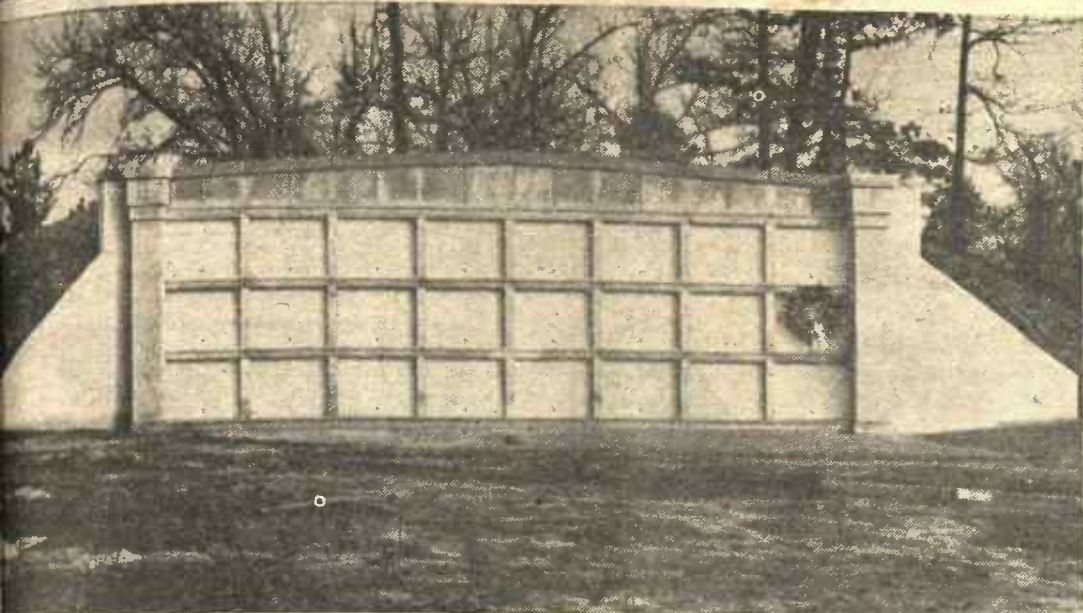

Tishomingo county farmers voted overwhelmingly Tuesday to continue cotton acreage quotas and marketing controls. Tabulation from voting places over the county gave 479 for and 43 against - 92 per cent favoring the controls.

The question got practically the same treatment elsewhere in the cotton belt. Percentages on a south-wide basis favoring the controls was between 94 and 95 percent. This means that acreage quotas will be in force in 1956 as it was in 1955 and that the government will insure or guarantee a minimum price for 1956 cotton grown according to rules and regulations.

County Agent news

Timber Stand Improvement

During the slack farming season is a good time to do work on your timber stands. Cutting down or girdling and poisoning cull hardwoods in pine stands will greatly improve the value of the pine. It will make for faster growth or the more desirable species.

Cutting down and sawing up these cull trees, including some of the oaks and hickories can also bring in an additional farm income. This wood is offering a market for use as fire wood for open fire places.

Pecan Tree Planting

If you are planning to get out some pecan trees—just a few or an orchard, make sure that you are getting an adapted variety. The best varieties are Stuart, Schley and Success.

It is generally better to buy trees from a nursery than to grow your own. Trees with one-year-old tops are recommended as they stand transplanting better than older trees, require less care are more economical.

Get trees of 4 to 5 foot and 5 to 6 foot sizes.

Make your planting holes deep and large enough to set the trees an inch or two deeper than they grew in the nursery. Do not crowd or bend the roots.

Do not put any fertilizer or fresh manure close to the roots. In digging holes, keep the top soil separate from the sub-soil. Use the top soil to fill in around the roots. Well rotted manure, compost or leaf mold may be mixed with stiff soils to loosen it before it is put back around the roots.

Pack the soil well as the hole is filled. If the soil is dry, add water.

Never let roots of nursery trees dry out before or during planting. Pecan trees can be planted anytime during December, January and February.

