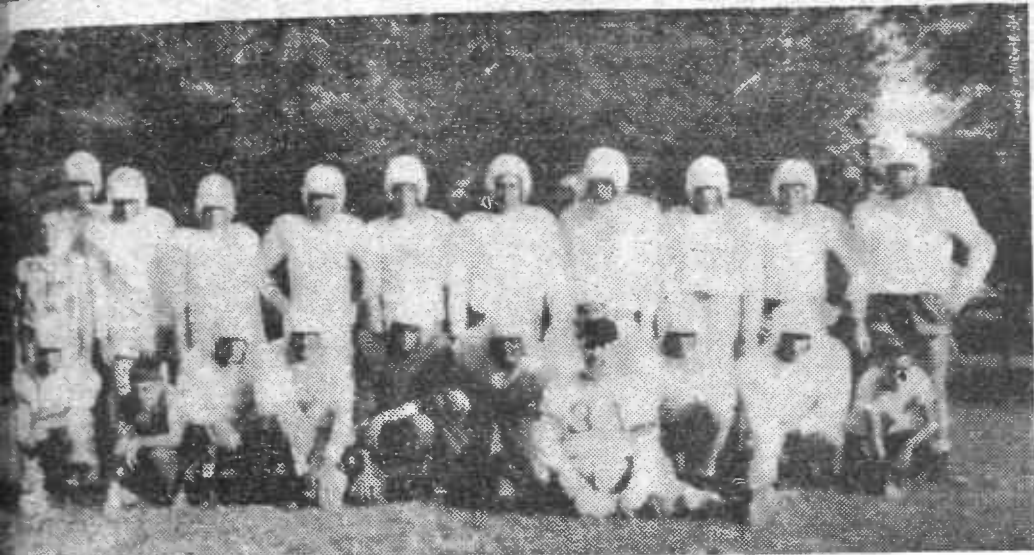

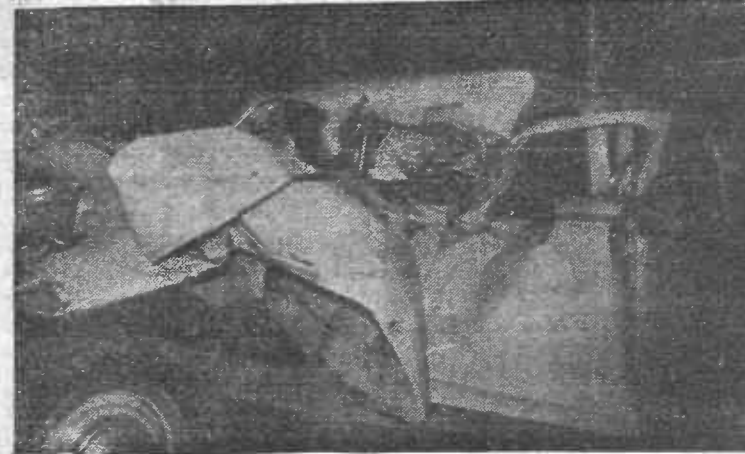
A well planned program of music, tours, and fellowship was enjoyed by more than a hundred ministers in Mississippi.

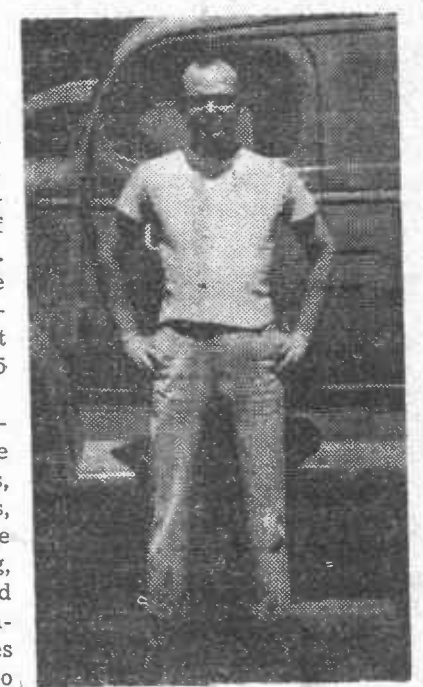

each boy and girl stays clean, but their job is many times doubled that of the mother at home.

