in 1955 to 2,000,000 bales of 500

previous years of record 1937, 48
and 1953, has Mississippi produced
over two million bales of cotton
acreage since 1871. Production in
1954 amounted to 1,571,000 bales
and the 10-year (1944-53) average
production for Mississippi is 1,693-
000 bales.

Deer Season Opens Monday

Open season for Deer hunting
in Tishomingo County will open
on Monday, November 21 and con-
tinue through Wednesday, Novem-
ber 23. Only Buck deer with an-
tlers over 4 inches long may be
taken. Any hunter killing a deer
must stop hunting immediately
and have his animal checked and
tagged at a checking station. Use
of rifles is prohibited. Shotguns
only with slug or shot may be
used for hunting.

Citizens Asked To Contribute To Iuka Highway Planting Program

The Iuka Highway planning pro-
gram explained in an article ap-
pearing in The Vidette two weeks
ago, if carried out as recommended
by the State Highway Department,
included planting trees along the
highway for a distance of about two
miles in every direction from the
intersection of new 25 and 72.

Trees such as magnolia, maple,
red bud, ginkgo and lilia will be
planted at 100-foot intervals where
the contour of the shoulders per-
mits. In other places pines and
multiflora roses will be used. The
sizes of the above ornamental trees
will make an impression the
first year they are planted and
within a few years Iuka will be
widely known as "that beautiful
town in northeastern Mississippi".

Not only will the present gener-
ation enjoy this addition to Iuka
but future generations will be ben-
efitted—provided we all get behind
this worthy undertaking and put
it over.

NOW THAT . . . Salk Polio Vaccine Is Available Here Is Some Information You Should Know

Now that Salk Polio Vaccine is
available from your own private
physician and from your county
health department you should
know the answers to the following
questions:

Will the vaccine prevent crippling?

The Salk polio vaccine prevents
at least 3 out of 4 cases of polio
crippling when properly used. Stud-
ies show that three injections aff-
ord much protection against par-
alysis for as long as two years.
Even one or two injections offer
considerable protection.

In 1954, there was 3 to 4 times
more paralysis among those not
vaccinated as among those who
received three injections of the
vaccine. Thus it can prevent 3 out
of 4 cases of paralysis.

Yes, fear and worry about polio
crutches, braces, wheel chairs, iron
lungs, expense, thwarted dreams
can be greatly reduced by vaccin-
ation with Salk vaccine.

Is The Vaccine Safe?

Over 180,000 shots of the vaccine
were given to Mississippi children
during the first six months of 1955.
The reactions following the vac-
cine were minor — even less than
from other commonly used vaccin-
es.

The Federal Government thor-
oughly tests every lot of vaccine

produced to be sure it is effective
and safe before it is released for
use.

When should the vaccine be given?

Now is the time to start the vac-
cine. To give greatest protection,
three injections of the vaccine
should be completed before the
summer upsurge of polio cases.

Who should be protected by vac- cine?

The age group most likely to
have polio is the 5 through 9 year
olds. Children in this age group
should be protected first.

Is there enough vaccine for every- body?

Not right now. Already a con-
siderable amount of vaccine is in
the hands of private physicians
through commercial channels. In
addition, the Federal Government
has appropriated money to supply
vaccine to the State Board of Heal-
th to assure extensive protection
against crippling polio. However,
the money allotted Mississippi is
enough to buy vaccine for only
about one-third of the children
19 years of age and under.

Since the quantity will be limited
for a while the vaccine will be avail-
able for the first grade through
the 9th grade to younger and old-
er children later.

Your private physician or your
county health department will tell
you who can get the vaccine at a
given time.

Where can you get the vaccine?

1. From your private physician,
or
2. From your health depart-
ment.

Ask your private physician to
protect your child. Your county
health department will vaccinate
any child for it who are in the
age group specified by your de-
partment. However, health depart-
ments have enough funds to pur-
chase vaccine for only about one-third
of the population 19 years of age
and younger in Mississippi. For
this reason, it is hoped thousands
will secure this vaccination from
private physicians on a strictly
private basis.

When will the health department give the vaccine?

The state and county health de-
partment have started an expanding
program of watch for notices of
clinic schedules. These will in-
form you as to time and place
of clinic and the age group to be
vaccinated.

