Responsibilities And Jurisdiction of Sheffield Office

Mrs. Mary King Temple, manager of the Sheffield, Alabama Social Security Office stated today that there was still some confusion in this area as to the responsibilities and jurisdiction of the Sheffield Social Security Office.

Mrs. Temple said that the Sheffield Office is responsible for issuing account numbers, handling claims for old-age and survivors insurance benefits, and issuing any information necessary for residents of the counties of Lauderdale, Lawrence, Colbert, Franklin, Winston, and Marion, Ala. and Tishomingo County, Mississippi. She added that any person in the counties mentioned above desiring to obtain a social security account number, file a claim for social security benefits, or merely seeking information should contact the Social Security Office at 101 W. 3rd Street, Sheffield, Alabama or should write to that office at P. O. Box 868, Sheffield, Alabama.

Mrs. Temple said that it is the des-

ire of the Sheffield Office to be of the utmost assistance to residents of northwest Alabama and Tishomingo County, Mississippi. She stated that this territory was formerly under the jurisdiction of the Decatur Social Security Office, but that the Sheffield Office was established to serve residents of this area in all the phases of social security formerly handled by the Decatur Office. Mail from residents of the seven counties named above will be delayed if sent to the Decatur Office since that office must send it to Sheffield for handling.

Mrs. Temple added that she appreciates the cooperation given the Sheffield Office during the eight months that it has been open to the public, and she feels that the employees in her office can render fast and friendly service to any person in this territory. She said that any requests for social security information or account number cards from residents of the northwestern part of Alabama and Tishomingo County, Mississippi should be sent direct to her office and that each and every request will be given prompt and careful handling.

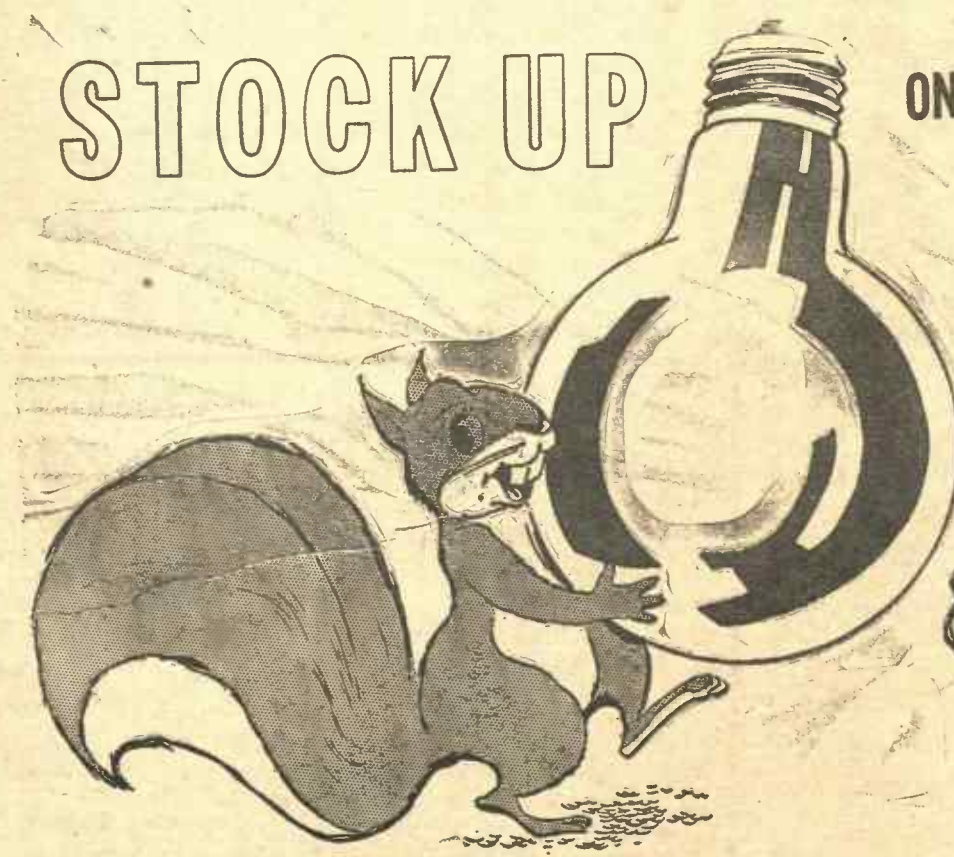

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Luke 2:1-40.
Devotional Reading: John 1:1-14.

