September 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, & 24 Are Dates Set For Annual County Fair

Exhibitors Urged To Start Now Planning, Preparing Exhibits

The Tishomingo County Fair Association has officially set September 19 through 24 as the 1955 fair week. This will be the second year for the fair to be held on the new fair grounds that were purchased jointly by the Fair As-

association, the Iuka Lions club and the Town of Iuka.

A new fence will be erected around the grounds before the fair commences this year. Improvements already in existence are a livestock exhibit barn and a building for exhibiting crops, community and club booths, and home-making exhibits.

County Agent W. C. Hamilton states: "I would like to remind the people that wish to make exhibits in the County Fair this fall that now is the time to select corn, cotton and other crop exhibits. Cattle and hogs that are to be shown should be handled and made gentle. Also, dairy animals should be blanketed."

Home Agent Miss Leola Smith urges all ladies of the county to start preparations of their exhibits and planning for the fair.

A carnival has been engaged to play at the fair this year.

ECONOMIC STATISTICS

In June of this year Iuka had 12 per cent more money orders issued than a year ago and 3 per cent more than during May of this year. Postal receipts fell 6 per cent short of June 1954 but exceeded May 1955 receipts by 28 per cent.

The entire Corinth district, of which Iuka is a part, had 1 per cent more business activity in June this year than a year ago, but 3 per cent less than during May, this year.

Business changed very little in Corinth when June 1954 and June 1955 were compared. The comparison with the previous month gave a decrease of approximately 7 per cent. Money order sales over the district were down 28 per cent and postal receipts were down 11 per cent for the comparison with June 1954.

There was no change in the position of the index to general business activity in Corinth during June 1955. The month end position was 135 per cent of the 1947-1949 adjusted average.

Freeze Vegetables Now And Enjoy August's Abundance All Year
A wide variety of vegetables reach their peak in quality and flavor in August. Many vegetables—squash, corn, beans, okra and peas

are more abundant and in their prime.

You can enjoy garden-fresh vegetables, the year round, if you freeze a good supply while they are in season. Freezing is easy, in fact it takes only about half the time to freeze as it takes to can your vegetables.

If you have your own garden,

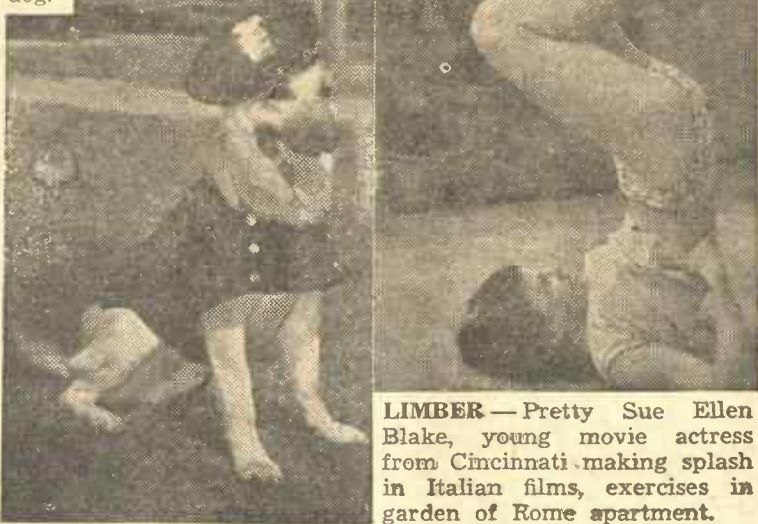
you should pick your vegetables at the height of their goodness, and early in the morning when they are freshest. If you buy them at the market, be sure to select tender, young ones, freshly picked and in good condition. Then freeze them as quickly as possible—the shorter the time from garden to freezer the better.

Your first step is to prepare them for your next meal. Then you should blanch them.

Do remember that blanching is a must for all vegetables. It is the process that causes just enough chemical change to preserve color, flavor, and texture of the vegetables, without destroying their freshness. And it is a simple operation if you work with a small amount and follow directions carefully.

The blanching time may vary for each vegetable, but researchers have worked up specific directions for each. And you should follow their instructions to the letter. I am sure that most of you got books with your freezer, but if you need one, come to the power office and I will be glad to give you one. Too much blanching may result in a soft, mushy frozen food. Too little blanching will not retard the bacterial and chemical changes sufficiently to preserve color, flavor and texture.

In the blanching process, you should use at least one gallon of water for each pound of vegetable. Any type of kettle or boiler may be used except copper, which discolors some vegetables. Place the vegetable in the top part of your blancher or in a thin bag and place it in the boiling water. Swish the bag around, a little so that each particle will be blanched evenly. Wait until the water returns to a boil before counting time. After blanching remove vegetable and chill by putting it in cold water. If you put ice in the water the vegetable will chill in about the same time required to blanch it.

