Mishel Piastro And The World Famous Longines Symphonette To Be Presented At High School Auditorium, Nov. 13

Mishel Piastro and the world famous Longines Symphonette will be presented Sunday afternoon, November 13 at 2 p.m. at the Howard Memorial Auditorium by The Etude Music Club and The Federated Women's Clubs of Iuka.

This magnificent concert ensemble has an established reputation in every nook and corner of the United States and Canada. Its programs have also been carried by government-owned radio enterprises, including that of the Armed Forces, throughout the entire world.

The Longines Symphonette had its premiere broadcast over Radio Station WEAH in New York in 1941 and has been continuously on the air ever since. It has been broadcast to millions of homes over a selective network of more than 150 of the most powerful radio stations in the country, with multiple appearances in many areas.

During 1948, the Symphonette made its radio debut on the Columbia Broadcasting System and has recently completed its fifth year cycle over the full C. B. S. Network of 166 stations.
The 21 weeks transcontinental personal appearance tour last season was probably the greatest symphony tour in the history of music.
Tickets for the Iuka concert are on sale at Curtis Bros. and Rushing drug stores. All profits realized from the sale of these tickets will go to the Iuka High School Band.

Citizens of the town and surrounding areas should feel honored in having this famous Symphonette appear here. The concert will afford entertainment for all age groups and all types of music lovers.

The symphony orchestra can be divided into four groups: the strings, woodwinds, brass and percussion.
The violin is the "prima donna of the string choir and is both coloratura and a dramatic singer." Mr. Piastro was concert master for Arturo Toscanini for ten years. A concert master is at the head of the first violin and takes over the performance of any solo music for his instrument designated in the score. There are six first violins, and four second violins in the Longines Symphonette.

The woodwinds are wind instruments generally constructed of wood, they are the flutes, oboes, clarinets and bassoons.
The Brasses are the muscle and sinew of the symphony, they contribute the most brilliant sonorities and they resound the loudest.
The percussion section is used to emphasize rhythm and to assist in building dramatic climaxes.

The position of the Longines Symphonette Orchestra on the stage will be as follows: the first and second violins will be grouped at the left of the conductor; violas directly in front; cellos, brass, timpani and piano at his right. The double brasses and the woodwinds are lined up in two rows in the rear of the orchestra.
Mr. Piastro will be on the podium promptly at 2 P.M.

Plans Materializing For Beautification Of Hwys. With Variety of Shrubs

A. E. Holmes, Jr., landscape engineer with the Mississippi State Highway Department, met last Thursday with the committee of men appointed by the City Beautiful Commission to help procure

the shrubs and trees and to solicit funds to pay for them, to be used in the Iuka Roadside Planting Project. This committee will act in a liaison capacity between the Town of Iuka and the highway department.

Mr. Holmes, after many hours of diligent work, has prepared a plan, which, if followed, will beautify and control erosion along Highways 72 and 25 for a distance of about two miles in each direction of the new intersection of these thoroughfares.

Here is the list of plants recommended for this project: the trees and plants are not small size but are to be as follows:
314 Red Bud, 4 to 5 feet; 465 Crepe Myrtle, 3 to 4 feet; 140 Pyracantha, 3 feet (packed in 1 gal. cans); 98 Holly (rotundifolia) 2 feet; 150 Sugar Maple, 6 to 8 feet; 90 Ginkgo Trees, 6 to 8 feet; 12 Irish Juniper, 4 to 5 feet; 8 Dogwood (field grown) 4 to 5 feet; 72 Tulip Trees, 6 to 8 feet; 54 Magnolia, 4 to 5 feet; 42 Tilia Trees, 4 to 6 feet; 3500 Multiflora Rose Bushes, 3 feet; 5,000 Seedling Pine Trees (to be furnished by the Soil Conservation Service).