Vaccine will be given only in the
presence of a parent or guardian
or when the parent or guardian
has requested it upon the proper
request form. Fill in your request
form as soon as you receive it and
return at once to your school or
health department.

One of the big occasions of the
Iuka school this year will be held
Monday night when the Iuka Lions
club will sponsor the annual Foot-
ball banquet for all the varsity
and Pee-Wee players. The banquet
is set for eight o'clock in the school
cafeteria.

Buster Poole, end coach for the
University of Mississippi Rebels
will be the guest speaker. Coach
Tony Grezaffi will act as master
of ceremonies. Among those to ap-
pear on the program will be C.
R. McCulley, president of the
Lions club, Jimmy Oaks, capt. of
the varsity football squad, Prof-
essor Shook, Rev. Carmon Savell,
and Coach Brison Mann.

During the evening Coaches Gre-
zaffi and Mann will present Jack-
ets to all members of the varsity
squad who lettered during the sea-
son just ended.

Among those attending the ban-
quet will be the varsity squad and
their dates or guests, the Pee-Wee
squad, faculty of the school, cheer-
leaders, Lions club members, foot-
ball queen and her court, local
ministers, and Bill Ross, sports
writer for the Tupelo Journal,

Grass Protects Holds And Builds Soil

For years it was thought that most erosion was caused by water flowing off the land. It was also thought that if water could be diverted and slowly drained from the land by terraces most water erosion could be stopped.

A few years ago research on the causes of erosion revealed that the flowing of water across land caused little washing. It was learned that the force of the raindrops beating on the soil surface dislodged soil particles that float away

in the water flowing off the land. Most of the erosion was caused by raindrops.

Land covered with a thick stand of grass as much as four inches high was protected from the raindrops and eroded very little, whereas tons of topsoil were swept away from similar land left bare. In this instance grass protects the land.

Grass also holds the land by thousands of roots crisscrossed through the first two feet. The grass roots literally ties the land down and holds it in place.

Another benefit derived from having land covered with grass is, that grass adds more organic matter to the soil than do most other crops. These decaying grass roots and decaying plant particles mobilize the mineral plant food elements in the soil thereby increasing its fertility.

Farmers who further reduce their cotton acres may find it advisable and profitable to seed down some of these diverted acres with

grass to protect, hold, and build their land.

The local Soil Conservation Service Technicians who work through the Soil Conservation District Commissioners will assist any interested farmer in selecting the proper grass to seed on his land.

Now is the time to plan how you will use your land next year. As for as your land is concerned, use it don't lose it.

