Famous New York Orchestra, Longines Symphonette, Coming Here Sunday P.M.

Thirty-One Of New York City's
Finest Musicians To Perform

"The World's Most Honored Music as played by the World's Most Distinguished Ensemble," the Longines Symphonette, is announced for the Howard Memorial Auditorium in Iuka on Sunday afternoon, Nov., 13, under its musical Director, Mishel Piastro.

If, by any chance, some are harboring the notion that the Longines Symphonette is a "chamber orchestra" because of the word "Symphonette," let that be dispelled immediately. Actually, the Symphonette is a full symphony orchestra in all respects except large numbers, and with all instruments represented. The essential difference between the Symphonette and the usual symphony orchestra is merely the fact that the Symphonette has a smaller string section.

The original Longines Symphonette, which took to the airwaves in the Spring of 1941, was a chamber orchestra "symphonette" in the truest sense, consisting of thirteen musicians, all first desk members of the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra, and where Mishel Piastro was then the Concertmaster. In 1943, woodwinds were added, and then the Symphonette was enlarged to include all of the usual instruments of the full orchestra. The sire of the present group is almost identical to

the "symphony orchestra" of Mozart's and Mendelssohn's day and for which these masters composed their works.

The numbers of musicians making the broadcast vary slightly according to the music being played that day. The thirty-one New York musicians to play here with Mishel Piastro are the average number heard on the radio.

The Longines specialty is the playing of shorter selections, or "movements," by the greatest composers, as well as many "lighter" pieces. Many people commonly refer to them as "the average man's symphony orchestra." The magnificence of their playing is achieved through using only New York City's finest musicians under Mishel Piastro, who was Toscanini's Concertmaster many years with the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra.

Their concert in Iuka under the auspices of the Etude Music Club and the Federated Women's clubs of Iuka, will be one engagement in an 18 week tour, and their fifth personal appearance tour will take them over the entire United States and Canada. Previously they made personal appearances in Carnegie Hall, New York; Symphony Hall in Boston, and a few other places.

He leaves two children, Mrs. Carlton Woodley at whose home he died, and Mrs. John Stormont, both of Iuka; eight grand children, Rev. Lloyd Stormont of Frankfort, Ky., James Robert Stormont of Dallas, Texas, Mrs. Ramelle Gravette Wilson, Chicago; John B. Stormont, Jr. Mrs. Mildred Curtis, Miss Martha Stormont, Miss Margaret June Woodley and Elmer Gravette all of Iuka; eight great grandchildren and one brother, O. A. Gravette of Albertsville, Ala., who is 99 years of age.

POLIO VACCINE AVAILABLE TO CHILDREN THROUGH NINTH GRADE

Tishomingo County Health Department will join the other 81 county health departments in an expanding vaccination program against crippling polio the latter part of November or December, according to Dr. H. G. Waldrop, County Health Officer.

With funds provided by the Federal government, the State Board of Health is purchasing Salk polio vaccine as rapidly as it becomes available, and as soon as a sufficient stockpile for administering the vaccine throughout the state is on hand, Tishomingo County will begin to receive its allotment.

"Vaccination in school clinics will follow immediately," said Dr. Waldrop, "in order to give maximum protection to as many children as possible before another polio season begins. We already have on hand other needed supplies, such as syringes and needles and informational and record keeping materials.

Our staff is now working out arrangements with school officials in order to get this big job done in the most effective manner possible for the health of our children."

In Tishomingo County the health departments will make the vaccine available to as broad an age group as possible, depending on how fast the vaccine comes into the state, observing at all times the intent of Congress in making it available and the recommendations of the (Continued on Back Page)

Smaller Businesses To Pay Unemployment Tax Beginning With January 1st, 1956

Firms Employing Four Or More
Persons Will Be Responsible

Effective January 1, 1956, an estimated 230 additional employers in non-exempt industry in Alcorn, Prentiss, Tishomingo and Tishomingo counties will become liable to the payroll tax imposed by the federal unemployment tax act, according to Robert Prisock, executive director of the Mississippi Employment Security Commission.

At a recent special session of the Legislature, the Mississippi Employment Security law was amended to conform to the federal law with respect to coverage of 4 or more workers so that firms newly liable under the employment security law can offset up to 90 per cent against the 3 per cent federal tax.

Mr. Prisock said that the regulations and reporting requirements of the Commission will apply to newly liable firms, most of which will be immediately eligible for modified tax rates depending on how long they have been in business.

