advise poisoning any cotton where young bolls are evident for they will have to be protected to make cotton. In young cotton setting a top cotton crop, poison every four days with long killing poison such as Deldrin or Toxaphene.
