POPULARITY OF NATCHEZ TRACE REVEALED IN FIRST ROAD CHECK

The growing popularity of the historic Natchez Trace Parkway which has been traveled successively by animals, Indians, early pioneers, soldiers and modern travelers is today making this scenic route one of the state's most frequented attractions.

During the first nine months of 1953 a total of 343,209 automobiles carrying 1,034,319 persons have traveled over the 64 miles of paved roadway in Mississippi, only hard surfaced section of the 450-mile route between Natchez and Nashville. Chances are that these figures will be substantially increased by the end of the year.

This heavy volume of traffic over an uncompleted road is considered significant in view of the fact that the Parkway is closed to commercial vehicles and does not provide a through route to any point not already served. It also exceeds the volume of traffic on many of the state's highways.

Actual work on the Parkway was started back in 1937, but was halted by World War II. At that time 105 miles of grading and minor drainage had been completed. Since the War the 64-mile strip of paving has been completed between Ridgeland and Kosciusko, picnic areas, nature trails and markers have been provided, and an attractive information office and museum has been opened at the Ridgeland end of the Trace, just off U.S. Highway 51.

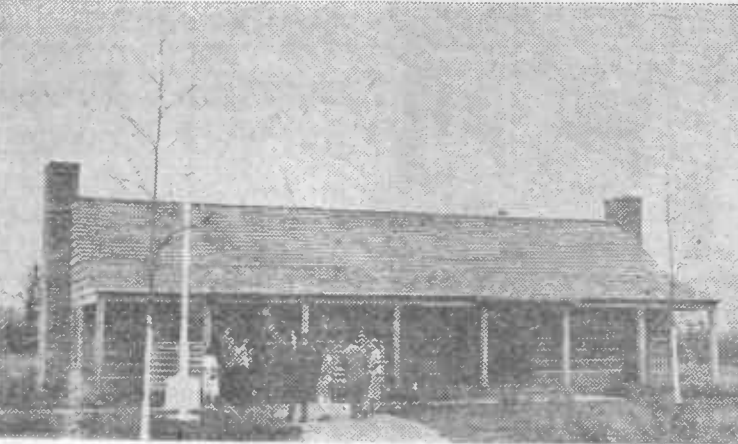
Mississippi to date has acquired about 200 miles of park right of way and has conveyed 171 miles to the Federal government, leaving about 29 miles practically acquired but not yet deeded to the government.

The entire Jackson-Tupelo unit of 165 miles in Mississippi has now been conveyed to the government and this important link has first construction priority. The second unit proposed in Mississippi runs 49 miles between U.S. Highway 80 at Clinton and U.S. 61 at Port Gibson.

Lands and rights of way for the Parkway, adopted by the National Park Service in 1930, are acquired by the Highway Departments of the cooperating states and turned over to Uncle Sam. The longest stretch of the colorful old post road, 316 miles, is located in Mississippi, with 33 miles in Alabama, and 101 in Tennessee.

The Parkway, following the historic Trace which was the only important land link with the Southwest in early days, has been designed exclusively for pleasure travel and is unique in that no advertising signs or commercial developments are allowed to mar its distinctive beauty, and commercial trucks are forbidden.

When completed eventually, the Parkway will extend the entire distance from Natchez to Nashville, following closely the original trails first made by wild animals, followed by Indians of various tribes in these areas, and finally by explorers, pioneer settlers and soldiers.

By treaty with the Choctaw and Chickasaw Indians, the United States acquired the right to develop the Natchez Trace into a wagon road and mail route in the early 1800's. But for many years the journey over the Trace remained a hard and perilous one—due not so much to the Red Man as to the blood thirsty bandits who found easy pickings on the wilderness trail. Lafayette knew its hardships, as did Meriwether Lewis, Andrew Jackson, Henry Clay and many another well known figure of history.

Work on the road began late in 1801. Whether the troops actually cleared all the road from Duck River Ridge, 30 miles south of Nashville, to Grindstone Ford, near Port Gibson, is not known. Increased traffic, after the acquisition of Louisiana in 1803, called for further improvement. In 1806, Congress provided money, and additional improvements were made under the direction of the Postmaster General.