All of the above to be first grade plants and purchased from only reputable, recognized nurseries.
This planting was recommended because the plants will not only do well in this climate with a mini-

NAME OF PLANT WILL BE TISHOMINGO SHOE COMPANY

Training operations at the new shoe plant at Iuka got under way Wednesday morning of this week with 10 employees learning the first steps in making shoes. Actual production will begin Monday morning, Nov. 7, with approximately 35 employees, Brandon Edmondson, superintendent of the plant said yesterday. Training of operators is being conducted only a few hours each day this week.

Beginning next week with the approximately 35 employees the plant will gradually hire more each week until about 100 are employed. This number will be maintained until the workers learn their duties, and as they learn additional employees will be hired. Mr. Edmondson said he expected to reach the hundred employees within a month.

Miss Billie Johnston has been employed as plant secretary.

The 48,000 square floor foot building is the result of a \$300,000.00 bond election held last March in the First, Second and Third districts. "The name of the factory will be 'Tishomingo Shoe Company,' Mr. Edmondson said. "We feel that this is the most suitable name for our plant since most of the districts of the county are responsible for it being here and since it is a mutual obligation between the General Shoe Corporation and the citizens of the First, Second and Third districts."

Completion of the boiler and heating system and connection of water lines to the plant is expected to be finished the latter part of this week.

Choosing your Electric Ironing Equipment

FIRE FACTS

With an automatic electric washer and dryer, washday is almost a matter of setting dials. That leaves only ironing to deal with.

No one has yet found a way to do this job by setting a dial. But you can clip hours off of this last washday chore by adding an automatic electric ironer and steam-dry iron to your laundry equipment. With two pieces of equipment, you can do your ironing with less effort and just about cut your ironing time in half.

In choosing your ironer, you will find two general rotary types—with the shoe (the heated part) above the padded roll or below it. Some have both roll ends open; some have only one open. You may have your choice of permanent, cabinet, foldaway and table models in these ironers.

The padded roll of these ironers revolves, carrying the fabric against the ironing surface or shoe. The ironer can be stopped at any time without releasing pressure of the ironing surface. Controls usually carry two speeds, slow for very damp articles and higher for drier articles.

These controls, operated with knee or foot, are very important. You should be able to reach them conveniently and they should respond to your slightest touch. There should also be thermostatic controls for the different fabrics.

These ironers operate on 115 volts, but need a separate circuit for best results.

A light weight steam-dry iron is an ideal companion to your automatic ironer. It eliminates the need for two hand irons—steam and dry. You will use it to touch up frills and ruffles on pieces ironed with your ironer.

There are many makes of steam irons to select from, so you should be able to find just the one for your particular needs. A steam iron is really a good investment and time saver.

Maximum Wages Concerning Social Security \$4200 yr.

Employers and employees are reminded that the maximum wages from which the social security deduction is made has increased to \$4200 for 1955 and succeeding years. Mrs. Mary King Temple, manager of the Sheffield, Alabama social security office said that the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act provided for this increase effective in 1955.

Mrs. Temple stated that the increase in wage credits thus established would mean higher maximum benefits in the future for retired workers and their dependents or for the survivor of these workers in case of death. The \$3600 maximum allowed before 1955 permitted maximum monthly benefits of \$98.50 to a retired worker while the new \$4200 maximum can mean \$108.50 to insured employed or self-employed persons retiring after mid-1956.

All employees who earn wages of more than \$3600 in a calendar year should make certain that the new maximum is being reported for them by their employers. They can do this, Mrs. Temple continued, by checking their pay slips or by checking with their employers. "The social security administration also advises all workers to ch-

eck on their wage records each five years. Post card forms are available to all social security offices for this purpose", Mrs. Temple added.

