December Plentiful Foods

Everybody likes a bargain, don't they?

As you look around, you will probably find pork on the bargain lists at your grocery stores during the coming month, as it is continuing on the U. S. Department of Agriculture's plentiful foods list during December. Watch for "specials" such as holiday hams, sausage and other pork items.

Also in plenty to fill your meat platters will be beef, especially higher-grade beef; turkeys and broilers and fryers.

As you plan your food buying for December maybe you will want to choose beef and broilers for the first part of the month and alternate them with ham and turkey during the holidays.

Both sweetpotatoes and Irish potatoes are plentiful. Fruits in

abundance include grapefruit, cranberries, California's table grapes and dates and winter pears from the West Coast.

Dairy products will continue plentiful. Two worth noting for home-made cakes and confections for the holidays are evaporated milk and butter. There'll be lots of lard for December pies and pastries; also vegetable fats and oils.

The fish being on grocery shelves will be tuna.

Big Birds

The big size is the economy size in holiday turkey, if price per pound is the consideration. Generally 16 to 20 pounders, ready-to-cook weight, sell for less per pound than the small birds.

The big bird is the buy not only for serving a crowd but also for a handy supply of cooked turkey meat in the freezer for guests or quick family meals.

For freezing strip meat from the bone and remove the stuffing promptly after the holiday dinner. Package stuffing and meat separately in freezer containers or wrappings of convenient size. Turkey broth made from bones also may be kept in the freezer.

Care of House Plants

When the winds howl, the skies are gray and the limbs of trees bare, something green growing in the house adds lots to the cheeriness of a room. Some of the favorites for pot plants are African violet, geranium, Boston fern, begonias, coleus and bulbs.

But whatever your choice, remember, pot plants must be grown in a cool room. They thrive best in a room where the temperature is between 55 and 70 degrees.

It is impossible to get too much evaporated moisture in the air for the well being of pot plants. Often it is hard to get plants to grow well in gas heated homes. The unburned fumes from inefficient burners or burners turned too high kill many kinds of pot plants. It takes less unburned gas to effect a plant than it does a person.

The morning sun is the most beneficial for plant growth. During the winter pot plants need as much

exposure to sunlight as they can get so that they may manufacture as much food as possible. The east window has the advantage of the morning sun; the southern window the longest exposure.

Water thoroughly when the soil on the surface crumbles between the fingers, or the pot rings when you strike it. Usually one thorough watering a day is enough—often that is too frequent.

\$70,000 Library Will Be Erected At Blue Mountain

President Lawrence T. Lowrey announces that a library building will be erected at Blue Mountain College at a cost of \$70,000 as soon as the plans are submitted and approved. It probably will be ready for use at the beginning of the 1956 session next September.

The building will be located near Whitfield Residence Hall where the tennis court now is, and it will house 40,000 volumes in addition to other library facilities.

Money for the erection of this building is in hand, having been given by Baptists of Mississippi through the Baptist Co-Operative Program.

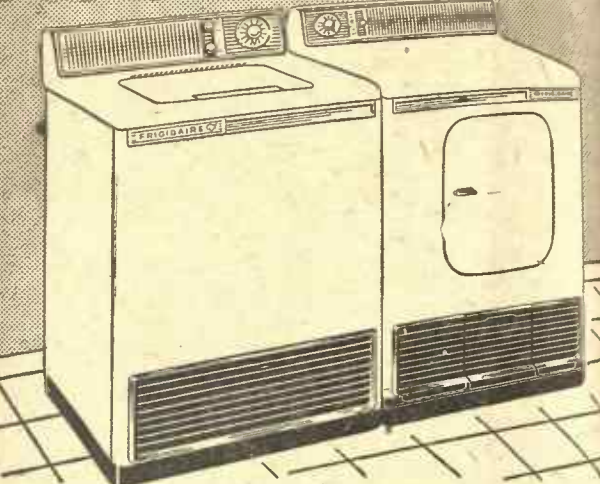

The History Of The Esport Baptist Church

The Esport Baptist Church was organized September 30, 1908, with 10 charter members, five coming from the New Salem membership. Of these eight members are still living but only two remain members of this church. C. S. Wales was Moderator of the meeting and J. B. Skinner was elected Clerk. In the organization meeting it was decided to hold the fourth Sunday in October for electing deacons and pastor. Rev. W. L. Norman of Burnsville, Miss., was elected first pastor. The church accepted the plan of faith of The Tishomingo Association and became affiliated with said association and associated with the association at the present time.

