Gov. Carroll Gartin Announces His Candidacy For United States Senator

Gov. Carroll Gartin who is popular in this section of the state is this week making announcement of his candidacy for United States Senator from Mississippi. He is seeking the office now held by Senator Jim Eastland. Mr. Gartin made the following statement to this newspaper:

"I am seriously considering the honor for several months, I have decided to become a candidate for the United States Senate in the Democratic primary to be held in August, 1954. This decision has not been hurriedly made, but is based on a careful and thoughtful analysis of the present political situation and a sincere desire to be of further and greater service to the people of Mississippi."

"As a private citizen, as a soldier in the United States Army, as Mayor of Laurel and as your Lieutenant Governor, I have devoted myself to public service. I come before the people of Mississippi in this important position with a sincere belief that there is an ever present need for men of vigor, honor and integrity in Government. I will, in my private, aggressive, and clean campaign, let my views on domestic and foreign problems be known to the people of Mississippi."

I like people. I know Mississippi intimately, from the grass roots to the highest level of our society. I think I know what they want and expect of their representatives in the United States Congress. My service in the Army gave me an excellent opportunity to see and live with the peoples of other nations in which the United States has placed its economic and military support as a frontier against communism. This experience, I feel, is a valuable background on which I can draw as the Congress considers American foreign policy.

The office of United States Senator is a high and honorable position. One who aspires to it should, first of all, want to serve as Senator, and if elected, appreciate it enough to stay on the job. The issues facing the American people are many and are serious. They require more than part time consideration. I sincerely want to serve the people of Mississippi as one of their Senators and I will devote my full time and attention to the duties of the office.

Our State is large and has varied interests. Many people cannot visit their Senators in Washington. When Congress is not in session, I shall make frequent visits to all sections of the state in order that I can better know the thinking of those who represent.

I fully respect the ability of Mississippians to select their own public officials. If I am elected, I will not directly or indirectly attempt to influence the election of other officials. With the exception of voting, I will positively leave the election of all other Mississippi officials to the good judgement of the voters of our state.

I am 40 years of age, and as I enter this race, I offer to the people of Mississippi, my vitality, capabilities, and my faith in the destiny of our state and nation. I have no affiliations or connections which would cause me to be partial or unfair in my decisions on Legislation affecting our State and Nation. I can and will cooperate fully with the other members of the Mississippi Congressional Delegation in an effort to work and to serve all the people of Mississippi. I earnestly solicit and will be forever grateful for the help and support of all Mississippians.

Job Open At Burnsville Post Office

The U. S. Civil Service Commission, Atlanta, Georgia, announces an open competitive examination for the position of substitute clerk in the 3rd-class Post Office, Burnsville, Mississippi.

Applications will be accepted from persons who reside within the delivery of the post office named or who are bona fide patrons of such office. Persons employed in the post office will be considered bona fide patrons of the office.

The beginning basic rate of pay for substitute is \$1.365 per hour. Applicants must have reached their eighteenth birthday, but must not have passed their fiftieth birthday on the date of filing applications. These age limits do not apply to persons entitled to veteran preference.

How to apply: application card form 5000-AB, properly executed, must be filed with the Fifth U. S. Civil Service Regional Office, Atlanta 3, Georgia. This form may be obtained from the Postmaster at the 3rd-class Post Office, Burnsville, Mississippi.

No one was too poor or too degraded but was touched by her sympathy and understanding. Of her, it could be said, "She hath done what she could."

Services were conducted Tuesday morning by her Tupelo pastor, Rev. Jeff Cunningham, assisted by Rev. G. R. Meaders, pastor of Iuka Methodist church and Rev. J. H. Holder.

She leaves one daughter, Miss Martha Frances Allen of New York, national director of Camp Fire Girls and two sons, William Henry Allen and Sam H. Allen, Jr., and three grandchildren all of Tupelo.

Among the out of town relatives and friends who attended the funeral were Robert Jackson of Memphis, Ward Prather of Baldwin, Simon Rubel of Corinth and many others whose names could not be learned.

Burial was in Iuka cemetery by the side of her husband Sam H. Allen who died several years ago.

