Iuka School Joins Special Milk Program, Supt. H. L. Shook Announces

Superintendent H. L. Shook announced today that an agreement has been completed with the School Lunch Program of the Department of Education which will enable the Iuka Public Schools to participate again this year in the Special School Milk Program.

The milk program was launched last year by the U. S. Department of Agriculture to encourage school children to drink more milk. Funds advanced by USDA to state educational agencies are used to reimburse schools for a substantial part of the cost of the milk served. Local dairies and distributors supply the milk.

All Schools that participate in the program this year will be able to serve their pupils milk at a cost of about two cents a half-pint, depending on the rate of federal reimbursement rates and in school distribution costs, Mr. Shook said.

Federal payments for milk served in Tishomingo County schools this year will amount to 4 cents a half-pint for schools enrolled in the National School Lunch Program, and 3 cents a half-pint for all other schools, Mr. Shook explained. These payments, he added, must be passed on as price reductions to the pupils.

Mr. Shook reported that the Special School Milk Program for this year has been modified and improved, which will enable more schools to participate, and thus benefit more children. Among changes working out he said, is that participating schools will be partly reimbursed with federal funds for all milk that is served as a "separate item", or in excess of the customary half-pint served as part of the complete lunch under the National School Lunch Program. Schools not enrolled in the lunch

program, but participating in the milk program will receive part federal reimbursement for all milk served. Last year a normal milk consumption base was established for each participating school and federal reimbursement was based on the quantity of milk served in excess of the base. This year, the base has been done away with.

Parents should assist schools with milk programs this year by encouraging their children to enroll in it and to make a habit of drinking milk regularly while at school, especially since the cost of the milk to the pupil is low.

"Although milk is generally recognized as the most nearly perfect food, and most necessary for our growing children, the fact remains that too many of our children do not get enough milk," Mr. Shook said. "Under the Special Milk Program, the pupil is able to get enough milk for his daily nutritional requirements, and at a low cost. We found last year that children really like milk and will drink more of it when it is readily available at reasonable prices."

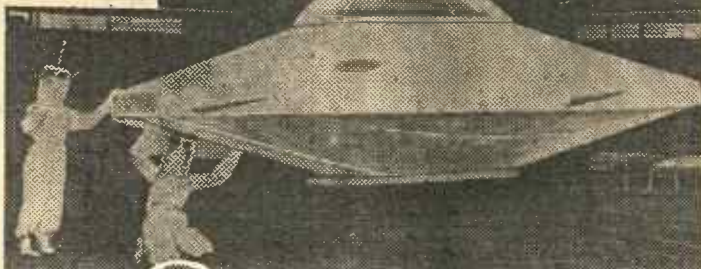

Farmers File Annual Report On Social Security

Sally could see that Bill was annoyed the moment he came in the door. Somehow a wife can al- ways tell, it was the set of his chin, or on indefinable something in his eyes. Sally didn't wait for him to speak, "Well, what is it this time dear?"

Bill mumbled, "It's this social security business. I don't see why they want us to keep records and make quarterly returns for a farm hand just on the little amount we pay. Jack doesn't earn over \$10 a month milking cows for us will this mean that we have to prepare a report every quarter just as we did when we were running the filling station?"

Sally replied, "No Bill, you are wrong about reporting for farm hands. We had a homemakers club meeting today and we discussed social security. A social security representative was there and he explained that reports for farm employees would be filed on an annual basis in cases like ours. In fact, he gave us a little booklet which he called "OASI-25." Let me see, that should be in my purse yes, here it is. let's read it together." "Here on the first page, last paragraph.

"A farmworker is covered under the new law if the employer pays him cash wages of \$100 or more in any calendar year, employer and employee taxes on these wages must be reported on a special Internal Revenue form and paid to the District Director of Internal Revenue. The social security taxes are 2 percent each for the employer and employee."

"It is important that you keep records of the name, social security number and cash wages of each employee to whom you pay or expect to pay, as much as \$100 in cash wages."

