Unit For Iuka Is Assured; Plans Made, Enlisting Started

Adjutant General of Mississippi, and in charge of the Miss. National Guard unit, was in Iuka last night when a meeting with members of the Legion and Veterans was held to make plans for organizing a National Guard unit in Tishomingo county. The veterans voted unanimously to build a new unit. The National Guard, they use of it for their regiments.

A unit will be designed by Company C of the 198th Infantry and will be composed of 115 men—6 officers, one sergeant and 108 enlisted men.

The unit, with a full complement of 115, will create a payroll of \$40,000.00 annually and will include pay for 48 weeks and 2 weeks of summer camp.

The unit will drill only two times a week. Requirements for guardsmen are: 17 to 18 years old, U.S. citizen, and from 5 years old with no prior military service. Men over 35 may enlist in the guard if they have at least 2 years of military service.

Anyone under the draft age is not eligible for enlistment in the unit. The unit is generally meant to be a part of the draft during the war.

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Wage Increase Announced By Blue Bell

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Pearl And Main Sts. Being Readied For Paving; Other Streets in Program

Main street beginning at the Methodist church and running north is being graded in preparation for paving and Pearl street beginning at Hundley hotel is also under construction. According to reports, paving of these two streets should be completed within two weeks.

W. A. Ramsey who is doing the work says each street will receive five coats of material—a coat of primer, a coat of inch size gravel, a coat of asphalt, another coat of small gravel and a finishing coat of asphalt.

Reports have it that several blocks of streets west of Pearl street and north of Eastport are also ready for paving with petitions having been circulated and property owners agreeing to pay the necessary costs.

Appearing in this issue of The Vidette is a resolution declaring the necessity for paving Main street beginning at the railroad and running south to the corner of Pruitt's gin lot, and Meigs st. beginning at the frozen foods locker and running east to the intersection of Aberdeen street at the park. These streets will be financed entirely by the Town of Iuka and the property owners will pay a front footage assessment to pay for the paving.

Bulk of the streets that are up for paving are being done by agreements between the property owners and the contractor, the Town government being responsible only for the intersections.

Congressman Tom Abernethy Is Guest Speaker At Rotary Club Meeting

Representative Tom Abernethy was guest speaker at the Wednesday meeting of the Iuka Rotary club. The affair was a combined meeting of the Rotary and Lions clubs of Iuka and other guests from Belmont and Tishomingo.

Mr. Abernethy discussed the region as a whole as being the "blooming rose" of the nation. He says that financial, industrial and political forces in the north-eastern states were attempting to put a damper on the industrial movement that is coming southward into our region.

Mr. Abernethy also stated that the reason industry was coming south was that management could not get along with labor—always a disruption of some kind to curtail production. Workers in the Northeast, Mr. Abernethy said, were asked by union leaders to produce half as much so as to give some one else a job—thereby costing management more to produce the merchandise and hence creating a higher priced product for the consumer.

Here in North Mississippi, Mr. Abernethy stated, workers have the desire to give a day's work for a day's pay. Industrial managers are happy to have workers who are agreeable and willing to work.

The speaker further stated that bills had been introduced into the Congress to prohibit the selling of tax-free BAWI bonds as they are being done in Mississippi and other southern states to finance and encourage industry to come to the south.

Speaking concerning the TVA question, Mr. Abernethy referred to campaign promises made and published by President Eisenhower when he was a candidate last summer. The Congressman said there was a definite trend amongst political, power, and financial circles to slowly squeeze TVA out of existence.

Rotary club President P. L. Sweeney presided at the regular meeting and the Rev. W. H. Holder introduced Dr. Harry Cosby who in turn introduced the speaker.

BROOKHAVEN—Work is under way at nearby Bogue Chitto, on a building to house the rural dial switching unit which will be an important part of the rural telephone undertaking now under construction in that area by the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company.

A crowd of interested people from this city and the Bogue Chitto area were on hand for the start of work on the switching unit which will link some 300 additional rural telephone customers to the exchange here.

According to Grady Sargent, local manager for Southern Bell, the telephone to be connected to the new dial switching unit will be located in the Bogue Chitto

community; southward along Highway 51 to the county line; in territory extending eastward through the Ruth community into Lawrence county and the Verna and Jayess communities. West of Bogue Chitto, lines will reach through the Arlington and Center Point communities to the Franklin county line.

Cables leading from the exchange in Brookhaven to the location of the new switching unit are being placed and have passed the half-way point between the two places, according to telephone company representatives.

