

County Schools To Re-Open Oct. 31; Teachers Are Listed

County Superintendent of Education George W. Stricklin announces that the County Board of Education has set Monday, October 31st, as the re-opening date for all county schools that vacated last year, September 9th, for cotton picking.

The white schools and one colored school will be closed down seven weeks to allow school children to help gather this year's cotton crop. Those schools that vacated and will re-open on Monday, October 31st are: Burnsville, Belmont, Lambert, Holcut, Cross Roads, Dennis, Belmont Consolidated, Golden Central Consolidated, Golden Central Consolidated, Holcut Consolidated, Paden, and Tishomingo Consolidated. The colored school district is Carter's Branch.

Down and Central schools are the first district are operating in conjunction with the Iuka School district and did not begin this fall. First sessions in schools began on Monday, October 31st.

Dr. Bostick was 84 and would have celebrated his 85th birthday on Wednesday, October 19.

Despite his advanced years, Dr. Bostick still maintained an active practice and was widely known in Tishomingo and surrounding counties. He was born at Marion, Ala., and lived in Itawamba county before moving to this county in 1907.

During his 50 years as a practicing physician, Dr. Bostick was designated as "stock doctor of the county and state." His practice extended into surrounding counties in Tennessee and Alabama.

He attended Tishomingo county schools and received his medical training at Memphis University Medical college, where he was graduated in 1906. He was a Methodist.

Town Gets \$900 From First Month Of Sales Tax

Mayor John H. Allen announces this week that the Town of Iuka will get approximately \$900.00 from the first month of collections of the one-half of one percent additional sales tax that was instituted the first of August. "This will probably be our lightest month in collections," the mayor said, "since it was during the year and at a time during the year when retail business is naturally off."

The City of Corinth has set Tuesday, Nov. 15, as the day for an election in that city to decide whether or not the one-half of one percent tax will be levied there.

Also the City of Booneville is contemplating levying the additional sales tax, it is reported.

Largest Cotton Yield Per Acre Ever Recorded

Tishomingo County is making the largest cotton yield per acre on record. The 1955 crop is expected to exceed 9,000 bales on 10,205 planted acres. This is better than a 440 pound yield of lint cotton per acre.

The County corn crop will average from 30 to 35 bushels per acre county wide. Some very high yields have been produced.

Producers with the highest yields will be announced at a later date. These farmers will receive appropriate awards from the Iuka Guaranty Bank, which sponsors the County Corn Production Contest.

General Shoe manufacturing plant has been underway for several days and is expected to be completed by the first part of next week, according to Mayor John H. Allen.

Herbert Biggs, manager of the Iuka Water System, has charge of the construction which involves 4400 feet of 8 inch drainage line. Cost of the installation will be between \$5,500.00 and \$6,000.00, and will be paid out of the town's general fund.

Connecting water lines to the new plant has been held up due to not having proper casing and valves to carry the line under highway 25 that is now under construction near the plant. However, work on laying these water lines is expected to start next Monday.

The plant will receive its water supply from the existing Town water system pending the erection of a new tank near the factory site. The company that has the contract for erection of the new tank has been delayed in fulfilling its contract because of railroad steel strikes. Mayor Allen said the new tank should be put up and in operation sometime in November.

Two new water lines to serve residential sections of the town will be started next week. First line to be laid will be one beginning at Pruitt's gin and continuing south past Brother Holder's residence to the top of the hill, then west to highway .5 near Frank's Dairy where it will turn north and continue along highway 25 to intersection with other water lines at highway 72. This line will be approximately 2 miles long and will, at the present time, accommodate about 20 families.