This results from Miss. payroll variation type of experience rating which allows the use of non-covered payrolls in establishing the experience period on which the tax rate is based.

An economic administration of the provisions of the law will require cooperation of employers with the Commission and its representatives with respect to furnishing information and reports as needed. Immediately following January 1, 1956, representatives of the Commission will contact individuals and firms in order to secure proper registration of liable employers. These representatives will furnish all necessary information regarding the new provisions and will offer assistance to new employers in the examination of payroll records to determine whether or not such individuals or firms are liable under the law, said Mr. Prisock.

**Harold Blount
To Establish
Waterways**

Mr. Harold Blount, who owns a farm near Tishomingo State Park, plans to establish three acres of grass waterways in a 60 acre field this fall.

In establishing these waterways the natural depression on the land

will be shaped, and prepared for seeding by fertilizing and thoroughly discing. Water naturally drains off this land by flowing into these low areas which eventually lead to streams.

Mr. Blount plans to seed fescue in these waterways. The reason he is planting grass in these depressions is to prevent the land from washing away when water from rows and terraces empty into them.

The proper way to drain rows and terraces is from the ridge to the natural draws. By doing this both the rows and terraces will be straighter and there will be less

erosion of the land.

Mr. Blount plans to establish these grassed waterways, or vegetable outlets, this fall. Then next spring he will establish his terraces on this 60 acre field.

Messrs R. C. Tice and Cason Wheeler, employees of the USDA Soil Conservation Service, will assist Mr. Blount in establishing these waterways this fall and his terraces next spring.

Messrs Tice and Wheeler work under the direction of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissioners in establishing soil conserving practices on the land. In establishing these waterways no land will be lost to production. The fescue will provide both hay and winter grazing, but the main objective is to slow down the movement of water as it flows off the land.

Other farmers planning water disposed systems for their fields are W. L. Robbins and Erwin Padgett of Dennis and H. P. Reno near Holcut.

Dry and mealy, moist and sugary, cooked in the jacket or out, sweetpotatoes are a prize package of food values.

If you are buying sweetpotatoes, or selecting those for cooking from your home supply, the choice ones are smooth, well-shaped, firm and of bright appearance. Any blow that will break an egg will bruise a sweetpotato, so be careful not to handle them roughly.

To retain the greater amount of food value, cook the potatoes in their skins. If necessary to peel the potatoes, do so just before they are to be cooked, and peel as thinly as possible.

Sweetpotatoes are primarily an energy-giving food. They have a very high vitamin A content. And

they have an appealing flavor and bright color that makes them a universal favorite.

Annual Flowers

For colorful blooms in your flower garden next spring, it's time now to get the seed of many plants in the ground.

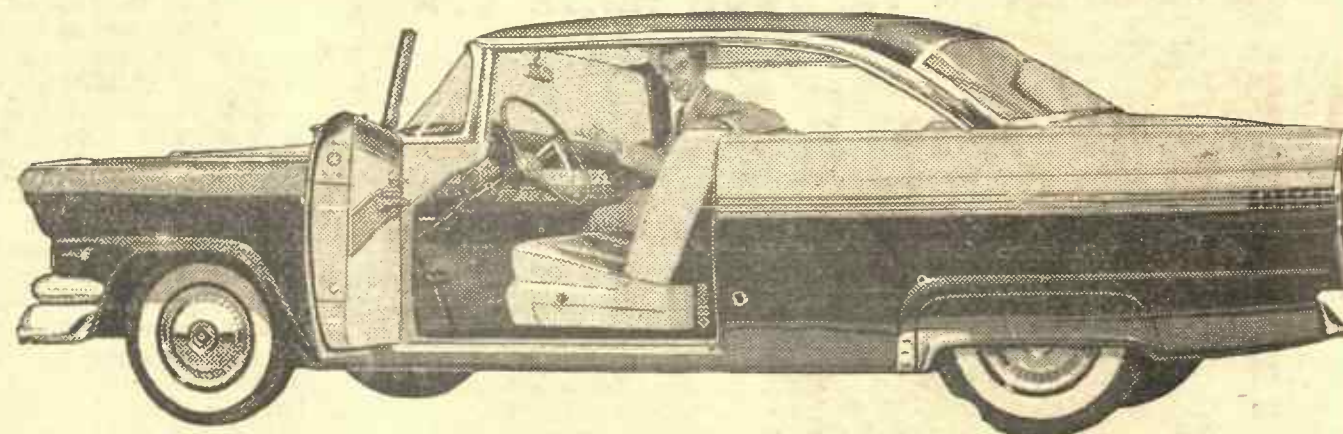

CEPA Notes

Washday Wonder, Electric
Combination Washer & Dryer

The newest wonder to end wash-day work is the electric combination washer-dryer. With unattended operation, it washes and dries your clothes with one setting of

its dials. In this all-in-one machine, your clothes are first washed, rinsed, and spun partially dry—just as in your automatic electric washer.

