issippi Baptist Childrens Home.

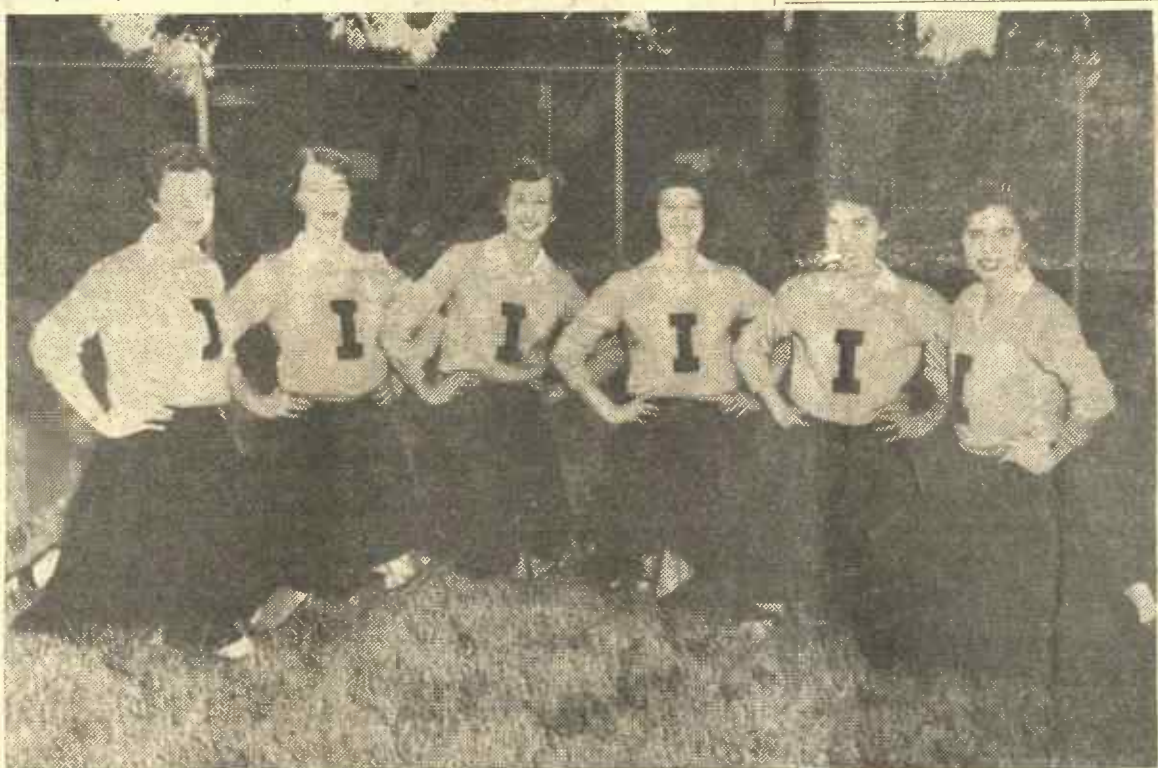
## Interest Growing In Current Home Improvement

## Shoe Factory To Start Operation Soon; Will Make 1,000 Pairs Daily At First

### Will Begin Work With Fifty Men And Women Employees

Iuka's new shoe manufacturing  
plant is expected to be completed  
on or about October 15, and it is  
hoped that production will start  
between October 15 and November  
1.

This statement was made to The  
Vidette by Eli White, division su-  
perintendent of the General Shoe  
Corporation manufacturing divi-  
sion, and Brandon Edmondson, who  
heads up the Iuka plant as its su-  
perintendent.

In a joint statement issued by  
Mr. Edmondson and Mr. White, it  
was announced that "the plant is

coming along in a good way, and it  
appears at this stage to be one of  
the best-looking plants we have in  
our entire system of operations in  
all of these states. We plan to start  
off cutting approximately 1,000 pr.  
of shoes per day. We would hope  
that our production within three  
months time would be up to be-  
tween 3,000 and 3,600 pairs of shoes  
per day.