And many schools do not have the facilities that encourage handwashing and make it easy. Even where lavatories are available in the rest rooms, there is often no soap or towels. What's the use running cold water over the hands without soap? And what's the use washing hands and drying them on soiled blue jeans or dresses or a common towel used by many?

Disease germs live in dirt. Most of the intestinal disturbances are caused by germs that are most commonly spread by personal contact. These include typhoid, para-typhoid, dysentery, diarrheas, strep infections, and some authorities think even polio. We teach clean hands, clean bodies, clean school rooms, clean play grounds. But are the facilities available at the school to protect your child? Johnny and Susie read in their health books about washing their hands before eating, after going to the toilet, but where and how?

If the school budget can't afford soap and towels, parents can help, as can 4-H Clubs, community and civic groups.

Visit your school, including toilets and lunch room. What kind of drinking fountains does your school have? What kinds of toilets? What place is used for handwashing? Does your school have towels and soap for the children to use each day? Is there a place to put used paper towels to keep them off the floor and grounds?

using two colors of rick-rack, the predominate color will be the one held toward you.

Using a needle and number 8 thread, take a stitch through the front of the first set of points (two thickness of points) then the back of the second set. Repeat until all points are on the thread and draw up tightly and tie in a hard knot. Clip threads and trim loose edges.

Use small amount of teroplane glue to fasten raw edges. Glue on to ear screw back, being sure to use fibers of cotton with glue to make it stick. Press rick-rack on and finish center with beads or artificial center.

Mississippi Among Leading Tree Farm States Of Nation

Mississippi ranks high among the 48 states in the number of tree farms whose owners are demonstrating both the desire and ability to protect their woodland and manage it for the continuous production of useful forest products. Only two states—Alabama and Texas—have more tree farmers than Mississippi.

As of August 1, there were 401 tree farms in Mississippi with a total acreage of 1,107,929. That represents an increase of 71 famers over a year ago, and an additional 156,260 acres of privately-owned, taxpaying forestland dedicated to the growing of forest crops for commercial purposes.

Texas has 468 tree farms, and Alabama 434.

Mississippi's tree farm program was launched November 4, 1944 under sponsorship of the Mississippi Forestry Association with cooperation and assistance from Southern Pine Association and American Forest Products Industries.

Importance of good forest practices is shown by foresters who predict that the state's present forest growth rate of 110 board feet per acre a year can be boosted to 300 board feet per acre if all commercial forestland is brought under reasonably good management.

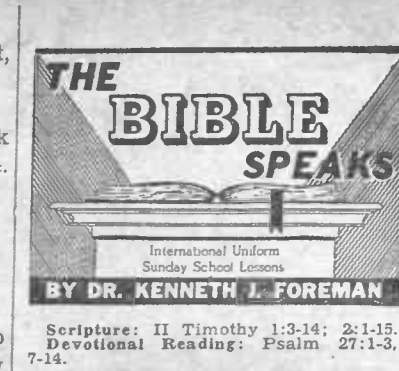

Christian Courage

Lesson for Sept. 13, 1953

NOBODY loves a coward. But Christian courage is a very special kind. A brave man may be a mean one; a brave man may be a selfish and cruel man too. But not a brave Christian! Christian courage is not something unconnected with the rest of life. Christian courage is one of a chain of virtues, not a loose jewel by itself. The courage of a Christian is (like that of others) sometimes of the body, sometimes of the mind and spirit. It is different from ordinary courage both in the why and the how.

Why Courage?

