sional life, in all our contacts with those who do not share our particular view of things, if we apply this test to our words and actions we will be practicing the finest principles of citizenship," said Mr. Anderson. The test is: 1. Is it the truth? 2. Is it fair to all concerned? 3. Will it build good will and better friendships? Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

"Citizenship often involves making money that we may serve better and making money involving work," he continued. "Useful work is worship and intelligent labor a high form of prayer. The man who can make money honorably and at the same time help others to make money is not only a good business man, but he is a benefactor to humanity." But Dr. Anderson wants to see the Four-Way Test introduced into our schools that our youth might get the habit while they are in the formative years. "Our world is only a large community today and we must seek a better way to live harmoniously together than by bombs," he urged. He cited the extraordinary success of the international assembly of Rotary International which he attended a short time ago. "Representatives of forty-five different nations around the world gathered for eight days under the same roof, studied, exchanged ideas, ate and fellowshiped together in a wonderful spirit of peace and understanding. These people proved that dedication to the idea and purpose for which man was created—unselfish service and love for one's fellowman—can spell harmony and peace and lead to more abundant life; why can not all people be brought to an acceptance of it? Such a philosophy makes littleness and greed and unbelief incompatible with progress, makes truth and fairness, good will and righteousness life's measure of success."

Polio Cases Increase In County; Support Is Urged In Emergency March Of Dimes Campaign Now In Progress

Three new Polio cases have been reported in the county during the past week, thus, making a total of five cases being reported in about three weeks. The following have been carried to the isolation hospital in Memphis: Eddie Davis (5) son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Davis of Burnsville; Tommy Curtis (7) son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Curtis and Betty Sullivan (col. age 22) daughter of Henrietta Boyd.

Gamma Globulin shots are being given those who have been exposed. According to county health nurse, Mrs. Helen Pruitt, approximately 200 persons had been given the serum.

The National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis has exhausted its funds on scientific research of a serum to counteract polio. This causes serious concern for care of polio patients here and elsewhere. Therefore, it is necessary that an emergency March of Dimes drive be held at this time to help provide care for those who are stricken with this dreadful disease. The drive opened on August 16 and will continue through August 31.

Voluntary workers of the Tishomingo county chapter March of Dimes realize that you, "Mr. John Q. Public" is called on in numerous ways to contribute to these worthy causes, however, keep this in mind when you are contacted in the next two weeks for a contribution—give as liberal as you can without material injury to yourself and family.

The mailing card chairman, Mrs. J. L. Dean, Iuka, is placing in the mail 3,000 letters, one to almost every family in Tishomingo county, requesting that you make some contribution to

the Polio Emergency Drive. Place your contribution in the envelope and mail back to Mrs. J. L. Dean immediately.

According to Chairman E. N. Allen workers will be named to personally contact all business and professional men all over the county. Others will contact the homes in the residential sections of the towns in the county. Do not shirk the duty that you owe your country, your neighbor or yourself. Your contribution will be worth plenty to those that are stricken with the Monster Polio.

Do you know how your March of Dimes money is used? Let me tell you about it. After our drives are over your treasurer, Mrs. I. M. Jackson, Iuka, sends only half of the money to the National Foundation; and retains the other half in the County Treasurer. Then all the expense incurred from our polio patients in the county is paid by your local chapter. When the local chapter funds are exhausted then we have to make application for loans from the National Foundation.

You are well aware of the facts of the outbreak of Polio in our county, NOW, and our county funds are almost exhausted, so naturally we will have to call on the National Foundation for help. The serious thought behind all of this is that the National Foundation funds are exhausted so if we cannot raise some money on this emergency drive it might mean that this service would have to be discontinued.