"Our best estimate at the pres-  
ent time is that we would start  
off at approximately 50 men and  
women employees. Our hopes are  
that within three months time we  
will be employing between 100 and  
150 people. This is not definite,  
and ought to be considered simply  
an estimate based upon such things  
as the progress our people can  
make, the quality of shoes that  
can be manufactured in the Iuka  
plant, the demand for our shoes  
and other such important factors.

"Again, depending upon factors  
like those just outlined, we hope  
that the plant ultimately will grow  
until we have between 275 and 350  
men and women employed in  
Iuka."

In addition to Mr. Edmondson  
as plant superintendent, the fol-  
lowing additional department man-  
agers have been announced by Mr.  
Edmondson:

Clois Brown, plant industrial engi-  
neer; Charles Norton, personnel  
manager, Bill Eubanks, cutting de-  
partment manager; Pete Smith, fit-  
ting department manager; Reese  
McAllister, Shoe leather depart-  
ment manager; James Turrentine,  
lasting department manager; Char-  
les Pandygraft, make-finish depart-  
ment manager, and Sidney Boyd,  
packing department manager.

Mr. Edmondson and Mr. White  
indicated that General Shoe Corp-  
oration would be interested in hav-  
ing an open house for the entire  
public several months from now,  
when the plant is operating smooth-  
ly and when many of the initial  
problems have been worked out.