Two gallons of 50 degree F. water for each pound of vegetable is recommended, and the vegetable is cooled to the temperature of the water before removal. Now it is time to drain it for packaging, sealing, and freezing. And don't forget to label and date your packages.

The main thing to remember is that the quality of your frozen food depends on the way you handle it before it is frozen. A freezer doesn't cost-it pays.

If you bought your freezer in May or June and failed to notify me, let me know because I have a nice gift for you.

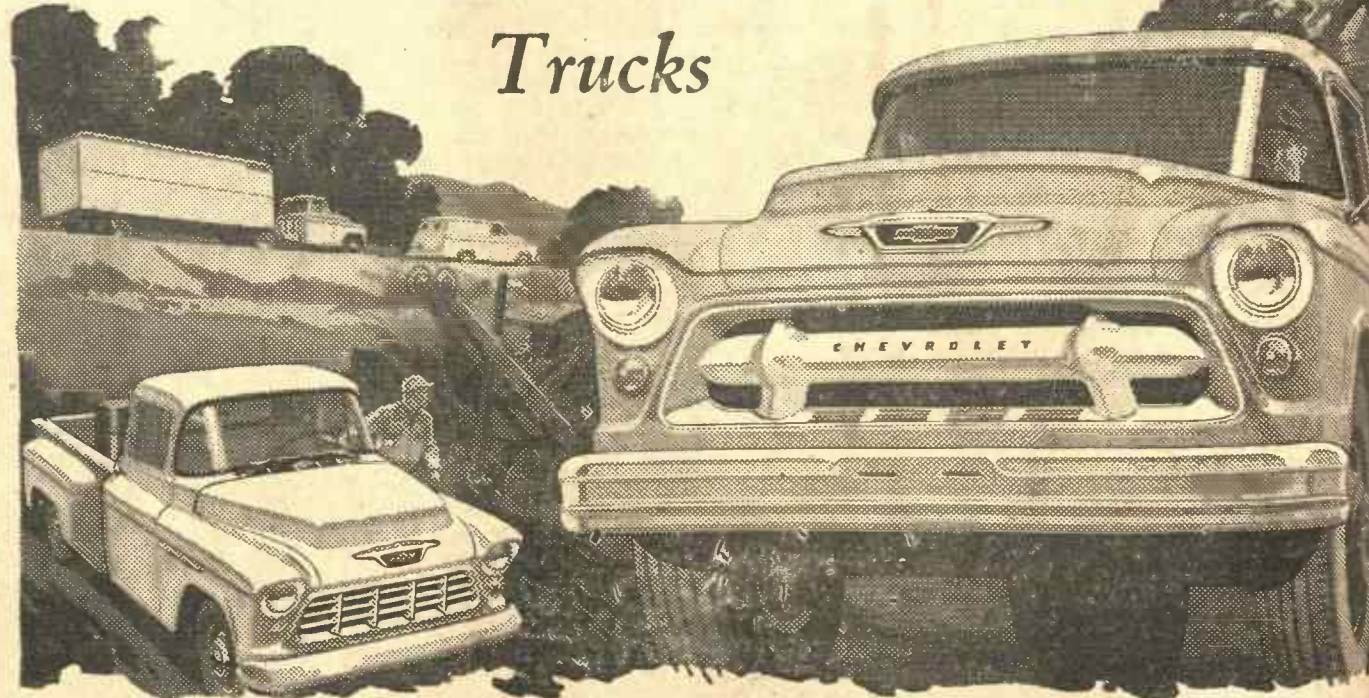

McRee Reports That Local Banks Helped Farmers In 1954 To Meet Their Needs

Mississippi farmers met their credit needs during 1954 chiefly by loans from their local banks, according to R. A. McRee, Jr., executive vice president of Iuka Guaranty Bank, who represents the Mississippi Bankers Association as Tishomingo County Agriculture Key Banker. Mississippi banks remained the largest lenders to the state's farmers during the year, providing far more financial aid to the farmers than any other lending agency, he noted.

Quoting from the fourteenth annual farm lending survey of the Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association, Mr. McRee stated that on January 1, 1955, Mississippi banks had loans outstanding to farmers totaling \$43,551,000 including both production and mortgage loans. This compares with a total of \$36,756,000 held by the farmers Home Administration, the second largest lender to Mississippi farmers. In addition, Mississippi banks held \$32,168,000 in C.C.C. loans under the government's price-support program not included in the above figures.

