Mammoth Parade to be Staged Fri. Prior To Queen Of Forest Contest Aug. 13th

Plans are almost complete for a mammoth parade, depicting forests and forestry products, to be staged Friday, August 13, in the three major towns in Tishomingo county. This parade will be the prelude to the colorful Queen of Forest contest that is to be held in Tishomingo high school auditorium Friday night, August 13, 8 o'clock.

From 20 to 25 floats pertaining to forestry or some phase of it will be in the parade which will originate in Iuka at 11:00 a.m. Planned schedule calls for the parade to be in Tishomingo at 12:05 p.m., and in Belmont at 12:50 p.m.

At 2:00 p.m. in Belmont a field demonstration will be presented of the Little Beaver girdling machine and demonstrations of other machines including chain saws will be held. The demonstrations will require about two hours' time.

Opening Date For Iuka School

Supt. H. L. Shook announces this week that the Iuka schools will open on Friday, August 27 for organizational work. Regular schedule will commence on Monday morning, August 30.

Mr. Shook also announces that students entering the first grade must have a birth certificate with which to verify the child's age. "The birth certificate for first graders is an absolute must," he stated.

Tishomingo County Farm Bureau now has 450 Members; Largest Number In History

The 450 active members enrolled in the Tishomingo County Farm Bureau helped to achieve a new all-time record for the statewide farmer organization for the second consecutive year.

The 46,125 members enrolled in the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation tops the record of 46,092 established last year.

The accomplishment was made possible by the tireless efforts of County Farm Bureau presidents, members of the boards of directors of County Farm Bureaus, membership committee members and workers. Official recognition was given by Boswell Stevens, president of the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation, members of the State Farm Bureau board of directors, and D. H. Echols, organization director

of the State Farm Bureau. The Farm Bureau membership work which was done in Tishomingo County was given special recognition by Talmadge Finch, of Tishomingo, President of the Tishomingo County Farm Bureau. This will mean much to the legislative, educational and social betterment of the people of the county, state and nation, he said. The accomplishments of Farm Bureau in these three fields of endeavor and the services which the privilege of voluntary membership provides helped enroll many new members this year, he reported.

Forty one counties had more membership this year than last year. Tishomingo county was listed among the 33 counties exceeding quotas in the membership drive.

WORK PROGRESSING ON FAIR GROUNDS, BUILDINGS; COUNTY FAIR WILL BE HELD SEPT. 22, 23, 24, 25

Work is progressing nicely on Tishomingo County's new fair grounds and buildings, according to W. C. Hamilton, county agent. With volunteer labor and under the supervision of extension and fair association officials, the livestock exhibit barn was started on Monday, July 26. Today it is practically completed and the exhibit building has been started. All the buildings should be finished within another two weeks.

Tishomingo county fair will be held this year on September 22, 23, 24, and 25 and it is expected to be the biggest and best ever held in the county. With the purchase of the fair grounds and erection of buildings exhibitors will have a much better opportunity to display their wares and to keep them on display longer with less damage. Farmers, farm wives, 4-H club boys and girls and FFA and FHFA boys and girls are urged to start planning now the exhibits they will show this fall in the fair.

The livestock exhibit barn is of standard size for this type building being 56x70 feet in area. The exhibit building will be 40x50 feet which is also standard size for this type of fair structure.

Bollworm
Examination for bollworm eggs on cotton should be started when most of the corn silks in the area begin to dry, or at the time bollworms usually appear. Examinations should be repeated every 5 days if possible thereafter until the crop has matured.

While walking diagonally across the field, examine 100 main-stem terminals (about 3 to 4 inches of the top of the plants) for eggs and worms. If eggs are found on the terminals and 4 or 5 small larvae in the small squares or on the tender top leaves, the infestation is sufficiently heavy to start treatment. Insecticides should be applied at 5-day intervals as long as necessary.

