Group Marker Unveiling

Approximately 250 persons at the erection, unveiling and dedication ceremonies of the "Jacinto" marker held Sunday at the intersection of Highway 45 and 356.

The marker, which was presented to Tishomingo and Alcorn counties by the state, has a green background with gold lettering and a blue blossom at the top.

The marker is located on the Jacinto marker, "Jacinto east nine miles. 1836 as seat of 'old' Tishomingo, including present Alcorn, Prentiss counties. Named in honor of the battle of San Jacinto. The house dates from 1854. Lost seat, 1870. Home of Sen. E. W. Carmack."

African Legion officials from the area were guest speakers at the dedication ceremonies. Both Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Holtzford, adjutant of the Legion and Reid Box, post commander addressed the gathering.

The monument was unveiled by girls representing Alcorn, Tishomingo and Prentiss counties. Those who were present at the ceremony were: Miss Nina Cooper of Booneville, Miss Dorothy Barnett of Booneville, and Miss Carolyn Cunningham of Booneville.

Driver, supervisor from the county was in charge of the marker. Leslie Horn of Corinth and representatives from Iuka and Booneville were present at the dedication ceremonies.

Flowers of Memphis served as master of ceremonies for the occasion. Guest speakers included: Dr. John K. Betterworth of the College; Dr. O. C. Skipper of the Mississippi College for Women; Roy Adams, northern highway commissioner; Clarence Edge, supervisor of the Rienzi district of Alcorn County.

The marker was delivered to the state to three counties for the erection and dedication ceremonies. W. C. Graves of Rienzi was the program for the dedication of the "Jacinto" marker.

Tennessee River SCD Commissioners Hold Subsoiling Demonstration

The local Soil Conservation Service District Commissioners announce two subsoiling demonstrations to be held in Tishomingo County. The purpose of these demonstrations is to seek a way to store and save for use by crops next summer rain water that falls during the winter and spring months. Something needs to be done about this subject if possible.

The first demonstration will be held Wednesday, September 29, on the Roy Adams farm, which is about 4 1/2 miles west of Iuka on highway 72, and the second is Friday, October 1 at 9:30 p.m. on the L. E. Deaton farm one mile north of Belmont on highway 25.

Different types of subsoiling equipment will be demonstrated.

Cotton Price Of 38 Cents Predicted Next Spring By Co-Op Manager; Analysis Is Given On Supply, Demand

Charlie McNeil, General Manager Mississippi Federated Cooperatives (AAL) would, of course, change all predictions.

The supply situation is as follows:
Carryover in U. S. August 1, 1953 5,510,488
1953 production 16,298,013
Total Supply 21,808,541
Domestic Consumption 8,525,188
Exports 3,782,620
Total Disappearance 12,307,808
Balance on August 1, 1954 9,500,653 with a carryover on August 1, 1954 of 9,500,653 bales, it is important to know where the cotton is and how much of it is available to the trade and at what price. The cotton is located as follows:

Cotton in 1953 loan 5,177,923
Cotton in 1952 pool 1,677,930
Cotton in 1947-51 pools 118,005
Mill stocks and free stocks 2,526,653
Total 9,500,653
To arrive at the total supply for 1954-55 we would add the

carryover, 9,500,653, to the estimated 1954 production of 11,832,000 bales making a total supply of 21,332,653 bales.
The next question is how much of that cotton is available to the trade, or free cotton. Remember that the law now requires that 3 million bales be set aside which will require all government owned cotton and part of the cotton now held in the loan.
If two million bales of the current crop goes into the loan, and that is a very minimum estimate, there will then be in loan and government stocks about 9 million bales of cotton. There will be available as free cotton about 12 million three hundred thousand bales including mill stocks.

Present estimates are that domestic consumption and exports this season will be 13 and one half million bales. In other words, one and one-half million bales will have to come out of the loan to meet demand.
Cotton placed in the loan in October 1953 at 34.94 cents per pound will have accumulated about 3.4 cents in charges. Assuming that the grower will not sell his equity in such cotton for less

than \$2.00 per bale, it will require a price of 38.04 cents in March to move the cotton out of the loan.
Since we believe that the trade could get all the cotton needed from the 1953 loan by paying two dollars for equities, the 38 cent price is probably the ceiling price.

Rotary Club Hears Two Guest Speakers At Wednesday's Luncheon Meeting

The Iuka Rotary club was fortunate in having two distinguished guest speakers for the regular weekly luncheon meeting held Wednesday at noon in the Educational building of the Methodist Church.

