Tishomingo county basketball will see the grandest display of the season next week when the B-BB Sub-Regional tournament gets underway late afternoon at five o'clock in the Tishomingo gym. Nine schools in the area will participate in boys and girls games.

There will be a total of 18 contests during the five days of play. The fray will be Tishomingo and Fairview boys at five o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Next will follow the Holcut and Tishomingo girls at 6 p.m. with Farmington and Burnsville girls performing at 7 o'clock. Last game Tuesday night will be Belmont and Burnsville boys at 8 p.m.

Starting off Wednesday night when four games will also be played will be Belmont and Fairview girls at 5 o'clock. Winners of the Holcut-Tishomingo girls' fracas will meet New Site girls at 6 o'clock. Holcut and Glendale boys will meet at 7 p.m. and Biggersville and Farmington boys will battle at 8.

Thursday night will see three games with the opener being between Glendale and Biggersville girls at 6 o'clock.

Three games will also be played on Friday night with the consolation games scheduled for Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock for the girls and at 2 o'clock for the boys. This district will send four teams to the regional tournament and third and fourth places will be decided in the consolation games.

Finals will be played Saturday night at 7 and 8 o'clock.

The sub-district A-AA basketball tournament will be played in the Booneville gym beginning Tuesday night, February 7.

Participating in this contest will be Kossuth, Iuka, Pontotoc, Fulton and Booneville quintets and Tupelo's sextette. Both Iuka teams will see action on Tuesday night with the girls playing Tupelo and the boys clashing with Kossuth.

The new Four-Year Program, "Onward For God and My Country," is launched in 1956 to help prepare America's boys to live

in today's world and to prepare them to carry their full share of the responsibilities of citizenship in the years ahead. Boy Scout Week observances will feature a dedication ceremony to be conducted by each of the nation's 104,000 units at their meeting places on February 8, the actual birthday of Scouting in America. Local Power Association Signs 20 Year Power Contract With The TVA

Tishomingo Electric Power Association signed a new 20-year power contract with TVA at a meeting of the Board of Trustees on Wednesday night, January 25, William J. Pyle, President of the Board, announced this week.

Tishomingo Electric Power Association buys power from TVA at wholesale rates for distribution to its members. Effective date of the new contract covering this power is January 1, 1956.

"The Association's old power contract ran to June 30, 1957," Mr. Pyle said, "but we have made several changes and wanted to include them in our contract with TVA."

Tishomingo Electric Power Association recently adopted a new commercial and industrial rate schedule under which commercial and industrial users will save an estimated \$7,000 a year on their electric bills. This new rate schedule is included in the new power contract.

"Another consideration in the Board's approval of a new power contract with TVA at this time is the financial future of the Association," The President of the Board added. "Our financial health depends on our buying an adequate supply of power for distribution to our members at the lowest rates possible."

Tishomingo Electric Power Association's first contract with TVA went into effect on June 30, 1937. "Since that time, the Association has made a remarkable record," Mr. Pyle pointed out. "In June 1937, the Association had about 700 members. And very few rural people could get electricity. Today, there are better than 4,800 members - and just about every farm in our area has electricity."

The Association serves all of Tishomingo County and parts of Prentiss, Alcorn, and Itawamba Counties.

Gratitude

Lesson for February 5, 1956

GRATITUDE is not a lost art; but it is a rare one. Ten men were cured of the same disease at the same time, but only one took time off to be thankful. When you hear people complaining about other people, one of the most frequent complaints is that So-and-so was not grateful. "He never said thank you . . . She took it for granted . . . They never wrote me . . . After all I'd done for them, they left me alone . . . With him it's all take and no give . . . Many of these complaints are true, although (to be honest about it) many of them come from people who aren't too grateful themselves.

Why Don't They Come Back?

When Jesus cured those ten lepers, even he seems to have been surprised that only one of them came back to thank him. We don't know, but perhaps we can venture a guess, as to why nine-tenths of those men who had felt the miracle-working power of God, went their unthankful ways in silence. Once man may have thought: "Who knows? This cure may not be permanent. Better not rush around shouting Hallelujah till I see whether this cure is going to stick." Another perhaps said to himself, "Yes, I'm cured. But I'm sorry it had to be that Jesus from Nazareth. He doesn't have too good a reputation with the authorities—it isn't healthy to be known as one of his friends. I'll play safe . . . Another one maybe really meant to thank Jesus; but he "lost his address" as we would say. He kept on meaning to, some day—but he never did. And perhaps still another fully intended to express his thanks, but he said to himself, "Just an ordinary hasty Thank-you won't do. I'll wait till I can do something really Big

for him, something that will repay him, perhaps with interest, for what he has done . . . But the time never came. Aren't these some of the very reasons you and I give for not being grateful to God or man?

