Ira B. Lykes Is Guest Of Rotary Club

Ira B. Lykes, superintendent
of Shiloh National park, was
guest speaker of the Iuka Ro-
tary club Wednesday at the reg-
ular luncheon meeting.
Mr. Lykes spoke on national
parks, their origination and ser-
vice. He said the service was
created in 1916 when President
Woodrow Wilson signed a bill
setting aside funds and designat-
ing certain lands for parks. The
speaker said three things were
required to make good parks:
An act of God, an act of Congress
and the help of the people.
In 1952 forty-two million peo-
ple visited national parks in this
country and according to the
speaker, each visitor spent on
his way to the park, while there
and on his return, an average of
\$10.04.
Shiloh National park had over
300,000 visitors last year and up
to now this year is above 1952.
Rotary President P. L. Sween-
ey presided over the meeting. A
number of out-of-town Rotarians
were guests of the club.

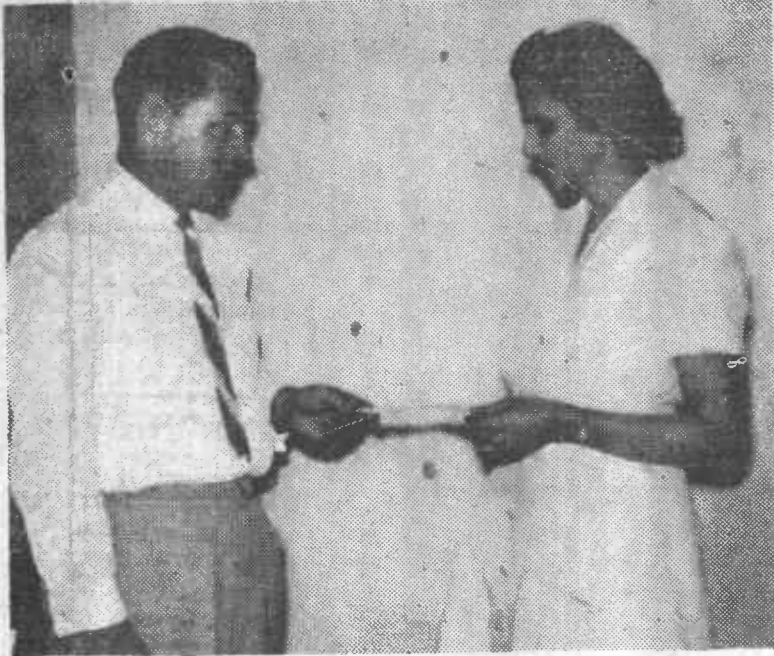
3c Stamp To Be In Commemoration Of FFA Of America

A three-cent postage stamp to
be issued this fall in commemora-
tion of the 25th anniversary of
the Future Farmers of America
has been printed. The FFA com-
memorative stamp will be first
placed on sale at Kansas City,
Missouri, October 13, during the
first full day of the annual Na-
tional FFA Convention.
Postmaster General Arthur E.
Summerfield has announced that
110 million of the FFA stamps
will go on sale. The design of
the stamp depicts a typical farm
scene with rolling hills in the
background. Featured in the
central foreground is a Future
Farmer, standing beneath a tree,
viewing the scene before him.
Wording on the flowing ribbon
across the bottom of the stamp
calls attention to the 25th an-
niversary of FFA. The color of
the stamp is blue.
The stamp will be available in
post offices outside Kansas City
on October 14.
Eight Mississippi FFA members
making two teams have been
certified to compete in the na-
tional judging contests to be held
in Waterloo, Iowa, October 6 and
7, in connection with the Dairy
Cattle Congress.
Three other Mississippi FFA
judging teams have been certi-
fied to compete in the National
Meats, Poultry, and Livestock
Judging to be held in Kansas
City, Missouri, October 14 and
15 during the National FFA Con-
vention.
President Dwight D. Eisen-
hower heads the list of distin-
guished speakers to address an
expected total of 10,000 or more
Future Farmers from all sections
of the United States, Hawaii, and
Puerto Rico. The three cabinet
members that will address the
convention are: Postmaster Gen-
eral Arthur Summerfield, Sec-
retary of Agriculture Ezra Taft
Benson and Mrs. Oveta Culp
Hobby, Secretary of the Depart-
ment of Health, Education, and
Welfare. The President will speak
on the night of October 15.

