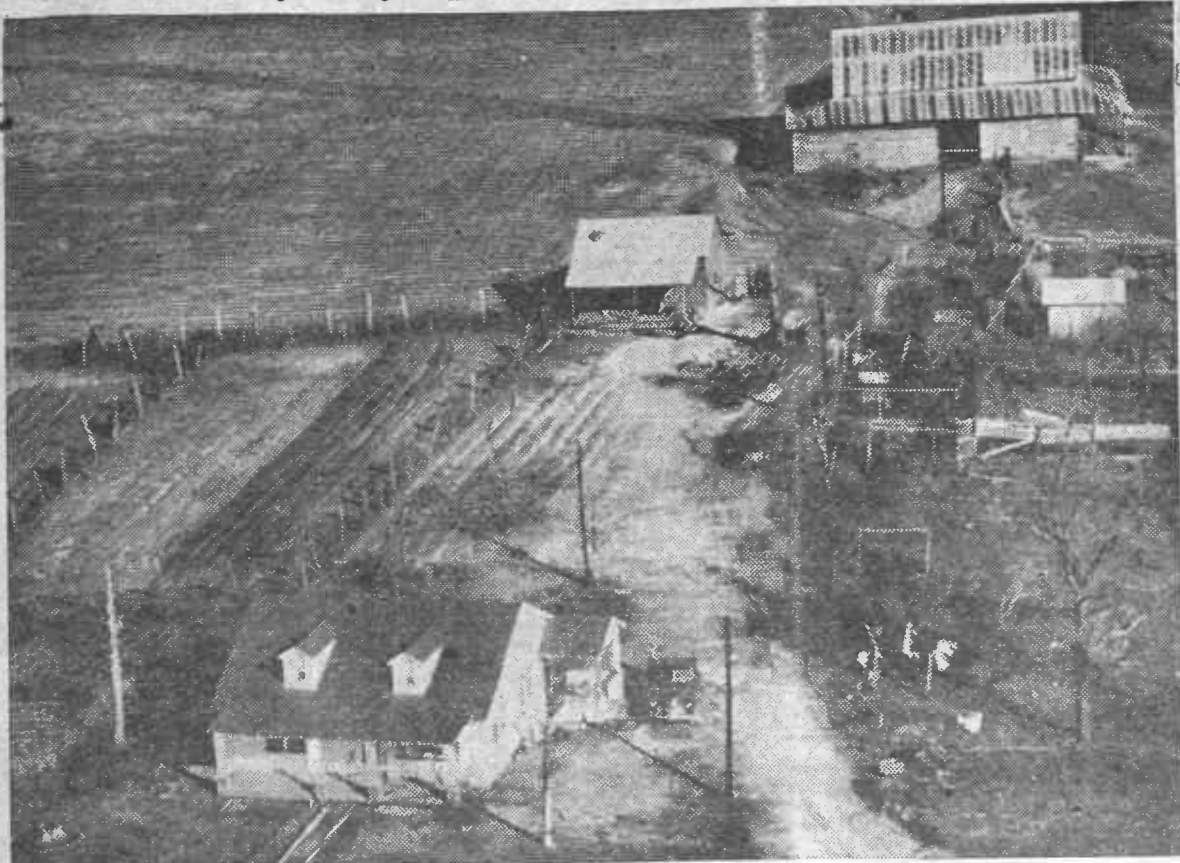

Emergency Polio Drive Enters Into Last Stages

The emergency polio campaign got underway all over the United States on August 16 and will run throughout the remainder of the month. It was started due to a shortage of funds on a national level and a heavy number of polio cases throughout the country this year.

Mrs. J. L. Dean, stated today, that due to circumstances beyond her control, the polio letters were late getting in the mail but everyone in the county should have in his or her possession an envelope in which to put their emergency contribution. Citizens are asked to return the envelopes immediately, in order to help Tishomingo County make a good showing in the national drive.

Polio continues to strike in Mississippi. State Board of Health reports listed 316 cases up to August 19. This compares with 236 for the same period last year and is an increase of 34%. Cases have occurred in 61 of the state's 82 counties.

The state office of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in Jackson reported 109 Mississippi polio patients in hospitals now.