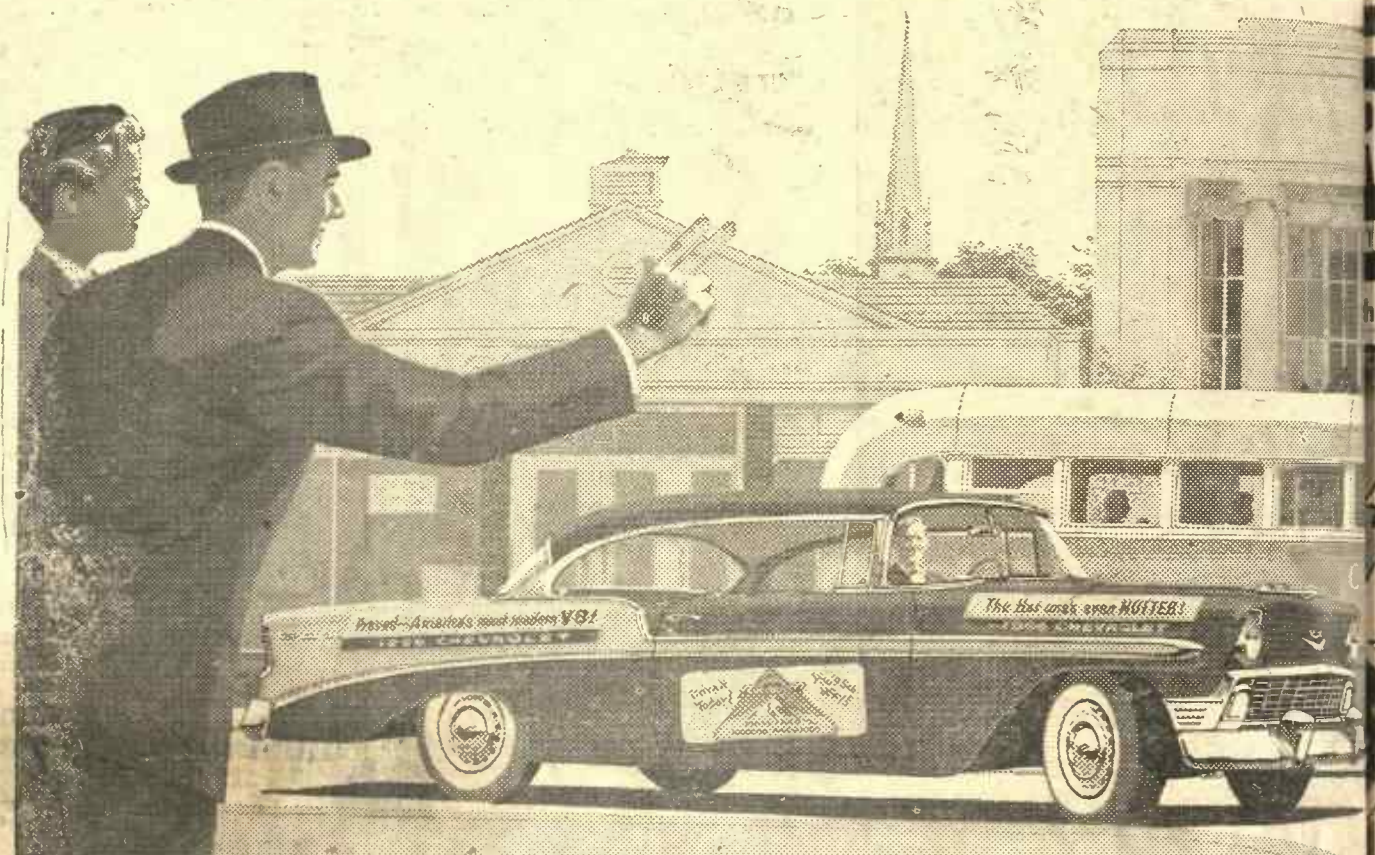

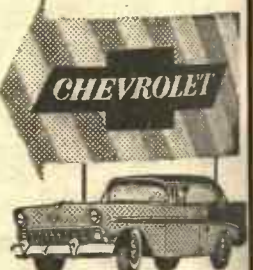

\$100 Income Of Farm Worker Must Be Reported

Do You Hire Farm Help?
Beginning January 1, 1955, if you pay a farm worker \$100 or more in cash wages in a calendar year, employer and employee taxes on these wages must be reported on a special Internal Revenue form and paid to the District Director of Internal Revenue.

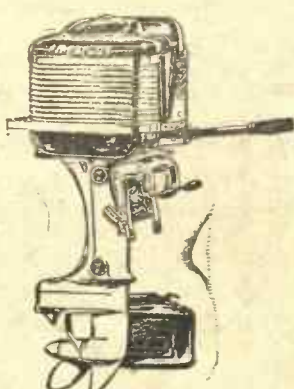
The Social security taxes are 2 per cent each for the employer and employee (a total of 4 per cent) on cash wages up to \$4,200 a year paid by the employer to each employee. The 2 percent employee tax should be deducted from the taxable wage payments.

It is important that you keep records of the name, social security account number as \$100 cash wages in a calendar year for agricultural labor.

If— You expect to pay a farm worker \$100 or more wages in 1955, and You have not been required in the past to file returns of Federal social security tax for farm employees, you should immediately get an application for an employer's identification number from your District Director of Internal Revenue or your social security district office.

After you file the application form the District Director will send you information about the social security taxes, and will put your name on his mailing list so that you will receive the necessary return forms.

Illegitimacy? What Are The Facts?

The records of the Welfare Department show that a large percentage of children receiving aid under our program are illegitimate. On the surface this looks awful, and many people firmly believe that we are subsidizing illegitimacy.

These are the facts:

Not more than 20% of the Negroes are married. Many of them have marriage licenses but due to the fact that one or the other had been married before and had

failed to get a divorce, they are not legally married. When you pass a house and see a Negro man and woman living there with a house full of children you take it for granted that they are legally married, for if they were white that would be true. If the man leaves and the woman comes to us for help for the children we search the records and if they do not have a marriage license or did not get a divorce from a prior marriage (which practically none do) we have to list the children as illegitimate. If you will pick out ten Negro families and check the records, you will find that not over two of them are actually legitimately married. According to the census our Aid to Dependent Children's program has a smaller percentage of illegitimates than the general population. The only trouble is that we have to get all the facts and in the general population we accept people's marital status on appearances, and do not check the records in the chancery clerk's and circuit clerk's office before accepting the children as legitimate.