"Despite reduced net income and continued high production expenses on farms," Mr. McRee said, "repayment of loans is rapid, and farm assets are at near-record levels, indicating that these factors have not weakened the financial soundness of agriculture. Bank loans play an important part in maintaining this strong financial position by permitting our farmers to make use of the latest equipment and modern production and marketing methods, resulting in greater efficiency. The majority of farm loans held by Mississippi banks are for these production and operating expenses."

Bearing out Mr. McRee's statement regarding the use of bank loans to farmers is the fact that of the total farm debt outstanding in Mississippi on January 1, 1955, \$23,567,000 was in non-real estate or production loans. This compares with \$12,336,000 held by production Credit Associations and \$14,339,000 held by the Farmers Home Administration. "It can be seen from these figures that about one-half of the production credit used by

the state's farmers in 1954 came from banks," he stated. He also pointed out that a high percentage of the \$19,984,000 in farm mortgages held by banks in the state at the beginning of this year were made for production and operating purposes.

Mr. McRee reported that all but 1 of the 194 insured commercial banks in Mississippi served agriculture by making farm loans during 1954.

County Agent News By W. C. HAMILTON Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension County Cotton Insect Report

Boll Weevil activity continues to increase with new generations hatching out daily especially in cotton that has not been poisoned. Infestation counts range from one percent to sixty percent with the county wide average of twenty percent.

At this stage of cotton growth when it is fruiting heavily I want to suggest that you poison cotton three times five days apart. Also I have noted some boll weevils migration in old cotton although this is not general. Full migration is expected by August 15. Check your cotton fields at least twice each week for migrating weevils and if found poison immediately. I think it would pay to increase the poison rates of application during this part of growing season. Use from fifteen to twenty pounds of dust and increase nozzle size, if spraying, one unit.

A good rule to follow in determining whether or not a boll is mature enough to be considered safe, is to take a pocket knife and check a few. Cut the boll across. If the fiber sticks to the knife blade, it is likely to be safe. However, if the boll cuts clean, then it still needs protection.

County Fair

I would like to remind the people that wish to make exhibits in the County Fair this fall that the fair dates are September 19 through 24th. Now is the time to select corn, cotton and other crop exhibits. Cattle and hogs that are to be shown should be handled and made gentle. Also dairy animals should be blanketed.

Silage

You have several weeks to cut sorghum silage after it begins to head. I would encourage farmers to start just as soon as sorghum gets in the good dough stage and this will give them a longer period for harvesting before it blows down or gets too dry. It was once thought that sorghum cut for silage in the early stage made acid silage, but it doesn't. Corn or sorghum cut in late August gives you time to plant oats or wheat for early fall grazing. I would encourage a mixture of oats or wheat and vetch because if this same area is to be used for silage next year, it can be grazed and plowed under in plenty of time for planting.

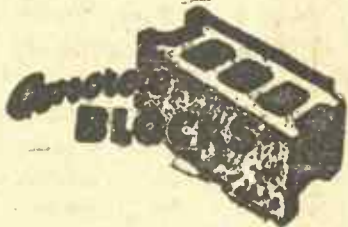

An air of optimism prevails among
the people. So far, this has been
a good crop year.

Farmers are saying if we can
get water we can make crops. Some
of the county agricultural men
are saying corn yields will average
50 bushels of corn per acre over
the county this year. And that
cotton if properly poisoned will
yield an average of one or more
per acre. L. E. Skinner of eight
acres of sericea lespedeza has har-
vested more than 34 tons of hay.
This is a yield of more than 4
tons of hay per acre. There are
so many farmers who will produce
75 or more bushels of corn per
acre they can't be listed. If you
take a look at Oscar Pruitt's at
Midway on your left. Will be
Ward Wimbish's field of corn, fur-
ther south is Omer Epps and dozen
of other fields of beautiful corn.
Dick Wingo and Bill Brinkley are
staying up nights worrying about
where they are going to store their
corn, and Harvey Davis and
Buster Honeycutt are in about the
same predicament.

Crops pastures and hay are as
fine as ever we've seen. We are
thankful and happy.

Let us think together about
what has happened in Tishomingo
County. Most of us can remember
years when was plenty of rain,
but we've never had a drop like
this before. There is a reason for
these fine crops, and that is what
we need to think about.