Contributions to the January campaign were not enough to pay for the vaccine trials and gamma globulin and at the same time provide funds for patient care. The emergency drive is an extension of the January appeal and must not fall short again. Failure of the emergency March of Dimes will mean catastrophe for a 16-year program of polio patient care, during which the National Foundation has paid out a total of \$196,000,000 for aid to hard-hit polio patients.

Eastland Victorious In Senatorial Race; Fifth District School Bond Issue Passes

Mississippi's senior United States Senator, James O. Eastland, was victorious in his bid to remain in his office for another term in Tuesday's First Democratic Primary Election. Senator Eastland carried the state by a vote of 131,789 to Lt.-Gov. Carroll Gartin's 79,474. A majority of 52,315 votes. Voting was light over the whole state. Eastland carried Tishomingo county by a 308 vote margin. County votes for Eastland were 939, Gartin 633.

In the Fifth Special Consolidated School District voters endorsed a bond issue to build, repair, equip and improve schools in that district. Trustees of that school district are this week advertising for bids for the installation of a steam heating plant in the main school building at Belmont.

Background Information On Senator James O. Eastland

Mississippi's senior senator, James Oliver (Jim) Eastland, was born at Doddsville November 28, 1912. His father was the late Woods C. Eastland, lawyer and farmer, and his mother is Mrs. Lillian Eastland, formerly of Haverhill in Scott county, who lived at Doddsville.

In 1908 the family moved to Forest where young Eastland attended public school. Later, he attended the University of Mississippi.

Jim Jackson Receives Promotion In Germany

Word has been received that Jim Jackson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Jackson, has been promoted to sergeant in the finance office in Bremerhaven, Germany.

Pvt. Jackson was the first one in his group to be made sergeant. He made the promotion in 17 months.

Admitted to the bar in 1927, he opened a law office at Forest. He served as Scott county representative in the State Legislature from 1928 to 1932.

In 1932, he married the former Miss Elizabeth Coleman of Doddsville. Eastland moved to Doddsville in Sunflower county in 1934 and established a law office at Ruleville.

He held no other public office until 1944, when he was appointed by Governor Paul Johnson to fill the term of the late Senator Pat Harrison.

He served in the senate from June 30, 1941 to September 28, 1941, and during this period his fighting speeches in behalf of southern farmers drew national attention.

On the floor of the senate, he introduced OPA Administrator John W. Harbo as a proposed selling price on cottonseed which would have resulted in a 10% rise to Mississippi farmers. He was successful in having the selling price adjusted at the time cottonseed was moving to market.

On the basis of his effective four-year term, Senator Eastland received over 4000 letters and telegrams urging him to become a candidate for a full six-year term.

While Eastland was serving as interim senator, Congressman Earl Doney was defeating Congressman Ross Collins in a primary to name a successor for the unexpired Harrison term, which extended through 1942.

Early in 1942, Eastland announced as a candidate for the six-year term beginning January 1, 1943. He led the ticket in the first primary over three other candidates, and defeated Wall Doney in the second primary.

In 1948, Eastland was renominated without opposition.

In the senate, Eastland is a member of the agriculture judiciary committees, and ranks 14th in seniority.

Senator Eastland was one of the leaders of the States Rights movement, which offered Governor Storm Thurmond of South Carolina as a candidate for president and Governor Fielding Wright of Mississippi as the vice-presidential nominee.

Eastland helped organize the Birmingham States Rights convention.

His family, besides his wife, includes four children, Nell, 20; Ann, 15; Sue, 12; and Woods, 10. Nell Eastland will be president of the senior class at Sophie Newcomb College in New Orleans next term, and she is majoring in history and psychology.

HOME AGENT NOTES

On some days you'd like a hot bread with your hot weather meal, but just hate to turn the oven on and heat up the kitchen even a little bit more.

Maybe you will find the answer to this in your waffle iron and cornmeal waffles. If you keep a corn meal mix in your kitchen, all you have to add to 1 1/4 cup of the mix are 4 tablespoons of melted fat, an egg and a cup of sour milk in which you've dissolved 1/4 teaspoon of soda.

Cook the waffles at the table as they are needed.

Corn Bread Mix

Mix: 3 cups corn meal, 1 cup sifted flour, 1 cup dried milk, 3 tablespoons baking powder, and 1 tablespoon salt.