To be sure, some of them are born of promiscuous women, and the woman should be the one to be punished. We do not give any money to the mother for herself—supposedly the money is for the children. The question is: Is it fair to starve little children because we do not approve of their mother's pattern of living? They did not ask to be born to such a mother. They get just as hungry, just as cold as other children whose mothers conform to the moral standards.

There are three things, and only three things, that we can do after these children are born. First, we could allow them to starve to death; second, we could force them to steal to live, and spend more money trying, convicting, and taking care of them in jails and penitentiaries; third, we can feed them

for a little while and help them grow up into good citizens. In a Christian society, we cannot allow little children to starve. Certainly, we should not force them to steal. The most the third alternative can cost the State is \$3.00 per month for the first child, \$2.00 for the second child, and \$1.00 for the third and all others under our present program.

Can we afford to make criminals out of many of these children by forcing them to steal in order to live when, by investing the above amounts over an average period of three years (which is the average time we feed a child), we can help them to grow up to be law-abiding citizens?

These children are here. We cannot wave a magic wand and say, "Abba, Cadaba" disappear. They are still here. We have the privilege of helping them by investing a small amount of money, or of forcing them to steal by refusing to help them. This is not a moral issue. The mother's conduct is the moral issue. The feeding of innocent children is our Christian duty, even though they were so unfortunate as to be born to an immoral mother. If we must punish, let us punish the mother, not deny food to the innocent children.