Roach Control

To get rid of troublesome roaches use 2 to 5% Chlorodane spray or dust. Apply this material around sinks, drain boards, behind wall cabinets and other similar places. Roaches come out at night looking for food and as these places are frequented they come in contact with the poison.

If spray is used in cabinets remove dishes before spraying. As soon as the spray dries they may be replaced and there will be no danger to humans.

After two weeks if roaches are still seen, repeat the spray or dusting procedure.

Why not give your cattle a good Christmas present by getting the lice off them. It is a simple matter to do. Either dust or spray them with DDT or Methoxychlor.

If dusting use a 5% dust, if spray is to be used mix 1 teacup of material to three gallons water and wet animals thoroughly. Do not spray on a cold day.

There are some other insecticides which can be used on beef cattle. They are: Toxaphene—Lindane Emulsion and DUC. Be sure to use as the label describes on the container.

And many of them add a list of all the things they have to do between now and time for Santa's arrival: Presents to make or buy, to wrap and mail; foods to plan and buy and cook; decorations to arrange; school parties for the children.

But with all the "more things to do than I have time," don't we all like the feeling of Christmas. It is a time for doing all the lovely and loving, heartwarming unnecessary things we've wanted to do all year.

As you complete your gift plans, don't overlook the "home-mades." These include clothing, house accessories, baked and canned "goodies," home grown flowers or even pine branches and cones for decorations. Look about you, some of

the every-day things you take for granted could be the gift answer for a friend "who just has everything." And those gifts like this that you choose, make and carry a special personal message of good cheer.

Fruit cakes, decorated with candied fruits and nuts and wrapped in cellophane are beautiful and most acceptable. A box of homemade jams, preserves, pickles or jellies put up in uniform jars and decorated with holiday wrappings is hard to resist. Fill a clever cookie jar with luscious homemade cookies.

Homemade candies always make a hit. Bottles of homemade salad dressing or mayonnaise are another idea for Christmas giving.

Decorations

We all love Christmas decorations—to make them and to arrange them. Even the littlest ones in the family want to help.

As you plan the decorations for your home and tree, don't forget such things as popcorn and cranberry strings, decorated cookies and cut-outs from old Christmas cards. These cut-outs make unusual name tags for Christmas packages, too.

You can use the old cards or colored paper to make paper chains. All children love to make them. Let them make small paper lantern from bright colored squares of paper or old Christmas cards.

Whatever your decorations, choose the colors carefully. If the backgrounds in the room are dark, put up light-colored decorations; if backgrounds are light, try darker colors.

Be sure the decoration fits its location. A tiny wreath on a large

You may want to adopt the practice of some folks: They prune their evergreens when they are ready to decorate the house for Christmas. That way they get a supply of freshly cut greenery and improve their shrubs and trees at the same time.

For a shining Christmas light, use a grater over a candle. Bank the base with greenery and Christmas balls or with holly.

For a gala decoration and Christmas card basket, wash and sandpaper a wire dish drainer. Add glitter with gold paint. Lace the edges with satin ribbon.

For a candy centerpiece, use a few sugar Santas on a floor of red and white peppermints. Fence them in with ribbon candy and four candles wound around with cellophane tape to resemble candy canes.

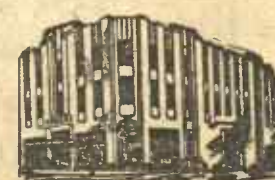

New Prospect Baptists Showing Progress, Construct New Pastor's Home

The New Prospect Baptist Church went to a full time program under the leadership of Rev. Douglas Joslin about a year ago. Rev. Joslin lived in his own home at Glen and served the church from there. When Rev. Joslin left the field, the church found herself, not only without a pastor but also without a home for one. Rev. Patterson, Area Missionary, volunteered to serve the church as interim pastor until such time as they could erect a pastor's home and thus continue on in a full time ministry. Work on the home began about the first of November. It is being built largely through volunteer labor and the gift of timber from members and free will offerings on the part of both the membership and friends. Mr. J. D. Ellis is

serving as the superintendent of the work and it is hoped that the home will be complete in another few weeks time. The pastorium is a three bed-room dwelling, living room, breakfast-kitchen, bath, and front and back porches.

