Attend Ag. Com. Hearing In Fulton Tuesday; Three From County Testify

Three farmers from Tishomingo county testified in the U. S. House of Representatives Agriculture Sub-Committee hearing held Tuesday at Itawamba Junior college in Fulton.

Purpose of the committee hearings is to find means of strengthening the family farm unit and making its operation profitable and self-sustaining. Rep. Clark W. Thompson of Texas is head of the committee, but since the hearing was in Rep. Thomas G. Abernethy's district, Mr. Abernethy had charge of Tuesday's meeting.

Among those from Tishomingo county to testify before the committee were Lester Skinner of Midway, Ferrell Skinner of Burnsville, and B. E. Wright, Sr., of Belmont.

"We hope some good will come of the hearing," Mr. Lester Skinner said. "We know that the small farmer is in a plight with ever-increasing costs and decreasing farm income and it is an established fact that he does need help."

One featured point brought out in the hearing was that small farmers favored a special cotton acreage allotment to insure a minimum of five acres and an urgent request that the government dispose of surplus cotton at whatever price it would bring.

Among others from Tishomingo county attending the hearing Tuesday in Fulton were Talmadge Finch of Tishomingo, L. E. Deaton of Belmont, E. N. Allen, ASC manager, Iuka, Hiram Jones and R. C. Tice, SCS office, Iuka, Hayes Woods, FHA administrator, Iuka, W. C. Hamilton, Grady Geno, and T. K. Marlin of the Tishomingo County Extension department, Cecil Brown representing the Tishomingo County Electric Power association, Jas. R. Wingo, Snowdown, Orville and Jerry Bostick of Golden, L. V. Edwards of Burnsville, L. D. Edwards of Tishomingo, and E. H. Alexander and Ralph Bowen of Belmont.

Twenty-six witnesses from north Mississippi and Alabama appeared before the committee.

The congressional committee is holding hearings in other states in an effort to arrive at a solution to some of the problems of the small farmers.

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Begin Installing Machinery In Shoe Factory Next Week

Brandon Edmondson, general manager of the newly constructed General Shoe Corporation plant in Iuka for the First, Second, and Third Districts, stated this week that machinery in preparation for the commencement of operation of the factory would be moved into the plant next week.

Forty-five letters have been mailed to applicants requesting

that they meet with personnel representatives of the company on Thursday and Friday of this week. "These interviews are to employ our initial employees," Mr. Edmondson said. "However, it does not mean that all of this forty-five will be employed at the beginning. We will probably start out with 15 or 20 people."

Plant managers plan to start one department by Monday, Oct. 24, and by the 15th of November it is expected that all departments will be in operation. "After all departments are put in operation," Mr. Edmondson said, "We expect to increase the employment gradually as new workers learn their duties and become proficient in their production operations."

In commenting on applicants seeking employment in the new factory, Mr. Edmondson said: "We are happy to have the people of Tishomingo county visit with us. But we would like to emphasize the fact that most people who desire jobs in the factory already have filled out application blanks and that we have those applications on file. We will call, or notify, these applicants as soon as we see that we can use them. Anyone who has not filed an application for employment in the factory is invited to do so."

Choosing your Automatic Electric Washer

The automatic electric washer is a key appliance in your modern home laundry. Once your clothes are sorted, you put them into the machine, set it, and leave the washing up to it. This saves you time, attention, and labor every time you

wash. Takes the "Blue Monday" out of wash day, so to speak.

In choosing your washer, you will find that there are more differences in the various makes than in any of the other major household appliances. The differences are mainly

in design and operation though. All do the same job of washing, rinsing, and spinning clothes damp dry. It is just a matter of which you prefer.

In looking for your automatic electric washer, you will find four types generally speaking—the tumbler, upright, agitator, upright pulsator, and upright agitated tub.

The tumbler has a cylinder that revolves on a horizontal axis, carrying the clothes to the top of a baffled basket. Clothes then fall to the bottom. This operation is repeated with each revolution of the cylinder, providing gentle washing action.

The upright agitator type has a central shaft with blades in an upright tub. The agitator in motion flexes the clothes and forces water through them.

In the upright pulsator type, the pulsator moves rapidly up and down, moving water from top to bottom of the tub. With this action the water is pushed or pulled through the clothes.

The upright agitated tub has a rocking motion, forcing water through the clothes.

Capacity for nearly all of these models is 8-9 pounds of dry clothes. And all do a good washing job when the directions of your particular machine are followed.

There are a few special features you may wish to look for in selecting the perfect washer for your needs. For example, flexible operation is a great convenience. Washers that have this feature allow you or lengthen any part of the operation (wash, rinse, spin) at will. Or you may skip or repeat any of these operations.

The amount of water left in clothes after spinning is also an important item. Some washers spin clothes dryer than others, thus shortening the drying period, in your electric dryer.

Some automatic electric washers come equipped with an electric heating element. This replaces the temperature of hot water lost in pipes through filling the tub.

Still another feature is the off-balance load switch. This cuts the washer off automatically if your clothes are unevenly placed in your washer.

All of the various makes operate on 115 volts, but need their own wiring circuit for most efficient operation.

