Some Of Iuka's Streets To Be Paved Soon, Petitions Have Already Been Signed

Petitions have been circulated and preliminary plans completed for paving some of Iuka's streets.

A plan to pave the street beginning at the Methodist church running north passed the clinic to Elmo Davis home, thence west to the intersection of Pearl street, and thence south to where Pearl intersects Eastport at Hurdley hotel, is almost completed and it is expected that a contract will be signed very shortly with the construction company to do the paving. Almost all landowners on the streets mentioned above have signed the petition to pay their part of the paving cost which will be charged on a front-foot basis. The contract will be between private parties and not between the Town of Iuka and the paving company. However, the Town has agreed to pay for paying of all intersections at the same rate to be charged for the rest of the paving.

Another petition has been circulated and signed by most of the landowners on South Main street beginning at the Southern railroad running south to the southwest corner of Pruitt Gin, and on Meigs street from the frozen food locker east to Aberdeen street at the park. The citizens on these streets are asking that the town council formulate plans and make an assessment of the cost per front foot to pay for paving. Mayor Allen, at the meeting Tuesday night, asked that the board be given some time to determine whether this could be done.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka held Tuesday night, September 1st, two ordinances of major importance were passed upon.

An ordinance establishing a fee for tapping a sewer line and a penalty for violation of the ordinance was passed.

Any person, firm or corporation must first obtain a permit and pay a fee of \$15.00 before being allowed to tap onto the sewerage disposal lines. Any person, firm or corporation attaching onto the sewerage lines without the permit and not paying the fee shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00.

Permits will be available at the mayor's office and an inspector will be employed to supervise tapping onto the sewer lines.

A resolution declaring a service charge of twenty-five cents per month to be charged to all persons, firms or corporations who have their water systems connected with the sewerage lines of the Town of Iuka was passed. The sewerage fee will be attached to the water bill presented to customers of the system.

Formal notices of these two ordinances appear elsewhere in this issue of The Vidette.

The Town Council presently is engaged in compiling the budget for the 1953-54 term of administration.

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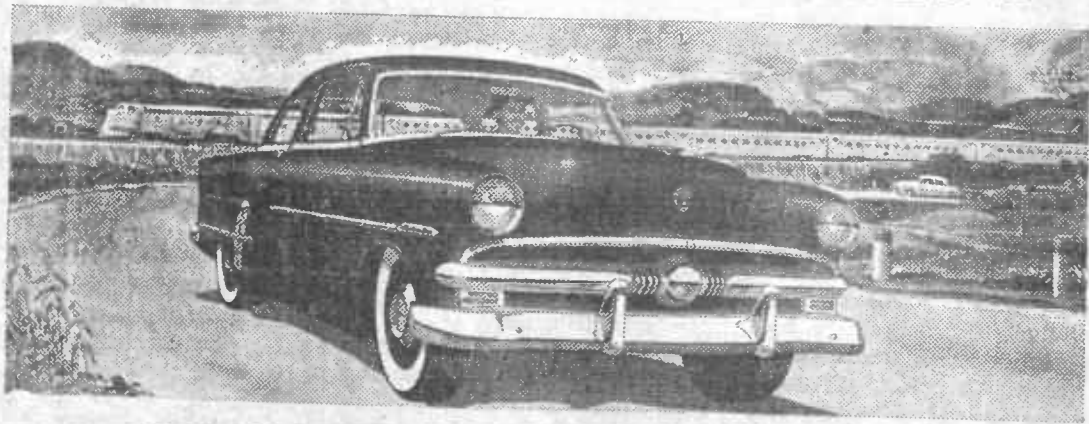

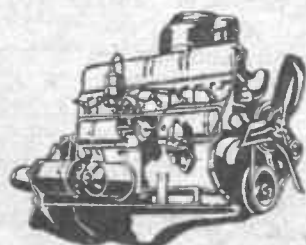

Grain feeds, such as corn, oats and barley, are usually cheaper during the harvest season than at other times. Those who have necessary processing equipment can prepare good and relatively cheaper home mixed feeds by getting their grain feeds at harvest time.

Farmers who plan to plant late fall and early winter grazing this week or next week are reminded that a seeding rate of 120 pounds of small grain and 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre won't allow clover or legumes to get a start.

