Iuka Citizens Warned About Outside Privies

Citizens of Iuka are warned this week about the condition of pit privies and sewage disposal systems by Mayor John Henry Allen.

In an official statement Mr. Allen says: "In order to protect the public welfare and health of the people of Iuka, the sewage ordinance adopted by the city of Iuka must be strictly enforced. The ordinance requires that all residences and businesses be connected to the public sewage system if there is a sewage line adjacent to their property. All pit privies and private sewage disposal systems shall be so connected that they will meet with the requirements of the Mississippi State Board of Health. If you have a privy or sewage disposal system that is not working properly, please get in touch with your local health department and you will be advised as to what should be done to make your disposal system comply with the aforementioned requirements."

Tuberculosis In Tishomingo County

Discovery of 2 new cases of tuberculosis in Tishomingo county since January 1, 1953, was announced by Dr. H. G. Waldrop, Health Officer of the Tishomingo County Health Department.

At the present time there are 61 known cases of tuberculosis in Tishomingo County with 4 hospitalized.

In Mississippi 628 new cases have been found between January 1 and June 30, 1953. This brings the total number of known cases of tuberculosis in the state to 6,505.

The case finding program in Tishomingo County is carried on by the Tishomingo County Health Department in cooperation with the private physicians of the county and is supported to a large extent by the Tishomingo County Tuberculosis Association.

Health Requirements For Livestock And Poultry Entering Fairs And Shows

Health requirements for livestock and poultry entering fairs and livestock shows in the state are the following:

Cattle—All breeding cattle six months of age and over exhibited at fairs or shows within the State must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued by an accredited or approved graduate veterinarian showing that they have passed one agglutination test for Brucellosis not more than thirty days prior to date of exhibit. The certificate should be issued prior to assembling on the premises and entering cattle in any fair show.

Cattle under thirty months of age vaccinated under state-federal supervision with Brucella abortus vaccine between four and eight months of age may be admitted when accompanied by the official calfhood vaccination certificate.

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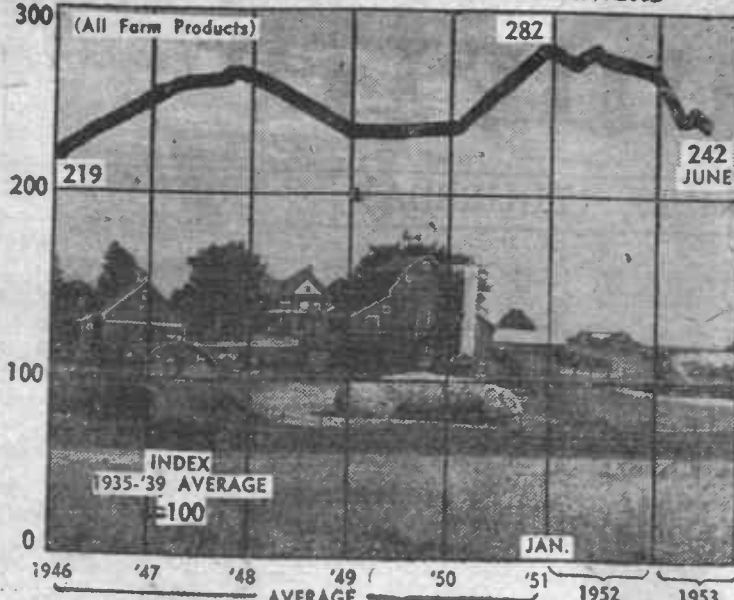

HOME AGENT NOTES

Lots of folks are superstitious about killing crickets in the house—but lots of folks have recently been finding it necessary to do something about a number of the insects in their homes.

In the house they will eat holes in the paper, rubber and cotton, linens, woolen or fur garments. In fact, they'll eat these things indoors or out-of-doors, especially if they are soiled with perspiration or foods. Outdoors they destroy seedling cotton and vegetables, too.

The female cricket lays 300 eggs that develop in 9 to 14 weeks.

To control them in the house, spray with a 2% household chlordane spray. A 5% chlordane or 10% DDT dust applied around the foundation, baseboards or doors will stop them from entering the house.

Keep children out of the insecticide. Keep chickens and livestock from eating green plants where the dust has been applied. A good rain or sprinkling of the treated area will remove the danger to people and livestock from the insecticide.

