A large strong Nat. Guard, composed of volunteer citizen-soldiers, is the most in the way of money we can get for our money. Men give their country more in protection than they receive in dollars. Another thing, the spirit of service which is the tradition of the National Guard, the very best tradition of our country way of life. Very probably our historic preference for a job voluntarily before it is thrust upon us, without choice, is much for our strength. The success of the voluntary matters military is

forcefully illustrated by the fact that the National Guard, with its oldest military organization in our Nation. Its history dates back over more than 300 years, well before the Revolutionary War. And from the Revolution on, Guardsmen have fought for their country in every conflict in which it was engaged.

The peacetime service of the National Guard is also impressive. We know of its work in time of emergency and disaster in this state. The Guard served valiantly, too, at the San Francisco earthquake, the Galveston and Johnstown floods, at Texas City, in hurricanes on the East Coast, blizzards in the Plains States. The list is long.

Now, at the request of Congress, and to meet a need for the particular kind of service which only the National Guard can offer, the Guard must increase its strength. Appropriately, the day chosen for its big recruitment drive falls on the birthday anniversary of the founder of our Nation. Thus is symbolized, if a symbol is needed, the essential character of the National Guard in the affairs of our country. Its coming campaign deserves our support.

Children Drink 5,000,000 More Bottles Of Milk

School children of Mississippi have drunk almost 5,000,000 more half pints of milk through December of this school year than through the same period last year. W. S. Griffin, State Supervisor of the School Lunch Program, explained that most of the increase is a result of the Special Milk Program which started last year. Through this period, his office disbursed to the schools of the state \$842,765.50 under the School Lunch Program and \$274,024.87 under the Special School Milk Program.

Harry Lee Neal a Tennessean is a brilliant and versatile young artist who has marked himself in many fields. In high school, he distinguished himself by winning Tennessee and Kentucky state contests as a pianist and orator.

It was in college that he became one of the youngest radio announcers in the country. In competition with pianists from all over the world, he was awarded one of the coveted scholarships to the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia to study with the renowned pedagogue, Mme. Isabella Vengerova.

About this time, he fell in love with Allison Nelson, a fellow student, and they began playing two pianos together. Shortly afterwards, they began their Philadelphia television series and were married. Today, Harry Neal's two-piano transcriptions are ranked among the best in the field.

Sen. Eastland Inserts Cotton Allotment In Senate's Current Farm Bill

Shortly before the 1 AM adjournment of the Senate Agriculture Committee Friday morning, Senator James O. Eastland inserted the small farmer amendment offered by Senator Stennis into the Farm Bill.

The amendment, which was a refinement of the old Stennis-Eastland amendment, provided that 1% of the national cotton allotment should be set up in an acreage reserve to bring every cotton farmer up to a minimum of 4 acres, or his highest average planted acres for the past three years. The 1% acreage reserve amounts to 174,300 acres. The State Committee would be required to set aside 3% of the state allotment to supplement the National Reserve. These hardship acres would be allocated by the Secretary of Agriculture to each state on a basis of need. The Southeastern States would, of course, be the beneficiary of the larger part of this acreage.

In connection with the adoption of the amendment, Senator Eastland stated: "The purpose of the legislation is to make the drastic acreage reductions of the last two years less onerous upon the small farmers. These farmers have been hurt as a result of the drastic reductions in cotton acreage, and it is believed that the present amendment will alleviate this hardship to a great extent."

Man Can Choose

Lesson for February 19, 1956

THE difference between man and the other animals is not in one thing but in many things. But one of the most important facts about man is his power of choice. Some little creatures of the sea just sit in one place their life long. Others drift with the tides. Higher animals like dogs and horses make some choices; but only man makes, or can make, the enormous number of decisions that every man makes, and only man can make choices that have the far-ranging results that human choices sometimes have. A dog does not decide what time he will Dr. Foreman get up; but man sets an alarm clock. A dog does not select his breakfast; man does (or would like to). A human being decides what to wear, where to work, whom to marry, whether to have children, whether to be a good citizen or no citizen at all. He selects a school or college, he selects his friends, he picks out a lot in the cemetery, he makes a will. Man is the choosing animal. And he is this because he is more than body. He is mind and soul.