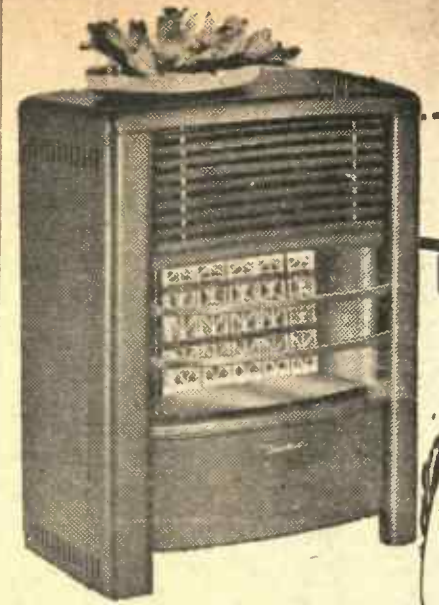

am chairman of the committee and
was the only member available for
this assignment. The Chavez Ap-
propriations Subcommittee on De-
fense, of which I am a member,
was also inspecting military bases
in these same countries and oth-
ers. To avoid duplication of expen-
ses, I joined this group. I announ-
ced then that I could not remain
beyond October 23rd or 25th be-
cause of my duties in Mississippi.

Regarding transportation, I ex-
pressly requested, before leaving,
that transportation going overseas
be provided by the military sea
transport service and that I be re-
turned by the military air trans-
port service, commonly called
MATS. The Department of Defense
granted my request and I departed
with the Tenth Division on a mili-
tary transport from New York on
September 17, and returned from
Spain to Washington on October
24th on a regular scheduled MATS
flight.

The idea of a special plane com-
ing from Washington to Madrid
for this purpose was unthinkable,
was not mentioned and would
have been rejected immediately by
me had it been suggested. I knew
MATS made runs through Madrid
as we have heavy military work
in Spain, but of course I did not
know the schedule dates and re-
lied entirely on the promises al-
ready made as to my transporta-

tion. The matter of transportation
was not mentioned to me again in
any manner by the Defense De-
partment, nor by any military of-
ficer with us, nor was it discussed
in my presence by the other Sena-
tors until the news story was given
us in Naples last Thursday, to
the effect that the Defense De-
partment was sending two special
planes for us. I, of course, had
made no special request and knew
nothing about it. Just two days
earlier I had understood from a
non-military staff member of the
committee that it might be neces-
sary to take us to some place be-
yond Madrid to connect with a
MATS flight. This procedure is not
unusual.

When we reached Madrid last
Friday there was a news item
quoting the Defense Department
as saying the planes were sent be-
cause the "Senators declined to
wait for scheduled flights." Speak-
ing for myself, this was utterly un-
true. No one had ever mentioned
such a delay of departure to me
in any way, directly or indirectly,
and had not requested me to de-
lay my departure to the United
States.

When I learned of those state-
ments and that the plane was then
enroute to Madrid, I told officers
there representing the Defense
Department that I stood on my
original request to the Defense De-
partment for transportation to
Washington on a regular MATS
flight and I asked for a definite
answer by 9 a.m., October 22. The
next morning at 8:30, I was told
that transportation would be avail-
able to me on a regular flight from
Madrid to Paris on October 23, and
from Paris to Washington on a
regular MATS flight with military
men and their dependents, leaving
Paris October 23rd, at 6 p.m. This
complied with my original request
and I returned on MATS as plan-
ned. The fact that this regular
transportation was available and
used by me proves it was not nec-
essary to send a special plane. I
arrived in Washington on sched-
ule on Monday, October 24th.

In view of the foregoing facts I

was stunned and stung by the
above-mentioned statements of the
Department of Defense. I cannot
yet believe that they willfully in-
tended harm, and I assume that
with all the facts in their hands
they will make proper corrections
for the benefit of the public, as
well as the individuals concerned.