Some persons who do not understand Christianity have called this way of life "a slave morality." Perhaps we Christians are to blame for this, because we have sometimes rated humility as the top virtue, and also because we have not always set the example of a courageous life. But a true Christian is not a dish-rag sort of person, a worm without backbone. He finds need for bravery quite as much as any hero in the world. First of all he needs courage for his tasks, as Paul pointed out to his young friend Timothy. The everyday tasks, of course; but Paul meant something specially Christian. Paul was an experienced missionary, and a very brave one; Timothy was a much younger missionary, and apparently not a naturally brave man. The work to which Timothy had been called is, after all, the same to which all Christians are called. Let us name two items: personal witness to Christ, and sharing the gospel with the world. Isn't it just these two tasks that scare the "average" Christian to death? Most church members would rather do almost anything else but go out and make calls

on strangers inviting them to unite with Christ.

...
Lashes and Laughter
The Christian has other needs for courage, as Paul pointed out. One is in order to endure hardship, the other is to endure ridicule. It is tough to be a real Christian. The toughness is not felt always here in comfortable America; but in other lands it can be very tough indeed. There are Mohammedan villages in India where any one who openly becomes a Christian is denied even the use of the public well, and if he is not assassinated he will be left to starve to death or forced to seek a beggar's living in strange villages. There are places in Africa where to be known as a Christian and friend of white missionaries means constant danger of torture and death at the hands of murderous heathen mobs. There are places under the hammer-and-sickle where to be known as a Christian is to be cut off from normal ways of making a living. These things are not done to Christians in America—yet; but there is another weapon many Christians have to face—the saw-edged dagger of laughter. Christians are told by some highly-educated and impressive atheists that all religion is "infantilism," that no one can call himself mature if he leans on a God or even believes in one, that all religion including Christianity is a relic of superstitious ignorance. It takes a certain amount of iron in the blood to stand up against this sort of belittling. It takes inner courage to say as Paul did often: "I am not ashamed."

How Courage Comes

Paul would not have helped Timothy if all he had said was: Be brave! He goes on to show him how. He points to himself as an example—not by way of conceit but simply to demonstrate that he knew whereof he spoke. First he says "I know him . . . I am persuaded that he is able . . . Christian courage is based on God, not ourselves. As John expressed it, "Greater is he that is in you than he that is in the world." Then Paul urges Timothy to look to God, not to man, for final approval. This always works. On the other hand, Christian courage is not hoping God will do it all. We have to combine faith with action. "Stir to a flame," says Paul, "the gift that is in you." God endows us with ability to do all we need to do and to be all we need to be; but it is up to us.