Mr. Deaton has been a farmer practically all his life, having owned this farm for over twenty years. He attempts to do a diversified type of farming by growing cotton, corn, hay and hogs and cattle. Just recently he has put up 1,000 bales of alfalfa and lespedeza hay. He is also active in the production of chickens and eggs having on hand at this time over 700 young hens that will soon be laying. Mr. Deaton operates a grocery store in Belmont and buys and pools cotton. He is a member of the Tishomingo County Farm Bureau Federation and is also a member of the Belmont Lions club.

All achievements of the Deatons cannot be credited to Mr. Deaton alone, since Mrs. Deaton, the former Ninnie Lee Sumner, has quite a few accomplishments of her own. She has been librarian for the Itawamba County Junior college at Fulton for the past five years and also spends a good deal of her time in canning and preserving fruits

and vegetables raised on the farm.

become grumpy, uncooperative and peevish. This kind of land will fight its tormentor, by forcing him to work long, hard hours for little or no return. It will deceive him by producing food and feed crops of little nutritive value. The operator and his family may eat more than normal amounts of food produced on such land and yet be under- nourished. This land will cheat the operator of his birthright, by forcing him to spend the money he might use for clothes, labor saving devices, and in educating his children for doctor and hos- pital bills. Sooner or later he and his family will acquire the personality of this land. Because their land refuses to give them abundant and profitable yields of good nutritious food and feed when improperly cared for, fear of insecurity and loss of con- fidence in their own ability may cause them to develop inferiority complexes.

Such operators may decide to sell their farm and this is where the land really gets even with the owner, who has failed to understand, love and properly care for it. The owner who would sell finds it difficult to find a purchaser, no one wants abused and mistreated land, finally to dispose of it the owner may agree to take the price offered which would be only a fraction of what he might have obtained had he

used the land within its capabili- ties and given it the treatment it needed. This principle of good land use and treatment is what the Commissioners of the Ten- nessee River Soil Conservation District urges every farmer of the county to practice on their farms. The technicians of the USDA Soil Conservation Service are employed to assist the farm- ers of Tishomingo County in planning and establishing a bet- ter land use pattern on their farms.

Take care of your land and your land will take care of you. Study its nature, try to under- stand it, work to bring out its best points and it will repay you over and over again for the time, effort and money you spend in properly feeding and clothing it. Clothe the steep hill sides with pine trees, the sloping land with pastures, sod crops or small grain and on the more level properly drained upland and bottomland plant and cultivate row crops.

Feed your land with legumes and minerals, do not overgraze your pastures or burn your woods, take soil samples and have tests made to learn the kind of fertilizer your land needs and use it. Lime, other minerals and proper treatment will change the disposition of a sour unco- operating soil to one with a sweet and charming personality, that will produce for the owner high yields of nutritious food and feed. The more closely the land is used and treated as it should be, the better it will respond to the good treatment the farmer give it. Determine now that you will clothe, feed and treat your land better. If you do this it will respond by making you a more likeable person and your future more secure.

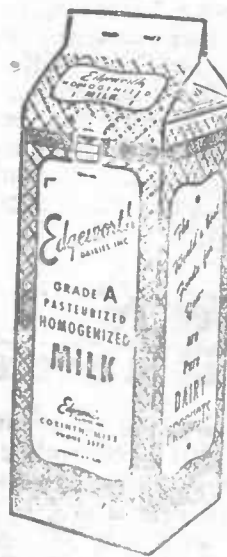

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

Scripture: Acts 20:35; 1 Corinthians 16:1-2; 11 Corinthians 8:1-9.
Devotional Reading: Philippians 4:15-20.

Growing by Giving

Lesson for August 22, 1954

A GREAT deal of "giving" is not giving at all. When two relatives give each other Christmas presents, it is more rightly called an exchange than giving. When the Red Cross or other community drives come along and the household-er turns in his few dollars just so he will be counted, just to keep from being thought a tightwad, that is not giving, it is a form of tax. When some higher court (say a Presbytery) or a Board or a Bishop lays upon a congregation an assessment, for funds a certain amount is "allotted" to a congregation or an individual member, that still is not giving, but more like a tax. You can rightly call it "giving" only when it is freely done, out of sheer good-will, without desire of return.

