Forest Fire Situation Critical In County; 1663 Acres Burned During Month

The forest fire situation has become extremely critical in Tishomingo county according to area forester Busby. The conditions are believed to be even worse than last year. Today only a spark is needed to light the fuse which sends a destructive blaze leaping through the powder dry forest that is endangering both lives and property. As an indication of the rapid increase of fire in Tishomingo county, 1663 acres have been burned by 80 fires during the first sixteen days of November.

These fires have been caused by smokers, hunters, debris burning, railroad incendiary, etc. The loss resulting from the above

mentioned fires will run into thousands of dollars.

The Mississippi Forestry Commission is doing its best to suppress the blazes in Tishomingo county but they must be fought one at a time. Tishomingo county only has three units, two jeeps and one tractor; each unit is manned by three men. So when fires outnumber the commissions suppression units the situation gets out of control and many additional acres of valuable timber and other property is lost. Last Friday Tishomingo county had several fires going at one time but with the equipment and

By means of the new system seventy five families will have service furnished by the Southern Bell Telephone company. The dial unit is to be connected to the Iuka exchange.

Mr. M. L. Hatcher, principal of the Burnsville high school will act as master of ceremonies. Other participants in the program will include Mayor John Henry Allen, Iuka; Mr. Howard Little, public service commissioner; Mr. W. J. Brinkley, manager, Tishomingo county electric power association; Rev. J. Blount, Burnsville; and Rev. W. F. Appleby, Tishomingo.

Representatives of Southern Bell Telephone company taking part in the activities will include Mr. L. E. Sawson, rural development supervisor; Jackson, Miss.; Mr. L. C. Parker, district manager, Tupelo; and W. G. Hardin, group manager, Corinth.

According to W. G. Hardin, group manager, the project will involve some 460 miles of wire, 106 new poles as well as joint use on 280 Tishomingo electric power association poles. The total cost of the project was in excess of \$50,000.

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An experiment was set up at State College to measure the soil movement from a period of extreme drought through a winter rainy season. In the fall of 1952, when a record drought prevailed, steel plates were set at the bottom of holes at various depths from 12 to 24 inches. A steel stem extended from east plate to the surface so that the rise or fall of the plate might be measured against a bench mark, which was a long rod driven down 10 feet to the soft rock.

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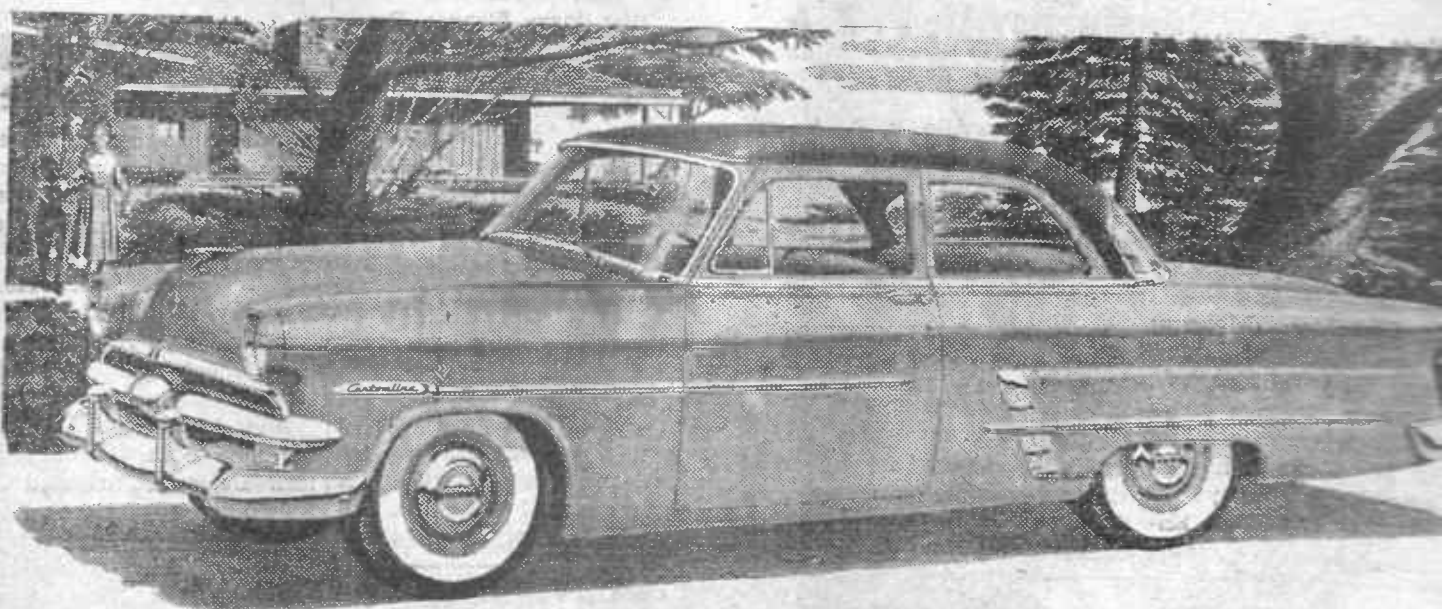