Steve Reis, Lexington, are the
three Mississippi FFA members

Highway Patrol To Enforce Directional Signals And Guttered Muffler Laws

Colonel T. B. Birdsong, Com-
missioner of Public Safety, stated
today, "Enforcement of direc-
tional signals on trucks and buses
and guttered mufflers on all ve-
hicles will begin 1 November,
1953. Since 29 July, 1953, we
have been advising the drivers
and owners through all Public
Information Media. On 1 Octo-
ber, '53 our Patrolmen began
warning drivers personally."
The Law on directional signals
is as follows:
Section 8192. (a) No person
shall turn a vehicle from a di-
rect course upon a highway un-
less and until such movement
can be made with reasonable
safety and then only after giving
a clearly audible signal by sound-
ing the horn if any pedestrian
may be affected by such move-
ment or after giving an appro-
priate signal in the manner here-
inafter provided in the event any
other vehicle may be affected by
such movement.
(b) A signal of intention to
turn right or left shall be given
continuously for a reasonable
distance before turning.
(c) No person shall stop or sud-
denly decrease the speed of a
vehicle without first giving an
appropriate signal in the man-
ner provided hereinafter to the
driver of any vehicle immediately
to the rear when there is oppor-
tunity to give such a signal.
Signals by hand and arm or
signal device.
Section 8193. The signal herein
required shall be given either
by means of the hand and arm
or by a signal lamp or signal de-
vice of a type approved by the
department, but when a vehicle
is so constructed or loaded that
a hand and arm signal would
not be visible both to the front
and rear of such vehicle then
said signals must be given by
such a lamp or device.
Section 8238. (c) Under Section
8238 is entitled, "Signal Lamps".
Whenever a motor vehicle is
equipped with a signal lamp to
comply with the provisions of
Section 8193, Code of 1942, the
signal lamp shall be so construct-
ed and located on the vehicle as
to give a signal which shall be
plainly visible in normal sunlight
from a distance of one hundred
(100) feet to the rear of the ve-
hicle but shall not project a glar-
ing or dazzling light."
The Law on guttered mufflers
is as follows:
"Mufflers, prevention of noise.
Section 8251. Every motor ve-
hicle shall at all times be equip-
ped with a muffler in good work-
ing order and in constant opera-
tion to prevent excessive or un-
usual noise and annoying smoke
and no person shall use a muf-
fler cutout, bypass or similar de-
vice upon a motor vehicle on a
highway."
Birdsong further stated, "This
is not a drive, but a part of the
Patrol's continued stepped up
enforcement; and even though
we will endeavor to get direc-
tional signals on all vehicles
which need them, and also en-
deavor to rid our Highways of
the vehicles (cars and trucks)
with guttered mufflers, we will
continue to place emphasis on
the hazardous moving violations,
namely, the speeder, the drink-
ing driver, the reckless driver.
Three hundred thirty-three (333)
persons have been killed in the
past nine months on Mississippi
streets and highways."
Birdsong went on to say, "while
the Patrol is 50 cars short of the
minimum needed to begin to do
a job, each man on the Highway
Patrol will continue to work
night and day endeavoring to
stop this terrible amount of
death and destruction on the
highways. We need the help of
every citizen of Mississippi. You
can do this by learning and obey-
ing all traffic laws. Will you do
it?"

Those blankets and comforters now going into use as the nights get colder may have to be laundered or cleaned next spring, just because the top edge is soiled.

An easy way to protect this top, which gets the most wear from handling as well as soil from use, is to baste a wide piece of cloth over the edge. The cloth will catch the soil, can easily be removed and washed and thus may save you a big laundering job or the expense of cleaning.

It may also make your bed covers last longer and can save replacing worn binding on blankets.

If sheets are long enough to fold over the blankets or comforters, they also offer some protection.

