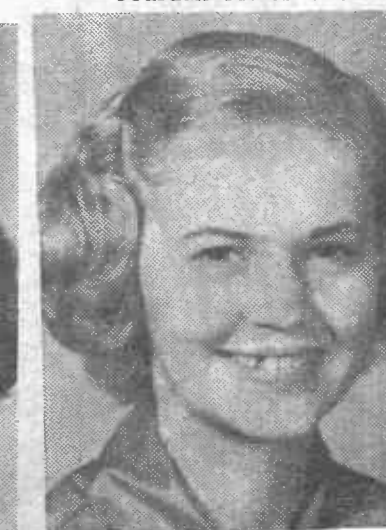

You hung your new white nylon curtains and then just a short while later they looked greyish. Or your plastic upholstery seems to be a constant dust catcher.

Has either or both of these situations happened in your home?

The reason for the dustiness of synthetic or sensitized fibers, as nylon and plastic, is that friction causes static electricity in them. This charge is slightly negative and dust has a positive charge.

Thus, the dust you stir up in a room is attracted to your nylon curtains or your plastic upholstery, just as iron filings go to a magnet.

Most manufacturers of sensitized fibers have now solved this problem by using a permanent anti-static finish.

If you bought nylon curtains before this anti-static finish was developed, you can correct the dust catching in your home by adding a few drops of vinegar to the rinse water when washing the curtains or plastic upholstery. The vinegar acts as an anti-static and will eliminate the attraction of dust.

Bunsters with Cheese and Fish

Combine ingredients, except buns. Mix lightly. Split buns and fill. Wrap in aluminum foil, and bake in a slow oven, 250 degrees F., about 30 minutes, until filling is heated and cheese melts. Serve hot.

The filling for Bunsters may be made with any kind of meat or fish added. The buns may be made, filled, foil-wrapped, and frozen for a week or so, then heated for quick serving when needed.

Ironing Tips

Ironing is a task any time of the year, but particularly during the summer time. To make your job easier and more quickly try:

Rolling clothes loosely when sprinkling. Tight rolling increases wrinkling and ironing time.

Use your tapered board for dresses, skirts, slips and such garments. To speed up ironing of flat pieces and men's shorts, use a padded board about 20 inches wide clamped on top of the regular board.

Carefully fold sheets, bath towels, wash clothes and kitchen towels as they come from the line to cut ironing time.

Iron consecutively all the fabrics that require the same iron temperature.

When ironing a garment that fades, slip a paper cleaning bag over the board to keep the cover spotless.

Medicine Cabinet

Remember what a time you had finding the bandages in the medicine cabinet last time junior cut his foot? And you resolved to clean it out and put things in order. But did you ever get around to it?

If you didn't, see if you can't find time today.

Throw away any medicines

that are old, stale, or out-dated. See that each jar, bottle and box is clearly labeled. Check your first aid supplies, as sterile gauze and cotton, adhesive, a good antiseptic, sterile applicators and remedy for burns.

Place first aid kits in the house, the barn, the farm shop and on the tractors and other pieces of farm equipment.

Peach Tree Care

Peach tree borers can be controlled with DDT, if properly applied at the right intervals.

Here's how. Mix one pound of 50 percent DDT wettable powder with each 12 gallons of water. Spray the trunk and lower parts of large limbs.

Make first application in early August, the second in early September and a third in early October. After using this treatment, go back in late October or November and examine closely the base of trees. If you find any borers, treat the infested tree with tehylene dichloride emulsion.

Poultry

Help out the hens in your laying flock and they will help you. Hens especially need pampering during hot weather. They must have plenty of ventilation and cool fresh water. Only 30 minutes without water on a hot sultry day may mean some hens dead from suffocation.

Summertime management is vital if you are going to make money from your laying flock. If the hens are kept comfortable, give plenty of air, good feed and cool water, they will lay more eggs and make you more money.

Hot weather management pays on broilers too. If you are having trouble getting your broilers to eat during the heat of the day, turning on the lights during the cool of the night. Broilers just won't eat enough when they are hot.

Summer management of layers, replacement pullets or broilers means keep them as cool as possible, provide plenty of good feed and water, and disturb them as little as possible. Try this prescription—it pays.

