Only 3 Polio Cases Reported In 1955; Additional Funds Needed For Further Research And Improvement Of Vaccine

Only three polio cases were reported in Tishomingo County during 1955. The number of cases reported in the state was only about one third the average number of the previous five years 180 in 1955, previous five year average 535. Nevertheless, in the aftermath of these cases, and in new cases, there will still be polio problems in 1956. The Salk vaccine has proved to be a major weapon against paralytic poliomyelitis, as records already show, but it has not yet won the war against this disease.

The above statement was made by Dr. Felix J. Underwood, State Health Officer and state March of Dimes Chairman as he called on Mississippians to give generously to the 1956 polio fund appeal. The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, supported entirely through public contributions to its January March of Dimes, has made an enviable record, both in this state and nationwide, for meeting the problems posed by paralytic polio. In 1955 the March of Dimes gave 224,000 cc. of Salk vaccine without charge to the State of Mississippi to initiate a statewide vaccination program.

"In Tishomingo County 1198 injections were given last year to

children in grades 1 through 6," stated County Health Nurse, Mrs. Berry Lee Pruitt. "Some of the children receiving their second shots," she continued. The Tishomingo County Health Dept. will begin their third series of polio shots about January 16. These will be available to children in grades 1 through 9.

Reported results on the use of Salk vaccine in 1955 are most encouraging but there still remains a great need for additional research to improve the Salk vaccine, to determine the duration of immunity it effects (and conversely to determine the need for "booster shots") and to provide the best possible treatment for patients already or yet to be involved with paralytic poliomyelitis. There is also a vast need for the professional education of young men and women who will contribute to the necessary research and help give the needed treatment.

Iuka Christmas Basket Fund Short \$23.07

The Iuka Christmas Basket Fund had on hand January 2, 1955 a total of \$69.33. Through volunteer contributions citizens of the community donated \$363.93, making a grand total of \$433.26.

A check was written for \$456.33 to pay for merchandise purchased to fill the baskets, creating an overdraft of \$23.07. The grand jury returned a number of indictments, among them being eight counts against Jordan Mitchell (colored) for burglary. Mitchell pleaded guilty to all counts. A true bill was returned against James Alfred Southward for forgery to which he pleaded guilty. Billy Akers pleaded guilty to a bill accusing him of assault and battery. William Thomas Harris (colored) pleaded guilty to two counts of housebreaking. Passing of sentence on all the above accused was deferred until next week.

Clestone Harris was indicted by the grand jury on two counts for which he will stand trial.

Criminal division of Circuit Court will be held next week.

Elsworth Sanders Burned In Truck Accident

Elsworth R. Sanders, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Sanders who lives on Airport road south of Iuka, was confined to the Community hospital Saturday morning with severe burns and other injuries resulting from an accident which occurred when the large truck he was driving hit the cement abutment on a bridge in Tusculum bottom, located about 3 miles west of Corinth on highway 72, Saturday morning at 3:30 a.m.

According to hospital attendants Sanders suffered severe burns on both legs and hands. His condition being reported "good."

The 1953 Ford owned by Jack Thorne was traveling toward Corinth on highway 72 when "Nubbin", as he is known to his friends, went to sleep at the wheel causing the truck and trailer to veer to the side of the road hitting the bridge abutment. As the truck hit the bridge the gas tanks exploded causing a sudden fire. Elsworth was thrown from the truck hitting the bridge and from there jumping into the water extinguishing the flames of his clothes.

Mississippi Highway Patrolman John Spencer of Corinth investigated the accident and said the truck landed beneath the bridge on the right side of the road.