Assistance Available To Timberland owners

Farmers and other private timberland owners will be allowed an assistance payment of up to \$6.00 per acre, but not to exceed 70 per cent of the actual average cost of "weeding" inferior species and cull trees from their timberlands, according to an announcement made by E. R. De Silva of the U. S. Forest Service. Prior approval of the County ASC Committee is necessary if assistance payments are to be expected. There are approximately 7 million acres of timberlands in the State where pine and other desirable species are over-topped by weed trees such as black jack oak which is of no commercial value. Lay-by season for other farm crops is an excellent time of year to perform this type of woods work since deadening at this season of the year is most effective in killing the worthless species which may be over-topping a crop of pot-

ential "green gold".

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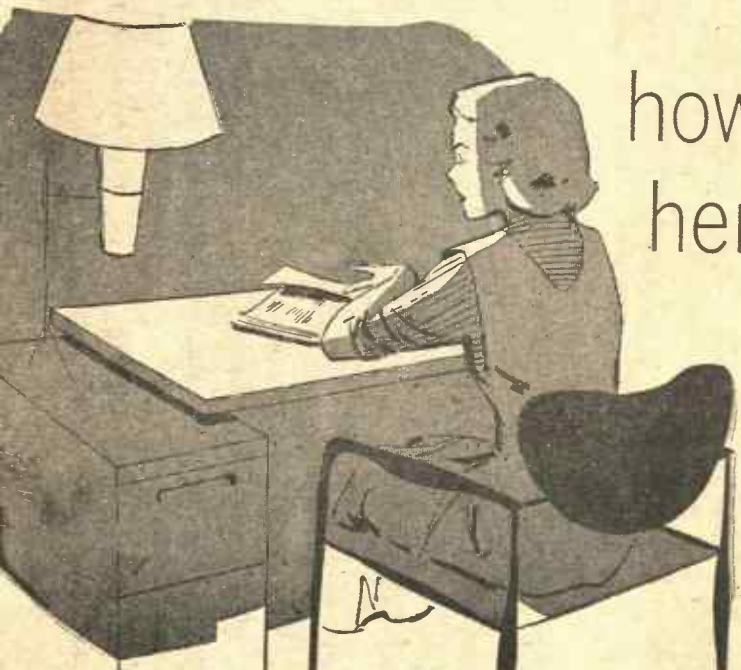

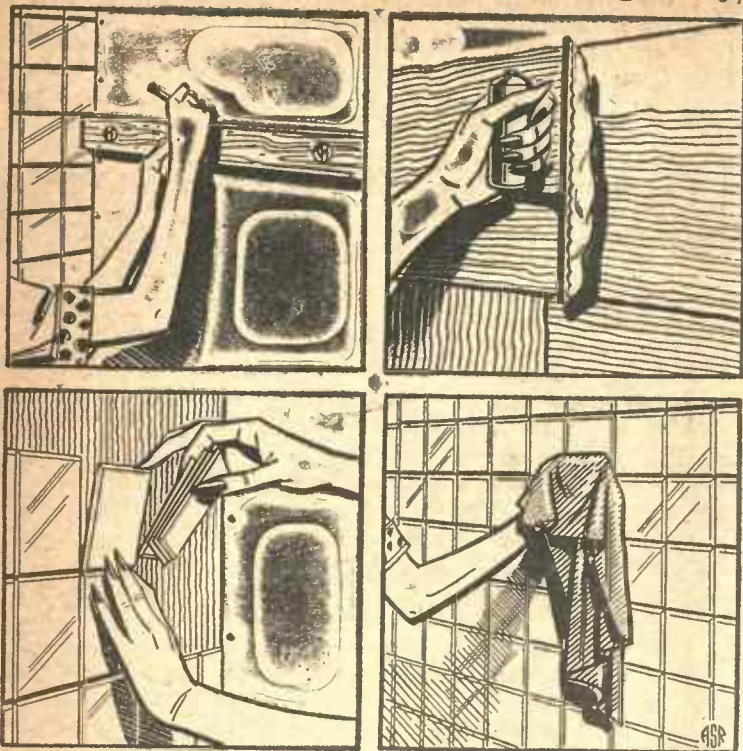

Plastic Tile Makes Remodeling Easy



Homeowners today are doing more of their own home modernizing than ever, and the big reason is the new ease of remodeling, using plastic wall tile. Old-fashioned bathrooms, kitchens, dinettes and other such areas can be converted into brighter, more livable rooms easily and inexpensively by installing plastic wall tile made of polystyrene.