OATS AND SOIL CONSERVATION

Apparently the value of oats as a grain and soil conserving crop has not been fully appreciated by the farmers of Tishomingo county. To convince oneself of this, it is only necessary to travel a few miles on any road in the county and observe the use farmers are making of their land. Such a study, by anyone, will reveal that farmers are planting acres and acres of corn on upland, fertilizing and working it well, only to have the dry weather and hot sun reduce it to dry fodder, before it produces much if any grain. The one thing lacking to produce corn on most of this land is rain at the right time and in the right amount.

plant to fall pastures crops to the State Soils Testing Laboratory at State College for detailed fertilizer analysis. This will enable you to use enough fertilizer without using more than is profitable.

Buy fall seed early. Oats, wheat, crimson clover, vetch, wild winter peas and ryegrass seed won't get any cheaper nor will they get any more plentiful before planting time.

Make sure that your fallowed land is disked often enough to retain moisture. If you need additional land to fallow, go in after harvesting your silage crops and immediately plow and disk the land for early fall planting.

Fall pasture crops planted on summer fallowed land make quicker growth and better stands.

Hay

Cut your hay before it gets too mature. Then don't let it lie in the swath or windrow until it loses all its good quality. Cut lespedeza in early bloom stage, soybeans when pods form, Johnson grass when first blooms appear, Sericea at 14 inches tall, wild hay meadows when grass begins to seed out, and Sudan or millet when first seed heads show up.

for grain and leaving the land in stubble during summer to protect it from erosion, then plowing it in fall and seeding back to oats. Some are using vetch with their oats and some are planting crimson clover to maintain the nitrogen supply in the land.

The commissioners of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District insist that each acre of our land should be used according to its capabilities and treated accordingly to its need. As work

Compared with May, 1954,
there was an increase of approx-
imately 1 per cent in business
activity during June in the Cor-
inth district, according to the
current issue of the Mississippi
Business Review, monthly pub-
lication of the Business Research
Station of the School of Business
and Industry at Mississippi State

College.

However, compared with June,
1953 there was a decrease of a-
bout one half of one per cent.
Data were very incomplete
outside of Corinth. Booneville re-
ported telephones in service to
be slightly below the previous
month and approximately 3 per
cent above last June. Iuka gave
a city-wide gain of 4 per cent
compared with May, 1954, but
a decrease of 10 per cent com-
pared with June, 1953. Ripley
reported more business activity
than either last June or May,
1954. The largest amount of gain
came in postal receipts. Compar-
ed with those for May, 1954, there
was a gain of 4 per cent.

In Corinth business activity
was down for June. Compared
with June a year earlier there
was a decrease of 1 per cent.
Bank deposits, with a decrease
of 18 per cent was the only in-
dicator to have a decrease, but
it was large enough to upset the
small increase in money orders
issued, postal receipts, and tele-
phones in service. Compared with
May, 1954, the following changes
occurred: bank debits, down, 5
per cent; money orders issued,
up 12 per cent; postal receipts,
own 10 per cent; and telephones
in service, a slight decrease, thus
giving Corinth a city-wide de-
crease of 1 per cent.

The general business activity
index moved upwards two points
during June, 1954. It rose from
137 per cent of the 1947-1949 ad-
justed average to 139.

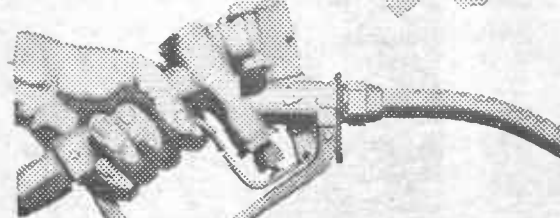

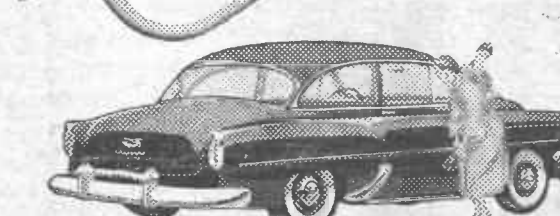

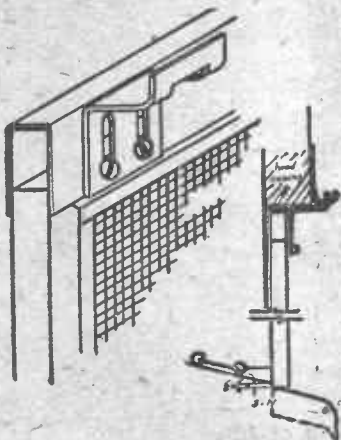

The merchants don't want the meters and a petition was presented to the Board signed by a big majority opposing this move. If all taxes now due the town was collected, it would change things. How many car owners pay taxes in Iuka? An audit of the books would show who was to blame.

