Iuka Shirt Co. Shows Progress In First 3 Months

Bernard Lukoff, president and manager of the Iuka Shirt Co., reports this week that the manufacturing plant has made wonderful progress in its first three months of operation ending on September 30.

The company has paid out to employees a total of \$55,936.67 in wages. One hundred and twenty-five people are now employed at the plant and Mr. Lukoff says the number will be increased "as soon as we can make the space."

"We manufactured about three-hundred dozens per week in the beginning. Now we are doing 1160 dozen shirts a week. We are in need of additional space badly. Our business is good and has all the potentialities of improving more," Mr. Lukoff said.

Ninety-eight percent of the employees of the Iuka Shirt Co. are Tishomingo Countians. The Company started operations in June of this year.

T. M. McDonald Sells Business To Clark; Retires

One of Tishomingo county's oldest merchants, T. M. McDonald, retired from active business last week when he sold his general merchandise store to J. O. (Click) Clark.

Mr. McDonald first went into business in Iuka in 1901 in a furniture store which he sold, afterwards going into the lumber business. In 1914 Mr. McDonald went into the grocery business and was engaged in this endeavor intermittently until last Friday when final agreement was reached with Mr. Clark.

Mr. McDonald was at one time a member of the Iuka Board of Aldermen and during one of his terms as alderman served as vice-mayor and upon the resignation of the late Sam Allen as mayor, served in that office. He was also a trustee of the Iuka school system. In 1928 he was elected Tishomingo county representative and served in that office from 1929 to 1933.

Ill health has forced Mr. McDonald into retirement.

Announcement of plans for reopening the store are incomplete since the new owners of the business intend to completely renovate the building. "We want to open our store as soon as we can," Click Clark, the new owner, said.

County Agent News

Now is the time to treat cattle for
lice and grubs.

Lice on cattle will not only retard the growth of calves but will reduce gain on beef cattle and lower milk production on dairy animals. The first symptoms of cattle lice make the animal rough coated and unthrifty. They stand around and rub neck and shoulders on post and side of barn.

To control lice, spray animals before cold weather sets in thoroughly covering all parts of the body. This takes approximately two to three gallons of diluted spray mixture for each mature animal. For beef animal use one pound of 12% Gamma BHC to fifty gallons water or four pounds of DDT

or Methoxychlor Powder to 50 gallons water.

On dairy animals I would suggest the use of Lindane Emulsion. The rate of this mixture is ¼ pint of 20% Lindane to 50 gallons water.

For controlling cattle grub use 1-¼% Rotenone Dust on back of animal. This may be accomplished by using a fruit jar with 10 to 12 holes punched in top.

An entire community can be freed from cattle grub if all the folks treat their animals.

Orchards

Late October is the time to treat peach trees with ethylene dichloride, provided they were not treated earlier with the DDT spray.

Farmers who sprayed with the DDT solution in August and September should repeat the treatment.

Trees that were treated with DDT should be checked now and those which show signs of borers should be treated with the ethylene dichloride.

Late October and early November are recommended times to set new strawberry plants. Ten days before planting, apply six to eight pounds of a 6-8-8, or equivalent fertilizer to each 100 feet of row. Mix thoroughly with the soil.

Set plants one foot apart in three to three and a half foot beds.

Recommended varieties are: Blakemore, Suwanee, Massey or Klondike.

