

## Tishomingo County Fair Opens In Two Days; Interest Is At All Time High

County workers, Home demonstration club members, 4-H members, Lions club, business and everyone in general expressing a great deal of interest in this year's Tishomingo fair that is to open on September 22nd. Fair catalogues have been distributed showing prize lists and it is expected that more people than ever will be in attendance this year due to the fact that the fair has been moved to house both the fair and the county stock show. These buildings have been completed, ready for exhibitors to make their displays in them.

### General Regulations for Exhibits

1. All exhibits must be in place by 4 p.m., Wednesday, September 22, except flowers, vegetables and food which must be in place by 10 a.m., September 23.

2. Premium money will not be paid to any exhibitor outside Tishomingo county.

3. Where there is no competition, premiums will be paid according to the judge's rating.

4. The fair management will not in any way be responsible for any damage, loss or injury.

5. All dairy and beef entries should be broken to lead in show and must have health certificate from approved veterinarian showing that they have undergone necessary tests.

6. The decision of the judges of awarding committee will be final.

7. All exhibits must remain in place until 1 p.m., Saturday, September 25.

"Any woman or girl in Tishomingo county is eligible to place an exhibit in the fair," Miss Bynum, home demonstration agent said. "They do not have to be a member of the home demonstration club or the girls 4-H club to be eligible. However, there is a group for 4-H club girls to place their exhibits in." Miss Bynum added, "in the home demonstration and 4-H clubs and indications are that more will enter exhibits this year than was entered last year. Definitely more 4-H club girls will have exhibits."

County agent W. C. Hamilton, in commenting on possible exhibits in the livestock and farm produce divisions said, "Due to the dry weather quality of products is not as good as in years past. However, farmers should exhibit what they have as prizes will be awarded on the best that is exhibited."

Mr. Hamilton also said that livestock that is to be exhibited should be on the grounds Wednesday, September 22, at noon, and that an approved veterinarian will be on hand at 2 p.m. that day to examine the livestock.

Everyone is urged to keep in mind the electric line pump that Tishomingo County Electric Power Association will give away absolutely free on Friday, September 24.

A huge midway-carnival has been secured for this year's fair and it will offer all types of rides and other amusements. According to K. L. Rushing, secretary-treasurer of the fair association, "this should be the biggest and best fair ever held in Tishomingo county!"

## Resolution Adopted By TCTA Opposing Abolishment of Miss. Public Schools

The resolution printed herewith is self-explanatory. With this resolution, the Tishomingo County Teachers Association becomes what is believed to be the first organization of school people in the state to openly and actively oppose the plan now before the special session of the legislature which convened Tuesday of this week to abolish the public school system of Mississippi. If the plan passes the legislature it will be placed in a referendum before the voters of the state this fall who will vote upon it and if two-thirds of those voting favor the plan it will be added to the state constitution as an amendment.

### RESOLUTION

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Tishomingo County Teachers Association in special session on September 3, 1954.

Whereas, the recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States, apparently more political than judicial, relative to segregation of the races in the public schools, has created a condition of unrest and uncertainty in the Southern States, and

Whereas, in an effort to circumvent this decision of the Court, the Legislature of the State of Mississippi has been called together in special session by the Governor for the purpose of proposing an amendment to the State Constitution which would give to the State Legislature the authority to abolish the public school system statewide by a two-thirds vote and at local option by a majority vote, and

Whereas, it is advocated by the proponents of this amendment that private schools be established in place of public schools as a last resort to preserve segregation, and

Whereas, the proponents of this measure do not offer any detail

of a workable plan for a private school system, nor can their best legal advisors guarantee that such a private school system could ever evade the Supreme Court decision, and

Whereas, federal aid for vocational education, the school lunch programs, and potential federal assistance for school buildings, as well as the State Teacher Retirement System, will of necessity be eliminated by the very nature of a private school system,

Be it therefore resolved, that the Tishomingo County Teachers Association go on record as follows:

1. That we are positive and outspoken in our opposition to integration of the races in the schools of the State, and believe that we already have and can provide better means of securing this end, less dangerous to the educational interests of the children of both races;

2. That we definitely favor and support a program providing equal educational facilities and opportunities for both races;

3. That we are opposed to delegating to the State Legislature the authority to abolish the public school system under any circumstances, and express the fear that once the public schools are abolished, they could never be reestablished under any condition.