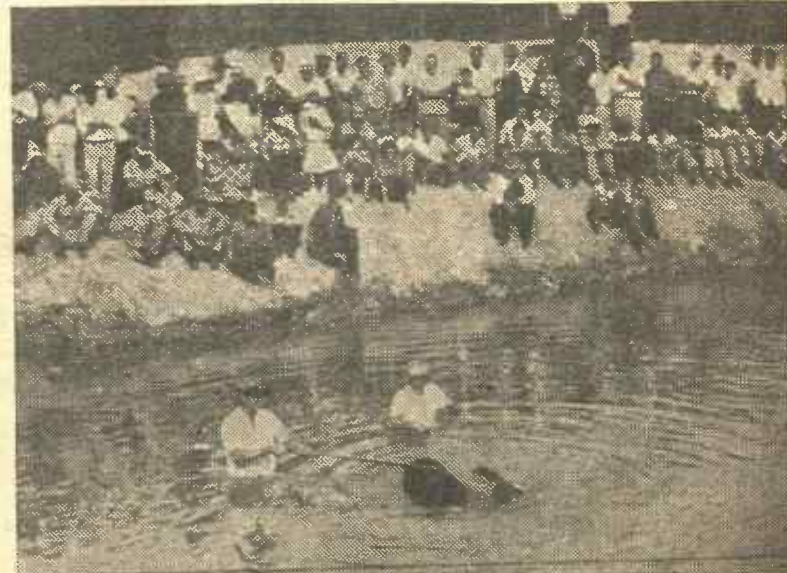

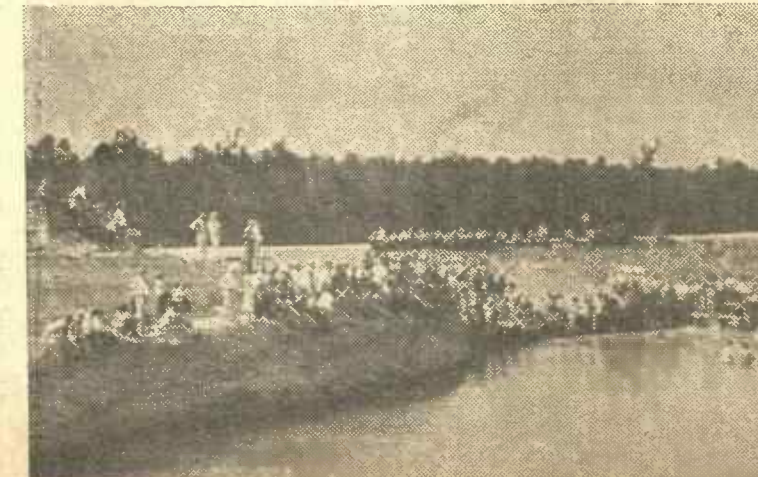

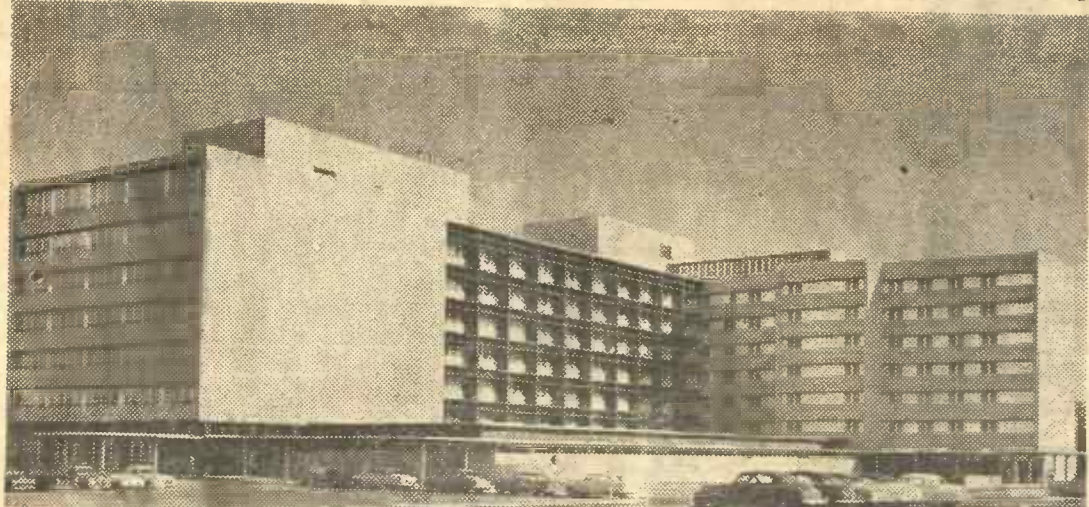


**COON-ON-THE-LOG**—Shown above is a portion of the approxi-

## New Ditch And Pond Pleases Paul Skinner

Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Conservationist U S D A - S C S "That new ditch the SCS boys laid out for me, hit and is carrying off the water from an underground stream that was sapping out a lot of my good bottom land," said Mr. Paul Skinner to a friend.

Mr. Skinner was telling his friend the facts. The water from a branch running out of some nearby woods sank into ground making a mire out of some good level bottom land Mr. Skinner needed for cultivation.

Mr. Carson Wheeler and Mr. R. C. Tice, both employed by the USDA Soil Conservation Service surveyed this ditch for Mr. Skinner. It was surveyed and constructed in accordance with SCS and ASC specifications. Mr. Ellett Allen's office which is the county ASC office, paid about half of the cost of construction.

The hitting of this underground stream and the draining away of this water was perhaps pure luck. But the very fact that this underground stream was hit, and that this excess underground water is being drained from this land attests to the skill and efficiency of Mr. Wheeler and Mr. Tice who surveyed this ditch, and to Mr. Thomas Bonds who cut it.

This is an unusual ditch, but Mr. Skinner has an unusual pond, also. This pond was surveyed by Messrs Tice and Wheeler and as usual the ASC paid about half of the cost of construction.

Mr. D. F. Frederick constructed this pond, and in the building of it hit a spring and water is rising

in this pond from this spring.

The Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissioners are well pleased with the results Mr. Paul Skinner is getting from his ditch and his pond.

Paul is also well pleased with his ditch and pond, but says he has no suggestions as to how other farmers might persuade Messrs Wheeler and Tice to construct them a pond with a spring in the bottom of it.