All of the telephones connected to the new rural dial switching unit will be considered part of the Brookhaven exchange. The monthly rates paid by these new

customers will entitle them to an unlimited number of calls to any other local telephone connected to the Brookhaven exchange without additional charge.

James M. Phillips, Southern Bell's Mississippi Manager, says the Bogue Chitto undertaking will cost in the neighborhood of \$175,000 and is expected to be completed late this year or early in 1954. He says the dial switching unit here will be the 18th one of its kind in Mississippi.

"The big Bogue Chitto job," Mr. Phillips stated, "is part of a record-breaking job of rural telephone expansion by which our company has increased the number of rural telephones in the State from 8,335 to over 38,000 in a little over 7 years."

Even when beef supplies are most plentiful, all good cooks are looking for thrifty and flavorful dishes to feature the lower grades and less expensive cuts of beef. One hamburger recipe that may be new to some cooks is:

Filled Hamburger Patties

Make thin patties. Before cooking, season with salt and place two patties together with filling between, pinching the edges together. For filling, use grated cheese seasoned with chili sauce or catsup and thin slices of onion. Broil or grill. The patties are easily prepared in the oven broiler or over an open fire.

Stuffed Cubed Steaks

1 pound of cubed steaks (about 3 steaks), 1 cup chopped celery and leaves, ½ onion, chopped, 2 tablespoons fat, salt and pepper to taste, little sage if desired.

To prepare the stuffing, cook celery and onions in 1 tablespoon of fat a few minutes, add bread crumbs and seasoning, and mix thoroughly. Put a mound of stuffing on each steak, roll and fasten with skewer or tie in place. Brown the stuffed steaks in remaining fat, cooking slowly and turning so that they brown evenly.

Cover and finish cooking until tender, on top of stove or in 350 degree F. oven. Takes about 1 hour. Serve with pan drippings.

Freezing Tomato Juice

Though tomatoes don't freeze successfully, tomato juice does. Here's how.

Wash, sort and remove the stem and bloom ends of vine-ripened tomatoes. Cut in quarters or eighths. Simmer 5 to 10 minutes. Strain. Pour into rigid freezer containers leaving head space and seal and freeze.

Control Weevils in Dried Peas and Beans

Whether you are saving dry peas and beans to eat during the winter, for seed next year, or for both purposes, you had better treat them for weevils. Most times peas and beans are a total loss because of weevils unless they are treated before storage.

Carbon bisulfide (high life) is a fumigant that you can obtain locally. To 1 quart of seed use 4 drops of highlife; 1 gallon of seed

Smokey Says:



Rain-fresh green foliage makes the odor of forest and stream an intoxication.

¼ to ½ teaspoonful of highlife. 4 gallons of seed (½ bushel) 1 to 2 teaspoonsful; 1 bushel of seed, 4 to 6 teaspoonsful.

Use air tight containers. Place seed in containers, pour in "highlife" and seal and cover tightly. At end of 24 to 35 hours, pour out and air seed and then store in tight containers, a closely woven sack, jar or bucket. Keep fire away.

Store in cool place. Be sure two or three small holes are punched in lid of jar, bucket or can to prevent moisture from accumulating inside the container and damaging the seed.

Other fumigants can be used, as well as pyrethrum preparation. Follow directions on the container.

Plant Cover Crops

The time for planting cover crops on cropland is at hand. A good crop of vetch, Austrian Peas or Wild Winter Peas will add organic matter and nitrogen to the land and furnish some grazing and will protect the land from erosion in the early spring, but during the Fall and Winter months, these crops offer very little protection from erosion and furnishes very little grazing because they do not usually grow much until early spring.

Oats and wheat, if planted early, and fertilized well will

make good growth in the Fall and can often be grazed in November or December. Some farmers make a practice of seeding oats and vetch, or wheat and vetch, on their cropland to control erosion, improve the land, and furnish grazing during the winter months.

The Commissioners of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District are concerned about the amount of erosion taking place on the cropland of Tishomingo County. They have discussed this matter with me, and have stated their belief that the farmers of this county will have to cultivate many acres of steep land for years to come. They do not think this is a good practice, and believe

that the farmers should make every effort to take all the steep land possible out of cultivation, but when this is done the farmers of the county will still find it necessary to cultivate some steep land.

If this be true, it is recommended that the farmers put forth every effort to keep this steep cropland covered with vegetation as many months during the year as they possibly can. Because vegetation cover offers best protection against erosion.