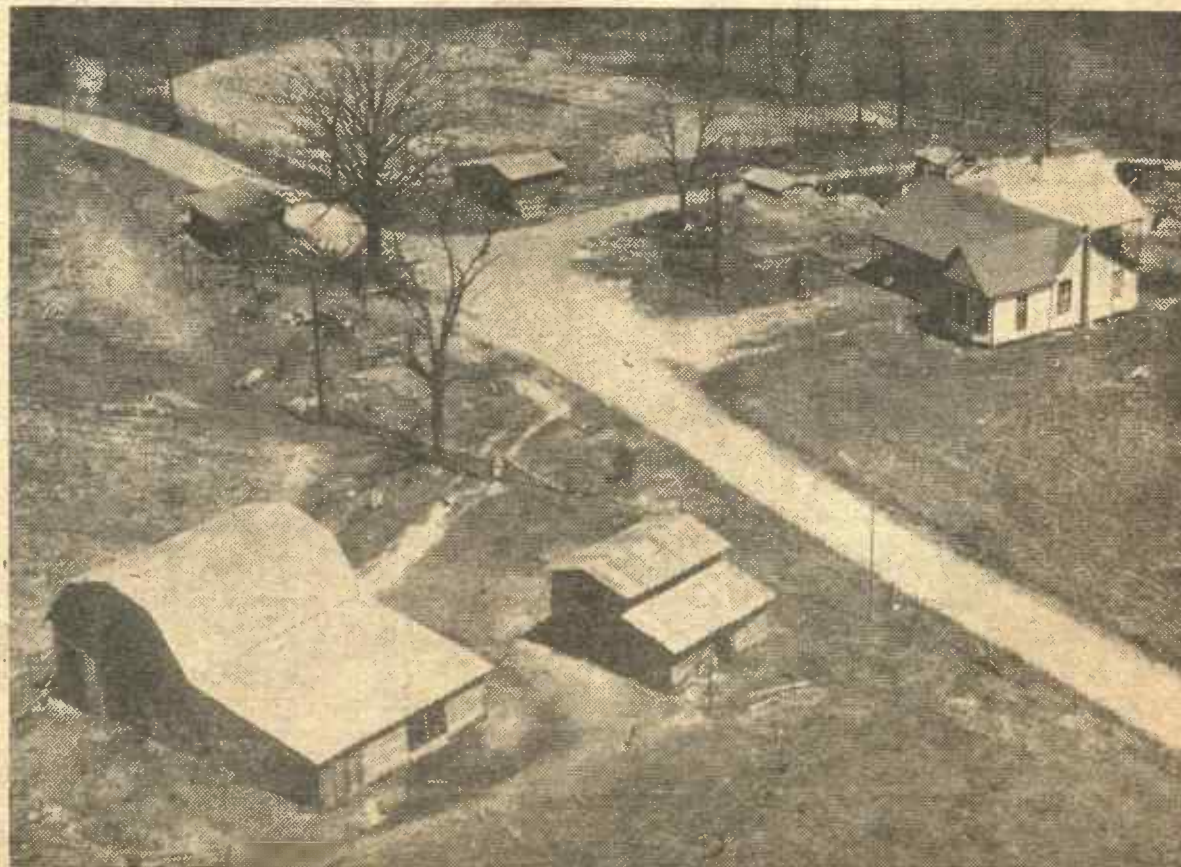
The other new water line to be laid will begin near Dexter's store at the corner of Oakgrove cemetery and will continue along present highway 25 to Rast's store. This line will be approximately 1700 feet and will serve about 15 houses.

Cost of construction of the new water lines will be paid from money supplied through a bond issue election in which was also included another well to increase the water supply. After several attempts in numerous locations a sufficient supply of water containing the proper analysis was found near the well that has supplied the town's water supply for many years. The wells are located at the rear of Hughes Ice plant.

NEW ENGLAND'S ATTITUDE
SENDS INDUSTRY SOUTH

New England has launched a big advertising campaign in such papers as the Wall Street Journal with eye-catching statements like the following:

"We will accept in trade your present property, regardless of its present condition, toward a modern manufacturing plant in any town, city or state in New England.

"We will rent, lease or build you a building to suit your exact needs and requirements for lowest cost and most efficient operation."

That promise by New England is readily recognized as a bid to hold on to any firm that may be tempted to move South.

But that promise is not enough to halt the exodus of industry from such northern and eastern areas of New England.

For it ignores the fact that the basic attraction of the small-town South for industry is an even flow of production, unhampered by the constant bickering and slowdowns that have become accepted as a part of each day's operations in countless plants of the North.

And until New England and other portions of the Northeast where industry is needlessly harassed by slowdowns—frequently for the benefit of no one—the South will continue to attract plants from that region.

Countless communities of the Northeast are slowly being turned into ghost towns because their union officials have failed to learn one simple basic rule of economics.

That rule, though given a rather high-sounding name by economists, is built around one simple fact. It is this:

Regardless of what party controls the White House, regardless of boom, depression, regardless of war or peace, regardless of passing time and even regardless of changes in the products being manufactured, American workers as a whole always receive in wages 40 per cent of the selling price of the finished products they turn out.

Today, as 40 years ago, the remainder of the selling price goes into purchase of raw materials, tools, electricity, rent, taxes, profits, etc.

