How to Repent

Lesson for January 15, 1956

ONCE upon a time, so the story goes, there was a young man who had just come to a church as their preacher. He was barely out of the seminary, and his notebooks and his head were well filled. He started out one Sunday morning with a sermon on Repentance. He analyzed the meaning of the word, he traced it through Scripture, he examined it theologically and psychologically,—in short, he laid down the Doctrine of Repentance, as he had been taught it. When he sat down, an old minister in the congregation got to his feet and up to the pulpit

"As fast as he could make it. 'Young man,' he said, 'you quit just before you got to the point. You told these people what repentance is: now stand up there and tell 'em to repent!'"

Substitutes for Repentance

So, nothing in this column should be taken to mean that knowing what repentance is, can be a substitute for repenting. Knowing what fishing is is not fishing; knowing what a doctor does will not make one a doctor. So knowing what repentance is, is not repenting. And still it helps. You can't fish if you've no idea what "fishing" means. You can't be a doctor if you don't know what doctors do. Some people never really repent, only because they have got into the habit of doing something else they call repenting, but is not really that at all. Repentance is not just being sorry for something you have done. You may be sorry for the wrong reason,—because you have been found out, or because your sin has caused you trouble, or because your pride in yourself has been dented. Repentance is being sorry but it is more than that. Repentance in the Bible sense of the word also is more than regretting particular sins. I may be

truly sorry I was harsh to a loved one; but next day I may be just as harsh and unkind. The harshness and unkindness are symptoms, they are not the disease; I need to repent of what it is in me that causes me to mistreat others.

Repentance Is Changing the Mind

Don't let any one tell you that Christians do not need to repent. Only those who argue that Christ's commands are not for us can suppose that repentance is not our own duty. As for Paul, he made it about as plain as words can make it: God calls on all men everywhere to repent (Acts 17:30). Beware of "Bible students" who try to evade the plain teaching of Jesus. He certainly taught repentance as well as faith. Now the Greek word used to translate Jesus' word (which no doubt was in Aramaic, the language of Palestine in those days) is "metanoeo" which literally means to change the mind. This is much deeper than changing your mind about what to take at a cafeteria or when to do the washing. It means, as Jesus' whole teaching shows, that total change of outlook,—loving what one hated, hating what one loved,—which changes the whole person from within. What is the center of your life? Is it yourself? Then no matter how many sins you may regret having committed, you have not repented in Jesus' sense of the word. Your life must be shifted over from love of yourself to love of God and your neighbor. Repentance is the outworking of the new birth. A person who professes to have been born again but who still looks at life from a self-centered standpoint, has probably not been born again. Repentance, in this deep and real sense of a radical change in attitude, aims and desires, is not something you can do in a flash and be done with forever. In 2 Peter 3:9 (a little book written to Christians) it is said the Lord wishes all to "reach repentance." It is actually a continuing lifelong process.

How It Works

But this profound inner change of the mind (which in the Bible is inseparable from the heart) will work out in repentance for particular sins. Some people, perhaps most people, find it easier to repent of "sin" (or what they call repenting) than of particular sins. But true repentance is both profound and particular. In false repentance, a person is "sorry" for a sin but goes on doing it. (Based on outlines copyrighted by the Division of Christian Education, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. 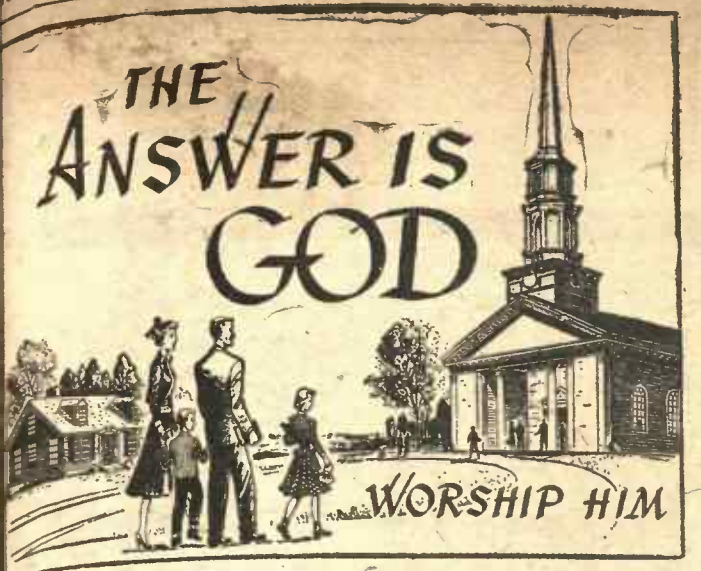

