1955 WAS VERY BUSY YEAR FOR COUNTY; SOME OF THE HAPPENINGS ARE LISTED HERE

The year nineteen-hundred and
fifty-five has passed and if a his-
tory were written it would prob-
ably go down as being one of the
most important years in the annals
of the county. The year brought
an unusual amount of storms and
floods and fires. It also brought
great strides in economic and in-
dustrial expansion. Improve-
ments in all the major communi-
ties in the county and created in
the minds of business and civic
leaders and the populace in gen-
eral an improved outlook for the
future.

The year was an important one
in governmental circles since all
county and state officers were
elected to serve the next four
years. . . . Also work was started
on and completed on some new
highways and bridges. . . . luka,
Tishomingo and Belmont saw the
greatest building boom in dwell-
ing houses that has been witness-
ed in many years.

Aside from politics, possibly
the greatest single incident affect-
ing more people was the building
of the Tishomingo Shoe Co. plant
at luka. This was done with a
\$300,000.00 bond issue passed by
the voters of the First, Second and
Third districts and will afford a
payroll for approximately 350
people. . . . Also, of no small mat-
ter was the formation of the luka
Shirt Co., Inc., which is, at the end
of the year, at capacity production
with 125 employees.

The election, industrial expan-
sion, community improvements,
and building of new homes, and
thousand and one other events
have gone to make up the activi-
ties of the citizens of the county
of the past year. Taken from our
files is a synopsis of the year's
happenings.

January

By January 6, 1955, ten candi-
dates had already announced for
the political races; Miss Leola
Smith of Ripley had come to luka
as home agent to replace Miss Im-
ogene Bynum who accepted a po-
sition in Lowndes county as home
agent; Rev. W. C. McGill, former
luka pastor, died Jan. 4; Tisho-
mingo County Circuit Court was
in session; Power Association an-
nounced electric program for 4-H,
FFA and FHA boys and girls; Beta
club installed at luka school; 200
club members attended reforestation
landowners attended Camp Ground, State
meeting at Camp Ground, State
Forestry James W. Craig and other
forestry leaders were present; the
largest single delivery of pine
seedlings was made to 80 Tishom-
ingo county farmers; on Jan. 11
Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Deaton cele-

brated their 55th wedding anni-
versary; on Jan. 20, W. H. Fair-
less of Tishomingo and R. A. Mc-
Ree of luka were awarded the
highest honors attainable—Silver
Beaver awards—in scouting; Dis-
trict Social Security office was
established in Sheffield, Ala.; Bel-
mont girls and Belmont boys were
winners of county tournament at
Tishomingo.

February

First public announcement made
on February 3rd of intentions of
General Shoe Corporation of Nash-
ville, Tenn., to operate plant at
luka; on Feb. 1st the worst torna-
do to strike in vicinity 20 years
struck the Maum and Cherokee,
Ala., areas; by Feb. 3rd, 26 can-
didates had announced for public
office; luka City Beautiful Com-
mission was formed on Feb. 3rd;
Belmont girls and Holcut boys
were winners of B-BB sub-regional
basketball tournament in luka;
Contract between Board of Super-
visors and General Shoe Corpora-
tion was signed on Wednesday,
Feb. 9th, election date set for
March 15th.

March

New state 3 per cent sales tax
went into effect March 1st; March
3rd decreed as "luka Planting
Day" for shrubbery; luka Beau-
tiful Commission sponsored move-
ment to have grape myrtle and
crape shrubs planted through-
out the town; Boy Scouts assisted
in project; 4-H club rally held
Friday, March 11th; Harold Mont-
gomery resigned as assistant coun-
ty agent to accept position in Tu-
pelo; Lealon Yarber was appoint-
ed Postmaster at Belmont; J. P.
Coleman is first gubernatorial
candidate to present campaign to
county citizens by speaking at
Tishomingo and Belmont; Citizens
in first three supervisor's districts
voted almost unanimously in favor
of \$300,000.00 bond issue for shoe
plant; April 12 was date set for
Burnsville and Holcut school dis-
tricts to vote on gymnasium bond
issue; announcement was made
for holding \$55,000.00 bond elec-
tion on Friday, April 8th, for im-
provement and expansion of luka
Water System; 235 entries display-
ing in art exhibit at luka school;
Mrs. Sara Elizabeth (Sally) Storm-
ont, mother of Supervisor Lunce-
ford Stormont, died on March 12;
Tony Grezaffi employed by luka
school to teach and coach football;
Tishomingo county suffers from
torrential rains and floods; J. C.
Byrd and V. L. Adams are an-
nounced as being new partners in
the ownership of luka Truck and
Implement Co.; by March 31st, 42

persons had announced for county
political offices; record freeze for
this time of year killed all fruit
blossoms, county suffered tremen-
dously from floods and cold weath-
er.