Peeling Tomatoes

Three ways to peel tomatoes are: Stroke the skin with the back of a knife until it is loosened. Or, dip the tomato into hot water one or two minutes, then quickly into cold water. The third way is to run the tip of a fork into the tomatoes and rotate it over flames until the skin wrinkles slightly.

Waxing Furniture

Wax acts as a protection for furniture and adds to the beauty and sheen of a good finish.

To wax furniture, apply a thin coat of paste or liquid polishing wax. Dry 30 minutes and polish with a soft cloth until wax

is gone and surface is stain smooth.

Two or three coats are better than one heavy coat. Waxed furniture needs dusting but does not need furniture polish. Regular dusting adds to sheen. It is

the rubbing that does it.

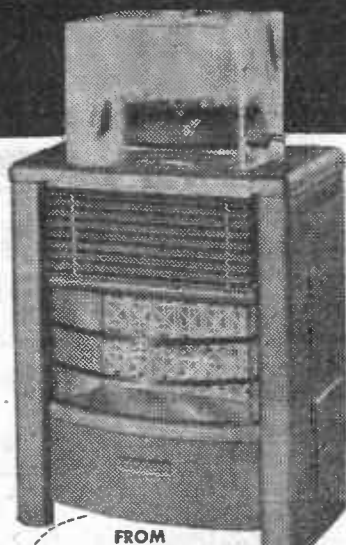

On eight days in September the temperature was 90 degrees or above, and on eighteen days the temperature was 90 degrees or above. The lowest maximum temperature was 74 degrees on September 24.