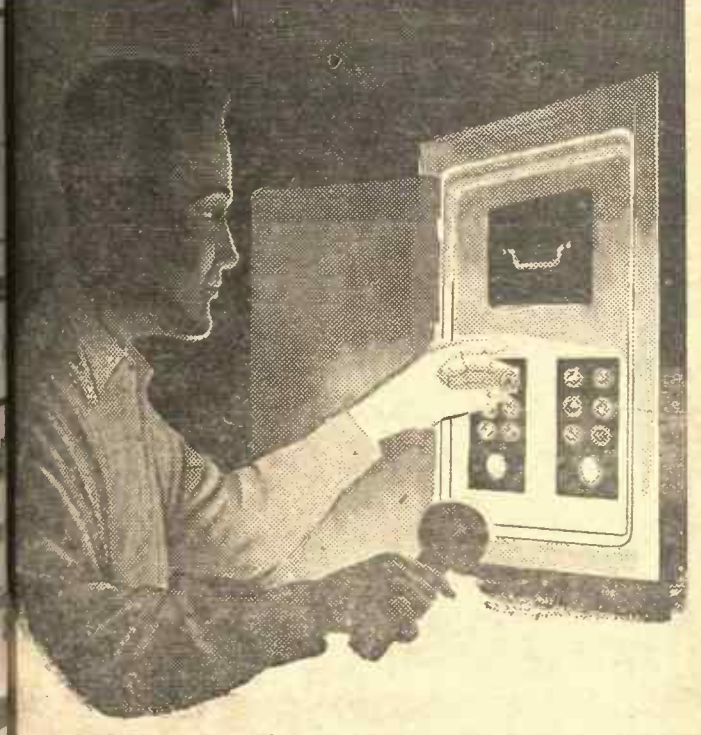

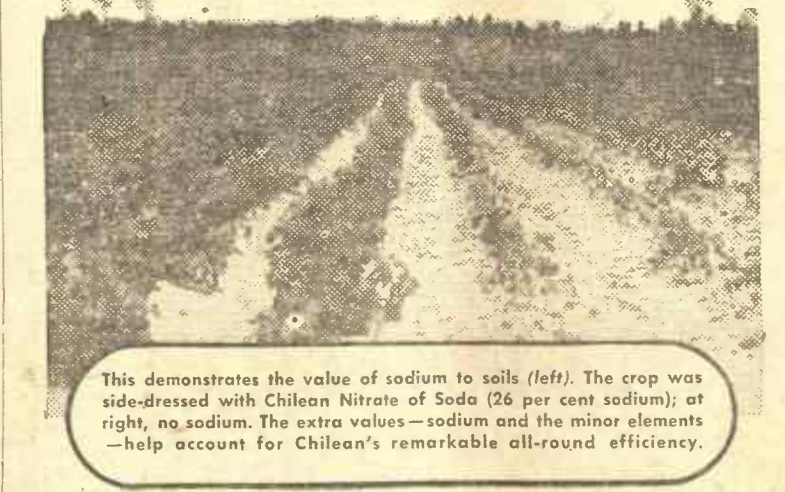

Any resident having an out-of-state tag on his car must take it off and replace it with a Mississippi tag. Out-of-State plates, even though current, are not permissible in the State of Mississippi.

HOME AGENT NOTES

 On a cold winter morning what's better for breakfast than a hot, cooked cereal? It may be oatmeal, whole wheat, rice or another that's a favorite of your family.

The general directions for cooking a cereal are to add a teaspoon of salt to each quart of water used and bring the water to a boil. Sprinkle cereal gradually in-

to the boiling water. Stir only occasionally so cereal will not become pasty.