Street Paving Is Greatest Improvement In Iuka In Past Year; Over Five Miles

As 1953 comes to a close it is well to look back and check on the improvements that have come our way during the year. Possibly the most notable in our community is the paving program that did not get underway until late in the last half of the year.

Because of the persistence of a small group living on Main and Pearl streets the program was finally started. After it got underway seemingly everyone in the corporation wanted to get in on the improvement program.

According to an estimate made by this writer and an official of the paving company there are 5.15 miles of newly paved streets in the town. And on Tuesday, when the check was made it was most apparent that the paving was paying off for on that day there was plenty of water everywhere and had the streets not been paved we would have been driving around in slosh and mud.

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen are to be commended upon their spirit of cooperation and willingness to do the best job possible for the citizenry. We know that it would have been possible for them to have refused to go along on the paving. But they did not choose to be aggravating. Instead each one of them offered their services wholeheartedly and as a result we have more smooth streets than we could have had otherwise.

The newly paved streets have been inspected by a licensed engineer and his report is that the job is as good as could be expected for the amount of money expended.

There is yet to be paved about a half mile of streets on which the necessary petitions have been circulated, resolutions passed and advertising completed. Mr. W. A. Ramsey who is doing the paving says that these streets will be completed as soon as the weather permits.

Farmers Adapt New Scientific Methods For Greater Yield; Better Living

During the past 20 years, while world population has increased 25 percent, world food production has inched up a scant five percent. Yet in the United States, with an 18 per cent increase in population in the same period, food production has leaped ahead by 50 per cent.

The story of how modern technology—science and the farmer teamed together—has accomplished this American agricultural miracle is told in a fascinating picture-filled booklet, "The Story of Agricultural Chemicals," which is being distributed today by the Du Pont Company. It is the latest in the "This Is Du Pont" series.

While every American has the output of 7.4 acres of land each year to fill his food requirements, a Japanese, for instance, has the fruits of less than a quarter-acre; the book points out. Still more important, a veritable revolution in farming methods, stemming from new farm machines, modern organic chemicals which lay low the farmer's traditional enemies in nature, and improved varieties of plants and breeds of livestock, has made those American acres pay off in a steady, dependable stream.

As American farmers adapt new scientific development to their operations, a new-found freedom is also being felt throughout rural areas, the booklet shows. Better working conditions, higher living standards, and more leisure for farm workers and owners alike are changing the appearance of both farm and homes and country towns.

"The massive thrust of technology, not social protest," it is shown, "has brought to the American farm its vast productivity and fruitfulness." Where, in Colonial times, 85 per cent of the population were farmers, food producers today represent only about 12 per cent of our population. Advances in the science and techniques of agriculture have freed larger and larger segments of the population to use their skills in other fields.

In today's unsettled world, over-population is a threat which many authorities consider a far greater hazard to humanity than the atom and hydrogen bombs combined. Each year, the human race is being increased by approximately 18,000,000 newcomers.

NATIONAL PARK CHANGES RECOMMENDED

Reorganization of the National Park Service in Washington and the field is under way, based on recommendations of a management survey group, Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay announced.

The recommendations are directed at improvements in the organization, policies and management of the Service to make the resources of the Park Service more effectively meet current needs.

The plan will place greater responsibility on field officials and remove from Washington routine work and technical supervision now being carried on there. To strengthen this delegation of responsibility, the field organization has been expanded from four regional offices to six offices.

Tuberculosis Patient Tells Story Of Rehabilitation Program Offered

Wayne Randall, pictured above, is from Iuka, Mississippi in Tishomingo County. He is recovering from tuberculosis in the Mississippi Sanatorium. He warns all the people of Tishomingo County that they must learn to protect themselves from this terrible disease. Tuberculosis can also be prevented but each person must be aware of the dangers they face every day in contracting this disease. A yearly chest X-ray is the best means of being sure that you do not have tuberculosis. Wayne did not dream that he might have TB. He was a high school freshman doing all the things a high school student en-

joys. He had a chest X-ray when the mobile X-ray bus stopped near his school in order to take advantage of the services offered him. When the X-ray showed that he did have tuberculosis, he went immediately to the Sanatorium. He has now been there two years but is making good progress and hopes to be home soon.

