Cotton Growers To Vote On Dec. 13 In Referendum

Cotton growers have an important decision to make Tuesday, December 13, Mack Sanders, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds farmers.

On that day, growers will vote in a referendum to decide whether marketing quotas will be in effect for their 1956 upland cotton crop.

"If at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve the quotas," Mr. Sanders explains, "Marketing quotas will be in effect on all farms growing upland cotton in 1956, penalties will apply on 'excess' cotton, and price supports to those growers who comply with their cotton acreage allotments will be available at the full level of effective supports. Under current legislation, this support will be between 75 and 90 percent of parity, the level depending upon the supply situation at the time of determination is made.

"If more than one-third of the growers disapprove quotas, there will be no marketing quotas or penalties, but price supports to eligible growers (who comply with their allotments) will be available at 50 percent of parity.

"In either case, acreage allotments will continue in effect for the 1956 cotton crop" Mr. Sanders concluded.

The Chairman pointed out that the Secretary of Agriculture is directed to proclaim marketing quotas for the next upland cotton crop when the cotton supply exceeds normal. Quotas are not put into operation, however, unless they are approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in a national referendum on the question.

All farmers who produced cotton in 1955 are eligible to vote in the referendum.

Game Wardens Buster Marlar, E. C. Hollins and Sixty Yarbber report that only one deer was killed in Tishomingo county during the three-day open season first part of this week.

Lucky hunter to get his deer was Claud Jones of Golden. Mr. Jones killed his deer on Bear Creek east of Belmont and Golden. It was an eight-point buck and weighed 135 pounds. He made the kill about 11 o'clock Monday morning.

The game wardens also report that a number of other hunters saw deer close enough to get shots—but missed. Among these hunters were Gerald Monroe of Corinth, Will Hamblin of Corinth, J. E. Hudson, Iuka, Billy Grisham, Iuka, and Jesse Meeks, Iuka.

Pork has been at the top of the shopper's list of plentiful foods all during November and will continue there during December.

Food stores, too, are well supplied with apples at this time of year.

Why not combine the two "plentiful" and all-time favorites, too, into a tasty dish of Roast Pork Spareribs and Apple Stuffing.

You will need 2 well fleshed rib sections that match (about 2 pounds each.) Have the breastbone sawed or cracked so that it will be easy to carve between the ribs.

Spread apple stuffing on one section that has been laid out flat and sprinkled with salt and pepper. Cover with the other section of ribs and sew the two sections together.

Sprinkle the outside with salt and pepper, and if desired sprinkle with flour. Lay the stuffed ribs on a rack in a shallow pan. Do not add water and do not cover.

Cook in a moderate oven of about 350 to 375 degrees until meat is tender and thoroughly

done. Allow about 1-1/2 hours. Turn occasionally for even cooking. Remove strings before serving, and for a gravy use the pan drippings.

Apple Stuffing

1/2 cup chopped celery and leaves
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped parsley
2 to 3 tablespoons fat
5 tart apples, diced
1/2 cup sugar

1 cup soft bread crumbs
Salt and pepper to taste

Cook the celery, onion and parsley for a few minutes in one-half of the fat, then remove them from the pan. Put the rest of the fat in the pan, heat and add the diced apples. Sprinkle the apples with sugar, cover and cook until tender.

Then remove the lid and continue to cook until apples are candied. Mix the vegetables, salt and pepper with the apples and bread crumbs.

Danger of Aspirin Poisoning.

Drugs are responsible for a third of the poisonings that cause deaths among pre-school age children, and aspirin is one of the leading drugs that cause these poisonings.

We all look on aspirin as a harmless, but commonly used drug, and often leave it where small children can reach it.

Let's be more careful and put the aspirin bottle in a safe place out of reach of small children.

We need to be particularly careful where we leave the attractively flavored children's aspirin. If it's left where they can reach it, they might mistake it for candy and be poisoned by an overdose.