When Choices Are Important

Everybody knows that some choices are more important than others. At least everybody should know this; but for some reason, people will put more thought into trifling decisions than they do into big ones. People need to learn what is important and what is not. A woman who had had a nervous breakdown told the writer that it all started when she couldn't make up her mind which of two hats to buy. One was only one dollar more than the other, and she could afford the dollar. But she actually lay awake all night worrying about whether she had a moral right to spend that extra dollar when there were so many people in the world. So she worried herself right into a sanitarium because she built up a trifling decision into a Terrific Problem. What makes a choice important? Surely a choice that lasts a long time is more important than one that makes a difference only a few hours or days. A choice that affects one's whole life is more important than one that affects only one part of it. A choice that lasts beyond this life into the next, a choice for eternity, is surely the most important of all.

Choosing Christ

Becoming a Christian can be described in various ways: one of the most meaningful is "choosing Christ." Jesus himself used to say "Believe in me" or "Follow me," which mean much the same thing. Choosing, or believing in Christ, is much more than just adding certain beliefs to whatever else you happen to believe. It is more than adding one more person to a list of persons you already admire. Choosing Christ is a far more profound thing. Real choice of Christ involves a turning-about of the whole personality. The captain of a ship headed north does not merely believe that North exists; he heads the ship that way, he keeps it moving toward the north star. He turns the helm of his life toward him, he keeps moving in the direction of Christ the "Morning Star." If that rich young man whom Jesus loved had followed instead of turning away, who knows what a changed man he would have been? We do know that the dishonest graffer Zacchaeus, a man of whom his neighbors could have expected little good, once he let Jesus into his life, was a radically different man.

Time and Eternity

Choice for Christ is a choice for a lifetime; so is choice against him. It is not a choice you make once and that's an end of it. It is a choice that has to be made again and again day by day. Every day brings you some moment of decision, where the way you decide is really a choice for Christ or against him. Deciding for Christ affects all your other decisions. For now you are his, and all your life's course is steered by his star. More than this: decision for Christ is a choice for Eternity. You enter the life beyond as his friend, or not his friend. He is the Light of the world. To turn from him is to choose the dark. "There are only two roads through life: with him, or without him. There are only two ends of life: with him, in the light, or without him, in the dark. The light is his gift; but the choice is your own."

trustees set by law for the first Saturday in March, which is March 3 of this year.

The law on school trustees election was changed in many respects by the 1953 Extraordinary Session of the Legislature, according to Mr. Tubb. The petition and or appointment method was repealed. Trustees are elected by the qualified electors of the school district in a meeting held at the school house between the hours of 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. on the first Saturday of March. This election does not include municipal separate district trustees who are named by the governing authorities of the municipality, nor in counties organized on the county-wide district plan where the county board of education is the board of trustees for the county-wide district.

The importance of selecting good men and women to serve as school trustees cannot be overemphasized. Although this position carries with it no financial remuneration; nevertheless, it carries a responsibility that is felt in every home in the school district and may result in the progress of public education in school communities for years to come.

County Agent news

Protect V/inter Grazing

Where land is boggy cattle should be kept off winter grazing areas. If left on, they are likely to trample and destroy more grazing than they eat.

Sod seeded areas will stand more grazing when wet than will other areas. This should also be protected from overgrazing.

Small grain areas to be saved for grain harvest should be nitrated during the first half of March. Where only grazing is wanted, the nitrating should be done during the later part of February.

Tomato Plant Growers

All tomato plant growers who intend to sell or ship tomato plants this year, must have them inspected by the State Plant Board before they can be sold.

For inspections, growers should apply to the nearest Board inspector, who is located at Booneville, or write the State Plant Board at State College.

The rootknot nematode is a serious tomato pest. Plants infested with nematodes cannot be sold, so

growers are urged to be certain that the soil used in plant beds is nematode free, or has been treated for nematode control. This control can be accomplished by using D-D. For specific information consult your County Agent.