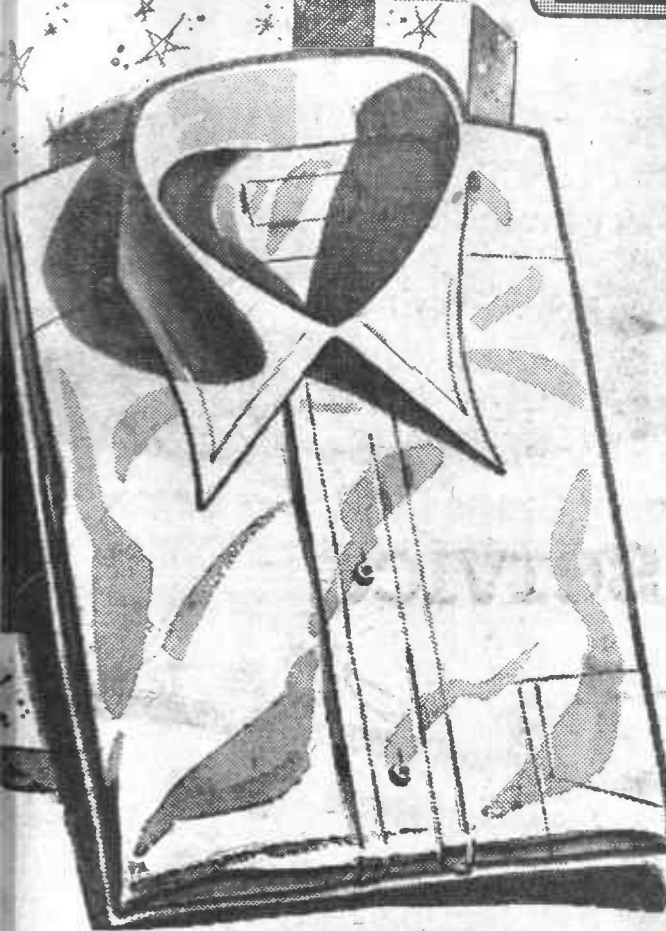

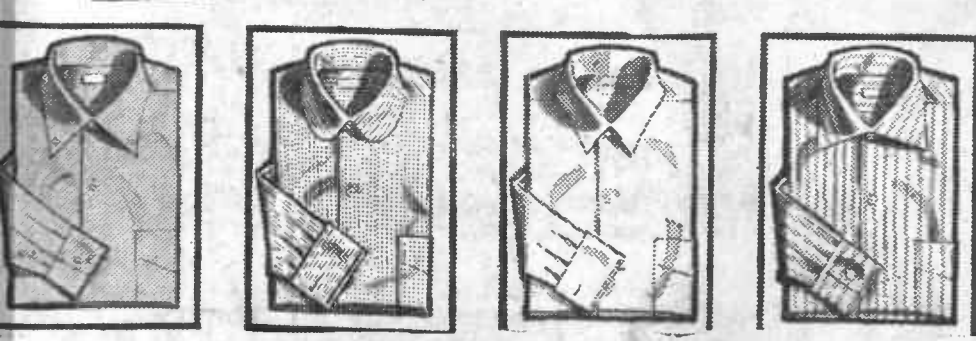

FIVE SOUTHERN STATES ACT TO ENCOURAGE OIL, GAS INDUSTRY

JACKSON, MISS.—(Special)—The southern states of Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Tennessee and Florida have acted to encourage exploration for and development of their oil and natural gas resources, a survey of the state capitols reveals.

Passage this week by the Alabama Legislature of a measure allowing percentage depletion as a deduction for state income tax purposes was hailed by oilmen as a great incentive to increase their efforts to find more oil and gas in Alabama.

The new Alabama law allows anyone deriving income from oil and gas production—landowner, royalty owner and producer—to deduct 27 1/2 per cent of such income when computing his state income taxes. Its purpose is to allow producers some credit for the using-up of capital assets which cannot be replaced, as well as to cushion to some degree the large financial risks borne by men and companies engaged in the search for oil and gas.

With the exception of Mississippi, all the producing states in this area which levy an income tax allow percentage depletion as a deduction. The federal income tax laws also recognize this deduction.

Enactment of this law by votes of 70 to seven in the Alabama House and 29 to 0 in the Senate pointed up the efforts to encourage oilmen to establish or expand oil and gas production in these southern states.

Early this year the Arkansas Legislature soundly defeated an attempt to increase that state's "severance" or production taxes on oil and gas. The current severance tax rate in both Arkansas and Alabama is four per cent of value.

Tennessee, Georgia and Florida state governments have set aside cash bonuses to be paid for the first commercial oil or gas well established in those states. A major oil company was awarded \$50,000 when Florida entered the producing column, and Tennessee and Georgia still have cash bonuses to the intersection of Gaines

ties of \$50,000 and \$100,000 waiting for the first oil or gas discovery.

E. D. Kenna, spokesman for the Mississippi-Alabama Division, Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, said that these states' action indicates an attitude of welcome to the oil and gas industry. He praised the vision of the legislators who foresaw the widespread economic benefits oil and gas development would bring to the states.

Kenna pointed out that in Mississippi alone, the oil and gas industry has spent well over a billion dollars raising this state to a national rank of ninth in oil production and seventh in natural gas production. Yearly expenditures by the industry in Mississippi are running in excess of \$60 million, he said.

The oil and gas industry spokesman contrasted the tax situation in Mississippi with that in neighboring states, stating that Mississippi taxes her oil and gas industry higher than any other producing state. "Although the attitude of Mississippi's citizens and state officials toward the oil and gas industry has been friendly, and the state oil and gas board is one of the fairest and most cooperative in existence, the fact remains that it costs more tax dollars to produce oil and gas in Mississippi than in any other state," Kenna declared.

Mississippi law does not allow percentage depletion as an income tax deduction, nor does it allow credit on state income tax for federal income taxes paid. The Mississippi severance tax rate on both oil and gas is six per cent of value.

A survey taking into consideration all local and state taxes paid by Mississippi oilmen shows that it now costs a small producer 32 cents in taxes to produce each barrel of oil. For larger producers, the tax burden per barrel was found to be 29.97 cents. Both these figures are higher than those for Louisiana even though the Bayou State imposes the nation's highest severance tax on oil production.

The Shining Light

Lesson for October 18, 1953

ARE we agreed that Christians ought to plan ahead for a better world? Are we agreed that the foundation of a better world is Jesus Christ and Christlike persons? Then we can go on with the next question, a very practical one. What exactly can God's "new men" do to leave this world better than they found it? Granted, we shall never see an ideal world this side of heaven; granted, we shall be imperfect persons as long as we live in this world. It is still possible—more than that, it is imperative, a "Must,"—for Christians to work and plan in the direction of the world of God's ideal.