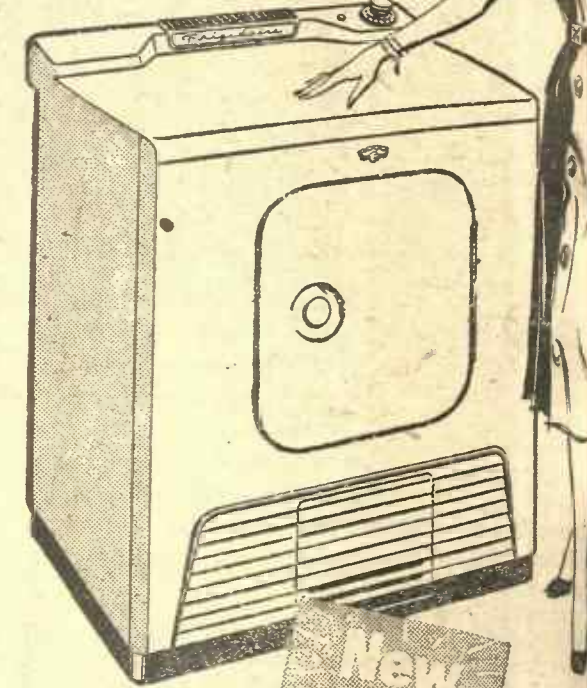
Cricket Problem

But if you find them around where they are a pest, try a 2% chlordane spray to destroy those that enter the house. A 5% chlordane or 10% DDT dust can be applied around foundation, baseboards or door footing to stop

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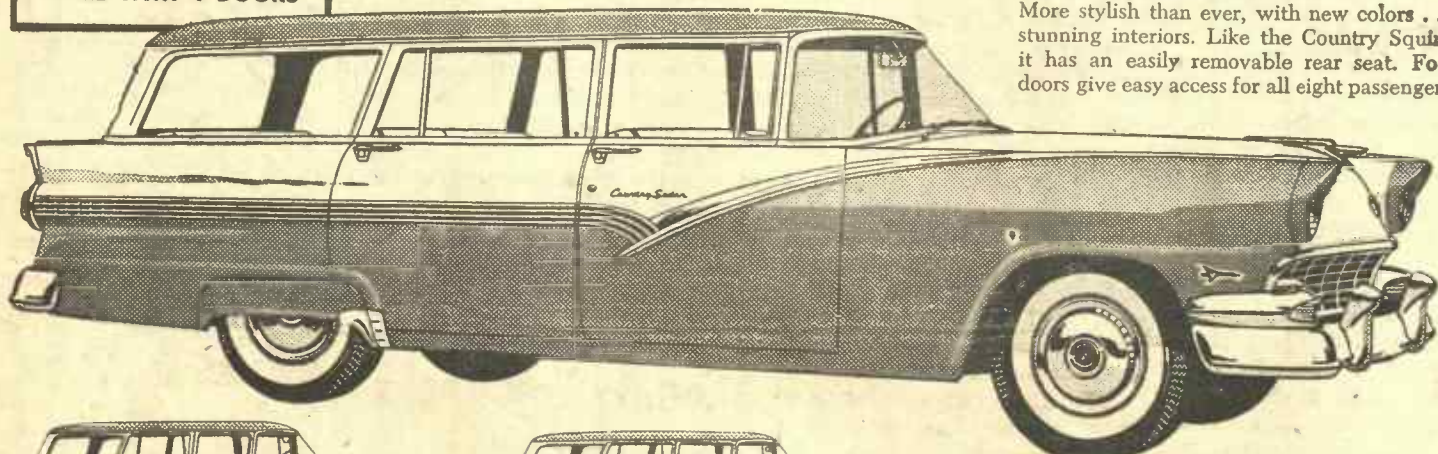