The State Plant Board prohibits out-of-state grown tomato plants from being either sold or shipped into Mississippi. This is to protect Mississippi tomato growers from late blight.

Poultry

Have you booked your chick orders? Most successful poultrymen booked theirs last fall for February delivery. If you haven't,

arrangements should be made now. February and March chicks develop into pullets that will go into production next fall when prices are seasonally high.

Here is how to make sure of what you are buying. Get a copy of the Mississippi Chick Buyers Guide, it is free at the County Agent's Office. It lists hatcheries that are cooperating with the Mississippi Poultry Improvement plan. Chicks for sale at these hatcheries are quality chicks. They are of U. S. Approved or Certified breeding. They are U. S. Pullorum Typhoid Passed or Clean.

Buy your chicks as close to home as possible. Shipping hazards increase with distance.

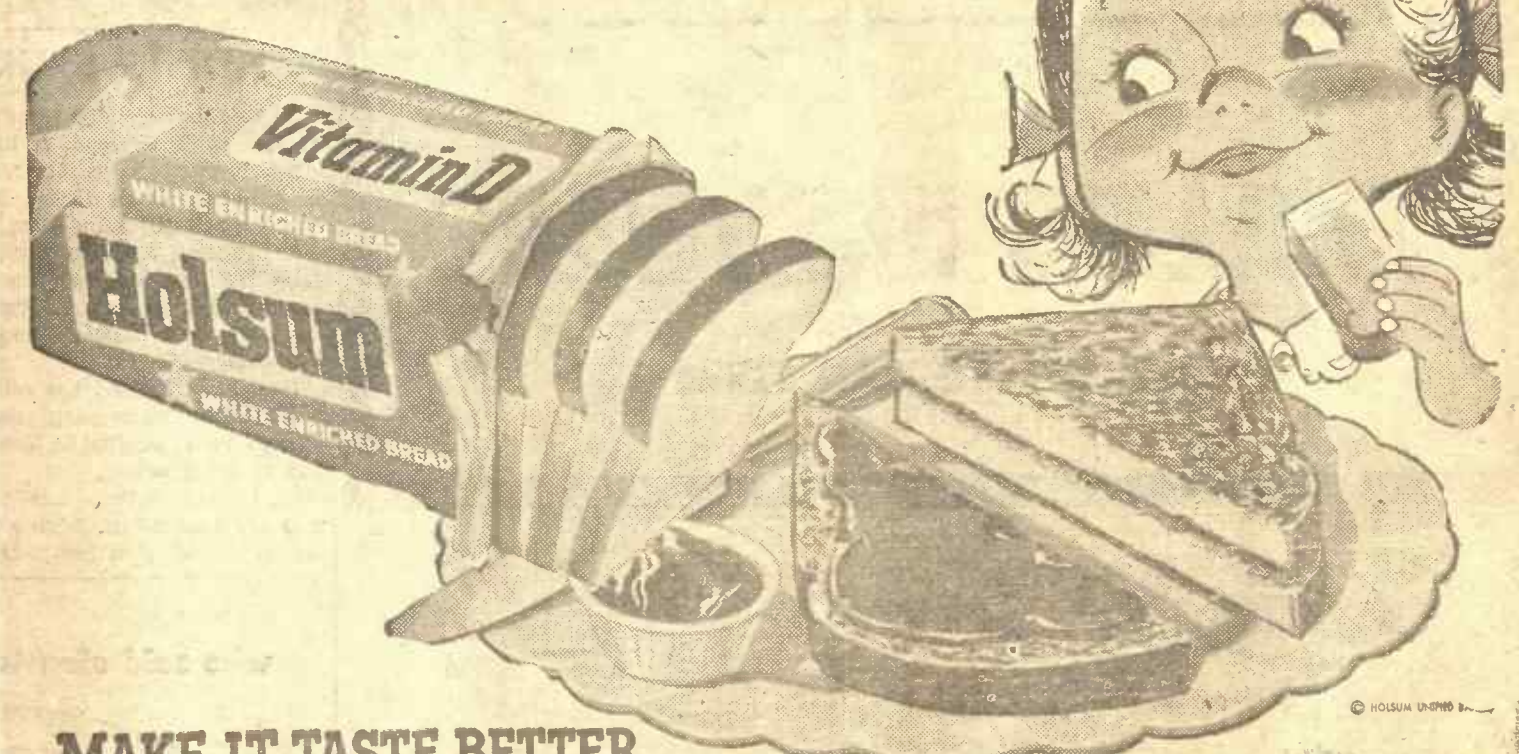

Harold Hendrix
Rewarded for Good
Land TreatmentBy
Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Con-

Mr. Harold Hendrix of Gravel Hill community, Tishomingo county, produced (11) bales of cotton on (6) six acres of well drained branch bottom land in 1955.

Tishomingo Countians will remember 1955 as a good crop year, but a yield of nearly two bales of cotton per acre on six acres is outstanding, and deserves the praise and recognition of all who work with the land.

On a steep three acre hillside

west of their cotton field Harold and his father, Mr. Chester Hendrix, have planted Sericea. There is an excellent stand of Sericea on these three acres. It is being used for pasture. Harold says their livestock seem to relish it as pasture and that their mules and cows eat the Sericea pasture clippings saved for hay.

Mr. Hendrix plans to sow more Sericea this spring around and above his stock pond, and will probably seed to Sericea and Bahia grass an area in the extreme northwest part of their pasture.

Along the east side of the Hendrix farm is a hill field almost too steep for continuous cultivation, but because their farm is small, only 50 acres, they need to tend this land. In 1955 this field was planted to corn and yield-

ed approximately 40 bushels of corn per acre. This is far above the county average yield of corn per acre, which included yields from hill and bottom land.

What did Mr. Hendrix do to obtain such high crop yields? First and most important of all Harold's father, Mr. Chester Hendrix, taught Harold to love the land to use all improved farming methods and techniques in improving and caring for his land. With this attitude toward the soil it was and is only natural for Harold to use good judgment and apply sound land-use practices.