Because plastic tile is light weight, a specially constructed supporting wall is not required—important in renovating an older home. Tile may be applied over smooth plaster, plasterboard, plywood, and many other surfaces. It is not satisfactory to "tile" over rough plaster. Wall-paper or oil cloth must be removed and paste washed off before tiling.

Walls must be true to insure a good job. If wall is not true or has holes, or large cracks, plastering should be done to form a smooth, level surface. After wall is prepared, follow these easy steps:

Draw guide lines, using a level, to determine horizontal and vertical starting lines. (Upper left.)

Using a mastic trowel, apply mastic (adhesive) smoothly and in sufficient quantity to insure good coverage on back of tile. (Upper right.)

Begin setting tile in middle of wall at top level line, pressing each firmly into place by applying pressure at corners only. After laying a half-dozen horizontal tiles, lay a vertical row to lower edge of surface to be tiled. This provides accurate alignment and makes a neat appearance. All partial tiles then appear in corners. (Lower left.)

As each row nears corner, stop tiling before corner tile is set. When several rows have reached this stage, place each corner tile, in turn, down the line. Special tile shapes may be used as finishing touches.

After installation, remove excess mastic with soft cloth and suitable cleaner. Do not polish until mastic has been added. (one tablespoon per gallon of water). Allow to dry; polish with dry cloth. (Lower right.)

The result? A hardy, permanent wall covering, yet an attractive one, having a softness of color which blends admirably with any decor.

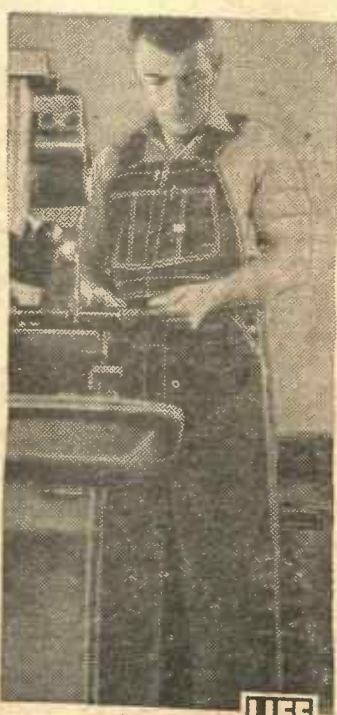

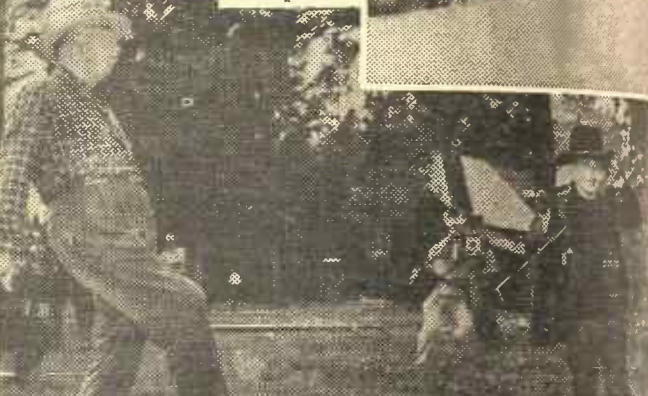

Mack Sanders, Chairman of the Tishomingo County A. S. C. Committee announces further Sign-Up for Federal Cost-Sharing for practices carried out on the farms of Tishomingo County. The First Sign-Up Period for fall practices ended August 31, however, if you did not get your request in during that period you can still sign up and get your material as long as the money lasts. You will be able to sign up and carry the material out the same day.

All who have not done so are urged to see about this soon and not wait until the rush and then possibly not any assistance. Who have previously made request has been approved and you should come to the office at once and get your material.

Practices that are available in addition to the Cover Crop practice are (1) Stock Ponds, (2) permanent Ditches, (3) Terraces, (4) Agricultural Limestone, (5) Timber Stand Improvement.

E. N. Allen, ASC office manager said; For the farmers in the Belmont Area we will be at Belmont on Tuesday of each week beginning next Tuesday, September 13. Keep this in mind and meet us there and get your material. Come prepared to carry your material out on the same day.

Marketing Cards have been mailed to farmers that are eligible to receive them. Be sure to take care of your card and carry it with you when you are ginning and selling your cotton. If you leave your card at home you cannot go by the A. S. C. office and get your number. This is a strict violation. If you lose your card you may report it to the A. S. C. Office and after investigation has been made, which will take approximately 3 to 4 days, you can be issued a duplicate card.