B. G. and A. D.

Lesson for October 2, 1955

MAKE-BELIEVE story can be just as entertaining as a true one, and more so. The tale of the Little Red Riding Hood is more interesting than some of the items this week's paper. Furthermore, a make-believe story can sometimes get a child across to people just as well as a true story does. For example, from the Red Riding Hood we may learn not to trust strangers — they may turn out to be lives in Grandmother's clothing. Many a fable and fairy-tale has fixed in children's minds many a useful truth. Nevertheless, the make-believe story sometimes only conveys falsehood. If I told you that my grandfather was the Most Wanted man by the police of six states, it came to his death in a gun fight with the sheriff in which he lost three deputies before they got him, it would be a much more interesting tale than the one of a simple law-abiding Christian dying in his bed of a ordinary disease. But it would give a totally wrong impression, it would be a lie for which there would be no excuse.

Amida and Amida

Now, believe it or not, there are many and there have often been in the past, those who claim that makes no difference whether the Christian gospels are fact or fairy-tale, no difference whether it was a historical character like Caesar or a made-up one like Cinderella. The Christian church always resisted such a notion as this. For the gospel story is to tell us something true about God, something true about him, and if the gospel story is true, then what it says about him and God is not true either. Compare the Buddhist story of Amida. The story of Amida is very like the story of Christ; it is a tale of a god, or at least a like superior being, who came to save men a life of service and sacrifice. Songs are sung of him, — "Amida loves me, I know, for the (Buddhist) pictures tell me so." Temples erected to him. But when you die, when and where did this Buddha live? you discover no one claims he ever lived where. He is a great big off-fairy-tale. A temple to him is a temple to Cinderella's fairy mother. Amida was brave, sacrificing, loving, godlike — he never existed!

World B. C.

For centuries, historians have dated time before and after Christ. All dates are either B. C. before Christ, or A. D.—Anno Domini, "in the Year of our Lord." B. C. does not mean Before Christ or Before Culture or Before Columbus but Before Christ. It makes the world B. C. different from the world A. D. is Christ. World B. C. was a world in which the "best" people supposed without slavery you could have civilization; a world in which a man could be required to have only one wife at a time, but in which it would have been thought ridiculous to expect to be faithful to that one wife; a world in which unwanted babies were simply left out of doors to die, unless men in the very business cared to pick them up to be sold later on; a world in which social responsibilities we know it was unknown, a world in which men who held government posts were expected to enrich out of them. If you want to know what the world B. C. was like, read Romans 1. Paul had been there. He knew.

World A. D.

Who knew, that first Christmas night, that the birth of that baby whose poor people from Nazareth was the turning point of the story of the world? God knew and men have found it out. The world A. D. is so different from the world B. C. that even a child man, if he found himself tried back by a time-machine to B. C., would pray to get back to A. D., to a world where life is better, where children are welcomed and cared for, where Christian homes are found, where love is a common ideal, a world where there are millions of Christians. Such real changes the real world were not made a make-believe Jesus, only by real one.

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Tishomingo County Baptist Association Will Meet For Ninety-Fifth Session

On Tuesday and Wednesday, October 4-5, the Tishomingo County Baptist Association will meet at the Iuka Baptist church for its ninety-fifth session.

The program will begin at 10 a. m. with the first day consisting of three sessions: morning, afternoon and night. Reports from all departments of the work will be given by the several associational leaders on their respective phases of work; inspirational messages will be brought by local and out-of-county leaders; and plans for the future will be made by the messengers that will come up from the twenty-one churches scattered throughout the county.

Rev. Albert Hamilton will act as Moderator with the following program outlined.

KNOW YOUR FEET

By DR. WM. M. SCHOLL

Comedians tell almost as many jokes about bunions as they do about mothers-in-law. But those unfortunate persons who suffer from bunions, and there are far too many such people, find nothing humorous about them. Few things can be so excruciatingly painful as a bunion.

A bunion, simply defined, is an inflammation and swelling of the "bursa," or fluid-filled sac, which encloses the great toe joint. It often is accompanied by a condition called "hallux valgus" or displacement of the bones of the great toe.