There have been many changes in Wayne's life since he contracted tuberculosis. It was necessary that he go to bed when he reached the Sanatorium for many months. The days seemed long for at first he was not able to sit up at all. Later, he was allowed out of bed a few hours each day and finally, he was allowed to walk around. He had to give up all his usual activities but fortunately, when he got better, he was able to continue high school through the bedside school program offered at the sanatorium. When he is completely well and goes home, he expects to finish high school. After he graduates, he will train for a vocation which will not be to strenuous for his health under the vocational rehabilitation program tuberculosis patients.

Tuberculosis is not a disease that can be cured in a short time. However, when Wayne returns home, no one need be afraid that they will catch tuberculosis from him.

The doctors who release patients from a TB hospital know when they send them home that they are well and will not spread the disease. The ex-TB patient is the only person you know who you can be sure is not spreading TB. The members of the family of a TB patient are X-rayed at regular intervals to be sure that they are free from TB. The ex-TB patient can take up a normal life after they have been cured but they must always rest a lot and take excellent care of themselves. All the residents of this county will welcome Wayne upon his return home and will be pleased to say that he won out over tuberculosis.

Many people in this area have not been so lucky. Every year there are some people who die in this county from tuberculosis. They wait too late before they discover they have tuberculosis. Every year more new cases of TB are being discovered in this county. Are you safe from tuberculosis? Are you sure? Have you had a chest X-ray in the last year?

The Tishomingo County Tuberculosis Association is working harder and harder each year to help eventually stamp out tuberculosis. The tuberculosis association has helped make possible the mobile X-ray buses which come through our county and offer you a free chest X-ray. The tuberculosis association has helped to finance the research which has brought forth the new treatments for this terrible disease. They have also helped many patients to learn a new trade so that they may be self supporting when they are well again and the Tuberculosis Association is constantly working to educate the people of our community in better ways of health and to teach the prevention and control of tuberculosis. Look up your Christmas Seals which you received in the mail and send your contribution in immediately.

Let's be sure that we won't have to let others go through what Wayne has gone through. Let's all work together and make every home safe from tuberculosis.