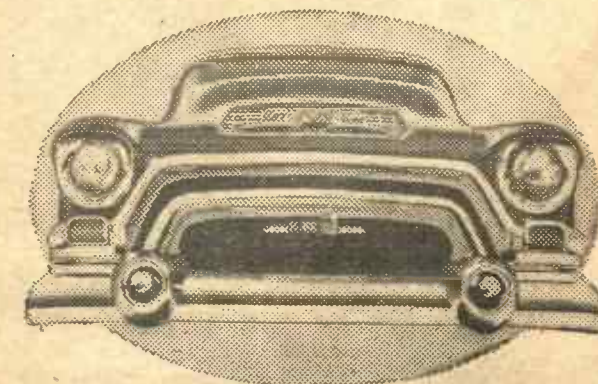

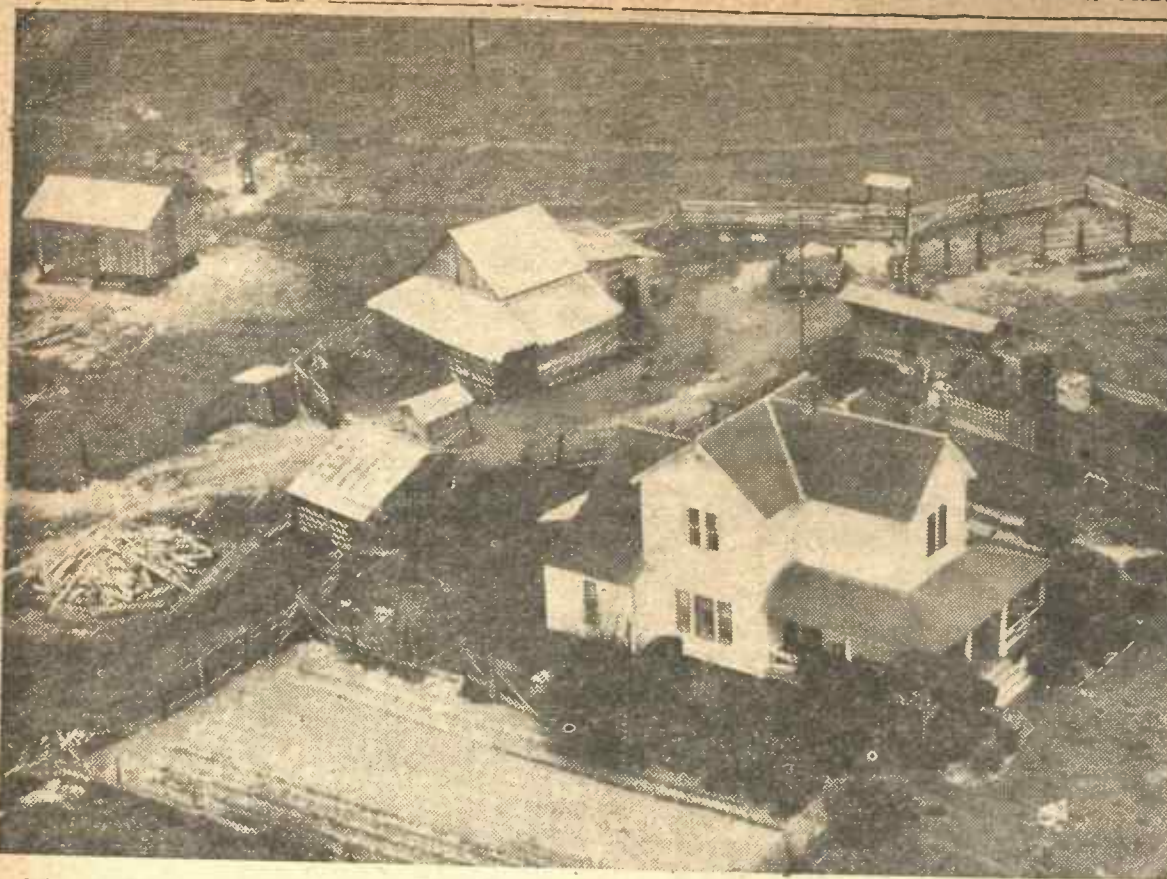

Business Activity For September

Business activity in Mississippi during September was nine per cent above that of September 1954 and 12 per cent above the level of August 1955, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College. The largest percentage increases over September 1954 were found in life insurance sales and bank deposits. Small declines occurred in money orders issued and registration licenses.