Refrigerator Defrosting
The time to defrost the refrigerator comes around often all during the year, and more especially so in hot weather. To

make the job take less time, be easier and more important to keep your refrigerator in best operating condition, never let the frost get more than one-fourth inch thick.

The thicker the frost the more it insulates or "blankets" the evaporator and reduces its cooling effect on the inside of the refrigerator, no matter how much the motor runs. Thus, thick frost lets the inside of the refrigerator warm up so that foods don't keep as well.

Most home refrigerators need defrosting at least once a week—or oftener in summer when hot weather plus use of the refrigerator for chilled foods and cool drinks cause frost to form fast.

Follow the directions in the booklet that comes with the refrigerator as to how to defrost. Some manufacturers advise quick defrosting with hot water in the ice trays while others warn against it.

If you have a newer model refrigerator with automatic defrosting, you're a lucky one who does not have to worry about defrosting the refrigerator.

Common causes of food waste are lack of planning, wasteful practices, poor buying, improper preparation, cooking and serving, accumulation of leftovers, and poor storage of fresh, canned and frozen products.

Plan the marketing so that food doesn't sit around in the kitchen or refrigerator and lose freshness and flavor. Use leftovers promptly in soup, stew or sandwiches—or if you have a home freezer, freeze them. Keep all

food clean, cool and covered to save more of it from the garbage pail.

Fruit Shake
To make "fruit shake", slice one-inch block of frozen fruit into tall glasses. Add milk, until each glass is about half full. Then fill the glass with vanilla ice cream and stir.

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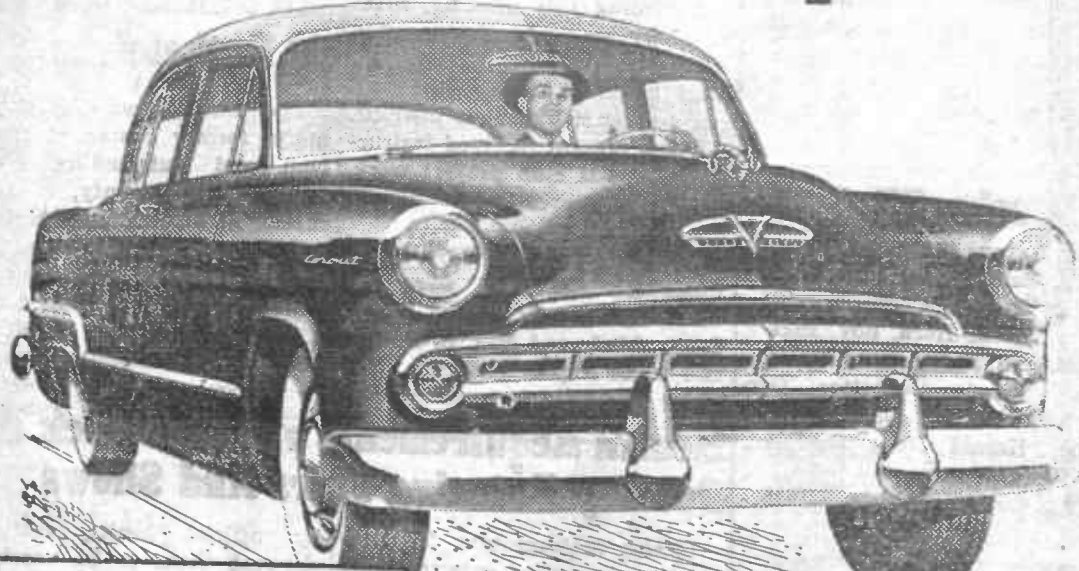

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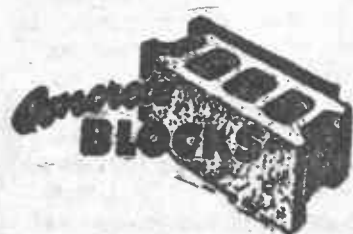

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rid of the lice on your cattle. Do it now. It will take two to three gallons of diluted spray material to give a thorough treatment to each mature animal. One such treatment will usually give control. However, sometimes a second treatment 14 to 18 days after the first is needed.