To make mix, sift dry ingredients together 3 times. Store in covered container. Use the mix to make corn bread just as for waffles, except use 1 tablespoon of melted fat instead of flour.

Beat the mix, eggs, milk and fat well. Bake in hot greased pan or muffin tins for 15 to 20 minutes at 450 degrees F. or until done.

Use 2 tablespoons of melted fat if making corn meal griddle

cakes.

Maybe you'll find the corn meal waffles good with barbecued stuffed hamburgers, a crisp garden salad, baked beans, corn on the cob, iced tea, with watermelon for dessert. To make the hamburgers:

Barbecued Stuffed Hamburgers
1 1/2 pounds ground beef, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 onions, 3 tablespoons butter, barbecue sauce.

Season ground beef. Roll to 1/2 inch thickness between waxed paper. Cut with round cookie cutter. Place a slice of onion between two hamburger patties. Brown quickly in butter on both sides. Add favorite barbecue sauce and baste meat well with it before removing from the pan. Serves eight.

You probably have a favorite barbecue sauce, but here is one you might like to try:

Barbecue Sauce

1/4 cup chopped onion, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 teaspoon red pepper, 1 teaspoon chili powder, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 1 cup cooked tomatoes, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup chopped celery, one teaspoon salt.

Cook onion in fat until golden brown and transparent. Add remaining ingredients and simmer for 30 minutes. Makes 1 1/2 cups sauce.

Outdoor Fireplace

An easy outdoor fireplace can easily be made by supporting an old oven rack on and between

two large flat stone walls or two logs. For the cooking pan, use a sturdy cookie sheet.

The fuel may be either charcoal or wood. Before cooking, let the fire die down to a bed of glowing coals.

PLANT WINTER GRAZING CROPS AND PROTECT LAND By Hiram A. Jones Work Unit Conservationist USDA SCS

Tie down your sloping cropland during the late fall, winter and spring months, by planting small grain, like oats and wheat and winter legumes, such as vetch and crimson clover on it this fall. A combination of wheat and vetch or oats and crimson clover would furnish grazing for livestock. Such a cover of small grain and winter legumes would help prevent the land from washing away during heavy winter and spring rains. These crops planted in the fall grazed during winter an early spring and turned as a green manure crop just before corn and cotton planting time will improve the structure of your soil.

You may think of a soil being mellow or having a live feel to

it, this is in a sense saying that such a soil has good structure. A mellow soil that feels alive is a productive soil. Plants growing on such soil suffer less from drought and respond quickly to good cultural and fertilizer practices. This is the kind of land every farmer knows about and every farmer wants.

Every farmer knows that any land worth clearing and putting in row crops will produce high yields for the first few years, then it becomes more and more difficult to obtain high yields from it. The chief reason yields decline on such land is the topsoil washes off. The main reason the topsoil washes off is the land is not properly covered during most of the year. Such land is usually planted to cotton and corn which is clean cultivated and after harvest the land is left bare until the following spring.

If the dry weather has cut short the feed you will need for your livestock this winter, why didn't you consider planting winter grazing for them on your sloping upland.

As work unit technician representing the USDA Soil Conservation Service in your county, I am interested in every practice that the farmer is doing to protect his land from erosion. The average landowner must consider the cost of any practice he performs. He must be reasonably sure such practice will pay its way. Lack of rain at planting time (September and October) could make it impractical to plant winter grazing and cover crops. But if it does rain enough to get a good season in the ground winter legumes and small grain planted as a mixture, or separately should prove of great value, for grazing, soil protection and green manure to turn in the spring.

This one thought might be worth considering. Acres planted to cotton are being reduced under the new agricultural program. Most farmers cannot plant as much cotton as they have in the past. The question arises as to how these diverted acres are to be used. Would it be wise to plant the steeper, more eroded land, that is to be kept as cropland, to a mixture of grasses and legumes to build it up and prevent it from washing away. If practical, graze it, if not, just keep it in such crops for 2 or 3 years before plowing it up and cultivating it again.

The commissioners of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District think this would prove valuable. They think by doing this a farmer could keep his cropland acres about the same. He could work his best and most level land. And maintain or actually improve the fertility of those acres of his field on which he has been making little if any profit for many years. The farmers who put this suggestion into practice might be pleasantly surprised to find that after these poorer acres of their fields had been in heavy sod for 3 or more years, they have become mellow, alive and more productive than any other part of their field.