Salt And Light

The first thing we can do, odd as it may sound, is not to do anything, but to be something. Jesus spoke to his disciples—and to us—in terms of salt and light. Now salt and light do not do anything, or rather what they depend entirely on their being what they are. If salt could change its mind and decide to be pepper or sand, no cook would want it. If Dr. Foreman an electric light could change itself into a doorknob, it would cause no end of trouble. The salt doesn't rush around doing something, it just is salt, the light is light. Salt and light are alike in this: there is no real substitute for either one. So there is no substitute for real Christians in this world. They are alike also in that they do whatever good they do, by contact. Salt in a shaker, light in a steel box, are of no use. So the Christian to be of use in the world must not shrink from contact with it.

Furthermore, salt and light are alike in that they must not be too prominent. No one cares for over-salted food or glaring lights. So a Christian who is like a Pharisee, wearing his virtues on his chest like a string of medals, is a nuisance to all concerned. But still it is true that the first and most constant service which every Christian can render in this confused sad world, is simply to be as good a Christian, as faithful a representative and servant of Jesus Christ he can possibly be.

Helping Others

Another thing that God's new men can do, a thing which can remake the world and in many respects has been re-making it,—a thing that sounds simple but which calls for a great deal of thought and planning, is this: just helping other people.

The New Testament makes it quite clear that an unhelpful Christian is hardly a real Christian at all. Naturally, not all Christians have the same opportunities. A little girl just entering the first grade can help her classmates and the teacher; but the teacher if she is a good one, can help all the class even more. The principal of the school, by selecting good teachers, can by his skill in judging people help every pupil in the school. The members of the school board by picking good principals can help the whole school system.

A boy on a farm in Missouri does not have the same opportunity to be helpful that he would have if he had been appointed Secretary of State. But a Christian, whether his zone of operations is a farm or the world, can always find ways of "going about doing good" as the Master did.

Winning Others

There is one thing that most Christians do not do, which—if they only went at it with any enthusiasm—would spread their light farther than any other one thing. (We bear in mind that if a Christian has any light, it is because Christ shines through him.) If it is true that the "better world," even if only a little better, can come to pass only as personalities are changed into the likeness of Christ, then the best thing a Christian can do toward a better world is to win others to his own Saviour. Saint Paul no doubt was helpful to others by the tents he made, for we can scarcely imagine him turning out shoddy or bungled work. He was more helpful still by "growing in grace" and shining as a true Christian character. But was there any service he performed which meant as much to him, in satisfaction, or to the world, by way of improvement, as the service he rendered in winning men from the kingdom of darkness to the kingdom of light?

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County Agent News

October is a good month to do some special pasture management and some other things to save the pastures from overgrazing. Graze all crop harvested areas such as following corn harvest, bean harvest and cotton picking. This does two things. It gives the livestock more grazing and saves the summer and fall pastures from long, continued overgrazing.

October is the ideal month to plant oats, wheat and ryegrass in sod. Here are recommendations for sod planting of oats or wheat. Plant in 16 or 20 inch rows, put in the seed 2 to 2½ inches deep and separate the seed from the fertilizer. If the land has not been mineralized I would use some mixed goods, say about 500 pounds per acre, but if it has been mineralized, use 30 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Oats or wheat can be drilled using this method on grazed down Bermuda sod, out on white clover sods, and re-seeding Crimson clover areas.

You can use the soil type method of sowing ryegrass in many different areas. I would recommend putting the fertilizer down at the same time the seed are seeded. Ryegrass will do well planted like this on white clover sods, re-seeding crimson clover sods, in winter pea areas that are not too low, out on Bermuda sod where Dallas and Jaspedeza have

faded out and on many poor run-down pasture areas where you want to bring them back and stop erosion. You can plant ryegrass and fertilize it on pretty badly run down pasture areas and get pretty good grazing from it next spring. It fits so many combinations, I consider it one of our top late winter and spring grazing crops which can be interplanted in other crops. Don't plant ryegrass on Jaspedeza sod.

Off-weight bales of cotton cause costly problems all along the route from the farm to the spinning mill. Overweight bales place undue stress on gin and compress equipment. This causes breakdowns. The bales are difficult to tie properly and go through marketing channels looking ragged.