Materials to use include DDT, methoxychlor, toxaphene, chlordane, lindane or benzene hexachloride. For specific instructions on materials and how to use them, see your county agent.

On milking cows, use only methoxychlor, rotenone or lindane.

Now is the time to get in a planting of fall vegetables. Save on that grocery bill this fall and winter. Vegetables that can be planted now include bush snap beans, beets, carrots, Swiss chard, collards, Chinese cabbage, leaf lettuce, head lettuce, mustard, turnips, parsley, radishes and rutabaga.

These and others that can be planted early next month will help to insure your family of fresh vegetables most of the year.

Get And Set Pine Seedlings Early

Mr. K. L. Busby, local area forester says, "The farmers, who got and set their pine seedlings early, obtained best results from their plantings last year." Based on last year's results, Mr. Busby is recommending that farmers get and set their pine seedlings early this year.

Recently I accompanied Mr. Busby to the T. V. A. Forest Nursery at Sheffield, Alabama. While there, we were told that if farmers would place their orders for pine seedlings with them early they could begin filling these orders the latter part of November without cost to the farmers.

On more than half the land in Tishomingo County, pine trees is the best crop the farmers can grow. I based this statement on the capability of the land as determined by the Soil Scientist of the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

The District Commissioners of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District recognize the need of covering more of our steep land with pine trees. Mr. Royal D. Deaton and his father, Mr. Carmack Deaton, of Paden, Mississippi are following the suggestion of the Soil Conservation District Commissioners and are setting areas of their steep land to pines. Not only have they set pines, but have constructed some and will construct more, fire lanes to protect these new plantings.

A good growth of pines protect the land from erosion, increases infiltration of water into the soil and furnishes the farmer with a future crop.

Most of the farmers of Tishomingo County would find it profitable to use the time needed to properly set two or three acres of their steep unproductive land to pines in December or January. Now is the time to decide where you are going to set your pine seedlings. After you have decided where you are going to set them, determine the number you need, (1000 per acre) and place your order with Mr. Hamilton, the County Agent, so the seedlings can be obtained and set early.

More Farm Housing Loan Funds Allotted Here

A new allotment of federal funds for farm housing loans in Tishomingo County has been announced by M. H. Woods, County Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration at Iuka.

Purpose of the credit is to finance homes and farm buildings for farm families. Veterans receive preference. The loans bear 4 percent interest and are repayable over periods up to 33 years.

Since the demand for these loans far exceeds the limited loan funds, Mr. Woods explained, only farm owners receiving all or a substantial portion of their income from the sale of farm commodities may qualify as borrowers. A loan may be made to improve a farm on which the operator works off the farm only if he or members of his family are farming on a sizeable scale. These loans may not be used to construct rural residences or other buildings for families not generally recognized as farmers.

An FHA Committee in each county, composed of three local citizens, at least two of whom are farmers, decides who is eligible. In Tishomingo County, committee members are Mr. William F. Sartain, Rt. 1, Dennis; Mr. L. W. Rushing, Rt. 2, Dennis; and Mr. William N. Honeycutt, Rt. 2, Burnsville.

Since this new type of credit was established by Congress four years ago, about 16,300 farm owners throughout the county have used the aid to improve their homes and buildings. Loans amounting to \$81,416,000 nationwide have been made for new houses, for repairing and remodeling old homes; for new barns, poultry houses, and other buildings, and to improve existing buildings. Numerous loans also included funds for farmstead

water systems.

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THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform
Sunday School Lesson
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Scripture: I Timothy 3:1-13; 4:6-16;
5:21-22; II Timothy 3:14-17.
Devotional Reading: Psalm 37:30-40.

Leaders

Lesson for August 30, 1953

A "classless society" there can never be, for various reasons. One of the plainest reasons is that there always have to be leaders in any society that is not a sheer mob—and even mobs have to be led. No group rises higher or goes faster than its leaders. This is true of bad societies like gangs of murderers, useless societies like some the reader can mention, and also of the most important and best groups in the world. The church of God is no exception. No church is better or more progressive than its leaders. The aged Apostle Paul in his letters to his young friend Dr. Foreman Timothy laid down some principles for Christian leaders which have been tested by time and found always to be good.