This church was organized in a school building upon the hill from where the Church stands at the present time which was known as Clement Chapel School. It was there that the church met for two

or three years until the building was completed. This same building that was built then is still being used for services and is in good state of repair.

During these forty-seven years this church has had a total membership of two hundred seventy-six (276) members added to its body. Of this number forty-nine have died; ninety-three have been dismissed by letter, it has sixty-six non-resident members on its rolls and sixty-eight resident members which gives the present enrollment of one hundred thirty-four (134) members.

During this time the Church has been fortunate in having a number of good pastors such as Rev. W. L. Norman, Burnsville, Miss. Rev. C. B. Gurley, Corinth, Miss. Rev. J. C. Henderson, Corinth Miss. Rev. C. C. Perry, Glendale, Miss.; Rev. W. C. Hamilton, Tishomingo, Miss. and numbers of other good men.

During the past fifteen years that there has been an active record kept the church has received seventy-eight members into its membership. Of these two have been dismissed by letter, twenty-eight are on non-resident membership list which leaves forty-eight resid-

ent members. The church has always stood for higher planes and principles as taught by our Saviour and is carrying on today in a wonderful way with sixty-five enrolled in Sunday School and sixty-five in Training Union. It has preaching services every second and fourth Sunday of each month with Sunday School every Sunday at 10:00 a.m. and Training Union every Sunday night at 6:30 p.m. It is going strong in all phases of church activities that any small church might be expected to participate in. It is a pleasure to serve this church and to have worked on this historical record and to have compiled same for the church.

1954 Amendments Provide For Many Families

Did the breadwinner of your family die after June 30, 1940, and before September 1950?

Mrs. Mary King Temple, Manager of the Sheffield, Alabama, Dis-

tributed Office of the Social Security Administration, states that the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act may now provide monthly payments to many people who previously were not eligible to receive Social Security Insurance benefits, provided the worker had 6 quarters of coverage (1½ years of work) or more.

This new insurance provision applies only in death cases, where the worker or a World War II veteran died before September 1950 and did not have sufficient social security credits for payments to be made to his survivors at the time of death.

If the breadwinner of your family died before September 1950 and you are not receiving monthly social security benefits, you should contact your Social Security Office if you are:

1. A widow, age 65, or older,
2. A widow under age 65 with unmarried children under the age of 18,
3. A child under the age of 18 and unmarried,

4. A parent, who was chiefly dependent upon the wage earner at the time of his death, provided the wage earner was not survived by a widow or minor children.

Don't delay! If a wage earner in your family died after June 30, 1940 and before September 1950, contact the Social Security Administration, and ask about your right to monthly Social Security benefits.

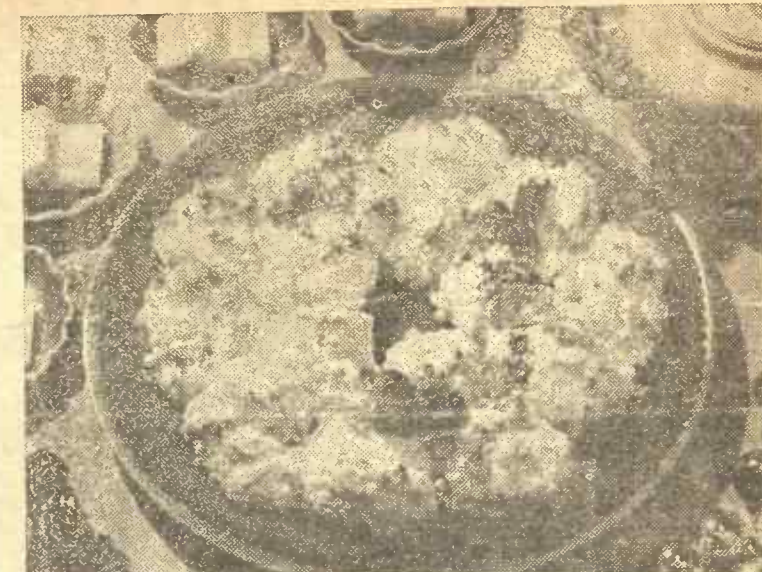

Christmas Wreath Coffee Cake



You can create this attractive Christmas Wreath Coffee Cake with little effort. Wonderful with breakfast, it will also set off a holiday coffee hour with the neighbors.

