Mississippi's Present School System

(Editor's Note: Presented here is the second in a series of articles by Superintendent H. L. Shook propounding the existing school system in Mississippi and proposed changes toward equalization of schools for the two races.)

In addition to a growing conviction that something should be done to improve condition of Negro schools in Mississippi, it appears that a powerful motivation for a reorganization of the State school system is a series of cases now pending before the Supreme Court of the United States. Here the doctrine of "separate but equal" school facilities and opportunities is under attack, and one seeks to show that the principle of segregation in the public schools is in violation of the Fourteenth Amendment.

These cases were argued before the Supreme Court late in 1952, but for some reason no decision was reached and reargument was set for the Fall term in 1953. The final outcome is anybody's guess, but the adverse trend of the Court's decisions in recent years in similar cases could be considered a straw in the wind. It seems obvious that in Mississippi neither race wants to see the wall of segregation torn away. It seems clear, also, that if there is to be any alternative to the prospect of having both races together in the same schools, it must be full equalization in all the essentials of the education program. This is what the proposals of the Recess Education Committee are designed to do.

This Committee, created by the Legislature in the 1952 session, faced a tremendous task in the formation of a plan to bring equal opportunities to all the children of the State. It is apparent that inequalities exist not only between the races, but also within each race in the different sections of the state. The Committee could not ignore Mississippi's unenviable position of being at the bottom of the list of Southern States in the amount of daily expenditure per pupil, in the average value of school property per pupil, and in the per cent of personal income spent for education. It could not escape the significance of the fact that Mississippi leads in the number of school districts and in one-room, one-teacher schools. It was faced with the fact that in 1951-52

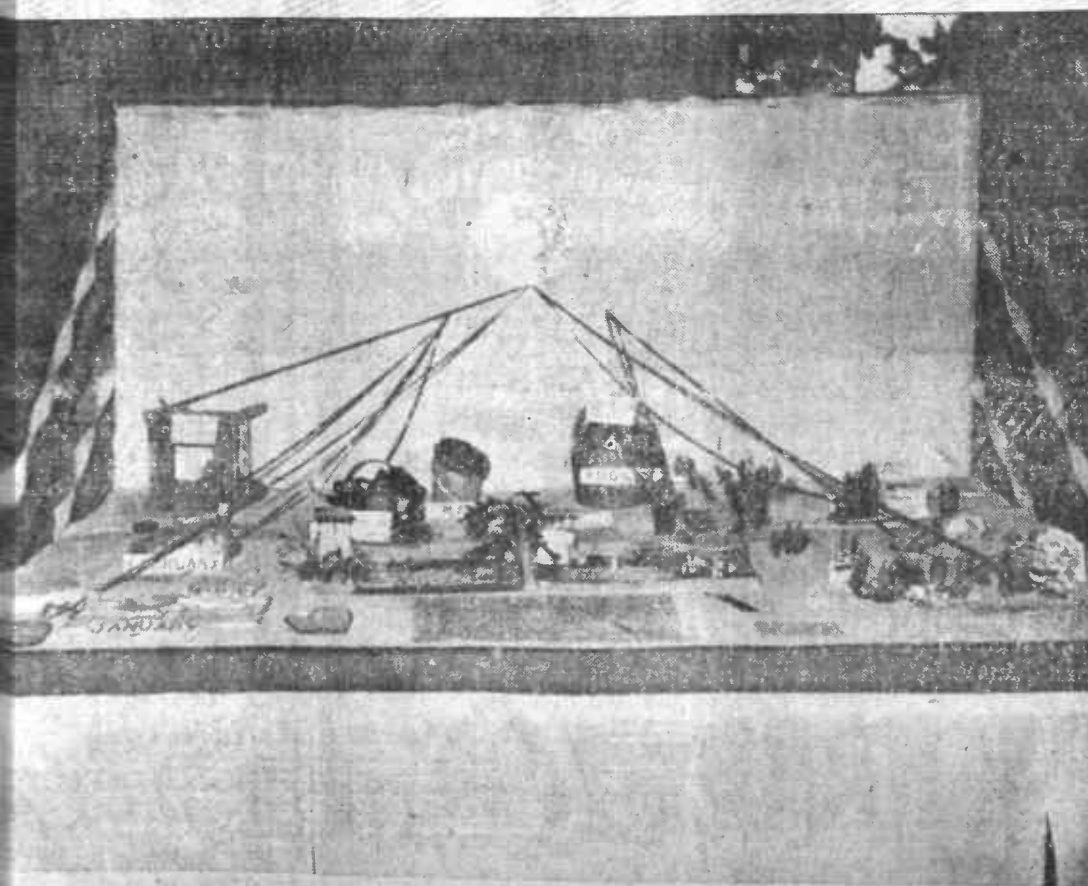
County Booth Is 2nd Place Winner At Tri-State Fair

