Spreading Christmas Cheer With Lighting

You can make your home sparkle with Christmas cheer with simple decorations and strings of Christmas lights. An illuminated wreath hung in your doorway welcomes your holiday guests and warms the casual passer-by.

Your windows framed in greenery and strings of lights, are inviting. If your home has columns, you can wind them with lights wrapped in evergreen boughs. Other architectural features may be outlined with greenery and lighting. Lights in windows are always attractive.

You can create interesting silhouettes of low shrubbery by placing colored lamps on the ground between shrubs and house. Flood and spot lamps are excellent for highlighting effects. Cutout figures, outlined with colored lights, placed in the yard or on the rooftop are effective highlighted with spot or flood lamps.

You will get better effects if spots and floods are hidden beneath shrubbery boxes or cans so that only the beam is visible from the street.

Perhaps you would like a huge wreath for your picture window. You can make a 41-inch one by fastening eight 18-inch lengths of wood together to make an octagonal shape. Paint it green and cover with greenery, add strings of outdoor lights, then hang it in front of your big window. This is a good wreath for an outside wall.

You can make stars—any size you want—from composition board. Painted white and with lights mounted on them, these stars may be used in many ways to add to your decorative scheme.

In making your outdoor decorations be sure to use weatherproof sockets, wire and bulbs.

For added interest, carry your outdoor decorative theme inside. Your indoor wreaths may be made with coat hangers as frames. Shape each hanger, leaving the hook to hang the wreath by. Wrap a string of Christmas lights around each frame, then twind with greens.

A string of holiday lighted bells and greenery in the doorway between rooms spreads the holiday spirit from room to room. Use Christmas tree lights in four or five inch translucent fireproof bells with the greenery in a spray effect.

Bouquets of greens on mantel, desks or tables will be enhanced by placing a string of warm-colored lights at the back to cast graceful shadows on the wall.

There is really no fixed limit to the use of lighting for decorative purposes at Christmastime. A little imagination and ingenuity may spread Christmas cheer to many many passers-by.

Highway Travel Deadly Serious

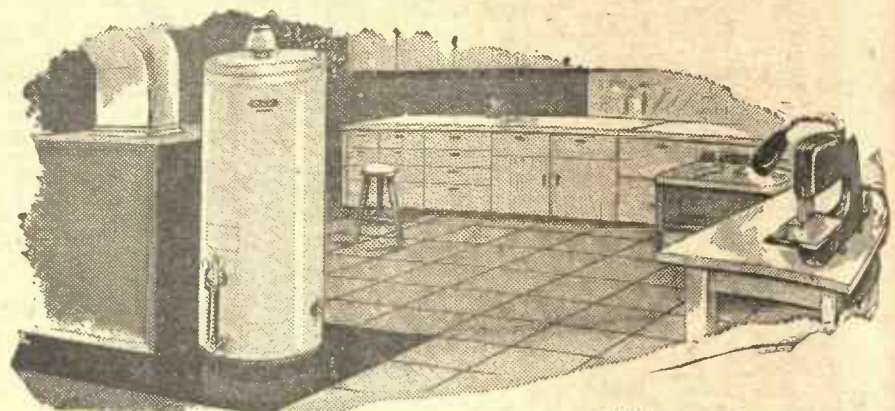

International Uniform
Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Background Scripture: Luke 10:25-37.
Devotional Reading: I John 2:1-11.
My Neighbor
Lesson for December 11, 1955

Two cart-drivers in China were
trying to get up a muddy hill.
Each driver's cart was stuck in
the mud, almost side by side.
Each man was beating his own
scrawny horse, but the wheels
were stuck fast. Along came an
American. "Why don't you un-
hitch one horse," he said "and
hitch him to the other cart? Then
the two horses might get the cart
out of the mud."
The carters were astonished. They
had never thought
of that. But they
did as the stran-
ger said, and sure
enough they both
got to the top of
the hill. That true
story, told by a missionary, shows
two things at once. One is that
in countries where Christianity
has had a chance to get around,
some simple Christian ideas get
taken for granted, such as help-
ing your neighbor when he is in
trouble. The other is that where
Christianity is unknown, even so
simple a thing as getting together
to pull out of the mud, comes as
a strange new idea.

Who Is My Neighbor?
Now if those two Chinese car-
ters had been father and son, or
brother and brother, they might
have thought of helping each other,
for in China nothing is too
good for members of your family.
But we have no great right to
make fun of the Chinese. All of
us are inclined to draw pretty
hard lines and to think, "Outside
those lines I have no neighbors.
Inside the lines, yes, we under-
stand pretty well what neighbor-
liness is. "Love thy neighbor as
thyself" is a commandment not
too hard to understand, for we
know what it is to love ourselves,
that comes all too naturally. We
like to get ahead, to cushion our-
selves from danger and if possi-
ble from discomfort, we consult
our own interests. Loving one's
neighbor as oneself just means
looking out for him in the same
careful ways, thinking ahead for
him, promoting him. We under-
stand what neighborliness is, yes.
We do not confuse it with being
meddlesome. If you want to
know as much about your neigh-
bor as you do about yourself,
you aren't being a neighbor but
a nuisance. If you do for your
neighbor what he can very well
do, ought to do and maybe wants
to do for himself, then you are
not treating him like a neighbor
Neighbors Out of Sight
Jesus' famous parable of the
Good Samaritan shows that hav-
ing neighbors is easy, in fact you
can't help it; but that the impor-
tant thing is being a neighbor.
It means more than living in
"peaceful co-existence" and not
bothering each other." It means
active co-operation and help.
Wherever there is a person in trouble whom
we can help, there is a neighbor.
In our time the world has grown
closer together than it was in
Jesus' time. If there had been a
famine in India, the good Samar-
itan would never have known it,
or if he had, he could have done
nothing about it. Now if there
is a famine in India we hear about
it as soon as the Indians can;
and we can do something about
it too. When farmers in a church
in Iowa, for instance, send a
heifer to a farmer in some out-
of-the-way or devastated part of
the world across a wide ocean,
that is being a neighbor, modern-
style for a modern world.