Cause for Rejoicing

Curing leprosy the way Jesus cured it is a miracle in anybody's language. Most of us think we would be grateful for miracles, if and when—; but for ordinary days, the usual course of events, we don't see God's hand and we do not feel any call to be thankful. As a matter of fact, God's mercies surround us on every side. We owe him life to begin with; it was God's creative power that brought life into being, in a universe hitherto lifeless. It is God's providence that has kept the stream of life flowing down the ages; his providence that gave you the ancestors without whom you could not be what you are. When you think of the enormous number of accidents (to call them that) which might easily have prevented your being born at all, and the "accidents" without which you would never have been born on this planet, you begin to see how grateful you should be. Most people, probably, if saved from sudden death, especially if others have been killed right beside them, will breathe a trembling "Thank-you" to God.

Gratitude and Happiness

When Jesus said to the one grateful man, "Your faith has saved you," he was using a word that means to restore to full life. There is a hint here that gratitude is a flower whose root is faith. Also there is a hint that the thankful mind is the happy mind. People who go through the world convinced that the world owes them a living, people whose prayers are mostly "Gimme," are likely to be a little sour. The world does not give them the lush living they want. God does not answer their prayers when and as they fancy he should. So a seed of unhappiness festers in their minds. But if a man will think every day what he owes to God and to man, if it really dawns on him what a debtor he is, his mind will be bright. All this—for me? he will think; and the thought will be a seed of happiness blossoming under sun and cloud. Time spent in being grateful—in living-out gratitude, is never wasted. It is a mark of the healthy mind and spirit.