Cereals may be cooked in milk instead of water. Or nonfat dry milk may be mixed with the dry cereal before adding the cereal to the water. Use ¼ cup nonfat dry milk for each cup of water.

Some fruits, particularly dried fruits, are good cooked with cereals. Try adding raisins, chopped prunes, dates, chopped dried apricots or chopped dried apples to different cereals to give interesting variety in flavor.

For variety serve cereals with brown sugar, honey or dark sirup as the sweetening.

Leftover cereals may be cut in strips, floured and fried. Serve with sirup and sausages for breakfast or for supper.

Sheet Length

How long should a sheet be? Many of us are being faced with this question as we replenish linen stocks during first of the year white sales.

The American Home Economics Association has worked out a definite answer to this question for you. In general: A lower sheet should cover the mattress and allow ample tuck-ins at the ends.

More specifically, you can figure the tuck-ins of a lower sheet this way, when the torn length of the sheet is 108 inches, the recommended length.

Shrinkage (held to 3%) will take 3 ½ inches; hems (3 inches plus 2 inches), 5 inches; length of mattress, 74 inches; ends of mattress (5 inches plus 5 inches) 10 inches. These figures add up to 92 ½ inches, leaving 15 ¾ inches for tucking or 7 ¾ inches at

each end of the mattress.

A 108 inch sheet used as a top sheet allows a fold-over of 18 inches for the blanket.

The sheet length you find on the label refers to the length before the sheet was hemmed and before shrinkage. This label should also show whether or not the length is torn. Torn length after laundering appears true in shape.

In width of a sheet for a cot with a mattress under 31 inches wide, should be 54 to 63 inches wide; single bed sheet mattress under 37 inches, 63 inches wide; twin bed with 39 inch mattress, 72 inches wide; three-quarter bed with 48 inch mattress, 72 or 81 inches wide; and double bed with 54 inch mattress, 80 or 90 inches wide.

Early Gardening

Did you get your garden ready for planting during those beautiful sunny days right after Christmas? Lots of folks did. They are going to be all ready for an early spring garden this year. And let's hope we don't have a late freeze like we did last year!

To make your garden pay-off in the biggest way this year, you will want to follow these suggestions: Apply plenty of fertilizer. Irrigate, prune, stake and mulch. Make successive plantings. Have a regular time to work in the garden. Control insects and diseases. Harvest regularly and thoroughly. And make your plans for a fall and winter garden.

lay these important jobs.

Train peaches and plums to develop a strong framework and a well balanced tree. Leave the center leader and space 3 to 5 scaffold limbs from 6 to 10 inches apart, with the lowest limb around 18 inches from the ground.

Small trees will require little, if any, pruning when set out. Larger trees should be headed at a height of around 3 feet and the selected scaffold branches cut back to two buds.

Training and pruning of 1 to 2 year old trees consists mainly of thinning out the smaller branches and moderately cutting back the remaining limbs just above a bud or branch.

Keep all suckers and lower branches removed from any aged tree. These can be rubbed or cut off at any time of year.

Apples and pears are trained like peaches and plums, except that the lowest limb should be 24 to 30 inches above the ground and from 6 to 8 scaffold limbs on smaller trees. Select branches that are growing at wide angles to the trunk.

Bearing trees of all kinds that have been trained to the desired shape and framework will need only light annual pruning. For the first few years after the tree has been bearing, pruning should consist of only a light thinning of branches, removal of dead or diseased limbs, crossing limbs, and a light heading back of larger branches.

Older trees will require heavier pruning to stimulate the growth of new fruiting branches and to maintain well balanced trees.

Spray peach, plum and apple trees one time during the dormant season with one part of oil emulsion to 20 parts of water for control of San Jose scale. Be sure to cover every part of the tree. Apply this material when the temperature is well above the freezing point.

County Agent news

1956 OUTLOOK

The overall farm outlook for 1956 is for continued strong domestic demand for farm products, total export demand at about 1955 levels, increased surpluses of major farm commodities, lower supports and market prices, high production costs, tighter production controls, and a further reduction in cash farm sales and net farm income.

Prices of major farm products in heavy supply will continue to be depressed. Prices received by farmers are expected to average lower again in 1956, continuing the downward trend that started in 1952.