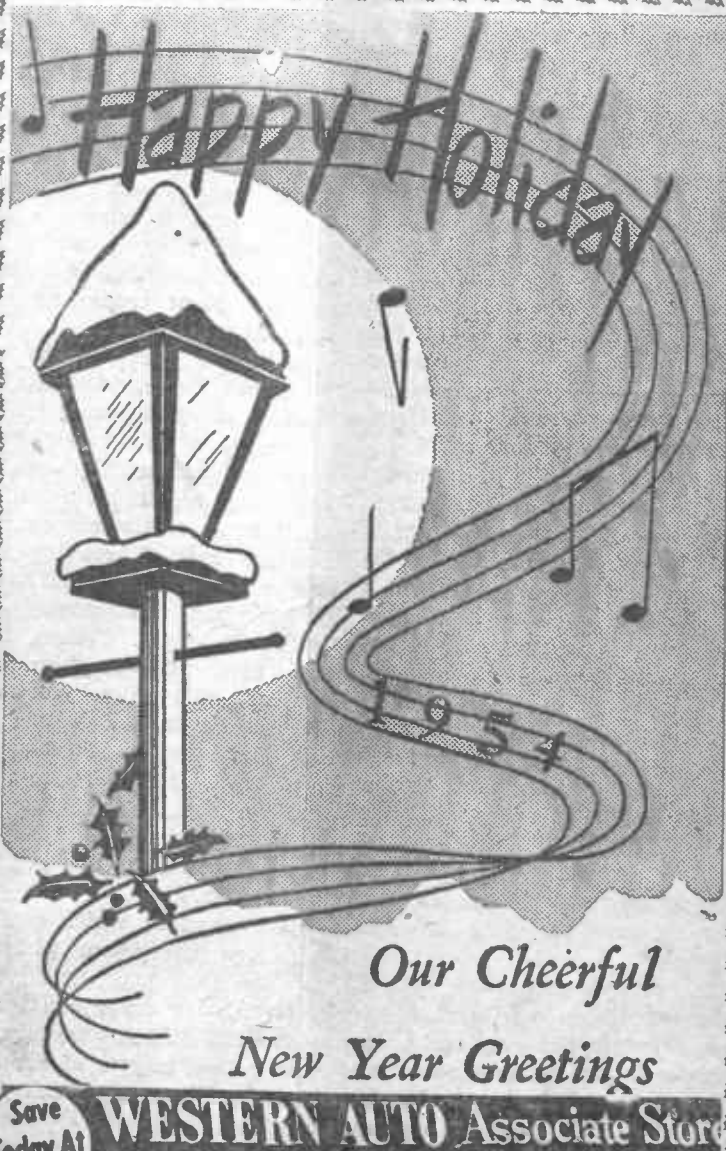

County Agent News

For highest cotton yields in 1954, farmers had better start planning their crop right now. A good way to begin is to select the land on which you are going to plant your cotton.

It should be the very best cotton land on your farm—deep, well-drained soil with a fair amount of organic matter. If you planted cotton there last year, go out and cut the stalks. If the land is subject to erosion, leave them on top of the ground as a mulch; if not, plow them under. Test your soil for fertilizer needs and plan to apply the indicated amount. Make sure that you are going to have enough

pure cotton seed, not more than two years from breeder of one of the recommended varieties; enough insecticide and labor to make the crop.

For best results follow the extension recommended "seven steps to more cotton, more money." Your county agent has these recommendations and will be glad to give them to you.

Decayed cotton and corn stalks from a good crop will add the equivalent of about \$10 worth of fertilizer to each acre of soil.

Farmers should cut these stalks, along with grass and weeds so that decay will take

place before planting time next year. If cut now and left on top of the ground, the stalks will help prevent erosion caused by winter rains.

The cut stalks also add organic matter to the soil making it hold moisture better and work easier. The organic matter also makes added commercial fertilizers more easily available to the plants.

Study during December what happened to the pastures this past summer and whether there was a feed program on your farm to supplement the pastures when they were down. Most pastures were overgrazed because of the drought, but many were seriously overgrazed because there was not enough area in pastures this summer. One of the best things you can do in December will be to plan next year's pasture program. Since we put our pasture program on an investment income basis, the amount of land in pastures is not what really counts. It is the amount we make from land that counts. I think that we need more acres in that we need more acres in summer pastures.

Make your farm machinery last. Before storing for the winter check the service all farm machines and replace all worn or broken parts. Store all machinery having wooden parts and delicate instruments in a dry shed and protect it from animals.

Drain water out of radiators and cylinder blocks on tractors and other power unit implements. Put heavy grease or rust preventative on plows and other tools with land-polishing surfaces. If storage space is scarce these tools may be placed outside on concrete blocks or floors.

For longer life, clean and paint machinery.