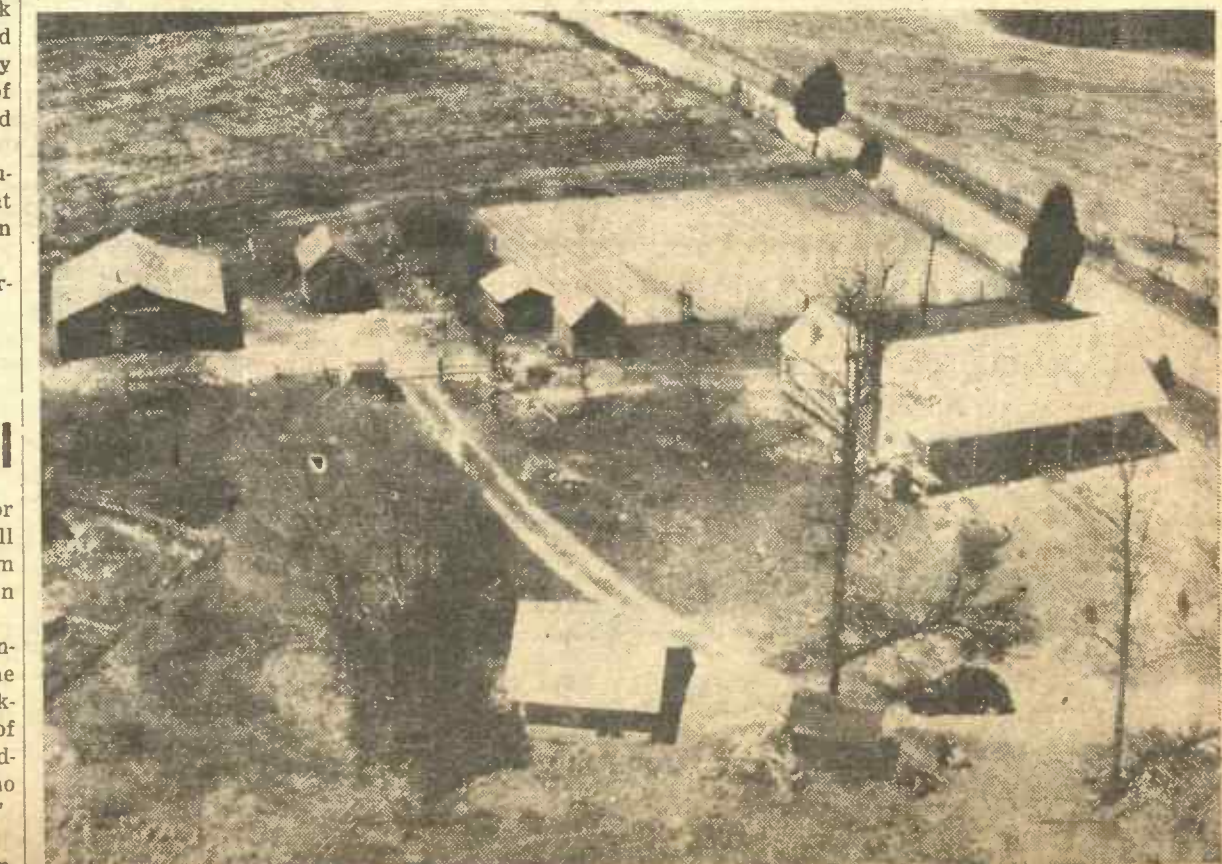

Money Orders In Iuka Up 25% Over September

General business activity in the Corinth district decreased during October to 121 percent of the 1947-49 average, according to the current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station of the School of Business and Industry at Mississippi State College. This is to be compared with 124 per cent of the base for October 1954 and 138 per cent in September 1955.

Activity decreased in three of the four towns for which data were available as compared to October 1954 and in each town when compared with level of the preceding month.

Corinth bank debits were up 20 per cent from September '55, but down four per cent below a year ago. Corinth money orders were up 18 per cent over September, and 7 per cent over October '54.

Iuka money orders issued were up 25 per cent over September, but down three per cent from October '54. Iuka postal receipts were up 22 per cent over September, and 11 per cent over a year ago.

Ripley money orders issued were up 38 per cent over September, but down 15 per cent from a year ago. Ripley postal receipts were down two per cent from September, but up 5 per cent over October '54.

Wiring Is Headache on Farm ... Here Are Basic Recommendations

The farmer who says: "I don't want to know anything about wiring; no body can make an electrician out of me," is only half right. Of course he shouldn't "do it himself" when it comes to installing or modernizing his electrical wiring system. That's a job for someone who is qualified to do that type of work.

The new Farmstead Wiring Handbook makes these points about 20-ampere branch circuits: install wires no smaller than No. 12. Use such circuits to supply permanently connected lighting equipment; convenience outlets for portable trouble lamps, drills, clippers, motors of from 1/4 to 1/2 horsepower, and for special lighting equipment, such as ultraviolet or bactericidal lamps. Special circuits are especially de-

But—the farmer should know something about wiring in a general way—for adequate wiring makes the wheels go round so far as his electric equipment is concerned. A motor on a starvation diet of electricity can't perform as it should, any more than a tractor can operate efficiently on a pint of gas. Both need what it takes to make them go—electricity for one; fuel for the other.

