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Deaton Is New Mayor Of Belmont; Aldermen Elected Wednesday Were Campbell, Cross, Harris & McAnally

Noonan C. Deaton was elected Wednesday of this week as mayor of the Town of Belmont to fill out the

unexpired term of D. F. Lambert, Jr., who resigned the office to take over his duties as State Senator from the 37th senatorial district of Mississippi. Mr. Deaton is no newcomer to Belmont's governmental circles having served as mayor the term preceding this term begun by Lambert.

Iuka Shirt Co. Pays Out \$50,517.24 In Past 3 Months

Bernard Lukoff, president and general manager of the Iuka Shirt Co., Inc., reports this week that his company paid out to workers in this area \$50,517.24 in the last quarter of last year. One hundred and fifty-three persons were employed by the firm at some time or other during October, November and December of last year.

At the present time there are 153 employees at the Shirt plant.

Four aldermen were elected in this special election to fill the unexpired terms of Lealon Yarber, Wallace Poole, Paul Moore and Blake Moore. Yarber resigned his post because he was appointed to permanent postmaster for the Belmont postoffice; Poole resigned because he moved out of the state, and Blake and Paul Moore resigned for various reasons.

The new officials will take office as soon as the election returns are filed with the governor and secretary of state who in turn will issue and sign a commission for each of the new office holders and return them to Belmont. It is estimated that this process will take from a week to ten days.

Credit For Unused Acreage May Be Obtained By Farmer Releasing Cotton Acreage At ASC Office

"Farmers of Tishomingo County may release temporarily any unused acreage allotment that will not be planted for the 1956 program year," said E. N. Allen, ASC office manager. "If this acreage that will not be planted is released, the farm will receive credit for the acreage as history even though no cotton is not planted," he continued.

Mr. Allen further stated, "if you are not going to plant your allotment, or any part of your allotment, be sure to contact the A. S. C. Office and sign a release." "You will receive credit for planting this acreage and your neighbor will be eligible to borrow this acreage to plant."

The closing date for releasing allotments will be April 20, 1956. "If you do not understand how this works contact your A. S. C. Office or the County or Community Committeeman and they can explain it further," stated Mr. Allen.

Secretary Benson's Highlights Of Farm Proposal

Tishomingo County A. S. C. Office has received Secretary Benson's highlights of the new farm proposal. The proposed program includes:

A Soil Bank of two parts - one called an Acreage Reserve and the other a Conservation Reserve - both to be voluntarily carried out by farmers. Cooperation in either part would not impair the farmer's historic acreage allotments. Under the Acreage Reserve, farmers would voluntarily reduce plantings below their acreage allot-

ments, and in return would receive certificates equal to a specified percentage of their normal yield on the acres they withheld. The certificates would be negotiable so farmers could convert them into cash, or they would be redeemable by the Commodity Credit Corporation either in cash or in actual commodity at a specified rate. The farmer would contract neither to graze nor to harvest any other crop from acres put into the reserve. With production reduced, CCC could use part of its accumulated stocks to supply market needs without depressing farm prices.

Under the Conservation Reserve, farmers would contract with the Government to shift land out of cultivation crops and into forage or trees and, where feasible, to ponds and reservoirs. Any farmer would be eligible to participate. He would be paid a fair share of the cost of establishing the forage or tree cover, up to a specified maximum amount per acre that would vary for different regions. The Government would provide certain annual payments for a period of years related to the length of time needed to establish the new use of the land. Land put into this Conservation Reserve would represent a net reduction in the farmer's cultivated acres and would be in addition to any land put in the Acreage Reserve. The farmer would agree to refrain from reverting these acres to cultivated crop production and not to graze them for a specified period



Roy C. Adams, Tupelo, Highway Commissioner from the Northern District, was elected to the chairmanship of Mississippi's Three-man body at ceremonies organizing the commission with all three members being sworn in for another term. Tishomingo County Taxpayers To Pay \$1,275,165 If Federal Budget Adopted

The proposed federal budget of \$65.9 billion, if adopted, will cost taxpayers of Tishomingo County approximately \$1,275,165 the Mississippi Economic Council estimates.

The Council estimates that the

state would have to pay \$296,550,000 or .45 percent of the total federal tax bill, while citizens of this county are estimated to pay .4% of the taxes paid in the state.

"Reason for breaking down the estimated cost of the proposed federal budget to state and county shares is to show what national taxation means at the local level," the council release said.

"If the final analysis, all taxes must come from the people, and often it is hard to estimate what the billions appropriated in Washington take in dollars and cents from local taxpayers' pockets."

The Council did not comment on the merits or demerits of any of the spending proposals.