What We Haven't Figured Out
There are many problems we
haven't worked out yet, in this
business for acting as good neigh-
bors. For example: What is the
wisest way to be neighbor to
people of different race from our-
own? How can a mill-worker be
a neighbor to the stock-holders,
or how can the stock-holders be
neighborly to the workers? When
a corporation, in the process of
expansion, throws 500 persons out
of work at one time, is there any
way in which those who are em-
ployed by the corporation can be
neighbors to those who have lost
their positions? How can we be
neighbors to people who resent us?
How far can we go in help-
ing people without turning them
into "moochers" and beggars?
How can Christians in one de-
nomination be neighbors to those
in another? And one more ques-
tion: Is it possible for non-Chris-
tians to be as good neighbors, in
Jesus' sense of the word, as
Christians can be?

plate. Fresh pork sausage will keep in the refrigerator for two to three weeks; it will keep two to four months in the home freezer or cold storage locker. For freezer storage, use only the best grades of packaging material. Do not use inferior wrapping paper.

Frosted Sorghums
 Danger from grazing frosted sorghums is gone when the stalks dry out. These fields, along with harvested cotton and corn fields offer a lot of winter feed for cattle.

Now is a good time to take soil samples and send them to the State Soils Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State College, for detailed lime and fertilizer needs.

By sending in samples now for areas to be planted to pastures and row crops next spring, you can beat the rush and get results of the test back in plenty of time to apply the recommended plant food before planting time.

The holiday spirit is appearing all about us now — in our homes, the stores, the lighted, decorated streets, in parties — and in lots of other places.

With this goes the hustle and bustle of crowds, confusion and tiredness that easily leads to accidents. And none of us want to mar our own or our friend's and family's holiday season with accidents. It just pays to plan against them.

Safety Against Fire

One step toward safety against fire is to buy or make your Christmas decorations so that they are fire-resistant. Place Christmas greens away from candles and electric light bulbs and away from heat or sparks from fireplaces.

As you arrange your dinner table centerpiece, remember that fires have been started by a combination of greens or paper decorations close to lighted candles.

Be sure Santa has a fire-safe costume. Sometimes Santa suits of untreated napped fabric, or whisks of untreated cotton batting have proved hazardous.

of good-sized, steady ash trays around any room where a crowd will gather.

A Beautiful Tree

All the family from the littlest one to the oldest loves a beautifully decorated Christmas tree. As you select your tree if you buy it, be sure it is fresh. Keep your tree fresh by keeping it standing in a container of water. The tree also needs to be anchored firmly so it can't topple.

Place the tree out of the way of traffic lanes and doorways where people won't brush against it. For fire-safety place it away from the fireplace and away from any updraft such as occurs in a stairwell. Christmas trees that have toppled over in doorways heave sometimes blocked exits when fire has broken out.

Check the Christmas tree lights to be sure they are in good repair with tight sockets and all insulation intact. Make sure not to plug too many lights into a single wall outlet.

Safety About the House

All steps and stairways in the house need to be well-lighted and free of toys and other items that turn an ankle or catch a heel and cause a fall. It's well to remember that visitors don't know their way around your house as your family does, so they need extra protection against any possible fall hazards.

If you wax floors before company comes, use a thin layer and polish so thoroughly the floors won't be slippery. Be sure there are no skiddy rugs, hazardous esp-

ecially to older people. Avoid any extension wires that can be trip hazards or fire hazards.

Kitchen Safety
 All the familiar rules about safety in the kitchen apply especially to the holidays when this room gets heavier use and often is more crowded.

To avoid falls wipe promptly any food that happens to spill on the floor, especially grease. Make sure

that young children are well away from the stove when the oven door is opened for the Christmas ham or turkey to come out or when there's considerable cooking on top of the stove.

The increase in cooking for Christmas often brings on a larger number of burn injuries caused by hot grease fires. What should the cook do in case of a grease fire?

If it is in the oven, close the oven door to exclude the air and stop the fire. If the fire is in a skillet on a gas or an electric stove, first cut off the stove. Then put a cover on the skillet, using a long-hand-

led fork. The grease fire can best be put out by sprinkling baking soda over the burning grease. Salt or sand may be used, but baking soda is best because it forms a cloud that helps to exclude air from the fire. Above all, keep your head and act calmly.