After 1800, the Trace became a colorful, dramatic, and vital segment of the American experience. The figures of the Indian, the explorer, and the hunter were followed by the Kentucky boatmen, the circuit riding preachers, soldiers, agents of government, and the settlers passing that way.

Meriwether Lewis, the great explorer of the old road in 1809 and met death at Grinders Stand in Tennessee.

Shortly after the beginning of the War of 1812, a brigade of Tennessee militia was ordered to Natchez and, on arrival early in 1813, received orders to disband. Andrew Jackson, the commander, refused to obey the order and he and his men subsequently marched home over the Trace. For sharing their hardships on this trip, Jackson's men admirably dubbed him "Old Hickory."

Two years later a large number of the victorious army of the Battle of New Orleans triumphantly marched homeward over the Trace.

Aaron Burr and other names and events of the history of the old Southwest are associated with the Natchez Trace.

Through treaties with the Indians from 1820 to 1832 all lands occupied by the Choctaws and Chickasaws were surrendered, and soon settlers came and the wilderness character of the road was lost. By the beginning of the third decade of the nineteenth century the road had entered into decline.

The development of the steamboat as a means of transportation induced travelers to choose other routes and some sections of the Trace were even abandoned and the ground given over to the growing of cotton, corn, or tobacco.

Thus for a century the old Natchez Trace which had witnessed so much of the South's history lay dormant except for a series of local roads connecting newly established farms or thriving new communities.

In undertaking to preserve and restore this storied old trail, the National Park Service attempted to follow the original road as nearly as possible and to preserve the scenic beauty and important landmarks which dotted the route.

To insure this, the Parkway averages a width of about 800 feet. The historical significance of the Old Natchez Trace and makes available to the leisurely traveler many points of interest relating to the history of the route, nearby Indian sites, old taverns and nature areas.

Park Service regulations are designed to protect the natural features, thus wildlife and vegetation are protected by law and courteous rangers patrol the highway to see that such regulations are observed.

Thus more than two centuries since the Indian used it as a means of communication and transportation, Mississippians and tourists alike are enjoying the thrill of traveling over a road which once presented a challenge to a sturdy people seeking a new home and a new way of life.

Selection Of Cotton Land Can Mean More Yield In 54

Attention given now by cotton farmers to selecting land for their 1954 cotton, sampling soil for testing, destroying stalks, and breaking a hardpan in the subsoil where present can mean one-fourth to one-half a bale more in 1954, according to T. M. Waller, cotton specialist of the Agricultural Extension Service.

"Efficiency in cotton production will be very important in 1954 in view of the expected acreage reduction program," he said. "The difference between profit and loss next year may be determined by whether you begin now carrying out the recommended complete production program."

The specialist gave advice on each of the four timely practices.

(1) Select for cotton in 1954, well-drained, deep soil with a fair amount of organic matter.

"This should be the kind of land where you feel sure you can produce a bale and a half to two bales per acre in 1954."

Use a soil auger or a spade to dig eight to 12 inches into the soil and determine its depth, also to find out whether there is a hardpan present. If present, the hardpan is usually four to 12 inches below the surface.

(2) While checking the depth of the soil, collect topsoil and subsoil samples for testing.

Free containers for soil samples, together with instruction sheets, can be had from all county agent's offices. Testing is done either locally or at the laboratory at State College.

"Get this sampling done as soon as possible so that you can have the results when you buy your fertilizer for 1954 needs," Mr. Waller urged.

(3) Cotton stalks turned under have fertilizer value of \$7.50 per acre where the yield was a bale or more per acre.

If the lay of the land will permit, destroy stalks and turn under. Otherwise, cut stalks with cutters that will leave a mulch on top of the soil. Such a mulch will help prevent soil erosion, slow the rate of flow of water, and permit more penetration of water into the soil.

(4) Recent research shows that breaking the hardpan, where present, in a cotton field increases the amount of moisture that can penetrate deep into the soil. Enough soil moisture must be stored within the soil prior to April or May of the cotton-growing season if the top crop of the cotton plants is fully developed to maturity in July and August.

