STREET PAVING PROGRAM PLANNED FOR IUKA

FINANCING OF PROJECT HAS BEEN ARRANGED SO AS TO AVOID INCREASE OF TAXES OR STREET ASSESSMENTS; WORK TO START WITHIN WEEKS

Citizens Donate \$646.42 To TB Association

Citizens of Tishomingo County contributed a total of \$646.42 to the Tuberculosis association through the annual sale of Christmas seals.

Miss Carolyn Crawford, secretary of the local chapter, stated that the above figure exceeds contributions turned in last year.

The annual sale is sponsored by the Lucy Rowe Club for the purpose of assisting the local chapter in securing necessary funds with which to carry on its vast rehabilitation program.

Iuka Town officials signed a contract Wednesday at noon of this week whereby financing will be provided for paving all the streets in Iuka that now have pavement on them and possibly some of the other more used streets that have been gravel up to this time.

The contract was signed with M. A. Saunders & Co. of Memphis, and Cady & Co., of Columbus, Miss. In the contract the financiers agree to advance money to the town to be secured by notes at 3% interest, as it is needed during the process of paving and street improvement. At the conclusion of the project the notes will be transferred to bonds which will mature over a period of approximately ten years. "By using this plan," Mayor Allen said, "we will avoid increasing taxes or street assessments."

Money for retirement of the bonds will come from the state gasoline tax, as per a law passed last year by the State Legislature. The Town of Iuka will receive approximately \$5,000.00 of this gasoline tax money each year which will be set aside to retire the indebtedness incurred in the street improvement program. Amount of money that will be required for the entire street paving program is as yet indefinite, but it is estimated by officials that the figure will run in the neighborhood of \$25,000 or \$30,000.00.

50 Motorists Perished In Miss. Traffic Jan. 56; 35 Killed in Jan. 55

Fifty motorists perished in Mississippi traffic accidents during January, according to the Highway Patrol. Only 35 were killed during the first month of 1955.

The state's highway death toll has mounted steadily since March 1955, pushing the overall '55 traffic death rate to a near-record 526 killed.

Commissioner of Public Safety T. B. Birdsong points out that one of the chief factors responsible for this alarming increase is the individual driver's apparent inability to cope with the horsepower of the modern automobile under existing driving conditions. "Horsepower vs. Horse Sense" is the way the Patrol head puts it.

Most new cars are capable of speeds double the legal limit set for Mississippi Highways, handle smoothly, and contain all the "safety" devices ingenious automotive engineers have been able to dream up. Many drivers lapse into a sense of false security, depending on their vehicle's horsepower to get them out of jams. Worst yet, motorists fall into a habit of driving too fast.

Entering congested traffic areas, irresponsible drivers dart in and out of traffic barely missing approaching vehicles. Then on a clear day, visibility unlimited, the high-

way dry, one driver miscalculates. Result: another traffic death.

"It's not the car, but the driver," Birdsong stresses. "The person who takes chances becomes careless. One mistake can be costly."

During the last three months of 1955, a '55 or '56 model car was involved in practically every fatal highway accident, Patrol statistics show. It has been late model vehicles involved in the larger percentage of January accidents.

"Don't let the horse power of your car rob you of your horse sense."

Budget Was \$2.5-Billion In The Red In 1953

Tax reduction during 1956 has about gone glimmering. After a long long time, higher-ups in both parties are proposing that we pay a little something on the national debt. While no shirts are being torn in pressing the idea, chances are fair that the mountainous obligation may soon be whittled.

It wasn't planned that way. It just happened. Actually, it is the unexpected result of some artistic political maneuvering on the part

of both parties. Here is the way it happened.

When Republicans took over three years ago, they had strongly advocated as their prime objective a balanced budget. Later, concluding that a balanced budget was not as popular as tax reduction, they took the more popular course. They promptly cut taxes which in turn increased the debt. This was done with the budget about \$2.5-billion in the red. It made little difference that the debt limit had to be raised. The popular thing was to cut taxes. Hence, the cut.

Two years later - January, 1955 - Ike brought his State of the Union Message to the Congress. He made it clear that Republicans would soon move for another popular tax cut. Democrats, not being so dumb and in control, beat him to the move. They brought out their own tax reduction bill which rat- iowise gave the most relief to the small taxpayer. Beaten to the draw, Republican screamed "foul".