CHRISTMAS WREATH COFFEE CAKE

Christmas inspires all sorts of good things, and extra goodies are just as much a yuletide tradition as holly and mistletoe. Holiday breakfasts especially deserve attention. Festive food at the start of the day sets the mood.

Christmas Wreath Coffee Cake is a goodie you can whip up in a jiffy to cheer folks on their way some December morning. It's quick as biscuits to prepare and bakes in only 20 minutes. The self-rising flour in the recipe already contains baking powder and salt in the correct amounts. You save the time it takes to measure and sift. You gain extra protection against mistakes.

Plan on grapefruit halves, eggs the way your family likes them, bacon, and Christmas Wreath Coffee Cake. Serve it hot with lots of butter or margarine to give your family plenty of zip for work—and fun-filled days.

CHRISTMAS WREATH COFFEE CAKE

2 cups sifted enriched self-rising flour
¾ cup shortening
¾ cup chopped candied cherries
2 tablespoons chopped citron or candied pineapple
2/3 to ¾ cup milk
½ cup confectioners' sugar
1 tablespoon milk
6 halved candied cherries and thinly sliced citron for garnish, if desired
Measure flour into mixing bowl. Cut or rub in shortening until mixture is crumbly. Add cherries and citron. Blend to coat pieces of fruit with flour mixture. Add milk to make a soft dough. Drop dough from a tablespoon in a circle on ungreased baking sheet, using 5 spoonfuls for the center circle. Space remaining spoonfuls of dough in outer circle. Bake in hot oven (425 Deg. F.) until lightly browned, about 20 minutes. Remove to cooling rack and frost immediately with icing made by blending confectioners' sugar and milk. Garnish with cherries and citron. Makes 1 coffee cake, about 4 to 10 servings.

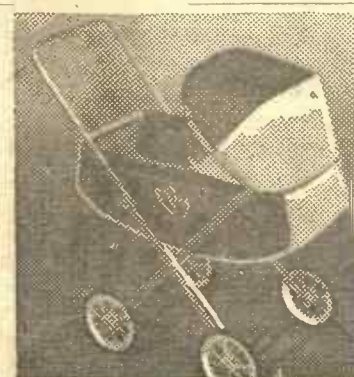

MISSISSIPPI IN LINE TO LURE CHEMICAL PLANTS TO STATE

The eyes of the nation's leading chemical company executives are currently focused on Mississippi as a choice site for expansion and development of this rapidly growing industry in the South.

Close to 60 representatives of America's leading chemical firms have learned first hand that Mississippi has two distinct advantages for this industry, which in recent years has brought new prosperity to Dixie. The occasion was a New York luncheon in November which was given for the industry executives by the Agricultural and Industrial Board.

The guests learned from Governor Hugh White and board members that Mississippi has access to a fabulous storehouse of agricultural and mineral resources needed by them. They also were acquainted with the fact that the state now is right in the middle of growing new markets in the South, Southwest and Mississippi Valley.

Simultaneously, a leading chemical magazine in November reported that diversified agriculture and industrial expansion in the South is creating new demands on the chemical industry. The publication, Industrial and Engineering Chemistry, is quoted as stating that Mississippi, favorably located in the middle of this growing Southern market, has abundant physical resources to meet the needs of an expanding chemical industry.

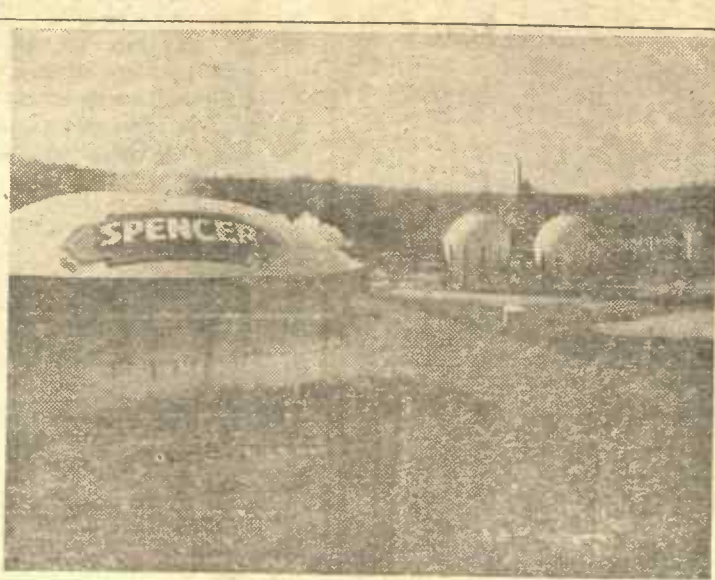
In October, Chemical and Engineering News, Bible of the chemical industry, carried an article entitled "Chemical Companies Go South," which stated that Mississippi is ideally situated to take advantage of the new trend.