4. That we have a genuine and complete lack of faith in the ability of any group to provide a practicable and effective system of private schools for all the children of all the people; and

5. That we express our deep disappointment in the Governor's statement that he will not call any further special session of the Legislature to provide funds for the school year of 1955-56 unless the proposed amendment is ratified.

Be it further resolved that copies of this resolution be given to the press.

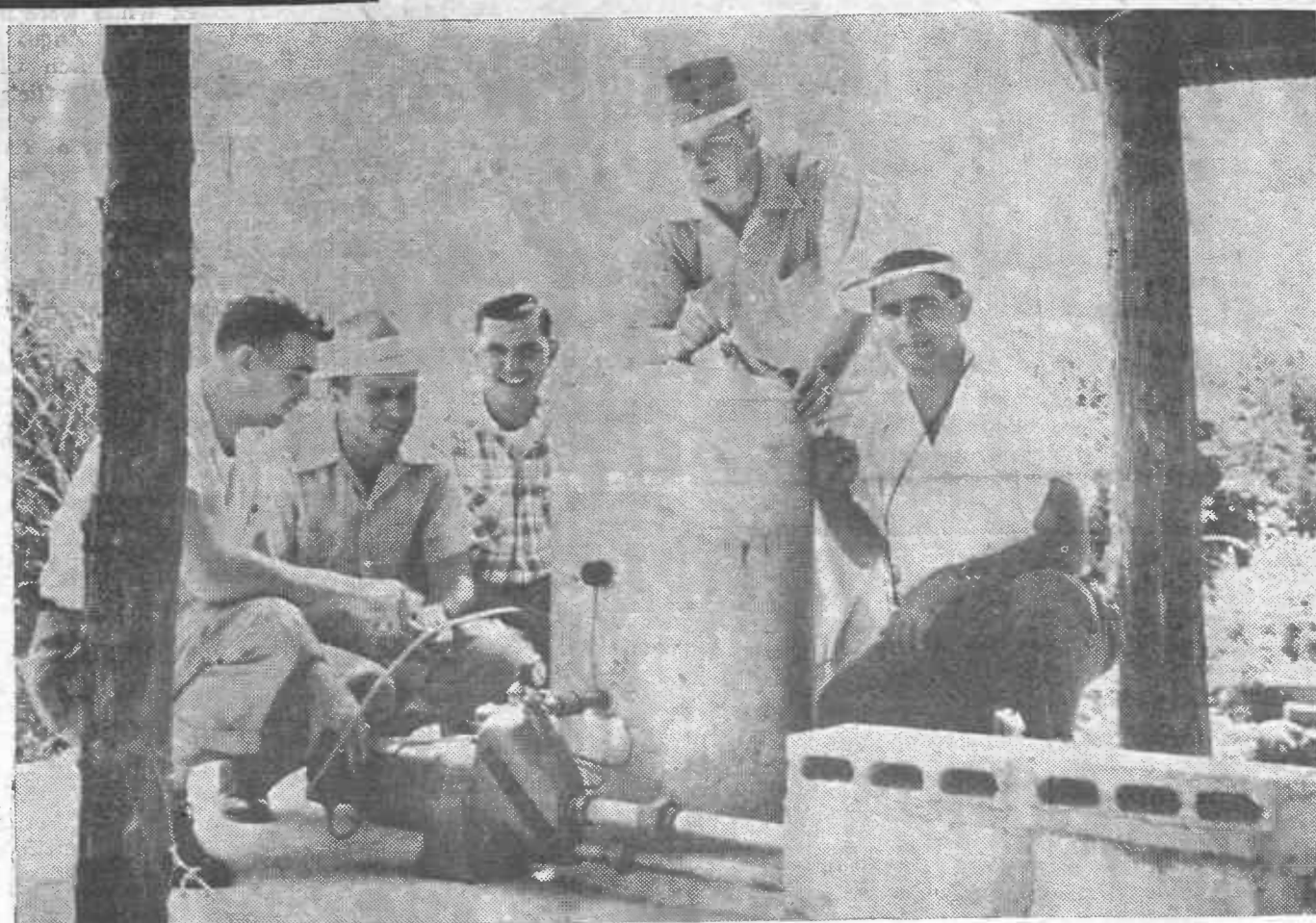

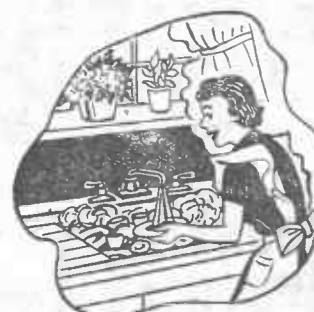

## Christian Citizens

Lesson for September 12, 1954

SUPPOSE the dream of some scientists comes true, and there is built a "space platform" buzzing around the earth, some thousand miles away, like a little moon? Suppose this thing is equipped with telescopic sights and atomic weapons? Such a thing — and it is now technically possible — would give its possessors power over the whole earth such as no conqueror has ever had. The

question then Dr. Foreman would be: What kind of people are running the thing? Do they really take an interest in the human race, or suppose they didn't care, and started blasting away some fine morning just for fun? E. B. White's famous story, "The Morning of the Day They Did It," imagines what would happen then.

Learning to Belong

That may not be true as prophecy, — a continent, a planet, blown out of existence because two men who do not care anything about it, or anything else, take a notion to blast it. But it is quite true as a picture of human attitudes. Neither soldier nor senator nor common citizen will do anything to help a country or people for whom he feels no special attraction; and he may very easily injure or destroy it without much conscience. In war, this is a picture of how each nation looks at the enemy; in "peace," it is a picture of the lack of social responsibility which plagues every country in the world. "Do what you like with it — it isn't mine," may possibly be all right when you are talking about your neighbor's tomato-patch or automobile. But when you are talking about your neighbor's nation, you are talking about something that is just as much yours as his. We