This frequently is so severe as to cause the great toe to overlap the second toe.

Primary cause of bunions is that old nemesis, the poorly fitting shoe. Shoes that are too short, extremely pointed or of any restricting shape force the toe backward and outward whenever pressure is brought to bear on the foot. Other causes are short or pointed stockings, weak or fallen arches, gout, and rheumatoid arthritis.

First step in the treatment is removal of the cause, or simply buying shoes and hosiery that fit properly. Most cases can be remedied by wearing the protective and corrective devices available in drug, department and many shoe stores.

In really severe cases, surgical operation may become necessary. "Probably the world's best-known foot specialist, Dr. Scholl is the author of 'The Human Foot, Anatomy, Deformities and Treatment'."

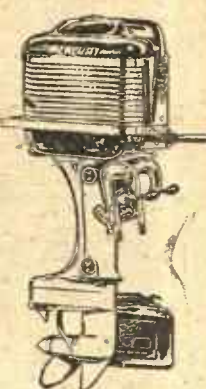

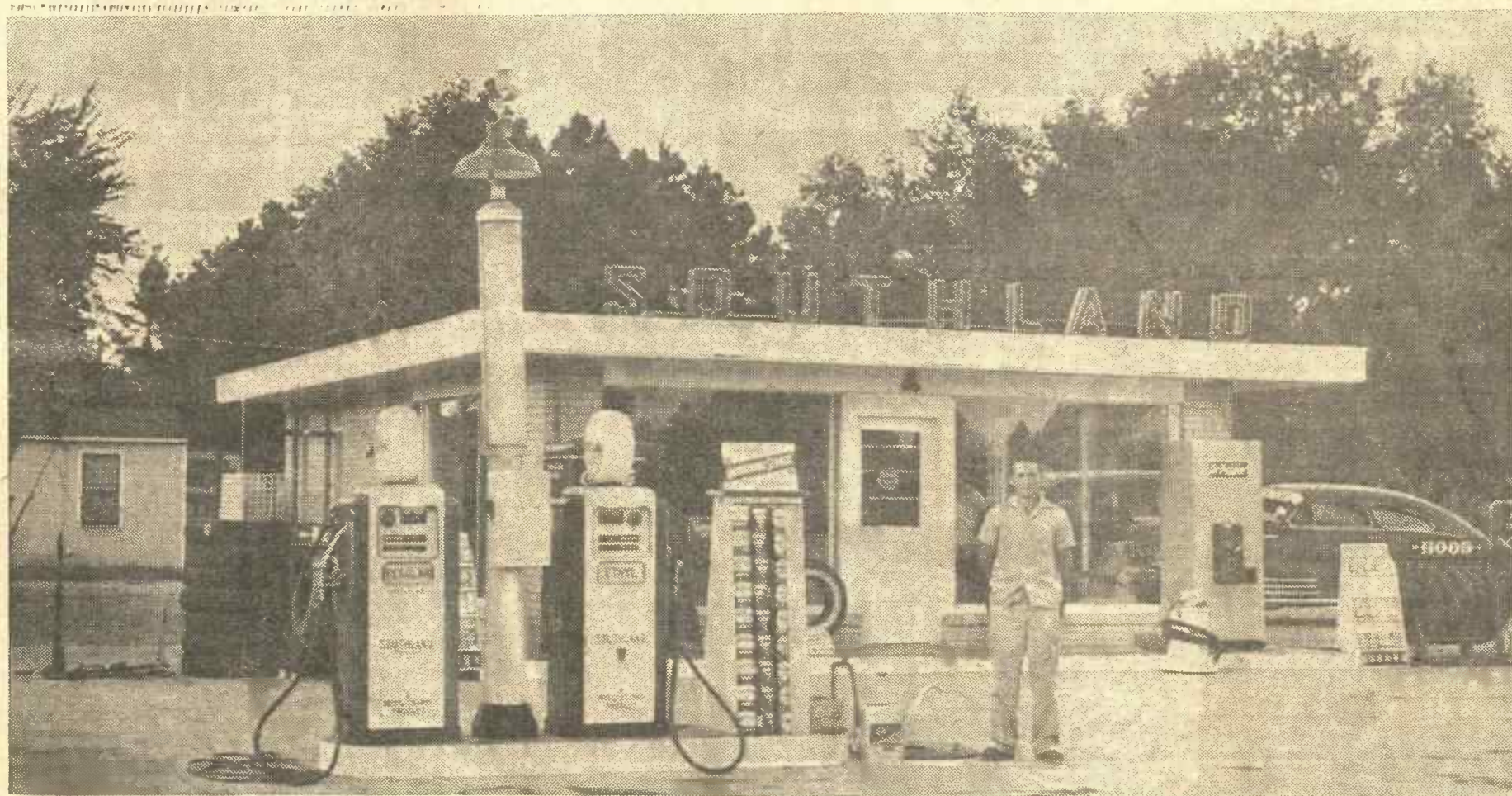

SUPERVISORS BACK AID TO MUNICIPALITIES

Mrs. Homemakers, as you plan your menus during October don't forget to include rice, pork and potatoes.

These three foods are at the top of the plentiful foods list for October.

Pork is a good buy for popular and nutritious main dishes. Rice is an economical food that lends itself to use in appetizers, salads, soups, main dishes and desserts. This season brought ideal potato weather and a generous supply at reasonable prices.

Other foods that will be October plentiful include dairy products, particularly cheese, grass-fed beef, broilers and fryers, fresh grapes from California, avocados from Florida, canned tuna, salad oils and lard.

A rice dish that makes a good one dish meal when served with green salad, toasted waffles or toasted bread sticks, fresh fruits and a beverage is:

Place a cut-up hen in a heavy iron pot or sauce pan. Cover with salad water in which you have put one whole onion and several stalks of celery. Cover with tight lid. Simmer until chicken is very tender.

