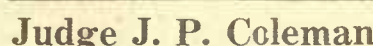

Wilson, Scruggs, Duncan, Belue And Bishop Are New County Officers; Biggs And South Are New Supervisors

Incomplete and unofficial returns from Tuesday's second primary election placed Wilson, Scruggs, Dunan, Belue and Bishop in as the new office holders for Washomingo County. Judge J. P. Coleman was victorious as governor in his race with Paul Johnson. Coleman came from behind with 1334 votes to 2493 to win over Johnson who got 2416 votes in the county. Johnson's first primary vote in the county was 2108. State-wide total for the two candidates gave Coleman 228,127 and Johnson 179,406. Coleman led Johnson with 77 votes in Washomingo county's second primary election.

In the sheriff's race Marlar had a slight lead over Wilson at the end of the first primary. However, Wilson edged Marlar out in Tuesday's election with a margin of 48 votes. Marlar's total was 668 and Wilson's was 2454.

Duncan and Daugherty, candidates for representative, entered the final stretch with Duncan holding a huge lead over Daugherty. N. Iuka 199; S. Iuka 275; W. Iuka 232; Salem, 28; total 730.

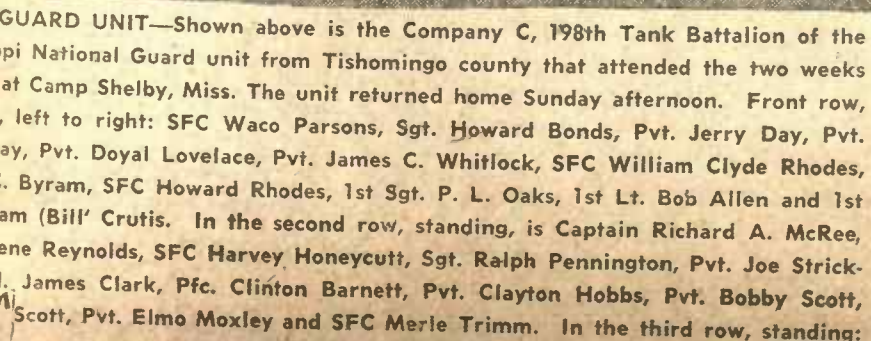

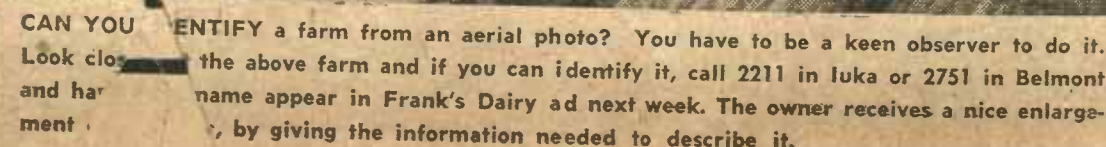

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Omer J. Bullen Grows Bahia Grass Successfully

Mr. Omer J. Bullen has demonstrated his farm near Golden, Miss. that Pensacola Bahia grass can be grown successfully in Tishomingo County.

When Mr. Bullen seeded six acres in Pensacola Bahia grass in the spring of 1953, he planted it on a highly fertilized, well-prepared seedbed, and he obtained an excellent stand. The years, 1953 and 1954, were very dry years, and it was not until 1955 that outstanding results were realized from this grass.

Mr. Fred Junior Bostick said, "We turned the cattle in on this Bahia grass pasture in 1954 and in 1955, and they grazed there in the mornings and late afternoon." This was in answer to the question as to how well cattle liked

this grass. "Our cattle prefer it to any pasture we have, continued Mr. Bostick, "and we do have some fine Dallis grass."

This year (1955), Mr. Bullen is harvesting seed from his Bahia grass. He thinks he will harvest about 250 pounds of dry seed per acre.

The Commissioners of the Tennessee Soil Conservation District are well pleased with the results Mr. Bullen has had with his Pensacola Bahia. There was some question, in the beginning as to whether this grass could be grown successfully this far north. Mr. Bullen has answered this question for the Soil Conservation District Commissioners, and they thank him for doing so.