This percentage going to workers held true when records first were compiled in 1914. And it has held true every year since that time, never varying as much as two percent up or down through good years and bad, worldwide war, and all the other changes that the years have brought.

Even before more than a handful of people belonged to labor unions the workers of America were receiving in wages 40 per cent of the selling price of the items they made. Now that one-fourth of all the country's workers belong to one union or another, they still get that same percentage. And economists are willing to predict that this same percentage will continue to hold good for years and years to come.

This unchanging percentage of America's industrial output going to wage earners means one thing significant which such regions as New England have ignored:

Whenever workers are successful in raising their income without at the same time increasing their productivity, their share of the selling price rises temporarily above 40 per cent.

And that causes one of two things to happen: Either the manufacturer has to raise his price above that of his competitors, thereby losing his markets and eventually his business.

Or, the forced increase in wages is taken out of the firm's earnings as long as the savings last, then the plant is forced into sale or bankruptcy.

No intelligent person opposes the principle of a constantly increasing standard of living for the people of America.

But those with foresight insist that this increase comes through steadily increasing productivity rather than through the effort of organized labor to boost its share of a product's selling price.

Through the years America as a whole has done just this—increased productivity almost twice as fast as prices rose so that everybody enjoyed a higher standard of living.

But in some parts of our country, in New England in particular, union officials have insisted that wages could be raised at the same time the workers reduced their productivity.

As a result some industries have gone bankrupt. And still more firms have simply moved away from the unhealthy economic environment created by such warped thinking.

Many of these firms — most of them, in fact — have come South not because we offered assistance in plant construction but because the people of the South are willing to co-operate with management in increasing productivity in order to increase income.

And as long as the people of the South maintain this attitude toward the basic economic fact of American life—that increased productivity is the key to all progress even though it may be accomplished with less effort and in fewer hours—our region will continue to attract industry from the North.

We in the South understand what has made America great. And with the harsh decades of the Reconstruction period now behind us, the South will grow in prosperity long after such regions as New England who do not understand the relationship between output and pay have deteriorated into industrial slums.

For though the ratio of effort to remuneration may differ widely between different types of industries, within the same industry the firms which develop highly productive co-operation between workers and management will consistently provide the highest pay for employees at the same time that they provide the highest earnings for management and the lowest prices for consumers.

The ninety-fifth session of the Tishomingo County Baptist Association is now history. Looking back thereupon may we point out some of the outstanding accomplishments and events thereof:

The Association by a standing unanimous vote adopted resolution of condemnation in which it voiced its disapproval of Sunday desecration in such things as "Coon on the Log," Sunday Picture Shows, and other forms of Sabbath desecration. And along with this there was condemnation of any pool of water being used as a place for baptismal services that was used for such unholy purposes as the recent "Coon on the Log" Sunday desecration.

The Association voted to go on a two-day-two-church plan for the coming year. That is, the Association will meet next year in two different churches on the two days: The first day at the Tishomingo Church, and the second day at the Ebenezer Church in Belmont. Many Associations in Mississippi or now using this plan and finding it to be very effective and helpful both to the entertaining churches and to the attendance.

The reports from the churches indicated a growth along all lines. There was a very healthy increase in the number of baptisms and additions to the churches.

Rev. C. L. Quarles, Executive Secretary for the Mississippi Baptist Convention, brought an outstanding message on missions. Rev. George Bacon, Eastport, challenged the Association with his sermon. Rev. C. A. Savell, in his usual able fashion, brought the missionary sermon for the Association, and Rev. Frank Roblin delivered the inspirational message at the Tuesday evening service.

Two Associational-wide events are planned for the coming year, in addition to the regular schedule of meetings and events. They are: The Simultaneous Evangelistic Campaign and the Central Baptist Training Union week.

A special committee composed of the following brethren, was appointed to confer with a similar committee from Prentiss County, in reference to the Associational Missionary situation confronting the area at this time: Mr. Ferrell Skinner, C. A. Savell, Guy Bickerstaff,

Claude Boothe, and Edgar Monroe. There is strong probability that Rev. Patterson will be leaving some time about the first of the year and the Area Mission Program will be terminated, so far as Tishomingo County is concerned. The Committee will confer with the Prentiss Committee to explore the possibility of Tishomingo and Prentiss cooperating together in a joint Associational program of missions.

Reports were received from all churches, and all of the twenty-one churches were represented by messengers.

