Iuka Streets Pass Inspection Of Engineer

Mr. Frank Morgan, engineer
for the city of Corinth was in
Iuka Tuesday of this week on
an inspection tour of the newly
paved street.

According to Mr. Morgan, the
streets are in good condition for
the amount of money spent on
the paving. He said "Only criti-
cism I could offer is the draining.
Some of the ditches along side
the street are too deep and may
become stopped up. If that hap-
pens the water will back up over
the street and seep under the
pavement."

"Special care," Mr. Morgan
said, "should be taken to keep
the ditches clear and free of
rubbish so that the water will
run off freely." Mr. Morgan also
said the Town would spend far
less money maintaining these
paved streets than it had here-
tofore trying to maintain the
gravel streets.

Mount Pleasant Lord's Acre

The Mount Pleasant Methodist
Church recently harvested their
Lord's Acre project. This was not
the first time that they had a
program of this nature for the
church. John Slack was chair-
man of the committee composed of

Not only did the church, but
the community assisted in the
cultivation and harvesting of the
cotton. John Slack gave the acre
to be used. Clarence Paden con-
tributed the fertilizer. The cotton
was gathered on September 23rd.
Although the harvest was short
with only 555 pounds of seed
cotton, the Lord's Acre netted
\$66.60 for the Church. As it has
been seen over and over, the
value of the project can not be
valued in material gain.