Orville McNutt Uses Home Made Sod-Seeder

BY Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Conservationist USDA—SCS

Mr. Orville McNutt, of the Midway community, is getting his improved sod seeder ready to plant his winter grazing and cover crops. With this machine he can seed small grain and vetch on established pasture sod, or on cropland. This can be done without too much disturbance of the soil.

Those of you who have not seen this implement, and who can visit Mr. McNutt's farm, might find it well worth your while to do so and talk with Orville and see this machine.

It cost him about (\$20.00) twenty dollars for the extra flexible hose and double throats for his John Deere planter and fertilizer distributor.

Last fall Mr. McNutt used this sod seeder with good results.

Orville is a cooperator of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District, and we who represent the



USDA Soil Conservation Service here in Tishomingo County are interested in this new method of seeding winter-grazing and cover crops.

The chief advantages of this method of seeding winter grazing and cover crops in about 20 inch rows are: 1. Planting can be made on existing permanent pasture or lespedeza sod. 2. Fertilizer can be placed in furrow with the seed. 3. Seeding can be done on the contour. 4. There will be less erosion because all land is not plowed. 5. The young plants are down in a furrow and are not so likely to freeze out. 6. This is a fast and inexpensive way to seed your winter grazing and cover-crops.

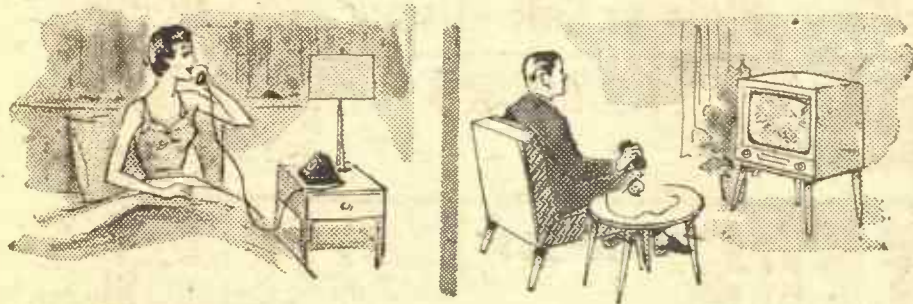

What do you think when you drive by a neat-looking farm and home and grounds? And what do you think when you see a tangle of weeds or trash littering the yards?

Don't you think the place that's neat and picked up reflects the pride of the owner and speaks of good management and dependability?

But the farmstead with boards, boxes, trash and junk scattered around, with fences down, doors and windows broken proclaims a careless operator, poor management, lack of pride and uncertainty, doesn't it?

Take a look at your home, the lawn and the farmstead. Look at it as an outsider would who is judging the place by its looks. So often the folks who live on a place have their observations dulled by familiarity.

Evaluate what you see. If you aren't pleased, see what a few hours' work and some planning will do to give the place a new look and reflect credit on the folks who live there.

Baked Rice and Cheese

Both rice and cheese are plentiful now. Try combining them in

this dish that provides servings for six.

3 cups cooked white rice
2 cups coarsely grated cheese
2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper or pimiento
2 eggs beaten
1 ¼ cups milk
1 teaspoon salt
One third cup bread cubes or coarse crumbs

Cayenne pepper to taste
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine

Arrange alternate layers of rice, cheese and green pepper or pimiento in a greased baking dish. Combine beaten eggs, milk, salt and pepper. Pour over rice and cheese mixture.

Toss bread cubes in melted butter or margarine and sprinkle over top. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) about 45 minutes, until mixture is set and top is lightly browned.

Don't defrost your home freezer with hot water.

Hot water will do the job quicker, but, it's taboo because it causes refrigerant pressure to be built up in the evaporator and causes difficulty in starting the compressor.

Wool Labels

Government laws say that every piece of wool fabric must carry a label. This law applies to wool clothing and woolen materials sold by the yard.

If you notice marking strings or yarns in the selvage of a wool fabric, that means the inspector has spotted an imperfection in the weaving and has tacked a warning mark there for you. When you buy the fabric, the clerk should call

this imperfection to your attention and allow extra material for cutting around the flaw.

The words "virgin wool" on the label means the fabric is made of new wool that has never been manufactured in any way before.

Social Security
Covers

Professional groups

Accountants, architects, funeral directors, and professional engineers are now directly concerned with social security. Prior to 1955, their professional self-employment income was excluded from social security coverage.

Accountants, architects, funeral directors, and engineers will file tax returns and pay their social security tax on their net earnings from self-employment. This means that in the early part of 1956, when they file their Federal income tax returns for 1955, they must be prepared to pay their social security taxes. The income tax form has an attachment which the self-employed person must complete in order to secure social security credit. This requires furnishing a correct social security number and the amount of net earnings for the year. Social security cards may be secured at the nearest social security district office. To secure social security credit for the year, net earnings must be at least \$400; the maximum amount subject to social security taxes is \$4200. The present tax rate is three percent.

If your work comes under the law and your net earnings are \$400 or more in any year after 1954 a report of your self-employment income must be filed with the District Director of Internal Revenue. This is no "take it or leave it" situation—the returns are compulsory.