As Farm Planning Technician, I went to Mr. Bullen and persuaded him to plant this six-acre field in Pensacola Bahia grass. Neither

of us knew whether it could be grown in this county. However, we did know there was a great need, in this county, for a grass that can be grown successfully on poor sand-clay upland, when properly fertilized and cared for. It now appears that Pensacola Bahia will do this.

Common Bermuda grass can also be grown on poor upland, if properly established and well-fertilized. However, it seems that Pensacola Bahia has advantages that makes it more desirable. (Unfortunately, it takes from two to three years to establish any kind of a good pasture on poor upland.

Most of our landowners need to use their land so as to receive a profitable income, while at the same time conserving it by stopping erosion. Pensacola Bahia grass can be planted on land too steep for cultivation, and while tending the land down, produces both hay and pasture. This can be fed or grazed by the farmers' cattle, and the barnyard fertilizer produced by these cattle can be applied to the more level fields where cultivated crops are grown. This practice will help maintain humus in the soil of the cultivated crops.

It has been demonstrated that Pensacola Bahia grass can be grown in Tishomingo County. It is an excellent crop to consider for use on our upland, which is a little too steep for cultivation.

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D. Honeycutt Constructs Stock Pond Number 2 On His Farm In Holtspur

Mr. William Dempsey Honeycutt, Holtspur, as he talked with my office recently.

"You really need another stock pond?" I asked.

"Yes, Mr. Jones, I do need one in the pasture across north of the house," he said.

He wanted ASC assistance on the construction of this pond. This assistance amounts to about half of the cost of the dirt (cubic yards). He gave this assistance the must meet government specifications as to location, design, construction, and sodding of the spillway.

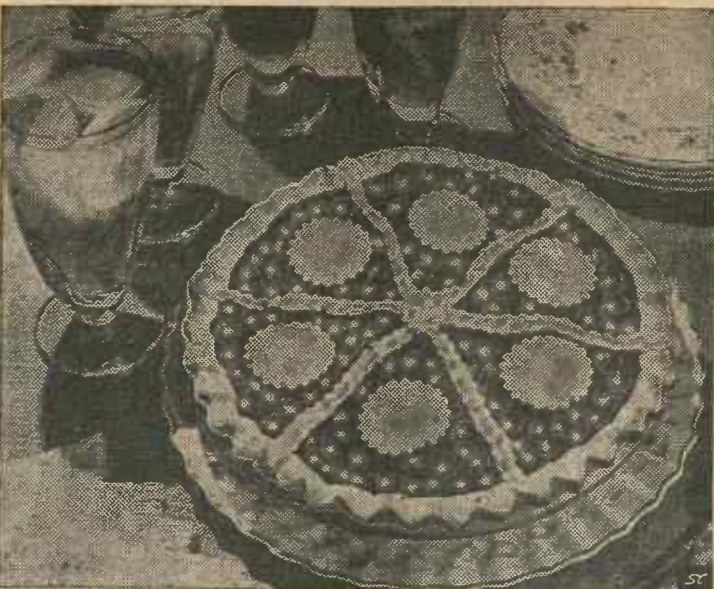
The first thing needing to be done was to verify Mr. Honeycutt's statement that he actually

needed another stock pond. If this could be done the next step would be to determine if the soil contained enough clay to hold water after a dam was constructed. This could not be determined in the office. So I suggested that he eat dinner with me and that afternoon we would visit his farm and determine if a second stock pond could be justified.

It was not a question as to whether Mr. Honeycutt was a sincere and honorable man. He most certainly is. I knew before I made this trip to his farm that he needed this extra pond. I didn't doubt that one bit.

Then why did I need to go and make an on the land inspection? I had to go because the construction of farm ponds for livestock is a permanent type soil conservation practice. It is a practice on which the U. S. Government will pay

Abundant Blueberries Ask For A Pie



Quick-cooking tapioca thickens the juice of this Fresh Blueberry Pie to a just-right consistency. For extra goodness, serve the pie warm, with a scoopful of ice cream on each wedge.

Fresh Blueberry Pie

3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
3/4 to 1 cup sugar*
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon cinnamon (optional)
4 cups wild or cultivated fresh blueberries
1 to 2 tablespoons lemon juice
Pastry for two-crust 9-inch pie
1 tablespoon butter

Combine tapioca, sugar, salt, cinnamon, blueberries, and lemon juice. Roll half the pastry 1/8 inch thick. Line a 9-inch pie pan and trim pastry at edge of rim. Fill pie shell with blueberry mixture. Dot with butter.