Investing Personality
When a church invites you to give to one of the causes it supports, it is doing a great deal more, something quite different, than just asking you to shell out some cash. You are being invited to share and invest your personality, no less. There is a hymn which says, "If you cannot cross the ocean and the heathen lands explore, You may find the heathen nearer, you may find them at your door." Well, you cannot cross the ocean, perhaps. You may be much too old to learn Korean or Portuguese. But your money can cross for you. Your money, given to "missions," represents your own work, your own energy and earning-power, put into portable form. In that portable form it becomes part (for instance) of the salary of a young man and his wife who are missionaries in Korea or some other country. They may be evangelistic missionaries, preaching sermons you could never preach. They may be medical missionaries, performing operations you could never do. Whatever they are, they are where they are, doing what they do, because of the gifts you and others have given through the church. Your personality, without those gifts, would be tied down to your little Main Street; your personality through those gifts goes out to the far corners of the world.

Adding to Yourself
In true giving, you not only invest your personality but your personality itself grows. Paul in writing to the Corinthian Christians whom he knew so well, gives them a high rating for their faith, for their ability to express their faith in words, for knowledge, enthusiasm and love for him. Now you would think that persons who had all those good qualities so that even an apostle, not too easily pleased, was delighted with them, would need no further improvement, they were good enough. But Paul thinks of one thing more. "Could you not add generosity to your virtues?" he asks. (Phillips translation.) The minute you read that you can see the point. A person without generosity is not so big a person as the same person with generosity added. Long after a man's body has ceased to grow, his soul can grow by his increase in the "grace of giving."

The Stingy Are Stunted
On the other hand, the stingy are stunted. They are stunted because their eyesight is poor, the eyesight of their mind, that is. All they can see is themselves, maybe their families. But they cannot see the needs of other people at all; on the contrary they never see people as they are, but only as sources of income for themselves. They are stunted because they tend to shrink more and more into themselves. Stinginess if left alone will cover up a man's soul as with a thick layer of cobwebs till the soul can scarcely breathe. The stingy man ends by being stingy even with himself. He becomes a miser. Money comes to be the only thing in the world for him. He began by not feeling the needs of others, he ends by not feeling even his own. He will go without much that he needs because even spending money (to say nothing of giving) hurts him to the bone. He is stunted because he finally loses resemblance to a regular human being and becomes no more than a slightly animated piggy-bank. You can put money into him but you can't shake it out. You would hardly guess that this poor shriveled soul had once been made in the image of God.

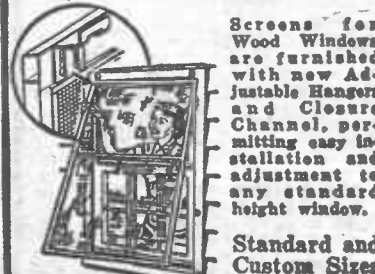

Boll Weevil

Boll weevil migration is in full swing, with these pests flying from field to field. Keep close watch on all cotton fields and if weevils are found use 15 to 20 pounds of dust per acre. Use a long killing poison. If spray is used, increase concentration of insecticide by using one-third less water. Poison every five days as needed.

Horn Flies

Are horn flies robbing you of beef gain or milk production? The fly season is still here and will be until cool weather arrives. You don't have to take the loss caused by these flies. They are easy to control.

You can get good control with a one-half percent spray of either DDT, toxaphene or methoxychlor. Control lasts about three weeks. When spraying, wet backs, necks and sides of animals thoroughly. During rainy weather or in extremely hot weather, wet the

underline of the animals. On milking cows, use only methoxychlor.

If you don't want to spray or don't have spray equipment, you can let the cows treat themselves. Build a home-made backrubber. Here is how to do it.

Fasten three pieces of old or new barbed wire between two posts or trees. Fasten a ring or snap in each end of the wire. Attach to tree or post with eye bolt or wire. The snaps will enable you to take the rubber down and store it when not needed.