They yelled that Democrats were ignoring all principles of fiscal responsibility. Actually, they were, just as Republicans did in 1943. Republicans charged it was all politics. And, it was, but it was just a question of whose politics the Congress would play—Republican or Democratic. One Democratic Member, admitting that the move was unsound, said he was voting for the Democrats' tax relief because he thought the American people were entitled to at least half as much relief as foreigners. (The tax bill gave \$2-Billion local relief. The pending GOP foreign aid bill called for \$4-Billion for foreign relief.) He observed that it had also been a campaign promise of most Republicans to cut out foreign relief, too.

The bill passed the House but was defeated in the Senate. Congress adjourned. Soon it was to return. Republicans could not return this year and suggest a tax reduction as they did last January. Democrats, still in control, would again take the ball away and get the credit. So, Republicans took the only open course—more talk of a balanced budget. Their "hope" of a year ago for another tax reduction was flatly dropped. Just before the session convened, leading Democrats were making similar proposals. In fact, some Democrats on the House Ways and Means Committee resurrected the almost forgotten idea of paying something

on the national debt. Republicans took that up, too. Result: no tax reduction during 1956 and possibly a balanced budget with a slight payment on the national debt.

If the situation holds, and it appears that it may, the heavy national debt may be whittled a few notches in the years ahead; provided, of course, no one starts trying to get the political advantage again.

Someone has said politics makes strange bed fellows. Indeed it does; and at times it accomplishes a few good things in unexpected and mysterious ways; for instance, a rare payment on the national debt.

Federal Aid Bills Discussed In Congress

Opposition to the two federal aid for education bills now pending in Congress was voiced today by the Mississippi Economic Council, statewide organization of business, civic and professional interests.

Gerard H. Brandon, Natchez attorney and president of the MEC, said the two bills, HR 7535 and S 2905, are measures which will bring a certain amount of federal control, "since any federal grant must of necessity carry certain regulations as to how it can be spent."

"We agree that federal aid for education sounds good on the surface," the official said. "Also, Mississippi is one of the states that would receive more from these particular proposals than she would pay in taxes to support them."

"Under RH 7535, our state is slated to get \$6,788,660, at a cost of approximately two million dollars. Under S 2905, we would get approximately the same amount at the same cost."

"However, the freedoms we would lose in accepting the grants would not be worth the price. Our legislature, and our people, have shown that they are willing to pay for Mississippi's own school system, and if Mississippi can do it, we are confident the rest of the states can."

He cited studies by such groups as the Commission on Intergovernmental Relations and the White House Conference as evidence that states can best handle their own

education problems.

The conclusion of the Commission on Intergovernmental Relations said: "The general conclusion is that Federal aid is not necessary either for current operating expenses for public schools or for capital expenditures for new school facilities. Local communities and states are able to supply both in accordance with the well of their citizens."

One section of the White House Conference report said: "No state represented has a demonstrated financial incapacity to build the schools it will need during the next five years."

Mr. Brandon said the Council went on record as opposing federal aid for education a number of years ago, after making exhaustive studies on the subject. Russell Lindsey, Laurel insurance man, is chairman of the Council's education committee originating the MEC studies.

"The sooner our federal leaders get away from the idea that the federal government can give people something that the people themselves have decided by local or state ballots they do not want, need or wish to pay for, the better off our nation will be," Mr. Brandon said. "The only money the government has is what it takes from the people, or what it borrows on the people's credit. Care of Electrical Appliances

Where's the book of directions for care and use of the vacuum cleaner — or the television set — or the waffle iron — you received as a Christmas gift?

Hope you haven't lost it, for it's a valuable piece of material.

For any electrical appliance to give the most enjoyment and good service for many years, you must give it proper use and care.

Put the instruction book and the guarantee in a convenient place where any member of your family can find them if necessary.

Some general tips for proper care and use of electric appliances include: In disconnecting the appliance, take hold of the plug and not the cord. Always cool appliances before storing them. Store co-

rd loosely in a drawer. Avoid hanging them over a nail to prevent extreme bending of the wire and wear in one place. Don't wrap the cord around a warm appliance.