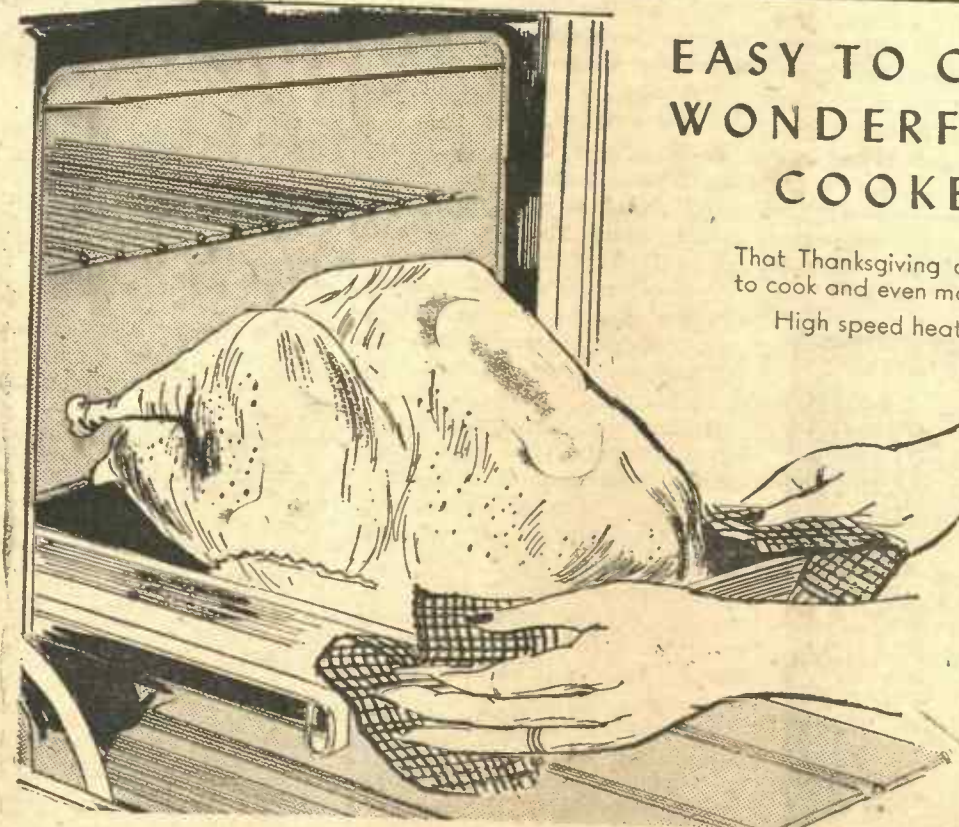
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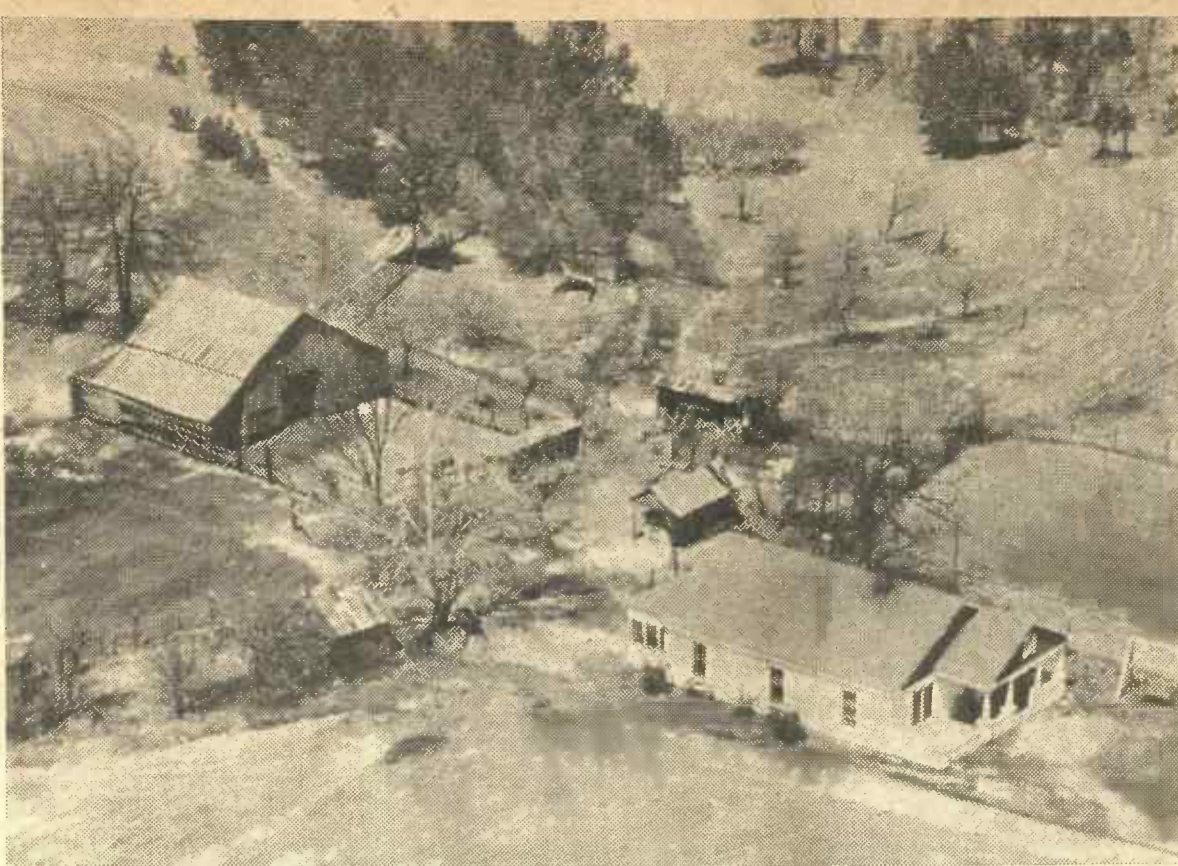

