H Achievement Week, Nov. 7-15; Tishomingo County Clubs Will Observe

Mississippi's 106,000 boys and girls in 4-H Club work join in observing National 4-H Achievement Week, November 7-15, according to C. I. Smith, state 4-H Club leader of the Agricultural Extension Service.

Highlight of the week will be the State 4-H Club Round-Up in Jackson, November 12 and 13. Over 200 state and district winners in some 40 projects and activities will be guests of the Retail Merchants Division, Jackson Chamber of Commerce.

Mississippi has one of the largest state enrollments in 4-H Club work, of which the total membership is over two million for the 48 states, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. About 25 per cent come from urban or rural nonfarm homes. Over 40 countries now have 4-H or some educational program like it.

Eligible for membership is any

boy or girl between the ages of 10 and 21 who agrees to "learn by doing" a farm, home or community activity as a demonstration of the best scientific methods. Volunteer local leaders help the boys and girls in their clubs, which are guided by local agents of the Agricultural Extension Service.

Besides a large enrollment, Mississippi achievements during 1952 in 4-H Club include 72 per cent of the members completing their projects.

The membership accounted for state totals of 5,558 acres in home gardens, 27,538 meat animals, 4,949 dairy animals and 564,553 birds. They grew 41,733 acres in food and feed crops, 17,771 acres in corn, 7,617 acres in cotton; planted 10 million pine seedlings and supervised 8,620 acres in woodland management.

How My Community Has Been Helped By Work And Leadership Of 4-H Clubs

When I joined the 4-H club at the age of ten, I knew very little of the advantages and possibilities of club work. Under the able leadership of the County Agent and his Assistants new fields opened up before me. Registered cattle began to be brought into the county and sold to 4-H Club members; hybrid seed corn of several varieties was introduced in the county and a few bushels were planted this year; registered pigs were provided for the club members by interesting parties, and many other projects such as cotton, forestry, soil conservation, and farm management have been carried on with great success.

A few years ago, the farmers in my community used wide spacing with a small amount of fertilizer for corn. Today farmers practice close spacing of corn and increase their fertilizer. We have many registered cattle, both dairy and beef type, and fine pastures for grazing. Hogs are being raised

on most of the farms due to more corn being raised. A more balanced farm program is being practiced on all farms. Because of the interest taken by our leaders in club work members have been awakened to the advantages offered and are following on a large scale the instructions given to club members.

Several of our boys and girls have won district and stage prizes. The trips to the State Capital and Colleges have been very educational. The training in Recreation and Leadership has helped to create a greater friendship among the members and has given us more self-confidence. We will be better prepared for our places in life by having been members of the 4-H Club.

Recapitulating, 4-H Club work has improved the field crops, livestock, pastures, homes, home-life, and the population of my community. It has brought us closer together, made better citizens of us, and has given us a broader outlook on life.