Let's take a practical look at a farmer's electrical service. It's a matter, first, of the power supplier "delivering" to the farm the amount of electricity needed at the required voltage. Next, it's essential for the farmer to provide (1) large enough wires to "carry" his electricity to his various buildings, (2) enough 20-ampere branch circuits, special and individual equipment circuits, and (3) plenty of convenience outlets in his buildings so that his electric power is properly distributed to various pieces of equipment and appliances where needed and at approved voltages.

Many power suppliers recommend that feeders (wires radiating to various buildings from the central distribution point—generally the meter location) be no smaller than No. 6.

signed for the type of electrical load to be served on the farm. Circuits serving poultry brooders, incubators and other heating equipment on which life processes depend, should be designed to allow no more than a 1% voltage drop. Other special circuits should be designed to allow no more than a 2% voltage drop, except in the case of a motor on an individual circuit and which can be operated satisfactorily on a voltage drop of 3%. These percentages are for the branch circuit only and do not include voltage drop in feeders and services.

Individual-equipment circuits are used to serve all permanently installed motors of 1/3 horsepower or over, all fixed appliances rated 1,000 watts or over and all equipment which requires continuous service where interruptions should be kept to a minimum—brooders, water systems, food freezers, milk coolers, and the like. It is well to know too that all motors of 1/2 horsepower or over should be served by a 230-volt branch circuit.

Power suppliers can be of great assistance to farmers in planning safe and adequate wiring modernization jobs. Good wiring will pay for itself.

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The Churches Of Christ Salute You Rom. 16:16 WHERE IS SALVATION?

It is important that we find the answer to the above question because it concerns the most important thing in the world, the human soul. Jesus said, "What shall it profit a man, if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" Mt. 16:26. It's importance is again seen when we realize that **God has said where he will save the human soul**, and unless we know **where** He has said he will save it it's salvation is impossible.

As is always our practice, we consult the word of God for an answer to this important question. We could find various answers by consulting the opinions of men. Some would tell us that salvation is here, others there, yet others somewhere else. Thus to consult men for an answer to this, or any other, question is to receive a multiplicity of answers which would serve only to confuse. Knowing this, we turn to the only infallible source of information, God's book, the Bible. It often differs with the religious opinions of the public, but it is **never wrong**—it CANNOT be wrong! We may choose not to believe what it says, but it is still right, nevertheless. It's right whether anyone believes it or not!

By reading Acts 4:12 we learn that SALVATION IS IN THE NAME OF CHRIST. The passage reads: "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." There can be no mistake about the teaching of this very important verse. It's statement is simple; it's instruction clear. It emphatically states that SALVATION IS IN THE NAME OF CHRIST. We know then where to go for salvation. Never to the names of men; never to any "other name under heaven," than that of the Lord Jesus Christ.

But knowing that SALVATION IS IN THE NAME OF CHRIST doesn't help much if we don't know how to get into the name of Christ. I might tell you that there's gold in a certain building, and that you may have it if you can get into the building. You might be helped by knowing the gold is in the building, but you could never possess it unless you discovered how to get into it. The same is true with reference to salvation. You may be benefited by knowing that salvation is in the name of Christ, but you can never possess it until you learn how to get into the name of Christ. Are you willing for the Lord to tell you how to get into his name? Will you accept what he says about it without question? The Lord commanded the apostles to, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them INTO THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY GHOST..." Mt. 28:19. God could not state it any plainer than this! To misunderstand it, a person would need some help! Any responsible person can understand it. Salvation is IN the name of Christ—we must get into the name of Christ in order to possess it—so we ARE BAPTIZED INTO THE NAME OF CHRIST! See that?

One of the finest ways to learn a thing, and learn it well, is to put it in the form of a syllogism. Let us sum up what we have learned in this article by putting it in one simple syllogism.

Major premise: Salvation is IN the name of Christ Acts 4:12.
Minor premise: But we are BAPTIZED INTO the name of Christ Mt. 28:19.
Conclusion: Therefore, no one has salvation IN the name of Christ until he is BAPTIZED INTO it.

The only way to disprove the conclusion of a syllogism is to disprove either its major or minor premise. If both the major and minor premises be true, the conclusion MUST be true. Who can disprove the major or minor premise of the above syllogism? To disprove either would be to disprove the word of God!