April

Definite plans made for starting
construction on FFA camp on
Pickwick lake; Shirley Vandiver
of Pleasant Ridge school was de-
clared top speller in county; April
14-30 proclaimed as clean-up time
in luka; Southern Bell Telephone
co. strike was in progress; an ap-
peal made by ginners of county
for farmers to relinquish cotton
acres they knew they would not
plant so county would not lose
acreage; on April 19, 20, 21, Gen-
eral Shoe accepted applications
for employment in shoe plant,
over 900 applications made; Burn-
sville school district gymnasium
bond issue passes; luka Water
bond issue passes—vote was 266
to 2; Salk polio vaccine was de-
clared successful, plans formulat-
ed by Health Dept. to start giving
vaccine to school children of coun-
ty; Curtis Bros. Drug Co. put on
drug sale for April 14, 15, 16;
Western Auto Store opened in
Belmont; Tishomingo County
Farm Improvement Association
announced TV Co-op seed, feed
and fertilizer; Aunt Jemima pan-
cake breakfast is held at luka
school, proceeds went to school
band; by April 21st, 263 1st and
2nd grade school children had re-
ceived their first Salk polio shots;
luka Lions first talent show was
held on Friday night, April 15th;
Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Claunch of
Holcut celebrated 50th wedding
anniversary; Burnsville man, C. C.
Stricklen, developed new inven-
tion—split ball bearing; Reid
Bros. announced fishing contest.

May

New Year's Eve Watch Party

A New Year's Eve watch party

is one that can be fun for you as well as your guests. Perhaps you have left your Christmas decorations in place, so all you will have to think about are the table dec-

orations and the food. Both can be simple.

Evergreens arranged in the shape of a star and with the green foliage well sprinkled with artificial snow make an attractive table centerpiece. Candles at the points and angles of the star add a touch of elegance and furnish soft lights for the table. Favors, such as horns, bells, whistles and gay paper hats add a gay touch to your party.

With Christmas feasting just past, your guests will relish a light meal—perhaps tuna casserole, potato chips, sauld, confetti cake, and plenty of coffee. The casserole can be prepared ahead and kept refrigerated until an hour or

two before serving. Gelatin salads are easy to prepare before the party. The cake will be ready to serve hours before the guests arrive.

To make this delightful confetti cake, you will need 2 cups sifted cake flour, 2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup shortening, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-1/2 teaspoons soda, 3 squares melted bitter chocolate, 3/4 cup milk, 3/4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 cup milk, 1 egg, 2 egg yolks (save whites for icing), and 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Blend flour, sugar, shortening, salt, soda, chocolate, and 3/4 cup milk by hand or two minutes with mixer at medium speed. Stir in baking powder. Add 1/2 cup milk, egg, and egg yolks, and vanilla. Blend by hand or with mixer two minutes at medium speed.

Pour batter into two nine-inch pans which have been rubbed with shortening and lined with waxed paper. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 35 minutes. When cool, spread fluffy white icing between layers, on sides and on top of cake.

Ingredients for fluffy white icing are 1-1/2 cups sugar, 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 egg whites, 5 tablespoons water, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Place all ingredients except vanilla in double boiler—or in pan on low heat. Beat with rotary beater till icing will stand in peaks. Remove from range and add vanilla. Spread icing between layers, on sides and on top of cake. Decorate with small colored candy mints.

May you have a happy New Year's Eve, and a very prosperous 1956!