Those of you who are interested in establishing grazing crops and who want my assistance in selecting areas to retire from crops for awhile can come by my office or write me. For information on varieties of small grain to plant and how to fertilize contact County Agent Mr. W. C. Hamilton.

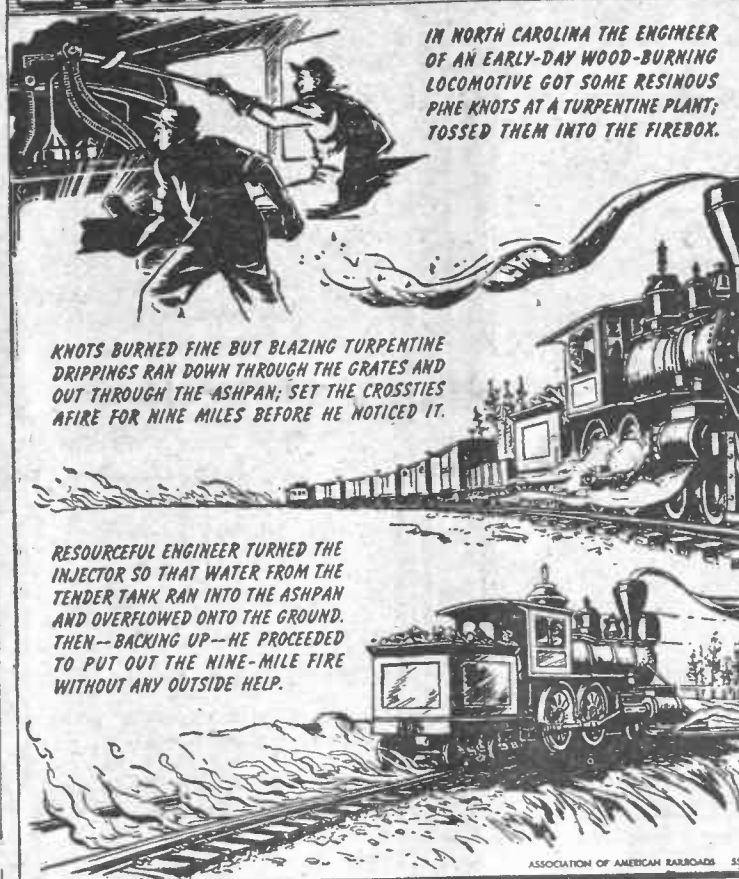

Sorghum Seed and Silage
Harvesting Silage: Corn should be harvested for silage when in heavy dough stage. To tell if it is ready, shuck a few ears and look at the grain.

A lot of corn has already been cut for silage, but a lot of late corn is still in the fields. If the corn is cut too early part of the value is lost. If it is left in the field too long, it gets dry and hard to pack.

If your corn has gotten too dry, you will have to mix some water with it. Or, if you have sorghum ready at the same time, mix the two by putting one load of sorghum, a load of corn, then another load of sorghum in the silo.

You should put up your sorghum silage when the seed are in the heavy dough stage. It can be left longer in the field be- cause it does not dry out rapidly. However, leaving it in the field, brings on the risk of having it blown down.

Sorghum Seed: Seed should be in the heavy dough stage before they can be harvested for re- planting. Dry the seed by spread-

ing on the floor. Thresh and treat for insects as soon as seed are dry enough.

If all the Sart and Tracy seed are put in the silo, seed are like- ly to be scarce next year, so plan now to save some of your sorghum seed.

Poisonous Materials

Don't lose any of your livestock because of your carelessness with poisonous materials. Fertilizers containing nitrogen and sacks that have contained nitrates should be kept well out of reach of livestock.

Discarded paint buckets, old storage batteries and other prod- ucts containing lead can cost you a prize animal. So keep them out of the way of your stock. Just a few licks may poison a cow.

Prompt treatment is the key to saving animals that are poison- ed. A competent veterinarian should be called when the first symptoms are noticed.

Cotton Insects

Don't stop your cotton poison- ing operations until all bolls are safe. Be on the lookout for mi- grating boll weevils, bollworms and any other injurious insect. Poison for control according to recommendations.

Fly Control

Have you tried the malathion method of controlling flies? It works.