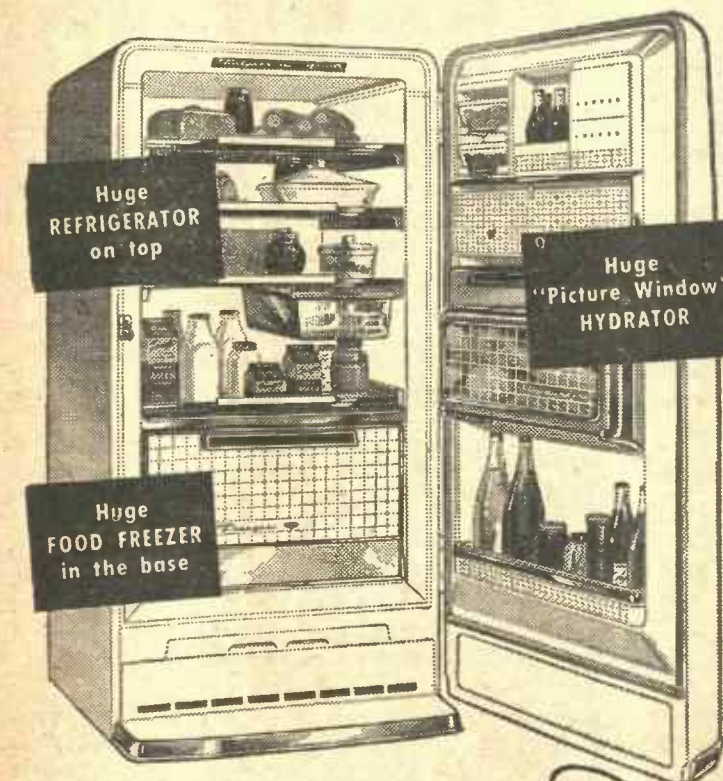

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR:
The Unfair Game Law

I have talked to lots of farmers and landowners from most all parts of the state and we are not satisfied with the present game laws because it does not give the land-

owner, the farmer, the man who raises the game, his rights.

I think the rabbit should be open season all the time and birds should be killed only by permission from the landowners on account of shooting five stock. If any kind of game is damaging our crops it should be free to be killed.

The squirrel is about the most unfair part of the game law in my part of the state. The season opens October 1 most of the time when the farmers are busy gathering their crops and we all know that the people who don't have anything to do and don't own any land come in and kill most of our squirrels in a day or two and we farmers, landowners and people who raise them don't get a chance at all. Now I think if we are going to have a game law it should be where the landowners and the farmers could have a chance at some of the game that he has raised. Now I think God created this game for our use not for a money machine. I know lots of farmers who buy state hunting license and maybe don't go but one time and the game wardens try to make a man pay a fine for hunting without a license. I think if we farmers raise this game it should belong to us the same as our hogs and chickens. But if we are to have this law I think the squirrel season should open August 15 or 20th so the farmers the poor man, can kill one or two before he gets busy gathering his crop. Now if you farmers and landowners agree with me write me a card or a letter with your name signed to it and I will send it to our law making body one or two of us can't do anything but several hundred might.

wood on twenty-five acres of his woodland.

Mr. Glover will do this to release young pine seedlings being smothered by the larger worthless trees.

Mr. Clovis Crane, who is acting Area Forester, approved the plot of woodland to be improved. Farmers carrying out this ASC practice in accordance with regulations will receive 70% of the actual cost of doing this work up to (\$6.00) six dollars per acre.

The Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissions and the local SCS technicians are interested in this phase of woodland improvement. We who work for the USDA Soil Conservation service urge farmers who own timberland needing such improvement to go to the ASC office (Mr. Ellett Allen's office) and make application for assistance in doing this work. The area forester will have to inspect any site to be improved. His approval of the site is necessary before any pay can be received for the girdling of hardwoods.

Some of the farmers who intend to apply this timber stand improvement practice on part of their woodland in 1956 are: Eugene Glover, Grady Barnes, Roe Daniels, Wayne Spinks, Zeke Hester, Herbert Mars, Lester Adams, Charlie Barnes, James R. Phifer, Shelby Morgan and Ernest P. Howell. Many others farmers have indicated that they are interested in having some of this work done and will apply for assistance to do it, provided they can employ their tenants to help do the girdling.