Although Mississippi now boasts 30 chemical plants processing a variety of products, all indications point to a tremendous growth of this industry during the next decade.

Southern farmers, turning to modern, scientific farming, are currently using 60 per cent of the nation's output of ammonia. Over 60 per cent of the nation's capacity is located in the South, and of the 18 southern plants in operation, Mississippi now accounts for two — Mississippi Chemical Corporation at Yazoo City, and Spencer Chemical Company at Vicksburg.

Mississippi, in fact, has one of the world's foremost authorities on anhydrous ammonia as a fertilizer. Dr. Baker Andrews of State College, He and Professor Felix Edwards developed the first workable equipment for applying anhydrous ammonia to the soil as a fertilizer, thus opening a new field.

Mississippi's potentials for the production of petroleum products and petrochemicals also are considered good. The state now has two refineries at Yazoo City and Sandersville with a combined capacity of approximately 11,500 barrels of crude oil per day. A third 10,000,000 refinery is being erected in Lamar county by Pontiac Eastern Corporation and will, when in operation, have a 12,000 barrel daily capacity. Gulf Refining Company will provide the crude oil, and in turn

will purchase the bulk of the products turned out by Pontiac.

The development of synthetic fibers in the South in relatively recent years has indirectly boosted the Texas-Louisiana Gulf Coast chemical industry. Mississippi, lying adjacent to this synthetic fiber producing area and half-way between the petrochemical raw materials and the textile industry of the Southeast which uses them, is considered by chemical authorities to be "a natural for future expansion of synthetics."

The presence of 48 salt domes which have been discovered in South Mississippi to date, plus the existence of a number of other minerals suitable for chemical industry use offer additional inducements for new and branch operations.

Although Mississippi still depends to a large measure on cotton for its livelihood, diversified crops and a fast developing livestock and dairy industry is providing an increasingly large number of other raw materials suitable for chemical processing.

Mississippi's livestock industry offers potentials for leather manufacture, and raw materials for the production of gelatin, glue and soap. The production of tallow, lard and other by products is expected to increase as a result of expansion in meat packing facilities.

Mississippi's dairy industry also is a source of raw materials for the production of lactose, lactic acid and casein. The tung nut, of which Mississippi is the nation's largest producer, offers unlimited opportunity for processing of its oil into paints, varnishes, lacquers and even into medicinal products. The cottonseed, soybean and certain grains also offer the manufacturer potentially good raw materials, and even the cotton stalk may have potential as a raw material because of its high content of cellulose.

The forests of Mississippi have for a number of years offered sufficient drawing power to attract a number of paper, pulp and wood using industries such as International Paper, Johns-Manville, Masonite, Flintkote, U. S. Gypsum, Hercules and others.

More than half of Mississippi's 30,000,000 acres is forest land, the equivalent of the states of Vermont, New Hampshire and Massachusetts. The fact that Mississippi is today the second largest pulpwood producer, and first in hardwood is sufficient evidence of its importance to industries needing this raw material.

Waste from logging operations and the state's more than 1,000 saw mills may one day attract chemical manufacturers interested in pulp, wood, charcoal, activated carbon, tanning, waxes, molasses, alcohols and acetates. Problems involving the utilization of these wastes today are economic rather than technical, but these obstacles may one day be overcome.

One of Mississippi's great attractions for the chemical industry is the presence of large quantities of surface and underground water for supply and waste disposal. The state not only has eight major rivers with 1,000,000 gallon daily capacity each, but borders the Mississippi River with a capacity of 8-billion gallons daily. Mississippi's stream pollution laws serve as protection for the industry and in behalf of conservation.

The state's opportunities for continued growth in chemicals manufacturing are strengthened by a good supply of fuels and power, and excellent transportation facilities. Natural gas is available in 244 cities and towns in the state. In addition, seven major pipe lines transport gas across the state from Louisiana and Texas fields. Power is distributed by two private utilities and the Tennessee Valley Authority. All distribution systems are tied to out-of-state sources of supply to assure a continued, uninterrupted supply.

next spring. Those who receive beem today will receive Bass next spring. No Further Application Is Necessary for the Bass.