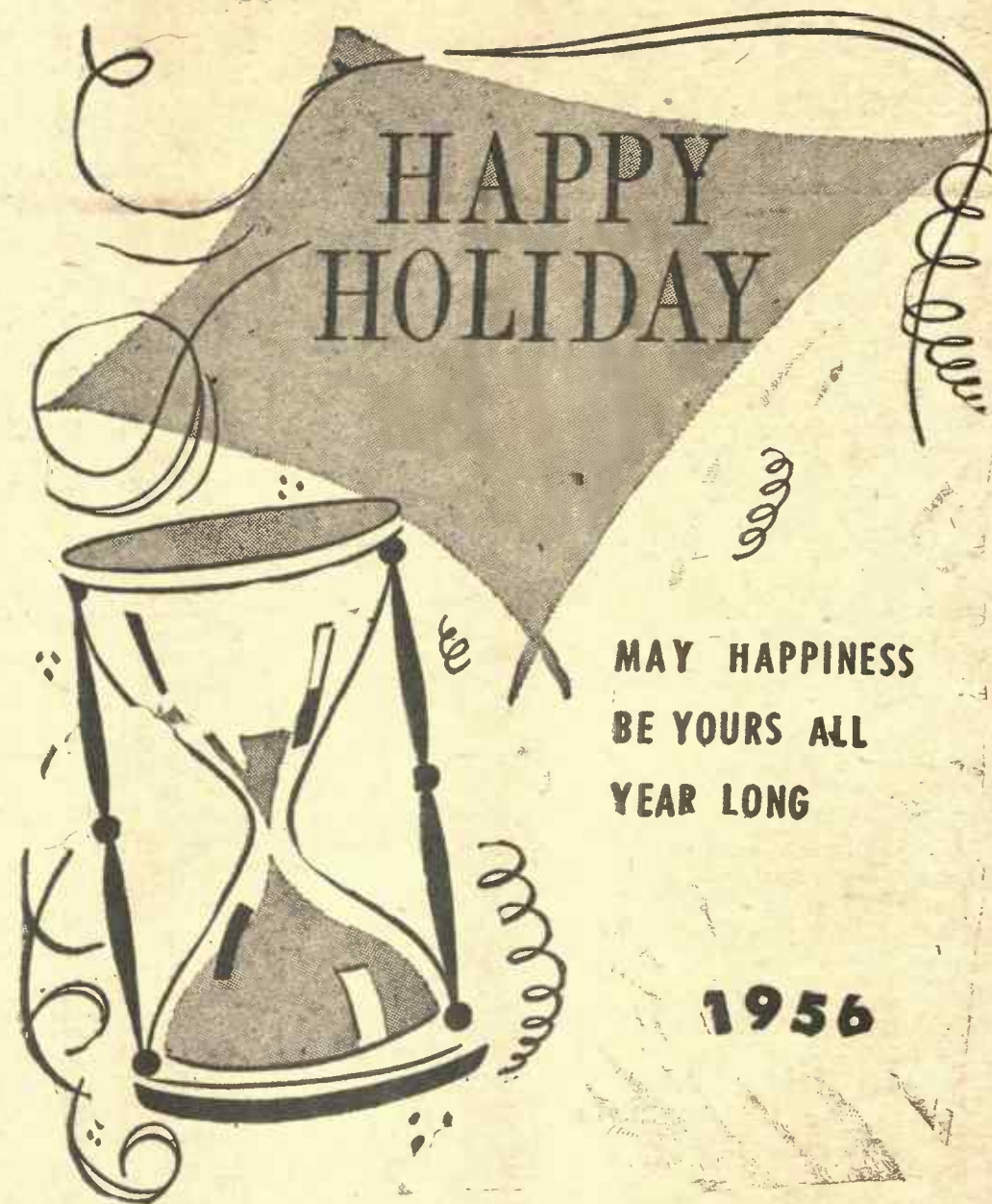

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Background Scripture: Luke 1:5-80; 2:29-32
Devotional Reading: Isaiah 11:1-9
Christmas Songs
Lesson for December 25, 1955