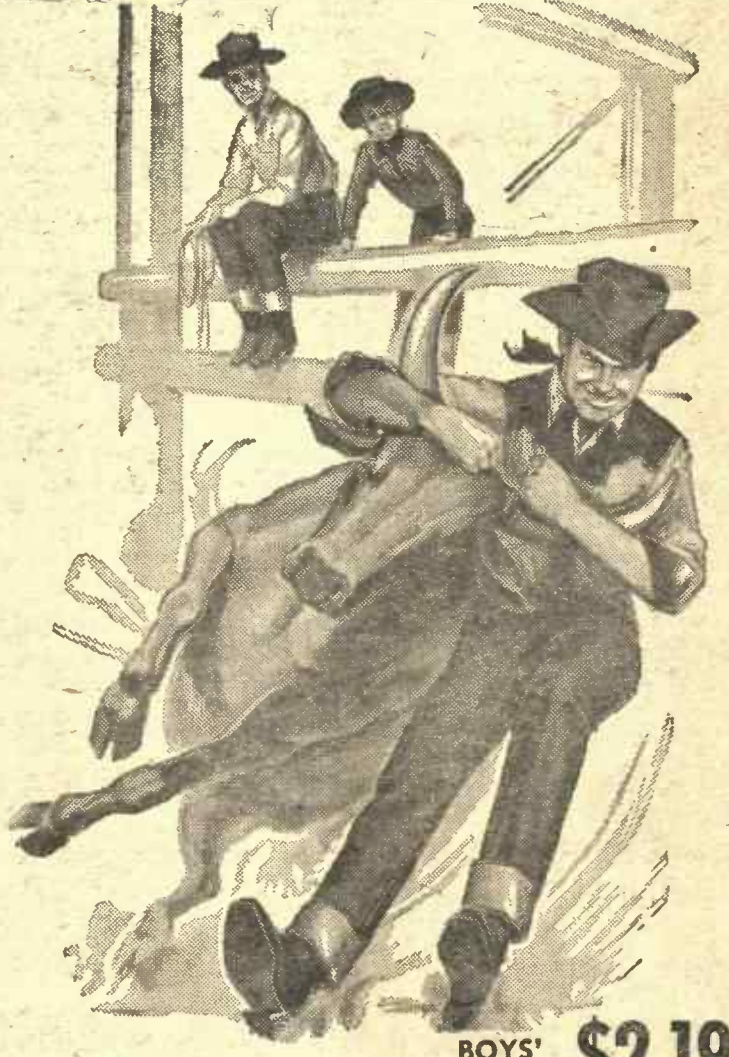

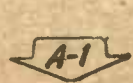

Social Security Card Not For Identification

A social security card is identification for social security purposes only, and should not be accepted as identification for other purposes. Mrs. Mary King Temple, manager of the Sheffield, Alabama, social security office reminded local storekeepers and their employees today.

A person can obtain a social security card and work under any name he wishes, Mrs. Temple said. To receive his old age insurance benefits at age 65 or later, he must prove only that he is the person for whom a social security account has been set up under that name and number, and that his earnings have been credited to that account.

Therefore, a social security card is no guarantee that an individual is using the name his mother gave him, or that he has a bank account. To illustrate the hazards of cashing checks where only a social security card is offered as identification, Mrs. Temple cited a true story. Recently, she said, police in Tampa, Florida, answered a call from a supermarket manager and picked up a woman "customer" who, using several different social security cards as identification, had passed \$1600 in worthless checks during her travels through six Eastern cities.

The 25-year old woman, Mrs. McGurkin, claimed she had been led into her criminal career by a man she met while working as a waitress in Baltimore. He had planned all their operations, she alleged, and had taken all the money. The man, Thomas Gerald Ryan, 29, des-

The general plan followed by the couple was for Mrs. McGurkin to visit the local social security office in each of the six cities on their itinerary to obtain a social security account number card. Ryan would pick a random address for a social security card, alleging that she was going to work for a number of checks, all for \$44.00 and took her around to several stores in town where she attempted to cash them, offering only the falsely obtained social security card as identification. Mrs. McGurkin told Tampa police that about half the stores she approached cashed the checks without requiring any other evidence of her identity.