Dec. 25 has been set as the time for a special tree will offering in which it is hoped to raise sufficient funds to completely pay for the whole structure and the necessary appurtenances. All members of the church, former members, and friends are cordially invited to attend services on Dec. 25 and at all times and a special invitation is extended to any and all who wish to come and see the home. The New Prospect Church is the first rural church in Tishomingo Association to build a pastorium.

The New Prospect Church is the only rural church in Tishomingo county that has a complete "Four Star" program consisting of a graded Sunday School, a Graded Baptist Training Union, a WMU Organization, and a Baptist Brotherhood. They also have a Family Night program which is observed once each month. They maintain a mid-week prayer service on every Wednesday night. 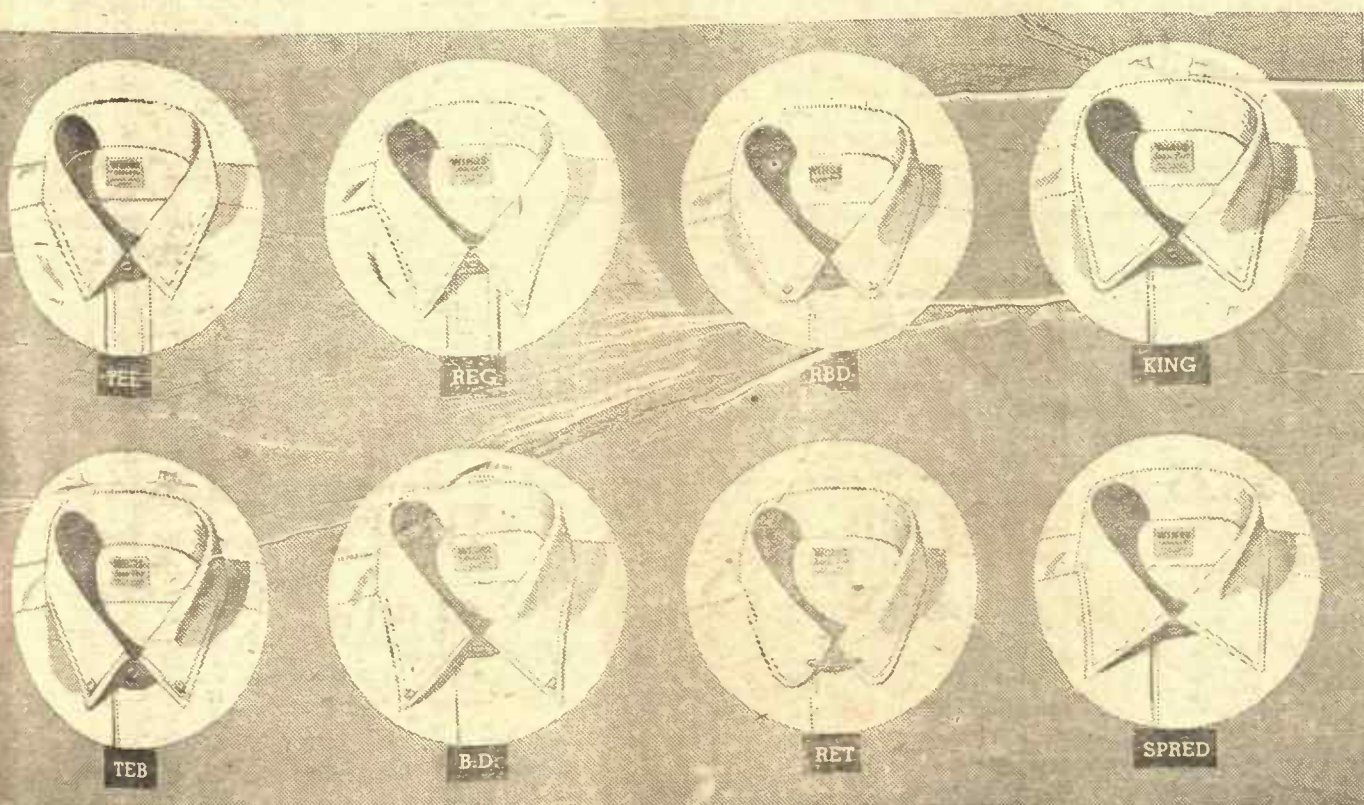