Three factors are used in arriving at the state's share of the total federal tax bill. They are: direct taxes on individuals, corporation taxes, and miscellaneous taxes. Each is compared to national totals.

The counties' share of the total state tax bill is based on an economic index developed in the school equalization program.

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International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Christian Marks

Lesson for January 22, 1956

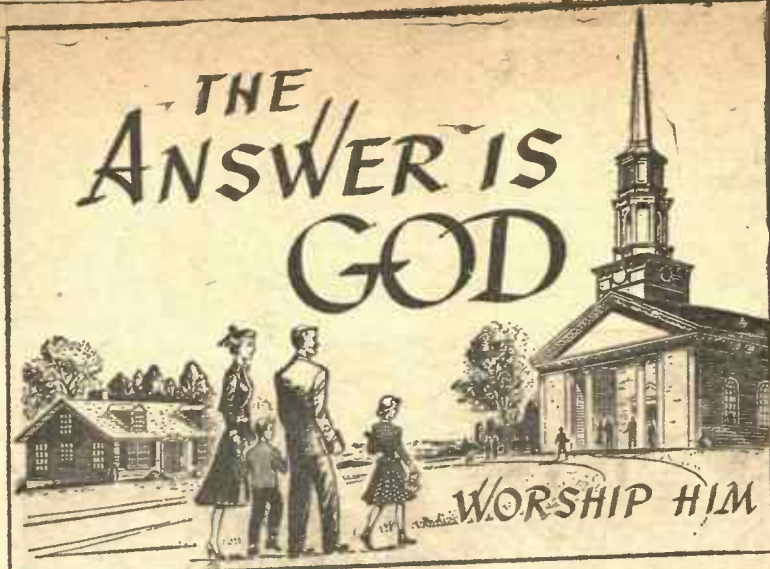
HOW can we tell whether a person is a Christian or not? Is there anything that marks all Christians? There is faith, of course; but only God can see faith itself. Jesus said: "By their fruits ye shall know them." What kind of "fruits" should we look for, in others and in ourselves, to see whether we are Christians? Only God is the final Judge. We should not be too quick to say brashly, "I know..." Better say, "I have good reason to believe..." So, what are the good reasons for believing that a person is a Christian? Sticking to our one chapter in Luke for this week, we can take note of three marks of a Christian, that is, of Jesus' followers, those who take his word as in order. They sound quite simple and ordinary; what is extraordinary, what is specially Christian about them, is the thoroughgoing quality Jesus expects.

Helpfulness
Three marks which we can readily see suggested, in this chapter of sayings of our Lord, are: Helpfulness, humility, and honesty. Everyday qualities, aren't they? In fact, you can't get along without them in the civilized world. Nobody likes a man who brags all the time. Nobody likes a man who never lends a hand to anybody in trouble. Nobody likes a man who can't be trusted. Helpfulness, humility and honesty are not in themselves specially Christian attitudes. Jesus certainly did not invent these qualities. They are found among people of many religions and of no religion. What Jesus did was to demand an extraordinary high degree of these everyday virtues. First, as to helpfulness: Not only in the words quoted in Luke 14 but in many other ways and places, Jesus emphasizes how far his friends are expected to go. Most people are willing to help others, if it isn't bothersome or expensive. Jesus' idea of helpfulness was of something quite costly, something that calls for effort, self-sacrifice. Helpfulness as he sees it is not just doing something for somebody who will do as much for you. It means doing for people who never can pay you back. You can't be sure you are helpful as Christ was unless you are willing, as he was, to put out more for others than you are going to get back.

Humility
We all expect humility from other people, and we even practice it ourselves, in the form of courtesy. For courtesy is a form of humility,—"After you!" "Please," "Thank you," "Pardon me," and the like, are humble expressions, when you come to think of it. But Jesus expects His disciples to be humble and not just to talk humble. Are you a Christian at this point? A few questions are in order, to ask yourself. Am I always thinking that other people don't appreciate me? Am I a little sore because I don't get the promotions I deserve? When I say, "What's he got that I haven't got?" Do I feel a little peevish, as if the answer I expect is "Nothing"? Have I often been able to forget my own interests on behalf of others? One of the most striking stories about Jesus is told by John, who records that Jesus, "knowing he came from God and was going to God," took a towel and did the "menial" service that every one of his disciples was too proud to do. The highest is the humblest.

Honesty
Everybody knows that honesty is a good policy. But one mark of a Christian is that he will be honest at two points, where (strangely enough) most people are least honest: that is, with himself and with God. The parables about counting the cost are really about the importance of facing the facts, admitting to yourself where you come short. Human capacity for self-deception is astounding. Why a man takes himself for a sucker, in other words, is something hard to understand. But it is even more amazing that men will think they can "get by" with God. Those excuses made by the unwilling guests, in Jesus' parable,—did they feel their host? Excuses offered to God are worse than waste of time.