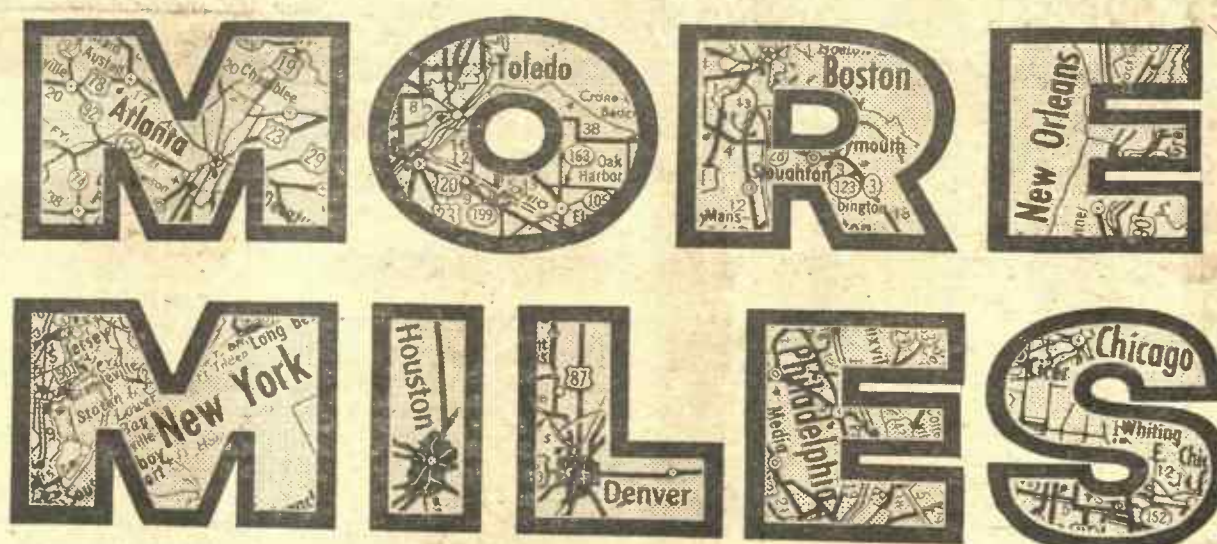

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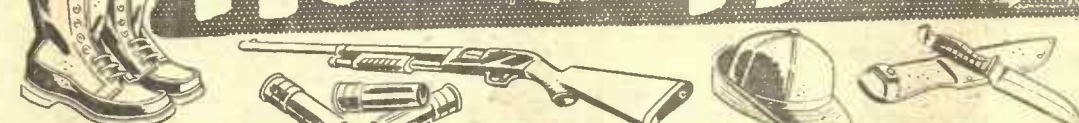
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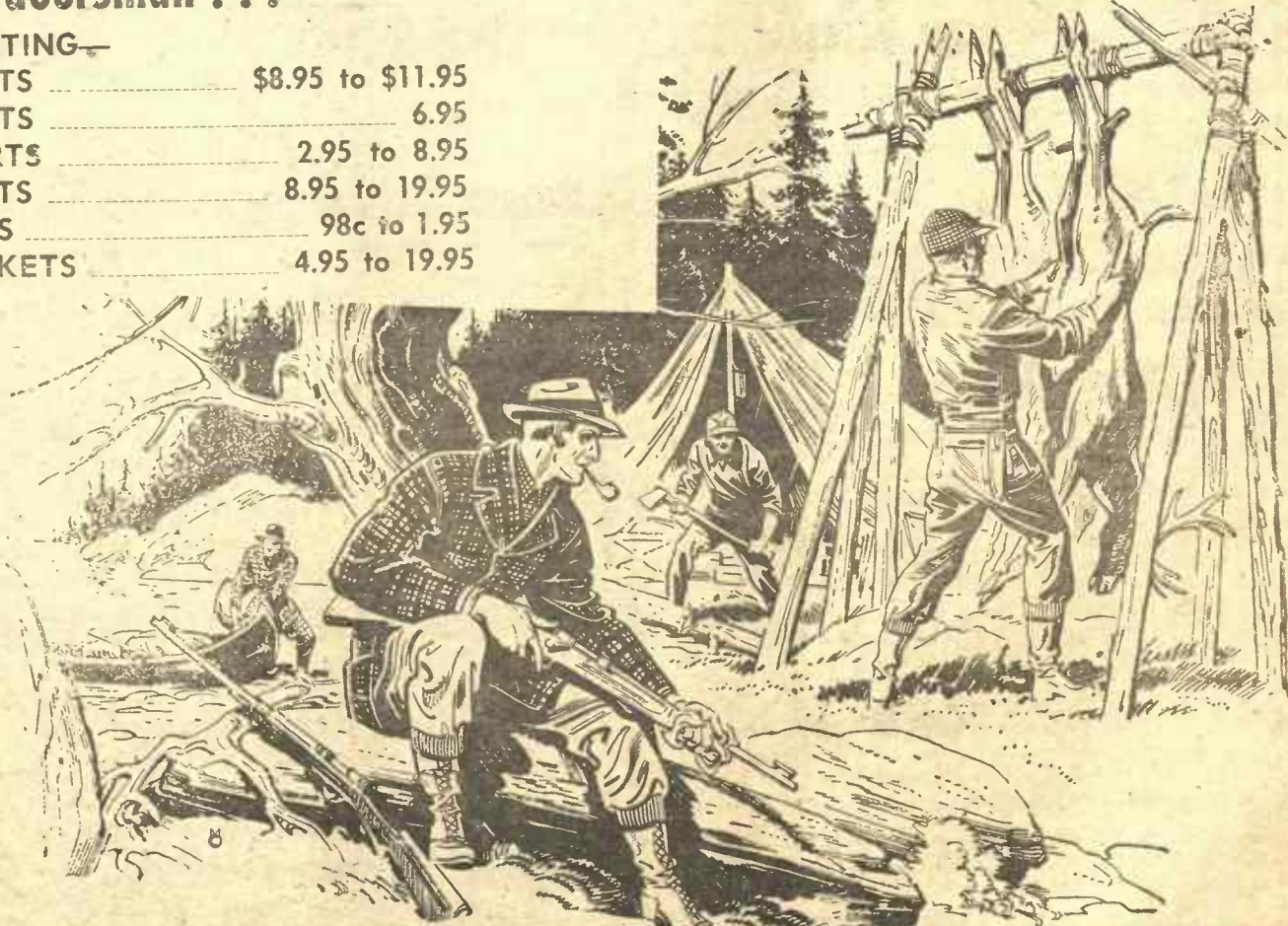

Powers of God

Lesson for November 20, 1955

JESUS no doubt did many ordinary things, such as paying his bills and eating his breakfast. It may well be that he "never did an ordinary thing in an ordinary way." (How would he pay you what he owed for lumber for his carpenter shop? How would he be as a breakfast companion?) But it is also true by all the records that he did some extraordinary things, so extraordinary in fact that no one word could quite describe them. The Gospel writers, all of whom of course used Greek, used Dr. Foreman sometimes a word meaning "sign," sometimes one meaning "wonder, miracle," and sometimes one that means "power." The same Greek words is translated in different ways. For example: the Greek word "dynamis" (power) is translated in the old King James version "power" in Luke 5:17, "virtue" in 6:19, "mighty works" in 10:13, "miracles" in Acts 2:22.