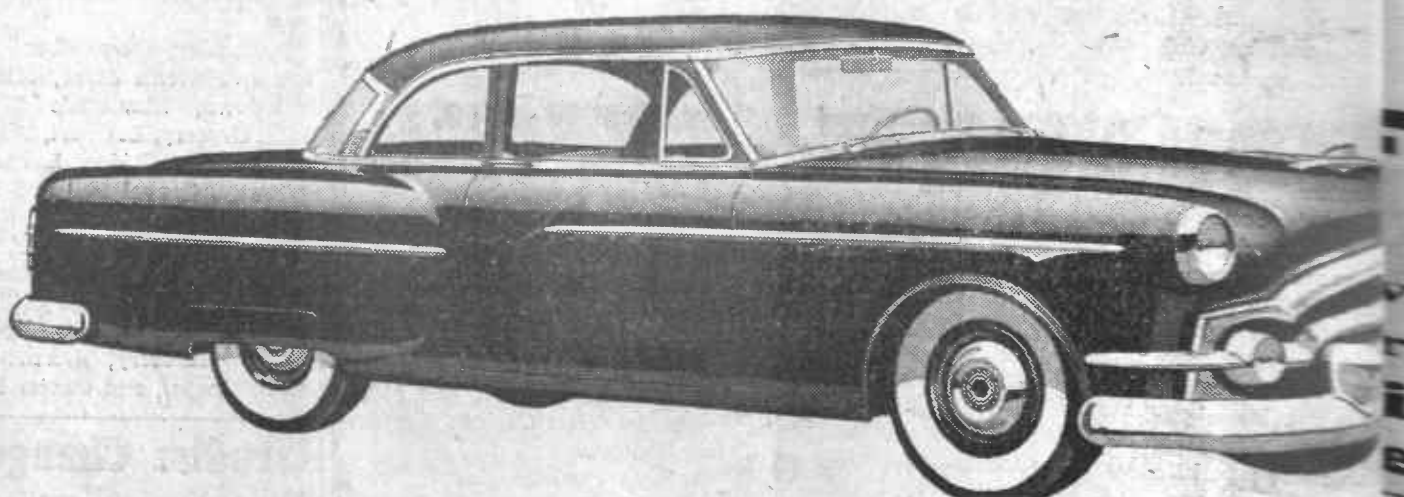

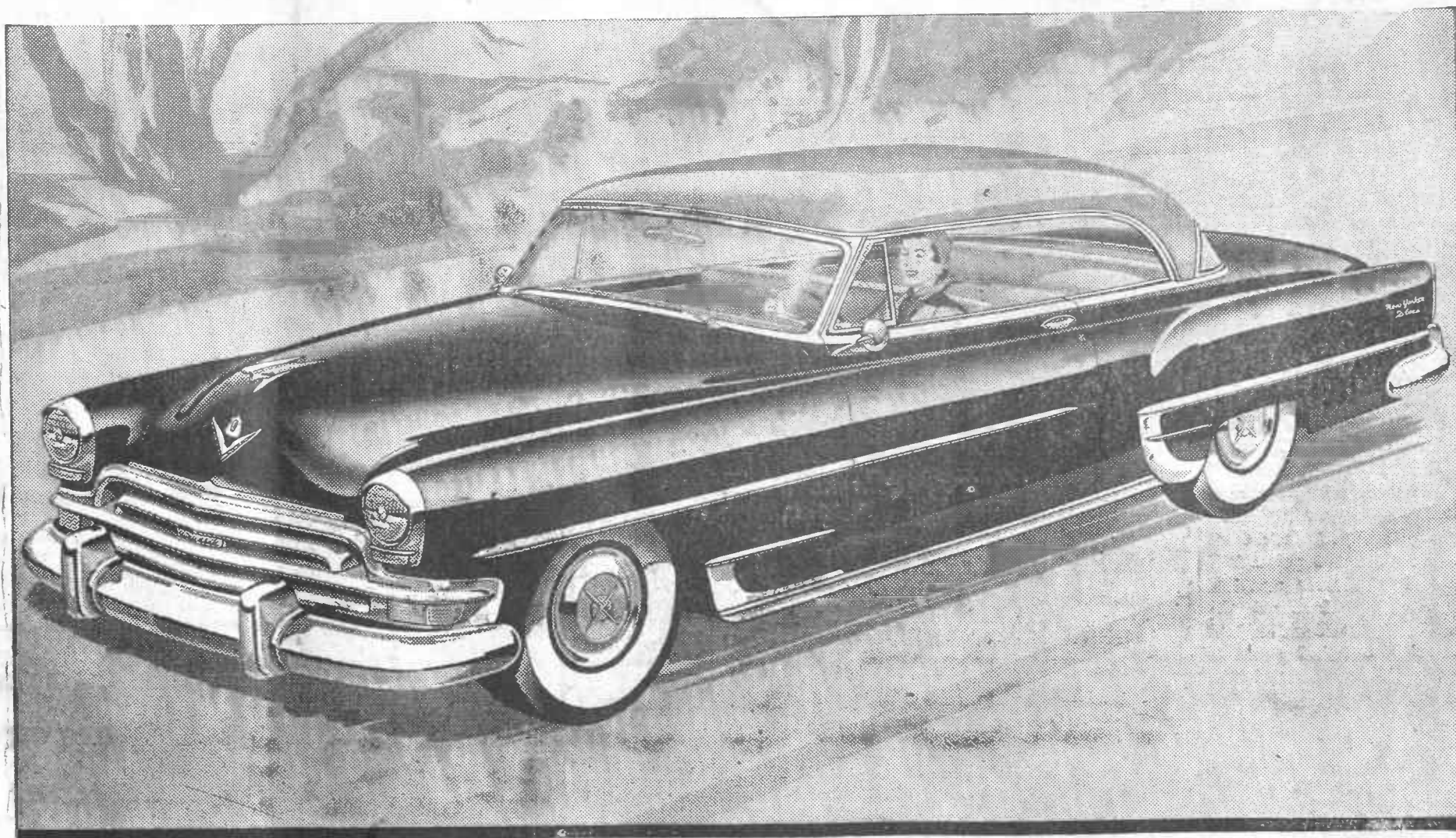

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Scripture: Genesis 1:27-28; Deuteronomy 6:4-9; Proverbs 22:6; Matthew 19:3-9; Luke 10:38-42; Ephesians 5:21-6:4; 1 Timothy 1:5-7; 3:14-17.

God-Planned Homes

Lesson for November 1, 1953

NO Christian home can be found between the covers of the Bible. Naturally there were no Christians before Christ, and the New Testament books were all written so early in our era that what we know as a Christian home could not exist. Jesus himself was brought up in a Jewish home. Timothy had a Jewish mother but a Greek father, and the "faith" that was in his mother and grandmother was not, probably, the faith of Christians. Nobody named in the Bible was married in a Christian church by a Christian minister. We have to say, if we stick to the facts of history, that the Christian home is something that developed out of the Christian faith which the Bible inspires and instructs, rather than something the Bible directly describes.

Law In The Home

The Christian home is not something so radically different from other kinds that it can't be recognized. Among the most primitive races there are homes of a sort.