Pine Trees A Good Soil Conserving Crop

Approximately three-fourths of the land of Tishomingo County should be in forest. Most of this land should be pine forest.

It is most encouraging to see the interest landowners are now taking in their pine trees. Not only have millions of pine seedlings been set in this county during recent years, but landowners are now deadening worthless hardwood to release young volunteer pines.

The county agent receives pine seedlings from the TVA and give them to farmers to plant on their land. If you have not applied to the County Agent for pine seedling, it is now too late. The supply have been exhausted for the season.

The ASC office assist farmers by sharing the cost of planting pine seedlings and of girdling blackjacks, and other undesirable hardwood to release young pines now growing under these larger worthless trees.

Mr. John Shackelford, our new Area Forester, is getting acquainted in the county, and will assist farmers with their forestry problems.

The Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissioners, and the local technicians of the Soil Conservation Service consider pine trees the major soil conserving crop of Tishomingo County. They consider it the most important soil conserving crop because most of the land of Tishomingo

county should be growing pine trees.

Forestry is the one project all agricultural agencies give their unestimated support to the landowners are to be commended for progress they are making in the care of their woodland. There is less woods burning, new pine plantings are to be seen throughout the county and the girdling of blackjack to release young pine seedlings is becoming a general practice with landowners. More attention should be paid to selective cutting of commercial timber, some of this is being done, but this is a weak point in our forestry program.

Some of the landowners who are practicing good forestry management are Gene Glover, Wallace Belue, H. S. Massey, L. P. Allen, Jr., L. E. Deaton and Fulton Hargett.

Lon C. Morris, Jessie Meeks, H. E. Hester, Roe Daniels, H. P. Reno, Dewey Lewis, Bill Robinson and Kell Milligan are some of the landowners who are planning to do timber stand improvement work next spring.

This is a fine work and all landowners who apply better forestry practices are to be commended.

Driver's License Expired 18 mos. Requires Exam.

The Mississippi Highway Patrol warns that all persons whose driver's licenses have been expired for more than 18 months will be required to undergo re-examination.

Commissioner of Public Safety T. B. Birdsong stressed that any applicant whose license has been expired for longer than the 18-month period of grace will be compelled to submit to written re-examination by a Patrol drivers license examiner.

All state motorists are urged to check the expiration date on their license to make certain that they hold a valid driver's permit.

Renewals should be prompt, preferably during the three-month period prior to the expiration of the license.

L. E. Birdsong, director of the Driver License Division of the Highway Patrol, states that the Patrol has more than one million license applications now on file. Many are not in force because the original applicant has moved to another state or is dead. Division personnel are attempting to bring these files up to date.

The Driver's license examining officer is in Iuka each Monday.