For fly control in dairy barns, poultry houses, hog pens, dog kennels, garbage dumps and around garbage cans, try a black- strap bait.

Here is how to make it. Stir one pound of malathion 25 W into two and a half gallons of Blackstrap molasses, cane syrup or low grade honey—stir thor- oughly. For making smaller amounts, use four level spoonful of malathion to a pint of sweet bait.

Smear the bait onto pieces of double thickness burlap. Use a paddle to do this. Lay or hang the baited burlap where flies col- lect.

For hanging baits cut the bu

lap into pieces 12 to 18 inches, run a piece of baling wire in and out around three sides to prevent curling. Hang where needed. Use enough baits to get control.

The bait may also be dribbled in narrow bands on cardboard or hard surfaces. Re-apply as need- ed.

CAUTION. Do not use mala- thion in dwellings, milk rooms or allow it to contaminate feed. Avoid breathing spray or mist. Keep it off your skin. Wash thoroughly after using. Read cautions on labels.

Deans, Secretary of the Southern Pine Association, said Mississippi's 1500 timber and wood products plants are produc- ing goods valued at \$353 millions

a year, and employs 42,000 per- sonal or 42 per cent of all work- ers employed in manufacturing industries in the State. "At the end of December 1951" he said there were 315 tree farms in Mississippi covering 895,436 acres. Today the number is approach- ing 500 tree farms with more than a million acres involved."

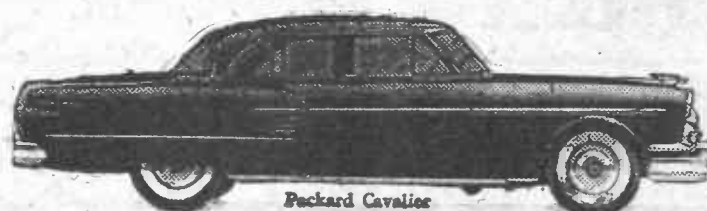
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\$6 Million Made Available To Farmers By Improved ACP Program For Soil And Water Conservation Practices

An improved ACP program for 1955 will make \$6,000,000 available to farmers in Mississippi for soil and water conservation practices, according to Boswell Stevens, president of the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation.

Farm Bureau was one of the agricultural organizations consulted in the planning of the new State ACP program, which initiates several changes that greatly improve it over the 1953-54 program.

Preliminary details of the program indicate that it will be more flexible and more easily adapted to local needs and conditions, Mr. Stevens said.

Most of the changes relate to the practices of establishing vegetative cover on farmland to protect it from erosion and to conserve water. These crops include perennial plants which protect the land for more than one year, and annual cover crops which either reseed themselves or have to be reseeded. The forestry and earth-moving practices, such as building ponds, will remain substantially the same as in the past several years. The perennial cover practice will be expanded to more land than was eligible last year. First is land that will be permanently in cover and as in 1954 diverted acres will be eligible for this practice. Second is rotation of crops which in 1954 was limited to 35 percent of cropland on the farm, but in 1955 will be left to the county ASC committee. Third is improving existing permanent cover now used for hay or pasture, and in 1955 it will be extended to make possible liming or fertilizing without

leeding in cases where seed or plants is already established. Instead of fixed requirement, a minimum and maximum on seed and minerals will be allowed with any farm agency to determine the most effective use. Fertilizer requirements will be in minimum units of plant food, rather than in formulas in 1954.

Three annual cover crop practices will be available where there was only one, winter cover crops, available in 1954. This will be continued on many eligible farms. Increased acreage is limited to what was grown on the farm for the past three years. Grazing oats will be added as an eligible crop this year. Annual winter and summer cover crops will not be eligible if harvested for hay, silage, seed, or grain.

In 1955 government help will be available in applying fertilizers to winter and summer cover crops. One of the new annual cover crop practices allows growing a summer cover crop, including annual lespedeza, Sudan grass and millet. The second new annual cover crop practice is for maintaining a cover throughout the 1955 crop year on land shifted from crop production to cover crops. This mainly would be planting both winter and summer cover crops on the same land on acreage taken out of cotton. Program assistance would go to each along with government cost-sharing. A wide range of choice is given the farmer under this practice.

Improvements will be made in the operating plan for 1955 for more prompt action by county committees on requests for ap-

provals. Sign-up periods will probably be in December and January.