I do not intend to imply that one enters the name of Christ by the mere act of baptism ALONE. He who concludes that, misunderstands me. The baptism I have in mind is the one spoken of in the scriptures; it is preceded by faith in Christ Jn. 8:24. Repentance of sins Lk. 13:3; Acts 17:30, and confession of one faith in Christ Mt. 10:32; Rom. 10:10. Without these three prerequisites to the baptism of which I speak, it would not put one into the name of Christ, hence would not save him. Will you accept this plain teaching from the word of God?

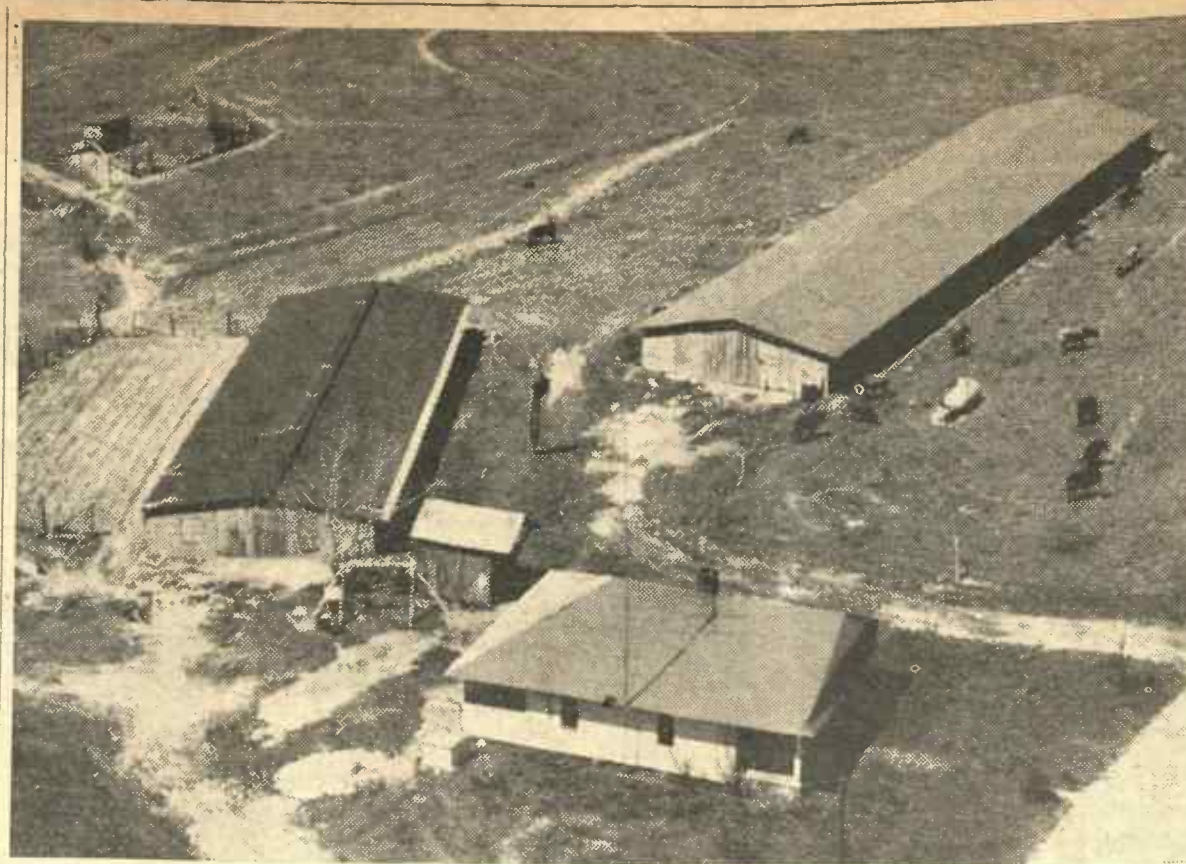

State Experiment Station Releases New Crowder Pea

A new cowpea is being released by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station for the 1956 crop. The pea, named Mississippi Crowder, is one of the Brown Sugar Crowder type and retains all the desirable characteristics of that pea and also has wilt resistance not found in the Brown Sugar Crowder. It was developed by Dr. W. W. Hare of the Plant Pathology Department.

The principal difference in the two varieties is in the reaction to Fusarium wilt, the worst disease of peas in the state. There are three known races of the fungus that can be identified only by the pea varieties they attack. While Brown Sugar Crowder is neither resistant nor tolerant to any of the races, Mississippi Crowder is highly resistant to one race and tolerant to two.