Unemployment, as reflected in total claims for unemployment compensation, declined 24 per cent to its lowest point since November 1953. Total construction contracts awarded during September were up sharply. The total value of \$24,740,000 was 113 per cent more than during September 1954 and 147 per cent above August 1955. Both residential and non-residential construction declined, but contracts for the construction of public works and utilities increased markedly.

Total tax collections of \$8,332,506 were 27 per cent over those for September 1954 and 25 per cent over August 1955 collections. Sales tax collections of \$4,062,355 were up 56 per cent from September 1954, before the rate was increased, and 1 per cent above collections for August 1955.

Oil severance tax collections of \$571,495 were up 37 per cent

from a year earlier and 3 per cent from the previous month. Timber severance tax collections of \$28,884 were slightly below those for September of last year but 4 per cent above those of August of this year. The gas severance tax yielded \$96,469 or 56 per cent more than in September 1954 and 15 per cent more than in August 1955.

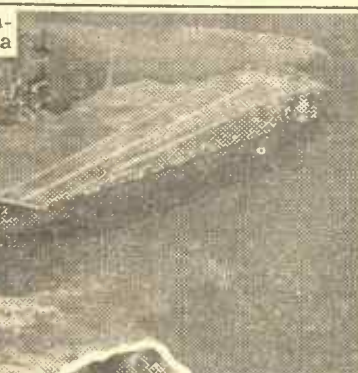

RICE-HAM CROQUETTES WITH HORSE RADISH SAUCE



$\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter or margarine
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon dry mustard
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
2 cups milk
8 cups cooked rice
2 cups ground cooked ham
2 tablespoons minced parsley
2 tablespoons minced onions
8 eggs
2 tablespoons water
1 cup cereal crumbs
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup well-drained horseradish
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Melt butter in small saucepan; stir in flour, salt, paprika, and dry mustard. Gradually stir in Worcestershire sauce and $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups of the milk. Cook until thickened,

stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Combine 1 cup of the rice, ham, parsley, onion, slightly beaten; mix. Chill well and shape into croquettes. Combine remaining water and beat slightly. Mix with remaining mixture and roll again in flour. Fry in deep hot fat (375°) golden brown. Drain on paper.

Thin remainder of mixture with remaining $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water. Heat thoroughly. Stir in radish and lemon juice. Serve the hot croquettes, serving.

Advice Given On Property Purchased Jointly

If you are planning to buy property jointly with your wife, get the advice of your certified public accountant or tax attorney first.

That is the advice of Mr. Lee R. Spence, Jackson, Trust Officer of the Deposit Guaranty Bank and Trust Company.

"Buying property jointly with wife might have some advantages but the disadvantages far outnumber the benefits," Mr. Spence told

the Fall Conference of the Mississippi Society of Certified Accountants, meeting at the University of Mississippi Thursday, Friday.

"Property passing by joint tenancy with right of survivorship will generally qualify for a general marital deduction to the extent of the amount so transferred in this manner a possible second tax saving is possible," Mr. Spence said.

"Before a taxpayer is advised to buy property jointly with his wife he should seek advice from a CPA or tax attorney to avoid the consequence of joint and estate taxes," he continued.