Sorghum Artists Are Guests At Lucy We Club Meeting; Paintings Shown

and Mrs. C. C. Gaiser of paintings was of two groups of birds. "These were taken from calendars given me by my good friend, W. H. Fairless of Tishomingo," Dr. Gaiser said. Two pencil drawings, a sorghum mill and a lime kiln located near Margerum were among the group and a most outstanding drawing done in pen and ink of the Margerum depot caught everyone's fancy. Both individual and group paintings on wood done by Mrs. Gaiser were displayed.

The artist began his discussion by naming the basic colors and then pointing out the difference in warm and cool colors and giving additional information on how colors might be mixed to obtain various shades. Naming over the essential items used by an artist, Dr. Gaiser discussed each and told what it was used for. At this point he stressed the importance of selecting only the best materials

so as to make the finished product as permanent as possible. It was interesting to examine 2 of the paintings that were done on canvas. These had been tacked on stretcher frames. In each corner of the frame were tiny pieces of

wood or pegs that could be driven down in order to tighten the canvas in case it became loose.

Dr. Gaiser pointed out the first steps an artist takes to get his picture or scene sketched. According to Dr. Gaiser, an artist stands back quite some distance from the scene he wishes to sketch and by holding up his pencil measures each object by sliding his thumb down on the pencil and then marks the width and depth it will take for the object on the canvas or material he is using for the painting.