With cotton acreage reduction a possibility, farmers might find it very worth while to plant, and heavily fertilize, fescue and white clover on some of their better steep land, and let the fescue remain on the land a couple of years or more for grazing, soil building and erosion control, then plow this up, plant to row crops, and plant another field to fescue and white clover for the same purpose.

Grass is one of the best crops for adding organic matter to the soil. A thick sod of grass will hold the land. Now is the time to begin working that steep land every other year or 1 year out of three instead of every year.

Where flies have built up immunity to lindane, DDT and other insecticides, A. G. Bennett, Extension Entomologist, recommends using malathion.
Poultrymen, especially those who use the individual cage system, are having lots of trouble from flies. The flies are breeding in the droppings under the cages; and in houses where dropping pits are used, the flies are breeding in the pits.
Put a stop to this fly breeding through the use of a 50 percent malathion emulsifiable concentrate as a residual spray. For large poultry operations, the entomologist recommends mixing one gal-

lon of the concentrate with 50 gallons of water and adding 1 pound of sugar to attract the flies.
For small poultry houses, mix one cupful of the concentrate to three gallons of water and add one half pound of sugar. The walls and ceilings should be sprayed until the spray runs down. Droppings under the cages and dropping pits should be sprayed also.
It may be dangerous to spray droppings and litter where hens, broilers or chicks have free access to scratch and stir it. For extra safety use this material on litter droppings only where the chickens are fenced out of it.
Besides using insecticides in poultry houses to control flies, other helps in fly control are rigid sanitation, deep dry litter, adequate ventilation and a bit of "uncrowding."

By planting that fall garden now with leaf and head lettuce, mustard, turnips, beets, carrots, onions, tendergreens, radishes, parsley, spinach and collards, in addition to many others, you can have green leafy vegetables through most of the winter.

Those vegetables planted during August should be side dressed now with the equivalent of a pint jar full of nitrate of soda for each 100 feet of row.
Here is a tip for a turnip and mustard green patch that will grow off fast. Broadcast a cupful of nitrate of soda for each 100 square feet and work well into the soil. Then sow seed and cover very lightly. Water the bed for quick "come-up."

Before sending your pigs to market pick out the best gilts and save them for breed stock. When choosing the gilts for future brood stock look for long bodies with moderate thickness, smooth shoulders, clean jowls, heavy hams, straight feet and legs and a well developed udder section. These are the marks of a good gilt.
Be sure that those gilts you save back are big, thrifty gilts from the best litters. Keep these gilts out of the fattening lots. Keep them on good legume pastures and feed them a 15 percent protein ration. This way they will cost less and make good prospects as brood sows.

Your life and the lives of others are seriously threatened if you use a farm trailer or wagon on the highway at night without adequate safety reflector warning at the rear. A reflector on the tail end is required in Mississippi. But the possible tragic consequences of not providing sufficient warnings are so serious that you'll want to check and make certain that you and others

are well protected.
With cotton being taken to the gins at all hours, and pickers sometimes being transported after dark, danger involving farm vehicles on the highways is at its worst.
One way to provide extra protection, in addition to the required reflector, is the generous use of inexpensive reflective tape. Apply strips of this on the rear of the trailer or wagon, especially across the bottom and up the sides.

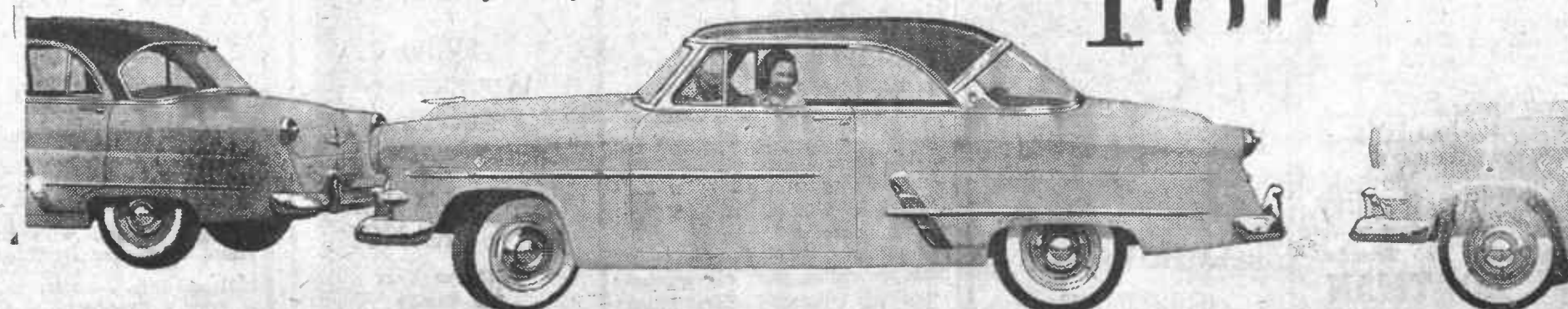

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Iuka met in recess on this the 11th day of September, 1953 at the Mayor's office of said town at 7:30 o'clock p.m. with the following members present.