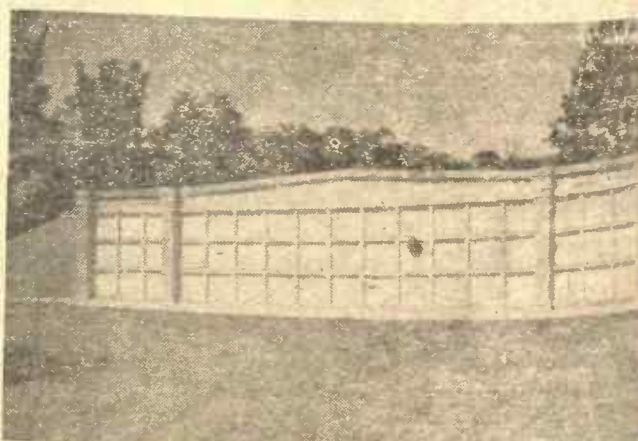

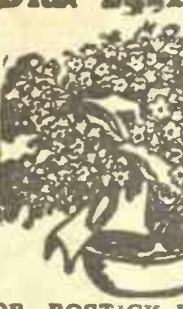

International Uniform Sunday School Lesson

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Luke 5:1-6:16

Devotional Reading: Matthew 25:31-40

Friend of Man

Lesson for November 6, 1955

PEOPLE describing themselves have a tendency to paint themselves handsomer than they really are. They do not like candid-camera shots of themselves. Even when a man has to admit that he has committed a sin or made a mistake, he will try to tell himself his motive was good, anyway. Now Jesus' self-portrait was extremely impressive; but nobody ever called him a hypocrite or a show-off. What Jesus had said of himself in the Nazareth synagogue was just the simple truth: Dr. Foreman he was indeed the same kind of Friend of Man that God is. He made humanity his business.

Healing Bodies

One fact stands out, and Luke makes a great deal of it. Jesus was a healer. He never assumed that sickness or physical disability "is bound to be." He thought people's bodies were important enough to be sound and well. He never thought of himself as so "spiritual" he could be indifferent to people's physical needs and pains. Wherever he went, he brought health with him. We do not fully understand how he did this, but the Christian church has taken the cue from Jesus here. The tremendous development of hospitals in America and over the world is not today all in the hands of Christians or religious people; but it was religious people who started this kind of thing. The church of today is beginning to see how much harm another kind of illness does, and to work at curing mental diseases. Compare a Christian country like ours with a non-Christian country like Korea where the total Christian population is less than six per cent. There a cripple has ordinarily been something to

laugh at. No one would give him a job, no one bothered with him. All he could do was beg, as he crawled or sat in the dust. Now, Christian hospitals there have been doing a work the heathen world never thought of,—rehabilitating amputees, making it possible for them to be self-respecting persons again. Christianity is teaching Korea a lesson. Where once diseases of all sorts were taken as a matter of course, Christian doctors and hospitals have shown the way to national health.

Healing Souls

Some people think that if a man is healthy that is enough. If a man's body is all right, he is all right. Christians know better—because Christ has shown us. Jesus did not think he had done all he could for a man if he got him on his feet, literally. Long before modern medicine rediscovered the fact, Jesus knew that men's most serious diseases are in their souls. He was the Friend of Man,—but not friend of their bodies alone. Hospitals today are more and more making use of chaplains, of counselors—and that is another Christian idea. In every mission hospital the medical missionary is an evangelist too.

What Friendship Means

To Jesus, friendship meant something deeper than what often goes by that name. How many people are "friends" only with the strong, the successful! How many people will be friendly only to those who can give them a lift up the ladder of ambition! This is the friendliness of a mosquito, who will stick close to you, but not with any notion of doing you good. Then again, a common idea of being friendly is to take other people without criticism, take them as they are. A word much in use with psychologists, psychiatrists and counselors nowadays is "acceptance." Now Jesus accepted all kinds of persons who were by everyone else rejected—lepers, tax collectors, the "lower classes," foreigners. But while Jesus opened his heart to these people, in the very act of acceptance he changed them. Some "friends" are like chameleons that take the color of whatever they lie on. Jesus never changed his own colors. He was the friend of sinners, indeed; but by being their friend he led them out of their sins. To be Christlike in friendship is to have a goodness that is contagious.

Plastic Covers

Plastic material, such as that in
which you buy fruits and vegetab-
les, is useful in cultivating plants

transparent to admit light.

You will find plastic bags are
excellent to cover pots of larger
plants when you won't be able to
water them for several days. Small
pot plants may be completely cov-
ered by plastic bags.

When rooting cuttings, you'll
find sheets of plastic are an ideal
covering. They're handy to use in
covering seed flats. Discarded plas-
tic table cloths or curtains will serve
the purpose.