Proper Use Of Social Security Cards Important

"The importance of properly

using one's social security card can hardly be overstressed, Mr. Ware Foster, manager of the Decatur Social Security Administration office, said.

"The omission of even a single wage report could conceivably lead to the loss of thousands of dollars in old-age and survivors insurance benefits to the family of a worker who died," he explained.

"Social security records, which are kept by name and number, not only are used to determine how much will be paid, but whether benefits can be paid at all. Consequently, part-time workers or those whose work is irregular may barely meet the minimum requirements even when all wages are properly recorded. Omission of one or two wage items could easily result in ineligibility," Mr. Foster said.

Every worker can guard against this happening by making sure that his social security number has been copied correctly into his employer's records. Lost cards can be replaced easily by the local office on request. Application forms to get either new or duplicate social security cards can be obtained from any social security office, and post office or State employment office. The social security office will also provide a free post card form to be used in getting a statement of wages credited to the worker's social security account.

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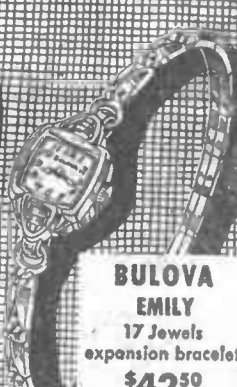
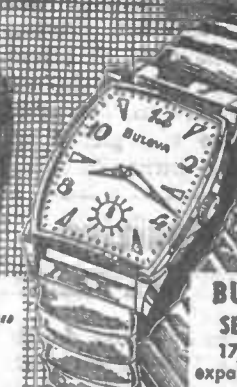

Meat Shrinkage Myth Hit By Impartial Authorities

At present there is a great deal of misunderstanding and misinformation regarding meat shrinkage in modern cookery, and many conflicting and unsubstantiated claims have created widespread public confusion.

Some homemakers are almost afraid to cook a roast for fear a hefty 6-pound beef will curl up and completely disappear in her oven, after reading some of the claims and accusations now being printed under the guise of fact.

Impartial experts and research groups throughout the nation agree that regardless of whether you prefer gas or electric cookery, meat shrinkage is not caused by the type of fuel you use, but by the heat itself. The higher the temperature used in roasting meats, the more shrinkage you will have—whether you use gas, electricity, wood, charcoal or \$50 war bonds for fuel.

The National Livestock and Meat Board, an unbiased and impartial authority on meat cookery, has this to say about meat shrinkage in a public statement recently issued.

"No meat cookery research has been conducted which proves that cooking with one kind of fuel is superior to cooking with another. When doing meat cookery research, both types of competitive

ranges were used. The factors felt to have the greatest influence on shrinkage and palatability are the temperature at which the meat is cooked, the length of cooking time and the grade of meat itself."

Among many similar statements from meat packers, restaurant groups and others, the one recently received from Mary Gifford, Director of the Consumers Service Department of Armour and Company, Chicago, is significant. She writes:

"My work with shrinkage in meat cookery goes back some 18 years, starting with considerable technical work done in connection with the North Dakota Experimental Station on the roasting of beef and veal. In our test kitchen here in Chicago, we have worked on this subject for some 13 years but in a less concentrated way. We use both types of competitive ranges and make positively no difference in the directions for their use in roasting. Nor do we make any statements regarding differences in shrinkage, because we have found no significant difference."