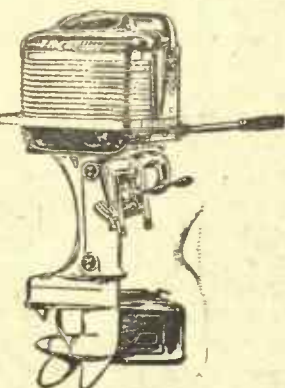

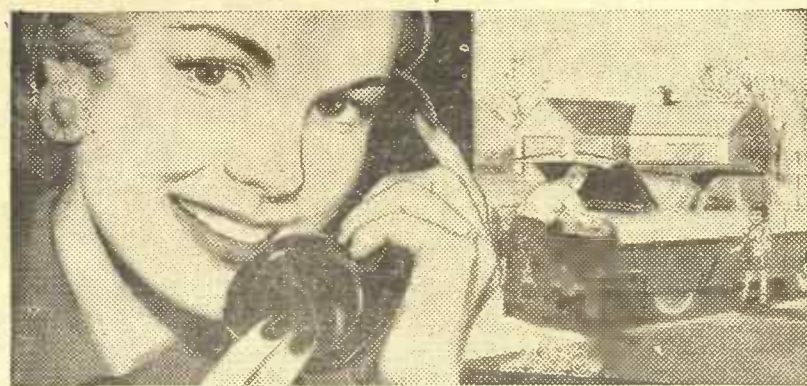

The Good News

Lesson for November 27, 1955

THERE is no such thing as the Christian religion, except in human beings. There is no such thing as the growth of Christianity, unless it grows in people. So how does Christianity spread? Only by one way: people who are Christians must win people who are not Christians. People who know Jesus Christ must introduce other people to him. The church has a word for this: it is called Evangelism. Anybody who thinks he doesn't believe in evangelism is really saying that he doesn't care whether there are any new Christians or not. He is saying (though perhaps without realizing it) that what he calls his "faith" is not worth talking about, or recommending to any one else.

Preaching and Bringing—

Our rather technical word "Gospel" means simply "Good News." That is what it is called in the New Testament. Not good advice, or good answers to philosophers' riddles; just good news—about God, about Jesus, about destiny. Luke gives us some interesting and valuable hints about how this Good News was broadcast in Jesus' own time and by his direction. One is in three words (Luke 8:1): Jesus came "preaching and bringing" the good news of the kingdom of God. The Gospel is not something just for talk. A tape-recorder can give out a sermon; but a tape-recorder cannot be a preacher of the Gospel. A minister who preaches on Sunday and disappears the rest of the week (if such there be) may be preaching the Gospel but he is not bringing it. Jesus lived by what he preached. The good news can be told by a clever tongue; but it can be brought only by a consecrated life. What would be thought of a grocery store

where, if you went in, you would see only empty shelves, and a flock of clerks who would button-hole you and tell you all about the wonderful groceries—that aren't there! And what can one think of a church where all you can find out about the love of God is just talk, and nobody brings the Gospel? The Gospel can't be brought in a little parcel you can tuck under your arm like a prayer-book. It has to be brought in a man-sized package, a live sample. After a few months you can buy a "demonstrator" car or tractor cheap; but a "demonstrator" Christian is beyond price.

You would think that if we could only get Jesus Christ in person, as he was in Galilee, into our church, we could convert everybody. Well, he didn't. No one ever brought or preached the Gospel better than he; but he did not meet with 100% success. He gave a reason for this that any farmer or gardener can understand. Preaching the Gospel is like sowing seed, he said. Sometimes when you look at two fields you may find it hard to believe that the same seed was sown in both; but so it was. The difference is in the soils. In Hutchinson, Kansas, there is a grain elevator with a capacity of ten million bushels of wheat. Every bushel in the hundreds of bins can be traced back to the area where it grew. On the wall in the testing-laboratory of that elevator there is a map of Kansas, county by county; and the kind of wheat each county is producing, this year, is marked there. The same seed wheat, in different counties or in different parts of the same county, may have different protein content or vary in number of bushels to the acre. So some people are better Gospel-soil than others.

To Preach and to Heal

When Jesus sent out his disciples to preach, he sent them to heal too. Health is the church's business. Whatever affects man's health of body, mind or soul, that is the church's affair. When she preaches and brings the Gospel, she has no right to say, "What we preach is only for your soul." The good news about God has transformed whole communities, it has changed the world for women, for children, for slaves, for down-trodden minorities. A gospel which is only for souls is not the Gospel Jesus preached and brought.

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City Agent news

Mississippi State Agricultural Extension Hogs
invades your herd of hogs, in for serious trouble. Hogs may be extra susceptible to influenza because of changeable weather at year. Adequate housing and proper ventilation will help prevent outbreaks of your herd.
Hog influenza is not a killer, it takes a great toll as it lowers feed efficiency, causes losses of weight and fertility. Outlined below are steps to help prevent outbreaks of swine influenza in your

1. Provide well-bedded, well-ventilated and draft-free quarters. Avoid overcrowding and night piling.
 2. Watch for signs of influenza like listlessness, coughing, watery eyes, loss of appetite and difficult breathing.
 3. Isolate newly purchased pigs for at least two weeks before allowing them to mingle with the home herd.
 4. In the event symptoms show up, start proper treatment immediately with penicillin, auromycin or sulfas.
- Peach Trees**
Peach trees set in December seem to fare better than those planted at other times during the dormant season. Early winter planting gives young trees a head start at making root growth and getting a firm footing in the soil. December planted trees are ready to make rapid growth when spring comes.