SCD cooperators who have farm ponds, but who are not getting beem at this time may want to stock their pond with fish. They should wait until next summer to determine if they will have ample water in their pond. If there is sufficient water in their ponds, they should come to the Soil Conservation Service office in Iuka and make application for fish. These will be delivered next fall.

Proper care of fish ponds is essential if best results are to be obtained. Fertilize your pond. Wait until the bass have spawned and then begin to fish. Keep your pond fertilized and fished. If you get too many fish in your pond it will be like having too many cows in your pasture. Fish become stunted and poor the same as cows if you have too many on an acre. Take fish out so those left will have a chance to grow.

STATE ATTRACTS 123 INDUSTRIES, EXPANSIONS; UPS TOURIST INCOME

A total of 123 new and expanded manufacturing plants employing 14,719 persons have been developed in Mississippi during the past two years, the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board reports in its biennial message to the incoming session of the legislature.

The Board's two-year report also shows that the state's tourist business has climbed at the rate of better than \$10,000,000 a year, or from \$268,082,384 in 1952 to \$285,776,941 in 1954.

The section of the report covering industrial development shows that 74 new plants were established during the two years, while 49 existing plants underwent expansions. A total of 33 of the new plants and expansions were financed under provisions of the balance agriculture with industry act, while the balance were built with private capital.

The Board estimates that the state's manufacturing payrolls were increased by \$36,790,000.

Diversified Industry
The new additions listed by the Board in its report represent a wide variety of manufacturers, including apparel, textile, wood working and furniture, metal fabricating, appliance, leather, chemicals, petroleum refining and a number of food products.

Mississippi's interest in securing new industries is reflected in vote tabulations for the 32 industries financed under the BAWI act. People in communities which followed the BAWI route voted by a margin of 25 to 1, approving a total of \$3,493,000 in bonds to acquire sites and construct buildings for lease to responsible manufacturers.

Charts accompanying the report show that per capita income, manufacturing payrolls and sales tax collections all have risen during the period, while cash farm income dropped considerably. Drought for three consecutive years was considered the reason for this decline.

Food Processing

In line with the Board's policy of helping develop agriculture, the report shows that 12 of the plants located in the state during the biennium contribute di-

rectly to the development and diversification of agriculture. They include plants for meat packing, poultry processing, dairy products and other food processing. Numerous grain and seed processing units, including grain elevators, were established but not included in the tabulation of manufacturing plants.

A Small Business Development Council, sponsored jointly by the A. & I. Board and the Mississippi Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, has held numerous clinics during the period to aid Mississippians with ideas which might be converted into small businesses.

Industrial contact men of the Board, backed by a national program of industrial advertising and direct mail, have made personal visits to the home offices of 776 manufacturing companies during the period covered in the report. During the period from July 1, 1954, to September 1, 1955, the board sent 15,642 letters to manufacturers inviting them to consider Mississippi as a location for branch plants. Replies were received from 1924 companies, of which 503 firms indicated they would like to talk with an A. & I. Board representative.

Six important research studies were made during the period in a campaign designed to attract specific types of industry for which the state is well suited. These studies showed that Mississippi is especially well adapted for the apparel industry, the chemical industry, metal fabricating, and pulp processing. Surveys also were made of Mississippi salt deposits and the physical resources for the chemical industry.

The Board's industrial advertising program during the period, designed to keep the state's favorable story before business leaders and industrialists, was carried in a list of nationally recognized business magazines, newspapers and trade publications. One entire special magazine section of the New York Times was devoted to telling the story of the state's industrial opportunities and its BAWI plan.