Rotary president Herbert Biggs presided and Bro. J. H. Holder, program chairman, introduced Hazel Breland, regional Red Cross worker who made a short speech of thanks to the people of the area for the wonderful support they had given the Red Cross. Miss Breland illustrated her talk with a story about helping a double amputee who had lost both legs in combat. The courage this young man had and the part she played in helping him adjust to a new life in which he was a living example of helplessness gave her more encouragement to do her job better.
Miss Breland served 11 years in army hospitals, a number of them being in Germany.

Soil Conservationist Hiram A. Jones had charge of the balance of the program. He introduced as principal speaker for the meeting Mr. D. Mercier of Corinth who talked on rural and urban cooperation or town and country relations.

At the outset of his speech Mr. Mercier said that most of the men in his audience were from the country and why the town people and the country people could not get along was almost impossible to understand. He pointed out the fact that not so many years ago most of the real business leaders of Memphis were from the country and that today many of the leaders of that city were farm boys.

The speaker said that all the improvements of modern day civilization were first dreams in the minds of men who visualized and saw possibilities of developing and creating our electric lights, automobiles, and everything else that we used today.

"We must have an ideal," the speaker said. "Something that we can work to and build to for the advancement of our children and grandchildren. When we get too old to dream and have ambition then the sooner the undertaker takes us away the better our community will be."

Mr. Mercier said he believes in the philosophy that unless a man works toward the betterment and advancement of his community then he is not worthy of living.

There is no obligation to buy anything. This is purely an effort on the part of your Farm Association to help the farmers increase their production and save money by using a fertilizer with proper analysis.

Cabbage Food Value

When you get your cabbage
home from the garden or market,
take good care to preserve its
quality. Wash it, drain off the
excess water and store it in a
covered container in the refriger-
ator. Cabbage doesn't keep its
food value long in storage. Keep
what you buy for only a short
time.

Sorting Clothes

Sorting dirty clothes on the
floor is hard on the back and
may add soil to the clothes, as
you may have learned from ex-
perience. On next wash day, try
sorting your clothes on a table
or counter at no-bend height.
You'll save wear and tear on
yourself and your clothes.

As you sort, brush out pockets,
close slide fasteners and remove
ornaments that won't stand wash-
ing. Then sort according to color,
soil and fabric. The day is past
when all kinds of fabric can be
washed together.

Washer Load

Studies show that clothes wash
cleaner if the washing machine
is not loaded up to capacity.
Some homemakers made a prac-
tice of putting a full load to save
time, water and detergent. But
for cleanliness, it's better to put
6 to 7 pounds of clothes in a wash-
er that can take 8 to 10 pounds,
for example.

The big disadvantage to over-
loading is not so much the dam-
age to the motor but is poor
laundering.

Unmolding Congealed Salads

To unmold a congealed salad,
loosen the edge of mold with a
spatula or small knife that has
been dipped in warm water. Then
quickly dip the mold just to the
top in lukewarm water. Hot
water will melt the mold. Shake

the mold to loosen the gelatin.
Place a serving dish on top of
mold, turn the mold over and lift
it off carefully.

For large molds, moisten the
surface of the gelatin and the
serving plate and unmold. When
the two surfaces are wet, it's
easy to center the mold. Remove
excess moisture with a towel.

Surround large molds with
salad greens after unmolding.
They may break if unmolded on
crisp greens. Individual molds
may be turned out directly on
greens.

Treating Sorghum Seed

Angoumois moth and rice
weevils damage sorghum seed in
storage. Reduce this damage by
treating the seed heads when
you spread them to dry.

Materials to use include DDT
and commercially prepared grain
protectant.

DDT. Use one percent, five
percent or 10 percent DDT dust.
You can use 50 percent DDT wet-
table powder if you mix it nine
to one with flour.

Use an ounce and a half of
DDT dust (six level tablespoons-
full) to one cubic foot of seed
heads. Example -- seed heads
spread 10 feet by 10 feet by one
half foot deep equals 50 cubic
feet.

Grain Protectant. (0.8 percent
piperonyl and 0.05 percent pyre-
thrins). Not quite as effective as
DDT, it is commercially prepared
and ready to use. Do not use pro-
tectant dusts in which allethrins
have been substituted for a part
of the pyrethrins.

Use three ounces (12 level
tablespoonsful) for each cubic
foot of seed heads.

How to apply. Sift dust onto
seed heads using flour sacks,
sheeting or coarse sack. Hand
dust guns may be used. Stir seed
heads several times with a pitch-
fork to help insecticide sift to
seed heads below.

After thrashing, seed should
be treated again with either an
ounce and a half of DDT dust or
three ounces of grain protect-
ant to each 100 pounds of seed.
This will protect seed while stor-
ed in sacks until planting time.