The Four-Way Test is now being used successfully around the world in business, government and schools as an effective measuring stick for conduct. It is a guide to right thinking. If memorized and constantly applied to relations with others, it will make a definite contribution toward more effective and friendlier relationship.

If you get into the habit of checking your thoughts, words and deeds against The Four-Way Test, the experience of others has shown that it will help you become happier and more successful. The four simple questions are as follows: (1) Is it the truth? (2) Is it fair to all concerned? (3) Will it build good will and better friendships? (4) Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

Using a large placard bearing the four questions of the Four-Way Test, Jimmy pointed out to the students and teachers that if the Four-Way Test was adapted to their everyday living, it would create a higher type of students and a better teacher. "It is character building and if applied to all your relations with others, it will make a definite contribution to the entire student body," concluded Jimmy Oaks.

Each teacher will have a desk plaque and in each room will be placed a poster bearing the four questions of the Four-Way Test. Also, similar stickers will be given each pupil to stick in the back of their notebooks.

Electric Safety
Don't get annoyed when a fuse blows out. As a housewife, you should be grateful for this little piece of electrical equipment that warns of your circuit being overloaded. It is an indication of possible danger ahead.

Overloading of circuits is caused by too many lamps and electrical appliances being used on the same circuit. The remedy is to use a smaller number.

Do not put in a larger fuse. This is just about the same as removing a safety valve or destroying a watch-dog. Too heavy fuses will permit the circuit to operate when overloaded, resulting in possible short circuits and fire.

Caution. When changing fuses, always turn off the electricity.

Facts About Lard

Cleaning Wall Paper
Due to plentiful pork supplies, lard is in large supply and the price is reasonable.

Here are some facts about lard: It is a rich, energy producing food it is highly digestible, it is an excellent source of the nutrients that make for clear, healthy skin. It makes tender, flaky pie crust, and it adds flavor to foods, whether used as shortening or for frying.

Here is a formula for making a cleaning substance for wallpaper. The formula was worked out at Cornell University in New York State.

Stir 4 teaspoons of baking soda into 2 cups of flour. Mix 2-½ tablespoons of household ammonia with the flour and soda; add 1-¼ cups of water.

Beat the mixture until smooth, then steam it in a double boiler for an hour and a half. Leave the cover on the boiler until the cleaner is cool enough to handle, then knead it with your hands until it is smooth and soft like art gum.

Before using, test the cleaner in an inconspicuous place, such as behind a door or picture. Make sure that the pattern on the wallpaper will not come off with the cleaner.

Begin to clean at the top of the room. Rub the paper gently with downward strokes and knead the cleaner as you work. Be sure that the strokes overlap to avoid streaks. Dust off any crumbs with a soft, clean cloth.

Picture mats, lampshades and window shades, if not too soiled, can also be cleaned with this wallpaper cleaner.