Mississippi Crowder produced an average of 5601 pounds of green pods per acre over 3 years compared to 3244 pounds per acre for Brown Sugar Crowder on plots at State College known to be infested with all three races of the fungus. Overall, the new pea produced 72 percent more peas per acre than Brown Sugar Crowder where wilt was known to be present and 19 percent more where the wilt situation was unknown. However, the Mississippi Crowder has not yielded well in the Delta area of Mississippi.

Canners in the state report that the new pea shelled readily in the viner and gave a good product in the can. The quality for fresh use and home freezing has been excellent.

The two peas are very similar in plant type but there are some minor differences. The Mississippi

Crowder pods are slightly smaller in diameter and slightly longer and the vines are a little larger and more vigorous. It is difficult to distinguish either green or dry shelled peas of the two.

The full report, published in the December issue of Mississippi Farm Research, is available on request from the Agricultural Experiment Station at State College.

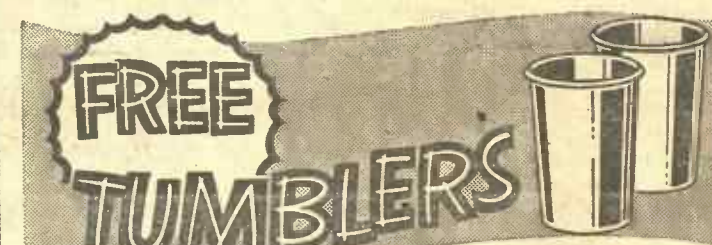

Records Kept Of Years Earnings Is Important

Farmers were reminded today

by Mrs. Mary King Temple, Manager of the Sheffield, Alabama District Office of the Social Security Administration, that they should keep some type of record to show the amount of their earnings from sale of farm products during 1955

and future years. This record will be needed to enable them to report their earnings for social security purposes.

"The time to start maintaining a record of farm products sold was January 1, 1955. If this record has not been kept, the time to start is now," Mrs. Temple asserted.

For a self-employed farmer to become eligible for old-age and survivors insurance benefits, he must receive credit on his social security account for his income. And with just a simple journal to record his sales, etc., he can maintain a basic record which will make it possible to accurately report his annual self-employment income to the Director of Internal Revenue each year.

This report is filed as a part of his Federal income tax return. He pays a social security tax of 3% on his net income of \$400 to \$2400 in the taxable year. Payment of the social security tax is required by law even though no Federal income tax is due.

Mrs. Temple points out that if the farmer fails to keep records and fails to make proper reports of his earnings, he stands to lose valuable insurance protection for himself in his own old age and for his family if he should die at any age. Farmers who desire information on the new law should get in touch with your local social security office which is located at 101 W. Third Street, Sheffield, Alabama.

Background Scripture: Luke 12:4-53.

Devotional Reading: 1 Peter 5:6-11.

Cure for Worry

Lesson for January 8, 1956

"TAKE no thought for your life, what ye shall eat, neither for the body, what ye shall put on." Did Jesus say this? There it stands in Luke 12:22. But how foolish it sounds! Christians do take thought for what they eat; they plan meals, they eat in Grade-A restaurants if possible; they make out grocery lists, they store food in freezers. They take thought for the body, too; didn't you get out your winter underwear and your overcoat, and didn't you store those last summer where the moths couldn't get at them? Very good Christians act as if Jesus never said "Take no thought . . ." As a matter of fact, the instinct of such Christians has always been right. Jesus never did say this. The Revised Standard Version gives the word of Jesus the right translation which Greek scholars have always known was correct: "Do not be anxious." Thought for the future is not wrong; anxiety about the future is wrong for a Christian, and not good sense for anybody.

"Your Father Knows . . ."

Worry is a kind of disease, and Jesus offers a cure for it. He had tested it in his own life first, and countless Christians have discovered that it will work. First and most important ingredient in this cure for worry is trust in God. Many people believe in God, after a fashion, without trusting him. Jesus reminds us that God is our Father, and that he knows what we need. He knows we need food and clothing. He will not see to it that we shall get what we need without our having to lift a finger. He will not promise to give us all we want. But we can be confident that our Father in heaven is none other than the Infinite and All-wise God. Whatever is real, is known to him, however small. The needs of the flowers in the meadow, the needs of the birds on the wing, God knows these—and how much more we his children have a right to depend on him! Worry is a sign we have forgotten God, or don't think he is wise enough, or strong enough, to do what is right.