Don't put electric units, thermostats or motor in water unless the manufacturer says you can.

Oil according to manufacturer's directions, using the type of oil he recommends.

If the appliance doesn't operate as it should, take it to a reliable service man or the dealer.

Longer Lasting Shoes

You've had the leather insoles of shoes of your family shrink, crack, curl and discolor, haven't you? Especially those shoes given heavy wear.

U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists have found an answer to this problem that will mean shoes will last longer and be more comfortable, too. Some insole leather has been produced commercially already by this process, but the process is not yet in general use.

The scientists have found that "retanning" vegetable-tanned leather insoles with a solution of aluminum retards insoles breakdown and increases shoe life. Studies have shown that in most cases the aluminum-retained insoles outwear other parts of the shoes.

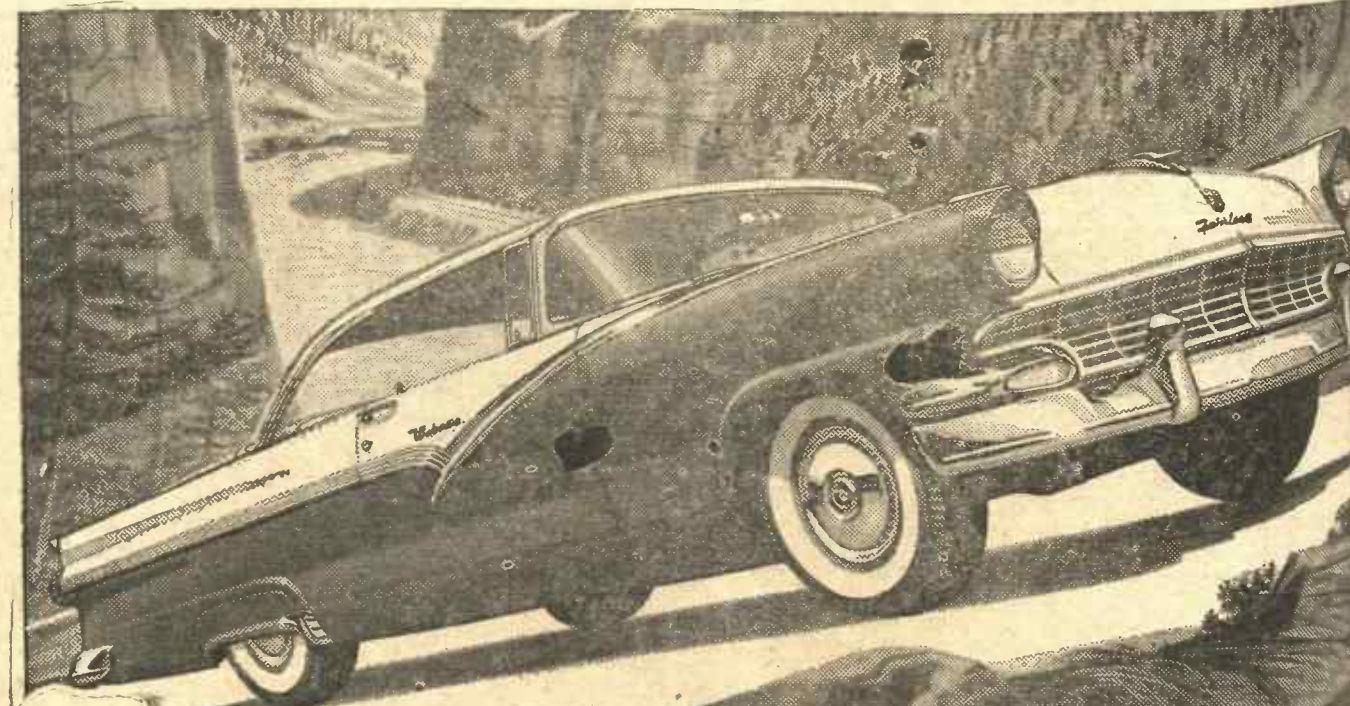

County Agent news

Mississippi leads the nation in numbers of certified tree farms, 826. Texas is second with 779, and Alabama, third with 578.