The amazing thing about this, story, Mrs. Temple said, is that she found so many willing dupes. Social Security Administration has repeatedly warned business men not to accept social security cards as identification in cashing checks, giving credit, or for any other purpose not connected with the administration of the social security program.

Although few people will, like Mrs. McGurkin, go to the trouble of obtaining a false social security card, she pointed out that properly issued cards may be lost or stolen, and may be in the possession of someone to whom it does not belong. Moreover, a person can have his name on his social security card changed by filing a request for a change in records with the Social Security Administration. For example, he said, women change their names after they marry.

Exams Set For S.S. Qualification Tests For College Boys

Colonel John W. Patton Jr., State Director of Selective Service for Mississippi, has received notice that General Hershey, National Director, has arranged for Selective Service Qualification Tests for college students on Thursday, November 17, and Thurs. April 19, 1956. These tests will be held at approximately 1,000 testing centers throughout the nation.

"To be eligible for the test, a registrant must (1) intend to request deferment as a student, (2) be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction, and (3) must not previously have taken the qualification test," Colonel Patton explained. He said application blanks for the November test may be obtained from the student's nearest local board now, and full information will be given by the clerk of the local board.

Applications should be submitted at the earliest possible date for the November test, and the deadline is November 1, 1955. Any applications postmarked after midnight on November 1 will not be accepted. The applications should be mailed to Science Research Associates, Chicago, Illinois, in special envelope which will be furnished by local boards.

Students who attain a prescribed upper class standing or make a score of 70 or better on either of these tests are eligible for consideration by their local boards for

deferment during the next academic year. Local Boards are not required to defer students who meet one or both of their criteria, Colonel Patton pointed out, but their classifications are subject to appeal. Students whose academic year will end in January 1956 are urged to take the November test so they will have a test score on file at their local boards before the end of their academic year, at which time their cases will be reconsidered for possible deferment.

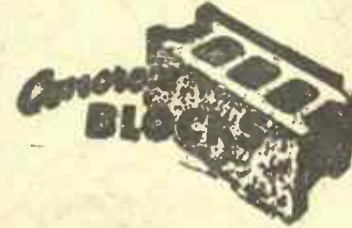

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Self-Portrait

Lesson for October 30, 1955

THERE are people who don't care how they look to other people; they have no particular long-range plans or pattern of life, they live (as they might say) by ear. We call such persons extroverts; they never stop, so to speak, long enough to look into a mirror. There is an opposite kind of person who is painfully interested in himself. He is forever looking into a mirror, as it were. He makes the most careful and detailed plans and is quite upset when a detail goes wrong. We call such persons introverts. In between these types is a more balanced sort of person. If one could "type" Jesus of Nazareth he would be the balanced sort, by all means. He was self-conscious enough to know and care what he was doing, but not in the least self-centered.

Jesus once had the opportunity, which to some young people is a rather frightening thrill, of speaking to a crowded audience in his own home town. He knew what was in nearly everybody's mind: "Give an account of yourself. Who do you think you are and what do you think you are doing?" To them he was just a home-town boy; but they had heard of strange things he had said and done, and they wanted to hear him talk. So he had the opportunity on a Sabbath-day of speaking in the synagogue. As he read the Scripture for the day, from Isaiah 61, Jesus stopped in the middle of a sentence, and sitting down (as teachers did in those days) he said, "Today this Scripture has been fulfilled . . . In other words, as Americans would put it. This is it. This is my plan of life. This prophecy, hundreds of years old, describes what I am and what I am doing. In short, Jesus took this prophecy to himself, as a self-portrait. It is more like a motion picture than a still picture; it expresses what he was, in terms of what he did.