No Show-off

You can get into all kinds of stupid and endless arguments over the "miracles" of the New Testament. They are not always labeled as such, or labeled with any word. The Gospels will just tell what Jesus did, and let the reader draw his own conclusions. What they all agree on is that Jesus performed acts of power which no one else could match. He did these things as naturally as you would pick a blackberry—as naturally but perhaps not so easily. As he himself expressed it, he could perceive "power" going out of him. (Luke 8:46, R.S.V.) However hard it may be to understand Jesus' miracles, we can confidently say three things about them. One is that he did not do them "just to be doing them." They were never aimless, or at random. Further, they never had the aim of showing off. To the end of his days Jesus was beset by demands from the Pharisees and others, to show a "sign from heaven." One of his early temptations was to cast himself down from a pinnacle of the Temple and expect God to protect him from the fall. But he did not yield to that temptation.

Never Too Much

Another striking fact about his miracles is that he never wasted power. He never did what others could do. When he fed the five thousand, he got the people to sit down in orderly fashion and got his disciples to help distribute the food. One would suppose it would have been just as easy for him to arrange for every person present to find a loaf and a fish suddenly in his hand; but Jesus did not work that way. Or again, after the tremendous miracle of restoring to life the little daughter of Jairus, Jesus—instead of producing lunch for her herself by a miracle—gives orders to the family to get the little girl something to eat. When he healed the paralytic, he told him to pick up his pallet and go home.

He Went About Doing Good

Simon Peter, who was far more impressed by Jesus' miracles than by what he said, summed up a great deal when he said that Jesus, endowed with divine power, "went about doing good." (Acts 10:38.) Our Lord's acts of power were always done for the help of other persons. This is the great distinction between Christ's miracles and those done, or allegedly done, by magic. Your typical magic-worker makes a doll and sticks pins in it, hoping by this means to inflict pain or death on some one. Whether or not magic is anything real, magic is malicious by intention. Jesus' miracles on the contrary were never malicious, but the exact opposite—they were acts of goodness and generous help. Jesus never called up genies out of bottles, he never created fire-breathing dragons, he never produced potions of love or death. All his miracles simply restored health, life, strength, gave food to the hungry, eyes to the blind . . . yes, and good news to the poor. For in listing for John the Baptist's benefit the acts of power he was doing, he names as climax not the raising of the dead, but the coming of good news to the poor. That is a miracle we still too seldom see!

John H. Allen reminds citizens of the county this week of the high cost they are paying the ravages of tuberculosis. Claiming November 16 through December 31 Christmas Seal Sale, he declares that the work of the Tishomingo County Tuberculosis Association aimed at preventing the spread of tuberculosis and bringing an end to the economic and personal tragedy caused by the disease.

Cost of TB in Tishomingo cannot be accurately estimated, however, public health statistics indicate that each case of tuberculosis costs the taxpayers over \$15. This figure does not include the cost of income nor the inestimable cost in suffering and hardship to patients and their families.

Christmas Seal funds could not be used near paying for the treatment of the TB patient in this county," he explained. Contributions to the tuberculosis association are spent to prevent TB. Used to teach people how to live well, to find the unknown TB, to help patients return to normal, happy lives, and to support medical research, our Christmas Seal dollars will speed the day when TB will no longer take toll in the homes of our community.

Urging every citizen to contribute generously to the Christmas Seal Sale, he pointed out that 94 cents of every dollar raised will be used to fight tuberculosis in this community and this state.

Are you guilty??? Are you one of those homemakers who helps bring about the figure of 2/3's of a pound of food per person going into garbage cans each day?

This is the amount that the U. S. Department of Agriculture figures is wasted for each person each day. As you make your shopping list, do you first check your refrigerator for bits of this and that you can put to some good use? It will result in a saving.