They contribute to the "rolling bale" problem and endanger workers. These overweight bales require extensive use of hooks in handling, which damage the bagging and cause trouble in loading.

Underweight bales make it difficult for compresses to obtain required density for shipping economy. These light bales need the same shipping space as do the 500-pound bales.

Delivery contracts are based on 50,000 pounds. This is exactly one hundred 500-pound bales.

Farmers can eliminate heavy and light bales by making sure that the cotton brought to the gin can be divided into one or more 500 pound bales.

Farmers should begin planning timber management jobs as soon as harvest is over for field crops. Good farming of the farm woodland means more income for the farmer.

One of the foremost management jobs for the farm woodland is fire prevention. Woods are generally in a very dry condition right now and a fire once started is hard to stop.

Fire lanes, especially between woods and any public road, will help prevent fires in your farm woodlands. Build one as soon as possible.

Crowding too many broilers in a house greatly adds to the risks of production. Never put more than one chick for every square foot of floor space.

Plenty of room in the broiler house reduces disease risks, raises a larger percentage of those started with a better conversion ratio, and produces better quality birds.

Vegetated Waterways

Now is the time to establish vegetated waterways in natural drains in fields to be terraced next spring.

A correct water disposal system established in a field, will walk the excess water off the land, and will slow down the speed of run-off to such an extent that more of the water will soak into the soil and very little soil will be swept away.

This is one method of conserving soil and water that every farmer of this county could put into practice on a part, or all, of his cultivated land, (our cultivated hill land is where we are losing most of our soil and water.) Mr. Tice and I, who work for the USDA Soil Conservation Service,

will assist, in so far as we can, any farmer in Tishomingo County in the planning and establishing of a complete water disposal system on a part, or on all, of his cultivated land, including hills, bench land and bottom land.

Just to terrace land the way it has been done in the past is good, but is an inadequate method of conserving soil and water. A complete water disposal system takes into consideration the best way to get water off of all the land, not just a little patch here and there. Neighbors should work together to fit the system into a whole watershed from the dividing ridge to the main channel. This is what the commissioners of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District had in mind, when they instructed the secretary to record in the minutes of a meeting that they favored planning farms by small watersheds, and that plans be written and farmers encouraged to cooperate in using the land according to its capabilities, and that water disposal systems be established to fit the watershed. By doing this the system would naturally fit all the farms within that watershed.

Each spring about planting time it seems customary for farmers to ask for assistance in terracing a field. They came into our office, or the County Agent's

office, or go to their Smith Hughes teacher and ask for assistance in surveying a few terrace lines. Those of you who think you will want some terracing done next spring should let it be known now, in order that

you can get your job done.

Now is the time to get your terrace rows arranged.

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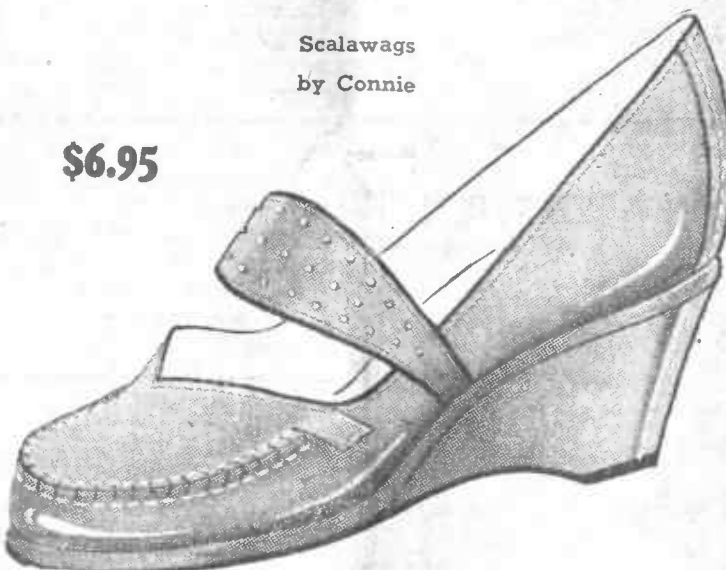
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
