Attending from Tishomingo County Tuberculosis Association was Miss Carolyn Crawford. The Christmas Seal Sale Campaign will be sponsored again this year by the Lucy Rowe Study Club with Miss Crawford as chairman.

Mr. Walter James, Consultant, Seal Sale Division of the National Tuberculosis Association, discussed the mechanics and techniques of the Seal Sale and introduced many new ideas which were beneficial to the tuberculosis workers of Mississippi. He was assisted by Mr. Judson Allred, Executive Secretary, Mississippi Tuberculosis Association, and Miss Nancy Beasley, Field Representative.

Mrs. Vann K. Rogers, of Tupelo, member of the Board of Directors of the Mississippi Tuberculosis Association, urged the members of the county association to make an extra effort during the campaign to raise sufficient funds to insure at least a minimum tuberculosis program of tuberculosis control for their county.

The Seal Sale, which will be conducted by mail throughout the county from November 16 through December, is the only source of funds for the tuberculosis prevention and control activities of the local association. The local campaign will be part of the 47th annual Christmas Seal Sale to be held throughout the county by the 3,000 voluntary associations affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Association.

Former Citizen To Show Film At Methodist Church

Restoration Of Independence Hall Club Project

The four clubs of Iuka have begun their General Federation project for the year which is the restoration of Independence Hall. Their objectives are as follows:

1. To conduct an educational campaign so that every man, woman and child may: (a) Better appreciate the struggles of our forefathers during the establishment of our Democracy in a Republic. (b) Become cognizant of the great benefits derived under our Constitutional form of government.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF MAYOR AND ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI DECLARING THE NECESSITY OF PAVING OR HARD SURFACING CERTAIN STREETS IN SAID MUNICIPALITY.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Iuka met in regular session on this 6th day of October, 1953, at the mayor's office of said town at 7:30 o'clock p.m. with the following members present.

Mayor: John H. Allen, Aldermen: N. C. Pruitt, E. D. Davis, Joe W. Thompson, W. F. Dugger and N. L. Phillips.

And among other business the following was transacted. After discussion a petition, which was filed before the Board relative to paving certain streets in the town of Iuka, E. D. Davis made the following motion:

"I move that the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Iuka do hereby declare that it is necessary to hard-surface the following streets in the town of Iuka, Mississippi and to levy a special assessment against each abutting land owner in a sum not to exceed \$2.00 per lineal foot on the following described property in said town:

Beginning at the bridge across Indian creek at the Southeast corner of Mineral Springs park and running East 800 feet.

Also Eastport street beginning at Elmo Davis feed store and running East approximately 2100 feet to the intersection of Gaines alley, the above described property being in the town of Iuka, Mississippi.

I further move that since petitions have been filed with the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the town of Iuka, signed by a majority of the abutting land owners of the above described property that this resolution be declared a necessity in the paving or black-topping the above named streets and that a copy of this resolution be published in the Vidette, a newspaper having general circulation in the town of Iuka, Mississippi for once each week for three (3) successive publications and that the Board of Mayor and Aldermen shall meet on or after the 22nd of October, 1953 at 7:30 o'clock

p.m. in the Mayor's office of said town for the purpose of hearing any objections to this resolution. If no objections are made to this resolution, the Board will issue negotiable notes not to exceed the sum of Five Thousand, Eight Hundred (5,800.00) with interest thereon not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum for a period not to exceed ten (10) years and will levy a special assessment against all abutting land owners in a sum not to exceed Two Dollars (\$2.00) per lineal foot for the purpose of paying said notes."

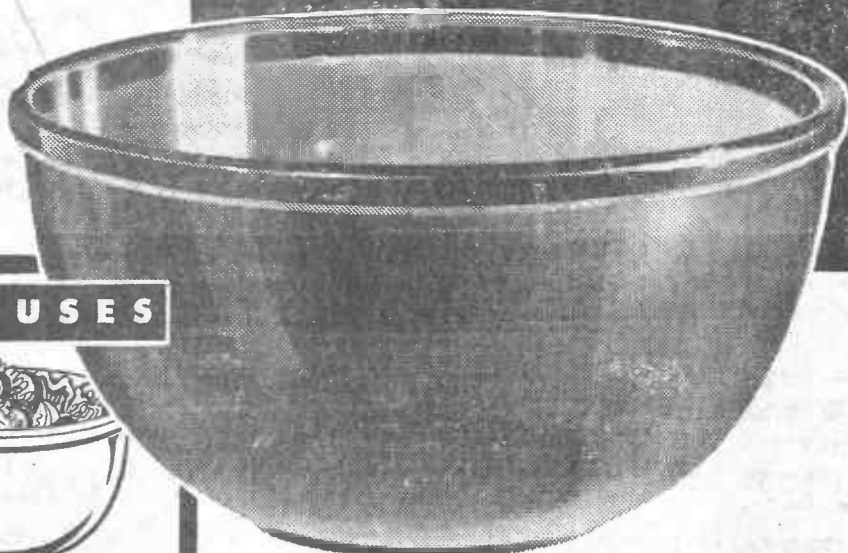

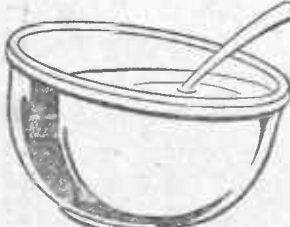

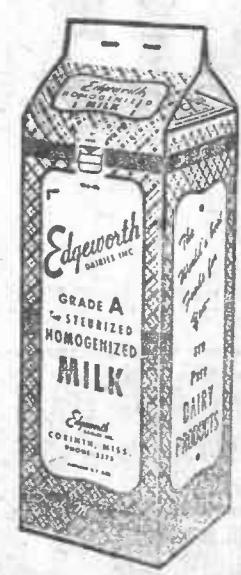