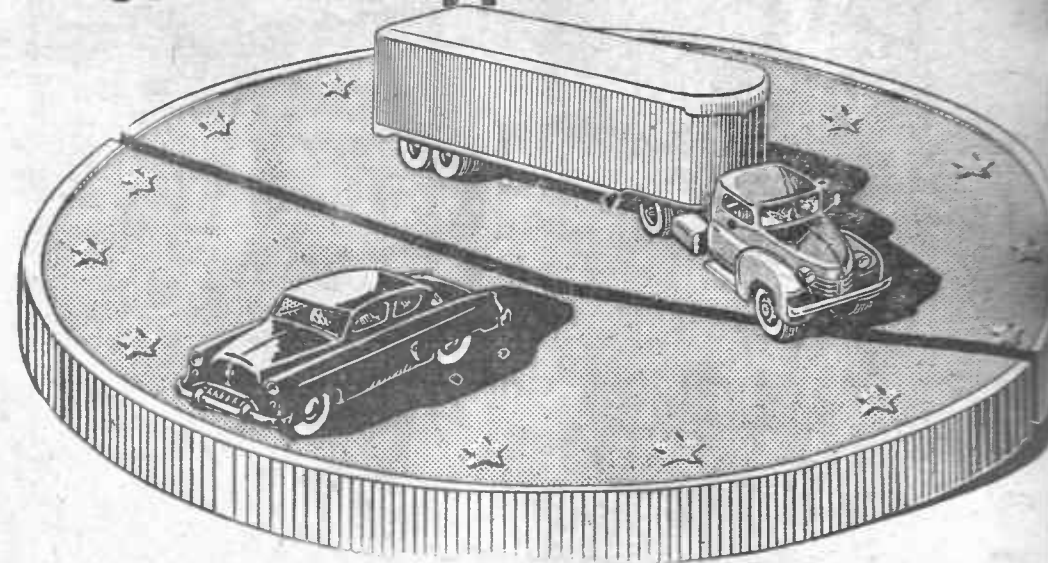

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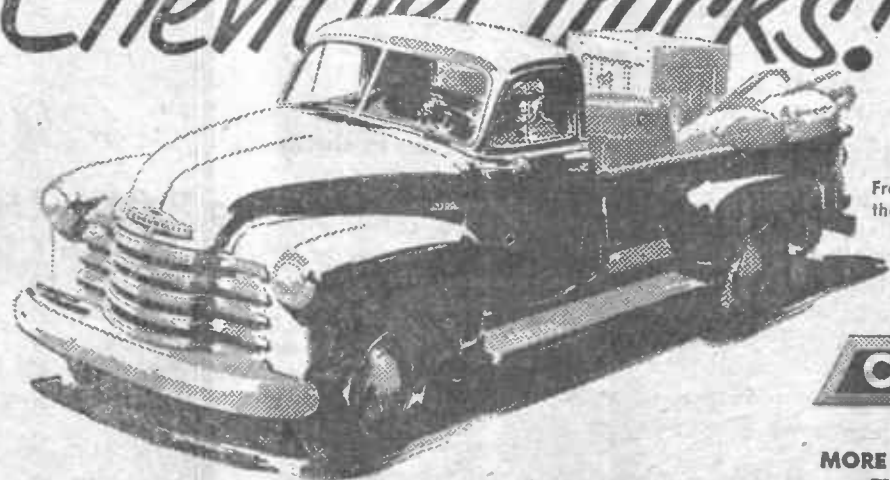

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Now is a good time to treat mounds for control of the imported fire ant. Two insecticides, dieldrin and chlordane can be used as dusts or liquid for control of these pests.

The imported fire ant causes damage to home garden, lawns and pastures. In some cases the mounds may damage farm machinery such as mowers. Their sting is painful and sometimes causes sores.

Heavy pruning has been found to reduce yields on both peach and apple trees.

In pruning old apple trees, remove branches near the ground that are completely shaded out by those above. Prune out dead

and broken branches and water sprouts.

In pruning young apple trees, the chief aim is to maintain a central trunk or leader and to prevent sharp crotches by removing limbs that threaten to make such crotches.

In pruning young peach trees, the aim is to produce three to five frame work branches spaced six to eight inches apart on the trunk with the lowest branch about 18 inches above the ground.

Pruning of bearing peach trees consists of a moderate thinning and heading back of branches and the removal of dead or damaged branches.

Where grazing is planned for cotton areas this winter, farmers can drill cover crops and then use the high speed clipper to mulch the cotton stalks. Where grazing is not wanted, the stalks should be mulched down anyway. This helps prevent washing of the soil.

This mulching of the cotton stalks will also get rid of food and hiding places for many harmful insects.

Two bale per acre cotton is possible on many areas of delta

land. Management this fall will help make that two bales per acre. Cover crops and cotton stalks and roots will add humus to the soil and help make for better yields.

In planning next year's cotton acreage, using the best land possible is the farmers first and most important job. Farmers can afford to do more to these acres as these have a higher per acre income than any other acres.

Let wheat or oats get eight to ten inches tall before grazing them. Do not graze these or any other cereal or winter grass closer than two inches from the ground.

Farmers who had overgrazed pastures this year, should make plans now for adding more acreage to the pasture program next year. The only hope for better pastures in the summertime is to either add more pasture land or cut down on number of animals. Fertilizer will do a two fold job on pastures. It will raise the value of grazing land and increase its carrying capacity too.