Roll remaining pastry 1/8 inch thick. Cut 3 long strips and lay across top of pie like spokes of a wheel. Then cut 6 pastry circles with cookie cutter and place between the strips. Cut one small circle and place at center where strips cross.

Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 65 minutes, or until syrup boils with heavy bubbles that do not burst.

*If desired, use 1/2 cup granulated sugar and 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar.

they cannot comply with the government regulations. Mr. Honeycutt now has two farm ponds. He was able to meet the requirements.

In one pasture he had the finest stand of bitter weeds I ever saw. When this was called to his attention he said, "Mr. Hamilton, the county agent, has promised me he will use this pasture as a demonstration on how to kill bitter weeds next year."

Mr. Honeycutt is not the only farmer having bitterweed trouble. Your county agent has the answer to this. Talk to him about it. The SCS men do not like to approve farm ponds in bitterweed patches, that doesn't make sense.

HOME AGENT NOTES

Getting ready for school, makes us realize the cool days are fast approaching. And that means Mother will be making Susie Warm skirts and dresses, and Johnny shirts and jackets perhaps.

If the material used is wool, it is a good idea to shrink it before cutting.

To shrink wool at home, wet a sheet in lukewarm water, wring out and lay out flat. Open the material one-half its width, deep the fold in the center, being sure to keep the grain even. If material has been torn, this will be easy to do.

Lay the material on one half of the sheet fold the other half of the sheet back over the material. Then fold the sheet and material into smooth folds about one foot wide.

Let it stand until thoroughly dampened, overnight in O. K. The time depends on the weight of the material.

Unfold and lightly press on the wrong side. It really does not take much pressing or steaming for wool that has been shrunk. Some wool actually does not have to be pressed at all.

Bedmaking

Making up one bed for a year involves a long trip - a four mile walk and 25 hours to make the journey. With extra cover on the bed, the distance and time is even greater.

Try making up one side of the bed completely, then tuck it in

at the foot and finish up on the other side. This one-trip bedmaking will cut the distance to one and one fifth miles and the hours to less than 16.

Kinds of Milk

When you buy milk, you will find it in several forms. These definitions should help you select the form best suits your purpose.

Fresh Raw Milk - unpasteurized; the fat and bacterium count vary. Milk should be pasteurized before using.

Fresh Pasteurized Milk - whole milk that has been heated, then quickly cooled. Pasteurizing destroys the bacteria and makes the fluid milk safe for all uses.

Homogenized Milk - in which the fat globules have been broken down into smaller sizes. No cream rises to the top, since it is distributed through the milk.

Vitamin D Milk - milk which has Vitamin D added (the cap and label will tell you.)

Fluid Skim Milk - only the cream or butter fat has been removed. Don't overlook it for cooking or drinking. It is highly nutritious.

Evaporated Milk - over half the water in fluid milk is removed. Milk is sealed in cans, then sterilized by heat. With an equal amount of water added, evaporated milk can be used like any other fluid milk. It can replace fresh milk in cooking.

Sweetened Condensed Milk - whole milk with 50 percent of the water evaporated. Sugar is added to preserve it. (It is usually used in recipes especially designed for it.)

Nonfat Dry Milk - has water and fat removed. With water added, it makes fluid skim milk. In fluid or dry form, it can be used in cooking. This milk has the advantage of both low cost and convenience. Keep it on hand for

emergencies.

Buttermilk - originally a by-product of butter making. It is now artificially produced with bacterial cultures from pasteurized skim or partially skimmed milk.

82 County Supts. Issued Invitations To Attend 4th District Education Conf.

J. M. C. Bourland, Amory; W. H. Hight, Louisville; and Boswell Stevens, Macon, who will serve as ex-officio consultants to the membership of the District conference.