Always there is a mated pair, father and mother, and children more or less under their care. Father and mother (aided often by other members of the tribe) teach the young what they are expected to know. So much is universal.

Now in the Christian home, one special feature marks it off from less developed types: training in religion. This we have inherited from the Hebrews long before us. According to Deuteronomy, the law of God was to be known by the parents and taught by them to the children. This is not simply the Ten Commandments, but the whole management of life under the will

of God. Now it should go without saying that if parents try to teach their children what is right, without doing right themselves, failure is certain. Some of the most important matters can be taught only by example. To take one illustration: parents should be the best persons to tell their children what Christian marriage is and how to achieve success in it. But if parents live in constant strife or even break up altogether, then what?

A recent study was made of 12,000 young people. It was discovered that in the homes where they came from, where the parents were both Roman Catholics, only 6.4 per cent of the homes had broken up; where both were Protestants, 6.8 per cent had broken up; where the parents were of different religions, 15.2 per cent were broken; and where there was no religion at all, 16.7 per cent of the homes were broken. What those unsuccessful husbands and wives did about their own marriages will have much more effect on their children than any good advice.

Love In The Home

A good home is much more than a place where everyone behaves correctly and does just as he should. A well-managed penitentiary might be that sort of place too. The great difference between the model penitentiary and the model home is that in one, the good behavior is compulsory, in the other the ruling motive is love.

There is no home where love never makes mistakes; none where love is complete and flawless. But where love is, there is hope. Without love, the least differences pile up into unscalable mountains of incompatibility and resentment; where love is, even mountains of difficulty can be brought low.

What the Bible teaches everywhere, especially in the New Testament, is that love, in the home or anywhere, to have its perfect work must not be one-sided. If every member of a home really set out to be the kind of person Paul describes in I Cor. 13 or Eph. 5, break-ups would be seldom indeed. Love ought not to be left to mothers alone!

God's Planning

A Christian home is one where God's plan of love is followed. But God never does for us what we can do for ourselves. We have to plan for our homes just as we do for anything at all that we want to succeed. This should begin early, too, like all good planning. Young people do not always ask the right questions before they fall in love. Winter Feed For Cattle

"It is doubtful if some cattle will get through the winter unless the available roughages are fortified with a reasonable amount of high protein feed" according to Paul F. Newell, animal husbandman of the Agricultural Extension Service.

"Every producer plans to winter his cattle cheaply. Even so, it will be good business to use at least some protein feeds with roughages."

Many beef producers are feeding hay and silage now because their grass supply is inadequate to maintain the cattle. Since much of the roughages used will be of poor quality, low in protein, it will be wise for each producer to supply himself with at least minimum protein requirements to insure his cattle being able to utilize the low grade feeds he has on hand.

"Cottonseed meal or cake, soybean oil meal or cake, or other high protein feed, fed with the usual roughages, will greatly increase the efficiency of these low quality roughages."

"Cattle producers who grow considerable grain and other feed crops are often able to utilize their stalk fields for 30 or more days each fall, thus reducing the normal winter feed requirements for their cattle by one-third or more. Stalk fields will not have as much salvage value this fall as usual due to dry weather."

With a short grass supply and a more extended winter feeding period than usual, cattle producers are wisely beginning to study their roughage and protein needs, Mr. Newell said. They are evaluating both supply and quality of their stored feed reserves such as hay, silage, straw stacks and stover.

"All types of roughage, even those of poor quality, will be useful to cattlemen before the winter is over. It will apparently be necessary for many producers to feed their cattle for as much

as 150 days this fall and winter rather than the usual 80 to 90 days."

The cattle situation would be greatly improved if general rains came, the animal husbandman added.

"The current situation brings home to every cow man, more than ever, the need for more perennial grasses and reseeded legumes on which he can better sustain his kind of business," Mr. Newell said. "Where producers provide enough permanent and perennial type pastures and avoid overstocking, they can have grass even in the dry seasons."

"Most cowmen want a limited acreage of temporary winter pastures for the calves they carry over as feeders or replacements, but to sustain the cow herd, the producer needs enough permanent type pastures and a stored winter feed supply."

"The cowman has to live with these dry summers, so he must arrange his program in such a way that he can have a dependable grass supply every year."

Collection Of Sales Tax Shows Increase