This heavy seedling and fertilization rate should be grazed off and the clover or legume sown on top in October. This way the clovers and legumes will survive.

Farmers who want to get their clovers or legumes in with the small grains now can plant 90

need more hay than they have on hand or will save during the remainder of the haying season, are advised to buy their additional needs before the haying season is over.

Those who buy hay now will have more choice as to kind and quality. Also the price is likely to be lower than it will be later on. In some areas farmers have more hay on hand than they can properly store. By buying this hay, dairymen can save the cost of hauling and stacking it in the barn.

Grain feeds, such as corn, oats and barley, are usually cheaper during the harvest season than at other times. Those who have necessary processing equipment can prepare good and relatively cheaper home mixed feeds by getting their grain feeds at harvest time.

Farmers who plan to plant late fall and early winter grazing this week or next week are reminded that a seeding rate of 120 pounds of small grain and 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre won't allow clover or legumes to get a start.

This heavy seedling and fertilization rate should be grazed off and the clover or legume sown on top in October. This way the clovers and legumes will survive.

Farmers who want to get their clovers or legumes in with the small grains now can plant 90

pounds of the small grains and use only 40 pounds per acre of nitrogen. Then the clover and legumes will come up and live.

Some September Pasture Jobs. Get ready to get in silage from corn and sorghum. Finish cutting hay. Get nitrogen for cereal and grass application. Do not clip pastures any more this fall. If broomsedge areas are to be seeded this fall, mow and burn rather than turning under this late. Plow land for second planting of winter grazing. Top dress fescue and white clover with phosphate and potash, or basic slag and potash.

Loblolly pines seedlings are in limited supply this year so those who want them should get in their application forms just as soon as possible.

Applications for these and other free seedlings are being accepted right now.

Slash pine seedlings, long leaf and short leaf are in normal supply. However all seedlings are being issued on a first come first serve basis. Better see your county agent or area forester at once so you will get the kind of seedlings you want.