all begin life as little egotists, each of us the center of his little high-chair universe. By degrees we learn to say "we" about our family, our gang, maybe our town or high school or lodge. But it takes church members a long time — some of them — to say "we" about the church, and even longer for even Christian citizens to say "we" about their country. Having no special feeling for it, they don't care what happens to it, and may even take part in doing it harm, just because they have never learned to belong to it.

Christian Citizens Needed

The Apostle Paul was a citizen of a great empire, and he was proud of the fact. He believed that every Christian, whether a citizen or not, had certain duties of obedience, responsibility and support, toward the Roman Empire. If this was true in those days, when the government was non-Christian, corrupt and oppressive, when Christians had for the most part no chance whatever in sharing the responsibilities of government, how much more true it is in a democracy! With professed Christians numbering about half the total population, with the vote in our hands and our representatives no farther away than the nearest mail-box, we have even more reason and opportunity to make our presence and our ideas felt, as Christian citizens, than could have been possible in the time of Paul and Nero. Any Christian who is old enough to vote and educated enough to read and write, might well ask himself a few questions to see if he is much of a Christian.

Quiz for Christian Citizens

Do you know the names of your senator, your congressman? Did you vote for them? Why? Do you know whether they are Christians by profession? Do you know how they have been voting on important questions? If so, do you find that they have been taking a Christian attitude as reflected in their votes?

Have you ever taken the time and spent the money to write or wire your congressman or senator to let him know how you and your neighbors stand on important matters? Have you felt that international affairs were somehow beyond your scope, or have you realized that bad relationships between nations have always brought death to happy homes? Do you realize that our nation, and others, have developed weapons of such terrible force that to use them can destroy the race of man? Do you have any idea what your congressman and senator, your personal representatives, are thinking and doing?