Invitations have gone out from Governor White and Superintendent Tubb to the 82 county superintendents, the 410 county board of education members, the 70 separate district superintendents and the 350 local separate district trustees, inviting them to attend this Conference or the conference of their district. Superintendent Tubb is urging each of these invited officials to invite other leading people of the county particularly members and members-elect of the Legislature. The primary objective or at least one of the primary objectives of these conferences is to obtain a good cross-section opinion on the six acres of discussion set out for the consideration of the six district conferences as well as the State Conference and the White House Conference. Superintendent Tubb believes that great good for public education will result from these discussions.

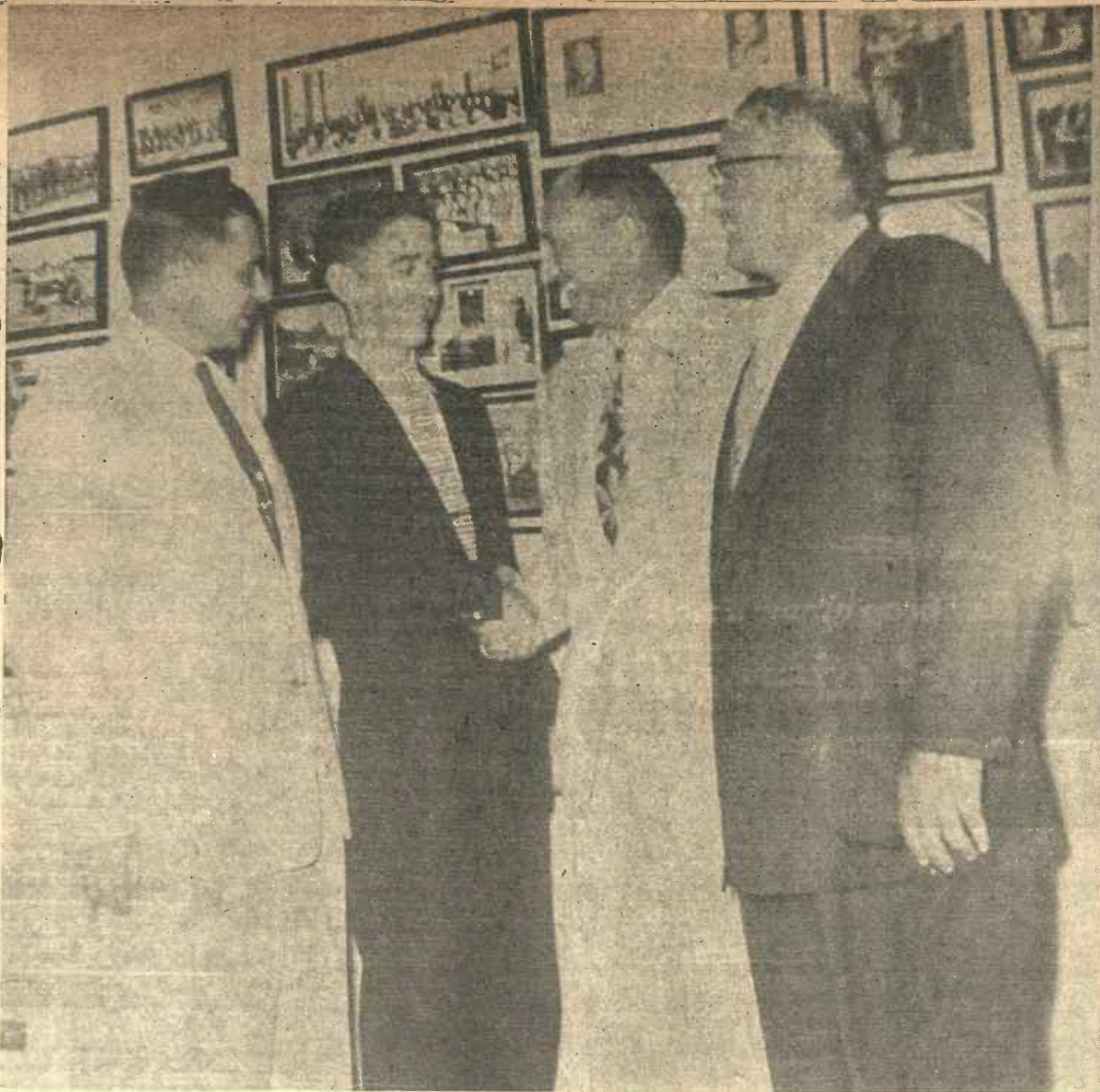

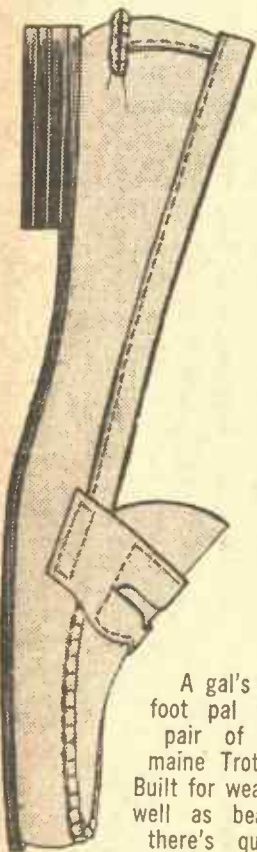

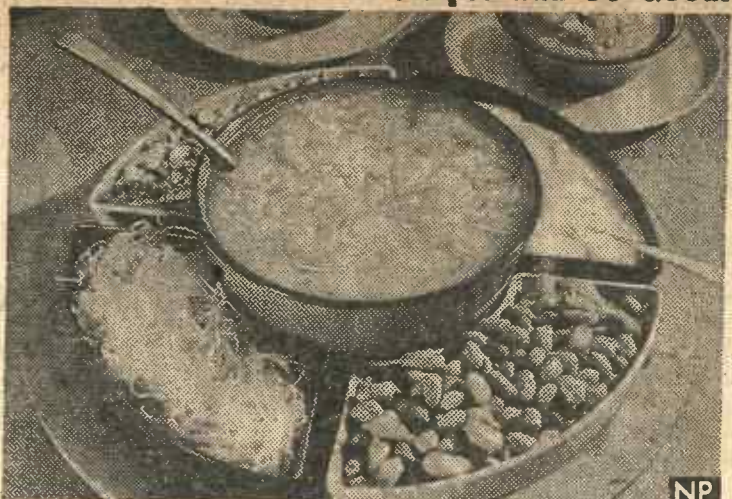

Inventory Your Woods

You would quickly notice what neglect, decay and abuse do to a building, but have you noticed what they do to the wood? Many of the wooded acres in Tishomingo County, once the very finest have been reduced by fire and thought- less cutting to where they are really a dead load on the owner.