Mountain and Molehill
Most human minds are pretty active. They are like a sweet-pea vine; its tendrils reach out and if they don't find a fence or a trellis they will climb up the nearest weed. So our minds get twisted around weeds and get lost in the high grass when they should be climbing into the sunshine. A second ingredient in Jesus' cure for worry could be expressed in the proverb: Put first things first. Most worries are caused by the things that are least important. Jesus picks out food, drink and clothing, as the things which "all the nations of the world" are seeking. Now these things are important. It is not wrong to buy groceries nor to plan a garden. But when they take first place in our minds, when we are anxious about these things forgetting others more important, we deserve all the trouble our worrying causes us. The preacher who worries more over how he says a thing than about what to say; the mother who worries more over her children's clothes than over their minds; the Marthas of the world who are "anxious and troubled about many things" so that they never have time for the heavenly Guest; these all carry burdens of worry which would drop off if they would put first things first.

The Mind at Work—on What?
Worry is not to be got rid of simply by sitting down in an easy chair and saying "Worry, go away!" You can't even pray it away, though prayer does help enormously and (as was said) without trust in God, worry is inevitable. Worry has to be worked away. Jesus' cure for worry includes this: "Seek God's kingdom." Paul writes: "The kingdom of God does not mean food and drink but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit." (Rom. 14:17.) Any Christian who will really put his mind and his energies to work in the service of God's Kingdom—that is to say, adding to the too-small sum of righteousness, peace and joy in this world, working to make this earth more like heaven,—will find that his worries have mostly evaporated.

"Our national advertising plans again bespeak our confidence in the year ahead. They have been coordinated with our production and selling plans to an extent not heretofore possible. Within the last 12 to 18 months, we have seen a growing body of tangible evidence that national advertising can and does contribute to the success of work and play clothes sales. We are, therefore, increasing the amount of money which we will spend in national media for 1956.

"All in all, we at Blue Bell are convinced that the year ahead will see our industry reach new heights. We are confident that this company's share of the market will be greater than ever."

Southern Viewpoint On Desegregation

The real reasons that most Southerners are against school desegregation were laid before the Nation today for the first time by a prominent Southern newspaper editor in the January issue of Harper's Magazine.

Thomas R. Waring, editor of the Charleston (S. C.) News and Courier, writes the frank expression of Southern sentiment and report which, he charges, the Northern-controlled press has never published before.

The Charleston editor accuses national news magazines and metropolitan newspapers of abandoning "fair and objective reporting of the race story." He says their "one-sided reports frequently substitute propaganda for facts."

Harper's Magazine is the first national periodical to present the Southern viewpoint in full. Its editors said the article ought to be widely read, although it does not express their point of view.

Waring, in his article, warns Northern readers at the outset that they may be "infuriated" by it. But, he adds, Southerners also have been "outraged" by the interpretation the Northern press has given to the desegregation problem.

He lists five differences in the Negro and white races which, he says, do not encourage white parents to permit their children to mingle freely with Negro children in school:

1. Health. "The incidence of venereal disease, for instance, is much greater among Negroes than among whites. . . . Fastidious parents do not favor joint use of school washrooms when they would not permit it at home—and there's no use to tell them that it is unlikely that anyone will catch venereal disease from a toilet seat. They just don't want to take risks of any kind with their children."

2. Home Environment. "For most colored children in the South the cultural background is different in many ways from that of their white neighbors—and while these differences may have various explanations, they add up in the public's mind as racial. Slavery is so long in the past that nobody thinks about it any more, but the master and servant, or boss and laborer, relationship between whites and Negroes is still the rule rather than the exception."

3. Marital habits. "On the average one Southern Negro child in five is illegitimate. . . . Many white persons believe that morals among their own race are lax enough as it is without exposing their children to an even more primitive view of sex habits."

4. Crime. "For many years, crime in the South has been more prevalent among Negroes than among white people. . . . With racial bars and rowdies of both races daring one another to make something

of the vast increase in daily contacts, opportunities for interracial strife are frightening. Conservative, law-abiding people — and believe it or not, they constitute the bulk of Southern whites—are deeply fearful that hatred and bloodshed would increase without separation of the races."

5. Intellectual development. . . . Southern Negroes usually are below the intellectual level of their white counterparts. . . . Some advocates of integration say the way to cure these differences is to let the children mingle so that the Negroes will learn from the whites. The trouble with this theory is that even if it works, a single generation of white children will bear the brunt of the load. While they are rubbing off white civilization onto the colored children, Negro culture will also rub off onto the whites."