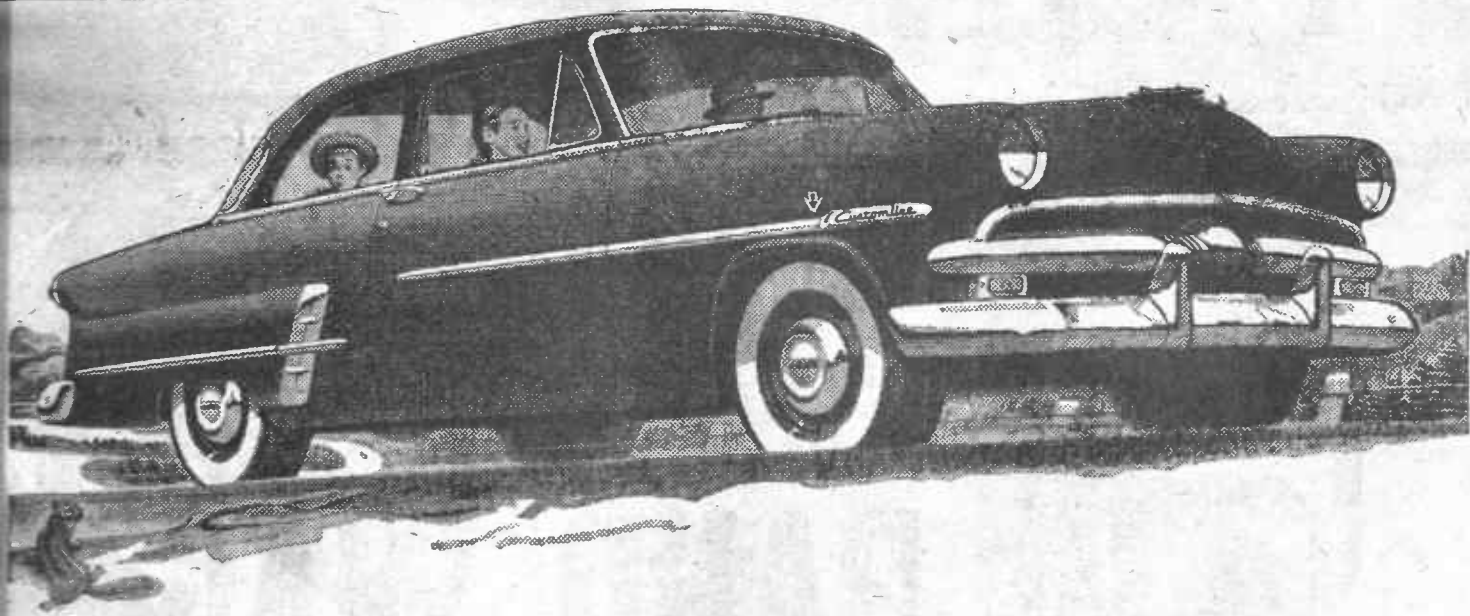

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF MAYOR AND ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI DECLARING THE NECESSITY OF PAVING OR HARD SURFACING CERTAIN STREETS IN SAID MUNICIPALITY.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Iuka met in regular session on this the 3rd day of November, 1953, at the Mayor's office of said town at 6 o'clock p.m. with the following members present:

Mayor J. H. Allen, Joe W. Thompson, W. F. Dugger, E. D. Davis and N. C. Pruitt.

And among other business the following was transacted. After discussion a petition, which was filed before the Board relative to paving certain streets in the Town of Iuka, E. D. Davis made the following motion:

"I move that the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Iuka do hereby declare that it is necessary to hard-surface the following streets in the Town of Iuka, Mississippi: and to levy a special assessment against each abutting land owner in a sum not to exceed \$2.00 per lineal foot on the following described property in said town:

Beginning at the McKinney Crossing Road where same intersects Eastport Street and continuing 2640 feet in an easterly direction with said Eastport Street to the corporate limits of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi. The aforementioned street being within the corporate limits of said town.

Also Mill Street beginning at the Mammoth Hosiery Mill on Sulphur Springs Road and running southward 1320 feet to the intersection of Fifth Street, all the above described streets being within the Corporate Limits of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi.