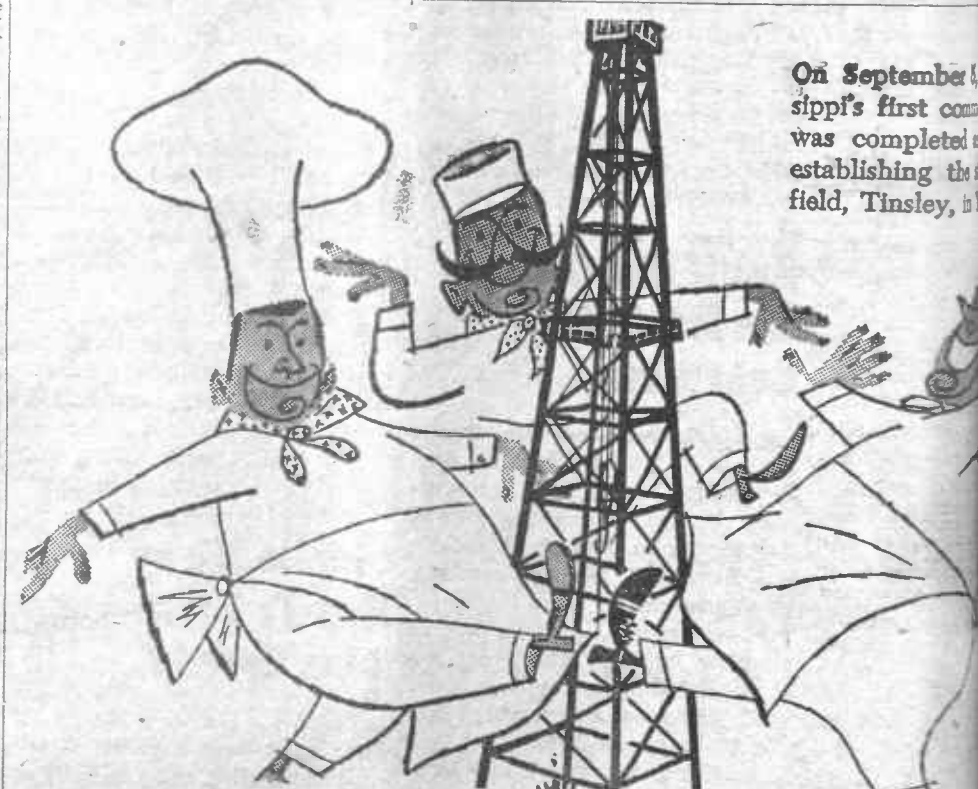

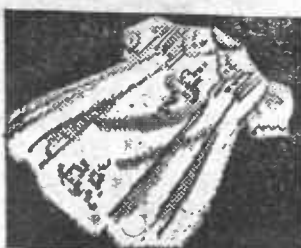

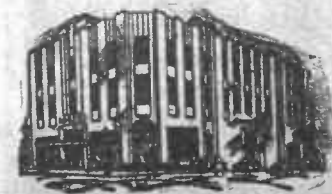

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Business On Increase; July 5% Over July Last Year; District Increase 14%

Business activity in Mississippi during July continued above the level of a year ago, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College.

Unadjusted data used in making the direct comparison between July 1953 and July 1952 showed a 5 per cent increase, while the same data showed a 3 per cent gain over June 1953. Each of the nine major factors used in the comparison ran above July 1952. The largest increase, 10 per cent, was shown for postal receipts and life insurance sales.

Although construction contracts lagged behind the total for June 1953 and July 1952, construction activity held up fairly well. Construction at the end of the first seven months of 1953 totaled \$48,713,000; compared with \$76,331,000 for the same period in

1952, a decrease of 36 per cent. The employment situation in Mississippi seems to remain fairly stable.

Each of the three severance taxes yielded more revenue during July 1953 than during June. The timber severance tax yielded \$37,449 in July compared with \$22,273 in June and \$38,416 in July 1952. This gave an increase of 68 per cent over June 1953 but a 3 per cent decrease from July 1952.

The gas severance tax showed an increase over the previous month for the first time in six months. Collections for July were \$51,466, compared with \$48,925 for June and \$50,844 for July 1952, the increase being 5.2 per cent and 1.2 per cent.

Oil severance taxes collected exceeded those for July 1952 by 5 per cent and June 1953 by 2 per cent. Oil severance taxes collected for July 1953 were \$415,068 compared with \$407,028 in June

and \$396,311 in July 1952.

Total tax collections for July fell 10.7 per cent under June 1953 and 5.3 per cent below 1952. The totals were: July 1953, \$6,192,894; July 1952, 5.3 per cent below July 1952. The totals were: July 1953, \$6,192,894; July 1952, \$6,542,028; and June 1953, \$6,933,348.

Each of the sixteen trade areas in the state indicated increased business activity during July compared with a year ago. The increases ranged from less than one per cent in the Meridian district to 14 per cent in the Corinth and Greenwood districts.

Increases by districts were: Biloxi-Gulfport, 8 per cent; Clarksdale, 7 per cent; Columbus, 12 per cent; Corinth, 14 per cent; Greenwood, 14 per cent; Greenville, 12 per cent; Hattiesburg, 8 per cent; Jackson, 6 per cent; Laurel, 9 per cent; McComb, 5 per cent; Memphis, 3 per cent; Meridian, 6 per cent; Natchez, 1 per cent; Pascagoula, 10 per cent; Tupelo, 11 per cent; and Vicksburg, 9 per cent.

Seven districts reported less business activity than during June 1953 and nine reported more. The decreases ranged from less than one per cent in the Natchez area to nearly 6 per cent in the Greenville District. The increases varied from less than one per cent in the Greenwood, Meridian, and Vicksburg areas to 8 per cent in the McComb district.

The Business Research Station's index to general business activity for the state was down by several points on July 31. On that date it stood at 365 per cent of the 1939-1940 adjusted average compared with 368 per cent a year earlier and 383 per cent on June 30, 1953.