## Jesus Is Real

Lesson for October 9, 1955

IT IS hard to say what is the most important doctrine of the Christian religion. Probably you would get more votes for the doctrine we call the Incarnation than for any other, because so many other doctrines hinge on this one. If you do not believe in the Incarnation you haven't much left of the Atonement, and (if you really face it) you have lost what is most valuable in your doctrine of God. Be that as it may, if you asked for a vote among people who have given this some serious thought, as to what is the most distinctive Christian doctrine, you would have a practically unanimous answer: The Incarnation. This is expressed in various ways both in the Bible and in Christian theology. About the simplest way of putting it in Bible language is that "God was in Christ" (II Corinthians 5:19). The simplest way of putting it in theological language may be that Christ was both human and divine.

### Jesus Was a Real Person

You wouldn't think it necessary to hammer on the point that Jesus was a real person, that is to say that he really was, and didn't just seem to be, a child and a boy and a grown man. Yet the church has often had to call a halt to men and movements that explained-away the real humanity of Jesus till there was really nothing left of it. The great church council held at Chalcedon (the Evanston of that era) in 451 A. D. found it necessary to say—in their own way of course—that Christ is as much divine as God is divine, and as much human as you and I are human. For some strange reason, however, the reality of Jesus as a human person is forgotten or denied by men. Again and again we have to be

brought up with a start by the gospel story, the story of a real man. Like all real men, Jesus grew from a real boy. The modern interest in childhood and the realization that "the child is father of the man."

**The Child Grew**  
Legends, tales without foundation, have made the boy Jesus into a smaller-sized adult. According to some of these legends, when Jesus went to school, the very first day, he not only knew the alphabet already but he delivered a philosophical discourse that astonished the teacher. Luke does not give us any such picture of an already-grown mind in a tiny body. He gives us a glimpse of a real child really growing. At first he grew without trying, of course, as every one does. What he ate and drank made him taller and stronger. He learned the Aramaic language, spoken in his village and in his family, just as children learn their mother-tongue everywhere in the world, just by hearing it and trying to speak it, till it becomes as natural as breathing. His mind grew by what was put into it, because it was a really human mind. Dolls are all the same no matter what goes on around them; human beings on the contrary grow or shrink, depending on their surroundings. It is not too much to say that if (for instance) Jesus' mother Mary had been a different kind of person, he would have been different too. To think otherwise is to fancy Jesus a kind of doll.

### The Boy Moved Forward

As has been often noted, Luke uses a different word for Jesus after his twelfth year. Before that, he "grew,"—the same word used for flowers and buildings, elsewhere in the Bible. After that, he "increased,"—and the word always implies will, effort. Up to a certain age a child can't help growing; he doesn't even give it a thought. But after a certain age, not the same in every one to be sure, if a person grows he has to put his mind on it; and he can choose the direction in which he will grow. Jesus could choose his friends; he could do what he would with his spare time. He grew by his work in the carpenter shop, we may be certain; but what about the hours when he was not working? When Jesus was fully grown, we know how familiar he was with the Scriptures. We know how well he understood people. Could he have achieved any of this without trying, without growing?

vention Week  
National Fire Prevention Week  
September 9-15. It is a good time  
to do something about the  
hazards on your farm and in  
the neighborhood.

a check to see just how  
many hazards you can find and  
eliminate during this week. Wat-  
er is particularly for electrical  
hazards which last year accounted  
for more than 21 percent of all  
fires.

a good time too, to make  
a check of your woods and pastures  
for fire hazards. Cut fire  
breaks between your land and public  
lands, and around  
stacked hay.

Stacked hay  
destroys your stacked  
hay, and the grass on which you  
are depending for a large part of  
your winter feed, it can hurt  
the stock.

year, woods fires are lik-  
ely to be especially hazardous due

to the great amount of grass in  
fields, on roadsides and in past-  
ures. Take extra precautions to  
prevent fire from getting on your  
land.

There is a problem this fall on  
getting volunteering stands of clo-  
vers in high sods. There are two  
ways to handle this problem. One  
way is to let livestock graze the  
high grass down and the other  
method is to wait until about Oct-  
ober 15 and clip it pretty close. If  
the grass is good it can be saved  
for hay and stacked in the pasture  
or baled.