I further move that since petitions have been filed with the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, signed by a majority of the abutting land owners of the above described property that this resolution be declared a necessity in the paving or black-topping the above named streets and that a copy of this resolution be published in the Vidette, a newspaper having general circulation in the Town of Iuka, Mississippi for once each week for three (3) successive publications and that the Board of Mayor and Aldermen shall meet on or after the 19th of November, 1953, at 7:30 o'clock p.m. in the Mayor's office of said town for the purpose of hearing any objections to this resolution. If no objections are made to this resolution, the Board will issue negotiable notes not to exceed the sum of Eight Thousand, Three Hundred (\$8,300.00) Dollars with interest thereon not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum for a period not to exceed ten (10) years and will levy a special assessment against all abutting land owners in a sum not to exceed Two Dollars (\$2.00) per lineal foot for the purpose of paying said notes."

And after full discussion, Aldermen N. C. Pruitt seconded said motion and the following vote was taken:

Those voting in favor of said motion: E. D. Davis, N. C. Pruitt, W. F. Dugger, Joe W. Thompson. Those voting against said motion: None.

A majority having voted in favor of said resolution the same is hereby adopted on this the 3rd day of November, 1953.

Said Mrs. Spain of her June vacation in Nassau: "I indeed gazed with benevolence upon any Mississippi school teacher who is the recipient of such a wonderful trip, which not only enriches her own life in innumerable ways but which may, through her, enrich the lives of our boys and girls."

Miss Howell, who made her Nassau trip in June also, says:

"That week spent in Nassau was the most wonderful week I've ever had. I sincerely hope that before too long you yourself will have an opportunity to go to Nassau because you will certainly enjoy every minute of it."

The winners, incidentally, made the trip from Jackson in about five hours by airline.

Emphasis on air education during this, the "Fiftieth Anniversary of Powered Flight," is especially important, according to C. A. "Bud" Moore, director of the Mississippi Aeronautics Commission.

"This contest," says Moore, "offers a challenge to teachers to assume the responsibility in guiding pupils to realize the airplane's potentiality for improving the quality of living and to integrate the social, economic, and political implications of the airplane into the course of study at all grade levels and subject areas."

Air Age Education, according to Mr. Moore, is a term which means education for life in the modern world. The fact that use of the airplane affects the life of every child in the classrooms of Mississippi's schools has been

realized by the Commission, the Department of Education, and school teachers, who now find aviation stories and material in all state-adopted textbooks at every grade level.

The Aeronautics Commission supplements this with a helpful variety of material for use by the teacher. One is "Air Education in Mississippi," a manual for elementary and high school teachers which emphasizes material in the state-adopted textbooks, lists sources of additional data, and offers suggestions for utilizing such materials in the work of the class.

Other available aids include a loose-leaf pamphlet series for teachers which covers a number of subjects, including the following: "The Primary Teacher in the Air Age," "Flying With the Intermediate Grades," "Transportation by Air," "High School English in the Air Age," and "Blackboard Border Patterns." Two of the newest available pamphlets are "New Horizons for Mississippi Teachers" and "Fifty Flying Years: 1903-1953," which are especially suitable during the current observance of the anniversary of powered flight.

In addition to these helpful aids, the Aeronautics Commission

has made an interesting and educational selection of films for use in the classroom. These include "The Air Age," a thirty-minute technicolor film showing uses of the present-day airplane; "Airplanes Make Markets"; "History of Aviation"; and "History of the Helicopter."

The teacher interested in living up her classroom programs may also secure a new 3-act play entitled "Sally Joins The Model Airplane Club," a 25-minute production for six girls and five boys.

Any of these teaching aids may be obtained by writing to the Mississippi Aeronautics Commission, P. O. Box 5, Jackson, Miss.

Teachers interested in entering the contest are reminded by Director Moore that Air Age Education is not a new subject to be added to an overcrowded curriculum, but is already an accepted part of the existing instructional program. Teachers interested in competing for the two vacations should write to the Aeronautics Commission for application forms and complete instructions.

This year's contest entries will be judged by the School of Education at the University of Mississippi. Winners will be announced at the annual convention of the Mississippi Education Association