Most of those acres can produce at least 400 board feet of lumber per year, but to get that production the timber stand will have to be rebuilt with desirable trees. On many acres, these desirable trees are already present as young ones but they must be released to per- mit their development. This goal can be obtained on a cost shar- ing basis through your local A. S. C. after those small trees have been released, protection from fire and over grazing will then permit the desirable trees to grow into val- uable timber.

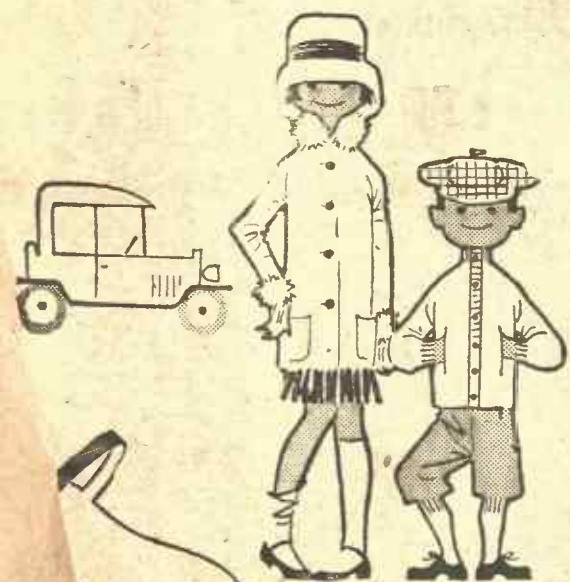

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

Background Scripture: Ezra 1; 2:64-65;

God In History

Lesson for August 28, 1955

WHAT is it that makes the world move? — the world of men, of events, the wide world of history? What is the most powerful factor in history? Some say geography, some say climate (which is still geography), some say great men, some say ideas, some say the progress of inventions. The religious answer is strikingly different from all these: it is GOD.