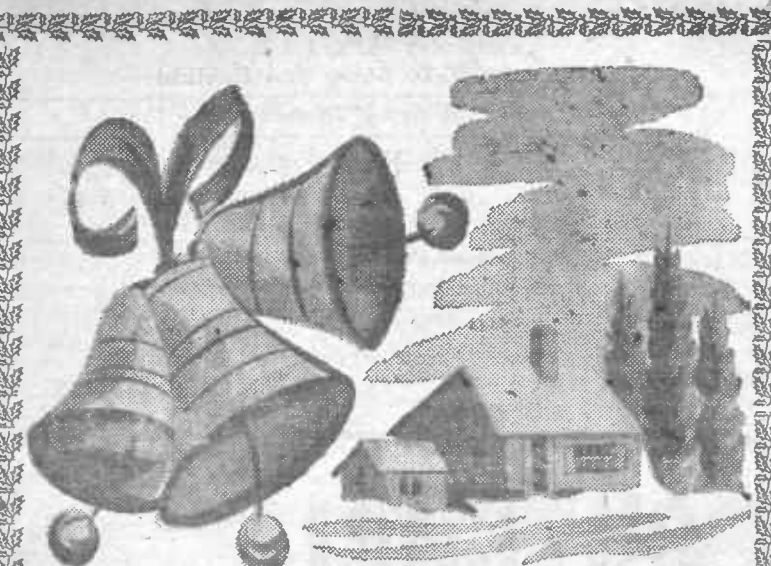

STATE COLLEGE MAKES PROGRESS
EVEN FOR AVIATION IN 75 YEARS

An illustrious Confederate son who served as the first president of what is now Mississippi State College might well be proud today of some of the achievements of the institution which he helped to launch 75 years ago this year.

Stephen D. Lee, a distinguished lieutenant general of the Confederate Army, was elected to the post by the first Board of Trustees on December 13, 1878, and governed the campus successfully for 14 years.

On this Diamond Jubilee year General Lee might well be surprised at the growth and progress of the college and the many new services it is rendering. He most certainly would be amazed over the work of one department in a field which didn't exist in his time.

For in addition to its many other services in the field of agriculture and engineering, Mississippi State today has an Aerophysics Department which has in recent years made valuable contributions to the aviation industry, accomplishments which are gaining even more attention outside Mississippi than from within the state.

The principles developed from experiments by this department are today being applied to make the aircraft more economical and efficient for the Armed Services, an accomplishment which undoubtedly would appeal to the military minded first president.

The Legislature in 1878 voted to establish the Mississippi Agricultural and Mechanical College under the Morrill Land Grant Act, under which the Federal Government donated to each state public land script equal to 30,000 acres for each senator and representative of that state in Congress.

This trust was for the endowment, support and maintenance of at least one college to include along with other scientific or classical studies, military tactics, agricultural subjects and mechanical arts.

On December 13, 1878, the Board of Trustees selected 860 acres adjoining Starkville as the site for the college.

General Lee was succeeded in 1899 by Ex-Governor John M. Stone. After the latter's death in 1900, J. C. Hardy presided over the growth of the institution during 12 eventful and sometimes stormy years.

George H. Hightower followed Hardy; then came W. H. Smith, formerly state superintendent of education; Dr. David C. Hull of Meridian, an alumnus; Dr. B. M. Walker, an alumnus; Hugh Critz, an alumnus; Dr. George Duke Humphrey, now president of the University of Wyoming; Dr. Fred T. Mitchell; and now President Ben Hilburn.

All made their contributions to the development of the college, but the greatest expansion of the physical plant occurred under Lee, Hardy, Humphrey, and Mitchell.

During Dr. Mitchell's administration, 1945-53, the college library was moved into a new million dollar air-conditioned building. Other important buildings added since the war include Patterson Engineering Laboratories, Dairy Industries Building, Dairy Production Plant, Agricultural Engineering Building, Gymnasium, Poultry Plant, enlargement of greenhouses, enlargement of Veterinary Science Building, Moore Hall, Briscoe Hall, Carpenter Hall, Walker Hall, Garner Hall.

The new Animal Husbandry Service Building, with an amphitheater with a seating capacity of 4,000, was officially opened and dedicated April 28. An extensive remodeling of Lee Hall, badly damaged by fire in 1948, has made it a much better building than ever before.

In addition, under President Mitchell, a new laundry was built to replace the one destroyed by fire. The Textile Building was extensively remodeled to provide accommodations for the Plant

Maintenance Department, and for the Regional Seed Research Laboratory.

The old GM&O depot has been remodeled to serve as headquarters for the Mississippi Seed Improvement Association. A small observatory has been constructed for the use of astronomy students, and numerous walks, roads, and parking areas have greatly increased the capacity and convenience of the campus. Expert landscaping has enhanced the natural beauty of the campus.

Two faculty apartments have been added, the West Stadium has been enlarged and the East Stadium built. Fourteen temporary structures were erected in 1946 to provide additional classrooms, laboratories, and offices. Temporary living facilities for students constructed in 1946 included 100 trailers, 176 one-family units in the West Side Apartments, and several buildings in the Depot Apartments. In the latter there are now 29 units, some of them used by staff members.