Remove onion and celery. Take chicken from bones. Measure 1 quart of broth. Sprinkle in the pieces of chicken and 2 cups of rice that has been washed and drained. Sprinkle in black pepper to taste. Cover again with tight lid.

Slowly steam rice until all broth has been absorbed and grains of rice stand apart.

Fresh grapes would make an easy to prepare dessert with this meal and they're good between meals, too.

Pork Grades

As you buy pork at your grocery store, note the grade of it. New U. S. Department of Agriculture grades for pork carcasses went into effect in early July.

The changes include the dropping of the term "choice" from the description of all grades. The back fat thickness permitted has been reduced on all grades; on medium one-tenth of an inch and two-tenths of an inch on other grades.

The five revised grades of pork are:

U. S. No. 1 - Slaughter hogs with minimum finish required to prod-

uce high-quality pork cuts. Carcasses usually yield more than half their weight in lean cuts of hams, loins, picnics and Boston butts.

U. S. No. 2 - Slaughter hogs slightly fatter than necessary to produce high-quality pork. Carcasses normally yield 47 to 50 percent of their weight in the four trimmed lean cuts.

U. S. No. 3 - Slaughter hogs decidedly overfat. Lean cuts usually make up less than 47 percent of carcass weight.

Medium - Hogs that are slightly underfinished and produce soft cuts. Yields of lean cuts are relatively high, but ratio of total lean and fat to bone is slightly low.

Cull - Hogs decidedly underfinished.

More Meals From Meat

The "Do-It-Yourself" trend is now catching on in the kitchens of American's homes. Homemakers are learning more about meat sel-

ection and meat cutting. They are making good use of this knowledge by buying large cuts of meat, which they then separate into several different smaller cuts at home.

This saves money on the per pound purchase price and also provides them with more meals from meat.