The reason why historians seldom mention God (even when they believe in him) is that they limit themselves to what can be seen and heard. True, sometimes historians are concerned with thoughts, as for instance, what were Stalin and Roosevelt and Churchill thinking of at Yalta? But thoughts are facts that scientists all admit; while God is not the kind of fact with which science can deal. So "historical science" as it is called confines itself deliberately to the kind of fact that science describes. Now God—let it be repeated—is not in that class of things at all. He is not a thing, he is not in a class. He works in history, but not in the way a man works, still less like a force such as that of wind or rainfall or volcanic eruptions. God can be seen, but only with "eyes of faith." He can be known, but by no means as simply as your cat be known. God works in history, not separately from events and men, but in men and forces. As Paul says, God is over all, through all and in all.

King's Intention

According to the Bible, God can work in and by mean of the acts of men who do not know him at all. There is a mystery here which no writer in the Bible undertakes to explain, a mystery which perhaps no human mind is capable of understanding. But the fact is

believed by men of faith. Take for instance the famous king Cyrus, known to history outside the Bible as well as inside it. He was one of the great conquerors and administrators of all time. At a peak of his career he made himself master of what had been the Babylonian Empire. He knew that many a temple had been plundered and destroyed by the Babylonian kings, and he knew that the many displaced persons from all the conquered cities where those temples had been, would be grateful for the restoration of those temples. So King Cyrus, in order to make himself "solid" and popular with this mass of subject peoples, adopted the policy of returning the "gods" of those peoples and authorizing the restoration of their temple worship. It used to be thought that Cyrus was a worshipper of the Jews' God, but archaeologists have discovered the original edict or announcement of Cyrus, explaining what he was doing, and asking that all these gods whose worship he was restoring, would pray to Marduk, whom Cyrus regarded as the king over all the gods, on Cyrus' behalf. Isaiah says plainly that Cyrus did not know the true God,—but God knew him, and wrought out his purposes through him, ignorant of God though he was.

People's Devotion

The Bible shows also that God works through the devotion and service of men who do know him. We may doubt whether the proclamation of a Cyrus would have done any good if there had not been men who were eager and ready for just such a chance to return to Jerusalem and restore the worship of the true God. We have had in American history one of the many other illustrations of this same point in the freeing of the slaves. The emancipation proclamation of 1863 was not made altogether from charitable motives. There was a strong political-military purpose in it; the immediate object of the proclamation was not to free the slaves everywhere, but to win the war and restore the union. Later, when slavery was abolished by the Constitution, the freeing of the slaves would have done more harm than good if it had not been for the devotion of men and women of both races who made it their life-work to educate and uplift those who were like sheep without a shepherd. God does work in history; but he needs the service of those who understand his ways and work with him.

Importance Of Your Social Security No.

Many of us will soon for-
get those little metal
tags, which we wore
around our necks.
The purpose of those
tags were to identify millions
of men and women so that their
earnings could be kept properly.
It's the same with your social
security account number. This
number, together with your name,
identifies your social security
account. Inasmuch as elig-

ibility for old-age and survivors
insurance and the amount of ben-
efit payments are based on the
earnings recorded in your social
security account, it's just plain
good sense to make sure that all
your earnings are being properly
entered on your record.

How can you make sure that you
will not be short-changing your-
self? Just make sure that your earn-
ing from work or self-employment
are being reported under the cor-
rect name and number as shown on
your social security card. You
can keep a check on your employ-
er not only by making sure he
has your name and number when
you start on the job but by check-
ing your card against your pay
slips or envelopes from time to
time. If you are a self-employed
businessman or farm operator
and make up your own social sec-
urity return every year, simply
make sure that your social secu-
rity account number card and your
annual report agree.
Even when mistakes are made,

the social security people are usu-
ally able, although with extra
time and expense, to rectify such
errors by use of a system of checks
and cross-checks. But don't put
yourself, or your survivors in case
of your death, in the situation
of one widow and her three chil-
dren. They were receiving lower
monthly benefits than they were
actually entitled to because the
deceased husband had relied on his
memory instead of his social secu-
rity card in furnishing his social
security number to his employers.
As a result, some of his employers
had used an incorrect number
and some of his wages were not
properly recorded. It was only af-
ter considerable time and checking
that this widow and her children
were able to start receiving the
full monthly benefit checks to which
they were properly entitled.