Mayor: John H. Allen, Aldermen: N. C. Pruitt, E. D. Davis, Joe W. Thompson, W. F. Dugger and N. L. Phillips.

And among other business the following was transacted. After discussing a petition, which was filed before the Board relative to paving certain streets in the town of Iuka, E. D. Davis made the following motion:

"I move that the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Iuka do hereby declare that it is necessary to hard-surface the following streets in the town of Iuka, Mississippi and to levy a special assessment against each abutting land owner in a sum not to exceed \$2.00 per lineal foot on the following described property in said town:

Beginning on the South side of the Southern Railroad on Main Street and running thence South with Main Street, and crossing Highway No. 72 and running with Main Street to the Southwest corner of the Pruitt Gin Lot on said Main Street.

Also, beginning at the North-west corner of the Frozen Foods Plant on Meigs Street and running thence with Meigs Street to where Meigs Street intersects the West line of Aberdeen Street, the above described property being in the town of Iuka, Mississippi.

I further move that since a petition has been filed with the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Iuka, signed by a majority of the abutting land owners of the above described property that this resolution be declared a necessity in the paving or black-topping the above named streets and that a copy of this resolution be published in the Vidette, a newspaper having general circulation in the town of Iuka, Mississippi for once each week for three (3) successive publications and that the Board of Mayor and Aldermen shall meet on the 1st day of October, 1953 at 7:30 o'clock p.m. in the Mayor's office of said town for the purpose of hearing any objections to this resolution. If no objections are made to this resolution, the Board will issue negotiable notes to exceed the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) with interest thereon not to exceed six percent (6%) per annum for a period not to exceed ten (10) years and will levy a special assessment against all abutting land owners in a sum not to exceed Two Dollars (\$2.00) per lineal foot for the purpose of paying said notes."

And after full discussion, Aldermen N. C. Pruitt second said motion and the following vote was taken.

Those voting against said motion: None.

A majority having voted in favor of said resolution the same is hereby adopted this 11th day of September, 1953.

The Christian Line
Lesson for Sept. 20, 1953

EVERYBODY knows the phrase, "party line," meaning a kind of ideas, arguments, plans and policies which are approved by a central authority. We hear the phrase most often in Communist connections; but there are also such things as the Republican line, or the Democratic line, and many others. Is there such a thing as the Christian line? In particular, is there a Christian line of behavior, a Christian way of life which is distinct, an ideal for all Christians everywhere? Or is Christian living a more or less do-as-you-please affair?

Christianity Is Respectable

The letter to Titus in the New Testament comes right to this point. Titus was a

fairly young missionary in a very tough area, the island of Crete. Titus may have wished he were in an easier field. "Liars, evil beasts, lazy gluttons" — that was the reputation of Cretans.

Even when such Dr. Foreman people become Christians there is a lot they have to learn. They do not become complete saints overnight. (Did you?) Paul, writing to his young former assistant Titus, advises him, as an advisor of new Christians, what line to take in teaching and preaching to these unpromising Cretan converts. Through Titus the Apostle speaks to parents, ministers, Sunday school teachers, of today. The first thing the modern reader notices is that the Christian line sounds "respectable," like advice from Polonius or Lord Chesterfield. Old men should be temperate, orthodox; old women ought not to gossip; young women should love their husbands and children; young men must exercise self-control; employees (slaves, in Titus' parish) must be honest and

give satisfaction to their employers. Citizens must be law-abiding. Everybody should have a decent job and save his money for special needs. Really, the reader may ask, what is so special about all this? Is the Christian line just to be a "decent citizen?" Well, of course that is a part of it. Christianity is certainly not DISrespectability!

Propriety Without Pride

So the Christian line does not go off in some other direction than respectability; but it is by no means the same thing. There are two vital points in which the Christian's way of life is distinctly unique. One is the Christian's attitude to his own respectable conduct. He must never do good in order to show off, neither to man nor to God. He must never be good or do good simply in order to get good in return. He must never think of his own good deeds as a kind of coin by which he pays his way into heaven. Years before Jesus was telling his disciples that they must live above the level of the Pharisees, this demand must have surprised and puzzled his listeners. How could anybody on earth be more respectable than a Pharisee? Well, nobody could. What Jesus was pleading for was (in part) just the difference in attitude toward one's own goodness. The Pharisee was proud of being good; he thought God owed him something. He wanted merit-badges; Jesus called for humility. The Christian's goodness is a response to God, not a demand on God. It is an expression of what we owe to God.