Fertilizing Pastures. For the past  
two or three years pasture fertiliza-  
tion has been neglected badly. If  
you want top pastures of clovers,  
phosphate and potash or basic slag  
and potash will have to be applied.  
Some pastures have not been fertil-  
ized for three years. They won't  
grow another good crop without  
phosphate and potash. If you use  
phosphate and potash, check for  
lime needs and if lime is needed,  
lime it.

This is the month to do much  
of the sod seeding. I would plant  
100 pounds of small grain and the  
regular rate of clovers or legumes

if a mixture is to be used. The  
following sods are good to inter-  
plant in: Bermuda, Carpet, fescue  
and heavy mixtures of Dallis and  
Bermuda. Don't seed at all on young  
Dallis and on old Dallis seed  
only a cereal so the Dallis won't  
be damaged.

**National Fire Prevention Week**  
is a week that pin-points our inter-  
est on a costly and tragic force.  
It is a week that none of us can  
afford to ignore. But remember,  
fire losses aren't confined to one  
week of the year. We must make  
prevention of fires a year-round  
project.

Did you know that farm fires  
alone cost \$157,000,000 in 1954. An  
this sum was 13 percent greater  
than for any year since 1948.

A slogan of Fire Prevention  
Week is: Don't Give Fires a Place  
To Start.

Let's make this a working slogan  
throughout the year in our homes,  
barns, on the farm, in business  
houses — everywhere!

Topping the list of causes of  
fires in homes is defective or over-  
heated cooking, heating and other  
equipment. This cause accounts  
for about 20 percent of all home  
fires.

Other causes, that you will do  
well to check and correct during  
Fire Prevention Week, include  
careless use of gasoline or keros-

ene, defective or overheated chim-  
neys and flues, sparks from chim-  
neys, electrical faults, lighting, care-  
less smoking, children and mat-  
ches, gas explosions, and grease  
and paraffin on stove.

### Fire Safety For Children

Teach your children common-  
sense firesafety rules. Tell them and  
show them by good example that  
they must not take matches and  
other things that cause fire near  
hay, straw or underbrush or near  
engines or fuel.

Children must be impressed with  
the danger of gasoline and keros-  
ene vapors. Insist that all toys given  
to children be firesafe; that  
they cannot cause fire, shock or  
explosion.

### Hamburger Rolls With Vegetable Gravy

2 cups sifted enriched flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
¼ cup shortening  
two thirds to ¾ cup milk  
2 tablespoons melted butter or  
margarine  
1 pound ground beef  
½ teaspoon salt  
Dash pepper  
1-¼ cups condensed onion soup  
(10½ ounce can)  
1-¼ cups water  
3 tablespoons enriched flour  
½ cup water  
1-½ cups cooked or canned vege-  
tables.

Sift together flour, baking powder  
and salt. Cut or rub in shortening  
until mixture is crumbly. Add milk  
to make a soft dough. Turn out on  
lightly floured board or pastry clo-  
th. Knead gently 30 seconds. Roll

out to rectangle about 12 X 8 in-  
ches and ¼ inch thick. Brush light-  
ly with melted butter or margar-  
ine.

Mix meat, salt and pepper. Cook  
gently until color disappears (do

not brown). Drain off excess fat.  
Spread evenly over dough. Roll up  
like jelly roll. Seal edge securely.  
Cut into 12 portions. Place on ung-  
reased baking sheet and bake in  
hot oven (450 degrees F) 12 to  
15 minutes.

Heat soup and water in saucepan  
to boiling. Blend flour and ½ cup  
water. Stir quickly into soup mix-  
ture. Cook, stirring frequently, un-  
til slightly thickened. Add veget-  
ables and heat to serving temper-  
ature.

Allow 2 rolls per serving. Spoon  
vegetable gravy over rolls. Makes  
6 servings.