Thrifty Homecraft

A homecraft that thrifty women
since early days have used to make
their homes attractive and also to
save money is weaving chair seats

If you have a chair with round
rails that needs a new woven seat,
why not weave the seat yourself
of Hong Kong grass, rush fiber or
shuck rope? Chair seats of all these
materials fit into modern inter-
iors well.

Hong Kong grass sometimes is
called sea grass. Although none
is being shipped here from Hong
Kong now, this grass is available
from Japan and Formosa. It has
a greenish tan color at first, but
the greenish cast disappears with
age. Size of the strands vary be-
cause they are hand twisted.

The grass weaves easily but is
not easy to knot. This, the strands
should be joined underneath and
secured by a square knot. About
2 pounds of grass will make a me-
dium-sized chair seat.

Instead of the traditional rush-
seat pattern, you may want to use
an open basket weave pattern, which
is easier. Measure the length of
each set rail to help figure out the
weave. Mark the center of each
rail. Weave from side to side first,
then front to back, over and under
the side-to-side strands, working
a simple pattern as you weave.

X-Ray Will Detect Many Diseases

X-ray is one of the most vital
aids to medical diagnosis today,
according to J. D. Ratcliff, nation-
ally known writer on medical sub-
jects. By recent methods, X-ray
will detect gallstones with 99 per-
cent accuracy, says this medical
writer. Its use is likewise invalua-
ble to the radiologist, or X-ray phys-
ician, in detecting medical condi-
tions of heart, brain, spine, neck,
vertebrae and bronchial tubes. In-
fertility in women can be discover-
ed by its use, as can anticipated
difficulties in birth caused by the
baby's position.

Quoting Dr. Henry K. Taylor,
professor of clinical radiology at
Post Graduate Medical School, New
York University-Bellevue Medical
Center, Mr. Ratcliff includes this
statement from the eminent rad-
iologist: "If tonight some global
catastrophe wiped out all the diag-
nostic X-ray machines, tomorrow
morning the medical profession
would find itself back in the 19th
century."

According to Mr. Ratcliff, per-
haps the most dramatic example
of diagnostic progress in radiol-
ogy, using X-ray in medicine, is ex-
amination of the heart. Notably the
famed "blue baby" operation re-
lies heavily on what the radiolog-
ist finds in X-ray studies. Also
visible under X-ray, by means of

"contrast media" such as barium,
iodine materials and even air, are
such small or shadowy structures
as the adrenal glands and the pit-
uitary, master gland of the body.

Use of the X-ray, which was dis-
covered 60 years ago this Novem-
ber by Wilhelm Conrad Roentgen,
is sometimes merely taken for
granted, writes Mr. Ratcliff in the
October Reader's Digest. The rad-
iologist is often mistakenly dis-

missed as a kind of scientific picture-
taker. But this highly skilled doc-
tor gets the same training given
other physicians, plus at least three
years of specialty study, the writ-
er points out. The radiologist is
"a key man in every modern hos-
pital," skilled at interpreting shad-
owy blurs that may be meaningless
to others.

For a number of years after Roe-
ntgen discovered X-rays (or roent-

gen rays) in 1895, the new mach-
ines were little more than scient-
ific playthings, says this science
authority. Amusing repercussions
followed the discovery. Fraudulent
clothing manufacturers offered
"X-ray proof" undergarments for
modest women. Others proposed X-
ray opera glasses, over a storm of
moral indignation. The ray soon
became useful to doctors in such
ways as locating swallowed safety

pins and broken bones.

Through medical progress, radio-
logists can now define much more
complicated conditions of the body.
An aid has been the progress made
in equipment in the past few years.
One result is an image on the fluo-
roscopic screen 200 times as bright
as the one from conventional
fluoroscopes. Another piece of equ-
ipment recently installed in Mass-
achusetts takes 12 X-ray films a

second. It will be invaluable in
photographing beating hearts, says
the author of the article, "What
the Doctor Sees in You."