To determine injury, inspect 100 bolls and 100 squares while

walking diagonally across the field and compute the percentage of injury for each. The boll-injury record is the most indicative of existing or occurring damage. In an alternative method of estimating bollworm damage make observations while walking diagonally across a field. The degree of injury may be recorded as follows:

None, if no damage is observed. Light, if only a few squares and bolls show injury. Medium, if injured squares and bolls are readily noticeable over most of the field. Heavy, if many injured squares and bolls are noticed over the field.

Hay Saving

Not just hay, but quality hay is vital to a successful dairy program. Farmers can do a better job of handling and curing and have a better quality hay.

Don't let your hay crop get too far into maturity before cutting it. Then don't let it lie in the mow or swath until it is matted by the sun and loses its green color and leaves.

Service lespedeza should be cut when it reaches around 15 to 16 inches. It should be left two or three hours in the mow or swath, then raked into windrows and either baled or hauled in the next day.

Dairy

Mississippi dairymen have some obstacles to overcome before they can make dairying as profitable here as it is in some of the older dairy production states of the mid-west. They must consider dairying as a business. They must pay closer attention to details. A complete set of individual cow records is necessary. However, to be of any use, these records must be used in planning the dairying business. The best records are of no help to the farmer unless they are used.

Cows must have better care. They must be protected from winter rains and winds. Cows need shade and plenty of fresh water in the summertime. They must be protected from flies and other external and internal parasites.

Good pastures and top quality hay and silage are a must if the dairy business is going to be successful.

Public Notice

A public hearing will be held at the Administration Building at the Crystal Springs Branch Experiment Station, August 13, at 2 p.m., to hear any protests against prohibiting the transportation or sale of out-of-state grown tomato plants or seedlings in Mississippi.

Any person interested in protesting such action by the State Plant Board is urged to be present in person at the hearing.

The action is being taken by the Plant Board because "late blight", a serious disease of tomatoes was introduced into Mississippi this year through the sale of South Florida grown tomato plants.

Farm Safety

Farm Safety Week is over, but the need for safe living is never over. Make safety your watch word. Remember, the hot weather normally last a couple of months longer. Take it easy and avoid heat exhaustion or sunstroke. Both of these are extremely dangerous.

The summer days and nights would be miserable indeed for most of us without our electric fans, wouldn't they?

Whatever the type or size of your fan, you must keep it clean and oiled for it to give the best service. Follow the manufacturer's instructions. There is little about a fan to get out of order if you keep it clean and oiled.

Avoid falls or bumps that might bend the fan blades or the guard. When cleaning the fan blades, be careful not to spring or bend them.

Be sure the fan is disconnected from the convenience outlet when you clean or oil it and not just turned to "off". It is so easy to hit the switch and turn it "on," which could cause a serious accident.

The places to lubricate small portable fans are at the end of the motor. Some fans have one place; others two places. When fans are used continuously each day: Use 1 or two drops daily if one hole is provided. Use two or three drops weekly if two oil cups or holes are provided. If the fan has wick oilers, fill the cups with light grade of cup grease once a year.

Care of Stiffened Petticoats

Fashion history is repeating itself. Again the ladies are wearing full skirts over stiffened petticoats. And with this style comes the problem of laundering the petticoats to keep them stiff.

Look on the label on your crinoline petticoat. If it says "permanent", go ahead and wash it—gently. Squeeze mild suds through the petticoat, rinse well, and roll in a turkish towel.

If the hem is particularly soiled, go over it with a soft brush. Don't use a chlorine bleach. It

may weaken permanently stiffened fabrics.

Starch it if it begins to wilt after laundering. One starching may last for several washings, if done properly. When completely dry, dip it in starch. Gently squeeze out the excess starch and shape carefully.

Iron with a moderately hot iron when slightly damp. If the iron sticks, it's too hot, or the crinoline is too damp.

If the crinoline is not permanent or there is no label that says whether it is or not, ask the clerk for washing instructions. Crinoline that isn't permanent, must be starched after each washing.