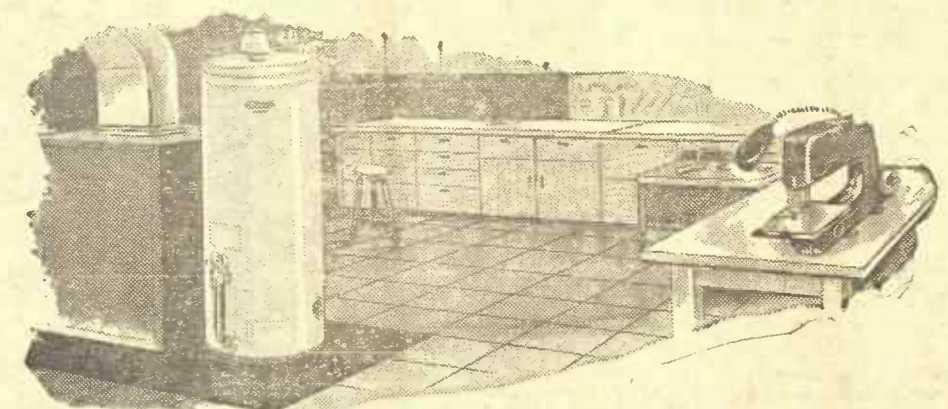

His Demands

Lesson for December 4, 1955

CHRISTIAN living is not a matter of vague general good will. A character in a movie remarked: "I'm not a mean man. If I heard that my neighbor's children had been eaten by wolves, I would feel some regret." Well, of course that didn't make him a Christian. (He turned out to be the villain, by the way.) But there seems to be a number of church members and others who think that being a Christian calls for nothing more than being generally at peace with the world... like a turnip. Being a Christian is a far more demanding thing. And the demands are Christ's demands. He is not a trademark, a portrait of a Founder beaming on us benevolently from the wall. He is the living Christ, Son of Man and Son of God. He makes demands on his disciples, and he has a right to make them.

Discipleship

Those who were closest to Jesus in Galilee, those with whom he took the greatest pains, were called Disciples. Now the least that "disciple" can mean is "learner." The first demand that Christ makes on us who would call ourselves Christians, the demand preliminary to all others, is that we learn of him. We never should assume that we know all about Jesus—his character, his teaching, his purpose. It is a sobering question: How much of our behavior, our attitudes, our relationships with other people—how much of this did we learn from Jesus, and how much did we copy from other persons, and how much is our own invention?

Decision

Another demand Christ makes of us is decision. This in three ways: decision for him, decision about him, decision with him. It

is specially these last two that are highlighted in this week's passages from Luke. The decision for Christ is the point at which one begins to be a disciple. But besides learning, the Christian disciple has to decide, and act accordingly, about some questions that affect him vitally. One is the decision about Christ which Jesus pushed on his disciples. "Who do you say that I am?" Jesus put this question only after they had been disciples for some time. (Why?) But it can be answered at any time, and it must be answered some time, if we have any title to the name "Christian." How seriously do we take Jesus Christ? That depends on what answer we give to his question: What do we think of him? Who and what is he? The more fully we know his importance, the more seriously we shall take him. Is he a dreamer, a poet, an impractical idealist? Is he a child of his age, important then, but now such a man as we can safely neglect? Is he a noble thinker, a stirring leader of men? Or is he, as Peter dared to believe, the Son of the living God? Does he come to us with the authority of one man's opinion, or does he speak as an ancient sage, or does he speak with the wisdom of the Almighty? He demands a decision.

Denial of Self

Now if we have answered the first two demands, for discipleship and for decision, we may be ready for the third demand. (This is the decision with him, spoken of just now.) We shall pay very little attention to this if we have not rightly met the other two. If we are not true learners we shall not even hear this, or we shall misunderstand it. If we think less of Christ than we ought to think, then this demand will seem egotistic, unreasonable, suicidal. It is only the Son of God who has the right to make such a demand. It is for nothing less than denial of self. There is a cheap substitute for this which is sometimes mistaken for it. It is called "self-denial" and may mean no more than going without ice cream for a while, doing without some luxury or other. Denial of self is something different entirely. Jesus puts it in terms of a crucifixion. To take up a cross was to be already on the last mile. To deny the self means to cease being one's own center-of-the-universe. It means "love thyself last." It means dying to oneself, as Paul put it, and living to God. It means "Not I, but Christ, liveth in me." The Calendars of Activities are now in the hands of the printers for the coming year. It is hoped

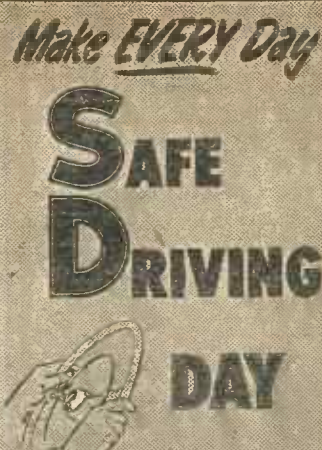
they will be out in time for distribution before the beginning of the new year.