"Do not go to the expense of deep tillage unless you are sure you need it because of a hardpan," he cautioned.

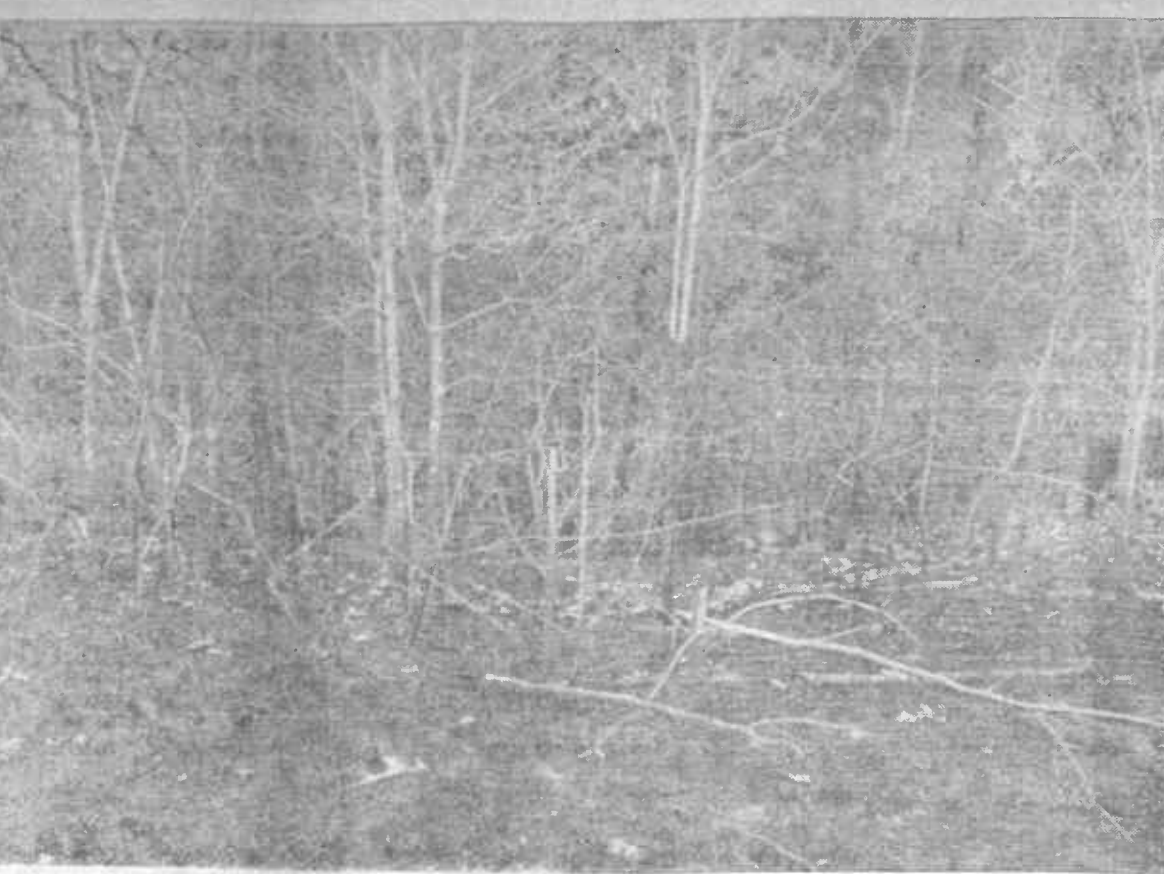

County Agent News

By W. C. Hamilton Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension Service

If no grass or other forage is available in your fields and pastures it will be best to confine drouth stricken animals in a dry, well-drained lot where they will not waste energy searching for feed. Too, such confinement will make emergency feeds go farther and will protect short grass from tramping.

Salt and water must be available to cattle. Easy access to water is especially important. A steep boggy banked pool is a good place to lose weak cattle.

Shelter will prevent chilling and help conserve body heat; this is especially important to thin animals on short rations.

Animals in fair condition need only be fed enough to maintain body weight. Very thin animals need enough feed to offset loss in weight caused by giving birth. Flesh that can be kept on animals in good condition in the Fall will save feed before Spring or after calving. The best feed should be saved for use at calving time.