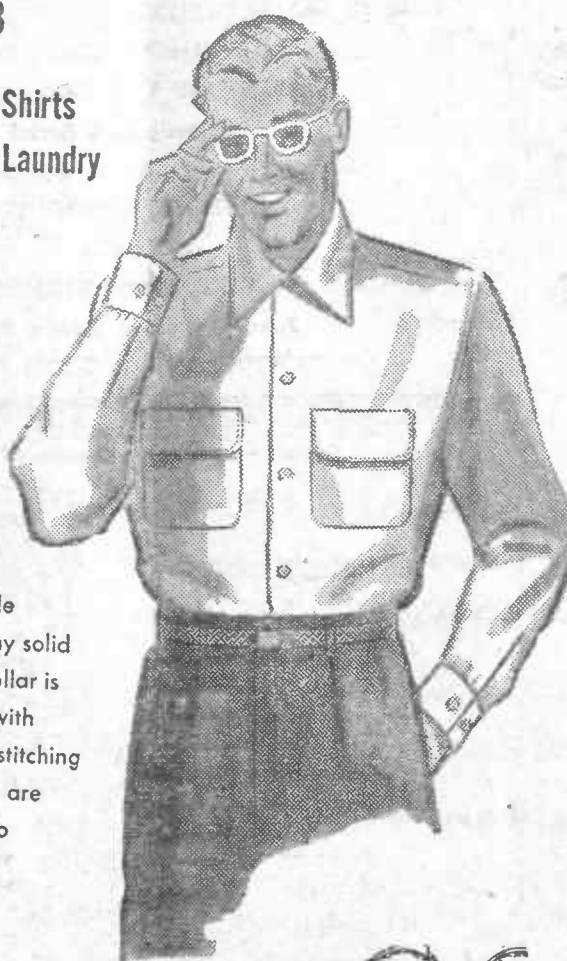

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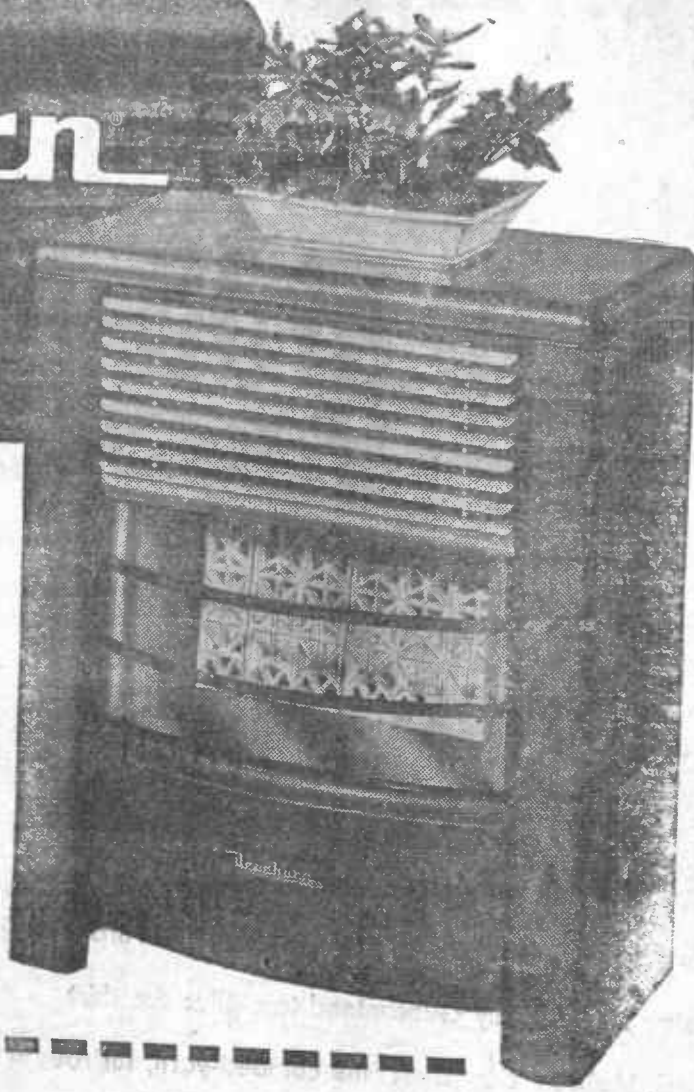

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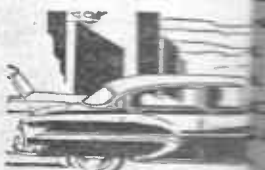

of this building at park head-
quarters, which features the Civil
War areas administered by the
National Park Service. A button
can be pushed and the Civil War
areas in any one state will be
identified by name and appro-
priately located on a map by a
small light. This display has wide
visitor appeal.

WORK LOST DUE TO ACCIDENTS

A million workers would have
to toil more than a year to make
up for the time lost in 1952 due
to occupational accidents, ac-
cording to the National Safety
Council.

"Accident Facts," the Council's
statistical yearbook just off the
press, shows that the time lost
last year as a result of work in-
juries amounted to 250,000,000
man-days. This includes not only
time lost by the employees who
were injured, but also that lost
by those who stopped work to
help the injured or out of curios-
ity.
Fifteen thousand workers were
killed and 2,000,000 injured in
1952, according to the Council,
but last year still was one of the
safest years in history for the
nation's industries.