In addition, the National Bureau of Standards has run tests and has reached the same conclusions, as has the University of Chicago, the University of Missouri and other unbiased and impartial groups concerned with fact only.

World Planning

Lesson for October 4, 1953

THE man who invented the word "Utopia" knew what he was doing. Sir Thomas More first used the name as the title of a book in which he described the island of Utopia, a place where everything is perfect—climate, laws, schools, people, everything. But Sir Thomas was having his little joke, for "Utopia" comes from two Greek words meaning No Place. He knew there is no real place in this world where everything is perfect; being a saint and a sensible man he suspected there never would be. No Christian has ever expected to see a perfect world this side of heaven.

Why Christians Plan

Nevertheless, Sir Thomas More lived an active life, working hard to make the England of his day more like the Utopia of his dreams—or rather, more like the heaven of which Utopia might have been a suburb. For he was a Christian, and Christians, at their best, do plan for a better world. Christians at their worst do not. At their worst, Christians either accept the world as it is and imitate it, or even defend it against all critics; or they run away from it, shutting themselves away from it, leaving it to dirt, disease and the devil. (It might be asked, are such persons Christian at all? That is another question.) Almost all Christians plan on a small scale. Most of us live in a rather small world, and in the tiny world of our daily life we like to make plans that are Christian. In the home, for example: an unplanned home, higgledy-piggledy, with everything in a continual uproar, is not the kind of home we want to live in. Christian young people plan to make their marriage and their home as near like heaven as they can—and that takes planning and hard work too.

Are we of today better Christians than our ancestors were? John Baillie asks the question in his "The Belief in Progress." His answer is No, if you mean by the question: Are Christians today more devoted, more saintly, than eight or eighteen centuries ago? If we have advanced beyond our forefathers, it is not in being better men personally. But John Baillie thinks, and it is a thought worth pondering, that we can and sometimes do have a wider view of the area of Christian action. Let us ask the question: Are we cleaner than our ancestors were? No, if you mean devotion to the ideal of "cleanliness next to Godliness." But while the citizen of 1800 was personally as clean as the soap of those days would permit, his kitchen and his streets and his water supply were not clean by our standards. Now planning for cleanliness includes such things as mosquito extermination and bonds for a sewer system. So it is with Christian planning. If you want to keep your home Christian you will need to do some thinking about all those wider circles that affect the home; schools, government, business life, war and peace.

Widening Circles

Suppose We Don't Plan?
A Christian who wants a Christian home but will not join nor work in his local P.T.A. is missing one of his best chances to work toward the home he wants. If you want a Christian home and take no interest in politics, you may by your very neglect be turning over the control of your community to crooks and exposing your children to the kind of community that crooks operate. Dried Winter Arrangements

With most of the bright, fresh
flowers soon to be frost casualties,
we will all be looking for a bit
of color and greenery from other
sources.

Some suggested ones include
corn shucks dried with clothing
dye and arranged into rosettes
that resemble flowers. Pine cones
cut across the cone also make
interesting rosettes. A small
amount of paint or glitter will
dress them up.

Dried seed pods, as okra, daisy
and any number of weeds, are
good for combining with other
materials. Dead twigs are good
for forming lines and curves in
designs.

As you prepare your arrange-
ment, never use a crystal vase
for a dried arrangement. Instead,
use pottery or some form of
metal. And when you use paint
to add color, use only a small
amount.

Hints On Bread

To aid in keeping bread moist,
place brown sugar or marsh-
mallows in the breadbox.

To reheat rolls or biscuits
without lighting the oven, place
them in the top of a double
boiler and heat over actively
boiling water for about 15 min-
utes.

To remove a burned crust from
bread quickly and easily, rub the
loaf with a vegetable grater.

To give muffins a nutty de-
lightful flavor, try dropping a
teaspoon of peanut butter into
each muffin pan before the bat-
ter is added.