Home-Grown Fruit

Don't be discouraged by the loss of fruit we had this spring from cold damage. Home-grown fruits can mean a lot to your family in delicious and nutritious foods and to your food budget in reduced food costs.

Now is the time to order your fruit trees for planting a new orchard or adding to your fruit plantings.

November and December are the best times to set out peaches, apples, plums, pears, pecans and grapes. Be sure to plant the varieties that are recommended for our climate.

Check at your home agent or county agent's office for a list of the recommended varieties.

Handy Tongs

Do you have kitchen tongs in your kitchen tool drawer? If you don't you just don't know what a handy device you've been getting by without. And you'll find they aren't expensive.

They are handy for lifting eggs from boiling water, potatoes from the oven, and link sausage from the frying pan. And you will find numerous other uses.

Regarding the sausages, one of the pork products on the plentiful foods list this month, use your tongs to turn the links. They help you keep from spoiling the appearance or letting out the juice as the old trusty fork has a way of doing.

3 cups cooked, mashed sweet potatoes
1 cup applesauce
18 marshmallows

Cook sweetpotatoes in jackets until tender; peel and mash, adding salt and butter to taste. Add applesauce and mix well. Spread half of the mixture in a buttered baking dish; dot with marshmallows and top with the remaining half of the apple-sweetpotato mixture. Place in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) and bake for 20 minutes.

You will need 2 pounds of fresh sweetpotatoes to make 3 cups of mashed sweetpotatoes.

Kitchen Fire Prevention

Every homemaker must be constantly on the alert to keep her house and particularly her kitchen fire-safe.

On the list of things she must watch against are overloading wiring by plugging in too many appliances on one circuit and leaving range or heaters on when she's not keeping a close check on them. She must check against short circuits and have frayed wires repaired promptly.

Curtains and dish towels must hang far enough from range or heater so a breeze won't blow them into the flame or against high heat. This would be true also of clothes dried in the house on wet winter days.

Turkey For Thanksgiving In The American Tradition

Thanksgiving Day brings our feast of purely American origin. For this reason it is a day set apart a day with special meaning.

On the first Thanksgiving in 1621 fifty Pilgrims and ninety Indians set the tone of our present holiday. They gave praise and Thanksgiving to God for mercies of the past year. But they were merry, too, with feasting and games.

Today's Thanksgiving feast centers on turkey, the noble bird that served so well on that first holiday. Though our domestic turkeys are only cousins of the wild turkeys used on that day, they come from the American continent. They are descended from the Mexican species tamed by the Aztecs, carried home by Spanish conquerors, and reimported to the United States

from Europe.

Using turkey as your main dish, you can spread a sumptuous feast with only the kinds of food that the Indians knew and taught the white man how to raise and use. Turkey, cranberries, both white and sweet potatoes, numerous kinds of beans, squash, pumpkin, tapioca, cocoa and chocolate, oysters, pineapple, peanuts, brazil nuts, and cashew nuts, all are of strictly American origin.

On that first Thanksgiving Day, turkeys were cooked over an open fire. Today their preparation is easier.

Here is a good way to get your turkey ready for roasting. Clean turkey of pinfeathers. Singe it and remove neck, giblets, and excess fat for use in stock for gravy. Rub it inside with salt, allowing 1/8 teaspoon for each pound.

With the tips of the fingers raise the skin carefully from the breast. Place a layer of rich dressing under the skin, being careful not to break it. Fasten neck skin to back with skewer. Stuff cavity loosely and truss.

Rub entire surface of bird with melted butter or margarine. Place

on a rack in a shallow pan and roast uncovered at 300 degrees F. 20 to 30 minutes a pound, depending the size and age of the turkey. Or, if you prefer, wrap the turkey snugly in aluminum foil. Place the wrapped turkey, breast up, in the bottom of a shallow pan. Cook to within 30 to 45 minutes of roasting time. Then fold foil away from bird and continue cooking until a golden brown.

If you have stuffing left after turkey is stuffed, it may be baked in a pan during the last hour you are roasting your turkey. Beste this dressing occasionally to give it a richer flavor.

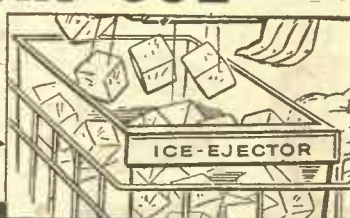