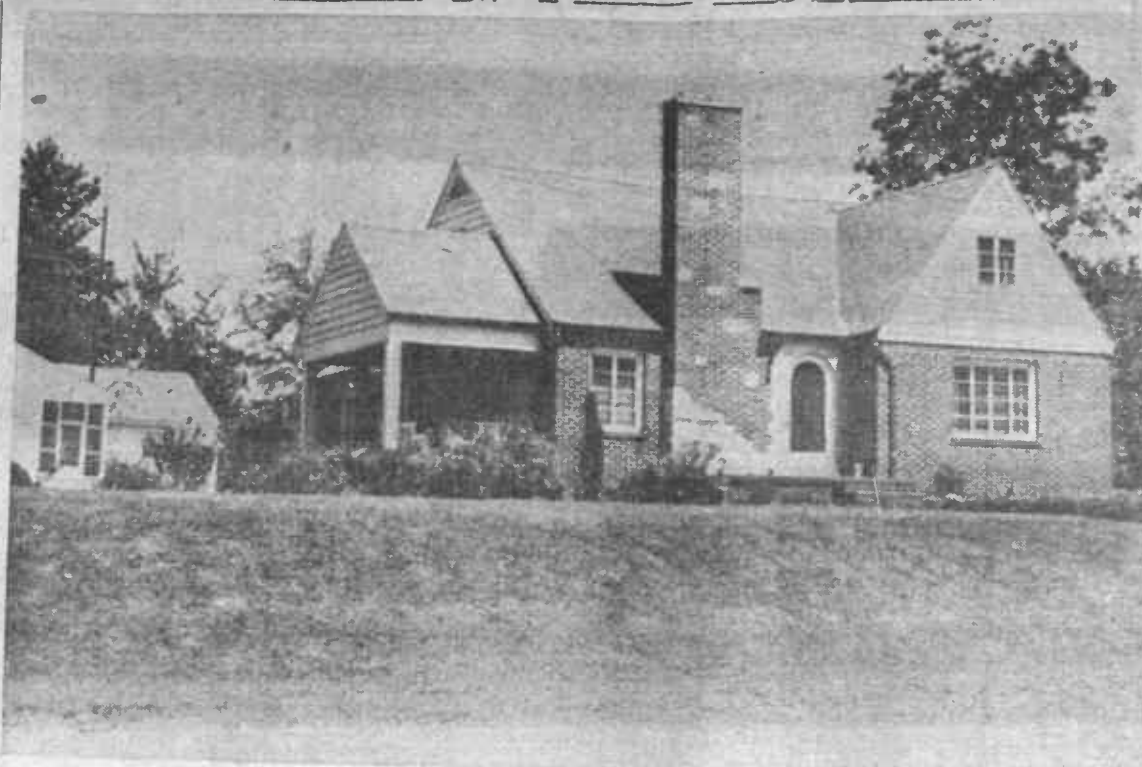

Roy C. Adams To Present Deed

The State Highway Department will today tender the final deeds for Natchez Trace Parkway right-of-way between Tupelo and Jackson to the Department of Interior at French Camp this afternoon.

Highway Commissioner Roy Adams will personally hand the deeds, for the last two sections of right-of-way between U. S. Highway No. 45 and U. S. Highway No. 51 to representatives of

the National Park Service.

The Trace, a scenic road stretching from Nashville, Tenn. to Natchez, a distance of 450 miles, follows the same general route used in early pioneer days. The route was a main overland connection back to Nashville and northern river ports on the Ohio for boat crews after traveling down the Mississippi to New Orleans.

Under congressional act, the Trace was authorized in 1934, providing the states—Mississippi, Alabama, and Tennessee—purchased all necessary right-of-way and deeded it to the federal government.

Mississippi has spent about \$1,500,000.00 since 1937 on right-of-way for the Natchez Trace Parkway. About 325 miles of route is contemplated for the state, Commissioner Adams pointed out, with today's deeds running the total to about 215 miles

of right-of-way purchased.

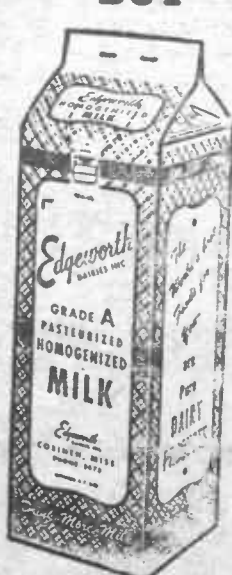

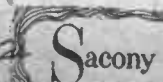

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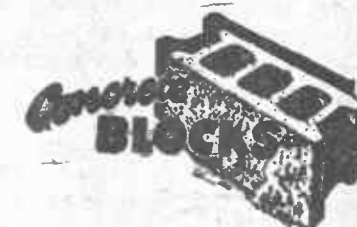

Your breakfast doesn't have to include the same food prepared in the same old way every morning. You have a wide selection of foods, including fruits and fruit juices, ready-to-eat or hot breakfast cereals, and meat or eggs.