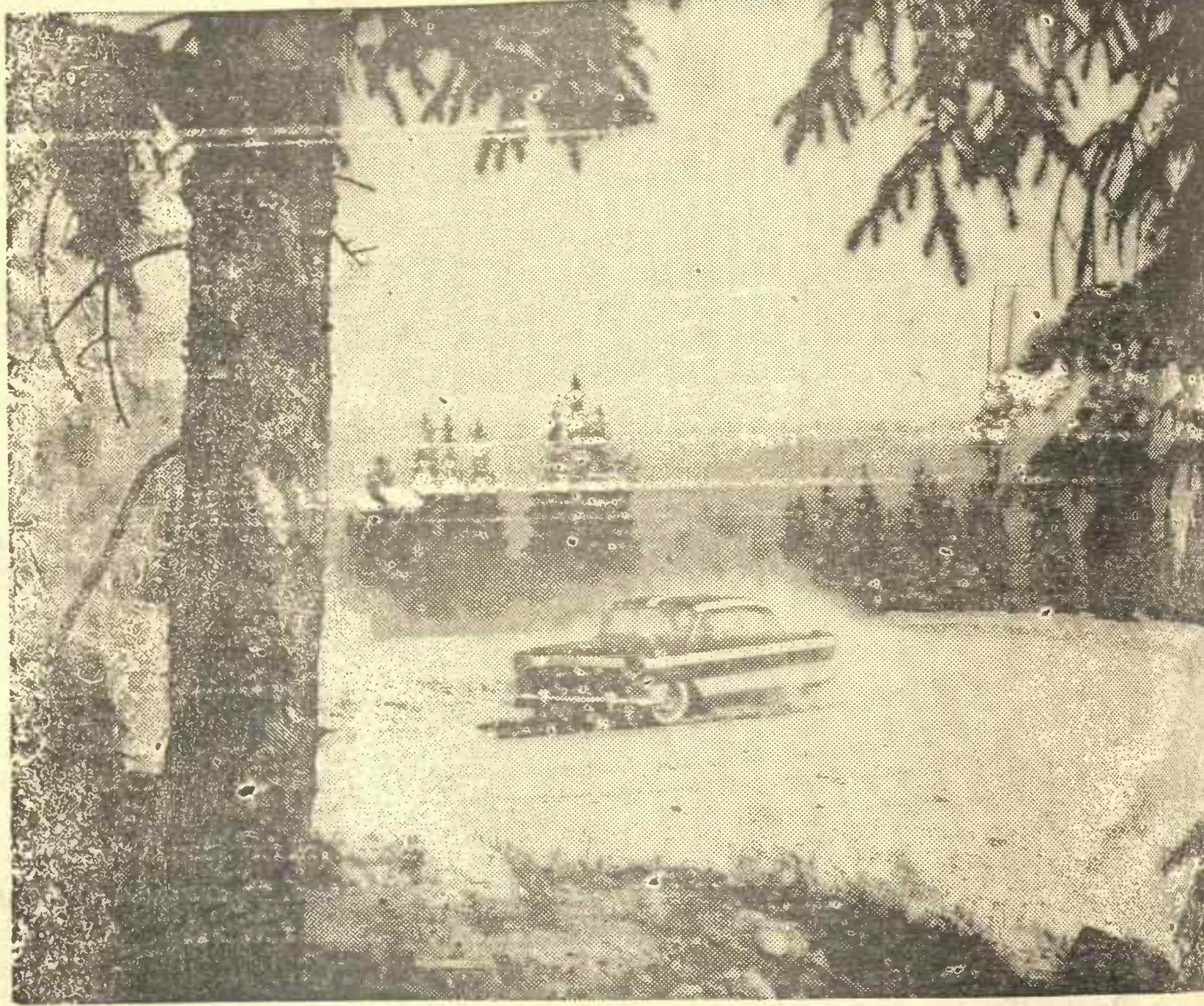

The bright days of October's Bright Blue Weather often make the colors of our clothes and curtains and other household furnishings take on a "tired" look, don't they? Why not try refreshing some of the fabric by tinting or dyeing? Tinting is cold water dyeing. The color produced is not absolutely fast. Fast-color dyeing requires boiling, and the fabric must be kept in motion throughout the boiling.

Look at your white curtains. Would a creamy tint make them more pleasing. Perhaps a bedspread or cotton throw rugs you have on hand could use a more harmonious tone to blend with the new color scheme in a bedroom.