Survey Made Of Home Consumption Of Milk Products

Are urban and rural families in Mississippi consuming milk in quantities recommended in food plans? What types of families have more, what types less than the suggested amounts?

In an effort to answer these questions, records of milk products consumed at home by members of 503 urban and 518 rural families in Adams, Ttala, Jones and Marion Counties were obtained by the Home Economics Department of the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station at State College.

About one-eight of the rural families and one-fourth of the urban families in the highest income group (\$1500 per capita or over) did not have milk products in amounts recommended in low-cost food plans.

The majority (57%) of the rural families and about 40 percent of the urban families in the lowest income group (under \$750 per capita) used milk products in amounts suggested in low-cost food plans.

Families composed entirely of adults more often consumed milk products in recommended amounts than did families with children. Adults in families with children drank less milk per capita than adults in families without children. Families with children were larger and recommended amounts for children are greater.

During the report week urban families used an average of 4.29 quarts of fluid milk equivalent per capita; rural families 5.17 quart. Rural families used only .34 quarts per capita more converted milk (i.e. canned milk, cheese, perched ice cream, cream) than rural families, the report goes on to say.

This study points out that there is no one solution for remedying underconsumption of milk, but it is the low-income family with children and the family with poor milk consumption habits that need special attention.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Background Scripture: Nehemiah 1: 2, 4; 6: 12-27: 31, 43.
Devotional Reading: Nehemiah 1: 6-11.

Executive Task
Lesson for September 11, 1955

THE city of Jerusalem was a slum. There is no other good word for it. The people, poor and few and scared, were existing in the midst of rubble. Today in Korea the cardboard shacks are coming down, more permanent houses are being built; but in Jerusalem there was no rebuilding. Everything was left just as it was after the war. How long had that been? One hundred and forty-one years! Four generations — as far back from Nehemiah's time as 1814 is from us. Suppose the city of Washington had never been rebuilt, since the British burned it in the "war of 1812"? Nehemiah was amazed and shocked when he heard about it. Like all prosperous Jews who lived in Persia, he had supposed everything was all right back in the motherland. When they told him how things actually were, he first cried; but then he acted.

Competition
Nehemiah, armed with a royal commission — for Palestine was now a part of the great Persian Empire—turned out to be one of the most remarkable executives in history. He went to Jerusalem as governor; but he saw it was no real city. In those days you could no more have a city without a wall around it than you can have a city today without paved streets, or telephones. The wall was an absolute number one Must. No doubt previous governors had seen as much; but they had done nothing about it. Nehemiah at once went to work on this problem. In 52 days the wall was completed; 52 days to do what for 93 years (since the first "Return") every one else in charge of Jerusalem had failed to do. How did Nehemiah succeed where so many others had failed—or not even tried? The answer, in one sentence, is: Nehemiah was the kind of executive who can make hindrances and handicaps work for him instead of against him. One of the handicaps obviously was the many jealous divisions among the people. The class-spirit can be shown just as easily in a group of castaways on a desert island, as it can in New York. Nehemiah knew all about this; and he organized his wall-builders by groups according to their occupation. The goldsmiths built here, and the priests built there, and so on. No group wanted to be outdone by any other group, so they all pushed on till it was done. It takes healthy competition to bring out what people can really do.

Fear Can Be Useful
Perhaps the big reason why the wall had never been built was that the people, ill-equipped and leaderless, knew that their watchful enemies would not want Jerusalem to rise again. They were afraid of "reprisals" or raids from one place or another, if they really set to work to build a real city again. Now Nehemiah did not wait till they got over being scared. They never would. So he (so to speak) tied that scare to their coat-tails, like a pack of fire-crackers. He ordered the citizens, as far as it was practical, to build the part of the wall nearest to where they lived. Every man and woman (yes, there were women) working on the wall would think: If this section of wall goes down, my own home will be the first one pillaged! So of course these scared people worked like mad, each one determined that if the wall gave way anywhere, it wouldn't be near his house.