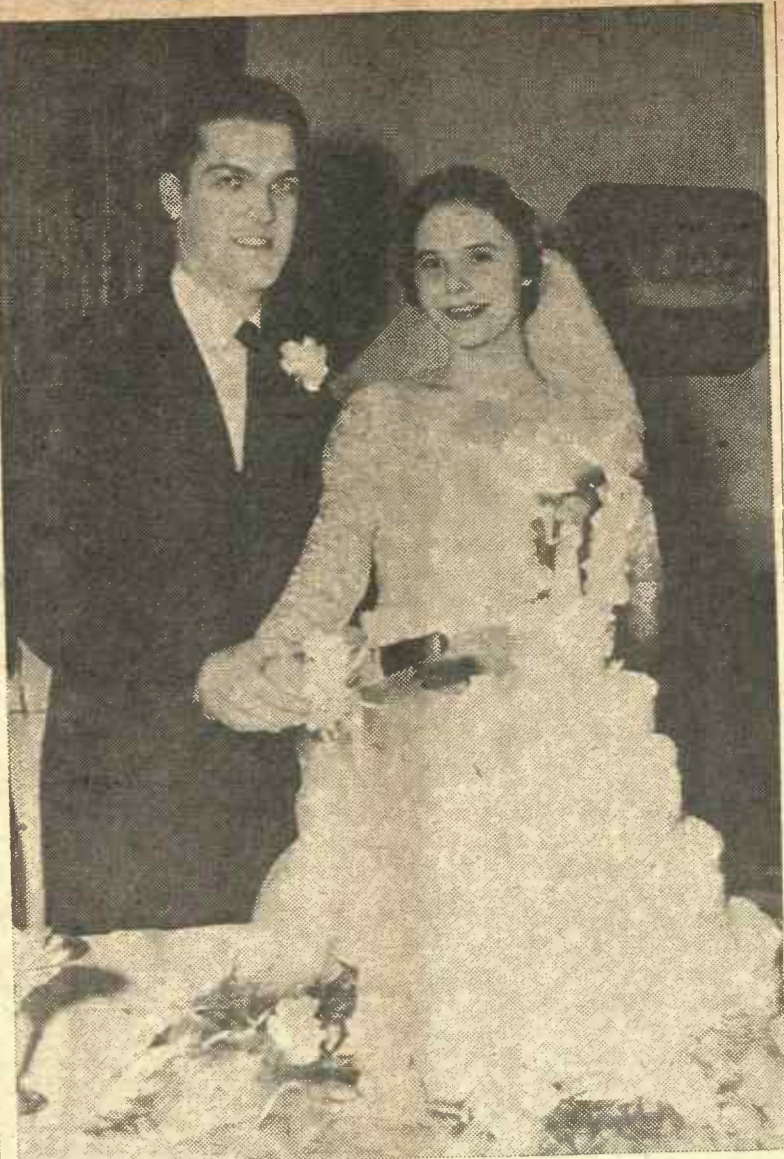

Pre-Packaged Fresh Meat Service To Be Offered Shoppers Of This Area

Women of this area will be offered a new and different kind of retail meat package in the near future when Liberty Super Market, owned by T. H. and H. C. Gann, begins the sale of pre-packaged fresh meats. The building, located on the old Mineral Springs hotel site, is nearing completion and should be ready for an early spring opening.

This new meat selling system, as described by Herman Gann, one of the owners, is "the first fundamental change in meat retailing in 30 years," and differs from the established method of meat merchandising in two ways:

(1) Meats are cut and wrapped prior to the sale. A transparent film is used instead of the conventional butcher paper, so that the shopper may examine the meat before buying it.

(2) Meats are displayed in open refrigerated cases. The shopper does not consult her butcher, but waits on herself as she has become accustomed to doing when buying packaged groceries.

Each package bears the weight and price, so that the shopper not only can see what she is getting, but knows at once what the cost will be. In choosing among the cuts displayed, she thus has an opportunity to compare amount of bone, amount of fat, weight and price before deciding which package to take.

"The meat industry spent eight million dollars developing this system," Mr. Gann told this newspaper last week. "It has been tried in many cities and has been successful in 99 out of 100 locations tried. National surveys show that five out of seven women who have tried it prefer it to the previous method of buying meats."

Meats are received, cut, weighed, priced and labeled on the store premises, Mr. Gann emphasized. And personal service will be available to shoppers who prefer it, or who do not, on any one visit to the meat department, find exactly what they want on the open cases.

The self-service meat system originated in Canada in 1923. Early experiments were unsuccessful because of inadequate wrapping materials and refrigeration equipment. It took until 1941 to perfect these, and self-service in the meat department has been on the rapid increase ever since.

Security For Farmers
Employed farmers can be
eligible for Social Security
as early as April of this
year if they have earned as much
as \$400 from farming in 1955 and
this year.

However, along with this goes
responsibility of reporting
earnings and paying the three
percent Social Security tax not
due until April 15, 1956. Pay-
ments should be made as soon as
possible after January 1.
Form for making the report

and paying the tax comes with
the Federal Income Tax and Life
Return. If your net earnings from
farming were as much as \$400
in 1955, you must fill out and file
during milking Excitement blocks
Farmers 65 years old and older
can retire after March, 1956, and
start getting monthly old-age in-
surance benefits provided they have
met the earning requirements and
paid their tax. Other farmers, re-
gardless of age, will get family pro-
tection in form of monthly pay-
ments to surviving dependents, pro-
vided they have met the require-
ments.

Proper Milking

If you do not get all the milk
out of a cows udder, you start
drying her up. Here are some sug-
gestions for making your milking
herd pay higher dividends.

Avoid exciting cows before and
during milking. Excitement blocks
the letdown stimulus. For best
results, the cow must be relaxed
and enjoy milking.
Stimulate let-down one minute
before beginning to milk. This
will let the milker draw milk on
its first pulsation. Do not stimu-
late milk let-down more than two
minutes before milking because
that can cause damage.

Massage the teats and the lower
part of the udder in warm water.
You can use a strip cup for addi-
tional stimulus, but you should
start milking as soon as the milk
has been let down.

Make sure that your milking
equipment is in good repair . . .
defective equipment can cause
trouble and lose you money.

Begin stripping as soon as the
teat cups start to crawl upward.
Otherwise, the delicate tissues of
the udder may be damaged.

Many dairymen machine-strip
by pulling the teat cups downward
and massaging each quarter of the
udder as soon as the teat cups be-
gin to crawl upward. As soon as
the milk stops flowing, remove
the milker.