When this operation is complete, your combination pauses for a moment, then the dryer part cuts out to complete the job automatically. Once you have set the dials the work is done.

All models of this new appliance are tumble action. They take eight or nine pounds of dry clothes, depending on the model. They all have safety devices door switches that cut off operation when the door is opened, manual switches to stop operation entirely if necessary, and protective devices for unbalanced load or motor overload.

None of the models have lint traps—lint is washed down the drain. This removes the need for venting, removes the need for venting.

No matter which model you select, you can use the washing combination or drying combination separately if you wish. Each model has separate controls for these two operations.

For excessively soiled clothes, you may need to prewash or use a soak cycle as you would with a separate washing machine. You may shorten or lengthen washing and drying cycles just as you do with your regular washing and drying appliances.

These combinations are no more complex to operate than any other automatic machine. Dial settings are clearly marked and easy to set for all operations.

In using any kind of washing, it is a well known fact that you must have plenty of hot water to get clothes really clean. Your combination washer-dryer will use from 15 to 16 gallons of hot water for each full sized wash load. For this reason, it is a good idea to make sure that your electric water heater is large enough to furnish hot water for as many loads as you will be doing in one day.

The electric combination washer-dryer must also have adequate wiring. It operates on 230 volts and needs its own 30 ampere circuit.

The cost of the combination washer-dryer is in line with the prices that you will pay for separate automatic washing and drying machines. Actually it will probably cost you less. You will probably pay less for its installation. It comes ready for connection without

additional plumbing.

Once you have used this combination washer-dryer, you will know real washday leisure. You set the dials just once—and your combination takes over the entire work of washing and drying your clothes.

County Agent News

By W. C. HAMILTON

Representing Mississippi State College Agricultural Extension

The Tishomingo County Cotton crop is 95% complete and the ginning to-date is 8,392 bales.

The cotton production average of lint per acre is the highest on record for this county. Some exceptionally high yields have been recorded with the highest county yield per acre being that of Harold Hendrix, Route 1, Burnsville, who had a 3.7 acre plot which he harvested approximately 8 bales of cotton.

This high yield was produced on good cotton land in a small branch bottom with the following fertilizer used: 400 pounds 6-8-8 and 100 pounds Nitrate Of Soda under and side-dressed with 75 pounds nitrogen per acre. This field was poisoned only four times and Mr. Hendrix stated that if more poison had been applied he would have increased his yield about one-half bale per acre. The variety was DPL-15, and the grade ranged from Middling Plus to Middling and the sample range was from 1-3/32 to 1-5/32 inches.

The record county corn crop is 75% harvested. All farmers had good yield with the county average being about 38 bushels per acre. Had it not been for some late planted corn the county average would have been considerably higher. The high production has caused storage problems on numerous farms.

I would advise the farmers to treat their corn for weevil and control rats and mice and sell at a later date when prices are more favorable.

Since there is an abundance of all farm feed crops, livestock and hog producers can expect more growth and better maintenance than normal.

I want to urge hog producers to sell their market animals as they reach the 200-215 pound weight since this hog brings the better price and cost less to produce.

Old Age Benefits Drawn With \$1200 Yearly Salary

Now you can earn up to \$1200 in a calendar year and not lose Old-Age or Survivors benefits according to Mrs. Mary King Temple, Manager of the Sheffield Social Security District Office. This new provision was included in the 1954 Amendments and is effective with the year 1955.

This change not only raises the amount of earnings permitted before loss of benefits occurs, but puts the wage earner on the same reporting basis as a self-employed beneficiary, Mrs. Temple said. Previously, the earnings of a wage earner were considered from month whereas not it is on an annual basis.

The new retirement test includes all earnings (net incomes) regardless of whether they are covered by social security.

The age beyond which the retirement test does not apply has been reduced from 75 to 72. In other words, after an individual attains age 72, he may accept his benefit checks regardless of the amount of his earnings.