The fruit juices supply needed vitamin C, the cereals are sources of minerals and vitamins, and the meat and eggs give proteins. The bread of some kind that every breakfast includes supplies necessary B vitamins, calcium and iron. Don't forget to include milk and cocoa sometimes too.

Household Hint
Keep a damp sponge at hand as you iron. It will take care of areas on garments that get too dry.

Cleaning Paint Brushes
A sticky, gummy, stiff paint brush left over from painting the lawn furniture in the spring or another paint job discourages the next paint job, doesn't it? And it wouldn't have taken much more time to clean the brush and put it away properly, would it now?

But if you didn't take this few more minutes, you will be glad to know that old or mis-used brushes may be reconditioned. Leave them suspended over a can in a conditioning solution, paint thinner or cleaner.

Suspend the brushes by boring a hole in the handle of each brush and hang it on a rod over the can. Two spring-type clothes pins held together with a rubber band will also provide a convenient way to suspend brushes. If you plan to finish a paint job tomorrow, store the brushes overnight by suspending them in turpentine or cleaner, with the bristles not touching the bottom of the container.

When the entire job is done, clean the brushes and handles with turpentine; then in warm soapy water. Dry and wrap them securely in paper. Leave them laying flat.

Men's suits made from the new synthetic fibers are found generally in most stores, and each has different wearing qualities. Dad's or Junior's new suit may be of orlon-and-cotton, dacron-and-wool or the most expensive all-dacron.

Experience in wearing garments from these new fabrics will be your guide, but here are a few pointers to help you in your first selection.

A dacron-and-wool blend makes a more comfortable suit than an all dacron, because the wool has the absorbent qualities that the synthetic lacks. The blend is easier to tailor, fit and press, because the wool provides some "give" or elasticity to the fabric.

All-dacron suits feel hotter than the blends of dacron-and-wool because they don't absorb the moist heat from the body. A point worth considering if this suit must be altered is that all-dacron suits can be taken in, but not let out because stitching leaves permanent marks on this fabric. All-dacron fabric is hard to press at home because it can be permanently damaged by too hot an iron and too much pressure.

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International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

Using Money

Lesson for September 6, 1953

CAN you use \$500?" is the way a loan company begins its circular inviting you to borrow from them at a ruinous rate of interest. Yes, indeed, I can use money, everybody thinks. What a man means by that is: I can think of ways to spend it. Give me a hundred dollars and I can guarantee to get rid of it before night. Give me a million and it may take me longer but I can use it, I can make it vanish, I can swap it in for something else.

But that is not using money. That may be using it, but maybe not. Money can be spent in wise ways or foolishly; it can be exchanged for something good or something bad or for really nothing at all. Using money is something more than merely passing it out of your pocket into somebody else's.

Root of All Evil

Money is not a bad thing in itself as some have thought. But it can be the root of many bad things. Or to speak more correctly, not money but the love of money is a root of all evils. (Paul does not in the original Greek say THE root; he does say A root.) For example, when a murder is committed and the police are trying to solve the mystery, one of the first questions asked is: Who stands to benefit by this murder?—meaning, who is going to strike it rich by this crime? Love of money can be a root of murder, theft, adultery, all the sins on the calendar. We could not abolish crime by abolishing money, to be sure. We could not abolish crime by seeing that every man, woman and child had exactly the same amount of money. The sinful heart has many outlets. But love of money, or in other words greed, selfishness, is one of the easiest and most frequent ways by which man's inner meanness comes out in the open.