Prices paid by farmers for production will remain high. Prices paid for feed, seed, fertilizer, and some classes of livestock will be lower while machinery, motor supplies, wages, taxes, interest and many industrial products may be higher. On balance, production costs and operating expenses are expected to be about the same as in 1955.

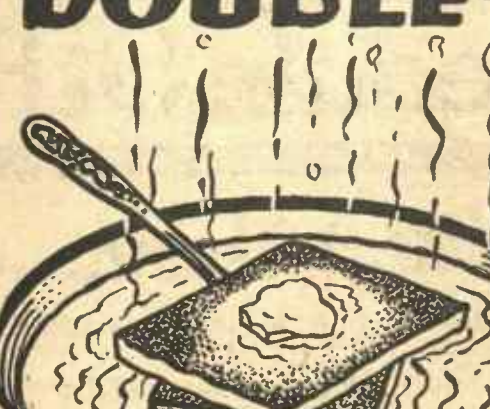

In The News

Politics is the rule and not the exception around Washington in a Presidential election year. Until now things have run true to form. Actually, the political skirmish was kicked off earlier and

with more verbosity than usual. Senators and Representatives returned with at least three or four weeks of stored-up political oratory. When expounded things will settle somewhat. Several months of real hard work will follow. But politics will refuse to be longer restrained. It will then swell and burst at the seams.

Ike's advisors and speech writers got the favorite Washington pastime off to a good start. Their State of the Union message thoroughly saturated the Capitol in a political fog. As usual, the message accredited everything good to the Republicans. It was everything to everybody, with a catch-all for any who might have been inadvertently omitted. It measured up magnificently to a political year document—something for everyone, either now or soon.

Ike may not be a candidate. No one knows. The message, however, carefully avoided closing the door. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson made a notable contribution to the political atmosphere. For months he has beseeched critics not to mix politics with the critical farm situation and repeatedly appealed for bi-partisan consideration. As it turns out, that was all hocus. It was merely an effort to stop the folks from talking about him, to relieve the administration of its responsibility and detract from their failures and unfilled promises.

Before Congressmen had time to unpack, Benson himself was the first to violate his personally espoused non-partisan approach. He ordered Republican Members to a secret meeting to discuss new farm programs. He excluded Democrats. Republicans were pledged to secrecy. This meeting bore all the earmarks and was nothing short of pure unadulterated politics. It so being, who can depend on the programs and promises that come of it or those who make them?

Let us go back to the Presidential election year of 1952. Benson and Ike were then promising farmers 100% of parity at the market place with no controls. They gave the Democrats a real lesson in the art of promise. They won. Three years have elapsed. With the passing of each month farm income has hit a new low and controls are still with us.

Confronted with a big election at a time when agriculture has fallen apart, the Administration is busy trying to reassemble the pieces. Ike's message was filled with dynamic promises, double first cousins of those of 1952. Benson is as busy as a cranberry merchant appealing to a Democratic Congress and the public for bi-partisan support of his new programs while at the same time holding secret political caucuses with Republican minority Congressmen of the Agriculture Committee. The chickens are coming home to roost.

A Presidential election year—promises—secret caucuses—politics. Ah, yes, we have them all.