Mercy and Renewal

This brings us to the other point at which the Christian line is on a different plane from ordinary respectability. It is the effect of a new birth inside. There is great difference between lifting ourselves by our own efforts and being lifted by the Holy Spirit, between goodness home-made and heaven-made. Being respectable enough for a good name in society is some distance short of growing into the likeness of Christ. There is an immense gap between respectability like a topcoat, and the goodness which is in the blood, beating through a changed heart. There is a clear difference between the respectability of a man who looks no further ahead than his own obituary, and the deep-reaching spiritual renewal of the man who lives as an "heir in hope of eternal life."

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Methodist women. For some these courses open doors to new worlds, stretch the mind and imagination, and enlarge the outreaches of the heart.

Listing the study courses for this year in the suggested order—one for each quarter beginning with September—the first one is the courses on "The Life and Task of the Church Around the World" (Text: "That the World May Know" by Charles W. Ransom.) Writing with the conviction that the world is one and the Christian task indivisible, the author of the text seeks to interpret the life and task of the church in the world in a manner suitable for general use in churches here. The central theme is that the church exists "That The World May Know" Jesus Christ. "The mission of the church to the world is not only to proclaim the hope of the gospel, but to demonstrate in its own life a universality that transcends division and a unity in Christ that offers healing to a broken world," says the writer.

A study of Jeremiah is the spiritual life course offered this year. It is offered as an aid to growth in practical Christian living with a three-fold purpose: To increase a knowledge of the Bible and deepen the appreciation of its truths, to deepen the appreciation of Jeremiah as a spokesman of God with a timeless message, and to discover ways by which one can come to know the will of God and how to make His will effective in personal living and in the community. The text is "The Prophet Jeremiah" by Harold C. Case.

The study of Spanish Americans (Text: "Within These Borders" by John R. Scottford) comes next. Something of Spanish culture and its contributions to life in the United States, a better understanding of Spanish American brothers and a glimpse of the Christian work in evangelism and education and social work may be gained through this study.

author of the text, "Alcohol and Christian Responsibility," for the Christian social Relations course. Through this study one may learn about alcohol and people, the truth about ethyl, social consequences and what may be done about the question, and the Christian's responsibility.

In addition a church-wide course is offered—Heritage of Human Destiny. This is a joint course to be taken with the whole church under the direction of the pastor. Supplementary books and materials are suggested for each course along with a study guide, and helpful material may be found in the "Methodist Woman" for the courses. Also the regular monthly program for 1953-1954, "A Shower Went Forth," can be easily arranged to correlate with the study program each quarter—all making for a full and interesting study program for the year.

It is good to study together, and to encourage a full study of these courses a plan of special recognitions has been set up. All socialists are urged to strive for jurisdiction recognition, the highest of these, which calls for meeting the requirements listed in the Missionary Education and Service handbook.

Business Activity For Iuka

Business activity data from four cities in the Corinth district were indicative of an increase of about 14 per cent over last July but showed a drop of about 2 per cent from the June 1953 level, according to the current issue of

the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College.

In the city of Corinth July 1953 business activity ran 18 per cent above that for the same month 1952 but fell 2 per cent under that for June 1953. Bank debits exceeded June 1953 by 7 per cent and July 1952 by 31 per cent. Money order sales fell 6 per cent under June and 4 per cent below July 1952. Postal receipts were 10 per cent in excess of July 1952 but 3 per cent under June 1953. Telephones were more numerous on July 31 than for either of the comparison periods. The increases were 8 per cent over July 1952 and 2 per cent over June 1953.

Three other cities reported incomplete data. Money order sales were up when compared with July 1952 in Iuka by 16 per cent, but down in Ripley by 7.3 per cent. Each of these cities reported decreases in money order sales when compared with June 1953. Iuka had a 10 per cent decrease in postal receipts when compared with July 1952 and 24 per cent when compared with June 1953, while Ripley showed a 21 per cent increase for the former comparison and a 6 per cent decrease for the latter.

Telephones in service were more numerous at the end of July 1953 than a year earlier in Booneville and Ripley, but down by 1 per cent in Iuka. Ripley reported a 2 per cent increase over June 1953, while Booneville and Iuka had losses of about .5 per cent each.