Not All Good People Make Good Leaders

Leaders do not spring up out of nowhere. They have to be selected and trained. What is true of the ministers of the church, the "clergy" as they are sometimes called, is just as true of the "lay" leadership, deacons, stewards, wardens or what not, and in general the kind of people you meet at a "Workers' Council" in any type of church. Now nearly everybody knows, sometimes from sad experience, that not everybody makes a good minister. Good intentions won't do it, religious devotion won't do it—though both of these are just as necessary for the effective Sunday school superintendent as for the pastor. Even the feeling, "I have been called to this work," is not enough; for experience has often shown how mistaken such a feeling can be.

How Can You Tell?

How can you tell whether you or any one else has the qualities needed for leadership? One of the best ways is the simplest: try it out. Paul speaks, for instance, of the religious leader being "apt to teach." The best way to see whether some one will make a good teacher is to let him try it a while. Some church executives make the mistake of not letting young people try their wings because they are "too young." If you will look around the average church you will see some good old saint who has been, let us say, the teacher of a certain class for thirty or forty years. Everybody says, "We don't need young sprouts, we need teachers of long experience like old Mrs. Whatzis." Yes, but when did Mrs. Whatzis get her start? The records will very likely show that she started out teaching when she was little Sadie Whozis, aged about sixteen, and it is safe to say that the greybeards in the church fifty years ago shook their heads and said little Sadie was much too young to teach!

The Habit Of Command

There is one point which Saint Paul insists on strongly. It is that the church leader must have a strong personal character. He must have a good reputation, of course, but character is far deeper. Among other personal points of strength Paul singles out the ability to control himself and others. He must be able to get things done. He must be able to persuade people to do right things. A leader without force of character just can't lead—it's a contradiction in terms. And Paul suggests two practical tests for this quality. One is: Can the man control himself? A person who falls easily into temptation, who is wishy-washy, who has a vile temper, who lets emotions run away with him, will never make a good leader. The other test, for a grown man, is: How does he manage his family? If he manages that badly, he is a poor prospect for a church leader.

The Bible And Leadership

Another matter often overlooked, but not overlooked by Paul, is this: The Christian leader must know his Bible, love it and be guided by it. When a church is electing officers, how often this is forgotten! A man will be elected to the official board because he is a prominent citizen or because it is hoped that he will be generous in his gifts, or because he is genial and friendly; but is the question asked: Can we elect as leader of God's people a person who is ignorant of God's Word?

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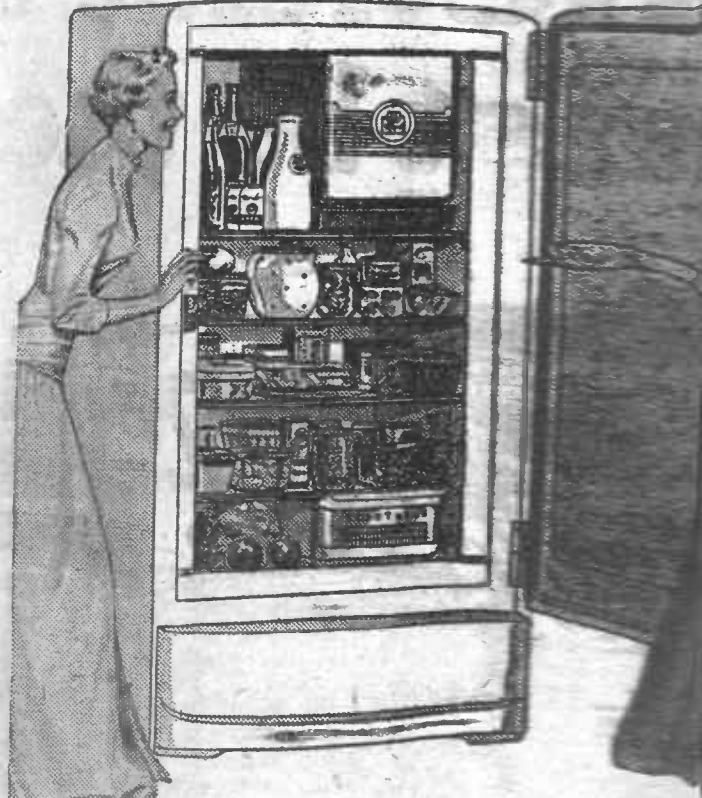