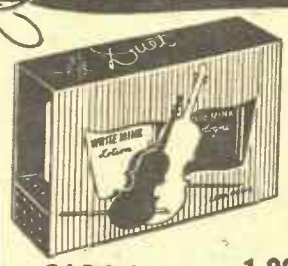

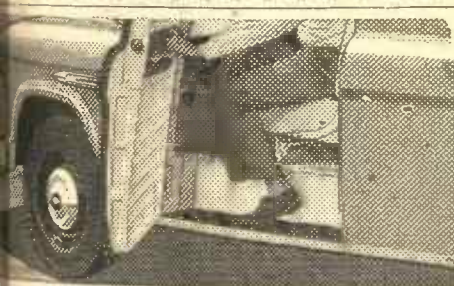

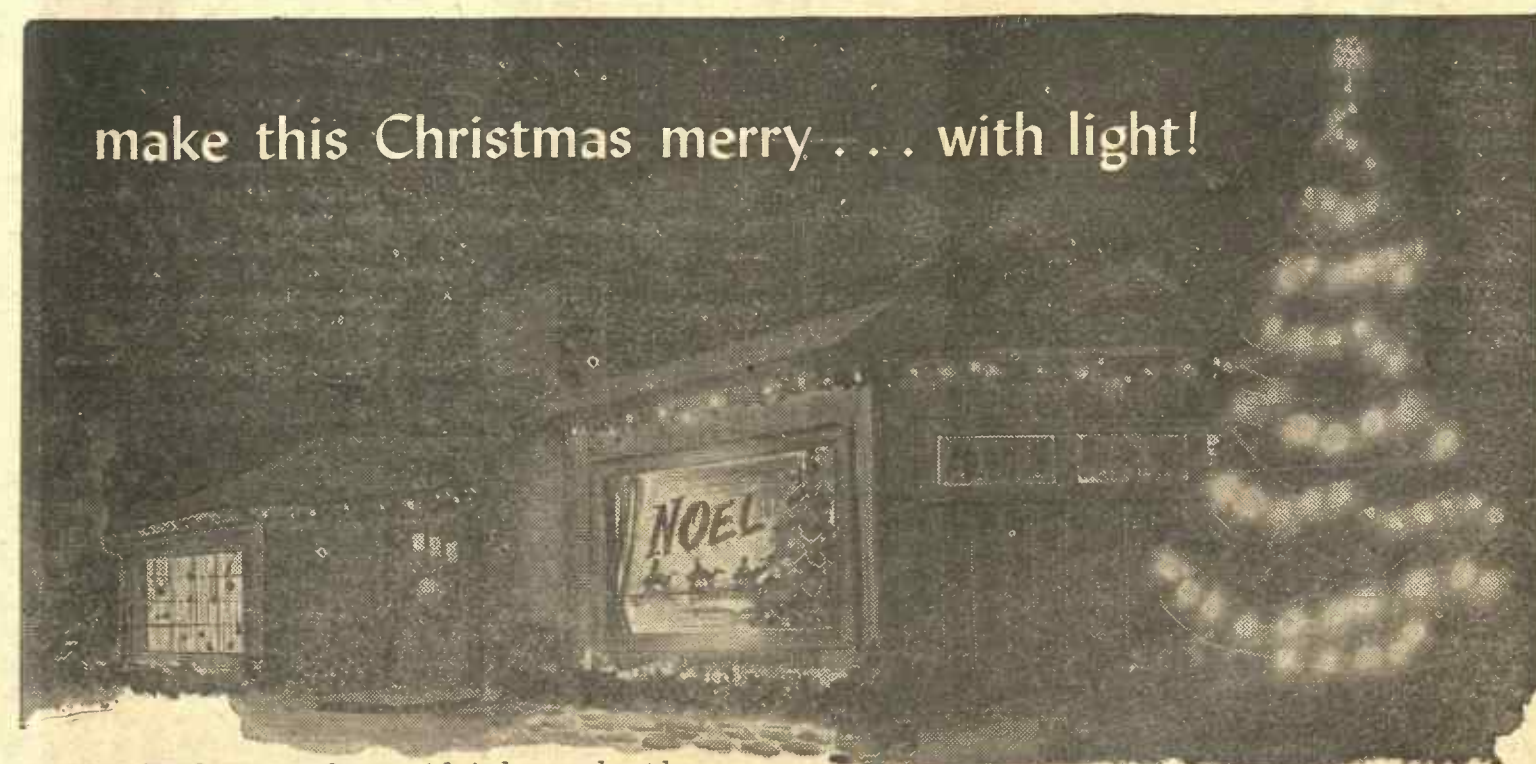