expected. Consumer income for spending in 1954 is not expected to be much different from 1953. Federal government spending will be down some, but this may be offset by increase in state and local government spending. Consumer buying is expected to hold up well. Demand for farm products is

expected to be strong. The marketing charges will continue high and the farmers share of the consumers food dollar should continue near the present low level.

Supplies of most farm products are expected to continue large in 1954—much larger than domestic consumption. Surplus of some of the major farm commodities—wheat, cotton, beef and butter, may be the largest since World War II.

The cost price squeeze that farmers have been in this year is expected to continue next year. Cash receipts from farm marketing in 1954 are not expected to equal those of 1953. However, somewhat lower production costs should result in most farmers' net income being about the same as last year.

Cotton farmers can look for large supplies, moderate demand, controlled production and prices close to support levels.

Beef Cattle. Fewer fed cattle will be marketed in the first half of 1954; however, supplies of grass cattle and lower grades will probably be about the same as in 1953. Prices should be more stable than in the past two years but may not differ much from the present levels.

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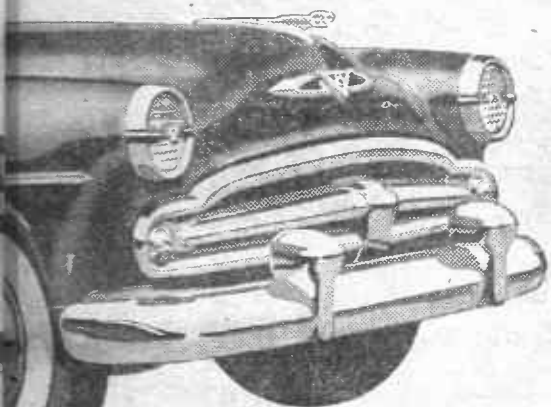

probably increase this fall. Next spring's pig crop is expected to be five to ten per cent larger than a year ago. Larger production will show up in increased marketings about mid 1954. Until then prices should remain relatively high; after which they may decline more than usual.

Lamb and mutton production may be lower with not much change in prices.

Dairy production is expected to remain high. Consumption will remain about the same as in 1953. Large supplies of manufactured milk products indicate that the farmer's prices for milk and butterfat in 1954 will depend largely on what the support price will be in the marketing year that begins April 1, 1954.

Prices for fluid milk consumption will remain about the same as this year's.

Egg production in the spring is likely to be up a little from last spring. About the same number of layers will be on farms but the rate of lay per hen is expected to be up. Prices may be lower, although still relatively high.

Broiler prices averaging about the same or slightly lower than this year's are in prospect. Total feed concentrates are a little above last years and prices are generally a little lower than a year ago. However, these prices may strengthen a bit later in the feeding season.

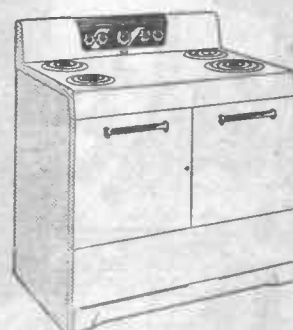
Cake Walk And Box Supper At Holcut School

Kudzu & Sericea Praised As Pasture Crops

Mr. Claude E. Morton of Midway community stated recently that had it not been for 7 acres of Kudzu and 5 acres of Sericea, he would have had to sell most of his cattle, because all but 4 acres of his permanent pasture dried up during the drought we

have had.

Mr. Morton gathered his crop early and on October 24th turned his 14 head of grown cattle and 4 (nearly grown) yearlings into his field to graze the stalks.

From early spring until October 24th these 13 head of cattle had access to, and grazed the 5 acres of Sericea except for the 21 days they were turned on the Kudzu in September and early October. These cattle are in better than average condition which proves the value of Sericea and Kudzu as grazing crops, on the type of land Mr. Morton owns.

"To show you how I feel about Kudzu and Sericea as pasture plants," said Mr. Morton, smiling, "I'm planning to plant more Sericea and set more Kudzu next spring". The only trouble I find with it on my farm is that I just don't have enough of either one for the number of cattle I have."