Tree farming not only assures regular harvests through careful management, but also makes for better soil and water conservation. Tree farming results in cover for food for wildlife and better streams and pools for fishing. The trees deposited by growing trees prevent soil erosion, muddy water and loss of moisture.

Care in rubber tires for your farm machinery, trucks and family car can be a considerable item of cost.

Protect them and make them last longer. Under-inflation is the greatest enemy of rubber tires. Check with your implement dealer for a guide

to proper tire inflation for various sized tires doing various jobs with different loads.

Other causes of excessive wear on tires include running at high speed on rough ground, letting the implement stand in hot sun while not in use, unnecessary spinning of the tires and failure to keep oil and grease off the tires. Make your tires last longer and save money.

Make The Skipper Skip

You all know how good home cured meat is. That is when it is free from skipper and other insect infestation. Here are a few methods of protecting your home cured meat from insects.

Eliminate breeding places of meat-house pests. These insects and mites feed and breed on many animal products and by products. Even grease and scraps of meat or cheese lodge in cracks in shelves, walls and floors can harbor them.

Brush and scrub thoroughly with soapy water all places where meat has been or is being stored. Give special attention to cleaning out cracks in shelves or floors. Smokehouses that are to be free of meat for any length of time should be cleaned as soon as the meat is removed and then sprayed.

Keep all meat scraps in tight containers until rendered.

Slaughter and cure meat during cold weather while insects are inactive. Protect the meat before insects become active in the spring.

Keep flies, ants and other insects out of meat rooms as they may carry mites. Be sure that all doors and windows fit tightly. Cover all openings with a fine screen having a mesh of not less than 30 meshes to the inch.

After cleaning the meat storage area, spray with a recommended insecticide. Here are two recommended sprays: 3 ounces of 25 percent lindane wettable powder mixed in a gallon of water, or 1 pound of 50 percent wettable DDT mixed in 2½ gallons of water. Keep the materials well stirred while using. On painted or non-absorbent surfaces, you can use emulsifiable concentrates of these

Timber And Sod Saves Soil And Water

Last fall Orville McNutt had a stock pond constructed on his farm. There has been very little rain, since he had his pond dug, until the last two weeks. But for the past two weeks there has been a great deal of rain as well as some snow, sleet, and hail.

There has been considerable rejoicing over the rain, it was badly needed. How much good this rain will do depends on how much of it soaked into the land to supply water for wells and moisture for plants.

In commenting on his pond last Monday, Mr. Orville McNutt had this to say, "It will help farmers over Tishomingo county on their farms. Billions of gallons of water which rushes off the land in this county annually, carrying the

best part of our land with it, could be trapped and saved by establishing timber and sod crops on the steeper slopes."

The Tennessee River S. C. D. commissioners say we need to save water as well as soil. Lack of water can cause the best soil to be barren. By following the land use practices recommended by the USDA Soil Conservation Service

Technicians, farmers of Tishomingo county can make better use of their land. By following these recommendations they can also save their soil and store moisture in it to keep the land productive.

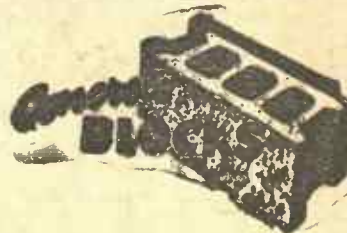

Alver Belue Appointed Fund Chairman Of 1956 County Red Cross Campaign

Through necessity, the national organization is asking for an additional \$8,000,000 for disaster work above normal collections to be made by its chapters in the 1956 campaign for members and funds. "An appeal for additional funds is being made due to the worst disaster year in American history," stated Mr. Belue. A series of tornadoes and floods during 1955 has cost the Red Cross an all-time record of more than \$27,000,000. Tishomingo County's share of the \$8,000,000 additional goal is \$2665.00.

From January 1, 1955 through January 31, 1956 the local Red Cross chapter handled a total of 470 requests and cases serving servicemen, their dependents, veterans and civilians, not including disaster relief operations. The National Red Cross gave financial assistance to 14 families totaling \$4050.00. In 1950 \$4596.00 was given to this county for relief. "Never before has there been such demands for emergency relief and the more costly long-range assistance to stricken families," stated Mr. Belue, "and it is hoped that every citizen of the county will make as liberal contribution as possible in order for this county to go over the top," he concluded.