Tie the three pieces of wire together. Then wrap with burlap feed sacks. Wrap sacks on barbed wire overlapping three to four inches. Tie sacks six to eight inches apart with heavy twine.

Then soak sacks with mixture of insecticide and fuel oil. If using DDT, mix a quart of 25 percent DDT (2 pounds per gallon) to one gallon of fuel oil. For a five percent methoxychlor solu-

tion, use the same proportions of insecticide and oil.

If toxaphene is the preferred insecticide, mix one and a third cups of six pound per gallon emulsifiable concentrate to a gallon of fuel oil; or use one cup of eight pound per gallon toxaphene to a gallon of fuel oil.

On milking cattle use only methoxychlor on the backrub-

bers. Place the backrubber where cows congregate—water holes, mineral boxes or in a shady location where the cows loaf. It. Consignments to the sales will be registered Jersey females. 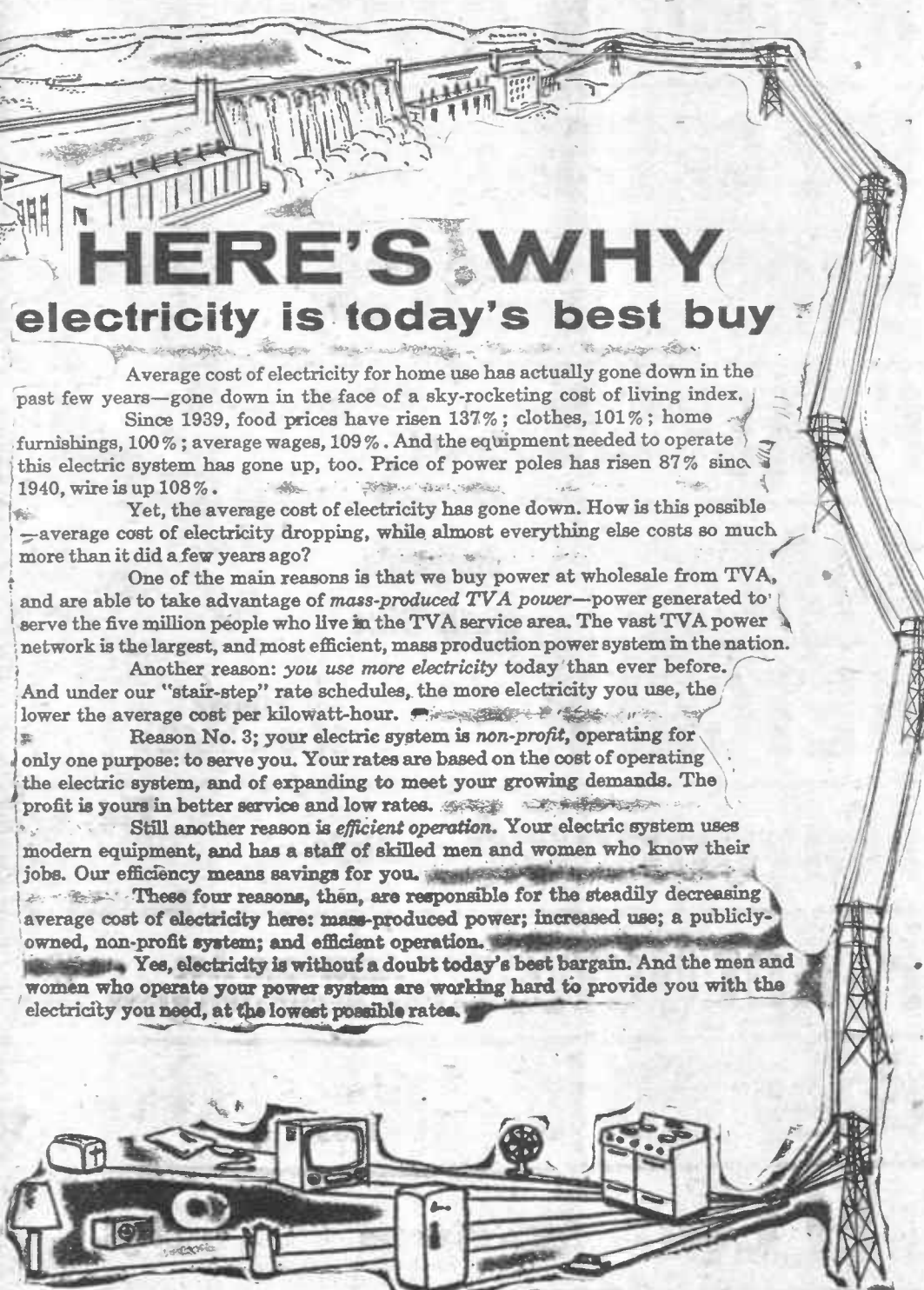