## Will Lose More Than Gain Integration Says Negro Publisher

Negro publisher of the (N. J.) Telegram, the following to say that segregation: "The following being made by agitators and press-against segregated South may cause Negroes to lose a lot of money will gain. "The State of Connecticut doesn't have twenty-five Negro teachers. "Nowhere in these integrated states do Negroes get anywhere near proportionate representation. Every device is employed to keep qualified Negroes from being assigned. Recently a reputable New York labor union made a report on the employment of Negro teachers in New York City and charged that a systematic scheme has been adopted to exclude Negroes as teachers. "This is not true, in the South. The State of Georgia employs 7,313 Negro teachers, and paid them close to \$15,000,000 in salaries last year. North Carolina paid its Negro teachers over \$22,000,000 last year. Florida is another state that ranks at top on teacher pay. "Mississippi paid \$7,414,273 in salaries to 6,753 Negro teachers in the state last year. **Lose Jobs** "If these states, that are now pouring millions of dollars annually into Negro pockets which provides our people with money that enables them to enjoy the dignity of man, to enjoy prestige and respectability, to buy homes and the necessities of life, are

forced to abandon the segregated school, 75 per cent of the Negro teachers in the South will lose their jobs. Not only that, but approximately 20,000 Negro principals will lose their jobs as well. "This present movement to end segregation in the schools is merely the beginning of a well-laid plan to completely end segregation in everything in the South. If this happens the Negro will be thrown into direct competition with the white race, and our business institutions will crumble. "No place in the world do Negroes own and control as much as do those in the South. Atlanta is without question the Negro capital of the world. It is the center of Negro culture, education, business and finance. And both Negroes and whites live, work and operate business without either being conscious of the other's race. **Racial Dynamite**

"This movement to integrate the schools of the South is loaded with more racial dynamite than appears on the surface and the Negro will be the one who is blown away. "During the past two years I have spent more time in the South than I have in my office, and I have interviewed thousands of Negroes in all walks of life

and I have found very few who favor mixed schools. They want their own schools, but equal facilities. This being the situation, one questions the fairness of forcing these colored citizens to accept what they don't want. "Right now the Southern Negro is in a better spot educationally, politically and economically than the Negroes any place else in the world. Race relations are continually improving. Every day more Southerners are recognizing the Negro as a man and according him the respect that he merits, but the Southern Negro himself can do more about improving conditions than can courts, legislation or pressure groups.

"Despite all the hullabaloo about the liberal North and East, no Negro has been made head of a State College or University. Down South the woods are full of Negro college and university presidents. In Texas a Negro college president of a state school gets \$10,000 a year.

"Negroes need to refresh their memories on the fact that just a few years ago we were raising Cain because colored kids in the South were being taught by white teachers. We wanted them taught by Negroes until now Negro teachers have completely taken over.

"A group goes back into the courts declaring that the Negro is not satisfied with equal facilities, that the separate but equal law is unconstitutional, that nothing less than integration will do. That doesn't seem fair to me."

The 1955 tour manager is a graduate of Mississippi State College for Women at Columbus and

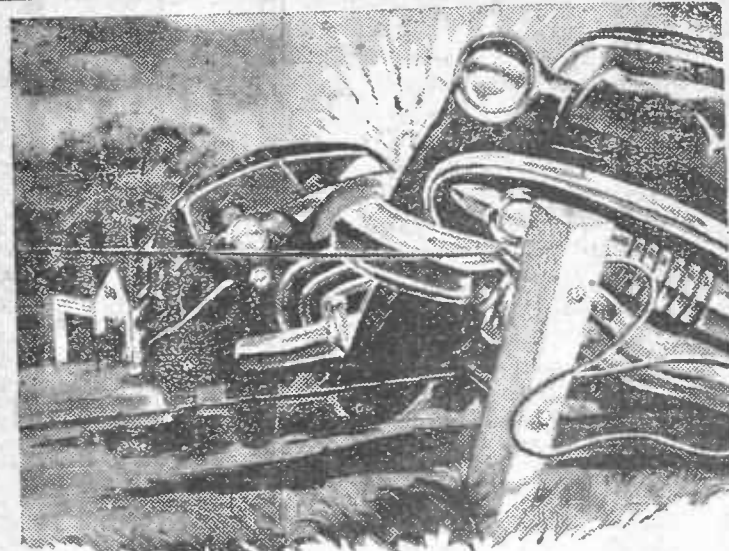
of Iuka High school. She is the daughter of Mrs. E. T. Johnston, Iuka.