Always wash nylon taffeta petticoats by hand. Use a soap—not a detergent, and let it drip dry. Don't wring it out at all—don't even squeeze out the excess moisture. Just lift it out of the last rinse water, hang it up and let it drip. It will keep its

shape best that way.

Peanut Butter Muffin Mix

(Makes 8 dozen)

1 cup shortening, 2½ cups peanut butter, 6 cups rolled oats, 8 cups sifted enriched flour, 1½ cups sugar, 3 tablespoons salt, 7 tablespoons baking powder.

Sift together flour, sugar, salt

and baking powder. Add shortening and peanut butter, and chop thoroughly with pastry blender. Add rolled oats and mix well. Store in a cool place to keep peanut butter and shortening (if hard) from growing rancid.

Peanut Butter Muffins

(Using mix—1 dozen)

2-¾ cups mix, 1 egg, 1¼ cups milk.

Beat egg and milk together. Add this gradually to the mix, stirring as little as possible. Bake in muffin tins at 400 degrees F. for 25 minutes.

Annual Meeting Of Tupelo P C A To Be Held Aug. 13

The Annual Meeting of the stockholders of the Tupelo Production Credit Association will be held in Tupelo, at the Lyric Theatre, Friday, August 13, 10 o'clock a.m., as announced today by M. C. Dougherty, Secretary-Treasurer.

The stockholders from the thirteen counties of Northeast Mississippi will convene to hear the financial report of the secretary-treasurer, to elect two directors and to transact other

A. & I. BOARD REPORT SHOWS PROGRESS MADE IN PAST DECADE

Mississippi has outstripped the rest of the nation in economic gains in almost every department in the past decade, a 10-year report of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board shows.

During the period covered in the report, which marks the tenth anniversary of the Board's program to balance agriculture with industry, Mississippi has made tremendous strides industrially, agriculturally and in attracting tourist business.

Per capita income, for instance, has jumped 284 per cent; manufactured product sales have climbed 506 per cent; business volume is up 368 per cent; bank deposits show a 326 per cent gain; cash farm income climbed 125 per cent; livestock production has climbed steadily by 169 per cent; tourist business is up 174 per cent; manufacturing wages have risen by 96 per cent, and effective buying income has soared for a 72 per cent increase.

Industrial Development
Under Mississippi's now famous BAWI law a total of 94 new community financed industrial buildings have been established, and a score of other existing BAWI financed plants have undergone major expansion programs.

In addition to BAWI plants, a total of 247 privately financed manufacturing firms have started operations, and manufacturing employment today is near the 100,000 mark.

Industries which have been attracted to Mississippi under the BAWI law during the past 10 years have contributed through payrolls alone a total of approximately \$300,000,000 which if turned over a normal four times, would amount to \$1,200,000,000. The sales tax from this alone would have contributed at least \$24,000,000, or more than 23 times the total \$1,415,000 appropriated during the 10 years to carry out the manifold activities of the Board since it was established.

Industrial Promotion
In its efforts to develop new industries, the Board not only has worked closely with local communities, but has waged a highly effective national advertising and publicity campaign which has been followed up with direct mail and personal contact approaches. Personal contact trips to every

matter of a business nature. The highlight of the program will be an address by Congressman Thomas G. Abernethy, a member of the Committee on Agriculture, who will bring an informative discussion on agriculture problems of the day.

The Production Credit Association maintains a field office in Iuka and Belmont with William J. Pyle and Olen C. Sheffield in charge, for convenience of members in Tishomingo county.

major industrial area of the nation have been made by the governor, the director, members of his staff and by members of the Agricultural and Industrial Board.

Representatives of various other private, area or local organizations have made similar trips at their own expense to help carry Mississippi's story to the people of the nation. These groups have represented utilities, railroads, chambers of commerce and area associations.

Special emphasis has been placed on such projects as the Import-Export Conference in Jackson, establishment of a New York Information Office, operation of an industrial display in the International Trade Mart in New Orleans, conducting of Small Business Development clinics, and through various other displays prepared for use at fairs, expositions and conventions throughout the nation.