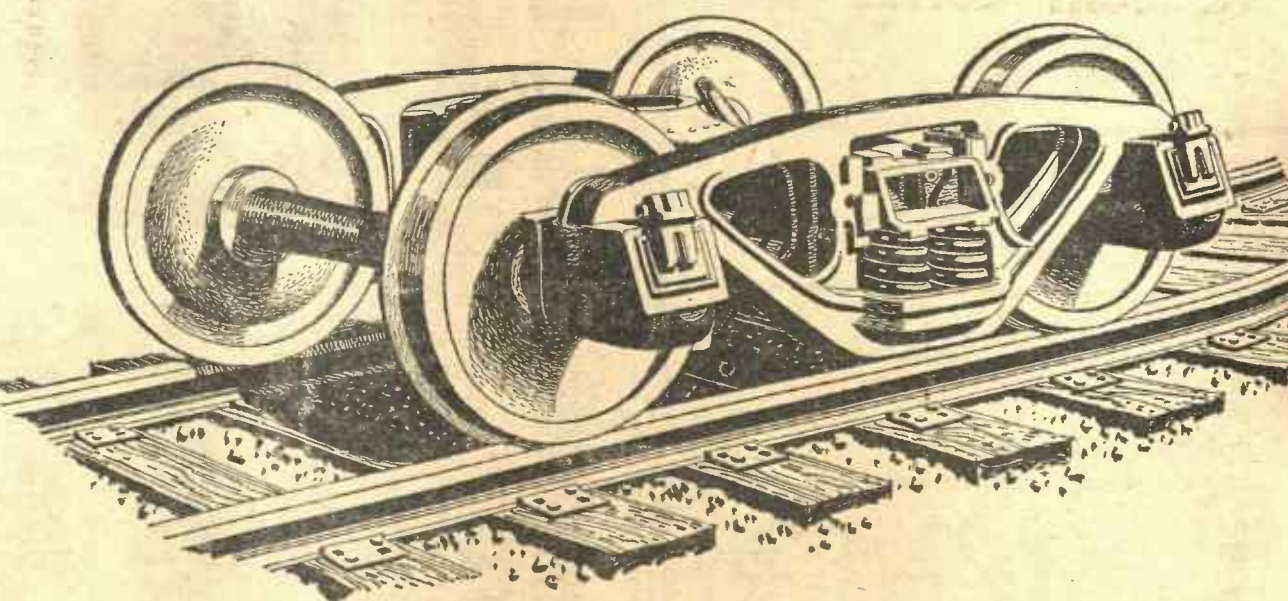

Fish Requested For Farm Ponds

An order for bream and bass to
stock newly built farm ponds
has been sent to the Department
of the Interior Fish Hatchery at
Tupelo.

More than 40 Tishomingo Coun-
ty farmers, all Soil Conservation
District Cooperators, have placed
orders for bream and bass with
which to stock their ponds.

The bream will be delivered
sometime this fall after sufficient
water has been caught in the
ponds. The bass ordered at this
time will be delivered next spring.

The bream are placed in the
pond first so they can mature and
multiply. Then the bass are placed
in the pond.

The bream live on insects and
small water plants. The bass are
carnivorous and eat the baby bream.
To keep a proper balance
ten times as many bream are placed
in the pond as bass. For instance
a half acre pond properly ferti-
lized will be stocked with 500
bream and 50 bass.

These baby bream and bass are

one, but the number is estimated
by the hatcherman. Excessive hat-
dling of these might bruise them
and cause them to die.

Farm fish ponds are fertilized
with ordinary high grade (high
analysis) fertilizer to increase the
growth of very small water plants.
These water plants called Algae, so
small they cannot be seen with
the naked eye, furnish food for
insects on which the bream feed.
A well fertilized fish pond may
produce twice as many fish as one
not fertilized. All cooperators re-
ceiving fish for their ponds agree
to properly fertilize them.

When is my pond properly ferti-
lized? This is a question often
asked by farmers. The best answer
to this question is, fertilize with
high grade material such as
6-8-8 in warm weather at two we-
ek intervals until the water be-
comes cloudy from the plant gro-
wth. The test commonly used is
to place the arm, elbow deep, into
the water and wiggle the fingers.
If the movement of the fingers
cannot be seen, the pond is prop-
erly fertilized.

The water insects eat these small
water plants, Algae, as cows graze
pasture. The more food these in-
sects have the faster they multiply
and grow. The bream eat these
nice fat juicy bugs and in turn grow
faster and bigger, the bass eat
the bream so the cycle is complete.

Therefore, the farmer who ferti-
lizes his pond and keeps it well
fished will have the most fish and
the most fun.

The Tennessee River Soil Con-
servatlon District Commissioners urge
all cooperators receiving fish in
this order to follow carefully the
instructions given for the proper
fertilization and management of their
ponds.

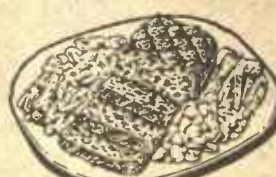