Remember your eligibility and
rate of benefits depend upon your
social security record; but your
correct social security record de-
pends upon you. If your work is
covered by the social security law,
it is important that your reported
earnings be positively identified
with the account number and name
exactly as shown on your social
security card.

Don't cheat yourself — check
yourself.

General Rules For Preparing
Oven Meals

Why not plan one day a week
for an oven meal and make your
cooking easier for that day?

Below are a few general rules
that should be observed in plan-
ning oven meals.

1. Choose foods that will cook
at the same temperature and ap-
proximately the same length of
time.

2. If meat requires a longer co-
oking time than other foods, place
vegetables and dessert in the oven
for the last hour and a half of
hour roasting period depending on
length of time required to cook
them.

3. Estimate the length of time
necessary to cook the meal by the
weight of the meat.

4. Roast meat in an uncovered
pan. Add no water.

5. Do not attempt to roast the
tougher cuts of meat in the oven.
These are better cooked in the
deep well cooker or on the surface
units.

6. Cook vegetables in covered
pans. (For vegetables that will
cook in about 30 minutes on the
surface, allow one to one and half
hours in the oven)

7. Foods which are cooked with
a large amount of syrup on the
bottom of the pan should be placed
on the upper rack.

8. Desserts usually are cooked
on the upper rack, when included
with the oven meal.

9. Be careful to select utensils
which fit into the oven without
too much wasted space.

Peritrate Is New Drug Being Used Against Attacks Of Angina Pectoris

A relatively new drug has been
established as the most valuable
long-acting medicine for protection
against attacks of angina pectoris,
painful and disabling heart disease
according to a report in the cur-
rent issue of "Circulation".

The new drug, called Peritrate,
is closely related to the explos-
ive nitroglycerine which has long
been the standard remedy for
angina pectoris.

Authors of the report are Dr.
Henry I. Russek, consultant in car-
diovascular research, U. S. Public
Health Service Hospital, Staten
Island, N. Y. and Drs. Burton L.
Zohman, Alice E. Drumm, William
Weingarten and Virgil J. Dorset.
The study was a joint project with
the National Heart Institute. The
journal, "Circulation", is publish-
ed by the American Heart Assoc-
iation.

The study tested the four drugs
commonly used in angina pectoris
as long-acting coronary vasodilator.
Of the four, only Peritrate "is
worthy of the designation," the
physicians wrote.

Because anginal attacks occur
when the heart muscles are de-
prived of oxygen carried by blood,
doctors have for decades used
nitroglycerine which dilates the
coronary arteries, often relieving
attacks within minutes after a
tablet has been dissolved under
the patient's tongue.

The drawback to nitroglycerine,
the doctors state, is "the relatively
short duration of its action". In
their tests, the effect of nitrog-
lycerine lasted for only 15 to
30 minutes while, "Peritrate...ex-
hibited its action up to five hours or
more following administration."

Objective evaluation of drugs
that have been developed to pro-
vide long-acting protection against
anginal attacks has been difficult,
the scientists emphasize, because
researchers cannot rely on the
patient's report of heart pain.
The psychological or sedative ef-
fect of treatment alone is some-
times enough to relieve pain. Place-
bos, so-called "sugar pills" with
no drug action whatever have
been proved to bring relief to
certain suggestible patients. On
the other hand, sedative drugs
such as alcohol and morphine,
relieve or eliminate pain but do
not dilate the coronary arteries,
according to the investigators.

To make sure that they were
getting physiological and not phy-
chological or sedative reactions,
the doctors devised an experiment
in which results did not depend
on the feeling of patients but on
electrocardiographic records of
heart action.

The physicians carefully select-
ed twelve patients whose elect-

rocardiograms were constant after
they had been subjected to identi-
cal exercise without medication,
and also to the same exercise with-
in minutes after the administ-
ration of nitroglycerine.

Once the constancy was estab-
lished, it was assumed that these
patients' reactions would provide
objective data for the evaluation
of the long-acting drugs.