Agricultural Development
The Board has in the decade just past worked closely with all agricultural interests to help develop the farm output and to improve the state's agricultural economy.

The Central Farmers Market, sponsored by the Board, has been in operation for five years and has resulted in a better standardization of products, improved market facilities for farmers, and even in the establishment of a poultry processing plant on the market site in Jackson.

The Board has worked with the State Experiment Stations and the State Extension Service. One particular project in which the Board had a part was the tomato test crop which proved that Mississippi tomatoes make fine catsup.

As a result of a study made by the engineering and research department of the Board, an ammonia plant was established at Yazoo City under provisions of the BAWI law.

The Board has been especially interested in the livestock and poultry industry and has encouraged the location of industries which would process such products.

An extensive program of advertising in trade publications read by processors, plus use of effective publicity, has helped to spur this phase of the Board's efforts to balance agriculture with industry.

As a result, Mississippi has secured valuable free publicity calling attention to these agricultural opportunities. Cash farm income has risen sharply, livestock and poultry production has climbed, and a diversified agricultural economy is being effected.

Tourist Business
Mississippi's tourist business is rapidly becoming one of its biggest money makers. When the A. & I. Board was established in 1944, the state was realizing \$99,382,000 from this source. In 1953 tourists entering the state dropped an estimated \$271,000,000 into cash registers from the Tennessee line to the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

The Board today receives close to 70,000 tourist inquiries annually as a result of its national advertising and publicity program which is conducted in newspapers and magazines throughout the nation.

To help keep the interest of tourist alive, the Board has in the last decade prepared thousands of pieces of attractive literature designed to create a desire on the part of vacationers to visit Mississippi.

To further keep this message before the public, the Board's Travel Department has conducted annual tours for editors of national magazines and newspapers, has participated in innumerable travel shows throughout the nation which have been attended by an estimated 2,000,000 persons, and has provided scores of convention meetings with appropriate displays.

One important phase of the Board's activities has been the annual "Hospitality Month" observance designed to arouse the interest of Mississippi communities to the value of this business and to encourage them to develop their natural attractions and facilities to reap greater harvests through visitors.

In these efforts, the Board has received the excellent cooperation of numerous organizations, including the Mississippi Press Association, the Municipal Officers Association, the Mississippi Outdoor Advertisers Association, the Mississippi Theatre Owners Association, the Mississippi Broadcasters Association, and the various local chambers of commerce.

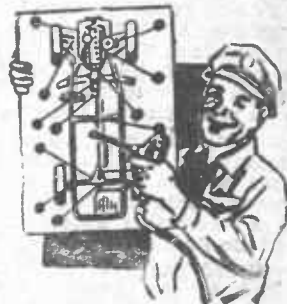

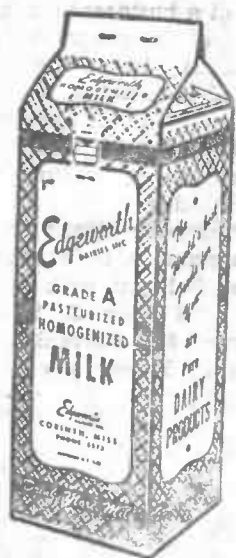

Choosing the Best

Lesson for August 8, 1954

A MAN grows by the choices he makes. This is to say, he grows taller by his right choices, while every wrong choice shrinks his soul. This is true of the physical life. Mrs. Gurney, that well-known lady on TV, one evening at a restaurant ordered cream soup, a large steak, vegetables to match, a sizeable salad, chocolate cake with ice cream on top, — and a slice of melba toast. "I am trying to re-Dr. Foreman duce," she said. The audience laughed, as well they might. Mrs. Gurney will never get thin if the melba toast she eats tops off meals like that one. A woman who can't choose to say NO! to what she knows will make her fat, will always be the wrong size. A boy in school who can't make up his mind to go out for active sports will probably turn to be undersized compared to what he might have been. Our choices make us, or break us.