As you dye the article, be certain to buy the dye according to the type of fabric and prepare it by the directions on the package. When tinting or dyeing, always use a container with ample room for moving the article about. Use enough water to cover all the fabric completely and rinse thoroughly when the desired color has been reached.

To see the color as it will appear when dry, you might be wise to test a small sample of the fabric first. Hold the sample to the light. To make the color darker, add more dye; to make it lighter, add more water to the dye bath.

Buying Fabrics
As you look at all of the beautiful colors, weaves and finishes on the bolts of fabric in display, it's hard to choose the one you like best, isn't it? As you make your selection, whether for a dress, sportswear or bedtime wear, remember these tips on selection:

Buy as good fabric as you can afford. Take careful measurements and figure yardage. Buy becoming colors. Consider laundering or dry-cleaning.

Food Wheel
Many kinds of wheels make this old world go round and one that we must never forget is the wheel of Good Nutrition. The Basic Seven Food Wheel.

Foods from each of the seven sections of this wheel must be included in each day's diet. They are "musts" to provide needed nutrients to build and maintain strong bodies as well as prevent disease.

The seven sections of the wheel are: 1) Green and yellow vegetables; 2) citrus fruits and tomatoes; 3) potatoes and other vegetables and fruits; 4) milk and milk products; 5) meat, poultry, fish and eggs; 6) bread, flour and cereals; 7) butter and fortified margarine.

Shelves For Linens

Sometimes shelves are so far apart in linen closets that there is plenty of room between for half-shelves. These can be fastened at the back or along the sides of the closet where they do not keep you from seeing the linens on the deep

shelves. The "little linens" — pillowcases, napkins, dishtowels, washcloths, dish cloths, potholders — will fit on a half-shelf just 8 inches deep. On shelves this shallow, linens are in a single row so they are easy to see, and easy to get in and out of storage.

County Agent News

Use Heat Lamps Safely
Infra-red heat lamps, now in wide use throughout Mississippi for brooding of baby pigs, turkeys and chickens, are sometimes a source of danger to the stock.

While the 250-watt R40 bulb, most commonly used, comes in deep red, hard glass, or clear, regular glass, most farmers buy the cheaper one-regular glass. This bulb breaks more easily.

Here are some rules to follow to reduce danger of breakage of these lamps, and reduce danger of

injury to livestock.

1. Hang lights from a light chain of wire so that they cannot fall.

2. Protect bulbs with deep reflectors so that they cannot come in contact with water or other substance that might cause breakage.

3. Suspend the lamps at a height where livestock being brooded cannot reach them. Use porcelain sockets or lamp holders instead of brass ones. Use rubber covered cord to connect brooder lamps, and make sure that excess cord is taped up out of reach of livestock.

No more than six 250 watt bulbs should be connected on a 15-ampere circuit. By all means, follow the manufacturer's instructions in operating the lamps and connecting them.

Poultry

Rats and baby chicks just don't mix. One rat has been known to kill as many as 200 chicks in just one night.

Besides killing the baby chicks and older birds too, rats will eat and waste more feed than the chickens will.

Rat proof your poultry houses. Rid your farm of rats. Get your

neighbors to cooperate with you in riding entire communities of these disease transmitting, feed wasting, poultry killing, "varmints."

See your County Agent for information on rat eradication and newest chemicals to use in your rat program.

Soil Testing

For faster service and certainly of having results of soils test on hand by planting time next spring, samples should be taken and sent to the State Soils Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State College during the fall and early winter.

Samples should be taken for spring planted crops during the latter part of October through January.

Forestry

Most acres of farm woodland will produce four times as much income if helped a little than they will if just let alone.

It is just as worthwhile to remove trees that are shading out desirable varieties as it is to plant seedlings.

Cull trees — those that are of such poor quality that they cannot be sold, get bigger but no bet-

ter. If they were culls the last time you made a sale, they are still culls.

There was a larger volume of business activity in the Corinth area during August 1955 than during either August 1954 or July 1955 by 7 per cent and 9 per cent in the order named, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College.

Corinth reported an increase of 8 per cent when compared with last August. Indicator changes were bank debits, 13 per cent; money orders issued, 5 per cent; postal receipts, minus 5 per cent and telephones in service, 5 per cent. The

same city reported 11 per cent more business activity than the previous month.

The general business activity index rose considerably in the city of Corinth during August. Starting the month at 133 per cent of the 1947-49 adjusted average, it climbed to 149 per cent at the end of August.