Putting Human Nature To Work

All that business about the spears, and other army equipment—ordering half the people to stand by in battle dress while the rest worked on the wall—may have scared off the enemy raiders; but it did something else: it got the wall built in an amazingly short time. Just the sight of those spears would put everybody into high gear. They wanted to finish that wall before the battle started. It never started; but Nehemiah's dramatic mobilization kept those amateur wall-builders going from dawn till dark. So Nehemiah showed in his time what the best executives have always shown: the skill to use human nature as it is, on the hoof. Executives—governors, presidents, heads of corporations, bishops—could doubtless get better results with better people. Tree Management Contest Open To All Miss. Farmers

All Mississippi farmers are invited to enter a forest tree management contest announced today by the Mississippi Forestry Association in cooperation with the Seale Foundation.

Participants may be the owner or operator who is interested in applying intensive improvement to selected acres of timberland now and July 1, 1956.

Purpose of the contest is to better farm woodland management in recognition of the importance of the State's timber industry to its general economy. Practices to be considered in selecting one county and district winners will include planting, timber stand improvement, removal of culls and weeds, selective harvesting and protection from fire, disease and over-grazing.

Contest is sponsored by the Mississippi Forestry Association, Seale Foundation, and the Mississippi Commission, Mississippi College, U. S. Forest Service, Mississippi Vocational Agricultural Experiment Station, Illinois Central Railroad and the Agricultural Work- ingmen's Union.

Only clean grain should be placed in storage. Cracked grain, screening, chaff and dust make for high insect infestations.

Grain Storage

Do you have a place to store your corn? Is the storage facility safe, rat and weevil proof? In order to qualify for government loans on stored corn, the commodity Credit Corporation has specific requirements for grain storage that must be met. Does your storage house or bin meet these requirements?

If you take a few precautions, corn can be stored safely on the farm for more than a year. Particular attention must be paid to the moisture content of the corn. During warm weather, corn can be stored safely only when the moisture content is less than 14 percent. Excessive moisture will cause souring, heating or molding and will also promote insect infestation.

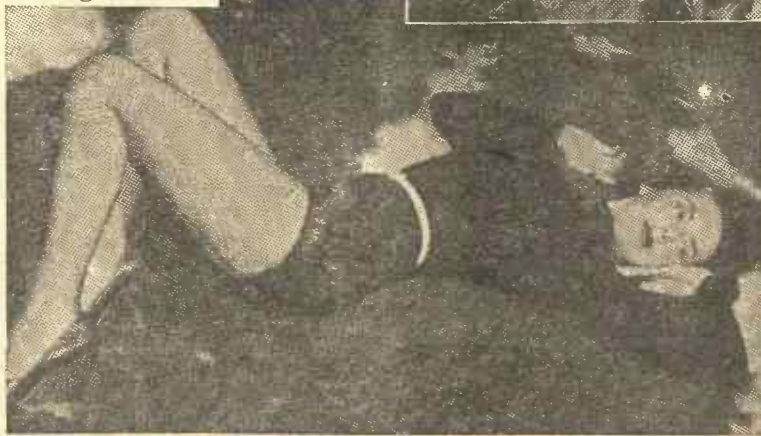

Make this roughage and the concentrate feeds that you give your cows go further in producing milk. Do not feed it to flies and other parasites. Treat your cows with insecticide regularly to prevent losses to insects. See your county agent for specific insecticides to use and how to use them.

Cotton Gin Fires

Wooden matches cause one out of every three gin fires during the harvest season. Sometimes the matches are carelessly dropped in to pick sacks or trailers by hand pickers. They are then ignited by friction during the ginning process and set the cotton lint afire.

These fires do not just endanger the gin. Smoldering lint, pressed undetected into a bale, may burst into flame hours later in a boxcar or warehouse crowded with other bales.

All cotton farmers and gin operators are urged to see that their employees do not carry wooden "strike anywhere" matches with them when picking cotton or at work in the cotton gin. If matches must be carried, it is recommended that such persons carry paper backed safety matches.

You see the names Rayon and Acetate on labels of fabrics and garments but do you know the two man-made textile fibers differ?

In developing standards to assure that you get value for your money, the American Home Economics Association has summarized these comparison differences between rayon and acetate:

Rayon dries slowly; Acetate dries quickly.

Rayon does not melt under a hot iron; Acetate melts under hot

iron.

Rayon does not dissolve in nail polish remover; Acetate does dissolve in nail polish remover.

Rayon loses strength on long exposure to sunlight; Acetate loses less strength on long exposure to sunlight.