DID the angels sing when Christ was born? Some pragmatic and unimaginative people say they didn't. True enough, Luke never says there was music. All he says is that the "multitude of the heavenly host" (he does not even say they were angels) were praising God and "saying, Glory to God in the highest." Surely Christian art and Christian story is not wrong in thinking of this as song, not mere recitation or speech-making. At any rate, if the angels did not sing such words, the Dr. Foreman church has sung them. All down through the Christian centuries Christmas has been a singing time. You cannot suggest all that Christmas means in simple spoken prose; you have to sing.
Beauty in a Jangled World
Luke, who had an ear for such things, put into his gospel not less than four poems connected with the birth of Christ. Of these the "Glory in the highest" is the shortest. The others are the words of Mary (Luke 1:47-55), of Zechariah (1:67-79) and of Simeon (chap. 2:29-32). In the R.S.V. these are printed as poetry, as they really are. (The reader will note other poetic passages, but these are the four most famous ones.) The church has set all these to music many times over, and in some churches they are sung every week. Mary's song like the others has been given a Latin name, from their first words in the Latin Bible: "Magnificat" for Mary's song, "Benedictus" for Zechariah's, "Gloria in excelsis" for the angels, and "Nunc Dimittis" for Simeon's. But modern church-goers do not always realize that each of these poems was called forth in some way by the birth of Jesus. This is as it should be. What poetry is to language and to sound, the coming of Christ is to this world of humanity. In the midst of all the jangling, wrangling, maddening and often meaningless noises of the world, in the midst of all the stupid ordinary soon-forgotten outpouring of talk, talk, talk, a lovely poem comes bringing beauty and meaning, like a rose in a junk-yard. So in the midst of our jangling world Christ comes bringing meaning and joy and peace
Some Will Not Listen
To some—to too many—Christmas means nothing. "Silent Night" is a tune to be tired of, nothing more. The angels might as well never have sung, the Story never written. Readers of TIME magazine will recall an article last July 18 about a writer who is typical of many men and women in these times. He knows there is such a thing as the way of Love, for every cross on every church proclaims it, and every Christmas carol sings it. But he will not accept it. He chooses the way of defiance and despair. To him, life is a wandering in the dark, with nothing, but his own candle which will soon go out.
But Some Have Heard
On the other hand there are many, and among them some of mankind's best, who have found in the Christian faith something more than merely a story, a lovely legend, a song for little children, something which it would be pleasant, but impossible, to believe. A good book to get for the new year is one called "This I Believe about Jesus Christ" (edited by J. C. Monsma; Revell & Co., New York). It is a collection of testimonies to Jesus Christ, by an impressive variety of men and women. College presidents, executives of great business firms, scientists, politicians, persons in many walks of life, all write on the same theme, what Christ has meant to them. Any one who thinks that Christianity is a religion only for weak characters ought to read this book. Any one who thinks that Christ is attractive only to children, might well read this book and learn better. The writers by their testimonies show that not alone for ancient and legend-loving times, not only for simple peasants in primitive lands, but for modern men, hard-headed, highly educated, burdened with great responsibilities, Christ brings meaning and beauty as well as power. Strong voices in every land join the heavenly host in praise to God who has given us his Son.

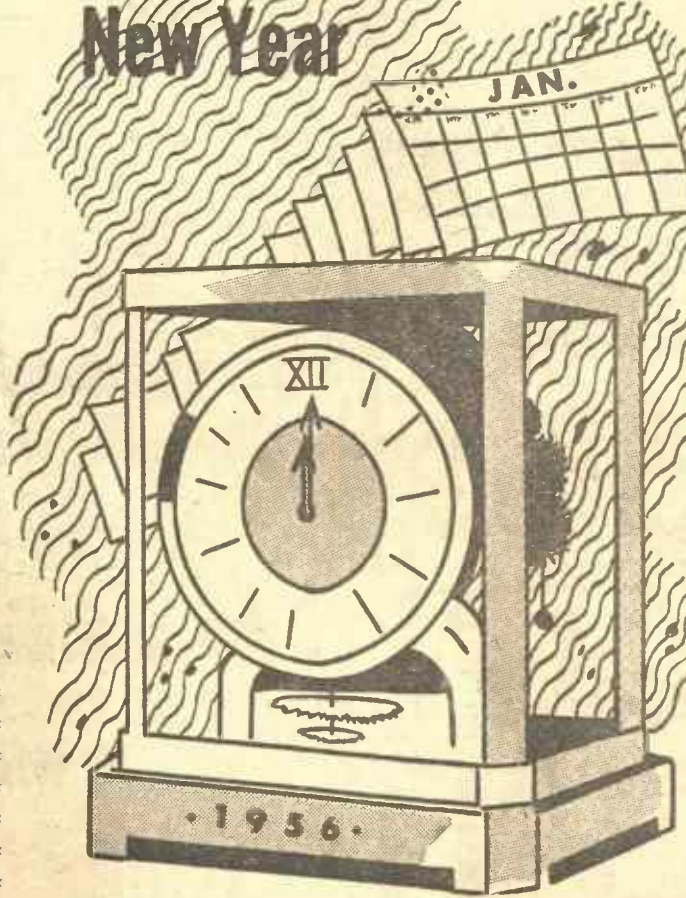

1955 A Good Year For Tenn. River SCD

The Tennessee River Soil Cons-

ervation District Commissioners re-
port accomplishment of District
Cooperators assisted by local con-
servation service technicians as
follows: There are now 451 Dis-
trict Cooperators who own a total
of 51,110 acres of land in Tishom-
ingo county.