\$1. Per Hour Law To Benefit Many Thousands

Jackson, Miss., Feb. 9, Revised estimates of employees who will receive more pay when the new \$1 per-hour minimum wage becomes law on March 1 indicate the number may run well above 25,000 production workers in Mississippi.

This statement was made to day by Wallace S. MacNicholl, Investigation Supervisor of the U. S. Labor Department's Wage and Hour Division here. He said the figures were based on November 1955 estimates just released, which show 130,900 wage and salary workers in Mississippi subject to the law's minimum rate provisions.

Latest U. S. figures show that 28.2% of the manufacturing employees in the South have straight-time earnings of less than \$1. The 15-state Southern area leads the

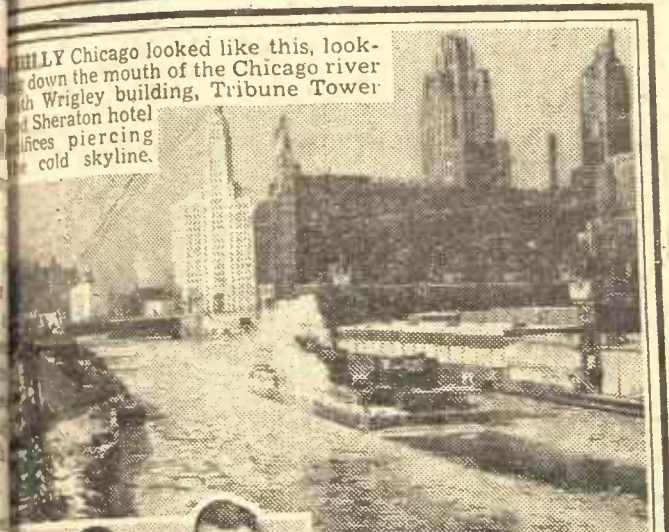

- 3 to 4 pounds corned beef
 - 4 peppercorns
 - 1 bay leaf
 - 1/2 teaspoon thyme
 - 6 small potatoes, peeled
 - 6 carrots, scraped
 - 1 small head cabbage
- Place meat in large heavy kettle with enough water to cover. Add peppercorns, bay leaf and thyme. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and cook, covered, 3 to 3 1/2 hours, or until tender. Meanwhile, cut potatoes and carrots into halves or quarters, if large. Cut cabbage into 4 to 6 wedge-shaped sections. About 30 minutes before meat is done, add vegetables to meat stock and cook until tender. If necessary, lift meat from kettle to make room for vegetables, then place it on vegetables to keep warm while vegetables are cooking. To serve, lift meat from kettle and remove surface fat before transferring to a heated platter. Remove vegetables from stock with a slotted spoon and place around meat. Makes 6 generous servings.

State Subversive Activities Control Commission Proposed For State

You may as well familiarize your self right now with the "State Subversive Activities Control Commission," because you're likely to be hearing quite a bit about it in the future. This is the name proposed for a group of three of the state's highest leaders—the governor, the attorney general and the secretary of state—in a House bill calling for such a commission.

As its name implies, the SSACC would concentrate its attention on organizations which might be considered subversive to the state, just as the U. S. Department of Justice keeps tabs on groups considered subversive to the federal government.

The bill was prepared by attorney general Joe Patterson; Quitman county representative Ney Gore, and Sen. Earl Evans, working with J. P. Coleman, to whom the final draft was submitted. Gore is secretary to the Legal Education Advisory Committee, the state's segregation "watchdog," and Sen. Evans, a member of the L E A C and former FBI agent, made the original suggestion for listing subversives.

The bill introduced by Gore, speaker of the House Walter Silvers, and representatives James E. Baxter, Lauderdale county; Hilton Waits, Washington county, and Miss Betty Jane Long, Lauderdale county.

It has been referred to the three House judiciary committees which are made up of all lawyers and law students in the House, and which when sitting as one body is known as the "Judiciary En Banc" committee.