For Others That, by the way, is typical of the Bible way of describing people. Adjectives like "good," "merciful," "truthful," always have verbs behind them. Adjectives describe actions. A man does not have one kind of character and another kind of action. His actions are his character, not his external actions alone, but together with the motives and intentions which are a true part of every act. Now Jesus describes himself in terms of action, but of action in relation to other persons. John Wesley says somewhere that when Christianity ceases to be social it is not any longer Christian. The idea that any one can become a higher type of Christian by retiring permanently from the world, devoted exclusively to prayer and contemplation, is a notion not derived from Jesus. For him, the meaning of life is in contact with other persons. But note the sort of person Jesus mentions: the poor, the captives, the blind, the bruised . . . the very people so many of us avoid. Most people jump at the chance to get their pictures taken with famous people. Jesus' self-portrait was a picture of him with obscure people, people in trouble. What would happen in a community if every church member became more interested in doing something for people than in "doing" people?

For All Others

What really enraged those churchgoers of Nazareth was not that Jesus was dedicated to helping others. That was fine, they were all in favor of it. The thing that raised them to murder-heat was that he drew no lines. He was for helping one and all, yes even Gentiles. What Jews of that day thought of Gentiles is expressed in a passage from a popular book written about the same time as the New Testament: "For our sakes you (God) made this first-born world. But as for the rest of the nations which are sprung from Adam, you have said they are nothing and are like spittle." (II Esdras 8:56). So when Jesus made it clear that he (like Elijah and Elisha before him) would draw no race or national lines, that he intended to carry God's love to the last and least of men, these race-proud Nazarenes threatened to lynch him. fats and oils and canned tuna will
all be good buys.

Plentiful Cranberries.
This fall's cranberry crop is the
second largest in history. You will
find the berries a tasty addition to
your meals in relishes, salads, des-

serts and as the favorite cranberry
sauce.

Along with ham, pork roasts,
pork chops, turkey or chicken from
the plentiful meat list, you might
like:

Cranberry-Pineapple Relish
4 cups cranberries
1 lemon
1 cup canned, crushed pineapple
2 cups sugar
Chop cranberries and whole lem-
on cut in quarters in food chopper.
Add pineapple and stir in sugar
until well blended. Chill in refrig-
erator a few hours before serving.
Makes 1 quart of relish and will

keep well in the refrigerator for
several weeks.

Cranberry Sherbet

Soften 2 teaspoons gelatin in ¼
cup water and cook until tender.
Force through sieve and return
pulp to saucepan. Add 1 ¾ cups
sugar, ¾ teaspoon mace and boil
5 minutes. Add softened gelatin
and stir until dissolved.

Put in freezer and leave until
partially frozen. Beat and fold in
2 stiffly beaten egg whites to which
you have added a teaspoon lem-
on juice. Return to freezer. Serve
before completely hardened, or soft-
en enough to fluff a little before
serving.

When you buy cheese, you have
a choice of several hundred differ-
ent cheeses. Actually, however, there
are only about 18 distinct types.

And these can be broken down
into four general classifications:
Very hard, such as Parmesan; hard
as Cheddar and Swiss; semi-soft,
as brick and Roquefort; and soft
as Camembert, cream, and cottage
cheese.

Tricks In The Kitchen

The dry ingredients for muffins,
coffee cake and other favorites
may be fixed ahead of time and
placed in any convenient covered
container. Label and store. Then
mix the liquid ingredients and
bake as desired.

Mix sugar and cinnamon and spr-
inkle over plain muffins before
baking. This spicy, sugary top adds
taste appeal.

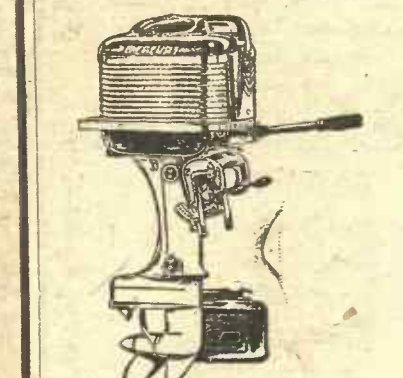
Cut slices of bread with a dough-