Between the ages of 65 and 72, a beneficiary loses a month's check for each \$80.00 or fraction thereof he earns over the \$1200 limitation.

Mrs. Temple states that by these changes, Congress has greatly liberalized the retirement test which will result in allowing many individuals to continue to work on a part time basis and still receive their old-age benefits.

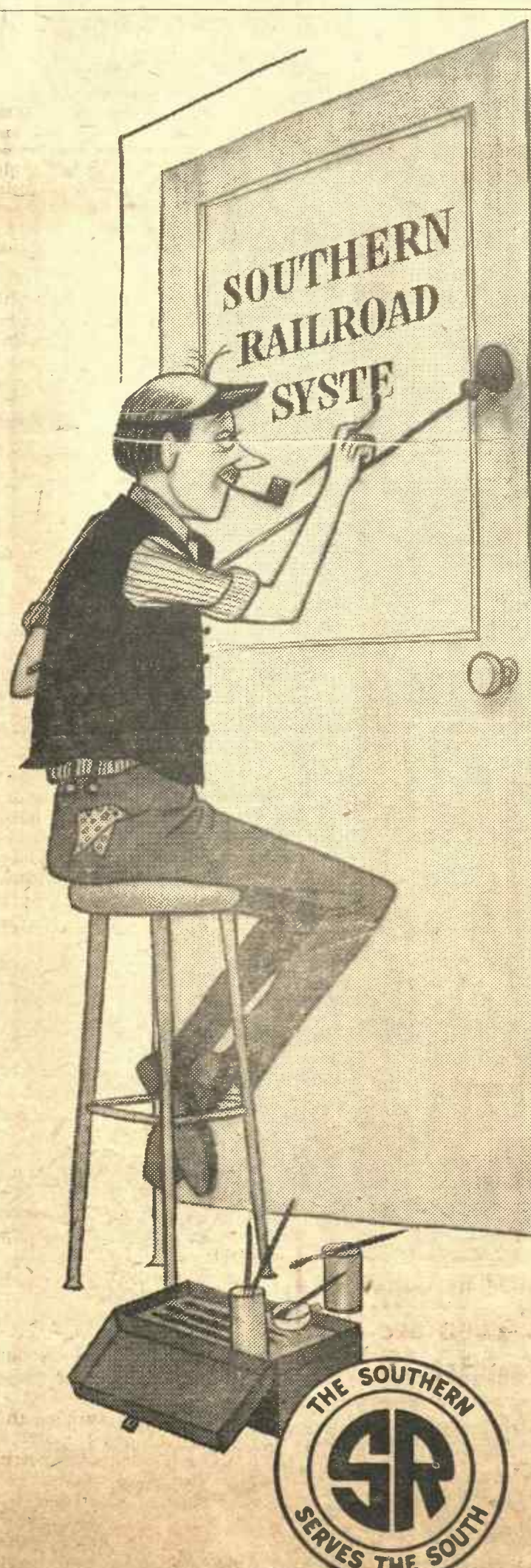

The Golden Rule

Lesson for November 13, 1955

LIVING is an art, not a science. Jesus did not come to give us a heavenly rule-book. On the other hand he did not live and die merely to provide us with tickets to heaven. For others, as for himself, he felt the tremendous importance, here and now, of this present life. He left behind him not rules but general broad principles for living in this world as sons and daughters of the Most High God. Jesus' principles were not the stuffy sort of thing that only philosophers can understand. His disciples, we know, were all men of limited education, the plainest of plain people. If Jesus had tried any theological gobbledygook on them, it would have gone clear over their heads. What he said could have carved on short tombstones, written on a postcard—any sentence of his teachings. The one the church has nicknamed the "Golden Rule"—short, sharp, and in Jesus' own view very important—is alone worth long study.

Luke's version of the Golden Rule (6:31) is clear enough: "As you wish that men would do to you, do so to them." Words of one syllable, but what words! It is saddening to see how many efforts have been made to by-pass this Golden Rule. One kind of by-passers will tell you this is much too hard. Some very religious people have fancied that Jesus did not mean this for here-and-now, but only for some "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere," sometime after Judgment Day. Other religious people have said that Jesus really meant to say, "You can't possibly do this,—don't you feel ashamed?" Now we can be sure of two things. One is, that Jesus was (to say the least of it) a man of common sense, an honest man.