The bill's chance of being enacted into law is a good one, considering the legislature's attitude on the segregation issue and a prevalent feeling among them that the NAACP is "subversive" as far as

boards of trustees of all junior colleges and the governing boards of all secondary and elementary schools and other educational institutions.

Furnishing of the list to educational institutions ties in with another proposed law which seems assured of passage that all teachers in institutions supported in whole or in part by state funds must list all the organizations to which they now or in the past five years have held membership for contributed funds.

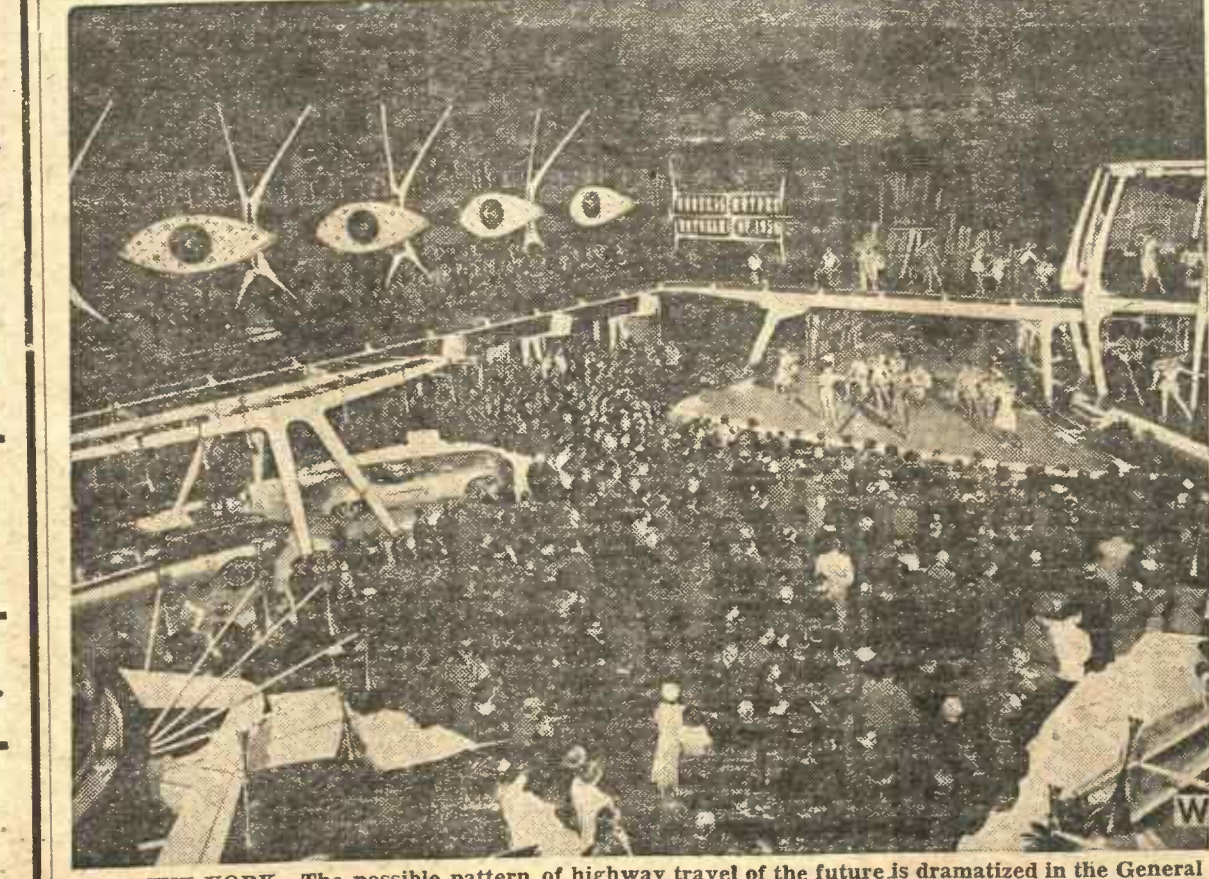

WHEN most people think of prayer they think of only one kind though there are several. The word "prayer" suggests asking for something; though it ought to suggest thankfulness, confession of sin, aspiration, trust. But leaving all these other kinds of prayer out of account, what a wonderful thing prayer is! If I could go to a millionaire once a year and ask him for anything I wanted; or if I could have an interview with the most famous person in the world with the privilege of asking one favor,—how dizzy I Dr. Foreman would be at the pleasure of the prospect! Yet God has more treasure than a millionaire, and the fame of the most renowned men is nothing compared to his glory. It is such a God to whom I can take my desires and requests, every day, every night of the year. It is only because prayer is so free that we take it for granted and fail to appreciate it. We might value the opportunity more if we had to pay well for it.