Your County Superintendent and your County School Board had nothing to do with sending the children from Lambert and Gravel Hill to Burnsville one week and they had nothing to do with sending them back to Lambert and Gravel Hill at the end of one week. Your trustees did it.

Since these schools are all in one school district, under one board of trustees, these trustees are the only officials who have the authority by law to shift the children from one school to another school in the Burnsville school district.

However, it is probable and very probable that the sending of the children back to Gravel and Lambert may kill the accreditation of the entire Burnsville School District.

If I can find a way to help you save the credit of your school, I shall be glad to do so but I do not see the way now under the present setup. Your Trustees did it.

Two Air Force Reserve men of Iuka will participate in the open house program and gigantic air show—the biggest, fastest and best ever offered by the Air Force in Memphis—to be held September 26 at Memphis Municipal Airport to officially name the 8710th Pilot Training Wing, Mid-South Air Force Reserve unit of which Brigadier General William J. Fry of Memphis is commander.

Iuka men who are members of the wing include: Capt. David F. Kimberly and S/Sgt. Paul F. Skinner.

The official name for the wing, which includes over 600 Mid-South residents, will be "Chickasaw Wing".

One of the features of the air show, which will be free, will be tactical maneuvers presented by the "Thunderbirds", the Air Force's precision formation jet flying team which performs in red, white and blue F-84 fighters.

Since their beginning June 1, 1953, the "Thunderbirds" have thrilled more than 5,000,000 people in the United States during 73 performances. Another

3,000,000 witnessed their precision flying in South America early in 1954. For many of the Latin Americans, it was their first time to have seen a jet.

The demonstration of precision flying by the "Thunderbirds" will begin when they enter the low area at a minimum altitude of 500 miles per hour in a tight formation, one behind the other. Pulling up into a loop they will change formation into a diamond while upside down. The show will progress through slow rolls, barrel rolls, loops, 4G turns, clover leaf turns and into the finale of a "Bomb Burst".

During this spine tingling maneuver four jets will climb straight up, split toward the four cardinal points of a compass, fall, then come straight down individually to meet head on simultaneously from four directions at 540 miles per hour.

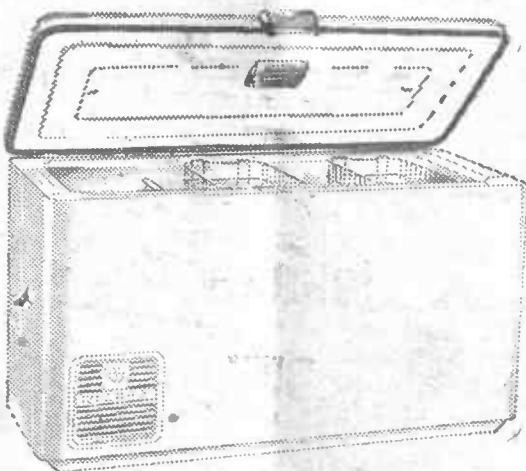