Then they are in better shape to withstand summer and early fall drouths.
Ground should be prepared before the nursery seedlings arrive. Holes should be deep and large enough to hold the roots without bending them. Trees should be set without delay.
Order your nursery stock now while the good quality plants are still available. Make sure that you order adapted varieties. June-buds or one year trees are the best type of stock to use. Plants should be two to three feet tall and about one-half inch in diameter. Your County Agent has a list of available fruit varieties that are adapted to Tishomingo County.
Dairying
Dairymen who feed concentrates by the "guess" method, usually find themselves going in the hole. In most instances, when they change

to a method of accurate records and feed according to production, they find a great savings in grain concentrates.
An important step in feeding is to make use of all the good roughage the cows can eat.

D. C. Daugherty's Triple-Purpose Pond

By Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Conservationist
"I'm well pleased with my pond Mr. Jones," commented Mr. Daugherty of Snowdown community.
"I want you to notice how it catches and holds the water off the little valley below the dam," he continued as we walked down the hill toward it.
I observed that Mr. R. C. Tice of the USDA Soil Conservation Service had done an excellent job of location and layout. A thick bermuda sod protected the dam from erosion, and I wished that every pond dam in the county had such a good cover.
Here was a pond this landowner had constructed using ASC assistance and soil conservation service technical help. Too, the farmer had done his part in sodding the dam.
This pond supplies water for livestock, it provides fish for the family and it prevents the flooding of the land directly below the pond. To be sure when the pond is full water flows out of the spillway, but during most of the year this pond is not completely full and catches and holds most of the water flowing into it.
The three main purposes of this pond are: flood prevention, livestock water and to provide fish for the farm family. These are easily recognized, but there is still another benefit the landowner could receive, he could plant a small fall garden below the dam and irrigate it.
This is just one among the hundreds of ponds the USDA Soil

Conservation Service Technicians have assisted farmers of Tishomingo County to establish. All furnish water for livestock and fish for the farm family, but this pond of Mr. Daugherty's has the triple-purpose of supplying water for livestock, fish for the family and prevention of flood damage.
The moral of this story is, make your pond serve as many purposes as you can by doing so you will get the most for the money you spend in constructing it.

A New Taste Treat With Leftover Turkey
If you are wondering how to dispose of your left over turkey after Thanksgiving, here are a couple of recipes to the rescue. Either turkey Brunswick stew or turkey creole is a good camouflage for that bit of leftover turkey.
Ingredients for the Brunswick stew are 2 cups turkey broth; 1 cup canned tomatoes; 1 (No. 2) can, or 2½ cups fresh lima beans; 1 medium onion, chopped; 2 cups

coarsely chopped cooked turkey; ¼ teaspoon ginger; and salt and pepper.
Combine all ingredients in a three or four quart kettle. Heat to boiling, then reduce heat to simmering. Continue cooking till stew is quite thick, about one hour. Stir occasionally. Season to taste, and serve with crackers, toast, or assorted breads. Yields about 6 large servings.
For the turkey creole, you will need 2 cups turkey broth; 2½ cups tomatoes; ¼ cup chopped green pepper; ½ cup chopped onion; ½ cup chopped celery; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon sugar; 1 small tip bay leaf; 2/3 cup uncooked rice; and 2 cups diced cooked turkey.
Combine all ingredients in saucepan. Bring to vigorous boil, and lower heat. Cover and simmer till the rice is tender and most of the liquid is absorbed, about twenty minutes. If necessary, uncover and cook several minutes longer to dry off rice. Remove bay leaf and serve piping hot. About 6 servings.
May this Thanksgiving be a happy one with lots of good food and a very, very grateful heart.