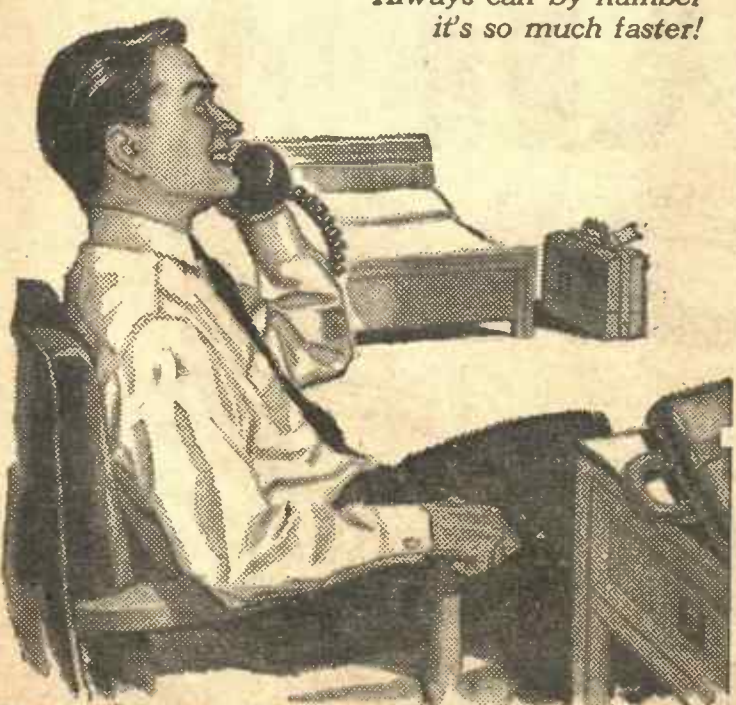

WHERE IS SALVATION?

Part II

In our article last week we learned that salvation is in the name of Christ, and that the only way the Bible says one can get into the name of Christ is by water baptism. Mt. 28:19, 20 (R. V.), hence there can be no salvation before one is baptized into the name of Christ. This week we want to study about another place salvation is said to be located, and learn what the Bible says about how to get into it.

Salvation is said to be IN CHRIST. "Therefore, I endure all things for the elect's sake, that they may also obtain the SALVATION which is IN CHRIST JESUS with eternal glory." (II Tim. 2:10) I think most everyone is willing to accept this verse as true. I doubt that anyone who believes in Christ would say that one can be saved outside him. Upon this point we are agreed. The difference comes when the question arises as to how one gets INTO Christ where that salvation can be had. Even though the Bible is just as plain in telling us how to get into Christ, as it is in telling us that salvation is in Him, people still claim that they can't understand what the Bible says about it. There are only two verses in the New Testament that tell us how to get into Christ: one is Rom. 6:3, "Know ye not, that so many of us as were BAPTIZED INTO JESUS CHRIST were baptized into his death?" the other is Gal. 3:27, "For as many of you as have been BAPTIZED INTO CHRIST have put on Christ." You may not believe what these verses say, but don't say you don't understand what they say! They are as clear as day! Notice now, Salvation by being BAPTIZED INTO HIM. Rom. 6:3; Gal. 3:27.

Those who believe in justification by faith only will not accept what the Bible says about this matter. Sometimes they will contend that one believes INTO Christ. Even though the Bible says in two places that we are "BAPTIZED INTO CHRIST" they deny it, and say "we believe into Christ." When they are called upon to produce a passage of scripture that states their belief, they cannot do it. There is not a passage of scripture in the New Testament that says one believes into Christ. Many say we believe in Christ, or on Christ etc. but not one says we believe INTO him. Realizing this the advocates of the "Believe into Christ" theory will often go back to the Greek and pervert the scriptures by translating their own versions of Jn. 3:16, and other passages, as "Believe into Christ." There is not a standard version in existence that translates any passage, "believe into Christ."

But, if we admit, for sake of argument, that the Bible actually teaches that one "believes into Christ," that still would not do away with Rom. 6:3, and Gal. 3:27 which say we are "Baptized into Christ," unless one wants to turn infidel, as some preachers sometimes do, and deny that these passages are authentic. We cannot believe that one "believes into Christ" and is "baptized into Christ" at the same time, unless we are prepared to accept a ridiculous consequence of such a belief. Notice this: if we both "believe into Christ" and are "baptized into Christ" we have this monstrosity: everyone agrees that belief comes before baptism, so if both ideas are correct, when one believes he enters Christ, but the Bible says we are "baptized into Christ," and one cannot be baptized into something which he is already in, so he will have to get out of Christ, after believing into him, so he can be "Baptized into Christ!"

Remembering what we said about syllogisms last week, let us sum up what we have learned this week in this simple syllogism:

Major Premise: 1. Salvation is IN CHRIST II Tim. 2:10.
Minor Premise: 2. But we are baptized INTO CHRIST Rom. 6:3; Gal. 3:27.
Conclusion: 3. Therefore, one cannot have salvation in Christ, until he has been baptized into him.