God's Scale and Ours

It is not only our health and physique, it is our minds and souls too, that grow by right choices, shrink by poor ones. Everybody, whether he has thought about it or not, has a "scale of values." That is, there are some things he prizes more than anything, others for which he has little use. One man will spend his last cent for a rare stamp, another man will give his last cent to missions, a third will leave his last cent at the race track. The writer's grandfather was known to have gone without meals more than once in order to buy certain books. Tell me what you prize most highly and I will tell you what sort of person you are. But what the Christian wants to know is: How does God look at it? A jeweler will not buy gems without first having them appraised by an expert he can trust. Life spreads many a bright sparkling jewel before our eyes; how can we tell the true from the false? How can we tell how to value life unless God appraises it for us? So when Saint Paul, or our Lord himself, tells us what the true values in life are, we are only hurting ourselves if we pay no attention.

All Values Are Real

Jesus' words sharply provoke thought, and he meant it that way. He clearly taught that things do not matter in comparison with greater values such as peace of mind and health of soul. But some people, reading the Sermon on the Mount, have jumped to the conclusion that he meant for Christians to pay no attention at all to food and drink and clothing, that if a Christian concentrates on the kingdom of God he need not give ordinary things a thought. Jesus certainly did not mean to be taken that way. He himself would ask for water when he was thirsty. He was not indifferent to meals; indeed his enemies accused him of eating too much. He did not build up a large wardrobe; but he wore clothes, and sometimes good ones. It is only a poor translation of Jesus' words that makes him say "Take no thought" for food or clothing or for tomorrow. What he said was "Do not be anxious, do not worry" about such things. What he means is clear: Christians should put their greatest energies of thought, interest, planning and action, into the greatest things.

Don't You Want the Best?

"Bad means: choosing a lower value in the presence of a higher." So a modern philosopher (Urban) has said. The tragedy of life is not that men choose cheap things. The tragedy is that they choose cheap things when they might have had better. It is no tragedy to have a high school diploma—on the contrary it is a good thing. But it is a tragedy to have only a high school diploma if you might just as well have gone on to college. It is no tragedy to be a worker on a farm; it is too bad if the tenant might have owned the farm by harder work and better management. It is no tragedy to be a clerk; one can serve God anywhere. But it is a pity before God if a man is content to live and work in some easy corner when he might have gone into God's great service as a minister or a missionary. God's question to every man is not: Did you choose the good? but, Did you choose the best?

BUSINESS ACTIVITY

Business activity during June averaged approximately 1 per cent above May 1954 and June 1953, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College.

Total tax collections for June were 35 per cent greater than May 1954, but 3 per cent below the June 1953 total. Totals were June 1953, \$6,559,675; May 1954, \$4,973,655; and June 1953, \$6,933,347.

The oil severance tax exceeded last month's tax by 3 per cent and June 1953 by 6 per cent. The totals for the comparisons were June 1954, \$431,842; May 1954, \$419,372; and June 1953, \$407,028.

The gas severance tax exceeded the same month in 1953 by 7 per cent. Gas severance collections for the state during June totaled \$52,269.

Timber severance tax collected during June totaled \$20,538. This was 16 per cent below the timber severance tax of the previous month and 8 per cent below June 1953 tax.

The employment situation was relatively unchanged during June. Non - agricultural placements moved downward in both comparisons. Job applications continued to exceed both of the previous month and June 1953.

Nine out of the sixteen trade areas had more business activity during June 1954 than during June of last year. The increases were Clarksdale, 1 per cent; Greenville, 1 per cent; Greenwood, 1 per cent; Hattiesburg, 3 per cent; Jackson, 3 per cent; Laurel, 1 per cent; McComb, 1 per cent; Memphis, 2 per cent; and Pascagoula, 7 per cent.

The Business Research Station's index to general business activity rose nine points during June. It started the month at 123 per cent of the 1947-1949 adjusted average and rose to 132 per cent on June 30.