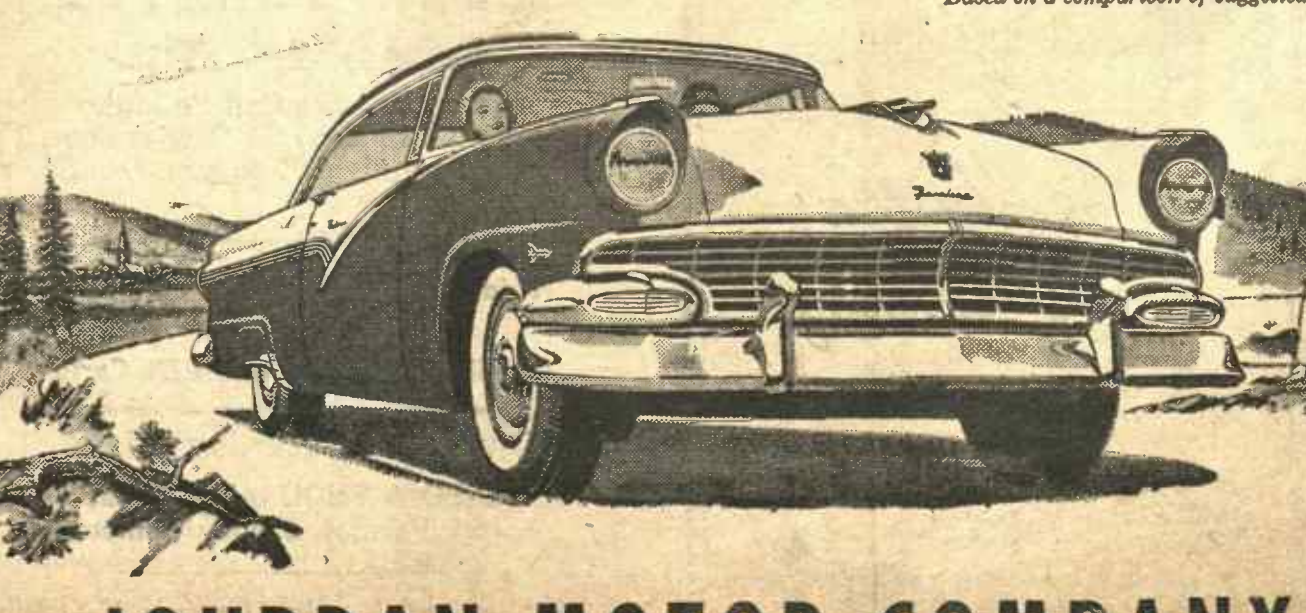

County Agent news

In last week's column I outlined the National overall farm outlook for 1956. Now let's take a look at some individual enterprises.

Remember to file your Income Tax return if you expect to participate in the Social Security program. These returns must be made by FEBRUARY 15, 1956, or an estimate must be filed by January 15 and the return.

Cotton. Supplies are at a record high. Mississippi growers face a further reduction in acres - a drop of six percent from last year.

The total supply is so far out of line with a normal supply at the present time that the Secretary of Agriculture could set the support level as low as 75 per cent of parity.

Beef Cattle prices are not expected to change much from 1955, although better grades will see some improvement. Prices should at least be more stable, so that producers can better plan their production programs.

Hog Prices could be lower during the first half of 1956, but the two-year price decline will probably end in the last half of the year. However, not much increase in prices can be expected before early 1957.

Sheep and lamb prices averaged lower in 1955 and not much improvement can be expected in 1956. Returns for wool will be about the same as in 1955 due to continued high support prices.

Dairy products prices will be influenced by the level of price supports to be announced for the marketing year beginning April 1, 1956. Cash receipts from dairying to increase some. With lower feed costs, net returns will be a little higher than in any of the past three years.

Poultry production, both broilers and eggs have another year of high output in prospect. Both egg and broiler production probably equal or exceed record highs of 1955. Turkeys will likely exceed the record high of 1954.

Because of these prospective large supplies, prices are likely to be lower than in 1955, despite strong demand.

The entire poultry industry is gradually adopting new production techniques which reduce unit production costs. The favorable recent experience with poultry make it a natural choice of farmers seeking additional sources of each farm income, particularly while feed prices remain lower than in recent years.

Soybean price supports have not been announced for 1956. However, they will probably be lower than for the 1955 crop, if and when made.

Vegetable crop production is not expected to differ much from 1955. Sweetpotato demand is expected to be as strong in 1956 as it was in 1955. The demand for good quality sweetpotatoes, properly cured, graded, stored and marketed is usually good at profitable prices to the producer.

The long range outlook for agriculture is encouraging, despite price decline, continued surpluses of some products and lower production in some areas.

The ability of a farmer to make and put in operation sound long-range and annual farm plans will be a determining factor in the success or failure of a farm business in the years ahead.

The new director from the area must come from Tishomingo County, while all members of the Council in the area will vote on the nominees selected.

Counties in the area are: Alcorn, Prentiss, Tishomingo and Tishomingo.

The new director for the area will take office on May 1, and will serve for a three year period. He will succeed C. L. Woodley of Iuka, now serving as area vice-president. Other elected members of the board in the area are: Eret Long, Corinth; John S. Bishop, Booneville.

Mr. Brandon said nominations can be made also by the general membership of the area by written petition of five or more for any one candidate. Balloting on the candidates will take place in February.

Share Croppers Must File Tax Returns

"Share-croppers in this area should be interested in knowing that they are generally considered self-employed for social security purposes," announced Mrs. Mary King, District Manager, of the Sheffield, Alabama Social Security Administration today. "This means share croppers are building toward protection for themselves in their old age and protection for their families in case of their death. To qualify for this valuable family protection, they must have net earnings of at least \$400 from their farming operations in a year."

Mrs. Temple pointed out that share-croppers, like all farm operators, will report their earnings for social security purposes for the year 1955 by filing an income tax return with a farm schedule. Share-croppers must file these tax returns with the District Director of Internal Revenue, Birmingham, Alabama, early in 1956, in order to receive social security credits for this farming operations, even though they may not owe any income tax.

Under a recent interpretation issued by the Internal Revenue Service and the Social Security Administration, sharecroppers in the usual farming arrangement in this area would be considered as self-employed. The landowner participating in the usual share-crop arrangement would be considered as receiving income from rent and would not have to report his income from his share of the crop for social security purposes, nor would he receive social security credit, Mrs. Temple continued.