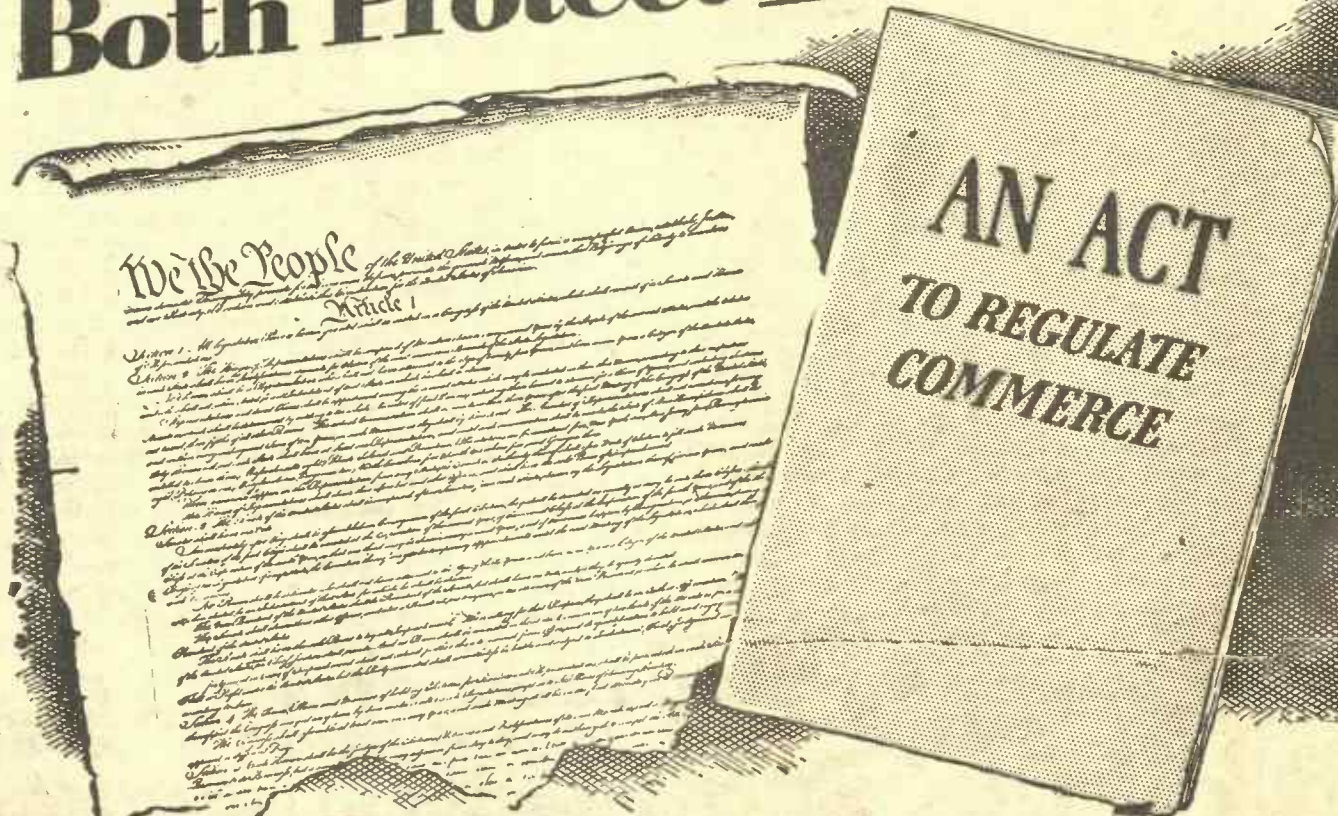

Often he would rush into the house to show his family the first spring flower he had found somewhere beside the road on his rounds or stand spellbound as he watched the beauty of the sunset. It was his pleasure in his rare moments of leisure to read and in reading record in his own handwriting passages gathered here and there and valued by him for the purpose of self-improvement. He deeply loved his family and made the most of the time he could devote to them. Unfailingly, with the family seated at the table, he began each day with a Bible passage, something from The Upper Room and a prayer.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this committee on behalf of the pastor, the board of stewards and the entire membership of the Iuka Methodist Church, express to the family of Dr. A. E. Bostick their sincere appreciation for his good works with an awareness that his influence for the good will live on through the years. His life - as he lived it - is a benediction to us all.