Naturally he selected the best cotton land for his cotton. He could not plant much cotton if he complied with the reduction program so he planted it on the best cotton land he had followed the county agricultural agents recommendations as to variety, fertilization, culture and insect control.

Mr. Hendrix is very careful about maintaining the terraces on his cultivated hill land. He uses mules and cultivates these steeper fields on the contour regardless of how crooked the rows are.

Heavy fertilization causes both cotton and corn to grow fast and cover the land soon. All of this great mass of cotton and corn stalks are plowed into the land to form organic matter. This organic matter helps to keep his soil alive and more porous so more water soaks into the land.

Soil Conservation Service Technicians and SCD Commissioners recommend crop residue utilization, terracing, contour farming and the use of Sericea on steep land for pasture. By doing all the practices Harold has been rewarded with high crop yields and improved cropland.

New Measure
Now Added To
Cotton Studies

Mills are becoming more interested in the quality of cotton they buy and for that reason the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station has added a measure of fineness to the qualities on which cotton varieties are compared.

For a number of years varieties have been compared as to yield, lint percentage, staple length, boll size and money value per acre. Last year, for the first time, the "micronaire" index rating comparing relative fineness was added to the list in the Delta studies.

According to this index of fineness the varieties ranged from the fairly coarse Bobshaw 1A to the fine Stoneville 2-B. Fineness was found to vary considerably between locations, with varieties being finer at Tunica than at Stoneville.

Tests were conducted at four Delta locations: Tunica, Money, Yazoo City, and the Delta Branch Station at Stoneville. In the hill section of the state six Branch Experiment Station locations were used. They were Raymond, State College, Holly Springs, Newton, and two locations at the Pontotoc-Flatwoods Station.

The 1955 results at all ten of these locations are published in the January issue of Mississippi Farm Research and may be obtained on request from the Experiment Station at State College. Not only do they provide the cotton grower with complete information on how 16 varieties compared last year but long-time averages are also given for each location, offsetting the effects of one season's weather.