Avoid prolonged hand stripping
of your cows. If they get into this
habit, it will cost you a lot more
time to get all the milking out of
the udder.

By following the correct milking
procedure, you will save time,
your cows will have fewer udder
troubles. You will also have better
and cleaner milk and more of it.

This is a growth of 193.2 miles

were improved last year.

Director T. C. Robbins pointed
out that while under current leg-
islation the counties turned over
193.2 miles to be added to the
highway system, the real emphasis
on progress was in the fact there
were 141.5 less miles of dirt and
gravel but 334.7 miles more of
paved roadway by the end of the
year.

At the start of 1954 the Highway
Department maintained 7,835.0
miles of highway system, thus the
department had a growth of 224.1
miles during 1954 as compared to
an expansion of 193.2 miles in
1955.

Mr. Robbins pointed out, from
the standpoint of roads not on the
Federal Primary System or Sec-
ondary Roads, the picture was not
as impressive.

There were 207.5 miles of these
roads in Mississippi paved during
the year 1955 but on account of
additions of these type roads to
the highway system, the unpaved
mileage was only reduced by 14.3
miles.

Tests Show Corn
Hybrids For Each
Section of State

Results of last year's corn tests at 10 locations in the State have recently been made public by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station for the information of farmers in planning their 1956 crop.

Based on the 1955 results and long-time average yields, the Experiment Station recommends the following hybrids.

North Mississippi (North of U. S. Highway 82): Dixie 22 (yellow), Funk G 779W, Tenn. 29, Dixie 33, Dixie 17, Pfister (P. A. G.) 653, Pfister (P. A. G.) 631, early feed (all white).

Central Mississippi: Coker 911, Coker 811, Dixie 11, Funk G 785W (all white), Dixie 18, Dixie 82, Pfister (P. A. G.) 486, McCurdy 1003 (all yellow).

South Mississippi: Dixie 18, McCurdy 1003, Funk G 740 (all yellow), Coker 811 (white), La. 521 (white).

Corn hybrids adapted to Mississippi have been developed by the Experiment Station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture in a cooperative program headed in the state by Dr. R. C. Eckhardt of State College. In 1955 variety tests were conducted at Branch Experiment Stations at Holly Springs, Verona, Pontotoc (2 locations), Poplarville, Newton, Raymond and Stoneville, at the main station at State College, and on the Dwan Rouse farm at Lucedale.

More than half of the state's corn acreage was planted to hybrids in 1955, representing a new high in acceptance of this research development. Use of adapted hybrids and recommended practices plus favorable weather resulted in an average yield of 30 bushels per acre, also a new high for the State.

Detailed information on these corn tests is published in the January issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College. In addition to yield, lodging, husk tightness, earworm, resistance, ear height and other factors are reported.

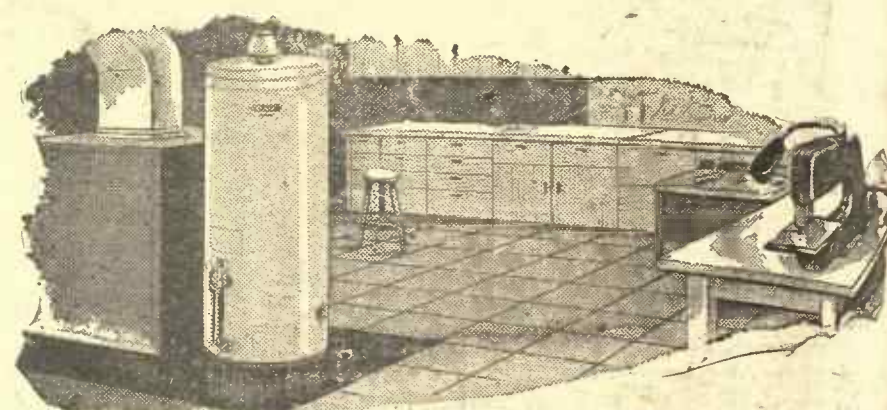

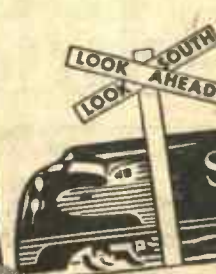