This unprecedented post-war expansion was necessary to accommodate returning war veterans, who pushed campus enrollment past the 3,500 mark.

The faculty has been enlarged and strengthened; the research in business and engineering as well as in agriculture; and the services of the Experiment Station and Extension Service expanded to reach every section of the state. It has been estimated that the services of the college now reach 82 per cent of the families in the state.

The Business Research Station, the Engineering and Industrial Research Station, the ROTC, the State Plant Board, the State Chemical Regulatory Laboratory, the Petroleum Laboratory, the Seed Improvement Association, the Seed Testing Laboratory, the Regional Seed Research Laboratory, Cooperative Creamery Association, Mississippi Artificial Breeders Cooperative, Veterans Farm Training Teaching Aids

Library, Adult Education classes and correspondence courses—all of these represent agencies and services associated with the college.

At the opening of the 1952-53 session, enrollment was slightly more than 12 per cent higher than for the previous year, freshman enrollment was 44 per cent higher than the previous year, and Mississippi State College had the largest number of resident students in attendance of any institution of higher learning in the state.

The summer programs for youth groups had the largest attendance on record in 1952. The number of people who visited the campus for the 189 short courses and the conferences during the year reached approximately 50,000. These people came from every state in the nation and from 15 foreign countries.

The 1952 Legislature conditionally appropriated funds for the construction of a chemical engineering building, the first of three proposed units for chemistry-related uses.

The American Hotel Institute, a national program of adult education for hotel employees, has been established with headquarters on the campus. The college seed laboratory last year was designated as the Southern Regional Seed Laboratory.

The Rust Foundation Trust Fund to provide scholarships has been established with grants thus far totaling \$20,000. Scholarship Day has been established as an annual event to honor those students who have demonstrated outstanding scholarship ability.

Two books have been published about the college and its leaders during this anniversary year: one, a biography of the late, great Dr. William Flowers Hand by Ben Hilburn; and the other, a history of the college by Dr. John K. Bettersworth, head of the department of history and government.

With three quarters of a century behind it, the college is looking ahead to even greater service.

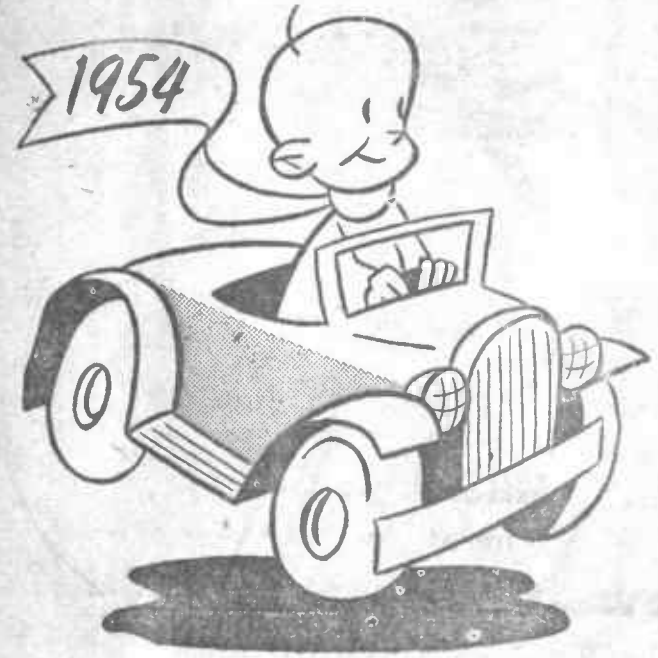

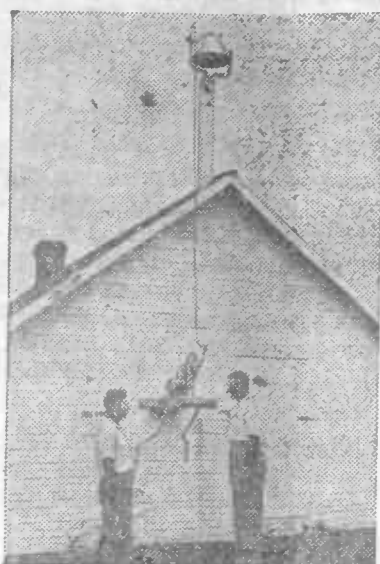

Farmers Amaze City Cousins...