And honest men do not deliberately tell their friends to do what they know is impossible. "It's Too Easy" An opposite way of by-passing the Golden Rule is to think it is too easy,—that it is just a nice-sounding bit of advice that is not only easy to do but which won't do much good. For example: a little girl cries for candy. The mother thinks: What would I want her to do for me? Why, I'd want her to do as I say. So I'll do as she says—give her the candy. (And make her sick, of course.) Or again: a wife's birthday is coming along. Husband thinks: What would I want for my birthday? New power saw, of course. So he gets his wife a power saw, which she certainly does not want. . . . No, the Golden Rule is not so easy as all that. It calls for imagination, for a wide vision, for a Christian spirit. It is indeed all too easy—for fools and knaves. But Jesus assumed that his friends were neither knaves nor fools. The Golden Rule is not something to save any one the trouble of thinking. It simply points out the direction in which our actions and decisions ought to go. It often means, not—What does this person want me to do, now? but—What will this person at last wish I had done for him? In other words, if we are to apply the Golden Rule we have to look at it in the light of eternity.

"It Won't Work" Another way of by-passing the Golden Rule is to say simply that it won't work. "It is a lovely ideal, the world would be much pleasanter to live in, for all of us, if we could live by it; but we can't, so let's get on with the practical business of dog-eat-dog, every man for himself and the devil take the hindmost." Again let us remember that if Jesus had not lived by his own rule, every listener would have known him for a hypocrite and the Golden Rule would have perished in a blast of cynical laughter. Well, who are today the leaders in the War of the 1860's who are most widely and gratefully remembered on both sides of what once was a battle line? Lincoln and Lee, beyond much doubt. And these are the two men who most undeniably loved their enemies. The Golden Rule, in a life devoted to God and man, will work.

Iuka Had 2% Increase In Money Orders Over 1954

Unadjusted data for the Corinth district showed an 8 per cent increase in business activity compared with either September 1954 or August 1955, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, Monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College. Without the seasonal adjustment

business activity in Corinth was up 8 per cent from a year earlier and the previous month.

Outside of Corinth were data incomplete. Iuka reported a 2 per cent increase in money orders issued while this indicator declined by 16 per cent in Ripley as compared to a year earlier. Postal receipts were down 15 per cent in Iuka and 10 per cent in Ripley by the same comparison. Telephones in service were more numerous by 5 per cent

in Booneville, 4 per cent in Iuka and 7 per cent in Ripley than a year earlier. General business activity was up 5 per cent in Booneville, down 2 per cent in Iuka and down 9 per cent in Ripley as compared with September 1954.

The seasonally adjusted general business activity index dropped sharply in Corinth during September. Starting the month at 149 per cent of the 1947-1949 average it fell to 115 at the end of September.

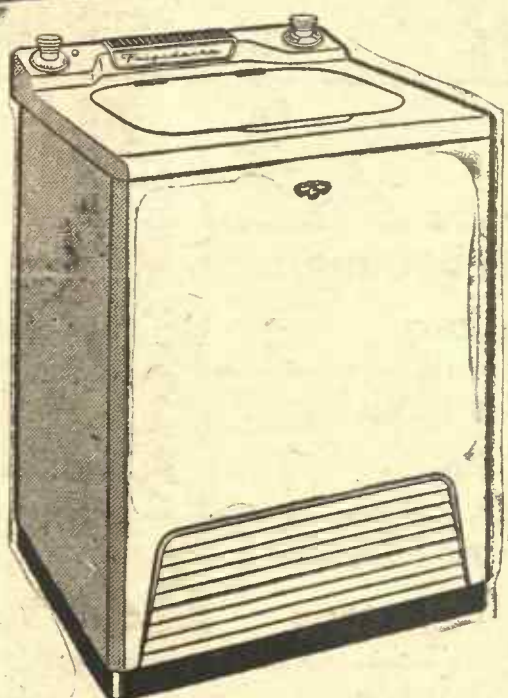

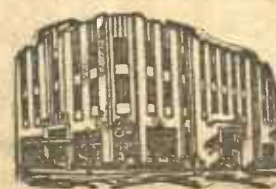

Since the government-supplied vaccine will be enough for only one-third of the children up to age 20, parents are urged to have private physicians to give the vac-cine now to their children. Polio vaccine is now available from the private physicians through com-mercial channels to all children from 1-14 years of age and pregnant women. Let us prevent polio crip-pling rather than having to treat it.

Since Tishomingo County's al-lotment of vaccine will be in prop-ortion to the number of request cards signed by parent, parents are urged to return them to the school as soon as possible.