County Agent News

Before selling your cotton find
out what the loan price is. Un-
less you can get as much or more
money selling your cotton, put
it in the loan.

Here is how farmers can get
their cotton in the loan—have
the cotton sampled at the gin as
soon as it is weighed. Your gin-
ner will send the sample to the
nearest Smith Doney Free Clas-
sing Office. In a few days you
will receive a green card giving
the grade, staple and prepara-

tion of your cotton. Take this
green card with you to the loan
office to find out the value of
your cotton. Then is the time to
see what you can get for it on
the market. Unless this is above
loan value, it will pay you to put
your cotton in the loan. For de-
tails see your county agent.

Remember, knowing the value
of your cotton before you sell
may save you from \$2.50 to \$5.00
a bale.

National Fire Prevention Week
begins October 4th. It will be a
good time for you to take stock
around your farm and home to
see what fire hazards you can
remove. Here are some of the
jobs you can do to help prevent
fire:

1. Never use gasoline or kero-
sene (coal oil) or any other in-
flammable liquid to start fires
in stoves, ranges or fireplaces.

2. Make frequent examinations
of stored hay to prevent heating
and spontaneous combustion.
Never store wet hay in barns.
Repair roof and walls to prevent
leaks in the barn.

3. Replace frayed or worn wir-
ing. Replace or repair defective
electrical appliances.

4. Build fire lanes around
pastures and woods—especially
between roads and pastures or
woods, and between woods and
pastures.

5. Remove rubbish regularly
from the house, cellar, attic and
closets. Do not let oily rags ac-
cumulate. Burn out of doors on
still, damp days—preferable after
4 p.m.

Sweetpotatoes can be harvested
for early market as soon as the
roots reach marketable size.
However, sweetpotatoes for stor-
age and for sale to canning plants
should be allowed to reach their
maximum yield.

The crop should be harvested
before the first killing frost or
freeze. Yellowing of the vines is
a good sign that the sweetpotato-
es have stopped growing.

Sweetpotatoes dug during warm
fair weather when the soil is
dry will be easier to cure, store
and grade for market.

Care should be taken when
digging not to cut or bruise the
potatoes. The best digger imple-
ment is a large turning plow—
either mule or tractor drawn,
with a rolling coultter on the
beam to cut the vines.

Handle sweetpotatoes carefully
and as little as possible from the
time they are dug until they are
marketed. Do not leave them on
top of the ground more than one
hour after they are dug out—
never leave them out overnight.

Do not throw the sweetpotatoes
into piles. They should be at least
partially graded as they are
picked up and then placed in
hampers.

All fields should be grazed out
following hay, corn or cotton
harvest. In this way, farmers can
get the benefit from extra graz-
ing and at the same time save
their permanent pasture areas
from tramping.

October is the month for plant-
ing clovers and legumes. It is
also the time to plant clover or
legume areas with a grass or
cereal for late fall and winter
grazing. Fescue areas should be
mineralized and not grazed un-
til the fescue is six to ten inches
tall.

Do not fertilize lespedeza—
grass areas this month. Wait until
next spring to do this. Fertilize
now, the areas would be too fav-
orable for clover to come in and
push out the lespedeza.

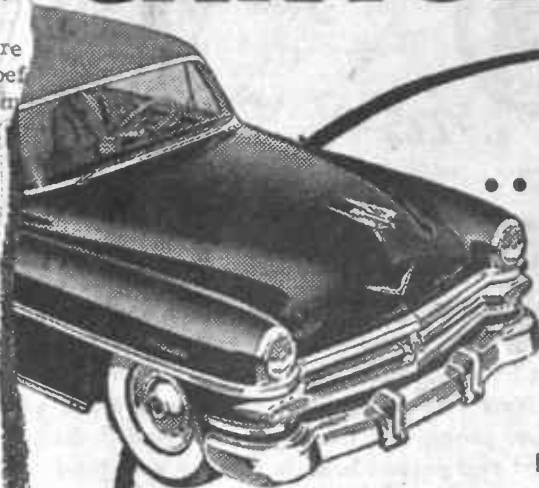