During 1955 these 451 District
Cooperators applied the following
soil and water conserving prac-
tices on their farms:

Conservation practice applied to
the land of Tishomingo county dur-
ing 1955. Croplands, total for co-
county, contour farming, 473 acres;
cover cropping, 2067 acres; crop
residue utilization, 743 acres; con-
servation crop rotations, 3 acres;
critical area planting, 46 acres.

Grassland, total for county: pro-
per use, 630 acres; pasture plant-
ing, 833 acres. Woodland: improv-
ement cutting, 25 acres; tree plant-
ing, 390 acres; reforestation nat-
ural, 283 acres.

Wildlife, total for county: wild-
life area improvement, one and one
half acres; fish pound improve-
ment, 34 ponds.

Structural practices total for
county: drainage, 338 acres; open
drains, (a dragline) nine and three
fourths miles; open (a dragline) 29-
545 cubic yards; open drains (b-w-
v) one eighth mile; waterway devel-
opment, 5 acres; terracing, 15
and one half miles; diversion con-
struction, one half mile and pond
construction, 47 pounds.

During 1955 a total of 166 farm-
ers were assisted on conservation
problems by the local Soil Con-
servation Service Technicians.

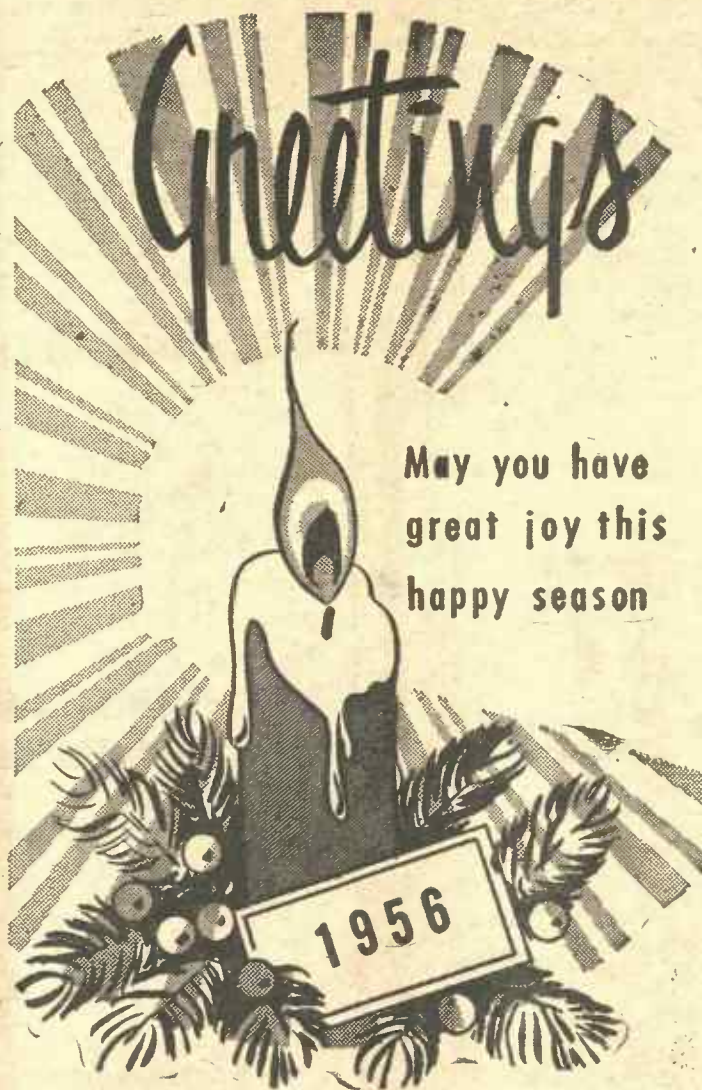

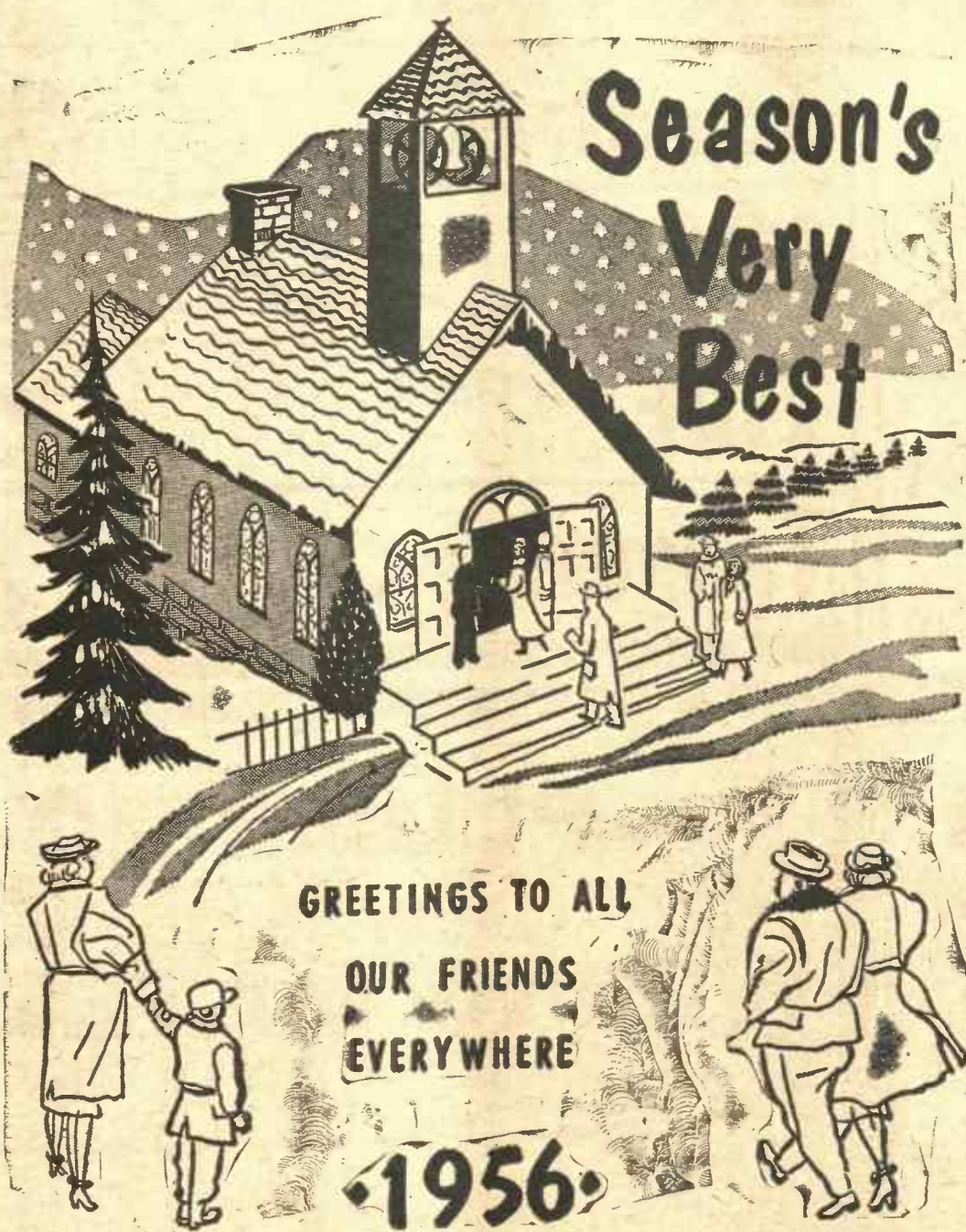

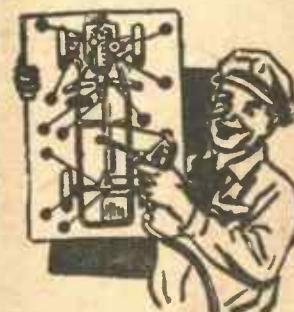