Rayon is attacked by mildew; Acetate is highly resistant to mildew.

Rayon does change color as a garment hangs in closet (this is known as "gasfading"); Acetate dyed with certain dyes "gas-fades" or changes color when wet with perspiration.

White Rayon fibers gradually turn to ivory; Acetate stays white.

The two fibers are alike in that they both take dyes beautifully, are reasonable in cost, are resistant to moths, are weak when wet and are both dry-cleanable and washable.

Many fabrics are blends of both Rayon and Acetate. These fabrics have the qualities of each.

Watch the labels. The Federal Trade Commission has ruled that all rayon fabric must be labeled RAYON, and all acetate fabric labeled ACETATE.

Standards have been developed to which all rayon and acetate fabrics should conform; but use of these standards is voluntary by manufacturers. Check the label to see if the product conforms to

American Standards Association (ASA) standards.

Better Breakfasts

September is being observed for the fifth year as Better Breakfast Month.

Research has proved that breakfast-skippers rob themselves of potential alertness and efficiency during the late morning hours, and that dieters are wrong if they think missing the morning meal is a practical way to lose weight.

Scientists have recorded weight changes of people with various breakfast habits. They have found that omitting breakfast had no influence on weight changes observed.

September is a good time to get your whole family in the swing of eating a good breakfast each morning along with school children. Teachers say they can tell the difference in the attitude, alertness and interest in school work in those pupils who have a good breakfast and those who do not.

House Cleaning Hints

Waxing sills and sashes with a colorless liquid wax gives them an additional protective coat that may make dusting easier.

Protect new or clean venetian blinds with liquid or paste wax.

Have a closet for all cleaning equipment. Use a market basket to hold small pieces of equipment and supplies and carry from room to room.

When cleaning walls and ceilings, remove dust with a vacuum attachment, soft brush or cloth, using light, even strokes. Begin at the top and work from side to side.

When washing painted surfaces, wash from the bottom up. Rinse and dry with cloth.

To dust venetian blinds, wear a pair of light-weight canvas gloves and slide the gloved fingers along several slats at a time.