The Price of Prayer

In a way, prayer does have a price. That is to say, if prayer is to be effective, certain conditions have to be met. Jesus told some stories which bring out what these conditions are. One is the tale of two men who went into the same temple to pray. One was an old hand at it,—if there was a "praying class" of Jews (corresponding to a working class, or a professional class) in those days, he was a prominent member of it. The other man had perhaps very seldom prayed. The first man was a regular contributor to his church; the other man—if he was like the average in his profession—seldom darkened the door of a place of worship. But in Jesus' story these two men found themselves side by side in the same temple, and only one was "justified," that is to say, only one got favorable attention from God. And that one was the man who had nothing to say but "God, be merciful to me a sinner." To ask God for this and for that, as if we deserved it, as if it were our right to demand gifts from God,—this is no way to pray. Effective prayer begins with confession and repentance, not with demands.

Not to the Proud

Let us make a short list of some differences between wrong prayer and right prayer. Wrong prayer is really talking to oneself, or talking so as to be overheard by some one we want to impress. Right prayer is addressed to God alone. Wrong prayer is proud; right prayer is humble. Wrong prayer wants God to support the pride of the prayer. Right prayer casts pride away and comes to God without a claim. In wrong prayer, I come to God asking him to do something for me which will give me a better reason than I now have for being proud of myself. In right prayer, I come to God asking him to cleanse me of the pride which makes me feel that God himself is hardly necessary. In wrong prayer, the one who prays rises from his knees just as he was, for he has no wish to be changed; in right prayer, the one who prays rises a better man, for he asked God to forgive and change him.

Keeping at It

Jesus seldom if ever tried to put all the truth into one parable. He was generally content with setting out one truth at a time. So the parable of the bothersome widow, the woman who finally wore out a stubborn and selfish judge just by keeping after him,—that parable does not say everything about prayer. But it does teach one thing: Keep at it! Jesus is careful not to say that God is anything like that judge. What he does mean is that if even a bad character like that judge can be moved to do the right thing by a persistent woman, surely God our Father in heaven, who is neither lazy nor stubborn nor ill-willed, will listen to persistent prayer. We must be careful not to read into this parable more than Jesus said. There is no promise here that God counts the number of times we pray for a thing, and that if we only pray enough times he will be sure to answer. There is no guarantee that God will answer any prayer we can think of if we say it often enough. What Jesus promises is that God will bring justice at last . . . if we keep on wanting it.

Army Pvt. Gerald O. Scruggs, son of Mr. and Mrs. Grover C. Scruggs route 2, Burnsville, recently completed the track vehicle maintenance course at The Artillery and Guided Missile Center, Fort Sill, Okla.

The ten-week course trained Private Scruggs as a specialist in the performance of organizational maintenance on track vehicles used in artillery units.

Private Scruggs entered the Army in June 1955 and completed basic training at Camp Chaffee, Ark.

Scruggs attended Northeast Mississippi Junior College in 1954.

Pfc Troy Bolton, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Bolton, Route 1, Tishomingo, is taking part in the Army's Alaskan "Exercise Moose Horn" in the Big Delta area, 165 miles from the Arctic Circle.

During the four-week maneuver, several thousand troops will receive practical training in tactical operations and cross-country movement under simulated combat conditions. Winter temperatures in the region drop to about 50 degrees below zero.

Also, two methods of arctic supply, airdrop and giant oversnow tractor-sled-trains, are being compared.

Private First Class Bolton is regularly assigned as a member of Company B in the 71st Infantry Division's 4th Regiment in Alaska.

He entered the Army in October 1954 and was stationed at Fort Jackson, S. C., before arriving in Alaska in March 1955.