Here's How They Put Ingenuity to Work

The resourcefulness and ingenuity
of farm people never cease to amaze
their city cousins. Talk to urban
dwellers about electrical applications

on the farm and they'll counter with
statements about the versatility of
farmers. Well, farmers are versatile
and the things they've made elec-
tricity do for them often surprise
even the electrical industry.

For the fun of it, let's "roam" around
the country and record Mr. Kilowatt
at work under some unusual circum-
stances. An Oregon farmer makes his

irrigation sprinklers perform double
duty. They water and fertilize his
pastures at the same time. River
water for the irrigation system is
pumped into a 200-gallon steel stor-
age tank in his fertilizer storage
house. Sacked nitrogen is dumped
into the tank where it is dissolved
and then pumped back through the
sprinkler system to his pasture.

In Pennsylvania, a farm family,
partial to the old and the new ways
of life—and wanting to combine both
—electrified their dinner bell. An
electric motor rings the bell, with
controls for it located in the house as
well as at the power source.

Heat for curing and storing yams
is a tough problem in some southern
states. However, one Georgia farmer
found the answer by building a 30x40
curing house of jumbo brick tile;
flooding the structure with concrete,
and then installing four 4,500-watt
forced-air space heaters to dry his
6,000 bushel crop. Electric conveyors
shift the heavy baskets of yams
around the building.

Bee keepers have their difficulties,
too, particularly when it comes to
increasing their colonies. In Califor-
nia, farmers are raising bees with
electric bee brooders. The devices
consist of an aluminum plate con-
taining nickel chromium wire. Hive-
equipped brooders are connected in
series and controlled by a master
switch. Thermostats keep the tem-
perature at the required levels. And,
speaking of ingenuity, an Illinois
farmer made a combination sprayer
and cow currier out of old vacuum
cleaner parts. He attaches a hose and
bottle of disinfectant where the dust
bag used to be to fashion the brush
on the hose and attaches it to the
suction end of the cleaner mechanism.

Keeping Pecans

With a record yield of pecans
this year, chances are that you
will have a supply to carry over
from the holiday season well into
this year. That is, if you make
your plans to keep them at their
best in flavor and crispness.

Pecans, like other nuts, keep
better in the shell than shelled,
and better at a cold than a warm
temperature. Cold keeping is
especially important for shelled
pecans to prevent rancidity. The
high oil content makes them very
perishable.

In the shell pecans will keep
two to three months at ordinary
room temperature before showing
a rancid flavor. Tests show that
after three months at 70 degrees
F., their flavor changes so much
that they are "barely acceptable."

In a tight container at 32 de-
grees F. or colder, shelled pecans
keep well for six months to a
year.

Pecans can be canned, but an
easier, better way is to put them
in moisture-vapor-resistant bags
or other containers and store them
in home freezers or freezer lock-
ers. There they will be protected
for as long as a year against
rancidity and will also be safe
against moisture which makes
them tough or even moldy, against
absorbing odors and flavors
from other foods, against insect
damage.

You may obtain directions for
canning or freezing pecans from
your home agent's office.

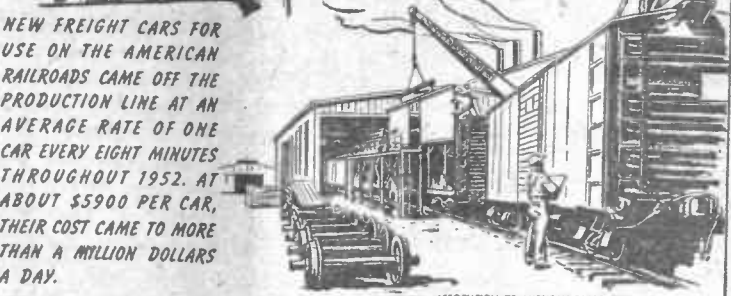