Let us say rains and brains
have made this crop possible. The
farmers of Tishomingo County
today are better farmers than they
were 20 years ago. Many of

Iced Tea—Ideal Thirst Quencher



WHEN the gang's all here — full
of pangs of hunger, whip up one
of those popular big super-duper
sandwiches frequently referred to
as grinders, heros or wedges
depending on what part of the
country you come from. They're
made with a large or small crunchy
loaf of French or Italian bread, and
filled with slices of tomato, ham,
cheese, salami, lettuce and some-
times even potato salad. If that
doesn't fill them up, nothing will.
And, to quench the thirst — what
could be better, less expensive and
satisfying than a big, tall glass of
iced tea. But be sure to make it
right! There's nothing quite so dis-
appointing as weak tea-colored
water pretending to be iced tea!
A good rule of thumb to keep in
mind is that iced tea requires 50%
more tea than hot tea. For example,
4 cups of hot tea require 4 tea bags,

while 4 glasses of iced tea require
6 tea bags. Although a teapot
always makes the best tea, you can
improvise if you don't have one
large enough to make a big pitcher-
ful. Here's how — just bring 2
quarts of cold water to a full roll-
ing boil in a saucepan. Remove
from heat and immediately add 5
level tablespoons tea (or 15 tea
bags). Brew, uncovered 4 minutes.
Stir and strain. Serve in ice-filled
glasses with lemon and sugar —
and if you like, a sprig of mint for
added glamor and appetite appeal.
To drink a glass of refreshing
iced tea is like walking into an air-
conditioned movie or restaurant.
You feel relieved of the heat,
relaxed and revived all at once. So
drink plenty of it — especially on
sweltering hot days when your body
needs plenty of liquid.

them are the same, only they are
20 years older. In that 20 years
they have learned a great deal.
They have turned from mules to
tractors; from low analysis fertil-
izer to high analysis fertilizers;
and they apply more pounds of
this per acre. They are planting
hybrid corn instead of getting
seed corn from their cribs to plant.
They poison their cotton by begin-
ning early to control thrips, and
late to kill migrating weevils. They

raise pure bred livestock, and a
great many of them are making
much better use of their land.

One of the Tennessee River Soil
Conservation Districts Commis-
sioners in speaking of this said,
"Acreage reduction has in many
cases proved a blessing in dis-
guise, because farmers now plant
fewer acres of cotton on their bet-
ter land, fertilizer, and poison it
which results in a much higher
yield and more profit to the far-

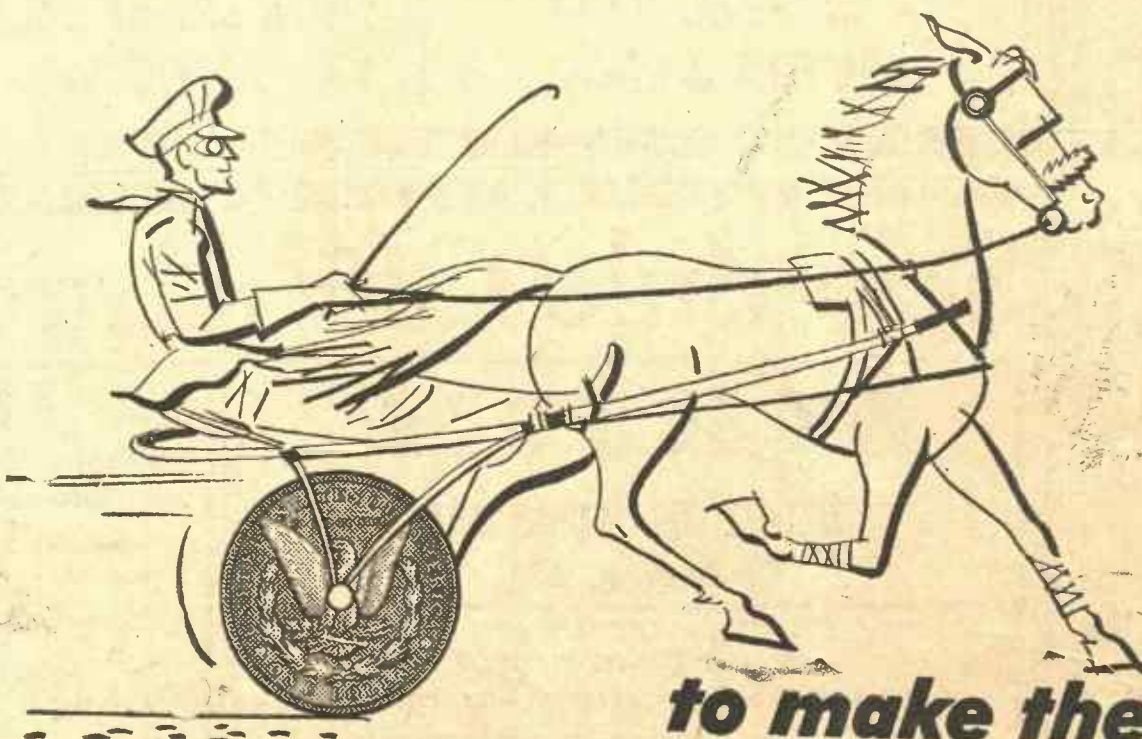