Farm Operators Now Included In Social Security

During the month of January 1956 many persons in this area received benefit checks under the federal old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the Social Security Act. Mrs. Mary King Temple of the Sheffield, Ala. social security office reported today. These benefits were payable because these persons had protection under the social security law. This protection has now been extended to farm operators who may qualify for benefits as early as the middle of 1956, depending on their age and type of crop produced.

Thus this area's self-employed farm operators (including sharecroppers) may find themselves qualifying for retirement benefits under this program when they reach age 65. Should they die insured under the program, their survivors may also qualify for benefits. The year 1955 will be the first time that earnings from operating a farm can be reported for this protection Mrs. Temple added.

Abernethy Suggests To Swap Fisherman For Farmer In Cabinet

In selecting someone for the department of Agriculture, Congressman Abernethy says that it is wise to select someone for the job who comes from the South and knows something about farming. Congressman Abernethy further states that, "The south, comprising more than one-fourth of the nation, is entitled to representation in the cabinet of any President, whether he be Republican or Democrat. Certainly, no section of the country has a stronger claim to a voice in the Department of Agriculture. Industrial progress has been made in the south but its greatest production still comes from its farms."

"All major crops are produced in the south—cotton, corn, wheat, milk, fruit, rice, hogs, cattle, poultry, sugar, nuts, soybeans, tobacco, wool, vegetables, small grain, forest products, etc. It is the leader in food and fiber production. Eliminate southern agriculture and the nation would collapse. To eliminate that of any other section of similar proportions would be serious but not fatal."

The Department of Agriculture is headed by a Secretary, an Under Secretary and three Assistant Secretaries. The Secretary is a native of Idaho and a resident of Utah. The Under Secretary is from St. Louis. The three Assistant Secretaries are from Indiana, Oregon and Iowa, respectively. They know very little about southern agriculture.

On October 6, 1955 when it was well known that one of the Assistants (James A. McConnell of New York) was resigning, this writer called to the attention of Secretary Benson the importance of southern agriculture to the nation's health and economy and urged him to nominate a southerner for the vacancy. Six days later Benson replied saying he would keep the suggestion "in mind". He kept it in mind just long enough to recommend a man from Iowa.

"Eisenhower received a big vote in the south. He carried several states and ran a good second in the others. Based on this alone and to say nothing of the importance of its agriculture to the health and economy of the nation, the south is entitled to a top level seat in the high councils of the Federal government."

"In this administration the south is without a voice at cabinet level. It does not have a voice as an assistant secretary of Agriculture. In fact, it does not have a voice as an assistant secretary of anything. In fact, it has only one little wee voice as an assistant to an assistant. So, this leaves the south just as completely beyond the realm of consideration, position and influence in this administration as though it did not exist."

"After a thorough search, the Library of Congress says that from among all of the cabinet officers, their under secretaries, assistant secretaries and assistants to the assistants, they found only one southerner. He is an unknown Special Assistant for Fisheries and Wildlife to the Under Secretary of State. His duty is to formulate and coordinate policy of the United States in the field of international fisheries."

"While we of the south appreciate this extraordinary recognition, we can't help but feel that it is of questionable benefit. On the other hand, it could be that these international fish are very important to the south, so maybe we should not appear to be ungrateful. We would, however, like to swap this fish expert off for someone who knows a little something about cotton."

To The People Of Tishomingo County:

Arriving in Jackson on January 2, work was not begun until after the Governor Inauguration which was held on January 17. Shortly thereafter work was begun and we first passed the recall law.

The committees were appointed by the speaker of the house. I was given 5 duties, including the Education and Agriculture Committees. We have had a number of educational bills to appear before us and I am very grateful to our superintendents and principals who have been a great help to you and me. I send them a copy of all the bills and they in turn study and recommend them to me.

The segregation bill received the approval of the house by a vote of 100 to 1 with no controversy. A majority of the discussion was on wordage of the measures and technicalities. The bills would:

1. Forbid interference with Mississippi rights under cover of federal authority.
2. Forbid stirring up integration lawsuits.
3. Permit persons to choose customers and clients.
4. Forbid disturbance of the peace in public places.

The Homestead Exemption bill will soon be brought before the house to make it permanent. By doing this it will be added to the state constitution.