County Agent news

Winter grazing on cultivated land that has been grazed down one time should be given a rest and a chance to make more growth. If extra growth does come on the oats or wheat, leave livestock on only a few hours a day, then there won't be as much damage done to the root system. There is a question as to whether you can renitrate

oats this late in the fall that have been grazed down. If the grazing is needed, apply 30 pounds of nitrogen. All the nitrogen may not be used during the winter, but will be there for early spring growth. When cultivated grazing areas get wet, keep livestock off.

Killing Dock. December is an ideal month to do the first spraying to get rid of dock. If the dock is growing in small grain or clover areas, it will pay you to spray it in December even though you know there may have to be another spraying in February to kill what comes up after the December spraying. Three-fourths to 1 pound of amine 2, 4-D in 20 gallons of water will spray an acre of dock.

If the dock is not solid over the area, just spray the spots of dock. Most of the time when spot spraying is done, 1 pound of amine 2, 4-D is put in 10 gallons of water. Then you won't have to haul so much water around over the area. You don't have to move livestock when you spray an area with 2, 4-D. This chemical won't kill any of the cereals and won't damage dormant pasture sod. It will kill right young white clover, but after it gets established, it will knock it back but won't kill it. It will kill crimson clover, hop clover, red clover, vetch and winter peas.

Poultry

Thinking of going into the business of producing eggs for market? It can be profitable. Mississippi is a deficit producing state and there is a need for more commercial eggs.

Commercial egg production can be a practical and profitable part of just about any balanced farm home program. However, careful planning and consideration should be given this business before getting in.

First, do you like to work with chickens? If not don't try poultry. Are you going to take care of them yourself, or go off and leave the chores to someone else? If you are not going to do the work yourself, don't try to produce eggs commercially.

To make more from your egg production, you have to like chickens and you have to give them some special attention.

Farmers who are going into commercial egg production should get their orders for sexed pullets in right away. Your county agent has a list of the approved sources of chicks especially bred for high egg production.

Wood Fires

Keep the ravages of fire out of your woods. A wildfire does no

good to anyone. Valuable timber is destroyed, feed and cover for game of nearly all species is ruined. Fire in the woods costs you money. Keep it out.

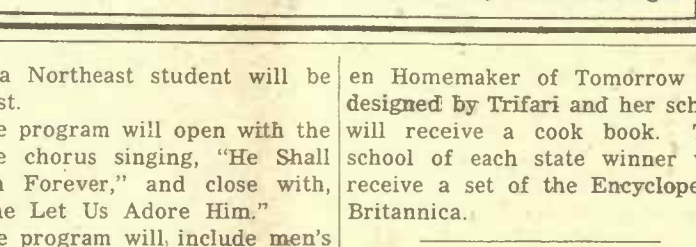

Local Senior Girls To Participate In Aptitude Test

Senior girls from Iuka and Holcut Consolidated schools will observe "Homemaker of Tomorrow Day" on December 6 along with 256,534 career-minded graduating girls in 10,222 of the nation's high schools simultaneously and on that day will test their aptitude for the career that awaits eight of 10 of them—homemaking.

Twenty-five senior girls have enrolled in the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow," stated Mrs. Miriam Gaines, home economics teacher at Iuka high.

General Mills, sponsor of a \$100,000 scholarship program designed to assist the schools in homemaking education, announced this huge participation of nearly half of the nation's high schools today.

A total of 177 schools and 2,667 girls in this state will take the 50-minute written homemaking examination which will be the basis for selecting the school and state homemakers of tomorrow. The examination paper of the girl receiving the highest test score in each school will be entered in state competition with each state homemaker of tomorrow receiving a \$1,500 scholarship and each state runner-up a \$500 scholarship.

The 48 state winners and the representative from the District of Columbia, with their advisors, will tour Washington, colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Philadelphia April 8-12 when interviews will combine with the test score in determining the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow who will be selected April 12. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000.

Science Research Associates of Chicago is the designer and judge of the examination which consists of multiple choice and objective questions which test the students' attitude and knowledge in the major areas of homemaking.

Each girl who takes the test will receive a homemaking guide. Each school winner will receive a gold-

en Homemaker of Tomorrow pin designed by Trifari and her school will receive a cook book. The school of each state winner will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.