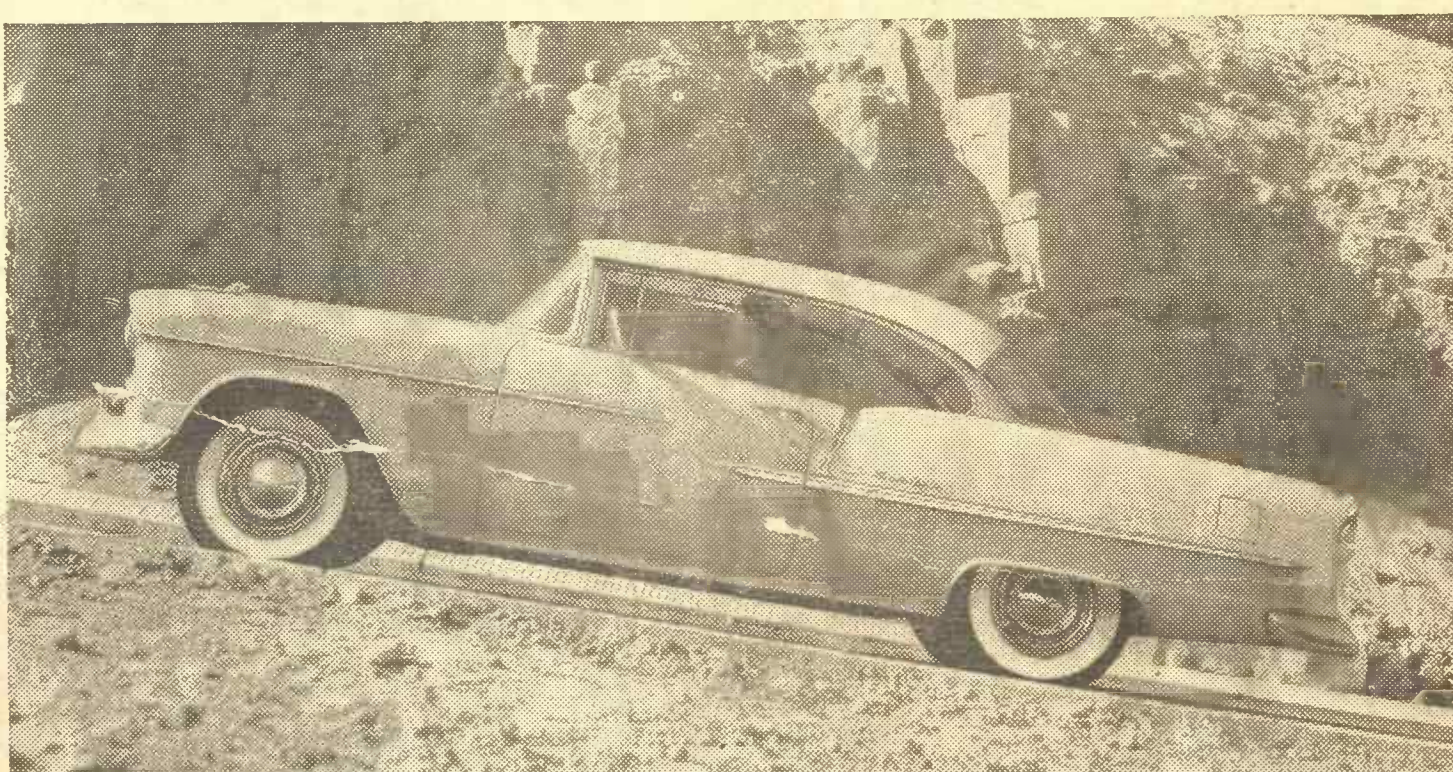

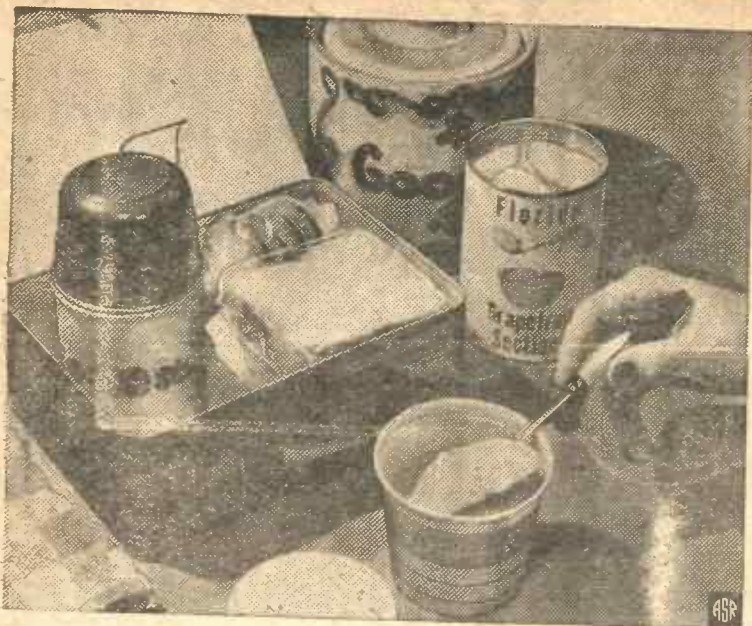

PROGRESS REPORT OF MISSISSIPPI

Mississippi homemakers are learning new ways to use dairy products, according to a study recently completed by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station. One-fourth of the women contacted in a four-town survey had during the past year tried new recipes using milk or milk products.

The survey also revealed information on the milk-drinking habits of Mississippi families which will be useful planning better diets and in promoting the increased use of dairy products.

The study concerned retailing and family buying practices of representative families in Amory, Okolona, Belzoni and Inverness as related to the marketing of dairy products. It showed that children's usual drink is more often milk than is that of adults; that more milk is drunk in winter than summer and that more is drunk at supper than at other times.

Homemakers were questioned about new dishes tried during the past year and 42 percent reported one or more tried. Twenty-six percent reported new dishes in which there were dairy products; 32 percent new dishes in which there were no dairy products. Dairy products most often used in new

dishes in order of importance were sweet milk, cheese, and evaporated milk.

The source for suggestion of the new dish was most often a friend and next a recipe in a magazine, newspaper or a cookbook. But it is to be noted that seeing in a grocery store or having clerk call attention to was much less important as a source of suggestion for dairy than for non-dairy dishes. The most common type of new dishes with dairy products were casserole dishes, congealed salads and chiffon pies.