Young bred heifers that are to calve in the Spring should be fed separately. Animals that lose weight but stay strong can be expected to drop calves of normal weight but these calves will not grow normally and the dam is not likely to re-breed unless she gets good feed at calving time.

Practically any kind of hay, fodder or roughage may be fed as long as it is supplemented with one to three pounds of cottonseed meal or cake and two to five pounds of legume hay. Good quality legume hays contain enough protein and calcium and can be used as the sole feed for drouth stricken animals if the supply permits.

As long as a cow gets as much as two pounds of cottonseed cake or four pounds of alfalfa hay or five pounds of top grade leafy lespedeza hay each day plus a reasonable fill of eight to 14 pounds of other roughage material, they should maintain their weights.

age drops may result in an increased electrical bill and reduced service. In many cases re-wiring and distribution of the electrical load over a number of circuits has resulted in a decreased electric bill and improved service.

December is the time to prepare land for planting Dallis and lespedeza. Planting should be done next March. However, where land is likely to be too wet to drill Dallis in March, the Dallis can be planted now and the lespedeza sown on top of the ground in March.

December is also a good time to go over all pastures and study them. If you have clover or legumes in oats or wheat, plan to graze this area until April 1 to 15, then cut the next growth for hay or silage.

This should be followed with temporary grazing of sudan or millet, or sorghum for silage.

If there is no clover or legume in the cereal, plan to move your stock March 1; re-tilt, plant lespedeza and cut a hay crop or get grazing from the lespedeza. If lespedeza is not planted you can plant temporary grazing, silage or grain sorghum, or just fallow the land for Fall planting.

Study your Spring clover areas and to get grass in it so bloat won't be so bad. You can plan to nitrate ryegrass, oats, wheat or fescue in clover in early March with 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen.

Plan to graze clovers heavily during March, April and May.

Look over your summer pastures. If you overgrazed last summer, plan to put more land in Dallis, lespedeza and Bermuda. Remember, you can't work all the land in row crops; pasture is the best soil saving crop to plant; and pastures help balance the farm program and divide the labor load so that some money can be made all during the year.

Tree Planting Time Is Here

By K. L. Busby, Area Forester

We are reminded by the brown leaves on the trees that they have stopped growing again and that it is the season of the year to plant trees.

Where are you going to plant your trees? If you are an out-right tree farmer and have no interest in other crops, the question of where to plant shouldn't bother you. You will plant trees on any land that won't seed in naturally. Your objective is to get every acre fully stocked with the kind of trees that will bring in the best return.

But if you are interested in other farm crops, then this question of where to plant trees is a little harder to decide. Naturally you want to put each acre of land to its most profitable use. Your best land should be reserved for crops such as cotton, small grains, hay, pastures, etc. If there is any doubt in your mind about planting trees on a particular area call on your Soil Conservationist, Mr. Hiram A. Jones, your County Agent, Mr. W. C. Hamilton or one of the other agriculture workers in the county for advice.

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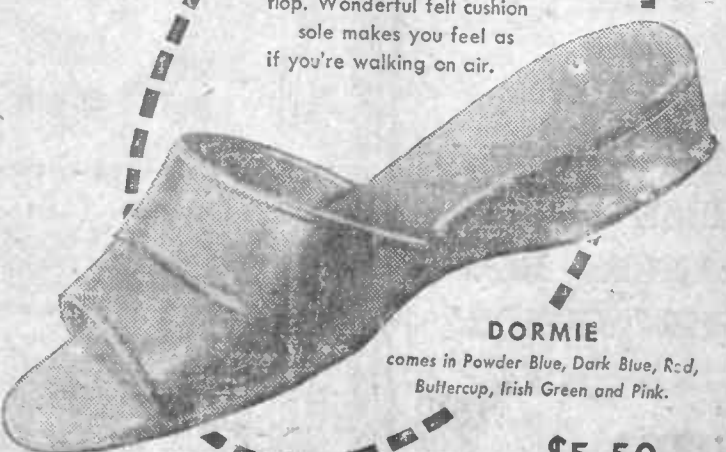