A town can't keep up if there is nobody to work for its betterment. Some are simply drawing their pay and doing very little in proper management.

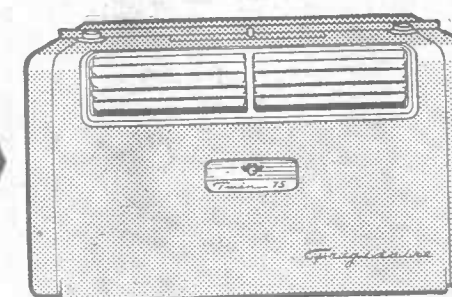

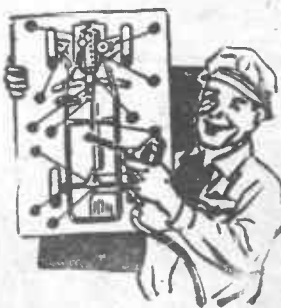

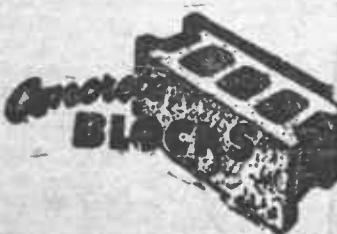

International Uniform
Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Scripture: Matthew 16:14-25; I Corinthians 9:24-27; II Timothy 2:3-5; Hebrews 12:1-4.
Devotional Reading: Exodus 20:1-17.

Self-Discipline

Lesson for August 15, 1954

GOD will not live any man's life for him, nor do for him what he can do for himself. There is peace and repose in the life of the Christian, to be sure; but there is also work, effort, struggle. Paul uses the language of the athletic field and the army to describe the life of the Christian man. The religious life is a race, a fight.

Pressure and Power
We grow, body and soul, partly without knowing it. But we have to put forth effort, all the same. One thing necessary in all kinds of growth—of body, mind, or spirit—is discipline. To some ears that is an ugly word, it seems to stand for repression. Can't we grow better if we are allowed to do as we please? Not by any means. A fruit tree or a grape vine which is never pruned will never produce prize fruit. A razorback hog running wild and eating what he pleases will not make as much bacon as a hog kept penned up and fed with care. A boy who practices the piano only when he feels like it will never learn to play. A football player who gets up and goes to bed when he likes, and eats and drinks whatever he happens to want, when he wants it, will never make the team. Discipline is just not doing certain unimportant things in order to do other important things. When water is run through a hose, the tighter the nozzle is screwed the farther the water is thrown. So it is in the world of Christian character. The life without any restraint is the life without fruit or force. The life without discipline is like the tree never pruned, a tangle of barren branches.

Habit of Vigilance
Sometimes Christians are disciplined by circumstances. Pain, or defeat, or poverty, may have a wholesome effect on us, like a surgeon's knife. But some of the Christian's discipline has to be imposed on himself, by himself. Discipline means getting rid, so to speak, of useless fat, keeping fit. Discipline means not frittering away our time and energies on useless things. It means going without some things we want in order to have more to give to others. It means locking up our pride when our feelings are hurt. It means not becoming so busy with trifles that we have to say "I have no time" when we are asked to help with the Lord's work. It means cutting out even harmless habits when they pull us down to less than our best. It means training down to get into condition for the fight right inside us between our best and our worst. Now we have to be careful about criticizing other people, who may have different battles to fight than we have. It may be quite easy for Mrs. X, who never took a drink of liquor in her life, to say hard things about Mr. Y, who seems not to be able to pass a tavern door without going in. But perhaps Mrs. X has just as much trouble passing up the second piece of cake or the tenth chocolate cream. We have to be on guard all the time, not over others mainly, but over ourselves. Not that we should not help others; indeed, we should. But we need always to remember what Jesus said: "Let him that is without sin cast the first stone."

What Alcohol Does
It ought not to be necessary to say a word about such an obvious subject as a Christian's relation to alcoholic liquors, but nowadays such a word is very much in place. In this matter the best and simplest self-discipline is to leave it alone entirely. What the apostles of "moderation" forget is that alcohol is a drug of a kind that weakens the resistance of the person who takes it. Asking people to be moderate in the use of liquor is not much less ridiculous than asking them to please be moderate in the use of narcotics. The stuff works on the nervous system itself and does it no kind of good. Let a Christian consider: Does the use of liquor help one to grow into the likeness of Christ? Does it make one more clear-headed, unselfish, more useful as a Christian citizen?