CAUTION. Do not feed treated
seed to poultry or livestock.

Omer J. Bullen
Grows Bahia Grass

Mr. Omer J. Bullen of Golden
community, planted five acres of
Pensacola Bahia Grass on his
farm in the Spring of 1953.

The growing season of 1953
and 1954 have been unusually
dry, but growth has been satis-
factory. On the more fertile and
moist land the Bahia grass has
made excellent growth, on the

very dry, poor and eroded areas
the grass lived but grew very
slowly.

Where the land was fertile and
water collected, to some extent,
the growth is so dense it feels
like a carpet when walked upon.
Mr. Bullen, a SCS Cooperator,
planted this five acre field of
Bahia grass for a demonstration.
He did this to cooperate with the
Commissioners of the Tennessee
River Soil Conservation District.
These gentlemen want to find
and demonstrate plants that will
grow on the dry hill land of
Tishomingo county. Of course
they want plants that are useful
for grazing or hay and will stop
erosion. Pensacola Bahia may be
such a plant. It seems to be easy
to get a stand of this grass. When
heavily fertilized, it will make
enough growth the first year to
graze. It does not seem to be as
palatable as Dallis grass, but is
said to be a better grass for
grazing than carpet.

To me, as a technician for the
USDA Soil Conservation Service,
it appears to require heavy ap-
plications of nitrogen for good
growth, it will also require all
the minerals needed for any
good pasture.

I believe it is a good grass well
worth trying. I do hope enough
farmers in the county will plant
it to really give it a fair chance.
I want to say this, Pensacola
Bahia seems to make good growth
and take rather heavy grazing
on land to dry, poor and eroded
to sustain a stand of Dallis. It
is much easier on good land to
obtain a stand of Bahia than Dal-
lis. Stock eat it and fatten on it.
It belongs to the poaspalum fam-
ily as does Dallis. There is no
question about it being a good
pasture grass. But just how good
it is, I, as well as the SCS Com-
missioners, would like to find
out. This we can do with your
cooperation.

Poultry

Better make arrangements now
to close up part of the poultry
house when cold weather arrives.
In hot weather air passage
through the poultry house is
called "cross ventilation," and is
desired. However, in cold weather
such air movement is called
drafts. These drafts are danger-
ous.

Drafts encourage colds and
colds mean a heavy loss in egg
production. So don't have air
coming into your poultry house
from more than one side during
the fall and winter. Houses with
windows and under window ven-
tilators should be closed up tight
on three sides. Pole type houses,
open all the way from floor to
roof, should be wrapped tight on
three sides.

Most of such houses have roof
type ventilators. Any openings
in the lower half of the wall may
result in updrafts of air out
through the roof top ventilator.
In really cold weather, all sides
of the house should be closed up.
In this case, the roof top ven-
tilator will furnish plenty of ven-
tilation.

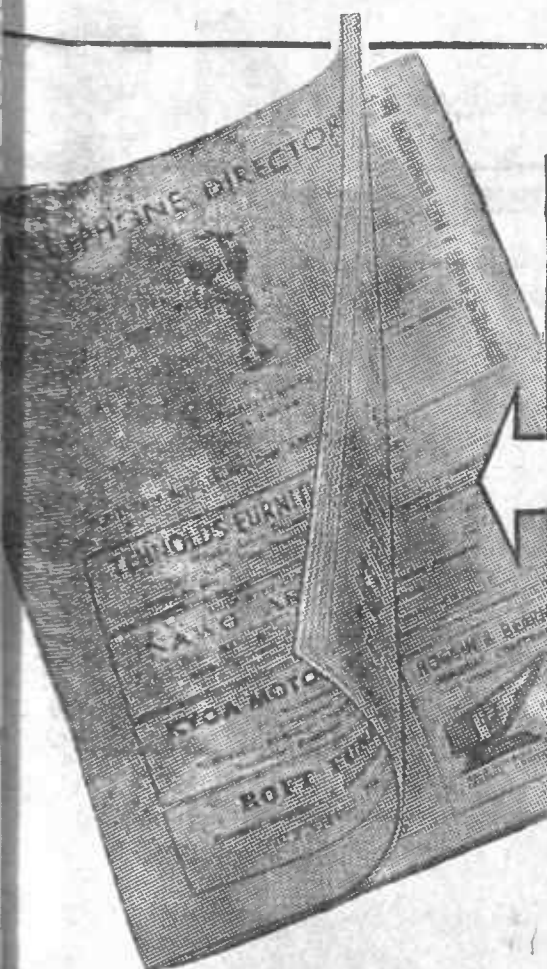