The four drugs were then given
separately on different days - each
before breakfast. (Dosage on an
empty stomach is important, the
doctors say.) Thereafter the effec-
tiveness of the drugs was measured
by recording the patients' elect-
rocardiographic responses to the
standard exercise, taken at inter-
val up to six hours after the drugs
had been administered.

These electrocardiographic res-
ponses were compared to those
which the twelve men had record-
ed after the same exercise a few
minutes following nitroglycerine
medication.

Tests run with each drug varied
from 138 to 271; 194 were run with
Peritrate. Eight of the 12 men
showed the same response to the
exercise several hours after Perit-
rate as in the first half hour
nitroglycerine.

One of the three other long-act-

ing drugs, nitroglycerine in a
sustained-action tablet, the clinic-
ians reported, showed only a "sli-
ght to moderate effect", and, "in
no instance" did it "cause a not-

mal response to be recorded," even
when given in massive doses.

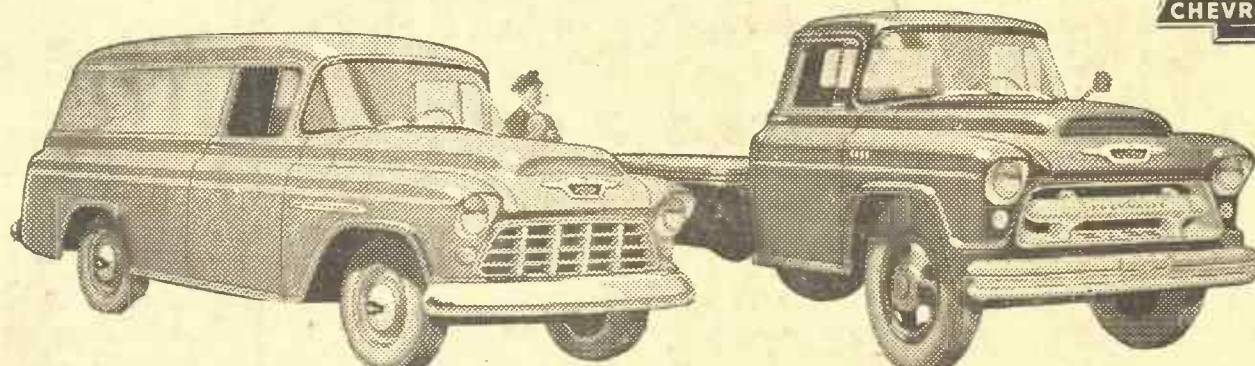

Whether the sandwich is carried in a lunch box, served at a restaurant, or eaten at home, the factory worker, office worker, farmer, and homemaker alike can rest assured that the sandwich does more than satisfy hunger in hot weather—it provides valuable nutrients necessary for good health.

New Chemical For Cotton Defoliation Controls Regrowth

Tests Reported from Delta Branch Experiment Station Show Satisfactory Control Obtained with Amino Triazole.

Heavy rainfall and rank growth emphasize the proper use of defoliant to protect and prepare cotton for harvesting this year. Loss from boll rots may be much greater than during the preceding year.

The Delta Branch Experiment Station at Stoneville has recently published a report showing how these losses can be reduced by the proper application of defoliant.

Second-growth following defoliation has been a serious problem ever since the use of harvest aid chemicals was introduced. In many cases, fields in excellent condition for harvesting have been covered with regrowth before machines could begin the harvest operation. Recently a material, amino triazole, was found to possess both defoliating and second-growth retarding properties.

After two years of investigating the effectiveness of the material at Delta Station, Dr. Harry Carns and his associates summarized their findings:

"These experimental results indicate that the chemical amino triazole offers considerable promise as a means of controlling second-growth in cotton. For this purpose it may be applied either alone or in combination with a commercially available spray defoliant. For control of second-growth the material was satisfactory when applied at the rate of 0.75 to 1.0 pounds per acre.

"The use of amino triazole alone as a defoliant is not presently recommended. Where combinations of a defoliant and amino triazole were used, satisfactory defoliation occurred when 0.75 to 1.0 pounds of amino triazole were combined with one-half the recommended rate of the defoliant. The data suggest that even lower rates of defoliant may be used; however, additional information is required."

The complete report is published in the August issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.