Rich Toward God

On the other hand, money makes much good possible. If a man is going to be a "good father," he can't be that if he is a pauper. He doesn't have to be rich, but he does have to have money for groceries and education and all that it takes to bring up children. If a man is going to be a good citizen he will pay his taxes, and if the state is a good state those taxes will be wisely used for the benefit of all. A poverty-stricken state is not a good state to live in. A poverty-stricken home is not the kind of home you want your children to grow up in. Or consider all the good done by the church. Much of it is made possible by the contributions of the members. An orphanage, a hospital, an old folks' home, an evangelistic campaign—every part of the church's activity is something that uses money and transforms it into service and happiness. In Jesus' parable of the rich farmer whom God called a fool, no doubt the neighbors (some of them) admired the man for his wealth and his thrift. "He takes good care of what he's got," they would say. But Jesus did not think well of the man. His trouble was not that he was well-to-do. Jesus never condemned a man simply for owning property, money or anything else. The rich fool's trouble was that he thought of no one but himself, built his barns for no one but himself. To be "rich toward God" he would have to think about using his wealth for the benefit of some one besides himself.

Bull's Eye

Everybody aims at something in life—everybody, that is, but the aimless, who don't count. We all take aim—but at what? When you pull back the bowstring, or cock the trigger, and look toward the target, what do you see in the bull's eye? What is the very center, the principal aim of living? Some see nothing but the dollar mark. It is a mark that can be hit, and a man's aim can be absolutely accurate. But the trouble with money as a central aim in life, is that the more successful a man is in hitting it, the less satisfied he is likely to be. There are rich people who are happy; but it is not true that a man grows happier with every dollar he adds to his pile; it is not true that the happiest persons in town are the wealthiest. It is generally a fact that if a person is both rich and happy, his happiness comes from other source than his bank account.

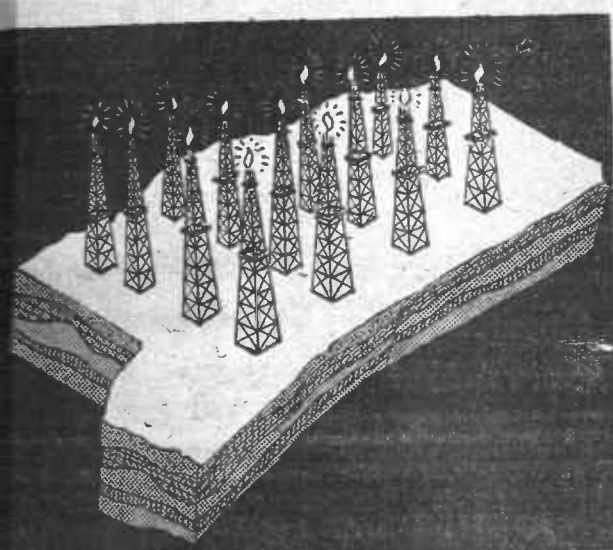

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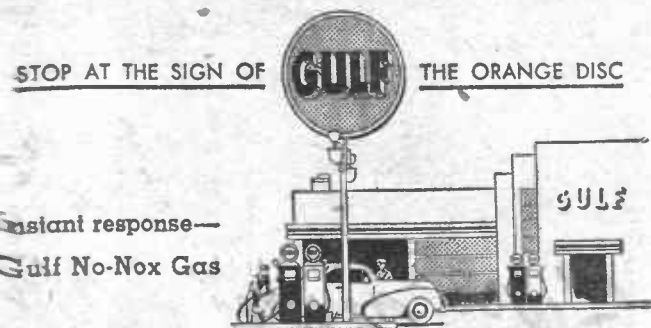

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE FEE FOR TAPPING A SEWER LINE IN THE TOWN OF IUKA AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF SAID ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI IN REGULAR MEETING THIS THE FIRST DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1953.

1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to tap into any Sewerage Line in said town without first being granted a permit therefor and a sum of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) shall be paid for said permit.

2. Be it further ordained that an inspector employed by the town of Iuka shall supervise the construction or tapping on to the Sewer System.

3. Be it further ordained that said permits will be available at the Mayor's office in said town.

4. Be it further ordained that any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions in this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than Twenty Five Dollars (\$25.00) and not more than One Hundred (\$100.00).

5. Be it further ordained that the Public Welfare demanding it, that this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after this date.

6. Be it further ordained that a copy of this Ordinance be published one time in the Iuka Vidette, a newspaper published in said town.
